RULES.

Motion that the rules of the last supervisor year be adopted for the year 1927, carried.

RULES OF BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF WINNEBAGO COUNTY.

Adopted April 25, 1927.

I. The meetings of this Board shall be held in the Supervisors' room, and the hour for daily meetings shall be 10 a. m.

And the County Board shall continue in continuous session from day to day until adjourned, unless to a day certain or sine die.

II. At the first meeting of the Board it shall be the duty of the chairman, or in case of his absence, the vice chairman, or in their absence, the clerk, to call to order.

The clerk shall then call the roll of members.

A quorum being present, the Board shall proceed to the election of a chairman and vice chairman.

(Amended to provide for vice chairman as authorized by Ch. 110, of 1903.)

III. It shall be the duty of the chairman to appoint the following standing committees, each to consist of the number of members as set after the name of each committee, viz:

Equalization, 9; finance, 8; general accounts, 7; illegal assessments, 5; justice and constables' accounts, 7; sheriff's and coroners' accounts, 7; insane, 3; poor and poor farm, 3; workhouse, 3; corporations, 3; public buildings, 5; roads and bridges, 5; per diem and mileage, 5; printing, 3; bonds and salaries, 5; county abstract and tract index system, 3; rules, 3; education, 3; sanatorium, 5.

IV. The Board may adjourn for such time as shall be necessary for the chairman to prepare the list of committees, and no business can be done until the same shall be announced.

V. The chairman, or in his absence, the vice chairman, shall take the chair at the hour to which the Board may from time to time stand adjourned, call the Board to order and direct the calling of the roll of members by the clerk.

VI. Upon the appearance of a quorum, the journal of the preceding day shall be read by the clerk, and any mistake therein shall be corrected by the Board; provided, that upon the last day of the session the journal for that day will be read and, before the final adjournment, corrected.

VII. After the reading and correction of the journal, the order of business shall be as follows:

1. Reception of petitions, memorials, accounts, etc.
2. Presentation of resolutions and disposition of same.
3. Reports of standing committees.
4. Reports of select committees.
5. Consideration of miscellaneous business.

VIII. The chairman shall preserve order and decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Board; and shall clearly and distinctly state every motion or question before debate.

IX. The chairman shall be entitled to vote on all questions taken by ayes and noes, and his name shall be called last; when the vote on any question is a tie, it shall be deemed to have been lost.

X. Every motion or amendment shall be reduced to writing when a request therefor shall be made by any member; and all petitions, memorials and substitutes shall be reduced to writing and read before they shall be considered by the Board.

XI. Every written resolution shall have attached thereto the name of the person introducing it; and when referred to a committee, the names of such committees shall be endorsed thereon.

XII. Every member, previous to speaking, shall rise and address the chair.

XIII. When two or more members rise at once, the chair shall designate the member who is to speak first; but in all cases the member who shall first rise and address the chair shall speak first.

XIV. No member shall speak more than twice upon the same question without leave; and when called to order by the chairman shall take his seat, and shall not be allowed to proceed without leave of the Board.

XV. A vote on any question shall be taken by ayes and nays when called for by any member; and SHALL be so taken on all questions involving the expenditure of money; and whenever a vote is so ordered and taken, the members voting in the affirmative and negative, as well as those absent or not voting, shall be recorded at length in the records of the proceedings of the County Board.

(Amended to conform to Sec. 709, Stat. of 1898.)

XVI. No account or claim against the county shall be audited unless it be made out in items and duly verified and be filed with the clerk of the Board, except as otherwise provided by law.

XVII. When a motion is under consideration, no motion shall be entertained except:

1. To adjourn.
2. To lay on the table.
3. For the previous question.
4. To postpone to a day certain.
5. To commit to a committee.
6. To amend or to substitute.
7. To postpone indefinitely.

These several motions shall take precedence in the order in which they stand in this rule.

XVIII. A motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, and for the previous question shall be decided without debate, except as hereinafter provided.

XIX. A motion to postpone indefinitely or to a day certain or to commit shall not be again entertained on the same day or in the same stage of the proposition.

XX. A substitute shall be open to amendment the same as the original proposition; but when adopted, shall not be subject to amendment. If an amendment or substitute is lost, another substantially the same shall not be entertained.

XXI. When a motion or question has once been determined, any member voting with the majority may move a reconsideration of the vote, but such motion shall be made and acted on at the same or next succeeding meeting, and shall not thereafter be made except by unanimous consent.

XXII. The previous question may be moved by any member, and the chairman shall then say: "It requiring five members to second this motion, those in favor of sustaining the motion will rise." If five or more members then rise, the previous question shall thereby be seconded and an opportunity then be given to any two members opposed thereto to briefly state their objections. The question shall then be: "Shall the question be now put?" which, if carried by a vote of two-thirds of the members present upon a call of the ayes and nays, the Board shall immediately proceed to vote upon the pending amendment, if any, and upon the main question.

XXIII. In filling blanks, the largest sum and the longest time shall be first put.

XXIV. These rules shall not be changed, amended or repealed, unless the proposition or amendment is introduced in writing and the same laid over to some subsequent meeting of the Board, not less than five days intervening, and then only with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

XXV. Any of these rules may be suspended upon any pending measure by unanimous consent or by two-thirds of the members present.

XXVI. These rules and all amendments or additions thereto which may hereafter be made shall govern the Board until altered or repealed, as herein provided.

XXVII. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in "Jefferson's Manual," so far as they remain in common use and are practicable and applicable and not inconsistent herewith, shall govern the Board.

XXVIII. Whenever the Board shall have gone into a committee of the whole and shall have arisen, the Board shall at once be in session for the receiving and acting upon the report of the committee of the whole, and for the transaction of any and all other business of every kind.

XXIX. No resolution for the appropriation for money shall be in order until the day after its presentation and reference, except upon the consent of two-thirds of the members of the County Board present.

XXX. All reports, resolutions and petitions must be presented in typewritten form, and read by the supervisor presenting the same.

APPROPRIATION FOR SPECIAL TREATMENT OF DEFECTIVE CHILDREN.

Supervisor Young offered the following Resolution No. 1.

Whereas, an appropriation of \$300 was made at the March, 1926, session of the County Board of Supervisors to procure medical aid for correction of physical defects of children.

Of this amount \$255.45 has been spent as follows:

Cases as tonsils removed for 8 children.

Glasses fitted for 3 children.

Dental work done for 4 children.

Eyes treated for 3 children.

Throat examination and X-ray work done for another child.

Hospital bill paid for throat cases.

Whereas, it has been possible to make above corrections for children whose parents were indigent at a cost less than would be incurred by sending them to the Wisconsin General hospital, therefore,

Resolved, that there be and is appropriated from the general fund of the county treasury an appropriation of the sum of three hundred dollars, for the use of the county nursing committee and the county nurse, to be used in caring for children in need of such treatment as above stated. The amounts to be paid by the clerk and treasurer upon presentation of a voucher of the chairman of the County Board.

TO DEFER PAVING OF MURDOCK STREET

The following communication from the City of Oshkosh, mayor and council, was presented.

To the Honorable County Board of Winnebago County:

In conference with your highway committee, Saturday, April 23, 1927, which was attended by the mayor and city engineer of the City of Oshkosh, an informal discussion of the paving of Murdock street from Main street to Jackson drive in the city, was had.

At this meeting it was pointed out by the mayor and engineer of the City of Oshkosh, that the city would like to complete the paving of this street, but that they could not do so this year, as money must be provided in the budget a year in advance to take care of the city's share of the paving, as well as the sewer, water and gas, and that if the paving is not ordered in, in the regular way, the street car company can not be compelled to pay their share of the expense, and the city could not make an assessment of benefits and damages to the adjoining property. In other words, the city can not take up this matter this year.

The city, by its mayor and council, desire to express their thanks for the consideration shown them, and to request that your honorable board defer action on the paving of this street until the season of 1928, thus giving the city an opportunity to comply with the statutes and complete the paving at the time the work is done by the county. If this consideration is shown the city, we will make preparation to carry out the city's part of the paving, at the same time of the county's work, and thus assure the city of a much better street.

AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE REGULATING THE USE OF AUTOMOBILES ON THE PUBLIC HIGHWAYS.

The Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin, ordains as follows:

That an ordinance relating to the operation of automobiles on the public highways, adopted by the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County on March 6, 1920, and published March 18, 1920, be and the same is hereby amended by the creation of five new sections, which are hereby added to said ordinance:

Section 1. There is hereby created in Winnebago County, Wisconsin, an office to be known as county motorcycle police. Said motorcycle police shall be elected by the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County at the annual meeting of said board, on such terms and in such numbers as the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County shall declare by resolution.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of said motorcycle police to police the highways of Winnebago County, maintained by the state and county, or by either the state or county, and to enforce all of the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 3. Said motorcycle police shall take and subscribe the usual constitutional oath, which oath shall be filed in the office of the clerk and shall further execute and file with the county clerk of Winnebago County a good and sufficient bond to protect Winnebago County against any and all unauthorized acts of said county motorcycle police, and for the faithful performance of the duties of their office, and upon the filing of said oath and such bond the said motorcycle police shall be and they hereby are invested with full police power, and all the power and authority vested in constables and deputy sheriffs.

Section 4. Said motorcycle police shall, in the discharge of their official duties, conform to such rules and regulations as may be prescribed from time to time by the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, or the district attorney.

Section 5. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage and publication.

That said motorcycle officers shall receive a salary of \$225.00 per month, provided they have had more than one year's experience as motorcycle officer in Winnebago County, and \$175.00 per month for their first year of service, and upon the further condition that said motorcycle officers execute and file, with the county clerk of Winnebago County, a good and sufficient bond to protect Winnebago County against any and all unauthorized acts of said motorcycle officers, and upon the further condition that said motorcycle officers execute and file, with the county clerk of Winnebago County, a good and sufficient policy of liability insurance covering said motorcycle officers, and said motorcycles, the premium on said bond and policy to be paid by Winnebago County, and upon the further condition that said compensation above referred to shall be in full and for all services rendered by said motorcycle officers, and that said officers shall furnish their own equipment, except the insignia or star to be furnished by the county clerk of Winnebago County.

HIGHWAY ORDINANCE.

Assistant District Attorney Walter J. Patri submitted the following ordinance, to comply with the new state laws, and to take the place of the ordinance now in effect:

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE OPERATION OF AUTOMOBILES ON THE PUBLIC HIGHWAYS.

The Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin, ordains as follows:

SECTION I.

(a). No person under the age of sixteen years, unless accompanied by a parent, guardian, or other adult person, and no intoxicated person shall operate, ride, or drive any automobile, motorcycle, or other similar motor vehicle along or upon any public highway in this county.

(b). No person shall operate a motor vehicle recklessly, or at a speed greater than is reasonable and proper, with due regard to the width, surface traffic, and use of the highways, and the rules of the road, or so as to injure the property, life, or limb of any person.

(c). Subject to the foregoing provisions of this section, and except in those instances where a lower speed is specified in this section, it shall be prima facie lawful for the driver of a motor vehicle to drive the same at a speed not exceeding the following, but in any case, when such speed would be unsafe, it shall not be lawful:

1. Fifteen miles an hour when passing a school during school recess or while children are going to or leaving school during opening or closing hours;

2. Fifteen miles an hour when approaching within fifty feet and in traversing an intersection of highways when the driver's view is obstructed. A driver's view shall be deemed to be obstructed when at any time during the last fifty feet of his approach to such intersection, he does not have a clear and uninterrupted view of such intersection and of the traffic upon all of the highways entering such intersection for a distance of two hundred feet from such intersection;

3. Fifteen miles an hour in traversing or going around curves or traversing a grade upon a highway when the driver's view is obstructed within a distance of one hundred feet along such highway in the direction in which he is proceeding;

4. Twenty miles an hour on any highway in a business district, when traffic on such highway is controlled at intersections by traffic officers or stop-and-go signals; a business district is defined to be the territory contiguous to a highway when fifty per cent or more of the frontage thereon for a distance of three hundred feet or more is occupied by buildings in use for business;

5. Fifteen miles an hour on all other highways in a business district, as defined herein;

6. Twenty miles an hour in a residence district, and in public parks unless a different speed is fixed by local authorities and duly posted; a residence district is defined to be the territory contiguous to a highway not comprising a business district when the frontage on such highway for a distance of three hundred feet or more is mainly occupied by dwellings or by dwellings and buildings in use for business;

7. Fifteen miles per hour when passing through any cemetery or through any county or state hospital, or poor farm grounds, or through any park;

8. Forty miles an hour under all other conditions.

SECTION II.

At the intersection of any public street or highway of the county, with any other public street or highway of the county, the operator or driver of any vehicle shall have the right of way over the operator or driver of any other vehicle approaching him on such cross-street or highway, from the left, except only in cases in cities where automatic stop-and-go signals shall be in operation, or where a police officer shall be in actual charge of the regulation of traffic at such intersection of streets.

SECTION III.

The operator or driver of any vehicle, when any street or interurban car is actually taking on, or discharging passengers at the crossing or intersections of any public streets or highways of the county, shall stop such motor driven vehicle until such passengers shall have been taken on, or been discharged from such car.

SECTION IV.

It shall be unlawful for any person to operate any automobile, motorcycle, or other similar motor vehicle without a sufficient modern and improved muffler to prevent noise, or with its muffler open upon or along any public street within the corporate limits of any city or village in this county.

SECTION V.

Every person operating an automobile or other similar motor vehicle upon or along any public highway of the county shall, upon a signal by putting up the hand or other sign of distress made by a person riding or driving a horse or horses which are frightened, cause such automobile or other similar motor vehicle to stop unless a movement forward is necessary to avoid accident or injury and upon request shall stop all motor power until such horse or horses are under control; and shall, if requested, assist such person or persons to pass such automobile or other similar motor vehicle in safety.

SECTION VI.

Every owner and operator of an automobile or other similar motor vehicle shall have equal rights upon all public highways of this county with all other users of such highways, and no person or persons shall in any way obstruct or impede the right of traffic of such operator or owner while operating, propelling, or driving such automobile or other similar motor vehicle.

SECTION VII.

From thirty minutes after sunset until thirty minutes before sunrise, no motor driven vehicle shall be driven upon, or occupy any public high-

way in this county, unless such vehicle is provided with two head lights, which shall be of such design and so adjusted, and of such power to enable the driver of such motor vehicle to distinguish a person, vehicle, or other substantial object two hundred feet ahead, and which shall be of such design, adjustment, and operation as shall avoid dangerous glare or dazzle.

There shall be displayed on the rear of every such motor vehicle one tail light, which shall display a red light, visible from the rear.

No motorcycle shall be operated or driven on or upon any public highway of this county, unless the same shall be equipped with one head light, of such design and so adjusted and operated as to render the use of the highway, by such motorcycle, safe for all the public, and said motorcycle shall also be equipped with a tail light, which shall display a red light, visible from the rear.

SECTION VIII.

Every such automobile, motorcycle, or other similar motor vehicle, while being used upon any public highway of the county, shall be provided with efficient brakes, and an adequate bell, horn, or other signal device, and it shall be unlawful for any person to use any signal device which shall not produce an abrupt sound, sufficiently loud to serve as an adequate warning of danger, and it shall be unlawful for any person operating any automobile, motorcycle, or other similar motor vehicle to make, or cause to be made, any unnecessary noise with any such bell, horn, or other similar device, or to use the same except in warning of danger.

SECTION IX.

