

First 5 Fox Valley:

In 2019, Winnebago county passed a resolution (132-042019) committing to investing in young children & families in Winnebago County and states that "research shows that when investment is made in the first 3 years of a child's life, the returns for the community are the highest, and the need for more expensive interventions later is reduced... an deliver an annual return of up to 13% per child on upfront costs".

The Help me Grow database is a state-wide model that offers a way to track families and progress on childhood development to eliminate gaps in services and ensure families have all resources available to them. The database tracking is only one piece of the program, navigators then identify areas where additional support could be directed and assist families in accessing those supports. This funding would allow First 5 to expand their capacity and services throughout Winnebago county and offer a more comprehensive program.

ChildCare Resources & Referral (CCR&R):

Similarly, CCR&R has identified ways to address the childcare crisis in Winnebago County.

Childcare centers are struggling to fill staffing positions, labor shortages, low wages and few benefits associated with working in the childcare industry means providers are hiring to fill spots vs. looking for quality staff. Providers are struggling to cover the cost and cover the vacancies to send staff to outside training (which currently is not required for hire). With vacancies, families are either turned away or centers are pushed to capacity causing burnout of the untrained staff.

The request includes expansion of a substitute teacher pool, to allow in-home and group providers temporary assistance to cover for planned and unplanned absence. In-home providers are leaving the field due to the inability to close. They understand the challenges for the families when they need to shut down for illness or planned procedures, when those issues arise, instead of turning to an untrained friend or family member for assistance, the substitute teacher pool would be available. Funding would cover the costs to providers initially and grow into a pay for use program.

CCR&R has seen success of this model in other counties they serve and would like to bring it to Winnebago County.

NEW Mental Health:

Providing wide-ranging assistance to the general public, providers, navigators, law enforcement, behavioral health organizations, etc. This site also serves as a supplement to Winnebago County human services. The majority of the website's users (72%) are from Winnebago County. The improvements will provide much needed enhancements to the service directory, expand on website design, engagement and implementation to a broad range of users in Winnebago County. Due to an end of year (unexpected) donation, the project would be able to move ahead with the project with a revised request of:

- \$20,000 for year 1
- \$25,000 for year 2
- \$30,000 for year 3

Funding request can be reduced from \$90,000 to \$75,000.

The content improvements are a one-time, permanent, and sustainable for high-quality content, design work and integration into the website. The funds will not support the NEW Mental Health Connection, they will support the website improvement. Once completed, the upkeep of the new website features and content will be funded by their existing, annual membership dues.

Tri-County Dental:

Winnebago County residents comprise about 40% of all Tri-County Dental patients, even though the fixed-site clinic is not located in Winnebago County. Tri-County Dental's mobile clinic provides care at their schools to children in 25 Winnebago County schools, removing barriers to them getting care and allowing them to spend more time in the classroom. In 2022, 46% of the children receiving care on the mobile clinic go to school in Winnebago County.

Mobile clinic (dental Bus) costs are around \$200,000 for a custom build-out in the existing ManCave condominium storage facility. We were pleased to hear how creative Tri-County Dental was with this option as it would be a considerable cost savings vs. purchasing land and building from the ground up (quotes were in excess of \$300,000).

Pillars:

The funds would address overdue and underfunded maintenance for the 16 Ascend units that are home to 25 households (all residents of Winnebago County).

While Pillars serves households across the tri-county area, the funds applied for in Pillars' Winnebago Spirit Fund application would be restricted to Ascend (both program and non-program units) located in Neenah. Therefore, all 25 households (totaling 38 people as of today) are Winnebago County residents. This program works with young adults experiencing homelessness and mental health challenges.

We were impressed that Pillars is exploring their sustainability plan in light of some of the funding challenges in the Fox Cities. They've hosted a workgroup to start conversation on partnering with other organizations that specialize in mental health programming, diversifying their revenue streams and displacing some expenses, allowing Pillars to focus on their area of expertise, housing.

