ELECTION OF CHAIRMAN

Motion that we proceed to the election of chairman by informal ballot, carried. Supervisors Korotev and Lea were appointed as tellers. Informal ballot resulted: Silas Spengler, 41; J. B. Schneller, 1; Geo. B.

Young, 1; M. F. White, 1; total, 44. Motion that the informal ballot be made formal and the clerk cast the unanimous ballot of the board for Silas L. Spengler, for chairman, carried. The ballot was so cast and Silas L. Spengler was declared elected.

Chairman Spengler, upon taking the chair, voiced his appreciation of the honor conferred upon him in his election as chairman of the board.

ELECTION OF VICE CHAIRMAN

Informal ballot resulted: Geo. B. Young, 31; W. F. Metzger, 8; M. F. White, 4; J. F. Ulrich, 1; total, 44. Motion that the informal ballot be made formal and the clerk cast the unanimous ballot of the board for Geo. B. Young as vice chairman, carried. The ballot was so cast and Geo. B. Young was declared elected.

Vice Chairman Young thanked the board for conveying the honor of the vice chairmanship upon him

RULES

Supervisor White moved that the rules of the last supervisors' year be adopted, with the following amendment:

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Gentlemen: Be it resolved by this board that Section XXIII of the Rules of the Board be amended by striking out the word "meeting" and inserting the word "day."

Motion carried, and the following rules were adopted:

RULES OF BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF WINNEBAGO COUNTY

ADOPTED APRIL 22, 1930

I. The meetings of this board shall be held in the supervisors' room, and the hour for daily meetings shall be 10 a. m., and the county board shall continue in continuous session from day to day until adjourned, unless to a day certain or sine die.

II. At the first meeting of the board, it shall be the duty of the chairman, or in case of his absence, the vice chairman, or in their absence, the clerk to call to order.

The clerk shall then call the roll of members

A quorum being present, the board shall proceed to the election of a chairman and a vice chairman.

III. It shall be the duty of the chairman to appoint the following standing committees, each to consist of the number of members as set after the name of each committee, viz:

Equalization, nine; finance, eight; general accounts, seven; illegal assessments, five; justice and constables' accounts, seven; sheriff's and coroner's accounts, seven; insane, three; poor and county home, three; corporations, three; public buildings, five; per diem and mileage, five; printing, three; bonds and salaries, five; county abstract and tract index system, three; rules, three; education, three; sanatorium, five; budget, four (county clerk, ex-officio); county fair, five; aviation, five.

IV. A county highway committee consisting of five members to represent cities, towns and villages, and all other elective committees and elective officers, are to be elected annually at the November session of the board.

V. The board may adjourn for such time as shall be necessary for the chairman to prepare the list of committees, and no business can be done until the same shall be announced.

VI. The chairman, or in his absence, the vice chairman, shall take the chair at the hour to which the board may from time to time stand adjourned, call the board to order and direct the calling of the roll of members by the clerk. In the absence of both the chairman and the vice chairman, a chairman pro tem shall be elected.

VII. Upon the appearance of a quorum, the journal of the preceding day shall be read by the clerk, and any mistake therein shall be corrected by the board provided, that upon the last day of the session the journal for that day will be read and, before the final adjournment, corrected.

VIII. After the reading and correction of the journal, the order of business shall be as follows:

1. Reception of petitions, memorials, accounts, etc.
2. Presentation of resolutions and disposition of same.
3. Reports of standing committees.
4. Reports of select committees.
5. Consideration of miscellaneous business.

IX. Every subject matter that shall come before the board shall be referred to the appropriate committee by the chairman, without motion.

X. The chairman shall preserve order and decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the board, and shall clearly and distinctly state every motion or question before debate.

XI. The chairman shall be entitled to vote on all questions taken by ayes and nays, and his name shall be called last; when the vote on any question is a tie, it shall be deemed to have been lost.

XII. Every motion or amendment shall be reduced to writing when a request therefor shall be made by any member; and all petitions, memorials and substitutes shall be reduced to writing and read before they shall be considered by the board.

XIII. Every written resolution shall have attached thereto the name of the person introducing it; and when referred to a committee, the names of such committees shall be endorsed thereon.

XIV. Every member, previous to speaking, shall rise and address the chair.

XV. When two or more members rise at once, the chair shall designate the member who is to speak first; but in all cases the member who shall first rise and address the chair shall speak first.

XVI. No member shall speak more than twice upon the same question without leave; and when called to order by the chairman shall take his seat, and shall not be allowed to proceed without leave of the board.

XVII. A vote on any question shall be taken by ayes and nays when called for by any member; and SHALL be so taken on all questions involving the expenditure of money; and whenever a vote is so ordered and taken, the members voting in the affirmative and negative, as well as those absent or not voting, shall be recorded at length in the records of the proceedings of the county board.

XVIII. No account or claim against the county shall be audited unless it be made out in items and duly verified and be filed with the clerk of the board, except as otherwise provided by law.

XIX. When a motion is under consideration, no motion shall be entertained except:

1. To adjourn.
2. To lay on the table.
3. For the previous question.
4. To postpone to a day certain.
5. To commit to a committee.
6. To amend or to substitute.
7. To postpone indefinitely.

These several motions shall take precedence in the order in which they stand in this rule.

XX. A motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, and for the previous question shall be decided without debate, except as hereinafter provided.

XXI. A motion to postpone indefinitely or to a day certain or to commit shall not again be entertained on the same day or in the same stage of the proposition.

XXII. A substitute shall be open to amendment the same as the original proposition; but when adopted, shall not be subject to amendment. If an amendment or substitute is lost, another substantially the same shall not be entertained.

XXIII. When a motion or question has once been determined, any member voting with the majority may move a reconsideration of the vote, but such motion shall be made and acted on at the same or next succeeding day, and shall not thereafter be made except by unanimous consent.

XXIV. The previous question may be moved by any member, and the chairman shall then say: "If requiring five members to second this motion, those in favor of sustaining the motion will rise." If five or more members then rise, the previous question shall thereby be seconded and an opportunity then be given to any two members opposed thereto to briefly state their objections. The question shall then be: "Shall the question be now put" which, if carried by a vote of two-thirds of the members present upon a call of the ayes and nays, the board shall immediately proceed to vote upon the pending amendment if any, and upon the main question.

XXV. In filling blanks, the largest sum and the longest time shall be put first.

XXVI. These rules shall not be changed, amended or repealed, unless the proposition or amendment is introduced in writing and the same laid over to some subsequent meeting of the board, not less than five days in-

tervening, and then only with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

XXVII. Any of these rules may be suspended upon any pending measure by two-thirds of the members present.

XXVIII. These rules and all amendments or additions thereto which may hereafter be made shall govern the board until altered or repealed, as herein provided.

XXIX. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in "Roberts' Rules of Order," so far as they remain in common use and are practicable and applicable and not inconsistent herewith, shall govern the board.

XXX. Whenever the board shall have gone into a committee of the whole and shall have arisen, the board shall at once be in session for the receiving and acting upon the report of the committee of the whole, and for the transaction of any and all other business of every kind.

XXXI. No resolution for the appropriation of money shall be in order until the day after its presentation and reference, except upon the consent of two-thirds of the members of the county board present.

XXXII. All reports, resolutions and petitions must be presented in typewritten form and read by the supervisor presenting the same.

XXXIII. All resolutions called for an appropriation of money, and all resolutions, the adoption of which will require an ultimate expenditure of money or an appropriation by the county board, shall be presented to the county clerk of Winnebago county, ex-officio member of the budget committee, at least ten (10) days prior to the opening day of the annual November session of the county board, and no bill or resolution calling for an appropriation of money shall be received by the board without the unanimous consent of the board after that time.

FEES OF REGISTERS IN PROBATE

District Attorney Keefe gave a verbal report and opinion with reference to the fees which are alleged to have been retained by the registers in probate, after which he read the following reports.

Remarks by Supervisors Tripp, Clark, White, Spengler and Meyer.
To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin:

Gentlemen: Pursuant to the resolution passed by the county board at its March 1930 session authorizing the district attorney to proceed to collect monies held by the register in probate which it is claimed may belong to Winnebago county, I herewith respectfully submit and tender to the county of Winnebago my check in the sum of \$594.77 for any sums of money that may or should have been taken in by me during my terms as both register in probate and deputy register in probate.

I do this in order to avoid any litigation in collection of any monies which may belong to Winnebago county, but I do not admit nor do I believe that I am owing the county anything. Some of this money I actually got and others of it I perhaps should have gotten, but did not get. I am doing this because I do not wish anyone to even have a suspicion that I knowingly took one dollar of the county's money that I was not entitled to, and am tendering this money to avoid the county going to great expense and trouble in trying to determine how much money should be returned to Winnebago county.

I honestly believe that even after an expenditure of county funds for investigation of the county court records it could not be shown or determined that I should have collected and turned into the county treasury an amount as large as is herewith tendered, which amount I have figured to be true to the best of my ability.

Motion that the report be accepted, and the amount of money tendered be accepted as a full settlement with Wm. C. Niemuth for all fees due the county, carried. Ayes 43, nay 1, Tripp.

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin. Gentlemen: At your March, 1930, session your board directed the district attorney of Winnebago county to proceed in the collection of fees alleged to have been unlawfully retained by the present register in probate and previous registers in probate. This report is being made to your board as a result of the aforementioned resolution.

I would respectfully report that the undersigned between Sept 1 1923. and Dec. 31 1926, acted as register in probate of Winnebago county under appointment from Hon. D. E. McDonald, and that during said period of time Wm. C. Niemuth was the deputy register in probate. During said period of time certain fees were retained according to long established cus-

tom and practice in that office and such fees had always been retained by prior registers in probate. During the period of Sept. 1, 1923, to Dec. 31, 1926, the undersigned and Wm. C. Niemuth divided said fees equally, and the undersigned is herewith tendering his check in the sum of \$238.42 as representing his share of such monies. In doing so the undersigned does not admit that such sum or any other sum is due the county from him on account thereof, but is making the tender to obviate the necessity of expensive investigation and litigation.

The sum so tendered has been computed to the best of the ability of the undersigned.

TERRACE GARDENS

Fred J. Peters, dance hall supervisor, addressed the board, giving a report of conditions at Terrace Gardens dance hall, and its management and attitude of the proprietor. Questions were asked by Supervisors Tripp, Jungwirth, Meyer and Spore. Motion that the license granted Terrace Gardens dance hall proprietors be revoked, to take effect immediately, carried.

