RULES OF BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF WINNEBAGO COUNTY

Adopted April 27, 1932.

I. The meetings of this board shall be held in the supervisor's room,

and the hour for daily meetings shall be 10 a. m., and the county board shall continue in continuous session from day to day until adjourned. unless to a day certain or sine die.

II. At the first meeting of the board, it shall be the duty of the chairman, or in case of his absence, the vice chairman, or in their absence, the clerk to call to order.

The clerk shall then call the roll of members,

A quorum being present the board shall proceed to the election of a chairman and vice chairman.

III. It shall be the duty of the chairman to appoint the following standing committees, each to consist of the number of members as set

after the name of each committee viz:

Equalization, nine; finance, eight; general accounts, seven: illegal assessments, five; justice and constables accounts seven; sheriffs and coroner's accounts, seven; insane three; poor and county home, three; corporations, three; public buildings, five; per diem and mileage. five; printing, three; bonds and salaries, five; county abstract and tract index system, three; rules, three; education, three; sanatorium, five; budget, four (county clerk, ex-officio); county fair, five; aviation, five; old age assistance, three.

 A county highway committee consisting of five members to represent cities, towns and viliages, and all other elective committees and elective officers, are to be elected annually at the November session of the board.

The board may adjourn for such time as shall be necessary for the chairman to prepare the list of committees, and no business can be done until the same shall be announced.

VI. The chairman, or in his absence, the vice chairman, shall take the chair at the hour to which the board may from time to time stand adjourned, call the board to order and direct the calling of the roll of members by the clerk. In the absence of both the chairman and the vice chairman, a chairman pro tem shall be elected.

VII. Upon the appearance of a quorum, the journal of the preceding day shall be read by the clerk, and any mistake therein shall be corrected by the board provided, that upon the last day of the session the journal for that day will be read and, before the final adjournment, corrected

VIII. After the reading and correction of the journal, the order of business shall be as follows:

Reception of petitions, memorials, accounts, etc.
 Presentation of resolutions and disposition of same.

Reports of standing committees. Reports of select committees.

4.

Consideration of miscellaneous business.

Every subject matter that shall come before the board shall be referred to the appropriate committee by the chairman, without motion.

The chairman shall preserve order and decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the board and shall clearly and distinctly state

every motion or question before debate.

XI. The chairman shall be entitled to vote on all questions taken by ayes and nays, and his nane shall be called last; when the vote on any question is a tie, it shall be deemed to have been lost, but any member may present the same question again at such time as provided in Section XXIII.

XII. Every motion or amendment shall be reduced to writing when a request therefor shall be made by any member; and all petitions. memorial and substitutes snall be reduced to writing and read before they shall be considered by the board.

XIII. Every written resolution shall have attached thereto the name of the person introducing it; and when referred to a committee,

the names of such committees shall be endorsed thereon.

XIV. Every member, previous to speaking, shall rise and address the chair.

When two or more members rise at once, the chair shall designate the member who is to speak first; but in all cases the member who shall first rise and address the chair shall speak first.

XVI. No member shall speak more than twice upon the same question without leave; and when called to order by the chairman shall take his seat, and shall not be allowed to proceed without leave of the board.

XVII. A vote on any question shall be taken by ayes and nays when called for by any member; and SHALL be so taken on all questions involving the expenditure of money; and whenever a vote is so ordered and taken, the members voting in the affirmative and negative, as well as those absent or not voting, shall be recorded at length in the records of the proceedings of the county board.

XVIII. No account or claim against the county shall be audited unless it be made out in items and duly verified and be filed with the clerk of the board, except as otherwise provided by law.

XIX. When a motion is under consideration, no motion shall be entertained except.

1. To adjourn.

2. To lay on the table

3. For the previous question.

- To postpone to a day certain.
 To commit to a committee.
- 6. To amend or to substitute.

To postpone indefinitely.

These several motions shall take precedence in the eorder in which they stand in this rule.

XX. A motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, and for the previous question shall be decided without debate, except as hereinafter provided.

XXI. A motion to postpone indefinitely or to a day certain or to commit shall not again be entertained on the same day or in the same stage of the proposition.

XXII. A substitute shall be open to amendment the same as the original proposition; but when adopted, shall not be subject to amendment. If an amendment or substitute is lost, another substantially the same shall not be entertained.

XXIII. When a motion or question has once been determined, any member voting with the majority may move a reconsideration of the vote, but such motion shall be made and acted on at the same or next succeeding day, and shall not thereafter be made except by unanimous consent.

XXIV. The previous question may be moved by any member, and the chairman shall then say: "It requiring five members to second this motion, those in favor of sustaining the motion will rise." If five or more members then rise, the previous question shall thereby be seconded and an opportunity then be given to any two members opposed thereto to briefly state their objections. The question shall then be: "Shall the question be now put" which, if carried by a vote of two-thirds of the members present upon a call ot the ayes and nays, the board shall immediately proceed to vote upon the pending amendment if any, and upon the main question.

XXV. In filling blanks, the largest sum and the longest time shall be put first.

XXVI. These rules shall not be changed, amended or repealed, unless the proposition or amendment is introduced in writing and the same laid over to some subsequent meeting of the board, not less than five days intervening, and then only with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

XXVII. Any of these rules may be suspended upon any pending measure by two-thirds of the members present.

XXVIII. These rules and all amendments or additions thereto which may hereafter be made shall govern the board until altered or repealed, as herein provided.

XXIX. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in "Roberts' Rules of Order," so far as they remain in common use and are practicable and applicable and not inconsistent herewith, shall govern the board.

XXX. Whenever the board shall have gone into a committee of the whole and shall have arisen, the board shall at once be in session for the receiving and acting upon the report of the committee of the whole, and for the transaction of any and all other business of every kind.

No resolution for the appropriation of money shall be in order until the day after its presentation and reference, except upon the consent of two-thirds of the members of the county board present.

XXXII. All reports, resolutions and petitions must be presented in typewritten form in triplicate, so that one copy will be immediately available to the local press, and the same to be read by the clerk of the board.

XXXIII. All resolutions calling for an appropriation of money, and all resolutions, the adoption of which will require an ultimate expenditure of money or an appropriation by the county board, shall be presented to the county clerk of Winnebag, county ex-officio member of the budget committee, at least 10 (10) days prior to the opening day of the annual November session of the county board, and no bill or resolution calling for an appropriation of money shall be received by the board without the unappropriation and the board without the unappropriation of money shall be received by the board without the unanimous consent of the board after that time.

In addition thereto are the employes and officers of the County Asylum and Bi-County Sanitarium, whose salaries are fixed by the trustees thereof.

We find that upon compiling a 10 per cent reduction in the salaries of the elective officers and deputies and appointive officers, that a

saving of \$5770.00 would be effected.

We direct the attention of the public, and of this Board, to the fact that a saving of this character, while in the aggregate a substantial amount, is a mere pittance which would not reflect itself in a taxsaving to the individual taxpayer of sufficient amount to be noticeable. For example-the Town of Winchester, with an assessed valuation of approximately \$1,000,000.00, would save, by this tax reduction in salaries,

about \$75.00.

Your committee directs your attention to this fact for the reason that while it believes, in response to public demand, that reduction in salaries is inevitable, that there must be savings and economies practiced by the County Board and other municipal bodies that will result in actual substantial tax reduction, and to that end your committee although not directed so to do, recommend to the county board that at the annual meeting thereof a resolution be adopted, abolishing the office of County Agricultural Agent and Clerk to Agricultural Agent, which would effect a saving on present salary basis to the county of \$3,760.00.

We further recommend that the County Board, at this session, adopt a resolution committing the county board to the policy of abandoning any further new road construction for a period of at least

five years.

It should be apparent, in the opinion of this committee, to any person that in order to reduce taxes public expenditure must be reduced in the spots where the money is being most generously spent, and in this, as in most other counties, the largest expenditure of public funds is in the road building activities of the county.

Your committee makes this suggestion with a knowledge that the increased demands upon the taxpayer to relieve the unfortunate are becoming burdensome, and will continue to grow so long as present conditions prevail.

Your committee therefore recommends the passage of the separate

resolutions attached and made a part of this report. July 26th, 1932.

District Attorney Keefe presented the following opinion as to the legality of the resolutions in Report No. 1.

TO THE HONORABLE COUNTY BOARD OF WINNEBAGO COUNTY Gentlemen:

I herewith give you my opinion as to the legality of the resolutions

proposed by your Committee on Bonds and Salaries.

Your attention is directed to an opinion of the Attorney General dated June 9th, 1932, found in Volume 21 of Opinons of Attorney General, on Page 602, wherein this subject is discussed. Section 59.15, Subsection 1 of the Statutes provides:

The County Board, at its annual meeting, shall fix the annual salary for each county officer, including County Judge to be elected during the ensuing year, and who will be entitled to receive a salary payable out of the County Treasury. The salary, so fixed, shall not be increased or diminished during the officers' term.