Describe the general scope of the project for which funding would be requested: Funds will be used to purchase items with three main focuses: an enhanced patient experience through updated tools; environmental and financial sustainability and emergency and disaster preparedness for the clinic property; financial stability with permanent mobile clinic storage.

1. Updated dental equipment and supporting technology to modernize our resources. These items will make us more attractive to our three groups who provide dentistry: Tri-County Dental Fellows; Marquette University School of Dentistry students; and volunteer dentists, who provide services and teach and supervise the students. With cutting-edge technology, we can compete for higher-caliber Fellows – recent dental school graduates who spend a year honing their skills and doing approximately 40% of our dentistry. Marquette University School of Dentistry, whose students provide a roughly one-third of our dentistry, consistently updates its equipment, and we need to stay current to be one of their off-site partners. The new technology can increase the number of volunteer dentists we have. For some, they will be able to use the technology they rely on in their office, making it more comfortable and easier to volunteer. For those who aren't using the new technology, it will allow them to be exposed to it without having to make the significant financial investment. More dentists using newer technology can improve dental services for us all. Here are the specifics:

o Treat dental decay - dental lasers, electric handpieces

Tooth decay is the second most common disease, after the common cold. Lasers remove decay without shots and the sound of drilling, reducing patient anxiety, especially with children who comprise 75% of our patients.

Not all decay can be removed with lasers. Electric handpieces are a more recent innovation to remove decay and are the technology dental schools are currently using and/or moving to.

Produce highly accurate dental images with 10 times less radiation using Cone Beam Computer
 Tomography (CBCT). Both hard and soft tissue images are captured, allowing for more accurate and
 safer diagnoses.

o Create crowns and flippers (removable artificial teeth) with a 3D printer. Priority will be given to children and veterans who have had front teeth removed, improving their self-confidence and selfesteem and the integrity of their mouth structure and bite. This will be a new service for us, and one we can do in our office in one visit, highly desirable so adults miss less work.

o Enhanced computer servers are a necessary one-time purchase to support any or all of the new lasers, CBCT and 3D printer.

o Intra-oral cameras and screens and televisions in each of our 13 operatories will be used to educate patients, reduce anxiety and enhance the patient experience. The cameras create images that can be projected onto the screen to show the patient the issues with their teeth or the great care they've been taking of their mouth. While the dental work is being done, the television can be used to watch videos, shows or movies to provide a distraction for the patient.

o Monitors in the lobby can be used to educate patients and patients' parents, as they are a captive audience when waiting for their children. We would like to use this time to provide education about good dental care. Daily dental care for kids is something that requires parental knowledge and follow up and makes a significant difference in children's outcomes. The current monitor in the team

conference room can't be seen by all team members when we gather for a training or education. It would be beneficial to have a screen that is visible to all.

o Phones and computers – our current phone system is decades old. A new system will allow us to contact patients using enhanced text technology and to mask when personal cell phones are used for follow up. Our computers are four years old and the infrastructure behind them is older. We'd like to improve our overall efficiency with updated computers.

2. Improve the environmental and financial sustainability of the clinic; prepare for disasters

o Using solar technology would bring down our clinic's electric bills and generate 85% of the power we consume, dropping our bills from \$5,000 to \$750 a year. As our roof is 20 years old, we would replace the roof before installing the solar panels.

o The addition of a generator would position the clinic to provide patient care during emergencies and disasters. Treating dental and other minor emergencies in our clinic would keep people out of hospital emergency departments so their attention can be focused on the most critical patients. We could also provide shelter, should it be needed.

3. Provide consistent storage for the mobile clinic, increasing our financial and physical stability.

o Historically, we have used donated or leased space for our mobile clinic. In the last three years, we have stored the mobile clinic in three different locations, one of which is 30 miles away from our clinic and further from the schools we serve. The mobile clinic is essential to our ability to treat kids in their schools and is a \$700,000 unit that needs to have a heated storage space to protect the dental equipment to keep it from freezing and breaking. The facility needs floor drains to remove safely the waste liquid and a water source to fill the tanks. To have our own permanent storage space with close proximity to our partner schools would be a game-changer and provide needed stability.