PETITION TO RELIEVE CONGESTED TRAFFIC ON ROUTE 41

The following, petition No. 1, was read:

Oshkosh, Wis., April 21, 1930.

To the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors:

Gentlemen: We wish to call to your particular and immediate attention the rapidly increasing traffic and the proportionately increased dangers caused by the congestion on route 41 south of Oshkosh from the city limits to the junction of county "A" and 41.

This narrow winding road is recognized as one of the most dangerous in this part of the state by the reason of such heavy traffic.

A large percentage of the fast traffic can be diverted easily by the paving of county "U," (known as the Oregon Street road) to the Winnebago-Fond du Lac county line, thence east on the county line approximately one and three-quarter miles to within about forty rods west of the tracks, thence south and east on the west side of the tracks joining "41" at the elevator and filling stations southwest of Van Dyne, thus avoiding the most dangerous of the railroad crossings between Fond du Lac and Oshkosh.

In support of this suggestion, we further call to your attention:

1. The Oregon street-Jackson drive road is twenty-four miles long without any abrupt turns or curves, and very nearly all cross roads open to full view, an ideal fast traffic route.

2. That unless there can be a plan outlined soon by which this traffic can be divided, we of Winnebago county will be forced to pay for the widening and straightening of "41" from the city limits to the junction of county "A" and "41," which will be at an enormous cost, owing to the damage to high priced property.

3. We face the probability of a separation over the C. & N. W. tracks at the city limits which will also be at a heavy cost.

4. We believe the cooperation of Fond du Lac county and the state highway commission can be secured for this plan as it may eliminate the necessity for a long, costly, winding separation over the tracks south of Van Dyne.

5. The village of Van Dyne will be greatly benefited by the diversion of the wild, fast, through traffic away from their one and only principal street, while not in any manner affecting the local traffic.

We request that you forward at once to the Wisconsin state highway commission a copy of this suggestion with our signatures attached and ask that the commission actively urge the cooperation of Fond du Lac county toward working out this plan.

REPORT OF PROBATION OFFICER 1930

The following Report No. 9 was presented.

To the County Board of Supervisors, Winnebago County:

Gentlemen: This annual report of the children's work in your county, which necessarily is largely statistical in order to show you what is being done, will cover certain definite divisions which have not heretofore been so marked in the number of cases handled as to stand out as definite classifications. This has been brought about by the Children's Code and is a very real mark of progress.

If you come to our office you will find our card file and our case files to correspond, divided into six distinct classifications, as follows: the dependent, the neglected, the delinquent, the illegitimate, the boarding home, and adoptions. Then last of all in our card file must be the reports sent to the Social Service Exchange. This latter prevents duplication of effort when used by the welfare agencies.

Each year has been brought to you a story of the growth of the children's work and this year it has grown as never before. There are many reasons for this. Probably the most outstanding are, the passage of the Children's Code which brings work to the probation office from the Juvenile Department of the State Board of Control, also from courts and individuals, and the present industrial or unemployment situation. The latter has given us dependent or aid cases which might not have come to us if employment in the family had not been taken away. It has returned some who had dropped off our list when they had sufficient income and others who expected to be independent had to be retained on the list because some member of the family, who, under ordinary conditions, would have secured work but under present conditions was unable to do so. Much has been said, in working out relief for the present unemployment situation, about employing the married man with a family to support. Would it not be well to add those workers in the dependent mother's family where she needs the support for the younger children? The thought has come to me that the family situation should always be known by the employer to prevent the employment of both life and husband and perhaps also children from the same home when there are other homes where some one is seeking labor and there is no income and employment is refused. Such cases have come to our attention.

Returning to our Children's Code—it has doubtless worked a much greater security for children and perhaps the chief handicap is lack of sufficient workers to enable its being carried out more completely in every county. The organization of County Children's Boards will assist in this. Now every department of welfare work from the State Board to the smaller agencies is so crowded with work that, as I often hear the worker's remark, they sometimes feel they are "only touching the high spots."

In our work in Winnebago County each month there have been with the new cases that come in over 150 on our list. While the greater number of these are dependent cases, it also includes some of all the other classifications. The month of October might be called our banner month if numbers made it so. There were 23 new cases for consideration of which 10 were dependent applications, 6 reported cases of neglect, 2 illegitimate cases coming from the State Board, 4 boarding home cases, and one delinquent. These, with those already on the list, made a total of 170 for the month of October. The previous month there was a total of 165. This indicates that the coming months will be heavy ones.

From November 1, 1929, to November 1, 1930, we have had a total of 133 active dependent cases including 356 children coming under the aid law. There have been 95 new applications for investigation for aid and 98 old cases carried over from the previous year for reinvestigation. Of the 95 new applications for investigation for aid and 98 old cases carried over from the previous year for reinvestigation. Of the 95 new applications 35 were granted an allowance. The others were considered ineligible for various reasons.

(Of the TB cases three remained at hospital, two of these recovered, one has passed on. The other case is one of long standing and the man is in his home. It is unfortunate that there is no way of keeping such cases in the hospital. This man was at the sanitarium but would not stay. He claims to use every precaution but really is endangering the health of wife and children. Our experience with TB cases makes us feel very strongly that further legislation is needed to protect the public health and that of the immediate family.

The monthly statistical reports show the following total of work done:

As you know your appropriation for the care of the county's dependent children now includes because of the provision in the Children's Code medical, surgical, hospital, and dental needs of the mother and children. The dental care needed by the children in Oshkosh can be cared for at the free dental clinic but outside of Oshkosh the care must be paid. We have secured fine cooperation from hospitals, doctors, and dentists and special prices have been arranged with hospitals and specialists for the different types of cases.

Hospital and surgical care has been granted to 26 children and 14 mothers, dental care to 15 children and 4 mothers, medical care to 5 children and 3 mothers, x-ray to 2 children and 3 mothers, and a shin piece needed for a mother's artificial limb. This has totaled \$1,252.10 for 73 cases. One feels there has been a very real advance made in the work when these needs that pertain to health come up and we can at once see that they are taken care of. It is as necessary as seeing that these families do not go hungry or cold.

There has been given during the past year supplementary aid in the form of milk in 6 families. In all but two of these families the father was TB and this special need considered necessary for the children. Three of these families have been discontinued because of sufficient income to meet the need. The aid was given by Charity Circle, the Paine Lumber company, and the Oshkosh Apostolate in Oshkosh and the Emergency club in Neenah.

Good second hand clothing is sometimes brought to us and much appreciated by mothers to be used as it is or made over for the children. Charity Circle made us 18 outing flannel sleeping garments for last winter and 13 school dresses for the little girls. They also furnished layettes for four mothers.

We have recently placed a young girl that was becoming a great problem in her home at the Adams Farm School at Winneconne. This was made possible by two Oshkosh women who are paying the board and the father clothes her. At present he is unable to do more but this keeps up the contact which should not be broken.

Winnebago County has 6 girls at this school and some were considered very difficult cases. All have responded wonderfully under the splendid care of Mr. and Mrs. McAfee. We can be very glad that we have such a place in our own county ready to meet our needs. It is a beautiful location and under splendid supervision.

Another child which we have boarded in a home for several years is being clothed entirely by the ladies society of the First Presbyterian Church of Oshkosh. They are considering taking over the entire or at least a large part of the entire expense of this child. These are only examples of some of the things we are doing to benefit the neglected child.

This year because of the present difficult financial situation and the natural growth of the county's welfare work your Juvenile Judge will need a larger appropriation. You may cut on the building of roads or a court house but it is no gain in the end to cut on the proper care of human life. Where it is not adequately sustained the condition breeds disease and crime and how much greater is the cost to society in the end.

Since the days when Christ said "Suffer little children to come unto me," the needs of the little child has appealed to all mankind. You will discuss for many days here in your annual session many important matters but what can you discuss that will be of greater importance that what you shall do to benefit these little human lives, keep them in health and proper living conditions that they may grow to strong womanhood and manhood, make the kind of citizens you wish them to be.

Only through the cooperation and help of the County Board have we been able to reach a standard that has been and is recognized by the Juvenile Department of the State Board as well as other social agencies. It has been a real pleasure and satisfaction to know that this has been done and your worker extends to you her appreciation for making this possible. We trust that this important help will be continued by your recommendation of those things which are included in our budget which in their total could hardly be recognized in its effect on your tax rate but is very important in keeping up the standard of this work.

Only \$62.00 was expended for iodine tablets this year because so many were left over from last year's supply. The cost of the iodine tablets is covered by school boards with the exception of mailing. In a very few instances individuals pay. We feel that this is a very necessary part of our school health program.

Tuberculosis

Eighteen contacts were sent to Clinics for examination. Much time is spent in the prevention of this disease such as, teaching people how to live better, the value of proper food, rest and more fresh air. But, more time should be taken with the tuberculosis patient in the home. Until we can get a law that forces a tubercular patient to be isolated in a Sanatorium we cannot hope to reach the peak of our preventive work. Reports tell us that admittances of children to Winnebago County Sanatorium increased 33 percent. A Preventorium for children is a necessity as many children are on the borderline and if taken in time actual tuberculosis could be prevented.

Dental Hygiene Program

Reports from year to year have shown a high percentage of children suffering from dental defects. It has been found that neglect in correcting these defects cause serious injury to the jaws and surrounding tissues many times resulting in systematic chronic disturbances, such as heart disease, stomach ailments, rheumatism, diseased glands, etc.

Therefore in 1929 the Health Committee felt the need of a survey in all rural schools by a Dental Hygienist, in order to obtain statistics as a basis for future work. This survey showed a markedly high number of children who were in need of dental care.

This year the Health Committee voted to expend \$250 for employing a Dental Hygienist again, thereby putting this program on permanently. To this date not all of the schools have been visited by the Dental Hygienist the second time, but the report of 42 schools representing 1,070 children having had the second examination is as follows:

There is a great need also for Dental Health education, because it is not normal for teeth to decay. Unbalanced diet, lack of cleanliness, poor assimilation, lack of exercise of the teeth and diseases all play a big part in destroying tooth structure and surrounding tissues. In 1929 in connection with the examination of the teeth, individual talks to the pupils and a demonstration on a model as to the use of the tooth brush were given. This year all children are asked to bring their tooth brushes to school on the day of the Dental Hygienist's visit and a tooth brush drill is conducted. This gives an opportunity to note the kind of a tooth brush. This also stimulates the interest of each child to possess his own tooth brush. Each child having good teeth is given a reward in the form of a button which also signifies that he belongs to the 100 percent Good Teeth Club. When all children in a school have received a button a 100 percent certificate is presented to the school, indicating that all pupils have had necessary dental work done. Last year five schools received these certificates. Literature concerning teeth is given to every family.