Any person or persons who violate the provisions of SECTION I of this ordinance, shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$100.00, nor less than \$5.00, or by imprisonment in the county jail not to exceed three months, or by both such fine and imprisonment; any person or persons who violate the provisions of SECTION II of this ordinance, shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$100.00, nor less than \$5.00, or by imprisonment in the county jail not to exceed three months, or by both such fine and imprisonment; any person or persons who violate the provisions of SECTION III of this ordinance, shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$100.00, nor less than \$5.00, or by imprisonment in the county jail not to exceed three months, or by both such fine and imprisonment; any person or persons who violate the provisions of SECTION IV of this ordinance, shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$25.00, nor less than \$10.00; any person or persons who violate the provisions of SECTION V of this ordinance, shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$25.00, nor less than \$10.00; any person or persons who violate the provisions of SECTION VI of this ordinance, shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$25.00, nor less than \$10.00; any person or persons who violate the provisions of SECTION VII of this ordinance, shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$100.00, nor less than \$5.00, or by imprisonment in the county jail not to exceed three months, or by both such fine and imprisonment; any person or persons who violate the provisions of SECTION VIII of this ordinance, shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$25.00, nor less than \$10.00.

SECTION X.

All proceedings for the violation of the provisions of this ordinance may be had before any justice of the peace or municipal court within the county having jurisdiction of similar cases under the laws of the state and all such proceedings shall be had and conducted in the same manner as similar cases under the state law except that any and all fines collected under the provisions of this ordinance shall be paid into the treasury of Winnebago County.

SECTION XI.

This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage and publication.

Whereas, the construction or reconstruction of a new bridge in its place is now necessary and advisable, and

Whereas, the said United States government canal is a navigable stream and the said bridge is required by the United States government for navigation purposes; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, by the common council of the City of Menasha, that we hereby respectfully request the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, at its next session, to petition the state highway commission, setting forth that Federal Trunk Highway No. 41 crosses a navigable stream, namely the United States government canal on the Tayco street bridge in the City of Menasha, in said Winnebago county, and that said County Board desires the construction or reconstruction of a bridge across said stream to replace the present structure, and that the construction or reconstruction of such bridge is necessary and is required to be a swing or lift bridge by the United States government, and that said bridge is located within a city of a fourth class on a street forming a direct connection between portions of the state trunk highway system.

Be it further resolved, that the city clerk promptly transmit sufficient copies of this resolution to the County Board of Supervisors and to the state highway commission.

Supervision.

There are 96 schools in the county and 119 teachers. Since making the last report 189 visits were made in inspecting the schools and assisting the teachers. Fifteen night meetings were attended during the year. These meetings were largely for the purpose of borrowing money from the state and discussing the immediate needs of the district.

Talks on office records were given to the training classes at Omro and to the Oshkosh Teachers' College. The office cooperated with these departments in permitting practice teachers to do observation and practice work in the county. Miss Ryss and I met regularly once a month with Mr. Patch and Miss Berg, both of Omro, to discuss topics of supervision in the county.

In accordance with the law, the county superintendent appointed the supervising teacher for a term of ten months, beginning August 1927 and ending June 1928. The supervising teacher is to supervise and assist under the direction of the county superintendent, the teachers employed in the schools of the county or superintendent district, devoting special attention to the less experienced teachers. It is indeed a pleasure to work with one who cooperates in every respect and who is most efficient in the work of supervision. I want to personally thank members of the County Board and others who made it possible for each county to retain the services of the supervising teacher.

Institute Fund.

The teachers' county institute fund is used for the expenses of speakers at county institutes held during the year. The state apportions a certain amount for this fund each year. Following is a report of the county institute fund of Winnebago County for the year 1926-27:

Certification.

Of the 119 teachers in the county, 13 have state certificates, 78 have first grade certificates and 28 have second grade certificates. Because of raising the standards of certification the number of teachers having first grade certificates is less than last year.

At the last session of the legislature an equalization law was passed, making a more equal distribution of school money to school districts in the state. Thus the law in regard to special state aid to teachers and school districts was done away with. As the law goes into effect January 1, 1928, the schools meeting the requirements will receive aid for the year ending June 30, 1927. Twenty-five districts will receive aid under the old law, an increase of eight over the year before.

Improvements.

Many schools have been remodeled. There is an increase of about 10 percent in the number of schools that have playground equipment. Three new schools were completed during the year at an average cost of \$6,500. Reference sets were placed in twenty-eight of the schools during the summer. Most of the schools now have reference material.

Attendance.

There has been a marked increase in attendance during the past four years. This is due to the hearty cooperation of both teachers and parents. In 1924-25 the average daily attendance was 86 percent. In 1925-26 it was about 87 percent. In 1926-27 it was 87 percent. The greatest problem is that of the attendance of the beet weeders' children. This problem the industrial commission of Madison is taking up and is cooperating with the office in regard to enforcing the law.

Reading Circle.

The teachers have the privilege of joining the local county teachers' association, which authorizes the superintendent to buy three professional reading circle books. Written reports are made on questions submitted from this office. The total number who earned teachers' reading circle diplomas or seals was 135, an increase of 17. 2,115 pupils earned reading circle diplomas or seals, an increase of 258 over 1925-26. 89 out of 92 county schools did the reading circle work. 43 schools are credited with having done 100 percent reading circle work.

County Fair.

Splendid use was made of the new educational building last year. All school systems of the county were represented except Winneconne. They are planning on an exhibit next year. The space provided for demonstration was in use all of the time. 46 rural and state graded schools had approximately 1,000 entries. The work was judged and premiums awarded during the summer. Mostly prize work was exhibited at the fair. The banner school received first in the county and sixth in the state. Individual prize money received from the state fair amounted to about \$30.00.

This year promises to equal, if not to better, the record of last year.

PROBATION OFFICER'S REPORT.

Mrs. Margaret Thorn, probation officer, offered the following Report No. 8:

To the County Board of Supervisors, Winnebago County:

Gentlemen:—Again we have arrived at the time of the year when it is the custom and obligation of your probation officer to give an accounting of the work done during the past year. It can only be a brief outline to give you some idea of the way the days have been spent, exclusive of one week of vacation.

From November 1, 1926, to November 1, 1927, the records show 120 families have been served by the mothers' pension and assistance in the support of 318 children. 25 of these were new applicants. Besides the 120 active pension cases there have been 34 applications requiring investigation which have not received the pension. These were found ineligible for various reasons, as no residence, adequate income, or in cases of desertion or divorce, support has been secured from the father. The sheriff's department has been very useful in the latter cases. These cases especially show the necessity for investigation. In addition to the above 154 pension cases, 59 others have received attention, making a total of 213 cases.

Three visits were made during the year to the industrial school for girls at Milwaukee, in the interest of girls placed there, and one to the industrial school for boys at Waukesha. The home for delinquent women at Taycheedah and the state prison at Waupun were also visited.

In deciding the amount of pension needed for a family, a minimum budget is worked out for each family and balanced with its income. Also it must be taken into consideration the irregularity of employment. In some cases the amount of pension allowed by law does not meet the needs of the family and it is supplemented by a welfare organization. During the past year the Bureau of Family Service has supplemented in 14 such families in Oshkosh, giving:

In the families where the incapacitated father has been a worker for the Paine Lumber Company, if supplementary aid is needed, it is granted by the company. In Catholic families, often the apostellate assists.

In Neenah, the Red Cross has given assistance in medicine, hospital care, fuel and groceries.

Sixteen cases have been discontinued during the year. The causes for discontinuing were:

Marriage of mother	5 cases.
Sufficient income	6 cases.

The mothers' pension is called an investment in future citizens and we have sometimes been asked if the children of these families rank favorably with those of their neighbors where the bread winner has not been taken away. Generally, it seems that they do, which certainly speaks well for the mother struggling alone to rear the family. Many of these mothers find it necessary to spend too much time outside of the home to earn and supplement the pension. Your worker has no desire to encourage dependency and every effort is made to keep a spirit of independence in the family, but there is grave danger both to the welfare of the mother and that of the children, when the mother spends many hours outside of the home. In such cases some way must be found for the children to be properly looked after and the home not neglected and the mother's health guarded. In some cases it has been found that the strain of responsibility has become too great for the mother.