It is apparent, from this section, that no action that your body can take can reduce the salaries of elective officers, except the newly elected incoming officers who are chosen subsequent to the passage of a resolution fixing salaries. The only immediate salary reductions that could possibly be made would be among that class who are not design-

ated as public officials, but who are appointive.

Your attention is further directed to the Statute above cited, which provides that salary schedules shall be fixed at the annual November meeting. The courts have repeatedly held, however, that salaries could be fixed at adjourned meetings of the County Board, and salaries could be lixed at adjourned meetings of the County Local, amin my opinion, pursuant to the authority found in Appleton vs. Outagamic County, 197 Wis., Page 4, salary reductions could be made at a special meeting of the County Board, within reasonable limits.

This meeting, I am advised, is a special meeting, being an adjourned meeting of the April session, held pursuant to request.

The question, therefore, is whether or not the action of the Board, taken at this time, could legally affect salaries of the officers to be elected in November. The latest date that I have any knowledge of, at which the right of the Board to fix salaries was upheld, was May 10th. This meeting is being held on July 26th. In accordance with the opinion of the Attorney General, above referred to, there seem to be very obvious reasons why, if challenged, a resolution fixing salaries at this time might be held to be invalid, for the reason that candidates for office were permitted to begin their campaign, by the circulation of nomination papers, as early as June 10th, and some candidates have already filed their nomination papers, and it is subject to considerable question, in my mind, whether the resolution, if taken into the courts, might not be defeated. However, I am of the opinion that in view of the present emergency the courts would incline to a position that would sustain the validity of salary reductions, and I am further of the opinion that no candidate seeking public office, or elected to public office, would challenge, in these days, the authority of the Board to fix salaries at this time.

In making the above statement I am unable to find any present legal authority to sustain it, but in view of the hanging circumstances I am sure the courts would uphold the proposed salary changes.

Every man or woman now running for county office would be advised prior to the primary of the amount of salary to go with the office in case of election, and if not satisfied there is still plenty of time for them to withdraw.

In reference to the resolution abolishing the office of County Agent, my opinion is that such a resolution should be passed at the annual meeting of the Board to be effective, and that the present resolution merely elicits an expression of opinion and sentiment from the Board.

In reference to the other resolution relating to suspension of road building, I am of the opinion that this resolution likewise merely expresses the sentiment of the Board, and that action must be taken at the November session, when the appropriations are made for road building activities.

I personally congratulate the Committee in having foresight to place this mater before the Board at this time so that, in the event of its passage, the Highway committee may be advised in sufficient time to know the attitude and sentiment of the Board.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BONDS AND SALARIES

The following report No. 2 was presented. To the Honorable County Board of Winnebago County, Wis.

Your committee on bonds and salaries, to whom was referred the resolution presented by the committee on bonds and salaries and the resolution presented by Supervisor Ulrich, do hereby respectfully re-port that pursuant to the request of the Board they met and gave consideration to the questions raised in the discussion had before the board this morning.

Your committee, upon an examination of both resolutions finds that with minor exceptions the difference in the resolutions relates to the amount of reduction proposed to be made in the salaries of officers

Your committee feels that the motives which prompted the filing of petitions asking for salary reductions and other communications on the subject, were inspired by sentiment that the rising costs of government should be and must be curtailed so as to effect a real reduction in the amount of taxes to be paid ultimately by the taxpayer. With this program your committee is in hearty accord, but your committee feels that the taxpayer should not be lulled to sleep under the impression that a real saving has been effected by reduction of salaries, unless such is the fact, and in order that the members of the county board and the public may be apprised of the real situation we beg leave to give you the following information:

First-An examination of the records of Winnebago County discloses the fact to be that there has been no increase in the salary of any of the elective officers, with the exception of the county judge, during the past twenty years. The same records discloses the fact to be that the salaries of the sheriff and register of deeds, during that period of time, have been substantially reduced. of some of these additional duties are as follows:

Old age assistance, affecting the offices of county judge, county clerk, county treasurer, and district attorney-mother's pensions, affecting the offices of juvenile judge, county treasurer, county clerk, district attorney and sheriff, and making the establishment of the office of probation officer necessary. Income tax law, adding to the duties of the county treasurer, county clerk, sheriff, and district attorney. Greatly enlarged highway program, adding to the duties of county clerk, county treasurer, and district attorney, and making establishment of the county highway committee and county highway commissioners' office necessary. County tuberculosis sanitarium, affecting the office of county clerk, county treasurer, county judge, sheriff, and district attorney. Alimony law, greatly adding to the burden and duties of the office of the clerk of courts. Law relating to the filing of chattel mortgages, adding a great deal of work to the office of the register of deeds. Creation of the Wisconsin General Hospital at Madison, and laws in relation thereto, adding new work to the office of the county judge, county nurse, and county clerk. Dog license law, affecting the work of the county treasurer, county clerk, and district attorney. Abolishing the office of county humane agent, and putting the burden of this work upon the district attorney and the sheriff. Creation of dance hall ordinance, greatly increasing the work of the office of district attorney and sheriff.

These are only a few of the added duties prescribed by law upon your elective officers that have come to pass in the last twenty years, and no additional remuneration has been given to any of these officers, and as hereinbefore noted, the salaries of the sheriff and register of

deeds have been reduced.

A fair statement, however, should include the fact that the county board has provided for additional assistance in the offices of some of the elective officials so that they can handle the volume of business committed to that office. This additional assistance, however, has given no

additional remuneration to the elective officials.

Your attention is further directed to the fact that using the figures of 1931 as a basis, the amount of salaries under the control of the county board and not including salaries of employes and officers of the sanitarium, county asylum, or the salaries of highway employes, totals \$68,720,82. A cut of ten per cent would mean a saving of. \$6,872.08 a year, and naturally a cut of twenty per cent would mean a saving of twice that amount. The equalized valuation of Winnebago county for last year was \$136,971,200.00, and using those same figures as a basis the present salaries cost the taxpayers one-half mill on each dollar of valuation, or five cents on each \$1000.00 of valuation. In other words, a property owner having and owning property assessed at \$5000.00 pays, in his tax bill, twenty-five cents toward the payment of the salaries of officers and employes of Winnebago county.

It is apparent, therefore, that if those same salaries are cut ten per cent that it would mean a saving to a taxpayer paying taxes on property assessed at \$5000.00 of two and one-half cents, and if the cut is twenty per cent he would save the price of a nickel cigar. The average farmer whose property is assessed at \$10,000.00 would be the beneficiary of the munificent saving as a result of this cut in salaries of ten cents.

Your committee feels that these facts should be definitely and thoroughly understood because, being in sympathy with the movement to reduce taxes they feel that the efforts to reduce taxes by reduction of salaries will not be a "flea-bite" on the back of the huge tax burden, and that the county board or any other municipal body, to give a real taxsaying to the taxpayer, must not only make reasonable reductions in salaries but must go further, and refrain from spending any more money than is absolutely necessary to carry on organized government.

Your committee desires to point out that approximately \$70.00 of taxpayers' money is necessary to pay for the time of the county board consumed this morning in discussing this question, thus wiping out the saving of the county board consumed the morning in discussing this question, thus wiping out the

saving of one entire township by the salary reduction.

It was this feeling, after a study of the situation, that prompted your committee to recommend—first—that the office of county agricultural scand at the state of the seasons and seasons. tural agent and assistant be abolished—second—that there be a cessation in new road building activities for at least five years.

Your committee feels that all other public activities should be curtailed to the minimum so that an example may be set for the other

municipalities in the county to pattern after.

Your committee interviewed the sheriff, county clerk, and clerk of courts, and find that under the present salary schedule the county clerk receives a salary of \$2400.000 a year, plus certain fees, which make his salary, in the aggregate between \$2850.00 and \$2900.00. Your clerk of courts reports that his fees will average, above his salary, approximately

\$1500.00 per year, making his average gross income about \$3000.00 per year, out of which, due to increased work in the office, he pays an extra assistant \$400.00 per year, in addition to his bond, which costs \$75.00 per year, making his net income about \$2525.00 per year. The sheriffs salary is at present \$3600.00 per year, and using last year as a basis the sheriff received, in addition to this salary, \$1238.88 for criminal fees, \$653.80 for conveyance, \$7564.26 for board, and \$2500.000 for civil fees, a total of \$15,556.94. The sheriff advises that out of this amount received he pays \$4860.00 in salaries, about \$4000.00 to board help and prisoners; that his car expense is about \$800.000 per year, and depreciation on cars used in his business about \$600.00 per year, or a total expense of approximately \$10,260.00, leaving a net income to the Sheriff of something over \$5200.00 in a year.

Your committee calls attention to the fact that the major portion of the sheriff's income is received through the board of prisoners, and that this item is subject to the control of the county board when it en-

ters into its contract with the sheriff at the November session.

