COMPATIBILITY OF OFFICE OF SUPERVISOR AND ALDERMAN The question of compatibility of the offices of supervisor and alder-man was brought up and as there is some question of the legality of such offices in the City of Oshkosh, Alderman Albert Loscher and Wm. F. Mueller were not seated as supervisors of the Eighth and Third wards of the city of Oshkosh, respectively,

ELECTION OF CHAIRMAN

Motion that we proceed to the election of chairman, carried. Motion that as Geo. B. Young, is the only candidate for the office, that the clerk cast the unanimous vote of the board for Geo. B. Young as chair-man, carried. The vote was so cast and Geo. B. Young was declared elected elected.

Chairman Young, voiced his appreciation of the honor conferred upon him, and asked for the same cooperation during the coming year as that which had been given during the past meetings.

ELECTION OF VICE CHAIRMAN

Chairman Young appointed supervisors Spore and Pope to act as tellers. Informal ballot resulted as follows: Shea 33; Sonnenberg, 7; and Schwarzbauer, 1, totai 41. Formal ballot resulted: Shea, 30; Sonnenberg 10; and Schwarzbauer 1. Totai 41. J. F. Shea having received the majority of votes cast was declared elected as vice chairman of the board.

Motion that the rules of the last supervisor year be adopted for the ensuing supervisor year, carried

RULES OF BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF

WINNEBAGO COUNTY Adopted April 24, 1933.

I. The meetings of this board shall be held in the supervisors' room, and the hour for daily meetings shall be 10 a. m., and the county board shall continue in continuous session from day to day until adjourned. unless to a day certain or sine die.

If At the first meeting of the board, it shall be the duty of the chairman, or in case of his absence, the vice chairman, or in their absence the clerk to call to order.

The clerk shall then call the roll of members.

A quorum being present the board shall proceed to the election of a charman and vice chairman.

III. It shall be the duty of the chairman to appoint the following standing committees, each to consist of the number of members as set alter the name of each committee viz:

Equalization, nine; finance eight; general accounts, seven; illegal assessments, five; justice and constables' accounts, seven; sheriff's and coroner's accounts, seven; insane three; poor and county home, three; corporations, three; public buildings, five; per diem and mileage, five; printing, three; bonds and salaries, five; county abstract and tract index system, three; rules, three; education, three; sanatorium, five; budget, four (county clerk, ex-officio); county fair, five; aviation, five; old age assistance, three.

IV. A county highway committee consisting of five members to represent cities, town and villages, and all other elective committees and elective officers, are to be elected annually at the November session of the board.

V. The board may adjourn for such time as shall be necessary for the chairman to prepare the list of committees, and no business can be done until the same shall be announced.

VI. The chairman, or in his absence, the vice chairman, shall take the chair at the nour to which the board may from time to time stand adjourned, call the board to order and direct the calling of the roll of members by the cierk. In the absence of both the chairman and the vice chairman, a chairman pro tem shall be elected.

VII. Upon the appearance of a quorum, the journal of the preceding day shall be read by the clerk, and any mistake therein shall be corrected by the board provided, that upon the last day of the session the journal for that day will be read and, before the final adjournment, corrected.

VIII. After the reading and correction of the journal, the order of business shall be as follows:

- 1. Reception of petitions, memorials, accounts, etc.
- 2. Presentation of resolutions and disposition of same.
- 3. Reports of standing committees.
- Reports of select committees.

5. Consideration of miscellaneous business.

IX. Every subject matter that shall come before the board shall be reterred to the appropriate committee by the chairman, without motion.

X The chairman shall preserve order and decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the board and shall clearly and distinctly state every motion or question before debate.

21. The chairman shall be entitled to vote on all questions taken by ayes and nays, and his name shall be called last; when the vote on all question is a tie, it shall be deemed to have been lost, but any member may present the same question again at such time as provided in Section XXIII.

Every motion or amendment shall be reduced to writing when XII. a request therefor shall be made by any member; and all petitions, memorials and substitutes shall be reduced to writing and read before they shall be considered by the board.

XIII. Every written resolution shall have attached thereto the name of the person introducing it; and when referred to a committee the names of such committees shall be endorsed thereon

XIV. Every member previous to speaking, shall rise and address the chair.

XV. When two or more members rise at once, the chair shall designate the member who is to speak first, but in all cases the member who shall first rise and address the chair shall speak first.

XVI. No member shall speak more than twice upon the same question without leave; and when called to order by the chairman shall take his seat, and shall not be allowed to proceed without leave of the board.

XVII. A vote on any question shall be taken by ayes and nays when called for by any member; and SHALL be so taken on all questions involving the expenditure of money; and whenever a vote is so ordered and taken, the members voting in the affirmative and negative, as well as those absent or not voting shall be recorded at length in the records of the proceedings of the county board.

No account or claim against the county shall be audited un-XVIII. less it be made out in items and duly verified and be filed with the clerk of the board, except as otherwise provided by law.

XIX. When a motion is under consideration, no motion shall be entertained except. 1. To adjourn

 $\overline{2}$ To lay on the table.

3. For the previous question.

4. To postpone to a day certain.

To commit to a committee. 5.

To amend or to substitute. 6.

7. To postpone indefinitely.

These several motions shall take precedence in the order in which they stand in this rule.