4-H Club Work

We feel that Health as one project for 4-H Club members is as nec-

essary as any other project, consequently classes were organized in First Aid in nine clubs and given for eight weeks. During July and August classes were held at the evening and afternoon meetings of the clubs. The enrollment numbered 121 club members. They were especially interested in the lesson on artificial respiration because of so many drownings in this locality. A clinic was also held in Winneconne.

Different methods of giving this treatment for the prevention of diphtheria was presented to the County Medical association. They decided to have a letter and literature sent to every family in the county urging them to take their children to their physician for toxin-anti-toxin. This was sent out from the County Nurse's office. All doctors were prepared to give this treatment in their offices. So far this has proven to be unsuccessful as few people have had this done. This year the same thing is being urged again rather than establish a clinic.

In the following statements, you will find an attempt to describe the activities of the schools under my jurisdiction. Certain statistical facts, as required by law, have been given in the previous pages. However, such tabulations cannot reflect the ambition of the pupils, nor can they show the aims and ideals of the teachers. The facts serve a purpose in revealing the scope of our activities and they are presented for that purpose.

Our schools have been busy places during the past year. Pupils have shown increased ability in class work, as well as their attitude toward the work of the school. The supervisor has had the splendid cooperation of all teachers in all types of schools. New duties have been assumed cheerfully, new procedures have been adopted, and pupils have been directed to new avenues of learning. Higher standards have been established and pupils and teachers have shown a gratifying desire to accept and adopt such standards.

Improvements

In the old days when people had fewer things to distract their attention a university might consist of a "log with Mark Hopkins on one end and a James A. Garfield on the other." This could not be true today, and so we have given much attention to the improvement of the school homes that shelter our children during most of their waking hours. New buildings have been completed in Districts No. 9, Oshkosh, No. 5 and No. 8, Vinland, and Jt. 6, Rushford. These are all beautiful buildings, equipped with every comfort for the health of the children, and thoroughly modern as to lighting, heating, equipment and sanitary conveniences. Other districts have made extensive improvements that have added many years to the life of their old buildings. Equipment is not overdone in any school and many have a generous supply of the necessary tools of instruction.

Mental Direction

Because districts have provided well for the physical well-being of their children, we have been able to direct most of our efforts, during the past year, to the improvement of teaching devices. Thus, the Course of Study has been outlined in clearly defined units, a study procedure developed that is getting wonderful results, and suggested methods for the teacher that enables her to direct the learning of the children along the most approved modern lines. All of our schools, rural, graded and high, are showing a fine interest in the individual differences of pupils. Not all pupils can work at the same pace any more than all people can run at the same rate or jump the same distance, so the work is adapted to use all of the ability of each pupil in each subject. Owing to this new direction and enthusiasm of our teachers, our schools are happy places.

"As is the teacher, so is the school," is one of our oldest educational principles. It is gratifying to report, therefore, that our teachers are almost without exception devoting their whole time and energy to their work. They take suggestions readily and use them, accept criticism gladly as a means to improve themselves and we have found their suggestions constructively helpful.

School Boards

Much of the success of the school depends upon the school board, the business managers of the district. Our board members are really interested in their work. They are cooperating in a wonderful way with this office in providing working tools for teacher and pupils, and

supporting the teacher and this department in things for the good of the school. Not only have board members been insistent that a real money value be given to the districts, but they have been ready and willing at all times to do what is shown to be an advantage to the children.

School Patrons

A good sentiment has been developed among school patrons. Without the support of the people of the districts, progress would be an uphill task. As it is, the people are showing a desire to get the utmost out of their schools, and they are doing this by supporting generously the recommendations of board and teacher. School sentiment is absolutely essential to carry out the advanced plans that we have for our schools, and I am pleased to report that never before have the people been so actively interested in the success of their schools.

Parent-Teachers' Associations

Many districts are continuing to show interest in their Parent-Teacher associations. Most of the programs are showing the type of work that is being done in the school, thus giving the people a chance to measure the progress of their children and judge the efficiency of the school.

Promotions

Promotions in all grades are taken care of through this office. For the past two years ability tests have been given to the sixth and seventh grades. If pupils are allowed to make yearly progress to the eighth grade, and then are found not ready for high school, it is a severe disappointment to them. By examining them at the end of the sixth year, we find that we can strengthen the upper grades by not admitting the pupils who need more drill on the fundamentals or are having difficulty with reading. Thus the upper grades can better progress, and it is rarely necessary to fail an eighth grade pupil. Parents seem to approve this plan.

Health

Our county nurse, Miss Sena Peterson, has performed a valuable service in our schools. Pupils and teachers cooperate with her, and much has been done to raise the general health level of the pupils. Mrs. Mildred Weng, the dental hygienist, examined the teeth of all of the pupils of the county last year. She has about completed the examinations this year and finds that the number of corrections that have been made, are most gratifying. All of us realize the importance of having good teeth. May I urge the county board take favorable action on the resolution calling for one thousand dollars to take care of the teeth of children of indigent families in the county.

Supervision

The supervising teacher, Miss Anna Ryss, is performing a fine service in a very satisfactory way. The helps given the teachers in service, especially the beginning teachers, have been largely responsible for the fine progress that has been made in this county. This county rates high among the counties of the state as a result of carefully laid plans, faithfully executed year after year, and by tireless efforts to lend help where and when needed. A school system cannot maintain a high level of efficiency without persistent supervision, sympathetically offered, any more than industrial enterprises can run without an efficient managing force. The youth of most of the teachers makes supervision all the more necessary, and the attainments of our schools is a credit to the teachers, as well as to the supervisor.

There are 125 teachers in the 94 schools of the county. Last year I made 184 visits in inspecting the schools and assisting the teachers. Where possible, the office cooperated with the district in furnishing special talks for school programs. A number of educational talks were given at night meetings.

Institute Fund

The teachers' institute fund is used for the expenses of speakers at county institutes held during the year. The state apportions money for this fund each year according to the number of teachers employed. Following is a report of the county institute fund of Winnebago county for the year 1929-30:

County Commencement

Yielding to the wishes of the graduates and their friends, we again took a group to visit the state capitol last June. Over seven hundred school children, parents, and friends made the trip. The low rate offered by the Chicago & Northwestern railroad was very attractive, less than the gas cost to drive a car, and the day was one of the most valuable pieces of educational effort attempted during the year. Governor Kohler's secretary and Mr. M. H. Jackson of the state department gave inspiring addresses to the group. The fact that diplomas were awarded at Madison will make the completion of the eighth grade one of the high spots in the lives of these young people.

This report is an attempt to show why education is necessary and how our schools are rising to their opportunities, supported by a community sentiment that is strengthening each year. It is clearly impossible to put on paper all of the activities that characterize our work. It is enough to point out some of the outstanding achievements that indicate the desire of our people to do well by their children. It is sufficient a recompense to know that the children appreciate what is being done and that they are proving a credit to their communities.

This is my eighth year in county work. If it is not asking too much of you, I should appreciate your permission to attend the National Department of Superintendence Convention to be held in February. City school boards have been sending the city superintendents to this convention for a number of years. Last year a number of counties paid all of the expenses of their county superintendents, while three paid one hundred dollars toward expenses. It is an inspiration to one in this work, and I feel that I can use this inspiration to advantage.

In closing, I wish to thank this board for its unfailing interest in my work. I have felt that you have approved the various activities that I have directed, and I hope to merit your continued approval.

COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT REPORT

The following Report No. 25 was presented.

Oshkosh, Wisconsin, Nov. 15, 1930.

To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin.

Gentlemen:

It gives me great pleasure to present in this report a brief summary of the University Extension work carried on in Winnebago County from November 1, 1929 to November 1, 1930.

The unusual season, that is, the late frost on the 16th day of May, the extremely dry, hot weather and the general depression which has come over the country during the past year has had an effect on our work just as it has on many other enterprises.

The immoderate weather conditions have interfered with our field experimental work and the general depression has had its influence on our dairy herd improvement work. But as hopeful and determined as I was to make my first year's extension work a success, the results we have obtained are far beyond my expectations. My appreciation of the hearty cooperation given me and the kind courtesy shown me is beyond my power to express.

The outline of work my committee chose for me to follow a year ago is as follows:

- I. Soil Improvement Work
- II. Object—Lower cost of production and increase quality of product.
 - (a) Increase quality and production on less acres.
 - 1. More thorough cultivation.
 - 2. Increased fertility with the use of more manure and com.
 - 2. Lime for quality hay (alfalfa).
- III. Plan of Work.
 - 1. 4-H club members on acre soil test project.
 - commercial fertilizer to increase yield per acre.
 - (b) Increase maturity and quality by use of commercial fertilizer and proper handling of crop.
 - 1. Potash and phosphate for quality.

2. Testing of soil through Extension Service.
3. Soil fertility school through Extension Service.
4. Institute work—four one day, three two day.
5. Inspection tours (result demonstrations).
6. Check in yields and taking pictures.
7. 4-H exhibit at County Fair.

Project No. 2—Dairy Herd Improvement Work.

Object—To increase the efficiency of the dairy herd.

- (a) Culling pure bred breeding herds with present Dairy Herd Improvement plan working.
- (b) Forming at least one C. T. A. and at least 50 herds in mail C. T. A.

Project No. 4—Diversified Farming.

Object—To increase income and net profit on farms.

- (a) Encourage park production—

- (b) Encourage growing of cabbage, cauliflower and cucumbers.
 1. 4-H club one acre soil test project.
- (c) Encourage feeding less poor dairy cattle and more good beef cattle.

Institute work and C. T. A. meetings.

SOIL IMPROVEMENT

Our SOIL IMPROVEMENT work was not carried on as we had hoped it would be. We had a large number of fertilizer test plots laid out. The results in almost every case were decidedly marked. But the late frost and hot weather brought the crops on so fast and so near together that it was hardly fair to ask the farmers and pea canners to delay their work and harvest their plots separately, as we had expected to do. Although we are not able to present many accurate figures showing the results, we were able to sell the ideal most 100 percent to these affiliated with the work.