Your attention is further directed to the fact that the amount received by the sheriff for criminal fees, conveyance, civil fees, and board, varies greatly from year to year, dependent upon the amount of business his office has to do, and that there is no definite method of ascertaining the exact average of income due to lack of proper statistics.

Your committee has also given consideration to the question of the immediate reduction of the salaries of county appointees. The conclusion of your committee, in that regard, is that it would be manifestly unfair to reduce, at this time, the salaries of clerks and deputies, which would effect no real saving, and might destroy the efficiency and morale in the offices of elective officers, but feel that the reduction to be proposed should be effective as of January 1st, 1933. The budget for the ensuing year was made in contemplation of the present salary schedule.

Your committee further reports that after consultation with the district attorney as to the legality of any proposed salary change, that they adhere, in view of all of the facts, to the opinion expressed in their prior report, and that the board should, at this time, adopt the following

resolution:

2. It seems to be the general practice to advertise for road materials tor the lowest responsible bidders, which necessitates machine labor. Now your committee believes that machine labor should not be used We believe that the where it is a disadvantage to human labor. We believe that the answer to the unemployment situation is not increased taxation, but

rather the proper spending of tax moneys.

3. We also made a trip to Dane County, where a crushing plant

was being operated with unemployment labor.

4. In one unit of this county, they are paying 52c per yard more for road material, by contract, than the same could have been produced for by using unemployment labor, with dozens of idle men walking the

streets depending upon a dole for an existence.

5. To summarize the whole situation we have accomplished very little in the way of actual relief, due perhaps to our inability to put our ideas before the different governing bodies properly, but we believe we have learned considerable about the situation that may be of value to this board.

Resolved that if the county is to continue to class granges in the same class with roadhouses, requiring license fee of \$25 per year and \$5 for supervision for each entertainment, we demand that the dance supervisors be required to assist the committees in charge of grange dances in every way possible to help maintain order and decency, not only inside of halls but on any part of the premises on which halls are located, and be it further

Resolved, that the chairman and members of the county board require that only such persons whose names have been recommended and whose conduct has proven beyond a doubt that they are capable to being efficient supervisors, should be approved, and be it further

Resolved, that whenever a supervisor appointed to such office lowers the standard of a supervisor by joining in and drinking liquor or booze, or otherwise conducts himself contrary to good morals while on duty, such supervisor should be immediately discnarged, by those who are in authority to do so. At a regular meeting of the Winnebago County Pomona frange held at Community Grange Hall on Oct. 8, 1932, the subjoined resolutions, introduced by the legislative committee of the Pomona Grange were duly passed, after a free and extended discussion in which all the constituent subordinate granges were heard through their accredited representatives.

Whereas, early in the season, members of the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors expressed themselves as opposed to the retention of the Agricultural County agent, and

Whereas, notice has been duly given that a final vote on this subject shall be taken at the November session of said Winnebago county

board of supervisors; therefore be it

Resolved, that the Winnebago county Pomona Grange, in regular session assembled, respectfully suggests that the discontinuance of the office of county agricultural agent of Winnebago County would result in losses to the agricultural interests of the county out of proportion to

the savings which might thereby accure, and be it further

Resolved, that it is the sense of this Winnebago County Pomona Grange that sufficiently substantial economies to warrant the retention of this service can be secured by the employment, at a reasonable salary, of a county agent competent to carry on all the activities of the office, including the highly important 4-H Club program; by a better organization of the necessary travel to cut down mileage expense; and by a more systematic handling of office detail to reduce the cost of maintenance

In connection with the foregoing resolutions may we be permitted to suggest that, during the past season, the Fond du Lac County Agent, without the assistance of a special 4-H club leader, successfully handled more than four times as many 4-H Club boys and girls as were handled in this county by the county agent and a special leader necessitating

double salary and maintenance expense

May we further suggest that it seems quite within the possibilities for the work of the office secretary and the 4-H leader to be merged for at least the greater part of the year provided care is taken to discover a person with sufficient breadth of interest and training. This would not only substantially reduce cost, but it would avoid overlapping of activities and fix more definitely responsibility for results.

REPORT OF THE WINNEBAGO COUNTY CHILDREN'S BOARD, 1932

The following report No. 8 was presented.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago county: It is now three years since the Winnebago County Children's Board

was established by the County Board. The children's board, at present, was established by the County Board. The Children's board, at present, is composed of the following members: Mr. George Young, Oshkosh; Mrs. C. B. Clark, Neenah; Miss Elizabeth King, Omro; Mrs. Jasper Pickett, Pickett; and Miss Mary A. O'Keefe, Oshkosh.

In the three years of its existence the scope of work undertaken by the children's board has been constantly enlarging under the suggestion and direction of the juvenile department of the state board of

The board has continued this year the work of making a survey of the foster boarding homes in the county and of investigating and recommending homes for licenses, getting acquainted with the history of the children, and supervising the homes. The number of foster homes ascertained through the survey is 24. Wherever it was possible and seemed wise efforts have been made to react thick the homes of the and seemed wise, efforts have been made to reestablish the homes of the

Due to the economic depression and the resulting unemployment, the number of children needing clothing has increased. These children do not come under any other relief organization. Many of them are rural school children, chiefly from Nordheim and Algoma Park where the town is already carrying a very heavy burden in the way of supply-

ing relief. Forty-two children were assisted in this way. This year the members of the board have been asked by Judge Spengler to assist in investigating the surroundings and home life of three children brought before the Juvenile court for delinquency. Four children were placed in the custody of the board by Judge Spengler for

guidance and supervision.

The children's board is giving to the problem of the unmarried mother careful study in regard to all the factors involved, the child, the mother, the alleged father, the family and the conditions contributing to delinquency. An increasing number of mothers are keeping their babies instead of sending them to institutions. This is made possible by the establishment of paternity and securing a financial settlement from the father. In many cases mothers are working and paying for their children in foster boarding homes. The responsibility for the wel-fare of her child is the greatest incentive for the mother to reconstruct

her own life and to make it, eventually, one of service and happiness.

At the October meeting of the board, Mr. Ruth, field representative of the State Industrial School for Boys at Waukesha, gave some statistics and information concerning the boys from Winnebago county who are either in that institution or on parole from the institution:

Number of boys in institution 440

Number of boys on parole 380

Number of boys from Winnebago county in institution 10

Sebbosh Oshkosh Number of boys from Winnebago county on parole

Oshkosh

Menasha

Number from villages and rural districts in Winnebago county.... An interesting fact—and it should be a hopeful one—about the boys from Winnebago county is that nearly all of them are above the average mentally, according to tests given in the institution. This means that those boys have the intelligence to become good, useful citizens if their environment is favorable and they are properly guided when they are paroled.

According to Mr. Ruth, many boys who never cause any trouble in the institution, when they are returned to their home communities, again get into difficulty and have to be sent back to the school.

It is the idea of Miss Yerxa and Mr. Ruth that information in regard to the conduct of paroled boys be sent to the children's board. Then, with the assistance of interested persons in the community, the board may work out plans for the improvement of conditions surrounding these

Miss King and Miss O'Keefe attended the state conference of County Children's Boards held in Wisconsin Rapids, June 8 and 9. At this meeting the function of County Children's Boards, and the methods and procedure for the protection of children were discussed. Expenses

Balance on hand June 30, 1932 \$ 87,376.80 The progress of the schools of Winnebago county during 1931-32 bore no apparent evidence of the stringency of the times. We are fortunate indeed to have as school officers and business managers of our individual districts men and women who appreciate the value of education, and do everything in their power to maintain the standards of the schools. The teachers, in the face of salary reductions and curtailment of expenditures for school supplies, have shown no decrease in their capacity for work or loyalty to their profession. The school patrons realize full well that in times like these the youth of today must be well trained for his active participation in dealing with the problems of to-

morrow. The school year saw the completion of a new one room school building, a brick structure, costing \$7,957.75 in the Slough Bridge district No. 5, town of Oshkosh. Improvements of other types such as enlargement or fencing of the school grounds, installation of electric lights, replacement of old equipment, and redecorating buildings have been made in a

number of districts.

SERVICE STANDARDS

Through teachers' institutes, group meetings, school board conventions, and attendance at community gatherings a close contact is effected with teachers, school officers and parents. Through school room visitations, inspectional tours, and a closely supervised program of formal and informal testing direct contact with classroom and individual pupil problems is made. Teachers' helps in the form of detailed lesson plans and bulletins are issued from the office.

A five year program of school ground beautification is being for-ated. Very little has been done in this county to improve the appearance of the school yards, and now seems an opportune time to make a beginning when donations of service as well as shrubbery and plants

can be secured more readily than cash.

COUNTY EXAMINATIONS

In addition to the standard test program which is well established, this office conducts the final examinations for eighth grade diplomas at various centers throughout the county. Eighth grade commencement

exercises were held at the Strand Theater, Oshkosh, Wisconsin, June 9, 1932.