The children's code committee, organized by the Wisconsin Conference of Social Work, is considering many problems in the children's work of the state and we hope for beneficial results from their study of the work. One of the several things hoped for a year ago was legislation that would take care of the state's original promise of annually refunding one-third of the aid granted by the counties. This matter will not be dropped. It is believed this is the first step to be taken in order to secure other desired and beneficial changes.

In a recent questionnaire sent to the juvenile courts by the children's code committee, the question was asked if anything was done to lift the family out of its dependence so it would not always be a dependent family. In pension families this is necessarily slow work. The aim in helping others should always be to help them to help themselves. Where the family is large, the mother usually cannot become independent until some of the children become bread-winners. Many things enter into lengthening the period of dependence in the large family, such as illness, early marriages of the children, or weakening of the family ties, which seems so prevalent at the present time.

One case which came in this year, it is hoped, will be self-supporting in less than a year. This woman was deserted and left with two children. She was much in need of an artificial limb when she applied for a mother's pension. The state rehabilitation department was appealed to for the artificial limb, which they will supply, and because the woman had had sufficient high school education, they also are giving her a business course. When this is completed, she should be able to secure a salary that will more than equal the present income upon which the family is now living. She is very enthusiastic over the work.

Another who completed a business course before she married, but had become "rusty" in her knowledge of the work when her husband died, is reviewing the work at night school with the same end in view. Another woman whose eldest daughter will graduate from High school next June and be ready to assist the mother will be independent from laundry work which was taken up through the purchase of an electric machine. Another

has started a licensed boarding home for children. These are only a few cases to show the efforts of some of the mothers to become independent through the aid given them.

The number of cases outside of the pension families are constantly increasing and with the necessary investigation and follow-up work for both, which takes much time, the work is constantly becoming more heavy. The need for someone in the office who understands the office end is correspondingly necessary.

In the 59 cases outside of the pension work the problems considered were neglect of the home, marital troubles, delinquency, truancy, the mentally defective, the unmarried mother and home finding. The two latter include boarding homes and placing for adoption. In the case of the illegitimate child, whenever it is possible and it seems advisable, an effort is made to keep the child with the mother. Also, an effort is made to establish paternity and secure support from the father.

The assistance of the district attorney has been much appreciated as well as that of other individuals and organizations. And over and above all the support and advice of the juvenile judge, whose long experience in the work makes such help of great value.

Again your worker wishes to remind you that if the pension is an investment in future citizens, we must endeavor to provide means for the balanced life embracing the elements of health, education, employment, recreation and spiritual development.

The health problem has always been more or less difficult to care for and it is becoming more so each year. In the case of the local families, the Bureau of Family Service which has assisted in medical cases, wishes to use its funds for its own families. In Neenah and Menasha the cities feel the pension cases should not be placed with the city dependents. Oshkosh officials take the same attitude. It is suggested that a committee be appointed to study this situation during the present session of the County Board and some decision reached as to how these cases shall be cared for wherever the need may arise in the county. Other counties are doing this.

I wish to thank the County Board for its prompt response when an office was needed in March. It is thought by friends of the work that a definite office is another step in the work's progress. We have considered carefully the needs of the situations as they have arisen and have endeavored to be as conservative as seemed wise if there was to be progress in the work that will keep our county's rank with that of the foremost in the state. Your worker greatly appreciates your cooperation in the efforts made each year to raise the standard of the work done.

Of the \$10,000.00 received from the county, \$250.00 was paid to the Twin-City Poultry Association of Neenah-Menasha, \$250.00 to the Wisconsin State Poultry Association of Oshkosh, and \$9,035.00 was spent for permanent improvements, leaving a balance of \$465.00 in this fund.

The cold weather experienced during fair week cut down the gate and grandstand receipts several thousand dollars. Although the net profit this year was very small, yet it is the ninth consecutive time that a balance was shown on the right side. This record has not been beaten by any county fair in the middle west. Some of the largest fairs in Wisconsin, although they receive the limit in county aid, yet are heavily in debt and show losses in operation. We must continue to take pride in our fair and keep it on a sound business basis.

Of the 2,424 exhibitors at the 1927 fair, 324 were adults, 62 junior farmers, and 2,038 from the rural and city schools of the county. The premium money spent on the junior farmers and pupils from the rural and

city schools, was the best investment made. The work of this class of exhibitors should be encouraged more and more.

The 1928 fair should show more encouragement for home exhibitors in the livestock classes. The Midway should be limited to riding devices and worthwhile shows. The worthless sideshows should be replaced with automobile exhibits.

While other county fairs are asking for more aid this year, I think it would be a good policy for Winnebago County to cut down \$1,000.00 on the fair aid budget this year, and cut still more in following years, providing no real disastrous weather is encountered at coming fairs. This can be done and still have our fair progress in an admirable manner, and hold its high ranking with other fairs. The County Board of Supervisors are to be congratulated on their unanimous support of the fair in the past, and I trust the county fair will always merit their confidence.

SUPERVISING TEACHER'S REPORT.

Miss Anna Ryss, supervising teacher, offered the following Report No. 12:

To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors, Winnebago County, Wis.:

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen:—I am glad to have this opportunity to appear before you and present a report of the work that was accomplished by the supervising teacher during the ten-month term, beginning August 9, 1926 and ending June 8, 1927.

The supervising teacher's work is under the direct supervision of the state department of education. A state conference of supervising teachers was held August 30 to September 4, 1926, at the state fair grounds, West Allis. At the annual conference, the salient objectives of the year's work are outlined and discussed. All the plans for our work contain the keynote

"closer supervision of classroom instruction." This means better school-room results and a better understanding of the individual pupils. Through all of our work we must see, not the teacher, nor the school boards, nor the parents, but the child. He comes to school to learn, and if we as teachers and supervisors fail to awaken in him a desire to learn, to progress, and to accomplish, we fall short of our mission.

The supervisory program for the year is always based on the text of the law which states that the work of the supervising teacher is "to supervise and assist the teachers employed in the schools, devoting special attention to the less experienced teachers." With this in mind, the beginning teachers are always visited early in the year, and a first visit made to the other schools as soon as possible. Schools that need special attention are visited more frequently than others. It is our aim to visit all the schools at least three times a year, believing that shorter but more frequent contacts are of greater benefit to the school than longer supervisory visits. However, we feel that the supervisory district is too large to permit the intensive work so necessary for the best results.

In addition to the classroom supervision, group meetings of teachers were held in various centers of the county. The unit plan of instruction in content subjects was the objective in this work and we feel that much was accomplished through the meetings. A large number of schools observed Patron's day and whenever possible the school was visited on that special day. This, together with visits to community gatherings has brought our office in close contact with various districts.

The issuance of six week's outlines and ability tests has been continued. By this method it is possible to keep the work fairly uniform throughout the county.

The following detailed summary of the work for the past year covers any further duties which might be mentioned.

The total cost of the supervising teacher, expense and salary, was \$2,790.79.

In the present year 35 days have been spent in school visitations. Two group meetings of teachers have been held and plans have been made for several others to be held at later dates.

A county-wide standard test program is in progress at the present time. This is for the purpose of making an inventory of the teaching results in the schools. Although a small percentage of the schools have been tested up to date, we are well pleased with the results. In most cases we find that the pupils in the schools are up to standard in their grades.

Rural school supervision in Wisconsin has done much to raise the standard of work in the one-room country school. We who are actively associated with it feel that it has passed the experimental stage. We trust that no movement will ever again be started which might prove unfriendly to the work, as was a certain bill which was introduced at the last session of our state legislature. I know that I am voicing the sentiment of the entire body of supervising teachers when I take this opportunity to express our appreciation to Senator Merritt White, our county chairman, Mr. Loescher, and a great host of friends, who so generously used their influence in defeating the aforementioned bill.

The success of any undertaking depends upon the cooperation accorded it from others interested in the work. This is particularly true in school supervision. If our office has experienced success in any manner, it is primarily due to the splendid force of highly cooperative teachers with whom we work, the fine spirit of the school board, and the wholehearted generosity of that great band of men and women, the taxpayers of the commonwealth, who make our schools possible.