On the County Farm where they have their own machinery and plenty of help we were able to harvest and weigh our plots separately, securing concrete figures on the work.

We tried out 0-14-14, 0-20-0 and 2-14-14. On the blank or check plot the yield of oats was 62 bushels per acre. On the 0-14-14 79 bushels per acre. On the 0-20-0 74 bushels. On the 2-14-14 84 bushels. These results are about typical of what we could have expected had we been able to check accurately on all of our plots.

It seems to make little difference what crop we tried it on, the results were much the same. On a few crops, especially late potatoes, we did not get very good results. It was too dry.

The work with commercial fertilizer so far in this county has not been at all conclusive. We are finding out that there is much to learn about its use. But we are getting some very good ideas, namely:

1. Certain land responds to certain fertilizers, and not to others and each farmer has his own fertilizer or plant food problem to figure out.

2. The use of high grade fertilizer, generally speaking, is a paying proposition.

It is quite difficult to determine just what increase there has been in the use of commercial fertilizer in the last year. We have dealers out of the county dealing within the county and we also have the Granges handling it as well as the regular dealers. But as nearly as we can estimate, the use of fertilizer has been doubled in the past year. Around Winneconne where only two cars were used last year, six cars were used this year.

Perhaps the only thing we have definitely accomplished is that we have proven to the farmers of this county that low analysis material are most expensive. By doing so we have saved much money for the farmers and have influenced them to decide to save more.

The standard fertilizers used in this county a year ago were 2-12-2 and 2-12-6. Next year they will be replaced by a 4-16-4, 3-18-9, 3-20-20 and 0-20-0, and this will mean a great saving to the farmers. For instance two tons of 3-18-9 are equal in value as plant food to three tons of 2-12-6. The cost of two tons of 3-18-9 is \$107.90; the cost of three tons of 2-12-6 is \$114.45, a difference of \$6.55 on that amount of plant food on the average car of fertilizer amounts to a saving of about \$65.00. On six cars, the amount used around Winneconne this year, the saving was about \$400.

It may be possible to cut the cost of soil building by using more lime and less fertilizer. In most sections of this county you have a good deep soil. It is quite apparent that there is sufficient plant food in the subsoil that has not been touched. If so, it is necessary to grow a plant that will go down after it. Alfalfa and Sweet Clover seem to be the logical crops to be grown for that purpose, alfalfa for hay, sweet clover for pasture and green manure. But it is also very evident that these crops will not do well on sour soils.

With these facts before us, we have to come to the use of lime, as much of the land in Winnebago County is sour. That is one of the projects we will have to work on.

The past year has been a dry one. There has been little call for drainage work. I have been asked to help in drainage work on 13 farms during the past year. I have not and will not encourage reclaiming land, as the cost is too high and the selling value too low, to warrant its being a profitable enterprise. Furthermore, my predecessor has put a great deal of time on this, and it should take care of itself from now on.

DAIRY HERD IMPROVEMENT WORK

Dairy Herd Improvement work was given second place in my program. Yet I believe we have made more progress in this project than any other single one.

A year ago in my report I spoke of putting forth a special effort to encourage the use of bulls from tested dams. I spoke of the cow trade taking many of your best cows. I drew your attention to the fact that when I came to this county I found only three breeders doing any kind of testing except those keeping private records or doing mail order testing. So it was evident that most of the bulls bought by farmers in Winnebago county were from untested dams. Believing that the efficiency of the dairy industry could not be improved by selling so many good females and using so many sires from common pure bred cows, we organized the pure bred testing association to cull the pure bred herds. This association has operated for a full year and has started on the second.

We had our first bull sale the 23rd of October. These bulls were selected from the herd improvement association. They were the best that were grown this past year. Aside from this sale, in January, after the cows were on test two months, I selected 12 of the best bulls, mostly from this testing association and we sold them to Winnebago County farmers at their own price. We can say up to date that we have been able to keep 23 of the best bulls produced last year in the county that might have been shipped out of the state.

At the recent sale held at Winneconne I noticed something that I have never noticed before I saw farmers studying their catalogs and buying bulls on the strength of their ancestors' production and not on color, size and spots. When we set out to organize this association the foremost thought in our minds was to get farmers to do that very thing. I not only told you that we were going to try to accomplish this but, we have accomplished it.

This is considered a strictly dairy county as the largest percentage of your total income is from the dairy industry. The prosperity of your county will depend largely upon the prosperity of your basic industry. The success of any dairy industry will depend largely upon the efficiency of the unit of production, the dairy cow. Six hundred years of live stock history reveals the fact that the only progress that has ever been made in developing the efficiency or even maintaining the efficiency already developed has been through careful selecting and mating. In the organizing and carrying on of this testing work, we have set up and are operating a machine to cull the seed stock and aid in the development of the efficiency of your dairy productive unit and make for the prosperity of the county.

I understand that the extension work in this county has been maintained by only a small majority of your votes. In taking this stand in the culling of this breeding stock I have gained the ill will of a few of your most influential live stock breeders and by so doing have jeopardized extension work in this county. But when I assumed my position in Winnebago County I sold my services and my judgment and so long as I am directing extension work in this county I am going to deliver my services and my judgment and not the services and the judgment of others seeking protection or promotion of some private enterprise at the expense of the public.

Those of you who attended the county fair last fall saw what was considered the finest showing of Holstein cattle that has ever been exhibited at your county fair. This breed promotion, carried on by extension work the past year, was one of the main factors in creating the interest that led to the showing of these county cattle.

4-H CLUB WORK

4-H club work, our third project has taken more time than any other project. Very much more time than we had expected.

From the experience we had a year ago I figured that with the appropriation made for this work we should try to keep our enrollment under 250 members. But our final enrollment was 311. The \$500 appropriated was not sufficient to finance the project, which was as I expected. The work is not entirely complete but very near it. It will finish with about 70 percent completion, 65 percent is considered is considered good. Three years ago the records show 33 percent completion, two years ago 38 percent, a year ago 45 percent and this year 70 percent, which shows that the work is progressing.

There were five demonstration teams trained. One of them won first at the district contest at Appleton and later was sent to the State Fair. One livestock and one clothing judging team were sent to the State Fair. One of our members, Irving Harder of Neenah, won first in judging Jerseys and John Boss of Clemensville won fourth in judging Holsteins.

Twenty-six girls, boys and leaders exhibited 17 calves and 26 pigs at the state fair.

At the County Fair out of a total of 500 entries, 52 or 30.4 percent were made by the 4-H club members. There were 7 calves, 60 pigs, 23 poultry exhibits, the rest were in sewing, canning and garden products. Aside from individual displays there were three sewing booths. There were two demonstration teams competing. At the state and county fairs, the total winnings were \$1,398 besides such prizes as blankets, book ends, etc.

One new feature in the work this year was the sow and litter project. There were 22 litters raised by boys and girls in the county this past year. This is the only project we have which shows a general profit and is an incentive to the boys and girls to carry on. In this project we demonstrated:

1. If hogs are properly handled there is a good profit in producing pork.
2. Good hogs are far superior in pork production to common hogs.
3. Just as good hogs can be raised in Winnebago County as any where.

The winnings at the State Fair and the National Swine Show have

proven that Winnebago County hogs are as good as the best. In the heavy classes Winnebago County hogs won second, fifth and sixth at the State Fair. At the National Swin Show at Indianapolis, Indiana a pen of Duroc Jersey barrows, which had been exhibited at the State Fair by Winnebago County club members, was purchased by Cudahy Packing company and exhibited at the National Show. There they won first, second and third in the heavy classes.

WEED CONTROL

Twelve years ago when farm land was selling for \$200 an acre and the world was calling for a larger production of farm crops, the weed problem was a more serious problem than it is today.

The large part the weeds play in our agricultural program is curtailing production and increasing employment. Until we get to a point where it begins to appear that we are facing a shortage in farm products and labor we need not worry about the weed pest.

Improved farm practices will to a large extent take care of the weed situation. Weeds usually thrive on soils that are not in condition to grow farm crops well.

Canada thistles and quack grass will thrive on soil low in potash or high in acidity or both. While at the same time and on the same land alfalfa and corn will not do so well.

Where land is put in condition to grow alfalfa successfully, Canada thistles soon pass out of the picture. That has been proven. The new quack diggers that have recently come on the market are without a doubt a hard blow on quack grass. If land that is infested with quack grass is worked with one of these machines during the season when quack grass is not growing, namely, sometime after the first of August, the roots can be pulled quite easily and when left on top of the ground will die.

We have been trying two different kinds of chemicals the last year, sodium arsenate and calcium chlorate. We find these chemicals work well if properly applied. If not they seem to have very little effect upon the weeds.

We believe the use of chemicals is profitable along fences and on small patches but too expensive to be used on a large scale.

We hear a great deal about these so-called noxious weeds. But the weeds that are really causing the greatest losses are the common weed such as rag weed and pigeon grass, etc. These weeds can only be eradicated by careful and proper cultivation of the cultivated crop.

POTATO TREATING

We treated potatoes three times, once at the Metz Cheese factory in the Town of Wolf River and twice at Omro. We treated 650 bushels, and last year 310 bushels. Farmers must have gotten results or they would not have come back. We received very favorable reports on the work.

DIVERSIFIED FARMING

We encouraged the growing of flax, cabbage and more hogs. Our flax project went over big. A good many of the growers raised as high as eighteen and twenty bushels to the acre and could have sold it for about \$2.25 per bushel.

Cabbage did not do so well. Those who had it contracted came out well. They raised as high as 12 tons per acre and received \$7.00 per ton. This was the so-called down year for cabbage. Those who had to sell on the open market have not received much profit.

We have encouraged pork production through the 4-H clubs as discussed in club work.

We held two pruning demonstrations but bad weather hindered the work so we only had eleven at the meetings.