XX. A motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, and for the previous

question shall be decided without debate, except as hereinafter provided. XXI. A motion to postpone indefinitely or to a day certain or to commit shall not again be entertained on the same day or in the same

stage of the proposition. XXII. A substitute shall be open to amendment the same as the original proposition; but when adopted, shall not be subject to amend-ment. If an amendment or substitute is lost, another substantially the same shall not be entertained.

XXIII. When a motion or question has once been determined, any member voting with the majority may move a reconsideration of the vote, but such motion shall be made and acted on at the same or next succeeding day, and shall not thereafter be made except by unanimous consent

XXIV. The previous question may be moved by any member, and the chairman shall then say: "It requiring five members to second this motion, those in favor of sustaining the motion will rise." If five or more members then rise, the previous question shall thereby be seconded and an opportunity then be given to any two members opposed thereto to briefly state their objections. The question shall then be: "Shall the question be now put" which, if carried by a vote of two-thirds of the members present upon a call of the ayes and nays, the board shall immediately proceed to vote upon the pending amendment if any, and upon the main question.

XXV. In filling blanks, the largest sum and the longest time shall be put first.

XXVI. These rules shall not be changed, amended or repealed, unless the proposition or amendment is introduced in writing and the same laid over to some subsequent meeting of the board, not less than five days intervening, and then only with the concurrence of two thirds of the members present.

Any of these rules may be suspended upon any pending XXVII. measure by two-thirds of the members present.

XXVIII. These rules and all amendments or additions thereto which may hereafter be made shall govern the board until altered or repealed, as herein provided.

XXIX. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in "Roberts' Rules of Order," so far as they remain in common use and are practic-able and applicable and not inconsistent herewith, shall govern the board.

Whenever the board shall have gone into a committee of the XXX. whole and shall have arisen, the board shall at once be in session for the receiving and acting upon the report of the committee of the whole, and for the transaction of any and all other business of every kind.

XXXI. No resolution for the appropriation of money shall be in order until the day after its presentation and reference, except upon the consent of two-thirds of the members of the county board present.

XXXII. All reports, resolutions and petitions must be presented in typewritten form in triplicate so that one copy will be immediately available to the local press, and the same to be read by the clerk of the board.

XXXIII. All resolutions calling for an appropriation of money, and all resolutions, the adoption of which will require an ultimate expenditure of money or an appropriation by the county board, shall be pre-sented to the county clerk of Winnebago county ex-officio member of the budget committee, at least 10 (10) days prior to the opening day of the annual November session of the county board, and no bill or resolution calling for an appropriation of money shall be received by the board without the unanimous consent of the board after that time.

On motion adjourned to 1:30 o'clock, to give the chairman and vice chairman time to appoint the committees of the board.

COMMITTEE TO APPROVE APPLICATION OF INDIGENT POOR FOR MEDICAL OR DENTAL CARE

The following Resolution No. 3 was presented:

Whereas, it has come to the attention of the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago county that in the giving of medical and dental care for the indigent poor charges of Winnebago County that the prices charged by the various physicians, surgeons and dentists vary to some degree, and Whereas, it is the desire of the said county board of supervisors that all professional men performing services for indigent poor in Winnebago county, as covered by this resolution, shall be paid a reasonable fee and all should be treated allke. Now Therefore.

and all should be treated alike. Now Therefore, Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago county that when any indigent county at large charge shall be in need of a physician or dentist, any person may make application to the County Supervisor of the Poor for care to be given to said indigent person. After being properly investigated and deemed that said person is in need of medical and dental care the said superintendent of poor shall by an order direct said patient to some doctor or dentist within a reasonable distance of the home of said patient.

All bills incurred for dental and medical care shall be properly item-All puts incurred for denial and medical care shall be properly item-ized and submitted to the supervisor of the poor, to be audited by the committee composed of three members of the county board and two members of the County Medical Society and one member of the County Dental Society, it being the purpose of this committee to pass on the casonableness of said bills, prior to the time they are submitted to the County Board for final allowance.

I wish to call your attention to the condition of the electrical wiring at the county jail. There appears to be some defect in the wiring, due at the county jail. There appears to be some defect in the wiring, due to the fact that the light bulbs are constantly blowing out and need continual replacement. As purchasing agent, I have cooperated with the chairman of the building committee to try to ascertain the cause of this. We have found that it is not due to the quality of the bulbs, for we have experimented with both the cheaper and the better qualities, nor does the voltage seem to be the cause. Mr. Weisheipl had the Wis-consin Public Service corporation test out the voltage and the voltmeter recorded a constant voltage, varying but a few degrees. We have had the City of Oshkosh electrical inspector who approved the wiring at the time of its installation less than two years aco. check up on this conthe time of its installation less than two years ago, check up on this con-dition, but he is unable to ascertain the cause. Mr. Weisheipl has had one of the electrical contractors checking up to see which circuit was causing the trouble, but with no results. We find that a majority of the bulbs are blown out at the end of two months of service. As this is an elements of the service of the service of the service of the bulbs expensive replacement, and shows that something is wrong. I believe it should be brought to the attention of the board, for I do not wish to continue the purchase of light bulbs for a detective wiring system.