ACHIEVEMENT, HEALTH AND PLAY DAY

As a departure from the customary contests in achievement, declamation, and music, a county achievement day was held in the Recreational building, Oshkosh, Wisconsin, May 21, 1932. The entire project was sponsored by the Winnebago County Teachers' association. Contests in achievement, spelling, and arithmetic, were featured for which monetary awards donated by the association, were made. The general program was based on the extra-curricular activities, such as music, health, play, and dramatics, regularly carried out in the schools of the county. Each township was represented by a number on the program. The outstanding success of the venture was made possible by the whole hearted cooperation of the teachers and the loyal support of the parnts and natrons.

LIBRARY SERVICE

The Winnebago County Library is rendering an outstanding service to every district which avails itself of the privileges offered. A traveling library of worth while reading material for adults as well as for children can be secured for every school in the county. Pictures for picture study called for in the course of study are also furnished through the library.

HEALTH AND EXTENSION SERVICE

Close cooperation in service with the county nurse, the dental hygienist, the agricultural workers, the 4-H Club leader, and welfare agencles furnishes an enrichment of the educational program so greatly de-

sired for a full development of every individual.

SUPERVISION pervising teacher Miss Eva C.

The supervising teacher, Miss Eva C. Monson, is rendering the county a distinct service in an efficient manner. The progress that the rural schools of this state have made in the last fifteen years is largely due to the closer supervision of the work made possible by the employment of supervising teachers in every county. The average rural teacher comes to us with less training and experience than is required for elementary teaching in village or city schools. It is obvious, therefore, that the lack in training and experience in the rural teacher should be offset by a well formulated program of close supervision and training in service. The law providing for rural supervision is one of the finest educational measures and one of which our state can be justly proud. The appointment of the supervising teacher is made by the county superintendent, but the salary and traveling expenses are paid by the state.

The supervising program in any county is based on the needs of

the schools. Improvement of instruction is effected through:

Classroom visitations.

Bulletins and outlines sent from the office.
 Institutes and group meetings of teachers.

From those figures it is shown that the County Library service is penetrating into all parts of the Winnebago County. Some districts still need a great deal of fostering before they will receive their share of the library service. If we had a full time assistant at Oshkosh we could do some active advertising, but with the present budget we wait until the call comes directly from the people. However, new stations do come in frequently during the year with the request for a collection of books. This fall the difficulty has been in getting enough books to fill the orders. Collections are changed as frequently as the custodian feels it is necessary. In ordering books we try to buy those that will give the most entertainment to our county.

COUNTY NURSE'S REPORT

The following Report, No. 21, was presented: To the County Board of Supervisors, Winnebago county. Gentlemen:

Due to the present conditions the work has necessarily increased in my office.

The school inspections have been carried on as usual. As a special feature 505 children were examined by physicians in Winneconne, Omro, and Nordheim schools. No child was examined without the parents' consent and 181 parents were present at the examinations. With the parent present the examination is always more satisfactory because they can ask questions and their receive direct advice from the doctor or nurse. Physical examinations in schools help us to detect early tuberculosis among children, also any other conditions which would require

early diagnosis.

In the Winneconne and Nordheim schools the indigent children are receiving free milk. In these cases they receive no milk at home. All school children should have at least a pint of milk every day in order to grow properly, and if this is not given they will not develop normally and they will be more susceptible to diseases of all kinds.

We are carrying quite a number of maternity cases this year and many calls have been made to expectant mothers. Just how are our indigent or near indigent expectant mothers going to be taken care of? This is a very important question at the present time, and we all realize full well what happens when a mother is taken out of the home. A small fund in our office to be used for this purpose would help greatly. Seven maternity packages have been given to indigent maternity cases from my office. Five layettes have been issued, these having been donated by various clubs.

Five infants and preschool child clinics were held last spring with an attendance of 120 children. The examinations were made by a physician from the State Child Welfare Department free of charge. These clinics are worth while in the educational value they bring to the mothers as well as the information concerning the child's general health condition. Special attention is being paid to infants and young children because f they do not receive milk and proper food in their early years, they will suffer the consequences all of their lives.

Many more home visits have been made than in former years due to a wider demand upon the nurse's services. I have tried to answer all calls as soon as possible after receiving them. The past year a considerable number of our calls have been made to determine whether or not it was necessary to call a physician. This is because of lack of money in the homes to pay for a doctor's call unless it was urgent. Several Supervisors have asked me to make calls under the above conditions and in many instances money has been saved. I will be glad to do more of this if requests are made. Fortunately we have had no epidemics this vear.

Dental Division

It has been proven by the best authorities in both the medical and dental professions that many of the systematic ailments are caused by the unhealthy condition of the teeth and gums. Many of these conditions start in prenatal life. Improper diet, poor assimilation of foods, and communicable diseases play a great part in early dental decay and improper growth of teeth.

Reports from year to year have revealed that a large percentage of children were suffering from dental decay and infected teeth. Many children lost their baby teeth too early in life thereby causing a shrinkage of their jaws and preventing the permanent teeth from coming in straight. Six year molars, which are permanent teeth, had been allowed to decay because many parents were not aware of the fact that these

teeth were not baby teeth.

It was these conditions that prompted the Health Committee of 1929 to vote to employ a Dental Hygienist to examine all the children's teeth and educate the children as well as the parents in the care and importance of teeth. Every year since then the Health Committee has voted to allow \$250.00 for the continuance of this program.

This year, in connection with the examinations and dental health

talks, models, and pictures, showing infected teeth, pyorrhea, progress of decay, and growth of the permanent teeth while the baby teeth are still

in their position are being shown.

Many children have had just the most urgent dental work done and the rest of the corrections have had to wait until times are better; as a result these children's mouths are classed as defective. However, children and parents who are contacted are all eager to larn about the ways to prevent dental ills. Mouths are found to be cleaner than before and diets are much improved. Some schools are 100 per cent in milk drinking which is an aid to better teeth and health.

No nurse or hygienist in any community has expected to find a large percentage of corrections in these times, but education along health lines has been very welcome, so some day when economic conditions allow the people to care for more than the bare necessities of life our

Co-operative Marketing

We decided to study the marketing of live stock in Winnebago County since we felt that the cost of distribution was too high and that the farmer was not geting his just share of the consumer's dollar.

I thought that it would not be a difficult task to organize a shipping association in the county to try co-operative marketing of live stock. But it was soon learned that a movement of this kind would be strongly and systematically opposed. Knowing conditions it was believed that the opposition would capitalize on every mistake that was made and it would be advisable to study the path carefully before proceding. Consequently there has been considerable study given to this project and very little action has been taken so far.

In this study the different methods and cost of transportation of

live stock were learned, market requirements studied and barter and

bargaining power was given careful consideration.

As a result we learned that the present cost of transportation could be lowered about one-third; market demands could be met much more efficiently than they are being met, and bargaining power could be transferred by a control of the control of t

strengthened by a certain extent.

The method of study was carried on by going into the market with live stock shipments, actually selling the products, going through the killing plants and learning at first hand the market demands, the actual cost of transportation, and the product most eagerly sought for by the rank and file of the consumers

It was also learned that certain markets demand a certain grade of live stock and at the same time reject other grades. A good single grade of stock always sold better than a mixed grade providing the salesman

knew he had a superior grade.

Going into the market with straight loads of one grade seems to

be the logical way to market live stock.

This study reveals the fact that a large per cent of the loss due to injury and disease could be eliminated by a sound marketing organization. An animal tattooed at the loading station could readily be identified on the rail. Disease, or injury of an animal could then be traced back to its source.

The fat barrow show at the County Fair helped pave the way for an advantage in the marketing of better hogs, more than in any proj-ect that has been carried on in the live stock circles for some time.

The packers were challenged to judge the hogs on foot and then again on the rail.

This study revealed that the packer buyers have been putting too much stress on yield and not enough on desirable carcasses, thus hindering the progress of extension work in swine development.

On the following page is a table giving the figures on tests made

at the packing house.

We have reached the stage in this work where we are ready to en ahead and help start organizing shipping associations, providing the

anead and neap start organizing snipping associations, providing the Agricultural Committee of the board favor such a movement.

The drawback to this project, I believe, in such a movement, will jeopardize the extension office. The truckers are going to use all kinds of methods to prevent a movement of this kind and you all know at present it is very easy to stir up sentiment against the office and if you allow your judgment to be influenced by this sentiment, the truckers are going to settle this question.

On the other hand if the truckers can be taught to see it, in my opinion, they can make more money collecting and loading this stock

than they rae now making in hauling it

Perhaps the most important fact to take into consideration is this the County Agent always works directly under the supervision of the Agricultural Committee and this subject will be left to their discretion.