REPORT OF COUNTY NURSE.

Miss Ada Newman, county nurse, offered the following Report No. 17: To the Honorable Board of Supervisors, Chairman and Gentlemen:

It is with pleasure that I submit the report of the work accomplished by the county nurse for the year November 1926 to November 1927.

Probably the greatest asset to a state and community is its citizenship. The government serves best which affords an equal opportunity to every one to develop "the best that is in them," to this end of becoming self-respecting and self-sustaining individuals. To provide such opportunity for physical development for each child of the county is the aim of the public health work.

Group meetings were held with the teachers at which problems of each school were discussed. General health instruction for the year was given. A health bulletin is being sent out to all schools each month for use in the school to stimulate better health instruction.

At an institute conducted by the state board of health in June, the problem of child nutrition was stressed as being the basis of all health work. It was demonstrated that malnutrition and its effects in lowering the resistance of the individual is the underlying cause of numerous defects. As a stimulus for better nutrition standards we are endeavoring to place scales in the schools so that the child and teacher can frequently take a health inventory.

The scope of work outlined by the county nurse's law is so large and varied that it is impossible to report all activities of this office. The nurse has cooperated with courts, county probation officer and other public health nurses and agencies in caring for social cases during the year. Forty visits were made to homes presenting problems of neglect, dependency or delinquency. Assistance in solving some problems of maladjustment must be given. These problems cannot be separated entirely from the health work of the community.

Tuberculosis Work.

One hundred and forty visits were made to patients and their families suffering from tuberculosis. Some of these cases have had sanatorium care and some are taking the cure at home. We are carrying 62 such families at the present time. We work in close cooperation with the sanatorium physicians and other public health and social agencies in tuberculosis follow-up. The Wisconsin Anti-Tuberculosis association held three clinics in the county where rural patients were examined. About 145 persons received chest examinations.

Comments On the Year's Work.

School inspection is of little value unless the home can be interested in bettering the physical condition of the child. With the idea of stimulating this interest the parents were invited to attend school and observe the inspection in the districts where it could be so arranged. The meetings have been of real value and have shown results in the number of corrections made. Thirty-three such meetings were held.

Every effort has been made to control contagious disease. This office has worked in close cooperation with local boards of health and the state board of health. It is our aim to keep the schools open and isolate the children who are ill. We have had splendid cooperation from the teachers in this work. Fewer days were lost in school work due to contagious diseases than in previous years. Two hundred forty-nine home visits were made for follow-up on cases of contagion and suspected contagion. Rule 17 of the state board of health, which makes provision for the exclusion of children from school who have coughs, colds and symptoms of illness, even when cause is unknown, is being emphasized more strenuously. By the early isolation of ill children much spread of disease can and is being controlled.

County Communicable Disease Survey.

A communicable disease survey was made of all rural schools early in September of this year. A questionnaire was sent to each home, asking the parent to report the diseases that each child had had. This information was compiled by the teacher on a form furnished by the office, a duplicate copy of which was sent to the nurse's office. The value of this survey consists in our being able to tell at a glance what diseases each child has had. In case of an epidemic we know without waste of time what children to isolate and who may attend school. In one school where whooping cough was suspected, it was noted that only those children were ill who had been reported as not having had the disease, and one case was very typical, a diagnosis of the others was easily made.

Goiter Prevention.

The program of goiter prevention has grown. At present 2,058 children of the rural schools are receiving one-sixth grain iodine tablets once each week as a prevention treatment for goiter. We have followed the plan of asking the local school boards of each district to finance the project. Our survey revealed that in some districts where the school boards have reported unfavorably on this project, that the majority of the parents wished to have the treatment given to their children. Therefore, we will revise our plan for next year's work and make it possible for all children to receive the benefit of this treatment.

Report of Toxin-Antitoxin Clinics Held in Winnebago County.

The County Board of Supervisors in session in November 1926 voted an appropriation of \$500 to be used for prevention of diphtheria in Winnebago County.

Plans were delayed on account of the death of the state deputy health officer, Dr. H. B. Sears. However, when Dr. V. A. Gudex, his successor, came, it was arranged to have a series of clinics at twelve centers, Dr. Gudex taking personal charge of eight clinics and local physicians taking charge of four. Without the assistance and cooperation of the state board of health, our work would have been greatly handicapped for funds. The most valuable service rendered by the state board of health was the prestige given this work. The people were more ready to respond when they felt the work was approved and sponsored through the deputy state health officer.

Publicity material was sent to all parents whose names appeared on the school census and to all parents whose names appeared on our infant registration list.

It was possible for us to treat 125 children in an hour. There was no accident, as infection or reaction, in the children treated. All who entered the clinic, with the possible exception of about four children, returned for the three inoculations.

The total number of children inoculated were 743.

The centers were at Elo town hall, Nekimi town hall, Algoma commu-

nity hall, Zittau, Allenville, Eureka town hall, Black Wolf town hall, Nordheim school, Winchester, Valley Brook school.

In discussing this work with a local physician of prominence in Oshkosh, he stated the "public clinics conducted by the state board of health are the only means of eradication of diphtheria. The private physician's practice is too small and many physicians are not yet sufficiently interested in prevention to make marked progress."

The Winnebago county health committee feels that the state board of health has rendered a valuable service, both from an educational point of view as well as a constructive piece of prevention work.

Orthopedic Cases.

At a clinic held some time ago, several crippled children were examined and recommendations were made for corrective work. Parents find it difficult to consent to surgical treatment for the crippled child. They are prone to think in terms of the present and recoil at the idea of any additional suffering for the inflicted one. It is sometimes a most difficult task to carry them forward to a time when the unfortunate one will be dependent upon his own ability to earn a living. Twenty-nine visits were made on behalf of these children. However, six have been successfully treated this year. Three of these were cared for at the Wisconsin General hospital. One of the cases was assisted by local Elks' club at the Milwaukee Children's hospital. Two were cared for by their own families, arrangements for the operation being made by the nurse. Arrangements are being made at present for treatment of two other cases.

COUNTY LIBRARY REPORT.

Miss Elizabeth Lathrop, supervising librarian, offered the following Report No. 19:

To the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Gentlemen:—The only visible means of measuring the service of a library to a community is by keeping track of the number of books that people use. Therefore, we submit the following figures from November 1, 1926 to November 1, 1927:

During the year the county library has tried to send out to individuals and communities whatever books they wanted. We did not try to utilize out-of-date material, but shipped as far as possible fresh new copies of highly desirable books. For example, requests have come in from country communities for books on biography, fur-bearing animals, rug making, home nursing, furniture making, music, dairying, house plants, child care and many other subjects. People have wanted to read the latest books with such titles as "We," by Charles Lindbergh; "The Barberry Bush," by Kathleen Norris; "Under the Tonto Rim," by Zane Grey; "The Royal Road to Romance," by Halliburton, and many others.

All these requests prove conclusively that the person who lives in the country is alert and up-to-date and wishes to read the same books that his brother in the city does. Why should he not, and why should he not have the privilege of doing so? Some letters from county patrons tell us "I don't know what I would do without the help of the county library." Another letter says "Everyday I am thankful for the county library system. It has made such a wonderful difference in our little library here that I want you to know how much we appreciate this service." One teacher writes, "Our school used the county library books last year, and we are

using them again this year. The books are a very great help in our school work. We use them as reading circle books and as a reference library for extra material with the textbooks."

Many requests for books we could not fill because of lack of sufficient funds. We have borrowed freely from Madison and from the Oshkosh public library, endeavoring to supply the need as far as possible.

During the week of the county fair we maintained an exhibit which attracted much attention. Several people left requests for books to be sent either to their homes or to schools.

We have worked as economically as possible with the \$1,500 that was appropriated last year. However, since that payment did not begin until January, there was a gap in our finances from November 1 to January 1. This will need to be taken care of, as salary for that period is still due.