The following Resolution No. 2 was presented. A RESOLUTION

Whereas, it is generally agreed that Winnebago County needs a new Courthouse, and

Whereas, because of favorable prices for both materials and labor it appears that the present would be the most practical time to build said Courthouse, and

Whereas, the present Courthouse site is owned by Winnebago County, and is in all practical respects suitable to the building of a new Courthouse, and has from time to time received the endorsement of the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors and the approval of the citizens of Oshkosh and Winnebago county whenever such Board and citizens have had an opportunity to give expression to their opinions, and

Whereas, Winnebago County has in its special building fund the sum of approximately one hundred eighty thousand dollars (\$180.000) which has been specially intended for the purpose of being applied towards the cost of erection of a new Courthouse building for Winnebago County, and

Whereas, the aforesaid special building fund of approximately one hundred eighty thousand collars (\$180,000), if held out of use can not contribute in any way towards the amelioration or easement of the present serious emergency that exists within Winnebago County because of the unemployment situation, and

Whereas, it has been generally recognized by most Government authorities, including the Congress and Government of the United States. that a Public Works Program designed to create employment for those who are now unemployed, is a desirable method of coping with and ameliorating the depression that our people have suffered from for several years past, and

Whereas, because of its present favorable financial condition Winnebago County should experience no difficulty in financing the building

of a new Courthouse, now therefore, be it Resolved, by the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, that Winnebago County build a new Courthouse upon the present Supervisors Winnebago County Courthouse, to the North of the present Courthouse building, at a cost not to exceed three hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$350,000). Be it further

Resolved, that the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) be transferred from the fund known as the special building fund, to a fund to be designated as the Pieliminary Courthouse Expense Fund, and that said Preliminary Courthous. Expense Fund be placed at the disposal of the Committee on Puplic Buildings for the purposes hereinafter designated; and be it further

Resolved, that the Committee on Public Buildings be and they are hereby instructed to at once proceed to secure from responsible sources, plans and specification. for the erection of a new Courthouse on the site hereinbefore specified in this resolution and at a cost of not in excess of the amount stipulated in this resolution as the cost of the proposed new Courthouse; and that the Committee on Public Buildings be, and it is hereby empowered to defray out of the thousand dollar fund herein designated as the Preliminary Courthouse Expense Fund, up to the limit of such fund, any expense necessary for the procurement of the plans and specifications for the atoresaid new Courthouse.

Be it further resolved, that it being the sense of the Board of Super-visors of Winnebago County that any building program undertaken by

Winnebago County at this time, is done almost solely with a view of alleviating the present serious unemployment situation within Winne-

alleviating the present serious mempioyment subation within winne-bago County, and as a means to that end, be it Resolved, that the Committee on Public Buildings, or any committee acting on behalf of the Winnebago County Board in the matter of the construction of a new Courthouse for Winnebago County, shall require all plans and specifications that are submitted to such committee for its are to be had within Winnebago County, and that all labor, skilled and unskilled, and of whatever description entering into the construction of such proposed new Winnebage County Courthouse, be obtained from among the real estate tax paying, and of not less than one year's resi-dence within Winnebago County, residents of Winnebago County. REPORT OF PROBATION OFFICER 1933

The following Report No. 8 was presented: To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors, Winnebago County:

Gentlemen: The report of your probation officer for the past year, covering the period from Nov. 1, 1932 to Nov. 1, 1933, will be made as brief as possible while bringing to you the chief outstanding facts.

The juvenile work covers cases of dependent, neglected and delinquent children, investigation of foster boarding home applicants, supervision of foster boarding homes, cases of illegitimacy and cases of the mentally defective. Also local investigations for juvenile courts in other cities, which are not frequent but take considerable time when called for.

The report upon the foster boarding homes will be given you by the county children's board so I will only briefly touch upon this. Our program for boarding children instead of institutionalizing them should be enlarged. Home life, whenever possible, is better for the child and cheaper for the taxpayer.

The investigation and supervision of cases of dependent children covers the greatest portion of the probation officer's work. This is often called an expensive form of aid but if this aid were compared with the expense if these children were institutionalized, which would be necessary if they were not cared for in their homes, we would find it much less and a smaller burden upon the taxpayer when they are kept in the home by means of the children's aid. Even when not considered from the financial point of view, doubtless, you will all agree that home atmosphere and the keeping of brothers and sisters together in the family circle is preferable.

From Nov. 1, 1932 to Nov. 1, 1933 we have had a total of families From Nov. 1, 1932 to Nov. 1, 1933 we have had a total of families re-main on the list from month to month it brings the total of all cases for the year to 346. We are glad to be able to report that, even in this time of depression when work is very scarce, a few have become independent. Many more would have become independent if the older members of the families could have secured work. Several of our aid families have been turned over to the city relief departments. Children's aid can be granted only for those below 16 years of age. Wherever the number of children of 16 years and above do not have work to supplement the aid and a larger allowance is needed because they are in the home the family has been placed with the city relief agencies. This has also been done in cares where there is but one child and the entire needs of a home must be provided.

May your attention be drawn to the fact that the term "mother's pension" should be dropped. Your help is needed on this matter which is more important than it seems. Mothers and others often think this aid is a pension and belongs to them whether their financial condition calls for it or not. We need also to remember that the amount a mother is granted by the court does not depend upon the number of children under 16 years but upon the family income. In other words it is granted by budget and the budget is balanced with the income.

The government reforestation work has been a great help in several of our families. Two families, through the work it has furnished, have become independent.