4-H Club Work

4-H Club work our second major project has taken more time than any other. We find it difficult to keep it a separate project. It is by far our most important work. In this project we work not only with the boys and girls but we develop our live stock industry, carry on soil we in the companies of are able to introduce new home practices, better herd sires and in some These boys and girls are learning by excases foundation females. perience that if they are going to improve their live stock or even maintain the present standard of excellency they have to breed them better. When we allow the club members to exhibit grades, pure breds and scrubs in the same classes it is soon demonstrated that the high grades and pure breds head the classes. In the fat barrow show, where breed characteristics are set aside and the animals are judged simply on what they will bring on the block, the pure breds, grades and cross breds. head the classes.

This work will be more thoroughly discussed in Miss Jean MacFarlane's report, the County Club Leader and Home Demonstration Agent. But in passing I wish to say that we had 413 members last year and this year we had 470. The 4-H Club Exhibits at the County Fair were as

follows:

74 calves 64 hogs 10 lambs 84 chickens

4 ducks 46 garden exhibits

424 sewing, baking and canning exhibits.

4 rabbits

handicraft exhibit.

This is the largest number of exhibits we have ever displayed at the County Fair. Last year the high mark was 534, this year we had 716 exhibits or 182 over last year.

In 1931 our high year in 4-H club work we won \$1,654.00. This year

our total winnings were \$1,806.00, an increase of \$152 over last year. At the State Fair this year we won eight blue ribbons and at the

County Fair three purple ribbons. Just another indication of the progress made in 4-H Club Work.

Perhaps the most outstanding feature of our year's show was the winning of the Grand Championship in the Holstein Bull classes. This was won by a 3 year old club bull, bought as a calf from D. K. Allen, a county breeder and developed and exhibited by Robert Van Alstine, a 4-H club boy from the Town of Omro.

Live Stock Improvement

At the present low values, the Winnebago County live stock represents an investment of about \$2,000,000. Perhaps 85 per cent of the incomes of the farmers comes through live stock and its products. Therefore the efficiency of Winnebago County agriculture will depend largely upon the efficiency of the live stock. Even a small increase in the efficiency would result in a large total sum.

If by selecting, more rigid culling, better feeding, etc. we are able to raise the efficiency of your dairy cows two pounds per cow per year at the present price of fat, the result will be a net income to this industry of approximately \$15,000. An increase in efficiency of 25c per cwt. or 50c

per hog will result in the net earnings approximately \$14,000.

There are a number of ways whereby we could reach a higher standard of efficiency. If we could at once induce the farmer to market three pigs at 200 pounds each instead of two pigs at 200 pounds each and sell their low producing cows, the situation could be changed immediately; but it is not probable that we shall ever be able to do this.

There is one thing they all will do and that is use some kind of a sire, and generally speaking the success will depend a great deal on the kind of sire they use. So we believe that a step towards the develop-

ment of better sires will mean a step towards prosperity.

The most effective step in this movement was organizing our Rure red Dairy Herd Improvement association. This was organized three Bred Dairy Herd Improvement association. years ago and has now been reorganized and started on its fourth year. As I have told you before, it is the only association of its kind in the state.

Being a new venture three years ago it was a question in mind if it would weather the storm of opposition. The only question that is left to settle will be decided by this Board of Supervisors.

Through the testing of pure bred cows in this association we are able to supply all the discriminating buyers with herd sires from dams of known production. Further we are able to encourage the breeding of better animals through the increase in sale price. Bulls from tested dams have averaged over \$15 per head over those from untested dams. We also have a grade association operating its second year.

We have been accused of undermining the business of selling bulls

from untested cows. This statement is false because bulls from untested dams are being sold for as much or more in Winnebago County than they are in any other county of the state.

During the past year we have played a part in securing for Winnebago County farmers not less than 55 bulls from tested dams and not less than 80 pure bred hogs of both sex.

A striking example of what we have been able to do in the way of finding good herd sires for dairymen is demonstrated in our work with Chas. O'Harrow, Town of Nekimi Four years ago the bull calves from this herd were being vealed. When that herd went on test we found that the production for the last three years has been about 500 pounds of fat on two milkings per day. Now he is able to sell his calves fc. breeding purposes.

There are two bull sales and two hog sales held annually in cooperation with this office. The catalogs are mimeographed in this office at a saving of about \$15 per sale. We got up a catalog that anyone could read and understand. At the sales we talked testing, culling, etc., in our sales talk, and by this method got more people interested in using better

sires.

Another important step we are taking in Live Stock Improvement is working toward the control of Bangs Disease or Contagious abortion.

Our job is to convince the farmer that this disease can be controlled by using sanitary methods. To carry on this work six herds from different parts of the county have been selected and are being tested every two months. In some herds the diseased animals are allowed to run with the rest of the herd, while in other cases they are separated in different ways. This work will be carried on until we are satisfied that we are in a safe position to secure the most practical methods of procedure.

This work is being carried on in cooperation with the Department

of Markets, Dr. V. S. Larsen of Madison in charge.

The farmers throughout the county are invited to see the samples taken and tested right in the barns and to watch the developments if they wish to do so.

Soil Improvement

Our fourth major project, Soil Improvement Work, was given about the same consideration as in the past two years. We made arrangements with Mr. H. G. Frost of Almond, Wisconsin, to borrow his one horse grain and fertilizer drill. With this machine we were able to put on the desired amount of material. This machine was used to explain fortilizer as lead to be able to give the same and was used to apply fertilizer on land to be used for corn, soy beans and small grain and the results on the average were very satisfactory.

In all we had 13 test plots, seven on small grains, one on soy beans and five on corn In addition to this we have one pasture plot put on by We were able to get the harvest yields Mr. J. E. Jorgenson of Neenah.

of nine out of the fourteen plots

Corn harvesting and the State Fair came about the same time. Had we known that the corn would mature so fast we could have made

arrangements to get the yield some way or other.

In studying over our results it is easy to figure most any crop can be increased from 30 to 50 per cent on theaverage by the use of a light application of commercial fertilizer. By a light application we mean 125 pounds on corn in the row and 250 pounds broadcast on grain.

Our conclusion is (1) that everything being equal the use of commercial fertilizer is a paying practice; (2) before using fertilizer to any extent it is advisable to study the soil needs; (3) we should not draw con-

clusions from results of one or even two fertilizer tests.

In addition to our field fertilizer tests we tested soil from 43 farms during the year. Furthermore we have been called out on farms a good many times to discuss soil management problems. We have done very little in the way of drainage work, it has been dry and furthermore I hav not encouraged the work.

We organized an orchard spray ring which operated very success-

fully. The results were outstanding in most cases.

We cooperated with the organizing and putting on the Home Tal-

ent Drama Contest staged in January.

We assisted a great many of our farmers in the distribution of the Seed Grain, which we believe was a help to the producer and the buyer. If we estimate that the farmers in the county received enough barley through this office to sow 1,000 acres and at an increase of 10 bushels per acre at 30c pe. bushel it would mean a net increase of \$300.00. It has been proven that Wisconsin No. 38 barley will outyield our common varieties from ten to fifteen bushels to the acre.

We took care of the Seed Loan in cooperation with the Seed Loan Committee. There were 56 applications for seed loan made in this office

and amounting to \$6,613.75

We distributed 306 bottles of inoculation for alfalfa, clover, peas

and soybeans.

The sheep growers were assisted in pooling about 16,000 pounds of wool. At the present time it looks as though it would mean an increase of about \$800.

4-H CLUB LEADERS REPORT

The following Report No. 32 was presented.

Oshkosh, Wis., Nov. 15, 1932

To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors

Winnebago County, Wisconsin.

Gentlemen: Pursuant to the terms of my contract, I am herewith rendering my runsuant to the terms of my contract, I am herewith rendering my annual report which consists merely of a brief summary of the outstanding events in 4-H and Women's club work of the year 1932 from March 1st to November 1st, the merits of which it is believed have not been questioned. It is hoped that your honorable body upon review of the same report will be cognizant of the fact that the County Board through its authorization of such activities has rendered possible a wonderful service to the rural residents of Winnebago County.

The 4-H Club work will be presented first since the Agricultural

The 4-H Club work will be presented first since the Agricultural Committee of the County Board of Supervisors planned that this project be carried from the beginning of my work in the county in March to the first of N

March to the first of November.

Organization.

The boys and girls 4-H Clubs were organized this year during the months of March, April, and May by personal visits to the rural schools, to the homes of former and prospective club members, and to former

leaders. I visited 70 schools in all and explained briefly the scope of

club work, 4-H standards, and the requirements of members.

By June first I had organized 36 clubs-470 boys and girls of Winnebago County had voluntarily pledged themselves to an organization whose object is to develop better farm and home practices and to build un rural communities. There are 5 more clubs and 8 more leaders this

year than last year
I attended the organization meetings but the boys and girls themselves chose their leaders, elected their officers, and decided upon their projects. I have attended 76 4-H Club meetings this season.

The following projects were carried this year: clothing, canning, baking, room improvement, foods, thrift Junior Leadership, calf, pig, sheep, rabbit, duck, turkey, handicraft, crops, potato, and garden.

Club members are encouraged to treat these projects as experiments and to try out suggestions given by leaders, parents, and the club literature so that their minds will be plastic to new developments in Agricultural and home life.