You have noted from the statistics given above what an immense increase there has been in the use made of the books in the county. Last year the appropriation was more than quadrupled, for we formerly received only \$325 all told. Our increase in circulation has kept pace with the increase in the appropriation, for it has more than quadrupled in 1927. In fact, in a year's time we have gained 76 per cent in circulation.

Some of the stations are fast developing into real library branches; for example, at Waukau, where the books are taken care of in the home of Mrs. Jennie Steele, there are approximately 421 books in that collection. From this place, as headquarters, Mrs. Steele is serving five country schools, women's clubs, community clubs, church societies, debating clubs, besides the village school and individuals in Waukau and in a large district round-about. The circulation from that one collection alone is 6,232.

If the appropriation for next year might be increased to a total of \$2,000, we might make some progress towards establishing a real branch from which better service might be secured. At these branches someone would report almost daily the needs of the people and even telephone for material on certain important subjects. If we could follow such a policy, the county should provide heat, light, bookcases, books, besides space and some small remuneration for those in charge. But in this branch would be found encyclopedias, dictionaries, maps, latest government bulletins of service to Winnebago County—all these at the disposal of the neighboring community to help greatly not only in schools, but in homes, clubs, granges, etc.

In many ways this would be an economical plan, as so many books need not be duplicated. Now we send many different collections to all parts of the county and they all want the same things. If, however, in time we had say three branches which would serve the neighboring communities, we might possibly buy fewer of some titles, but we would serve just as large a group, for they would return books to the branch and exchange them often.

In a small village recreational facilities are almost minus. An attractive, warm, light room, where a library is housed, would be a splendid influence in the community and solve many problems for both young and old. A branch library in a village serves the families on the farm more easily than just a deposit of books at some school or home, for the farmer and his family find it necessary to go often to the village for business reasons, where they cannot find time to drive off to a neighboring home or schoolhouse, merely to return or to borrow a book. If the village sets out an array of books, it is one more reason why the farmer's family will wish to go to that particular village.

Hence, we recommend that our appropriation be increased from \$1,500 to \$2,000 and that a branch be established at Waukau this coming year, where the county will provide light, heat, bookcases, books, and perhaps a small remuneration to the custodian. Since Waukau has developed and grown more than any other one collection in the county, it would seem that this would be the logical point to establish the first branch.

A great amount of credit for the extension and development of the libraries in Winnebago County is due to Mrs. A. L. Anderson, who has had charge of doing the actual work. She has given unstintedly of her time and enthusiasm, although she is paid only for part time work. She has cooperated heartily with the librarian in carrying out the plans and ideals of county library service, so that the county would receive the best service possible. The result of this cooperation may be readily noted in the results obtained during this first year of real county library work.

We are hoping that with an additional appropriation we may be able to give still more help to Winnebago County, and therefore, we recommend:

1—That the contract with the Oshkosh public library be renewed with such changes as may be necessary; 2—That the appropriation for 1928 be \$2,000, to cover the expenses from November 1, 1926 to December 31, 1926, and to make some progress towards establishing a real branch in the county; 3—That a branch be tried out at Waukau during the coming year. COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT REPORT.

G. A. Sell, county agricultural agent, offered the following Report No. 20½:

To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors, Winnebago County, Wis.:

Gentlemen:—I am pleased to submit herewith for your consideration the annual report of county agricultural agent work in Winnebago County for the year ending October 31, 1927.

Any program of work, as outlined below, that is planned for a year ahead cannot always be closely followed. Unexpected and emergency problems come up. Then, too, some projects grow bigger than anticipated. So this year the boys' and girls' club work aroused such interest and grew to such proportions that other projects received less attention than heretofore.

This report is of course only a very brief outline of the year's work. A great many things come up—information furnished and suggestions made—for which there is neither space nor time in a report of this kind.

Program of work as formulated by county agricultural committee, county agent, district supervisor: More profitable poultry; rural home makers' classes; sweet clover for pasture; soil improvement—liming sour soils for alfalfa; Wisconsin system of pork production; boys' and girls' 4-H club work.

More Profitable Poultry.

As one means of encouraging better feeding as well as giving practical instruction and experience to older rural pupils, a "feeding for eggs" project was conducted through fifty-six rural schools. One hundred and twenty-four pupils finished and received school credit. Many of these flocks were started hereby for the first time on a balanced egg ration. In practically every case more eggs were produced and that at less cost per dozen.

Five special poultry schools were held with an attendance of 283 adults and young folks. These gave much helpful information, for I had a practical successful poultry man as helper.

A number of demonstration flocks were supervised — chick rearing, flock management, feeding for eggs, culling, and disease control, etc. Such work gives us reliable figures, also furnishes practical continuous demonstrations to which to refer others.

Only two culling demonstrations were held. It so happens that last fall most of that work came before November 1, and this fall before November 1.

At least six or seven poultry houses were built or remodeled according to our university straw loft type plans. These are already used as demonstrations of economical and efficient housing of farm flocks.

The breeding stock distribution started three years ago with selection of good breeding pens is bearing fruit many fold. Not only has it raised the type and production of these few flocks, but it has also infused good producing new blood into many another flock. One of our cooperators this year has a pen that has already produced from 200 to 240 eggs per hen in less than a year.

Home Makers Classes.

Five more home makers' classes were organized this year. Four of them in new communities. Each class met five times with the home management specialist. The average attendance at these classes was between twenty and twenty-five. Each class had a number of so-called leaders who were responsible for gathering records as well as passing the work on to those who could not attend. These local leaders reported reaching a total of 947 women. They held 26 meetings by themselves without the specialist.

A county-wide get-together or achievement day held in July brought together nearly 400 of these farm women and their friends. This event turned out to be an occasion of inspiration as well as recreation. Following are some of the improved practices adopted:

Health practices adopted, such as rest periods, drinking more water, better fitting shoes, correct posture of body, etc.—151.

Labor savers installed, such as changing tables and other work surfaces to correct height, improving equipment, arranging kitchens more conveniently, more conventionally, making use of house cleaning suggestions, etc.—152.

Laundry short cuts, such as easier stain removal, improvement of equipment, dry cleaning helps, and other wash-day time savers and conveniences.—311.

Home decorations—exterior, such as lawns, shrubbery, trees, etc.—1409. Interior, such as curtaining, papering, color harmony, better room arrangement, things that make a house home-like.—609.

Soil Improvement.

Trial of phosphate fertilizer or agricultural limestone or both has been quite generally encouraged where soils seemed to lack something. Especially at Ring and Algoma farm institutes was stress laid on importance of these materials in any program for permanent soil fertility.

As a direct result several cars of lime were shipped into the Fisk-Pickett section. A number of farmers there, in Algoma, and otherwheres also tried fertilizer. Practically all these trials that came to my attention were profitable and satisfactory.

In northwestern part of the county where soils are so acid that alfalfa and clover won't grow at all without liming, considerable ground limestone has been hauled by farmers from a local grinder started in 1925 or 1926.

A soil survey of the entire county by state and federal soil specialists has just been completed. Soil maps will be available in a year or so. This should be a help with the further trials of fertilizer to build up gradually

a fairly definite program for permanent soil fertility for our various types of soils.

Wisconsin System of Pork Production.

This is one of the projects the promotion of which has somewhat curtailed in favor of boys' and girls' club work. The so-called Wisconsin system was presented by the swine extension specialist to good sized audiences at two farmers' institutes. As a result, quite a little helpful literature on breeding, feeding and sanitation was distributed. Further work was confined to the ton litter contest. Two of the four litters entered made the requirements, namely, a ton of pork per litter at 180 days of age. One of these, that of Chris. Bleuer, Omro, shown at the county fair, thereby demonstrated that good feeding was profitable.

Sweet Clover for Pasture.

This is another project the promotion of which was somewhat curtailed in favor of boys' and girls' club work, that is, no general widespread campaign was carried on. However, the use of sweet clover as a better pasture crop was presented to our farmers at the farm institutes, at other meetings, through the press, etc.