From Nov. 1, 1932 to Nov. 1, 1933 there have been a total of 172 active aid cases including 397 children. These children will cost Winnebago County, including all medical, surgical and hospital care given, about \$45,000 for the entire year. Please bear in mind, that if the homes had been broken up because of the death of the father and the mother's inability to care for the children without help, and the children had been sent to our state institution at Sparta it would have cost our county \$82.576, and an equal amount from the state, or a total of \$165,152. We are sometimes troubled over the amount we are spending in this relief but from these figures you will see it is really a more economical form than relief through the institution.

The aid cases are supposed to be reinvestigated and have their hearings before the judge once a year. For the past year cases have been reheard frequently for changes in the allowance to keep the demand upon our fund as low as possible. Fuel allowances have been taken out of the budgets for the summer months and whenever a change of income has taken place the mother has been brought in for a reduction. This with the monthly reports that must be checked each month with the re-

ceipts for the expenditures and the consultations with the mothers in advising how their money should be spent takes a great deal of time. The coming year prices probably will be much higher and the low budget of the past year will not meet the family needs. Allowances will necessarily be increased accordingly. During part of the period of illness of the probation officer a trained field worker has been employed and paid by probation officer from her salarv

Hospital, medical, surgical and dental work has been provided for our mothers, incapacitated fathers and their children. Glasses have also been purchased when needed. Special rates have been secured from the physicians, surgeons and hospitals and very fine cooperation has been received.

Hospital care has been given eight mothers and 10 children; surgical care has been given five mothers, 13 children; X-ray care has been given one mother, two children; medical care has been given 50 mothers, 92 children, dental care has been given 11 mothers, 13 children; dental care has been given Oshkosh children at the school dental clinic; medical care has been given seven incapacitated fathers; glasses have been furnished one mother, eight children.

The amount spent for such care totaled \$1,802.80. One child had a bad case of deformity of her teeth. This corrective work extends over a period of three or four years and is very expensive. If the work is not done the child's health is impaired, also the appearance which would prevent occupying a position in future life that might be filled if cared for. A specialist kindly offered to do this work covering a period four years for the cost of the materials giving his service and private organizations and the county children's board are assisting in the expense of materials used.

ANNUAL REPORT OF COUNTY PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE'S Work From Nov. 1st, 1932 to Nov. 1st, 1933

Gentlemen:

The scope of work outlined by the County Nurse's law is so large and varied that it is almost impossible to give an accurate report of this office, especially since the depression. It has brought new problems meeting up with the difficulties of finding a solution. In planning our program our aim has been to reach the largest number of persons possible in the limited amount of work which can be done by one worker.

gram our aim has been to reach the largest humber of persons possible at the limited amount of work which can be done by one worker. Our records show this year that more time has been spent in making home visits than in any other phase of the work. There is an increase of 43 visits made to maternity cases, of 72 visits to infants, 202 visits to cases of suspected communicable diseases due to the measle epidemic and 44 to social service cases Many families report illness asking the nurse to call and when the visit is made they wish to make application for aid. Teachers report to our offlice children who might be in need of aid and an investigation is made. Cooperation has been given to the Red Cross in assisting them to give clothing to needy people. It is not the policy of a Public Health Nurse's offlice to do social service work but the times require someone to investigate homes when problems arise and we are glad to do "our part." Many supervisors have called on us for this service.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE COUNTY SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS, WINNEBAGO COUNTY, 1932-1933

To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County. State of Wisconsin:

Gentlemen: To comply with that part of the Statutes of the State of Wisconsin as set forth by Section 39.07, enumerating the duties of the County Superintendent of Schools and more specifically, subsection (E) which states. "Reports to the County Board: He shall annually report to the County Board the condition of the schools under his supervision." I hereby submit this report for the year ending June 30, 1933. The sta-tistical part of this report is based on the annual report to the State Superintendent of Public Instruction and embodies the work of the past school year carried on under the superintendency of my predecessor, Mrs. Anna Ryss Ostrem, during which time I served as Supervising Teacher.

The previous tabulations have contained statistical data concerning our school system. These, together with the following summary of activities engaged in by the patrons, school boards, teachers, and pupils in cooperation with this office may serve in a measure to show the scope of the school endeavor of this county. However, no report can reflect that spirit of cooperation and desire for improvement and progress which is the inspiration of those of us privileged to work constantly with teachers and pupils.

Physical Conditions and Equipment

The modern school building in the Pingry District, No. 5 Jk. Town of Winneconne, represents the only new building erected during the year 1932-33. However, improvements in enlarging rooms to accommodate increased enrollments have been made, electric lights have been installed fences around grounds of schools located on hazardous highways have been built improved heating and ventilating systems have been installed, correct seating arrangements made, free textbooks adopted in additional districts, etc.

It is gratifying to be able to state that most of our schools are santary and comfortable and that an effort is being made in most districts to make the school home an ideal place for boys and girls to develop through study. However, we do have schools which are striking exceptions to this general rule and it has been and shall continue to be our constant effort to raise the standards of these schools to a higher level. Most school boards respond carefully but splendidly to our request which are as conservative as we can make them without sarrificing efficiency and the welfare of the children whose education must be carried on even in times such as these. We do take into consideration the economic situation, but we are not willing to let that become an actual handicap to school progress. Nor are school districts in most cases wiling to let their boys and girls make the sacrifice, for this year has marked as many improvements in physical features of cur schools as previous years. Quite frequently we find a school whose greatest handicap is in not having equipment in the form of reference books, maps, construction material, seatwork, etc. These are inexpensive as compared with other items of expense but school boards do not always realize the great need for them and feel that expenses are being curtailed by not making such purchases.