To sum up our work for the year I wish to call your attention to the fact that we have had 932 office calls, 936 telephone calls. Have written 2,041 letters in regard to our work. Held 60 meetings in relation to our projects with an attendance of 3,560. We have had 61 miscellaneous meetings with an attendance of 4,221 people. I had 96 field interviews.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON UNEMPLOYMENT

The following report, No. 29, was presented:

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin:

Gentlemen: Your committee on unemployment report as follows: In the time granted this committee, it has been an impossibility to gather full data as to how many persons in Winnebago county are out of employment. The federal employment office reports that about 100 applicants for male help are received on an average each day, and that the employment office can find work for about 9 applicants on an average at some kind of a job. Many factories here are working their men in shifts, so that they receive at least some pay. It is perhaps safe to say that the factories are running about 50 percent capacity. The law is very specific. It does not permit the County Board to put up any lump sum to be handed out as a dole to the unemployed, in order to relieve unemployment. There is only one thing under the law that the County Board can do and that is they can put up any amount of money they feel fit to help the unemployment situation, but it must be done in the form of providing work for these men on county improvements.

Your committee recommends to the county board adoption of the following plan:

1st — Appoint a committee to find out how many men or families in Winnebago county are out of work. This committee should consist of the chairman of the county board, the district attorney, the county clerk, the mayor of Oshkosh, the mayors of Neenah and Menasha, and two supervisors to be appointed by the chairman of this board, and that the sum of \$500 be appropriated from the contingent fund to enable this committee to gather this information.

2nd — That the sum of \$100,000 be placed on the tax roll to be placed in the contingent fund for the help of unemployment, to be expended for such projects as the board may determine, the following projects being recommended by your committee.

1st project — To place at the disposal of the highway committee as many men as it can reasonably use in road building, snow removal, oiling of roads or fixing up of all Township Roads.

2nd project — To provide a County Park. A committee should be appointed to at once look over suitable sites for a county park. After these sites have been looked over, a special meeting of the board should be called, and if the site is bought men employed to put such a park in shape.

3rd project — To elect a committee to gather prices on locations for a new court house. When the committee has gathered this data, a special meeting of the board should be called, so that the board can decide on the matter of a site and make immediate preparations for starting building operations.

REPORT OF SUPERVISING TEACHER

The following report, No. 35, was presented:
To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors, Winnebago County,
Wisconsin:

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen: I am glad to have this opportunity to appear before you and present a report of the work that was accomplished by the supervising teacher during the ten month term, beginning August 14, 1929 and ending June 13, 1930.

Supervision had its beginning when certain persons or officials were made responsible for the work of other persons or individuals. In American education supervision is as old as teaching itself, and both supervision and teaching had their origins in the work of laymen. From the first, supervision was never clearly differentiated from administration. During recent years, however, supervision of instruction has developed as a profession, distinct from that which involves administrative features.

To educate is to guide growth. To supervise instruction is to guide the professional growth of those directly involved in guiding the growth of the youth, in our schools. Educators are realizing more and more the value of this guidance and consequently the demand for more and closer supervision of class room instruction is steadily increasing.

It is frankly admitted that teaching a one room rural school is the biggest job in education. A large percentage of our country boys and girls never come in direct contact with any other organized school than the little one room rural school in their home district. This little school, with its elementary course of study, which is to be completed in eight years of school attendance, offers the only training which these children receive as preparation for life. Realizing this fact, and also realizing the fact that the rural teacher has less training and is less mature than the teachers in the village or city schools, we can readily see the necessity for guidance in professional growth of these rural teachers. Wisconsin is doing its share to provide such guidance through the county supervising teacher.

The supervisory program of any county is based on the needs of the schools. Improvement of instruction is effected through:

1. Research
2. Framing of Objectives and Planning
3. Executing the Plans
4. Judging Results

In Winnebago County our supervisory objectives are accomplished through:

1. Class room visitations.
2. Bulletins and detailed lesson plans sent from the office.
3. Institutes and group meetings of teachers.

The work of class room visitation consists of:

1. Checking the age, grade statistics and suggestions for remedial work.
2. Examinations of textbooks and library books and outlining a complete reading program.
3. The examination of the teacher's daily program.
4. A conference with the teacher regarding the seat work activities of the children and the plan for making assignments.
5. A study of and suggestions for economizing in school management.
6. Attention to the physical conditions of the school and suggestions for school room beautification.
7. Encouraging the teacher to work out some special problems.
8. Analyzing recitations and conferring with the teacher regarding strong and wasteful practices.
9. Checking on the individual pupil's progress based on age grade statistics.
10. Conferring with the teacher on results of tests sent out from the county superintendent's office.

The second supervisory activity is carried out through detailed lesson assignments and the six weeks bulletins mimeographed in the office. The demands from the teachers for more teaching helps through mimeographed materials prepared in our office has grown to such an extent that the full time secretary, provided for our office by action taken by your board within the last year, has indeed increased

the efficiency of this service to an inestimable degree. The highest type of supervision is that which is given in response to a request for help. A request for help from a teacher is a sign of professional growth. It is our duty to respond to such a request in the most efficient manner possible, and the services of a full time secretary for the office of county superintendent and supervising teacher is therefore a necessity.

The third activity in our program for training teachers in service is the teachers' institutes and group meetings. The program for 1929-30 included a teachers' institute at the opening of the school year and a monthly gathering of the teachers for instruction in music. Music and art, the cultural subjects of our curriculum, have been given but scant attention in the elementary school, until the last few years. Consequently our teachers are not prepared to teach these subjects as efficiently as reading, arithmetic or language. With this in mind, music instruction was offered at a Saturday meeting once a month last year. Our attention will remain focused on music so that the children of our rural schools will be able to add their contribution to a "Singing America."

The plans for the current year include a series of ten Saturday meetings held in various sections of the county. Four of these have been held. The meetings are planned by the chairmen of the groups, and a program of reading circle reports and discussions is carried out. These gatherings are under the direct supervision of the supervising teacher. Another series of similar meetings will be held during the winter months. It is with considerable pride that I can report a 100% attendance with the exception of one at the meetings held this fall. We feel that this is an expression of professionalism from our teachers.

To be truly progressive in any work we must be possessed of a somewhat venturesome spirit. We must have a desire to try new things. Our adventure in supervision this year is an experiment in reading. The Thorndike-McCall Standard Tests in reading have been administered to 3rd to 8th grades, inclusive, in all the schools in the county. The county has been divided into two sections, the experimental group and the control group. In the experimental group the teachers' attention is focused on reading, and especially remedial work in this subject. They are also advised to make any changes in the program necessary to effect greater improvement in reading. In the control group the teachers are not giving more attention to reading than to other subjects. Our aim is to prove what changes may be necessary in our daily program to develop better readers, and how this may best be accomplished in our one room rural schools. At the close of the year another standard test will be given and the results compared with those attained in the first test. This will make possible a comparison of growth in the control group and the experimental group.

Cooperation between the county supervisors and the teacher training institutions is a necessity for the best results in our supervisory program. The rural department of the Oshkosh State Teachers' college and the Green Lake County Normal cooperate with our office to make provision for cadet teaching in the schools of this county. The faculty of the training institutions is invited and encouraged to visit schools in the county. Conferences are held at which the aims of training institutions and supervisors are discussed.

A supervisor's activities are not confined to direct contact with teachers and pupils alone. Frequently home calls are made, by which a better understanding of the problems of individual children can be attacked. Community contacts must be developed and are developed through attendance at community gatherings.

The following detailed summary of the work for the year 1929-30 covers the activities of the supervising teacher:

The time devoted to supervision but not accounted for in the above report was spent in preparing outlines and bulletins, and in exercising the duties involved while serving as president of the Winnebago County Board of Education.

The total cost of the office of supervising teacher, salary and traveling expenses, for the past year was \$2,952.97.

Up to date 33 days have been spent in school visitation. During this time 105 contacts with teachers, in the schoolroom, have been made. 79 of which were regular classroom visits and observation of work, and 26 were calls made, with no formal report given; 13 home visits have been made and 17 conferences with school board members have been held.

The following range of activities will give you in detail the work for the year:

1. Organization outline sent regularly to all teachers.
2. Detailed assignments in mimeographed form provided for physiology, civics and geography.
3. An experiment in reading grades 3 to 8.
4. A supervised testing program in arithmetic in a small group of schools.
5. Further development in the music work by encouraging the organization of rhythm and harmonica bands.
6. Two series of group meetings of teachers sponsored by the supervisor.
7. Improvement of the playground equipment, improved physical and sanitary conditions of the buildings and well balanced schoolroom equipment.
8. Increase in the number of districts maintaining nine months of school.
9. Increase in the number of schools providing free textbooks.
10. Demonstration of need for more reference and supplementary material.
11. Cooperative efforts in further 4H clubs.
12. Emphasis on daily health in all schools by promotion of an organized lunch hour and provisions made for hot lunches.
13. Reduction in the number of 5-year-old children in school.
14. A county-wide standard test program in reading.
15. Better school attendance, and more rural school children going on to higher institutions of learning.

Supervision of rural schools is as big an undertaking as the supervisor wishes to make it. We could not hope to attain any measure of success in our attempts in supervision without the encouragement received from the county superintendent, the county nurse, the people interested in the training of teachers, and others who come in direct contact with our work. Nor could we dare to venture forth on our rounds of supervision if we were not assured of a friendly welcome from the little country teacher, a splendid cooperation of our school board members, and the cordial good will of the parents. But the greatest reward for our efforts comes from the trusting glance and the cheerful greeting of our real friends, the boys and girls, to whom we are trying to minister. We may never have the privilege or satisfaction of knowing how far-reaching our efforts have been, because the returns will be measured in character of the citizens we are helping to prepare for active duty in life.

To the members of the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, I extend through this report the kindest greetings from the teachers and pupils, in the county. We solicit your approbation. We know that you will do everything in your power to make our schools equal to the best in the state.

STATE AND COUNTY AID CONSTRUCTION AND MAINTENANCE DURING THE CALENDAR YEAR 1931.

The following resolution. No. 40, was presented:

SECTION I. The County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin, regularly assembled, does hereby ordain that such funds as may be made available to the county for highway work in the year 1931 under the provisions of Section 20.49 and Chapters 83 and 84 of the statutes, and the additional sums herein appropriated shall be expended as hereinafter set forth:

SECTION II. WHEREAS: The State Highway commission has notified the county clerk that a sum of money estimated to be two hundred six thousand seven hundred thirty-eight and 78-100 dollars (\$206,738.78) will become available at the end of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1931, under the provisions of subsection (9) of section 20.49 of the statutes, for the improvement of the state and county trunk highway systems in the county, but that its exact amount will not be known until after June 30, 1931, and

WHEREAS: Twenty per cent of the said sum, plus \$45,000.00, or eighty-six thousand three hundred forty-seven and 76-100 dollars (\$86,347.76) is required by law (subsection 9 of section 84.03) to be set aside for the improvement of the county trunk highway system, in the county; the county highway committee is hereby authorized and directed to expend the said sum for the improvement of the said county trunk highway system during 1931 in the following manner, to wit:

(1) The sum of \$45,000.00 for the improvement of county trunk "T" by grading, draining and surfacing with concrete, beginning at junction with United States highway 110 and extending northerly as far as sum will construct.

