Tom Egan called the meeting to order at 3:00 p.m.

Public Comments

Supervisor Hanson addressed the Commission regarding a potential project.

Introduction and discussion regarding the role of the Commission. Mike Collard outlined the resolution creating the Commission and its role in making recommendations to the County Board regarding how ARPA State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds given to the County would be used.

Update regarding status of Winnebago County SLFRF allocation and allowable uses of funds.

The Commission reviewed a NACo publication regarding use of ARPA fiscal recovery funds by counties. Funds may be used in any of four broad categories: to replace public sector lost revenue, to respond to public health needs and negative economic impacts, to provide premium pay for essential workers, and to invest in broadband, sewer, and water infrastructure.

Mike Collard explained that under the latest guidance from the U.S. Treasury Department, a formula could be used to determine an amount of revenue that the County would be presumed to have lost as a result of the pandemic. Under this formula, we will be able to designate all of our SLFRF funds, in the amount of \$33,390,918, as replacement of lost revenue.

Once the funds have been designated as replacement for lost revenue, under the Treasury rules we will be able to use those funds to pay for a wide range of government services. This will free up funds that have been, or would otherwise be, used to pay for government services, which the County Board can then spend as it chooses. The end result will be that we will have fewer limitations on how the money is spent, fewer reporting requirements, and no time limit for using the funds.

After further discussion, the consensus of the Commission was that the funds would be treated as replacement of lost revenue, but then the funds freed up by allocating the money to general government services for various projects that are within the spirit of the ARPA rules. Until spent this money will be maintained in a separate fund and not comingled with other County funds.

Discussion regarding strategic planning, priority and outcome setting, and methods the Commission will use to consider spending and appropriation requests.

Bob Poeschl suggested that we set up a typical submission process for projects, with an application form, and soliciting proposals from various entities. He also thought that a portion of the ARPA dollars should be allocated to creating a strategic plan for the County. There was considerable further discussion by the Commission regarding a wide variety of community needs

Set next meeting date and time.

The commission agreed to meet next on August 9 at 3:00 p.m.

Chuck Farrey moved to adjourn, seconded by Morris Cox. All members voting in favor, the meeting was adjourned at 5:00 p.m.

Background:

The American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA) established State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds, designed to deliver \$350 billion to state, local, territorial, and tribal governments to bolster their response to the COVID-19 emergency and its economic impacts. Of the \$350 billion earmarked, Winnebago County was allocated \$33,390,918, to be disbursed in two tranches of \$16,695,459 each. The first tranche was received by the County on May 19, 2021, and was accepted by the Board through Resolution 196-082021, adopted on August 17, 2021. The second tranche of \$16,695,459 was received by the County on July 11, 2022.

Justification:

Under Chapter 59.52(19) of the Wisconsin Statutes, "The board may accept donations, gifts or grants for any public governmental purpose within the powers of the county."

This resolution will simply accept the second installment of funds. It will not determine how the funds will be used.

RESOLUTION:

Recognizing State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds Established by the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) in the Amount of \$33,390,918 as Replacement of Lost Public Sector Revenue, Identifying General Government Expenditures as Having Been Funded by this Revenue

TO THE WINNEBAGO COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS:

WHEREAS, in order to support the pandemic response, bring back jobs, and lay the groundwork for a strong and equitable recovery, the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA) established State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds, designed to deliver \$350 billion to state, local, territorial, and tribal governments to bolster their response to the COVID-19 emergency and its economic impacts; and

WHEREAS, one of the allowable uses of these funds is to replace lost public sector revenue, and regulations promulgated by the U.S. Department provide a formula which may be used determine a presumed amount of revenue lost by the governmental entity as a result of the pandemic; and

WHEREAS, application of this formula shows that Winnebago County's entire allocation of \$33,390,918 may be claimed as recovery of lost revenue resulting from the pandemic; and

WHEREAS, with certain exceptions, ARPA funds which represent replacement of lost revenue may be used for general government services performed after March 3, 2021;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors that it recognizes State and Local Fiscal Recover Funds in the amount of \$33,390,918 as replacement of lost public sector revenue for Winnebago County.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Winnebago County hereby identifies expenses incurred and paid in the form of regular wages incurred between March 4, 2021 and September 30, 2022 in the following general fund departments: Sheriff, Coroner, Emergency Management, Parks, Information Systems, and Facilities and Property Management, and in Park View Health Center, as general government services which have been funded through the use of ARPA SLFRF funds, and recognizes revenue in those departments in amounts totaling \$33,390,918 in 2022.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the eventual use of the fund balances created by recognition of this revenue will await further action by the Board.

Fiscal Note: Revenue totaling \$33,390,918 will be recognized in 2022, and will be identified has having funded prior expenses in the same amount. The fund balances created by this recognition will be subject to future action by the Board.

Background:

Going back several decades, Winnebago County as a whole of government has not had a strategic plan, which would clearly define a mission, vision and priorities. Additionally, the strategic plan would outline specific goals and objectives to guide staff.

Without a strategic plan, Winnebago County lacks direction on how to allocate and spend ARPA resources let alone maintain and invest in other priorities. Communities with robust strategic plans have been to more quickly identify areas of investment.

Specifically, under ARPA, counties may spend resources on planning, consultants, and other expenses to ensure proper allocation of the resources. Treasury has been actively encouraging governments to go through this process to ensure ARPA is spent effectively.

The County Executive has been discussing the need for a strategic plan since arriving in office in 2021. A strategic plan is crucial for an organization to set overall goals and develop a plan to achieve these stated outcomes. Not having a strategic plan in Winnebago County makes decision more difficult This document will greatly assist us in direction and purpose of all that we do.

Measuring outcomes has not been a strength of Winnebago County. A budget planning tool will focus our thinking to outcomes-based budgeting, prioritize our programs within the County to help us determine effectiveness, and review mandated services. It can provide the data we need to make fully informed decisions for both short- and long-term goals within our County structure.

Policy Discussion:

ARPA funds need to be seen as investment dollars for a better future and not simply money to be spent on projects. We know the pandemic caused challenges such as the labor crisis and supply chain disruptions. We must be ready to adjust our spending to adapt to the challenges met by our citizens. ARPA allocation should be a slow and cautious effort to ensure the well-being of Winnebago County residents for the long-term effects suffered from this pandemic. We must find a new way forward and clearly define

what our role should be as the Winnebago County government. This is a strong first step in achieving a clear and direct path for us to govern.

Additionally, I am requesting dollars (about \$45,000) to hire a firm through RFP to facilitate a strategic plan. Hiring a firm will bring together county board members, departments and members of the community in developing our strategic plan. An additional \$40,000 will be utilized to review our strategic plan for stated outcomes through software and other dashboarding services.

Lastly, I am asking for dollars (about \$90,000) to hire a firm over multiple years with a software tool to begin priority-based budgeting (PBB). We would ask a priority-based budgeting software used by Marathon, Jefferson and Washington Counties and numerous cities across the state to respond to an RFP. When using PBB, a tool begins to track data and cost each program within the county. Each program is then scored for a mandate. Following the completion of a strategic plan and priorities, each program is scored for priorities. The idea is to reallocate resources to higher priority areas. This project will add quite a bit of responsibility to the finance staff. With the assistance of a policy analyst, the finance department will be able to knock the project out of the park. PBB will build on the review of programs in the late-2000s.

Both the strategic plan and PBB tool are essential to determining which projects and ideas should be funded with ARPA dollars.

With a strategic plan, an annual review of the objectives and goals could be presented to the board. Marathon County does this. This will keep board policy making and county executive operational direction easier and moving in the same direction.