Our State Superintendent, Mr. John Callahan, in a letter to school officials entitled "Will the Schools Do Their Part?" in support of the N. R. A. says in part: "The depression has cut down severely, often stopped entirely, school buying... Some districts, I know, are not in a position to buy the needed books and supplies. For no group is it more important that the N. R. A shall be a success than it is for the young people now in the schools. In the years ahead, they will be called upon to pay the debts we are making now. While conditions now do not offer much, if any, opportunity for school boards to restore departments, to increase pay or shorten hours, they should wherever possible, join the manufacturers, the merchants and all other classes in that necessary part of the Recovery Drive: The buying campaign. Wherever possible the schools should do their part."

The Testing Program

The testing program of the county consists of the Standard Tests for all grades and the final examinations for seventh and eighth grades.

The Standard Tests are given to all grades at the close of the twelfth week of school in some one or two subjects to determine by comparison with thousands of other children the actual progress made by the pupils. This eliminates the determination of progress in such subjects being based wholly on the judgment of the one teacher in the school and gives that teacher an insight nto the needs of her pupils. A standard achievement test is given to the sixth grade in the spring to determine their ability for promotion. If a pupil is found to be weak in his work and the repetition of a grade is deemed advisable, the foundation work should be strengthened before the pupil is promoted to the seventh grade This plan has proven its success by reducing the number of eighth grade failures to a marked degree.

The final examinations for seventh grade in two subjects and for eighth grade in all subjects required for a diploma from the state graded and rural schools are required by law to be given by the office of the county superintendent. Graduates for the year 1932-33 numbered 222 from the rural schools and 34 in the state graded.

A County Commencement for these 256 Eighth Grade Graduates was held at the Strand Theater on Wednesday, June 7, 1933, with Dr. Silas Evans of Ripon College as Commencement speaker.

Achievement, Health and Play Day

A very successful All County Day was held in the Recreational Building, Oshkosh. Saturday P. M., May 20, 1933, when the Winnebago County Teachers' Association again sponsored a program based on the extra-curricular activities regularly carried out in the schools of the county. Achievement awards were presented to the winners of contests held in the forenoon in spelling, arithmetic, and general achievement. Each town either alone or in conjunction with other towns cooperated in the affair by giving a number on the program. Farents and teachers displayed a splendid spirit in making this day enjoyable for the school children.

The Supervising Teacher

The training of teachers in service is everywhere recognized as being of major importance. It is being more and more admitted that the help given by supervision in the school room is the most valuable help the teacher can receive. With this in mind and with a background of supervisory experience giving me intimate knowledge of the problems involved in the field. I made the appointment of Miss Addell Mc-Kenney as Supervising Teacher for Winnebago County schools.

The selection of Miss McKenney for this position was based on her qualifications in training, her varied teaching experience and her decided success as Supervising Teacher in Waukesha County for a period if eight years as testified to by the schools of Waukesha County, and by members of the State Department of Public Instruction who had observed her work over a period of years. Miss McKenney began her

work in the county on Aug. 15, 1933 and after her three months on duty in the office and in our schools, I feel assured that there will continue to be constant improvement in the quality of work done by our teachers and pupils. The supervisory objectives are accomplished through:

1. Class room visitation.

For the year 1932-33 the 111 teachers in the rural, state graded and village grades of the county received 351 visits from me as supervising teacher and 285 visits and calls by Mrs. Anna Ryss Ostrem, as County Superintendent. Up to date this year every school has been visited once and some twice by either Miss Mc-Kenney, the Supervising Teacher, or me. 2. Outlines and helps sent out from the office.

3. Institutes and Group Meetings.

An institute was held before school opened to set forth in part the aims and plans of this office for the year's work and to give out such materials, outlines, and plans which are made available through the office. Thirteen group meetings were held during the year with an approximate attendance of 350 teachers. Professional reading and improvement in instruction were topics of discussion.

The law governing Supervising Teachers was changed by the last legislature in the following manner:

Section 39.14 (7)

"STATE REIMBURSE COUNTY. On receipt of such report, and it appearing from an actual inspection by direction of the State Superintendent that the work of such Supervising Teacher has been efficient, and that she has devoted her time exclusively to the duties of the position, the State Superintendent shall certify in favor of the county which employed her, the amount of the salary paid, but not to exceed an amount to which such teacher shall be entitled under a salary schedule for Supervising Teachers to be adopted and promulgated by the State Superintendent of Public Instruction which shall provide for a salary range of from eleven hundred to fifteen hundred dollars per year, varying with length of service and professional training. The county shall also be entitled to reimbursement for the . . . actual and necessary expenses paid to her in the year preceding, and file it with the secretary of state, whereupon he shall draw his warrant for the amount of the certificate and in favor of the proper County Treasurer.

4-H CLUB LEADER'S REPORT

The following Report No. 19 was presented.

Oshkosh, Wisconsin, November 13, 1933.