Describe the general scope of the project for which funding would be requested: Pillars requests \$50,00 in support of facilities and maintenance of Ascend. Ascend is a semi-independent program that provides supportive services and independent living skills paired with affordable housing for young adults living with mental health challenges. Since the inception of the program in 2017, Ascend has served over 80 young adults on their journeys to successful independent adulthood. Funding from the Winnebago County Spirit Fund will be used to address overdue and underfunded maintenance for the 16 Ascend units that are home to 25 households.

The 16 units that make up Ascend are owned and managed by Pillars. The housing is broken into two categories: Program Units and Non-Program Units (rental units). Program units are dedicated to housing Ascend participants while the remainder of the units are rented out below market rate. Rental income generated by these non-program units helps support the overall operations of Ascend. However, this rental income is not enough to sustain the program on its own.

Pillars acts and advocates, on our own and in partnership with others, to increase access to affordable housing. As such, Ascend program participants pay monthly program fees (which cover housing and all other program costs like case management and professional counseling services) well below market rate – 70% below market rate, in fact. This affordable rent helps support participants in establishing financial stability and self-sufficiency. Tenants residing non-program properties are charged below market rate, unlike many local landlords who charge rates far above true market rate. In charging these affordable rates, Pillars does not generate the full income potential of these units. Pillars absorbs the difference of income that would be generated by charging full rental amounts. These factors and more contribute to the Ascend facilities and maintenance budget operating at an amount below what is needed to maintain

the units at a comfortable level. Projects like tree removal, flooring rehab, garage upkeep, and more all remain in need of maintenance.

Having a home is imperative for these young adults' success. Pillars strives to provide a safe, comfortable home for all individuals who live with Pillars. Funding from this grant will make that possible for the 25 households who reside in Ascend units.

Please describe the lasting impact of this project on the community: The primary goal of Ascend is to quickly and dramatically improve the future for at-risk young adults who are living with a mental health challenge. As a participant of the Ascend program, young adults receive access to professional services like case management, life skills education, professional counseling, and a vast network of resources and community support. With these support systems and affordable, stable housing, these program participants have a firm foundation to build upon their independence and self-sufficiency. With a program duration of 2 years, young adults have the opportunity to explore career paths, continue education, and grow as an individual.

By leveraging the stability of safe, affordable housing in conjunction with resources for mental health support, education, employment, and basic living skills, program participants are set up for a lifetime of success and self-sufficiency. As these young adults are lifted up, they are supported in rising to the level of independence of which they are capable of. In the end, this yields a more vibrant and engaged community, a stronger workforce, less reliance on community programs and resources, and individuals who have greater opportunity to achieve success in every part of their lives. When the young adults of our society thrive, so does the community.

For many program participants, Ascend is their first experience having a safe, clean, and stable home. Ascend creates a new standard of home for these young adults' futures. When you're well-rested, healthy and strong, doing the hard work of overcoming barriers becomes easier. Stephanie*, a graduate of the program, shared a bit about her housing history and experience. Stephanie* reported that living at Ascend was the longest she had ever remained in one place. She went on to express her appreciation for having an environment where she can be "independent without drugs, alcohol, or guests distracting [her] from [her] goals."

Ophelia*, an upcoming graduate of the Ascend program, said, "for the first time in my life, I'm able to have regular therapy." She added, "I've never had a case manager before that could see me regularly, every single week. It's been really amazing to have that consistency and know that there's people that I can count on." Because of Ascend, Ophelia* was given the support and resources necessary to pursue her dream education and career. Ophelia's* next step toward independence is an apartment through Pillars Stable Housing. There, she will benefit from rent adjusted to 30% of her childcare worker income. Manageable rent will ensure she can continue to care for herself well, without financial stress or fear for her safety.

The direct impact of these maintenance needs will be tough to measure. Ascend has provided over 80 individuals with a place to call home while they work toward successful independence. By investing in the maintenance of these properties, you are investing in the young adults of our community and providing them with the best chance for success. This funding will allow Pillars to make the necessary investment in the homes that 25 young adults and 10 households of community members rely on each year.