(2) For the construction and maintenance of the county trunk system, the sum of \$41,347.76, to be used on county trunk "T."

SECTION III. WHEREAS: The State Highway commission has estimated that the sum of one hundred seventeen thousand nine hundred eighty-three and 20-100 dollars (\$117,983.20) will become available under subsection (9) of section 84.03, as state aid for the improvement of the state trunk highway system in the county in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 83 of the statutes:

BE IT RESOLVED: That the said sum shall be expended in the following improvements, to wit:

1. The sum of one hundred two thousand dollars (\$102,000.00) for the improvement by grading, draining and surfacing with concrete of state trunk highway No. 21 beginning at Omro and extending westerly as far as the said sum will construct.

2. The sum of fifteen thousand nine hundred eighty-three and 20-100 dollars (\$15,983.20) for the improvement by grading, draining, and surfacing with concrete of state trunk highway No. 125, beginning at junction with United States highway 41, extending along official layout to an intersection with Lake street or as far as the said sum will construct.

SECTION III-a. WHEREAS, there appears at this time that more funds have been allotted to State Aid Project 3118-A, Siding 172 Overhead, the Oshkosh-Waupun road, than is necessary to fully complete same

BE IT RESOLVED, That the following sums representing 1930 County Allotment be transferred from Project 3118-A for the purpose herein set forth:

(1) The sum of thirteen thousand dollars (\$13,000.00) to Project 3319, the Aurorahville-Omro road, highway 21.

(2) The sum of eleven thousand eight hundred sixty and 52-100 dollars (\$11,860.52) for the improvement of state trunk highway 125 by grading, draining, and surfacing with concrete, beginning at a point of junction with United States highway 41 and extending along the official layout to the intersection of Lake and Main streets, or as far as said sum will construct.

SECTION VI. WHEREAS: It appears that certain additional highway improvements in the county are necessary and warranted, the said County Board does hereby appropriate the following sums for the purposes hereinafter set forth:

(a) The sum of thirty-eight thousand, six hundred fifty-two and 24-100 dollars (\$38,652.24) for the improvement by concrete of county trunk highway "T" beginning at junction with United States 110 and extending northerly as far as the said sum will construct.

(b) The sum of eighty-six thousand, three hundred forty-seven

and 76-100 dollars (\$86,347.76) for the improvement by concrete of county trunk highway "F" beginning at village of Omro and extending northwesterly as far as the said sum will construct.

(c) The sum of seventeen thousand eight hundred eleven and 16-100 dollars (\$17,811.16) for the improvement by concrete of county trunk highway "F" beginning at where item "B" leaves off. Said sum to be transferred from balances on hand, including \$3,310 accruing from special benefits assessed, and extending as far as the said sum will construct.

(d) The sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000.00), for the improvement by concrete of county trunk highway "F" beginning at where item "C" leaves off. Said sum to be transferred from the machinery fund of the County Highway commission and extending as far as the said sum will construct.

(e) For the maintenance (and construction with gravel and stone including bridges) of the county trunk highway system, the sum of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000.00).

(f) For operation Omro bridge fund the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00).

(g) For dust prevention the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000.00).

(h) For administration including salaries, per diems, office and travel expense of the county highway committee, the county highway commissioner, his clerks and assistants not paid from construction or maintenance funds, the sum of eighty-five hundred dollars (\$8,500.00).

SECTION VII. WHEREAS: Appropriations are made herein, in addition to the amounts available for work in the county under Section 20.49 of the statutes, the County Board does hereby levy a tax on all of the property in the county to meet such appropriations as follows:

(a) For the various purposes set forth in Section VI hereof, the sum of two hundred fifty-four thousand, five hundred dollars (\$254,500.00).

SECTION VIII. WHEREAS: The various highway activities, for which provision is made in this resolution are continuous from year to year, and the exact cost of any work cannot be known at the time of making the appropriation therefor, this Board does hereby direct that any balance remaining in any appropriation for a specific highway improvement after the same shall have been completed, may be used by the county highway committee to make up any deficit that may occur in any other improvement of the same class for which provision is herein made, and any balances remaining at the end of the year in any highway fund shall remain and be available for the same purpose in the ensuing year, and any deficit in any highway fund at the end of the year shall be paid from the next appropriation made for the same purpose, and

WHEREAS: The exact amount of the funds that will become available for highway purposes in the county under Section 20.49 of the Statutes will not be known until after June 30, 1931, at which time correct figures will be submitted by the State Highway commission, the county treasurer is hereby authorized and directed to make payments on account of the improvements to be made with such funds, as hereinbefore authorized, from any funds in the county treasury that are not required for the purposes for which appropriated prior to August 1, 1930; and to reimburse such funds in the county treasury from the sums received under Section 20.49 of the Statutes. The county clerk is hereby directed to levy the taxes named in Section VII hereof in the county tax levy, and the county highway committee and the county highway commissioner are hereby directed to carry out the highway construction and maintenance for which provision is herein made, in the manner provided by law, and to employ such patrolmen, laborers, and foremen, as they may deem necessary for such purpose.

The two branches of the Winnebago County Library:

The one at Waukau, in the home of Mrs. Jennie Steele reported 16,710 books and magazines circulated during the year. 1,308 of these were magazines. Mrs. Steele wrote as follows: "I am sending in my report for the whole year. Here are some things I'd like to say that can't go down in actual figures. Do you know that over two-fifths of that circulation (16,710) stands for non-fiction? There isn't a day but I meet folks hungry for the truths that crowd all about us. Maybe you sometimes think I go wild when I ask for things, but you see they look to me to provide the books, or rather they feel we have but to call loud enough and the County will give. I wish that the Board of Education could take time to visit me"

The other Branch was newly welcomed into the organization this year. It is, the Winneconne Library with Mrs. Bockin as librarian. The circulation for the year was 5,861, 64 of which were magazines. Under the County contract we will be paying Mrs. Bockin \$58.61 which is based on the 1 cent for each circulator. This sum is to be made in monthly payments.

The most recent station is that at Winnebago under the direction of Mr. Hellmuth. The women of his community begged him to get a station for their use, and it now promises much for the future.

The work with the schools is progressing and the relationship between us is most cordial. The teachers are among our most loyal boosters as they understand only too well how difficult it would be for them not to have a source for books.

The booth at the County Fair this year brought in many compliments, not only from our own county but from visitors of other counties. They liked the idea of the lighthouse as representative of the Library.

We have been able to do more for the Adult readers this year. Some of outstanding and ever popular title have been added to the collection.

Budget:

In spite of a most pressing need for an increase in our budget we recognize the stress of hard times on the county and are willing to carry on for another year with the same appropriation of \$3,000.00, if the contract with the city of Oshkosh is renewed. I am suggesting the following budget:

REPORT OF COURT HOUSE SITE COMMITTEE

The following Report No. 53 was presented.
To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County: Gentlemen:

Your Court House site committee beg leave to report as follows, to wit: We have investigated and discussed all sites that have been proposed, including the so-called Washington Blvd. site, the Clark and Kennedy site, the site immediately to the east, known as the Russell site, the post office site, and the present occupied site.

Your committee finds that exclusive of property owned by the Chicago and Northwestern Railway company the assessed valuation of the Washington Blvd. site is \$78,050.00, including ten parcels of land. Based upon our experience in attempting to secure prices with a view to private negotiation, it is our opinion that this site would cost from one hundred twenty-five to one hundred fifty thousand dollars, and your committee have eliminated this site as a possible court house site.

We have also given consideration to the so-called Russell site, which consists of the Konrad property at the corner of Jackson Drive and Church street, and the Russell property fronting on Algoma Blvd., the property having a frontage on Church Street of 167 feet, and 141 feet on Algoma Blvd., with an average depth from east to west of 132 feet. Your committee has also eliminated this site as a proposed site.

Your committee has also investigated the so-called Clark and Kennedy site, which has been recommended by the Commission Council of the City of Oshkosh and by certain local civic and business organizations. We find that this site is available, as both owners would consent to sell.

We have also considered the so-called post office site, and it is the opinion of your committee that this site, while offering many advantages, is not adapted to court house purposes.

It is therefore the recommendation of your committee that if the

County Board decides to build a court house on a site other than the present site that the so-called Clark and Kennedy property be acquired at private negotiation, at a price not to exceed \$65,000.00 and in the event the County Board decides to acquire said site that not to exceed \$65,000.00 be offered for the same, otherwise that condemnation proceedings be instituted to acquire same.

This committee has been unable to agree upon any other recommendation to the Board, and feels that the first action of the Board should be to determine that if a court house is built it should or should not be built upon the present site.

If such determination is made, then your committee feels that the Clark-Kennedy property should be acquired.

STATE AND COUNTY AID CONSTRUCTION AND MAINTENANCE DURING THE CALENDAR YEAR 1931

SECTION I. The County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin, regularly assembled, does hereby ordain that such funds as may be made available to the county for highway work in the year 1931 under the provisions of Section 20.49 and Chapters 83 and 84 of the Statutes, and the additional sums herein appropriated shall be expended as hereinafter set forth:

SECTION II. WHEREAS, The State Highway Commission has notified the county clerk that a sum of money estimated to be Two Hundred Six Thousand Seven Hundred Thirty Eight and 78-100 Dollars (\$206,738.78) will become available at the end of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1931, under the provisions of subsection (9) of section 20.49 of the statutes. for the improvement of the state and county trunk highway systems in the county, but that its exact amount will not be known until after June 30, 1931, and

WHEREAS: Twenty percent of the said sum, plus \$45,000.00 or Eighty-six Thousand Three Hundred Forty-seven and 78-100 Dollars (\$86,347.76) is required by law (subsection 9 of section 84.03) to be set aside for the improvement of the County Trunk Highway system, in the county; the county highway committee is hereby authorized and directed to expend the said sum for the improvement of the said County Trunk Highway system during 1931 in the following manner, to-wit:

(1) The sum of \$45,000.00 for the improvement of County Trunk "T" by grading, draining and surfacing with concrete, beginning at Junction with U. S. Highway 110 and extending northerly as far as sum will construct

(2) For the construction and maintenance of the county trunk system, the sum of \$41,347.76 to be used on County Trunk "T."