To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors, Winnebago county, Wis .: Gentlemen:

Pursuant to the terms of my contract, I am presenting the annual re-port of my work during the past year with 4-H clubs and Home Demon-stration clubs. It is your Honorable body that has intelligently seen the value of such work and thus made it available to the rural residents of Winnebago county

The growth of 4-H club work as shown in this report expresses, I believe, the gradual increase of interest in this project and in behalf of those who have given much of their time and efforts to the 4-H program, I thank the Honorable County Board of Supervisors for making this worthy organization available to the youth of Winnebago county. The city with its dazzling lights no longer holds a fascination for

The city with its dazzing rights no longer house a fascination for the boys and girls from the country, for the many opportunities there have become decidedly limited in the last few years. The present influx is "back to the farm" and now it is the duty of our educational systems to prepare these young folks to the best advantage for their careers. How many of your children or the children of your neighborhood find their life work on the farm? A surprisingly high percentage will become the second the former and homenables in your

remain in the country and become the farmers and homemakers in your place in a few years.

Because these young people do not know their own needs too few of them are preparing themselves for their life work. There would be a far mole satisfied group of farm people if these boys and girls were taught to clothe and feed a family cheaply, and yet keep them healthy and happy, and to produce farm products in an efficient manner. Too often the darry ration is given more consideration than the family menu or the scnool lunch.

There is a comparatively new organization in the United States and in 17 foreign countries which already has an enrollment of nearly 1,-000,000 boys and girls in this country alone.

It is not based on spectacular, new fangled ideas, but on good oldlashioned principles which have been in existence for many years-the

child and his parents in relation to the home, community and country. These old-fashioned ideas were formulated at the beginning of this century into the 4-H club organization, and it has had the advantage of combining the good points of Boy and Girl Scouts, Girl Reserves, Camp-

fire Girls and other youth organizations. 4-H Club Work deals with the natural life of the rural boy and girl. It is a system of education that places the responsibility of learn-ing on the boys and girls themselves. They learn by the "doing" process and this is not easily forgotten.

The county is made up of local clubs of 5, 10 or 15 young people of common purpose and goal who would naturally work or play together.

Each member must select and complete a project which is centered around living, growing plants and animals or concerned with the active processes of home making, farm accounting and other matters directly related to the daily life of the farm and farm home.

To quote one writer: "We are all a part of what we meet, do, say and hear. The experiences that our farm boys and girls are having are fast becoming the fabric of their lives." In other words, they grow like the people and things with which they associate.

Remembering this, we would expect to find garments carelessly made by a girl who was trained in an untidy, dirty, poorly cared for home and likewise expect to find lousy ideas in a boy's head when we find lice on his pigs According to one boys' and girls' worker: "More boys have become runty men because their dads gave them runty pigs than for any other reason."

So it is not enough to have something to work at--it must be something worth while. The 4-H project must offer a challenge so that the child will grow with his work.

The study of books is incidental and supplemental to the actual planting, growing, harvesting, and marketing of a crop, the canning of fruits and vegetables raised on the farm for the winter months, cutting,

fitting and making of a garment, or the use of dairy products in the diet. To quote one of our 4-H girls from the Clairville Club, "I have begun to feel that I am capable of assuming a large amount of responsibility in the work at home I feel as though I am helping to earn the family

In the work at home I leer as though I and heiping to earn the family bread. I am vitally interested in what goes on at our farm." The 4-H work tends to adjust farm boys and girls to the rural mode of living and thus make them better citizens. One 4-H club boy from the northern part of the county writes: "4-H club work has helped me and my community as a whole by making our neighborhood a more sociable and a better place to live, as well as more cooperative."

We like to see each child make a profit in his project; however, there is no place in the 4-H program for those who see only the mone-We have far higher ideals for we try to build boys and tary side of it. girls who will do a piece of work to their best ability for the pride and satisfaction that they find in the finished article.

I have spoken only of the boy and girl but no less important are the leaders of the 4-H clubs. Men, like Rockefeller, Ford, and Carnegie, the leaders of the 4-h clubs. Men, like Hockefeller, Ford, and Garnege, have given large sums of money for hospitals, memorials, museums, churches and parks, but there are many who are equally as public spir-ited in our own community who are not financially situated to donate money. There are 49 unpaid local leaders in Winnebago County, who have given their time and efforts to building of boys and grils. This is entirely voluntary work which they are doing for the joy and satisfac-tion it holds for them, and at the same time they are becoming better citizens and doing a real service to their community.

citizens, and doing a real service to their community. In the spring of the year I organized ten 4-H clubs and reorgan-ized all of the old clrbs. By June 1st I had enrolled 444 boys and girls in 29 clubs in 15 different townships.

I had a leaders' meeting in March to make plans for the year's work and another meeting in June to organize the leaders as I felt they would work more effectively as an organized group.

In June four one-act plays were given in a county tournament and In some four one-act plays were given in a county tournament and the winning group was sent to the state meet in Madison. This is the first year that the 4-H clubs have entered the drama work, but judging from the number of inquiries that I have had concerning the work many more clubs will enter next year. I am sure that the merits of the drama work are clearly seen by all. The county "round-up" at Menominee Park in July was a fete which represented the work of the boys and girls themselves. Over 1200 people attended the all-day educational program.

1,200 people attended the all-day educational program.

Thirteen girls' demonstration teams and six boys' teams competed and the winners of each group went to the State Fair (A 4-H club demonstration is the presentation of a good farm or home practice by club members who have learned the process in their club project, and who can show and explain at the same time the method in detail.)