Training Local Leaders.

4-H Club work in this county has made it possible for 54 unpaid adult local leaders to give their time and efforts to a movement which is undoubtedly developing the leaders of the rural communities in the future, and incidentally this work is as beneficial to the adults as it is to the children.

Of these 54 leaders, 36 have never had any direct connection with 4-H. Club work before so they have required a great deal of coaching Six leader conferences were held in the early part of the summer in various centers to plan the season's program and to explain what was expected of each club. The rest of the season I worked with the leaders

individually.

Demonstration Teams.

A great deal of time was spent in training teams to make public demonstrations of some phase of the projects which were carried. This part of the work has been stressed more this year than ever before because I believe that demonstrations teach coordination of the mind and hands. While a team is baking a cake, fitting a garment, or sewing a seam as the case may be, they must be giving at the time a clear concise, and convincing explanation of the methods they are using.

Demonstrations give the boys and girls practice in appearing before an audience and teaches them to be able to explain clearly why the method they are using is the best. How many adults hav had the opportunity that these young folks are getting?

We have had 16 teams in the county this year making public demonstrations and of these 10 demonstrated at the county contest before 350 people. Other years there have never been more than 4

teams in the county.

The girls' team on "Dish Washing" was chosen to represent Winnebago County at the State Fair in Milwaukee. They were Rosemary Howlett and Martha Ross from the township of Algoma and their leader was Miss Elizabeth Small. They won third place in the "Foods" demonstration class.

"Round-Up"

Over 350 attended the all day county 4-H Club Picnic and Demonstration Contest at Winneconne August 12th. Professor Humphrey of the university gave a calf judging demonstration and both he and Mr. D. K. Allen spoke to the group.

All of the girls who had finished their dresses modelled in the dress revue and I explained to the mothers and friends the 4-H club standard

of dress which the girls are aiming to live up to.

At this meeting a 4-H Club Gate Sign, which was designed and constructed by a local leader, was accepted as the ttandard to be used throughout the county. The sign reads: "A 4-H Club Member Lives Here"—its purpose is evident. Later in the afternoon contests and sames were held only chiefly which can be put up at club meetings were games were held and shields which can be put up at club meetings were given as prizes.

Camp.

The clubs have had no difficulty in earning money this year because the older people have been such loyal supporters. Money was

earned to send representatives to camp or to the State Fair by bake sales, selling pop and ice cream, and putting on entertainments.

15 members attended the District 4-H Club Camp at Onaway Island Waupaca August 4-7. The purpose of the camp is to teach boys and girls 4-H Club standards, to inspire them to lift themselves toward these standards, and to train them for leadership.

I planned the menu for the camp and help teach the handicraft ects. In handicraft they learned how to make book ends, raffia projects.

baskets, bill folds, belts, etc.

The boys and girls returned with a broader outlook on club work and a higher and brighter spirit because of the new and inspiring friends they had met and their association with state and other county leaders.

I can see a decided influence on the clubs to which they returned and the clubs have grown and done better work because of this outside contact. The help I gave in encouraging these young folks to attend camp I feel has been time well spent.

Fairs.

One of the requirements of a 4-H Club member is that he exhibit his

project at a local, county or state fair.

15 of the club had local fairs which I attended and judged the girls' work. Parents and friends came to see the exhibits and the I have encouraged local fairs because I believe that this is the best time to explain just what is expected of the members. In judging, I always give reasons for my decisions and in many cases I have the girls judge the garments and cooking themselves so that they will get into the habit of comparing their work with others.

The clubs worked hard preparing for the county fair. The 4-H Club parade represented about 30 of the clubs with about 150 boys and girls taking part. The entries were floats, banners, decorated cars and

buggies, and livestock.

There were 9 club booths and they are classed as either display or educational The former is an array of the best garments or products made by a club, and the later aims to tell a story of methods used.

The general display booth in which individual entries were made was very much over-crowded with a decided increase over other years. The entries were as follows:

There was a total of 716 entries as compared with 534 of last year. Fourteen club members from the county attended the State Fair in rourteen cuto memoers from the county attended the State Fair in Milwaukee and stayed at the 4-H Club camp where four or five hundred other boys and girls were living. They slept in the dormitories and ate in the big dining room which seats 700 people and as they mingled with this group they had many new and happy experiences. Wonderful sportsmanship was shown during the whole week and the boys and girls returned with higher hopes and bigger and better plans for the coming year. That week was an experience which will never be forgotten.

forgotten.

The demonstration team and leader and one boy who was chosen from the county to play in the State Orchestra had their expenses paid. Another boy ushered on the grand stand and a girl acted as waitress to earn their board and room The remaining club members entered live-

The girl that represented the county in the style show was awarded 8th place competing with 60 others, in spite of the fact that her suit was made over from a garment that had been worn for six years.

4-H Club premiums for the year total \$1,806.

Achievement Program

The Achievement program on November 4th marked the climax of the year. The purpose of this program is to award pins to those who have completed one successful year of club work.

268 boys and girls received these pins making a 57 per cent com-

pletion as compared with 46 per cent of last year. This is a 11 per cent

increase.

Seven clubs were given 100 per cent certificates because all of the members received achievement pins. This is considered a high honor in club work and I am happy to say that the number of such clubs has greatly increased. Last year there was only one club with 100 per cent completion.

Six prizes were awarded for the best record books to encourage keep-

ing accounts.

The Achievement Program was worked around the theme "Keep the 4-H Fleet Sailing" and the stage was decorated to represent the deck of a ship. Professor K. L. Hatch, Director of Extension in the State and Miss Elizabeth Salter, assistant state 4-H Club leader were the speakers from the university. In spite of the very bad weather over 450 attended.

Plans for the Future

Many of the clubs are planning to continue the meetings through the winter, and it is the hope that the number of members dropping out from year to year will be greatly decreased. Children as well as adults loose interest in any type of organization that is not active for four or five months of the year as is clearly shown by the following figures:

The Agricultural Committee of the County Board of Supervisors realized this when they suggested that the club work be carried throughout the whole year. By making the winter meeting more interesting I think that the boys and girls will stay in club work until they are older when there is so much more for them in the way of contests and trips.

I am now giving the club's suggestions for Christmas gifts and handicraft helps in painting, metal work, making brushes and such

things that can be made very cheaply at home.

Plans are now under way for a leaders organization which, I believe will be a step forward in 4-H Club work of the county. An organization of this type should make it more interesting for the leaders and give them a chance to express their own views as well as making it notifies to have contexts to making depending and provided and the country. it possible to have contests in music, dramatics, and possibly sports.

Home Economics Work
The Agricultural Committee of the County Board of Supervisors planned that Home Economics work should be carried from November to March so I have not spent as much of my time with this phase of the work as I have with the 4-H Clubs. I do feel, however, that there is a direct connection between the two groups and that the two if properly handled will reenforce each other. In fact, I have found several 4-H Club leaders at my home-maker's meetings and a great deal of enthusiasm among the women to cooperate with the 4-H Club work in every way that they can.

During the first few months that I was in the county I called on a few of the leading women of the various communities and explained the work which I would start in the fall. It was very encouraging to have them respond so favorably to the work and so anxious to have it start.

Since the women worked hard to get a Home Demonstration Agent

I felt that the work should be started as soon as possible so I gave four open meetings, and in April and May Iwas busy with 4-H Club work so Miss Stillman and Miss Meloche from the university gave six open meetings. Part of these lessons had to do with dyeing and rennovating clothing and the other with planning the canning to meet the family needs.

In August and September I gave seven canning lessons in various parts of the county. Meat and non-acid vegetables were canned in both tin and glass using two kinds of pressure cookers and explanations were given for the more common method of canning in the wash boiler. I canned corn, carrots, beets, whole tomatoes for salads, chicken ground beef patties, rolled roasts and pot roasts. State and government bulletins were given out at each meeting. The meetings were well attended and I have several requests for more lessons on meat canning In all the canning work, the importance of canning the products grown on the farm so that the family will have plenty of nutritious food in the

winter is stressed.

In October I organized nine homemakers' groups which takes in 13 townships of the county. At the organization meetings I gave a soan townships of the county. At the organization meetings I gave a soap naking demonstration and encouraged the women to save every bit of the county demonstration and encouraged the women to save every bit of the simple cold process which was used. Many people have asked if the women of the county do not already know how to make soap and I have answered the question by saying that those who have done this before have more questions and get more out of the meeting than those who have never tried soap making. This is equally true of every other protect. project.

The second monthly meeting of the homemakers' clubs has come November. In the Home Demonstration work throughout the state a "live at home" program is being carried out and so we are teaching the women to make use of what they have. The Christmas suggestions which I have given out at these meetings can be made very cheaply and

yet are unusually attractive.

In the following meetings of the year I will give work on making over old garments, and especially in the work a Home Demonstration

Agent can help the women save large sums of money.