SECTION III. WHEREAS: The State Highway Commission has estimated that the sum of One Hundred Seventeen Thousand Nine Hundred Eighty-three and 20-100 Dollars (\$117,983.20) will become available under subsection (9) of Section 84.03 as state aid for the improvement of the State Trunk Highway System in the county, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 83 of the statutes:

BE IT RESOLVED: That the said sum shall be expended in the following improvements, to-wit:

1. The Sum of One Hundred Two Thousand Dollars (\$102,000.00) for the improvement by grading, draining and surfacing with concrete of State Trunk Highway No. 21 beginning at Omro and extending westerly as far as the said sum will construct.

2. The sum of Fifteen Thousand Nine Hundred Eighty-three and 20-100 dollars (\$15,983.20), for the improvement by grading, draining and surfacing with concrete of State Trunk Highway No. 125 beginning at junction with U. S. Highway 41, extending along official layout to an intersection with Lake Street or as far as the said sum will construct.

SECTION III-a. WHEREAS: There appears at this time that more funds have been allotted to State Aid Project 3118-A, Siding 172 Overhead, the Oshkosh-Waupun Road, than is necessary to fully complete same.

BE IT RESOLVED, That the following sums representing 1930 county allotment be transferred from Project 3118-A for the purpose herein set forth:

(1) The sum of thirteen thousand dollars (\$13,000.00) to Project 3319, the Aurorahville-Omro Road, Highway 21.

(2) The sum of Eleven Thousand Eight Hundred Sixty and 52-100 Dollars (\$11,860.52) for the improvement of State Trunk Highway 125 by grading, draining and surfacing with concrete, beginning at a point of junction with U. S. Highway 41 and extending along the official layout to the intersection of Lake and Main Streets, or as far as said sum will construct.

SECTION VI. WHEREAS: It appears that certain additional highway improvements in the county are necessary and warranted, the said County Board does hereby appropriate the following sums for the purposes hereinafter set forth:

(a) The sum of Thirty Eight Thousand, Six Hundred Fifty-two and 24-100 Dollars (\$38,652.24) for the improvement by concrete of County Trunk Highway "T" beginning at junction with U. S. 110 and extending northerly as far as the said sum will construct.

(b) The sum of Eighty-six Thousand, Three Hundred Forty-seven and 76-100 Dollars (\$86,347.76) for the improvement by concrete of County Trunk Highway "F" beginning at village of Omro and extending northwesterly as far as the said sum will construct.

(c) The sum of Seventeen Thousand Eight Hundred Eleven and 16-100 Dollars (\$17,811.16) for the improvement by concrete of County Trunk Highway "F" beginning at where item "B" leaves off. Said sum to be transferred from balances on hand, including \$3,310 accruing from special benefits assessed and extending as far as the said sum will construct.

(d) The sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) for the improvement by concrete of County Trunk Highway "F" beginning at where item "C" leaves off. Said sum to be transferred from the machinery fund of the County Highway Commission, and extending as far as the said sum will construct.

(e) For the maintenance (and construction with gravel and stone, including bridges) of the County Trunk Highway System, the sum of Eighty-eight Thousand Dollars (\$88,000.00).

(f) For operation Omro Bridge fund the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00).

(g) For administration, including salaries, per diems, office and travel expense of the County Highway Committee, the County Highway Commissioner, his clerks and assistants not paid from construction or maintenance funds the sum of Eighty-five Hundred Dollars (\$8,500.00).

SECTION VII. WHEREAS: Appropriations are made herein, in addition to the amounts available for work in the county under Section 20.49 of the Statutes, the county board does hereby levy a tax on all of the property in the county to meet such appropriations as follows:

(a) For the various purposes set forth in Section VI hereof, the sum of Two Hundred Twenty-two Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars (\$222,500.00).

SECTION VIII. WHEREAS: The various highway activities, for which provision is made in this resolution are continuous from year to year, and the exact cost of any work cannot be known at the time of making the appropriation therefore, this Board does hereby direct that any balance remaining in any appropriation for a specific highway improvement after the same shall have been completed, may be used by

the county highway committee to make up any deficit that may occur in any other improvement of the same class for which provision is herein made, and any balances remaining at the end of the year in any highway fund shall remain and be available for the same purpose in the ensuing year, and any deficit in any highway fund at the end of the year shall be paid from the next appropriation made for the same purpose, and

WHEREAS: The exact amount of the funds that will become available for highway purposes in the county under Section 20.49 of the Statutes will not be known until after June 30, 1931, at which time correct figures will be submitted by the State Highway Commission, the County Treasurer is hereby authorized and directed to make payments on account of the improvements to be made with such funds, as hereinbefore authorized, from any funds in the county treasury that are not required for the purposes for which appropriated prior to August 1, 1930; and to reimburse such funds in the county treasury from the sums received under Section 20.49 of the Statutes. The County Clerk is hereby directed to levy the taxes named in Section VII hereof in the county tax levy, and the County Highway Committee and the County Highway Commissioner are hereby directed to carry out the highway construction and maintenance for which provision is herein made, in the manner provided by law, and to employ such patrolmen, laborers, and foremen as they may deem necessary for such purpose.

Section II. The said poles and wires and other apparatus connected therewith shall be so located so as not to interfere with travel upon any public highways, or with necessary construction or maintenance operations on any said highways, and as near the outer limits of said highways as practicable.

Said poles and wires and other apparatus shall be constructed in a good and workmanlike manner and the crossarms shall be at such height as not to interfere with the reasonable use of said highways, streets, alleys and other public places by the public, and at all crossings of said highways, roads and streets, the wires shall be at the height of at least fourteen feet above the traveled surface thereof, and the poles along said highways shall be at least twenty-four feet in height.

In constructing and maintaining such poles and wires there shall be no unnecessary cutting of shade trees and shrubbery, and all brush cut and all rubbish caused by the construction of said lines shall be destroyed in such manner as to do no damage, or removed from the limits of the highways at the expense of the corporation.

Section III. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage.

COURT HOUSE SITE.

The following report, No. 7, was presented:

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Gentlemen: Your committee, appointed for the purpose of making investigation and recommendation to your honorable body as to the acquisition of a new court house site, beg leave to report as follows, to-wit:

Your committee organized with Mr. Nick Bouchette as chairman and your district attorney as secretary.

Your committee realized that the agitation for the construction of a new court house for Winnebago county and for the acquisition of a site has been continuous for a long period of years. Your committee further had in mind that the construction of a court house is a problem not peculiar to the city of Oshkosh alone, but a problem for Winnebago county as a whole. Your committee realized the impossibility of reaching a determination that would be unanimous or one that would be entirely convincing and satisfactory to every person in the county.

Your committee have attempted to face this problem courageously, with no interest in mind except the best interests, as they see it, of Winnebago county as a whole.

Your committee had in mind the fact that a proposal to bond the county for the construction of roads, a proposal to build a sanitarium,

and a proposal to build a court house had all been defeated at popular referendum. Your committee had in mind that years ago, when under the leadership of the late E. E. Stephens, North Park was acquired by the city of Oshkosh for park purposes, that the public sentiment was overwhelmingly against such a move at that time.

Your committee have attempted to visualize their problem through the vision of years to come and not the immediate necessities of the present alone.

Realizing how unequipped with technical knowledge the committee was, and realizing how many ill-advised and unfounded rumors have been circulated in reference to this matter, and realizing the attempt to divide the city of Oshkosh into an east and west side and a north and south side, your committee felt that the safest way to proceed in its deliberations was to first become equipped with certain facts to be derived from impartial and unprejudiced sources that are expert in their respective lines. To that end the committee accepted the offer of Lindl. Schuette & Ries, Inc., to make an analysis of the soil conditions at the present court house site. That report, dated December 1st, 1930, together with its accompanying blue print, is hereto attached and marked Exhibit "A."

This report, set out, raised certain rumors as to the nature and quality of the sub-soil at the present court house site. It likewise verified in the minds of the committee the water conditions and sewer conditions that were thought to have a bearing upon the construction of a building on the old site.

An analysis of the condition at the so-called Clark site, corner of Jackson and Algoma boulevard, is likewise included in that report.

The attention of your honorable body is respectfully called to this first report that came to the attention of your committee.

In line with the thought that expert advice was further necessary, your committee secured the services of Auer, Jensen & Brown, architects of known standing and reputation in the city of Oshkosh, and at the suggestion of Mr. Henry Auler, Mr. Jacob L. Crane, Jr., a consulting engineer of Chicago, was brought to Oshkosh and made a complete analysis, from the standpoint of a city planning engineer, of the various sites suggested for court house purposes. Mr. Auler's firm likewise presented a report, which answers many of the questions that have been asked in relation to this problem, and these two reports are hereto attached and marked Exhibit "B." ✓

Your committee likewise received reports from Holabird & Root, architects of Chicago, Ill., of national reputation and standing, who, at their own expense, sent two experts into the city of Oshkosh, and who made a complete analysis of all four sites suggested. That report is hereto attached and marked Exhibit "C," and is complete in all particulars.

We likewise were favored by an investigation and report made impartially to the committee, and without suggestion from the committee, from the firm of Clas & Clas, architects of the city of Milwaukee, which report is hereto attached and marked Exhibit "D."

Your committee felt that with these five reports from known experts and from men whose business it is to design and build court houses and to assist municipalities in the construction of public buildings, they were equipped to view the question as to the selection of a site with some degree of intelligent action.

Your committee further secured reports from Mr. M. K. Reilly, congressman from the Sixth Congressional district, as to the situation in reference to the possibility of purchase of the old post office site.

From all of these reports—from the independent study of the membership of the committee—the majority of the committee who have signed this report reached certain definite conclusions:

- (1) That the old court house site is not suitable as a place to expend the public's money in the erection of a building to stand for seventy-five years.
- (2) That it would be unwise and impracticable to even attempt to construct a building either to the front or rear of the present court house structure.
- (3) That if it were proposed to erect a building on the present site it would be necessary, in order that the site be used to any proper advantage, that the old court house be first razed. This would entail

moving the activities of the court house to other locations pending the construction of the new building, which would involve an estimated expense of not less than fifty thousand dollars.