A demonstration is a difficult thing to give and yet it is one of the most valuable practices we have in 4-H club work for it teaches the boy and gift to orace better that the state of th boy and girl to appear before an audience and speak in a clear, concise Think of the many adults that regret that they and convincing manner.

did not have the opportunity of receiving this training. The program of music and other stunts on the afternoon program of the round up" were arranged and presented by the club members.

A refreshment stand to help defray expenses was taken care of by club leaders.

Professors Humphrey and Mosely and Mrs. Nellie Kedzie Jones of

the university all contributed to this educational program.

The girls' demonstration team which demonstrated on "Canning Tomatoes the 4-H Way" won third place in the State Contest at the State Fair, and the boys' team on "Setting the Table for the Laying Hen" won first place in the poultry group and third place against all agriculture teams.

The booth which was put up at the State Fair on canning received first place and the garden booth third place. Prizes won on pig projects at the State Fair by Winnebago County

4-H club boys were five first places and thirty-five other placings.

Because of the growing public interest in 4-H exhibits a large space and Home Economics projects. The members spent a great deal of time and effort in putting up the booths and yet it was well worth while.

Standards are built by comparison—the opportunity the fair offers helps greatly in improving the work done in the local clubs. One club girl writes in her report: "I can rate myself by comparing my accomgirl writes in her report: plishments with others.

An agricultural judging contest was held which 28 boys entered. They judged pigs, cows and poultry

Filteen girls entered the Home Economics judging contest in which sewing and baking was judged. The value of boys and girls judging cannot be overestimated.

Fifteen girls entered the dress revue contest in which the girls modeled the dresses they made.

Four teams demonstrated at the County Fair. In the open classes 4-H club boys won four Junior Champions and two grand champions, and 12 first places on their swine. 4-H club calves received eight first placings in the open class and the best aged bull exhibited from Winnebago County was a 4-H club calf.

The 4-H parade of livestock, club members and floats was one-third of a mile long.

Sixteen out of twenty-nine of the clubs held local fairs in their own communities. I judged at seven of these, as many as could be arranged, and found the parents unusually interested in hearing comments on the work. In most cases the parents must be convinced before we can expect the children to adopt club standards.

Demonstrations, judging, dress revues, talks and musical selections were common at these fairs.

The Achievement Program in the 4-H club work can be compared with graduation in High School. The 4-H members are awarded plns if

they complete their projects, exhibit and keep a record. About 500 people attended the program which consisted of inspira-tional talks, a club folk dance, club songs, initiation service, and read-ings by club members, 62% of the members or an increase of 5% over last year, completed and were awarded pins. Seven clubs were awarded 100% certificates

George B. Young, chairman of the county board, presented pins to the local 4-H club leaders. Prizes were awarded to the three best agricultural record books and the 3 best home economics books. The outstanding canning girl was presented with a 12 quart pressure cooker given by the National Pressure Cooker company.

We were fortunate this year to be able to send one of our club boys to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago.

Another boy from this county received Honorary Recognition from the State Department for his outstanding record book.

The 4-H clubs are planning to continue through the winter months engaging in music, dramatics, etc. I have organized the Hot School Lunch Project in 10 schools. This project is carried from November to April. In these times we can less afford to be ill than ever before.

Home Demonstration Groups

In the capacity of a part time Home Demonstration Agent a definite project on clothing has been carried with the County Home Demonstration Clubs.

It has been stated that agriculture is the backbone of the nation and in these terms the Home is the spinal cord. The mother is the

one who guides the activities of the entire family. The women of the county have been glad to receive help with their homemaking problems.

I believe an extremely worthwhile piece of work was handled by I believe an extremely workning piece of work was handled by these clubs when they made up Red Cross material for the needy. In the town of Oshkosh, members of the Home Demonstration club, gathered in the basement of the Nordheim school and helped the poor relief people to cut their garments. They brought patterns from their own homes and by cutting the clothing in this way we found that a great deal of materiai could be saved.

I gave one lesson to these clubs on "Making New Garments from Old." I handed out to the women patterns from mittens; children's dresses, toys, coats, snow suits, and tams; aprons, dresses; collar and cuff sets; and many others. This is a great saving to the homemaker. Ideas for inexpensive, home made Christmas suggestions, as well as demonstrations on sandwiches and salads were given at other meetings.

The last two meetings with the clubs in the spring were demonstrations on teaching the women to make patterns at home for any member of the family.

Fron, these figures is seen that the County Library is penetrating into all parts of the County and that the adults are making use of their spare time to read in order to keep abreast of the changes in modern life, and also to take advantage of excellent recreation. We also see from these figures that some communities are not yet fully awake to the resources at their command. Books on all subjects can be requested and in so far as the small budget permits we will see that the community gets the kind of books they are interested in and want to read Mrs. Anderson is on part-time dury only, and is kept busy getting the books ready and to the people. This fall the difficulty has been in having enough books to fill the school requests but collections are changed frequently which permits the books

The picture collection for the school course of study showed a circulation of 2,918 in the schools of the County.

The magazines were circulated in Pickett 340 times: Winneconne 180 times: Winchester 1,239 and Waukau did not report separately on magarine circulation, but constant use is made of them.