In spite of severe winter killing, the acreage held its own 1,685 acres, according to the assessor's reports.

A questionnaire submitted by mail to several hundred sweet clover growers, asking for their experiences, brought a few over fifty replies. All but two of these liked it and those two had apparently never given it a thorough trial. These replies, based on the experiences of these fifty farmers, bore out the claims of this office as to the following advantages:

- 1—Comparative safety from bloat.
- 2—Greater capacity—pasture two head per acre.
- 3—Longer season—grows into August.
- 4—Improves soil for following crops.

Boys' and Girls' Club Work.

This project was started on a larger scale than anticipated at the request of a conference of rural leaders, officers of breed associations, community clubs and other farm organizations. Immediately the interest exceeded our best expectations.

When chance for enrollment was offered through the rural schools, 294 boys and girls over 10 years of age applied, from 26 school districts. Meetings were held with these various groups and 22 clubs organized, each with adult leadership, as well as with their own officers. Most of the boys undertook a calf rearing project and most girls took up first year's sewing work.

In spite of the late start last spring, 17 clubs have had more or less of their members finish the first year's work. Seven have already had their achievement meetings. Four clubs need more time to finish, and only one club did not function. Two local fairs have been held for the calf club—Clemansville and Allenville; and three for the sewing clubs—Allenville, Pickett and Bennett.

Exhibition of this club work at our county fair more than doubled the exhibits in the junior farmer department. Approximately 100 exhibited either at the fair or in elimination contests held for the same. Forty-four calves were shown at the county fair, the first real exhibition of local stuff for some years. Three canning teams exhibited. Fair officials cooperated splendidly and with their promise of continued cooperation everything points to a very healthy growth in this work for the coming year.

Tuberculosis Eradication.

You will all remember that in 1926 every cow in Winnebago County was tested for tuberculosis by the state. This was a direct result of county agent activity. During 1927 two tests have been made on herds in which infection was found. The first time there were 189 herds, two-thirds of these tested clean so that the second re-test only 65 herds had to be tested. This was just completed. Results are not known to us yet, but undoubtedly the amount of infection has been greatly reduced.

County Fair.

Considerable time was devoted to interest people in various phases of our county fair. The butterfat production contest was conducted, also the horse pulling contest. The latter again set the state record for the third successive year. Some assistance was given in keeping up the interest in the farm products booths. Competition was keener than ever. Your county agent acted as superintendent of the junior farmer department. Bringing in of the boys' and girls' club work more than doubled the exhibits in this department. Expansion of this work can without doubt greatly increase both participation and attendance at our county fair. Demonstration contests, maybe intersectional athletic contests, could well take the place of some of the former midway.

Farm Accounting.

The teaching of farm accounting in the rural schools was this, its fourth year, through the hearty cooperation of our rural school authorities and teachers, the most effective yet. Practically all seventh graders the beginning of the year had the practice work. Then in January, 146 started keeping records on their home farm. This is the largest number in any county of Wisconsin.

Cow Testing.

One standard cow testing association, the Clayton-Winchester, is being conducted. Some of the former members of the Neenah association are now testing the new way by mail with the Outagamie county association. Our standard Oshkosh Cow Testing association has through the tester's efforts expanded into a modification of the Outagamie mail system from 25 to over 60 members. This is an effort to help more dairy farmers with herd improvement.

Drainage.

Preliminary surveys and plans for the drainage of 175 acres were made on seven farms, for 388 rods of ditching on six farms. Tile systems were laid out and a detailed survey given for 29,800 feet of tiling on 14 farms. These farmers seemed to appreciate this service very greatly.

Orchard Improvement.

One pruning demonstration was given last spring. The work of a spray ring operator was supervised during spraying season. Other general helps for orchard improvement were given to individual farmers upon request.

Pest Eradication.

Flies—Eleven fly spray demonstrations were held with an attendance of 115. This work was copied from Jefferson county, where it proved very successful. So took no chances in demonstrating a material and method more effective in keeping flies off cattle than other methods now used. We demonstrated that not only the flies on cows at the time of spraying could be easily killed without harm to the animal, but that flies could also be kept off cattle for the greater part of the day.

Rat control—Seven demonstrations were given on how to get rid of rats. Two methods of eradication were used. One the cyanogas dust pumped into burrows. This results in instant death. The other method is the use of poison bait, using barium carbonade in various foods. This method has to be used where rats are not closely confined.

Blackbird control—Some investigations were started this fall with Mr. Oderkirk, United States bureau of biological survey, and with the cooperation of our local game warden. No patent remedy has yet been found. We are planning some careful trials next spring at corn planting time. Chances are that cooperative effort on a large scale will be required to reduce the amount of damage done.

War Salvaged Explosive.

Twenty-nine hundred pounds of pyrotol was distributed up to October 1. At \$7.90 a hundred it was a material saving for the farmers in the use of explosives.

APPROPRIATION FOR TAYCO STREET BRIDGE.

Supervisor Spore offered the following Resolution No. 18:
Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin:
Whereas, the state highway commission of the State of Wisconsin has ordered the Tayco street bridge, over the United States government canal, in the City of Menasha, Wis., to be built at an approximate cost of two hundred sixty thousand dollars (\$260,000), of which amount one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) has been ordered paid by the County of Winnebago, and whereas section 87.04 of the Wisconsin statutes permits the county to charge back to the municipality in which such bridge is located not to exceed 40 per cent of the county's share of the cost of the construction of such bridge; therefore

Resolved, that said bridge be constructed during the summer season of 1928, or as soon thereafter as possible, and that the county highway committee be and they are hereby authorized and directed to do all things necessary to construct the same or aid in the construction thereof.

Resolved further, that there be and there is hereby charged to the City of Menasha, in which such bridge is located, 40 per cent of the amount charged against the county for the construction of that bridge, to-wit: the sum of forty thousand dollars (\$40,000).

Resolved further, that there be and there is hereby appropriated to pay the county's share of the construction of said bridge the sum of sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000), and the proper officers of the county are hereby authorized and directed to insert the same in the next tax levy of the county, the same, when collected, to be paid and used for the county's share of the construction of said bridge.

T. H. 26 south with the specified concrete 20 feet in width construction, in the season of 1928; and be it

Further resolved, that there be and there is hereby appropriated for the purpose of constructing said highways the sum of \$200,000.00.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin:
Gentlemen:—Your agricultural committee has gone over the work of
the county agricultural agent's office from time to time and takes pleasure
in reporting at this time that work is making very satisfactory progress
in various phases of the agricultural development of the county.

A conference was held Thursday with the state supervisor of county
agent work and a program set up for the coming year that should help
materially in the further building up of our agriculture. Much of this work,
of course, has to be carried on for a period of years to show such results as
can be expressed in figures and even then results cannot always be described
statistically. For instance, one of the main objectives in boys' and girls'
4-H club work, that of developing a keen interest on the part of our young
folks in agriculture, can hardly be put into figures.

We beg leave to report further that our agricultural agent has given
Winnebago County more than ten years of good faithful service marked by
hard work, by long irregular hours, and by many evenings spent out in the
duties of his office where the average citizen can be at home with his
family.

And whereas, our agricultural agent in the last six years has had only
\$100 raise, and whereas he is now receiving only about the average salary
paid all Wisconsin agents, even though he has been in the service longer
than all but two of the fifty-six Wisconsin county agents;

And whereas, the salaries paid by the counties in this part of the state
average between \$300 and \$400 higher than ours; and whereas counties of
similar population and assessed valuation pay up to \$1,700 more;

And whereas, it is the desire of this committee and our county agent
at all times to conform with the spirit of economy that guides this board,
and yet also put our county agricultural office on somewhere near the same
basis with our neighboring counties.

We, the undersigned, your county agricultural committee, recommend
that the agricultural agent's salary be raised \$200 per annum by increasing
the county's share thereof from \$1,100 to \$1,300 per year, thereby giving him
a total salary of \$3,000 a year with what the state and federal government
pay him. Thirteen neighboring counties now average \$3,138.