The Agricultural Committee has very wisely suggested that the homemakers cooperate in making up garments from the cotton material which the Red Cross is giving to the needy. I have put it up to the women and left it for them to decide and every group has willingly a reed to do the work. Some have even agreed to have all day meetings once a week besides the regular monthly meeting so that the cloth-

ing will be made up as soon as possible.

As an emergency program, I felt that a great deal of good will come of this work for it will give me the contact with a group of people who really need the help of the Home Demonstration Agent and who so many times are not reached. The plan is to bring the mothers who need the help into the meetings and teach them to sew and make over clothing so that they will be able to clothe their families more economically in the future. By teaching them the fundamentals of sewing me will be giving a far greater service than simply handing out garments already made up.

REPORT OF PROBATION OFFICER, 1932

The following Report, No. 38, was presented:
To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors, Winnebago County:
Gentlemen: Another year of depression has brought with it a vast
increase in relief in our juvenile work. While the number of cases of dependent children have increased, they have not increased as much as aid in other departments of public relief, as our cases are more re-

stricted by provisions of law.

Our juvenile work covers several classes of cases. While those of dependent children and their mothers cover the largest portion of the work, there are also cases of neglect, delinquency, investigations for foster boarding homes and the supervision of those licensed, cases of foster boarding homes and the supervision of those lucensed, cases of liegitimacy, the mentally defective, and investigations for Juvenile Courts in other counties whose cases call for investigation in our territory Many cases of reported neglect and delinquency brought to the attention of the probation officer never reach the Juvenile Court. Only when more strenuous measures than the work of the probation officer seems needed is a petition filed and the case brought to the court. In those cases brought to the Juvenile Court by other officials a thorough investigation of the child's family background, its mentality and all resources that might be used if the child were placed on probation can be of help to the court in making a decision. The county children's board and the probation officer may assist in the study of children's board and the probation officer may assist in the study of these cases.

Placing of children in the foster boarding home where they may feel themselves a part of the home circle and enjoy the home atmosphere and training instead of sending them to an institution is the method used more and more, where their own homes are broken or for some reason they must be removed from their homes. However, some cases are distinctly institutional cases and it is not only a detriment to the child but also to the community to leave the delinquent in

a home.

In the cases of all aid applicants, if they reside in the city of Oshkosh, to prevent duplication, we at once clear with the social service exchange to learn if any other agency is active on the case. In Neenah and Menasha we clear with the city poor departments and in the townships we try to get in touch with the town chairmen. They often give us valuable information. All of our cases, wherever they are

located in the county, are listed with our social service exchange.

From November 1, 1931 to November 1, 1932, we have had a total of families listed each month of from 190 to 210. It has been difficult to give adequate supervision of those active on our list and do all the detail work in making complete investigations of new applicants. The number of families receiving aid total 176. The number of children under sixteen veers of any honeithing from this old total 488. There are der sixteen years of age benefitting from this aid total 468. There are older children in these families in whom we must also have an interest and when possible work out plans for their time. This is externely difficult, more often impossible during the depression and consequently we have had to ask the city poor departments or private relief appraises to supplement which for these children cannot find work tellef agencies to supplement relief for these children cannot find work

and they cannot receive aid from the children's fund. Of course, they must remain in the home. It is a situation carrying with it great danger of delinquency. The aid cases have been distributed in the county as follows: The City of Oshkosh......114 The City of Neenah 19

Your probation officer has been on duty every day except how during the year.

Medical, surgical, dental and hospital care have been given both mothers and childrer when needed as is provided by law.

Medical service has been given 21 mothers; 34 children.

Surgical care, major and minor, given 3 mothers; 32 children.

X-Ray provided for 2 mothers; 1 child.

Glasses provided for 5 children.

Dental care for 13 mothers; 10 children.

A total of 121 cases have revealed this attention at an expense of

\$1.642.16. In every case special rates have been granted for the service given The children here given as receiving dental care are those who do not live in the city of Oshkosh. We are fortunate here in having the service of the free dental clinic for aid families and a large number of children are cared for there.

We are most grateful for the fine cooperation given by the different

social agencies, professions and individuals.

We have sometimes been criticized for the amount of aid granted our mothers. As you doubtless know the law requires that this aid be granted by budget. We are using a very minimum budget. It has been revised each year to meet the changed conditions. The number of chidren in a family does not determine the amount of aid the mother receives but the budget balanced with the family's income.

Let us remember that children who become undernourished because of inadequate food supply and who are improperly clothed and housed are going to become not only health problems in the future but cases for the court in problems of delinquency and their generation will be

one not only weak in body but in character.

Our problem is not only our children in our family circle but all children in all family circles and especially those in these handicapped dependent families. It makes us our brother's keeper in a very large

PROPOSITION OF R. C. LAUS, DISTRICT ATTORNEY-ELECT

The following communication was presented:

By a resolution passed by the Winnebago County Board at the adjourned November, 1931 session, the salary of the District Attorney was set at \$3,800 a year, and it further provided that the District Attorney should devote his full time to the office, and that the Building Committee should find suitable office space for the incoming District Attorney, at the court house.

The committee on Public Buildings, since the time of the passing of the resolution have been considering various rooms in the Court House

to be used for the office of the incoming District Attorney

As yet they have not decided definitely as to what changes should be made and in view of the considerable cost to the county, in the event changes must be made, we are asking the decision of the entire board' as to whether they desire to accept the proposition offered by R. C. Laus, the incoming District Attorney.

The committee met with Mr. Laus and understand his proposition

to be as follows:-

 That the incoming District Attorney be allowed to maintain his own office where it is at the present time, located in the City National Bank Building, Oshkosh, Wisconsin. The rent of the office and all the expenses, with the exception of the telephone, stationery, and other incidentals which would be required no matter where the office was located, to be paid by the incoming District Attorney

2. It would be understood definitely and absolutely that the incoming District Attorney would be present at all times, with the county stenographer, during the times the County Board is in session, for the purpose of giving legal advice to the members of the County Board and services of the stenographer for drawing resolutions and other writings.

3. That the District Attorney be allowed to continue his private practice and handle business which would not conflict with the duties

of the office of District Attorney.

In the event the above arrangement can be made, Mr. Laus has agreed that he will pay back into the treasury of Winnebago County the sum of eight hundred dollars (\$800.00) a year, during his ensuing

term of office.

If this committee is required to find office space for the district attorney in the court house we find that it will be necessary to make several changes in the offices in the court house. The members of the Road and Bridge Committee are now using the rooms which we had planned to use for the district attorney's office and it seems that it would be quite inconvenient if the Road and Bridge committee were to be denied the use of these rooms. If any change is made we believe it will be necessary to provide an office for the sheriff in the sheriffs residence, which will cost a considerable sum of money. It will be necessary also, to change the County Treasurer's office and provide for him in the office now occupied by the Sheriff and make the now Treasurer's office suitable for the Probation Officer.

It would also be necessary to purchase some furniture and furnish-

ings with which to equip the office of the District Attorney.

It is the opinion of this committee that if the County Board sees fit to accept the proposition as offered to it by the incoming District Attorney, Winnebago County will save the eight hundred dollars, (\$800.00) a year agreed to be paid in by Mr. Laus and will also save about five hundred dollars (\$500.00) which it will take to arrange the different offices and buy equipment for the new District Attorney's office. In other words, over a two year's period it will save Winnebago

County at least two thousand dollars, (\$2,000.00).

In view of the fact that is is the paramount desire of the County Board to save money and cut expenses wherever possible, we believe it advisable to submit the entire question to the county board. If the county board is desirous of accepting the proposition offered to them by Mr. Laus, it is the suggestion of the committee that the board instruct the District Attorney of Winnebago county to submit the proposition to the Attorney General of the State of Wisconsin, requesting his opinion as to all the legal problems involved.

REPORT OF DISTRICT ATTORNEY ON PROPOSITION OF R. C. LAUS

The following opinion was read:

To the Honorable County Board of Winnebago County:

Gentlemen:

There has been a communication handed me by the County Clerk with the request that I advise the Board in reference to the same. I am advised that this communication was prepared by the District Attorney Elect, R. Curtis Laus, with the request that it be submitted to the Board. It appears to be signed by R. E. Fahrbach, and not any committee of the Board.

Paragraph One of this report asks that the office of the District Attorney be maintained in the City National Bank Bldg., the District Attorney to pay the rent and all other expenses, excepting telephone, stationery and other incidentals. This, of course, is contingent upon the county modifying its resolution adopted at the March, 1932 session, and permitting the District Attorney to engage in private practice, as specified in Paragraph Three.

The proposition, reduced to plain, simple language, is that the incoming District Attorney, who was elected with a distinct understanding as to what his salary would be, and what the nature of his duties would be, now seeks to evade that plain situation created by the resolution adopted at the March. 1932, session, and seeks to substitute therefor a proposal of his own that would completely nullify the spirit of the former resolution, and in consideration of abandoning the position taken by the Board at the March, 1932 session, the new District Attorney pro-poses to pay his own office rent, in an office to be selected by him, and

to remit \$800.00 of his salary, provided he can engage in private practice.