The opinion of all the experts is that to build a building on that site would require approximately eighteen thousand dollars of additional expense in the construction of a basement in order to overcome the effects of the water pressure at that point.

The committee was therefore faced with the proposition that the present court house site would be burdened with a cost of at least sixty-eight thousand dollars before the building was started. It was felt by the committee that the present property in its present condition could be sold for a minimum of at least forty thousand dollars, which would make the present site cost the county at least one hundred eight thousand dollars, and when constructed the court house would be in an isolated part of the city, in a district zoned for factory purposes and surrounded at present by factories.

Having in mind these considerations the majority of the committee were of the opinion that the advice of the experts was well-founded, and that the present court house site is not in any way suitable or adaptable for court house purposes.

Your committee next considered the various other sites proposed. The property to the east of Roe Park was given consideration, and it was discovered, upon an examination of the assessment roll, that the price of obtaining this property would be almost prohibitive, and that condemnation proceedings would have to be instituted in order to acquire the property in any event, from information in the hands of the committee.

This site, because of these reasons and because of the recommendations of the experts, was likewise discarded. The same may be said of the proposed site at the corner of Merritt and Mt. Vernon streets, known as the Rumery property.

Your committee likewise gave consideration to the so-called post office site, and discovered that the United States government does not dispose of its property in the manner some people thought. It appears that this property is carried on the books of the post office department at seventy-five thousand dollars, and because of the attitude of the government at the present time there is no disposition to expose the same to sale unless a bid were made by the county in an amount equal to the amount for which this property is carried on the books of the government. In any event, the property would have to be bid in by the county at public sale, which is highly impracticable for a municipality.

If this were not a controlling factor, the fact that all of the engineers and architects who reported to the committee were of the opinion that the lot size is too small and inadequate, and that from every standpoint of parking, traffic congestion, etc., the post office site is not suitable, it would seem that these latter considerations should govern, and did govern the action of your committee. In addition to this, your committee discovered that to purchase the post office site would require an investment of at least one hundred twenty-five thousand dollars.

In the consideration of the Clark site your committee had in mind that this site has within its boundaries an area considerably larger than the present court house site, and in the opinion of planners and builders, is admirably located for court house purposes. This site stood first in the opinion of every expert who was called in for advice. The committee likewise had the judgment of the master builders of the city of Oshkosh who unanimously proposed the so-called Clark site, and in addition to this, the mayor of the city of Oshkosh reported to the committee that it was the unanimous choice of the commission council of the city of Oshkosh.

Your committee, with all of the elements before it, then considered the cost of acquisition of this property, and believe that the property can be acquired for eighty-five thousand dollars, and were of the opinion, after giving serious consideration to the matter, that it would be advisable to purchase this property for court house purposes at a price not to exceed eighty-five thousand dollars.

The so-called Clark and Kennedy site involves a parcel of land 371.6 feet long on Algoma boulevard, 362.8 feet on Jackson drive, with

an extreme depth on the west side on the Kennedy property of 297 feet, and an extreme depth on the west side of the Clark property of 244.5 feet, as shown by the plat hereto attached and made a part hereof. Your present court house property is 200 feet on Ceape street, by a depth of 336.9 feet north and south.

Your committee therefore gave careful consideration to the question of costs and concluded that it would be cheaper to acquire the Clark-Kennedy site for eighty-five thousand dollars than to build a new court house on the present site at an estimated expense of one hundred eight thousand dollars, as previously set forth.

Your committee ascertained by actual measurement by measuring the distance one must ordinarily travel from the corner of Main and Washington boulevard, to the present court house that the distance necessary to travel to reach the present court house is greater than would be necessary to reach the court house when constructed on the Clark-Kennedy site.

Your committee has in mind that the court house must be convenient of access not only to people of the whole county but to people of surrounding counties, and after giving careful consideration to all of the elements involved in connection with the reports before it, recommend to your honorable body that Winnebago county acquire the so-called Clark-Kennedy site.

Your committee desires to state that no action of the committee was taken until Saturday, January 3rd, 1931, despite newspaper and other reports to the contrary—that no action of the committee was finally taken until the matter had been thoroughly discussed and each and every member of the committee given an opportunity to voice his sentiments and opinions. Your committee vehemently desires to state that no group, individual, or organization of any name, nature or description, has guided or influenced its action, and that the report herein contained is the honest judgment of a committee of public servants who have honestly and patiently tried to discharge a public trust.

MINORITY REPORT ON COURT HOUSE SITE

The following minority report No. 8 was presented.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, State of Wisconsin:

Gentlemen: The majority report of your Court House Committee having been made by Supervisor Bouchette, Chairman of the Committee, I beg leave to submit a minority report as follows: to-wit:

The price asked by the Clark-Kennedy site owners is too high, as is agreed by the majority of your court house committee. Even if this site can be obtained for \$85,000 which from the attitude of the owners of this property is very doubtful, unknown sums of money would still have to be spent for putting the property in shape to receive the proposed new court house. As the committee's city planner, Mr. Crane said in his report to the committee, there would be a difficult problem in placing the building and locating drives and landscaping here, a problem, the solution of which he would be glad to help solve at the proper time. Be it said in passing, that Mr. Crane is not a low priced man, and for the service he rendered to your committee he was, in my judgment, very well paid. Mr. Crane also embodied in his report to your committee, the statement that in his judgment, which your committee sets much store by, that the acquisition of the Clark-Kennedy property by the county would not provide sufficient room to properly receive a court house fitting to the dignity and prestige of Winne-

bago county, and that additional property, the Dillman property specifically should be acquired in order to meet the needs of the situation. It seems to me that after acquiring the Clark-Kennedy property at treble its assessed value, and adding to this the possibility, nay probability, that we still should need the Dillman property, which if needed and the same proportional price was asked for the Dillman property as has been asked for the Clark-Kennedy property, and added to all this the extra expense made necessary for solving the difficult (to use Mr. Crane's phraseology) problem of placing the building, landscaping, drives, etc., we should if we attempt this undertaking be leading this county into a very expensive undertaking, and one that we should find it very hard to justify to the taxpayers of this county. Once we make a start by buying the Clark-Kennedy site, we are then committed to the undertaking and cannot turn back. After you have the bear by the tail, you dare not let go.

I went on this committee desiring to ascertain what was best for the taxpayers of Winnebago county, and the studies of your committee did not extend far enough in the time at their disposal to ascertain what disposition could be made of the present site in case the county decided to buy a new site. We have no data as to what this site is worth. None of the employed experts dwelt on this phase of the situation. It was casually stated by two of the members of your committee that possibly \$35,000 could be obtained for the present site. Judging by the value of the surrounding land as assessed by the city of Oshkosh, \$35,000 for the land itself would be about correct. But gentlemen, I urge you to remember that while it is apparently possible for people whose land is assessed for \$35,600 to ask and receive from \$95,000 down to \$85,000 for such land, it becomes a very different proposition should Winnebago County attempt to realize three times the value of its present site. We buy in a sellers' market and sell in a buyers' market and the taxpayer absorbs the deficit. I for one will not consent to this proposition. Mr. Auler the architect tells us that a new jail can be incorporated in the new court house at a cost well within \$80,000 and double our present space. If such jail were incorporated in a new court house, there would, it seems to me, to be a great discrepancy between the proportional cost of the jail and the court house. On this basis the entire new building combining jail and sheriff's residence and court house would cost only around \$400,000 exclusive of cost of site. Such reckoning, gentlemen, appears to me to be ridiculous, when we consider that all along the members of this board have understood that the cost would be about again as high.

Much has been said about the difficulty alleged, of obtaining proper footings for an adequate court house on the present site. However, the wish is father to the thought. This argument is simply to my notion, camouflage and propaganda in favor of the Clark-Kennedy site. We have had no architect tell us that a suitable court house could not be erected on this site. Holabird and Root of Chicago said nothing about the difficulty nor extra cost of obtaining suitable foundations for a new building on this site. Mr. Reis, stated specifically before the committee that any type of building could be erected on this site. It was also stated that there was insufficient room to build a court house to the north of the present building. We have 129 feet between the south line of Otter street and the north line of the present building. If your new court house were to be 100 feet wide which is at least 30 feet wider than the present building, we should still have a set back of 29 feet from the south line of Otter street, which seems to me to be sufficient. As to the razing of the old building upon completion of the new, the claim is made that the removal of the old building would be added expense. Buildings such as this contain much valuable material. The timbers, studding, brick and stone can all be used and have a value that would compensate for the cost of removal. The county is buying right along stone for crushing by its prisoners. The amount of stone in this building would provide for quite a lot of work for these prisoners.

Much also has been said upon the subject of beauty of location. It is my opinion that beauty is merely a matter of contrast. In all cities whose inception dates back before the era of city planners, you will find oases of beauty amidst surroundings that are not remarkable from an aesthetic viewpoint. Whatever there is here to mar the aesthetic sense, has been placed here by the permission of the City of Oshkosh, and the rest of the taxpayers of the county should not be made to suffer in their tax burden by aesthetic sins committed by the city of Oshkosh. Gentlemen, we have a site, it is ours. It is paid for, it has

sufficient room, ample parking space, it is accessible, it has the merit of familiarity to the people of Winnebago county, it has been endorsed by the county board in its votes on various occasions, it has been endorsed recently by some of your prominent citizens, Mr. E. J. Dempsey, a former president of the State Bar association (if he has been quoted correctly by Attorney Williams) and by Mr. Maxcy in his article in the issue of The Daily Northwestern as of January 3rd inst, and it is my firm conviction that should your honorable body see fit to submit this question of site to the people of the county at the spring election that it would be overwhelmingly endorsed by the people most concerned, the already overburdened taxpayer.

Party of the second part agrees to furnish all fuel, lights, water and gas necessary to properly run said jail, party of the first part to furnish all labor necessary to take care of boilers, furnace, and so forth.

It is understood and agreed that said party of the first part is to furnish all necessary labor for turnkeys, jailers, at his own expense, and to generally do any and all things necessary for the proper carrying out of the rules and regulations of the state board of control concerning the care and conduct of jails and prisoners without additional compensation to his salary as fixed by the county board of supervisors of Winnebago county, except the payment of 33 cents per meal for meals actually furnished as hereinbefore provided.