To this end we recommend the adoption of the following resolution.

DANCE HALL ORDINANCE.

The following dance hall ordinance was submitted by District Attorney Keefe:

AN ORDINANCE governing the operation of public dance halls, pavilions,

amusement parks, or like place of amusement, within Winnebago County.

The Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin, do ordain as follows:

Section 1. No person, firm or corporation shall conduct, establish, or manage any public dance hall, pavilion, amusement park, or like place of amusement, within Winnebago County, Wisconsin, without first having obtained a license therefor, as hereinafter provided.

Application for such license shall be made in writing by the person, firm or corporation desiring the same, to the County Board of Winnebago County, at the office of the county clerk of Winnebago County, on or before the third Tuesday in November of each year. Such application shall contain the name of the person, firm or corporation owning and conducting said dance hall, and a legal description of the premises on which said dance hall is situated. Each such application shall be accompanied by an annual license fee in the sum of twenty-five dollars.

Section 2. The County Board of Winnebago County shall, at its annual November meeting in each year, pass upon all applications for licenses, and upon the granting of the same shall issue a written license specifying the legal description of the premises licensed, the condition upon which said license is issued, and the expiration thereof.

In the event that the County Board shall, by resolution, refuse to grant such a license to any person, firm or corporation, then, and in that event, the money deposited with the application for such license shall be returned to the applicant.

Section 3. No public dance hall shall be conducted in Winnebago County except in a licensed dance hall, pavilion, or amusement park.

At least five days prior to the holding of any such public dance in Winnebago County, the person, firm or corporation holding same shall file, with the county clerk of Winnebago County, written notice thereof, upon blanks to be furnished by him, specifying the name of the person, firm or corporation intending to hold said dance, the date thereof, and the location of the dance hall.

Section 4. No dance shall be conducted in any licensed dance hall within Winnebago County except in the presence and under the supervision of a Winnebago County dance supervisor, and each person, firm or corporation licensed to conduct a dance hall within Winnebago County shall, before the commencement of any dance in said licensed dance hall, pay to the dance supervisor, assigned by the County Board of Winnebago County to supervise said dance, the sum of five dollars for his services in supervising said dance.

In the event that more than one supervisor shall be assigned to supervise said dance by the County Board of Winnebago County, then the person, firm or corporation licensed to conduct said dance hall shall pay the sum of five dollars to each such dance supervisor so assigned prior to the commencement of said dance.

Section 5. All licenses to conduct dance halls within Winnebago County shall be upon the express condition that the use of intoxicating liquor shall be absolutely prohibited in such licensed dance hall, pavilion, or on the premises licensed during the holding of a public dance, and that there shall not be allowed at any such dance the presence of intoxicated persons, or of children sixteen years of age, or under, unaccompanied by their parent or lawful guardian, and shall be issued upon the further condition that the dances conducted in said dance hall shall be conducted in a peaceable and orderly manner.

No person, firm or corporation licensed to conduct a dance hall, pavilion, amusement park, or other place of amusement, shall permit, within said dance hall or upon the premises so licensed, any unlawful or immoral acts.

Section 6. The County Board, at any regular or special meeting thereof, upon proof being furnished that any person, firm or corporation licensed to conduct a dance hall, pavilion, amusement park, or other similar place of amusement, has violated any of the conditions or terms of said license, or the state law pertaining to the operation of said licensed places, may, by resolution, revoke the license granted to said dance hall, and thereafter no license shall be granted for such dance hall, pavilion, amusement park, or other similar place of amusement, until after the expiration of one year from the date of the revocation of said license.

Section 7. This ordinance shall not apply to any duly incorporated city or village which has, by ordinance, provided for the licensing and regulation of dances, dance halls, and amusement parks.

Section 8. Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not less than twenty-five dollars.

nor more than two hundred dollars, or by imprisonment in the county jail of Winnebago County of not less than thirty days, nor more than six months.

Section 9. This ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage and publication.

ST. LAWRENCE DEEP WATERWAY.

Supervisor Tripp offered the following Resolution No. 35:

Oshkosh, Wis., November 21, 1927.

To the Honorable Members of the Winnebago County Board:

I offer the following resolution:

Whereas, the governments of the United States of America and the government of Canada have made an investigation as to the feasibility and practicability of building a deep waterway from the Atlantic Ocean to connect with our Great Lakes by a commission of engineers duly authorized by both governments to make this investigation, and

Whereas, these engineers reported to the secretary of war during the year 1927 that such a deep waterway was feasible and could be built, and that it would be of great economic benefit to the entire middle west;

Be it hereby resolved by the members of the Winnebago County Board, that they respectfully request the secretary of war and the members of the senate and the members of the house of representatives that legislation be enacted at the next session of congress of the United States to build this waterway, known as the St. Lawrence Deep Waterway, from the Atlantic Ocean to connect with our Great Lakes, as these engineers have already advised.

Be it further resolved by the members of the Winnebago County Board that the secretary of war is hereby requested to finish the completion of the Wisconsin to the Gulf route, known as the Fox River route, by way of Oshkosh and Portage, as demanded by congress, of acts of July 1870 and of June 1872, and under provision of the River and Harbor Act of March 3, 1873. Congress ordered this waterway to be a connecting link from Green Bay to the Gulf of Mexico by way of Oshkosh and Portage, and up to the year 1927 this route has not been completed, and is only completed now in a haphazard manner as far as the Montello lock.

The members of the Winnebago County Board respectfully ask, that as no act of congress is necessary to complete this waterway, as it had already been passed, that the secretary of war is hereby requested to issue orders to the Milwaukee office of government engineers to complete this waterway by dredging from Montello lock to the City of Portage and to put the government waterway at the Portage end of the waterway in good order.

Be it further resolved by the members of the Winnebago County Board, that whereas the government is now completing a lock at Portage costing \$164,000, and whereas it was proven to the river and harbor board by a committee appointed by Governor Blaine of the State of Wisconsin on April 27, 1926, that by the completing of five more power dams in the Wisconsin River below Prairie du Sac, the government would receive a revenue from the lease of this water power totaling over one million dollars per annum, sufficient money to reimburse the government for every dollar that has been expended heretofore on this waterway.

The members of the Winnebago County Board hereby urge the secretary of war that these five water power dams be built at the earliest opportunity, as by so doing it will be possible to navigate the Wisconsin River from Portage to Prairie du Chien for the entire navigation season, as now it is impossible to navigate the Wisconsin River only during high water periods, which is about nine weeks per annum.

Be it further resolved by the members of the Winnebago County Board, that a copy of this resolution be sent to every county board in the State of Wisconsin, to the governor of the state, to the secretary of war, and to General Jadwin, chief engineer of the United States of America, and to the Wisconsin representatives and senators at Washington, and that the

state legislature be asked by Senator White, of Winneconne, to pass this same resolution.

REQUEST TO DREDGE RAT RIVER.

Gentlemen:—Whereas subsection 8 of section 20.49 of the Wisconsin statutes provides that the \$25.00 per mile for town roads made available thereunder shall be expended subject to the supervision and approval of the county highway commission.

Although this law is proving popular and a great help to the townships, we still believe the benefits can be very materially increased by a more uniform system of town road construction.

To this end we earnestly recommend that no part of said funds be expended for surfacing any road grade which is less than twenty feet from shoulder to shoulder where grade is not provided with necessary, adequate and effectual drainage.

Believing that the safety and convenience of the traveling public, both local and outside, will be best served by bringing all grades to a width affording room for the safe passing of automotive vehicles, by the construction of side ditches where needed, by reducing the crown of present roads to a degree that will guarantee freedom from the dangerous skidding which occurs on many of our narrow town roads when autos or trucks pass each other thereon.

We sincerely request the co-operation of the various town boards of Winnebago County in the carrying out of this program, with one purpose, one system, and one object, namely: the making of the town roads of Winnebago County the most uniform, satisfactory and safe in Wisconsin, and a credit to the farmers who build them.