It should be apparent, therefore, that the purpose of the in-coming District Attorney was to run for office, knowing what the emoluments thereof would be and the conditions attached to it, and then, after election seek to circumvent the will of the Board by some new proposal, the very nature of which indicates that he wants to capitalize the office of District Attorney by engaging in private practice, to the extent that he can afford to pay his own rent and remit \$800.00 of the proposed salary.

To bolster up this position, the District Attorney Elect, in a communication which he himself drew, seeks to make it appear that the County will be saving a great deal of money.

Being personally familiar with the whole situation, and the facilities available in the Court House, I am constrained to say that in practically all of the counties similar to Winnebago, the office of the Sheriff is located where it properly belongs, namely, in the County Jail, and Winnebago County has provided a suitable office for the Sheriff in the I have never been able to see any good reason why the jail house. Sheriff's office in the Court House should be maintained, as it is largely a place of congregation for people who have very little, if any, particular business to transact with the Sheriff. It would be very simple to put back, into the present Sheriff's office the partition which is now on hand, converting the same into a private office and a waiting room that would amply serve all of the needs of the District Attorney.

I have in my office a stenographer's desk, typewriter, and chairs for the waiting room, and there is now in the Court House suitable furniture for the District Attorney's private office, so that no expense would be involved in equipping the office. All of the library of the county is located in the Court House, so that no expenditure for books is neces-

The Sheriff's office could be moved to the County Jail, where, in my judgment, it properly belongs in any event, so that the communication of the District Attorney Elect, which states that it would require \$500.00 to arrange the different offices, is, in my judgment, made without any real basis in fact.

It is true that it might be advisable to provide additional office space for some of the other offices in the county, namely, the Treasurer and the Probation Officer, but they have efficiently served the county for many years in the quarters which they now occupy, and there is no

real substantial reason for present change.

Being thoroughly familiar with the duties of the office of District Attorney, I can say that if the office of District Attorney is to be efficiently maintained and served, it will require the undivided time of the District Attorney elect, and it the proposal which he submits were adopted, the next request to the County Board would be to provide him with assistants to perform his duties, because he would never be able to engage in private practice and perform the manifold duties of the office, as they have grown now to be, alone.

So much for the generalities involved in the proposal—As to the legal effect of the proposal, permit me to make this suggestion—The District Attorney Elect became a candidate for the office upon the distinct understanding with the voters of Winnebago County that if elected he would accept the office as a full-time job, with an office at the Court House, with a salary of \$3,800.00 per year, and any other person who may have desired to aspire to this office could have had nothing else in mind than this proposal. To now break that contract with the voters of Winnebago County, and to provide an entirely different scheme or plan of handling the office, would seem to me to be not only unlawful but highly improper to say the least. Every person who might aspire to the office of District Attorney had a right to know and understand, a reasonable time in advance of the September primary, just what the duties of the office of District Attorney were to be, and just what the

salary would be, and it might well be said that had the attorneys of Winnebago County known that they could engage in private practice, after election, there may have been any number of candidates for the office

If Mr. Laus sees fit to reduce his salary \$800.00 a year and remit that amount to the county he has the right to do so, but in my judgment the salary is now determined by action of the Board, and becomes a contract between the people of Winnebago County and the District Attorney Elect. If he was not satisfied with the conditions attached to the office he should not have aspired to the office, or he should have at least advised the voters, prior to the election of his determination to try to evade the mandate of the County Board, if possible, if elected.

I note that in the last paragraph of the communication Mr. Laus suggests that the District Attorney be instructed to submit this proposal to the Attorney General. I do not consider that the proposal contains

to the Attorney General. I do not consider that the proposal contains any legal propositions that require any such action. In my judgment it is largely a question of good faith with the voters of Winnebago County on the part of the District Attorney Elect, and certainly involves good faith with others who may have aspired to this position.

It is therefore my opinion that the action of the Board, taken at the adjourned March, 1932 session, stands, and that this Board has no right to now enter into a new arrangement with the District Attorney which will, in effect, be a complete violation of the contract entered into between the District Attorney Elect and the people of Winnebago County, when he ran for and was elected to this office. when he ran for, and was elected, to this office. OUTDOOR RELIEF INVESTIGATOR

The following Report No. 6 was presented.

To the Honorable County Board of Winnebago County: Gentlemen:

Because of the extreme interest which I have in seeing that the work of the county supervisor of Outdoor Relief functions as intended,

I desire to make certain observations:

1. Due to the depression it is possible, at the present time, in my judgment, to secure extraordinary talent for \$100.00 per month, as was evidenced by the applicants for this position.

2. All other things equal, I am heartily in favor of giving this work to some worthy person who is, due to the depression, now unemployed. However, this cannot be the major consideration. The person chosen as Supervisor of Outdoor Relief will have to function at once, and six months or a year's training to acquaint the new supervisor with the duties of the office is too expensive a proposal.

In the list of applicants for this position there are a large number of men, and a number of women who are of fine character and excelof men, and a number of women who are of fine character and excelent education and training, but there are a comparatively few who have any knowledge whatsoever of this work. I could recommend to the board thirty names of people who are honest, intelligent, of good character, and who would make an excellent Supervisor of Outdoor relief after a certain period of training had been indulged in, and while I could heartily recommend to the board a number of those names submitted by the committee, I feel, upon reflection, that it would have been much better for the board to have had presented to it the recommendation of the committee of a single name, as I can visualize how difficult it would be for the entire county board to canvass the qualifications of a large number and arrive at a fair and accurate selection. I supposed this was to be the work of the committee, and what the county board wanted the committee to do.

I therefore suggest that the examination of the various applicants as taken in writing, be submitted to the board, and that if possible some person be selected who has the training and capacity to step into this position and immediately start to function.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF OUT-DOOR RELIEF

The following, Report No. 2, was presented:

To the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wiscon-

sin. — March 6, 1933.

Gentlemen: On January 5th at a meeting of the Committee on Poor of the Winnebago County Board, it was decided that I begin work by investigating all those cases which were reported to be county charges. The Soldiers and Sailors Relief Commission, having received so many applications for aid from those who had not previously received it, and being anxious to relieve them and desiring their investigaton, requested that I begin work on these cases. I found, however, that this took so much time, that there was no time left for investigation of our county charges, so I was forced to discontinue this part of the work. A hearing of applications for old age assistance was scheduled for about that time and I also investigated some of these cases.

From Jan. 5 to March 4, 1933, the following number of cases were investigated and reports made on the same:

Number Old Age Assistance Number Direct County Charges.....

At the last meeting of the County Board in January, no appropriation for office supplies, printing, etc., was made. In order to properly carry out the work as outlined in the resolution, a considerable supply of this nature is needed. Apparently no one had authority to make any purchase for this office. However, in order to properly make reports on investigations and keep records, it was necessary to have a type-writer for the reason that my time was entirely taken up during the day in making calls, and it was necessary for me to do all work of this kind in the evening at home. With the assistance of the County Clerk. I rented a typewriter with the understanding that if the County Board so decided at the March session, it could be purchased for the sum of Twenty-five Dollars, rental to apply on the purchased for the sum of Twenty-five Dollars, rental to apply on the purchase price.

At a second meeting of the Committee on Poor on Feb. 13, they decided that this office take direct charge of all county indigents and issue orders for their care and maintenance. Accordingly some of the

necessary printed matter which would enable us to carry out this plan was secured. This phase of the work became active Feb. 20th with issuing of orders for provisions and general care. To date 95 indigent families have been taken over from municipalities as direct county charges. Orders in the city are issued for a period of two weeks, and those in the county, for a month. Owing to the fact that this plan has just been started and the bills have not yet been sent in, it is impossible at this time to give any accurate financial report. The cost of caring for the 406 persons in these 95 indigent families, will be approximately \$2,000.00 per month. This does not include hospital bills, medical care, buriais, etc.

In accordance with the resolution regarding deportation of non-residents, four families have been given transportation and have left the county. Two of these were legal residents of other states, and the two other cases were such which no doubt would have required hospital care, one a prospective confinement case and the other an impending operation. A fifth family will leave here about March 8th.

Whenever it was possible to do so, I have tried to fill the needs of the people with Red Cross supplies. Nearly all these people have been getting flour furnished by the Red Cross through the different municipalities. The county has no such supply. However if it would be possible for the county to get some of this flour, a plan for its distribution by county trucks or municipalities might be arranged.

It was my intention when I began this work, to do my office work in the evening, for as I stated before, my time during the day was taken up in making calls and issuing orders. But I find that I have so many people calling at my home and so many phone calls, that it will be necessary for me to set aside certain days to do this work. Many of these calls have been occasioned by misunderstanding as to just what

my duties are and what is really meant by county charges. General Summary-