COOPERATION has been excellent from many County departments and with the teachers. Especially in the projects made by the schools which are displayed from time to time in the County Library so that the other teachers can see what is being done by their colleagues. Also the County Nurse, Miss Peterson, the Four-H Club Leader, Miss Mc-Farlane, and the school office through Miss Monson and Miss McKenney are interested in seeing that their groups get the books which will help in their work, as well as, mean the most to the rural citizens. The splendid newspaper articles written by Mr. Raymond Peterson helped us tell the County what we were doing during the year. ACTIVITIES. Mrs. Anderson, the County Assistant, spoke at the

Teachers' Institute on Aug. 24th to explain the County Library to the new teachers. At the display in connection with the Four-H Achieve-ment Day, Oct. 11th, Mr. McNeel, Assistant Four-H Club Leader of the State, expressed much interest and asked for a list of books which we furnish the Four-H Clubs. In two successive Saturday radio broadcasts from Madison he specifically mentioned our Library and what it is offering the Four-H leaders. An exhibit was shown at the Annual County School Board Convention in October and most of the sessions were attended by the County Assistant. We also furnished a display for the County Supervising Teacher which she used at group meetings. Many of the Granges and Community Clubs come to us for program material throughout the year. As has been the custom we had our Booth at the County Fair. The main decoration beside the books was furnished by the Widmer School. It was a miniature farm.

There can be no denying that the Winnebago County Library is helping to provide "generous opportunities to all for richer understanding of contemporary life, for mastery of circumstance, and for greater social and civic usefulness" because according to Governor Lehman of New York "libraries are essential to a democratic state because reading and study promote continual growth in mental power, character, and civic spirit." Most judges will say—provide good educational and read-ing facilities for the people or more than the money needed for them and give it to crime correction. As Mrs. Jennie Steele wrote to us in her report on the Waukau Branch, "The work this year while more, has simply been delightfully interesting."

BOARD 1933

The following report No. 22 was presented: To the Honorable Board of Supervisors, Winnebago county:

Gentlemen: The Winnebago County Children's Board was established by the order of the Board of Supervisors four years ago. The members at present are: Mr George B. Young, Oshkosh; Miss Mary O'Keefe, Oshkosh; Mrs. C. B. Clark, Neenah; Mrs. J. F. Shea, Pickett; and Elizabeth M. King, Omro

In the three and one-half years since its organization was completed the board has held forty-two meetings. The work has been under the supervision and at the suggestion of the Juvenile Department of the State Board of Control. The scope of the work undertaken has been constantly enlarging and the number of cases under consideration constantly increasing.

During the past year the work with foster homes has been continued. The homes have been investigated and supervised and recommended for license to the State Board of Control. Studies have been of the his-tories of the children in the homes. In one case a parent has been persuaded to take his child from the foster home and care for him in his own home.

Except in two cases, in both of which the foster mother after years of service was unable to continue the work, all the children are now in the same homes in which they were first placed. We believe this to be important as the child should have the feeling of belonging which can only come with living uninterruptedly in one home and under the care of one foster mother.

Due to the help given the needy by the distribution of clothing through the Red Cross, fewer calls for clothing have come to the board yet in some cases various articles of clothing have been purchased in order to keep certain children comfortable and able to attend school Twenty have had needed medical and dental care.

Judge Spengler has called upon members of the board to assist in investigating surroundings and supervising five cases of children and young persons brought before the Juvenile Court for delinquency, all of whom were placed by him in the custody of members of the board. The great problem of the year has been that of the unmarried mothers. The Children's Board has made a survey of all cases reported

in the county and in many cases has made a careful study of all the factors involved, especially of conditions contributing to the delinquency. An increasing number of the mothers are keeping their babes instead of sending them to institutions, and in an increasing number of the cases paternity has been established and a financial settlement made by the father. Following is a summary of the survey of all cases handled except those handled by Catholic agencies:

On April 26, 1933 the report of this board from the State Board of Control was of 86 cases from this county on their files, a large number of which were cases left over from former years.

Miss O'Keefe, Mrs. Clark, and Mrs. Shea attended the Conference of Children's Boards held at Fond du Lac, October 5th. At this meeting the functions of children's boards and questions of child welfare and of illegitimacy were discussed. Expenses \$3.00.

AGRICULTURAL AGENT'S REPORT

The following Report No. 27 was presented:

Oshkosh, Wisconsin, Nov. 11, 1933. To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors, Winnebago County, Wisconsin.

Gentlemen: In presenting my fifth annual report I have no alibi or apology to offer, as the realizations of our work have been beyond our expectations. For the benefit of someone who might read this report in the future I wish to say that under normal conditions I would have an entirely different report to offer

As you know, our job is education and research in agriculture. We have tried to adhere as closely as possible to our position, but on account of the emergency measures that have been enacted during the past two years, much of our time has been given to personal service rather than general education.

Fortunately, many of our projects that were started three and four years ago have been carried on with little assistance.

We have had some direct opposition given to our work, but I would like this Honorable Board of Supervisors to know that there has been more indirect opposition than most of you realize. The direct opposition has been easy to meet but the indirect opposition has been more difficult. As a whole the opposition of any kind has not been a serious handicap. In organizing 4-H clubs in the spring we encountered a little difficulty because of neighborhood differences. With this exception, I am of the opinion that the opposition we have met with, if it has not been, it will be a help to our work. A thorough analysis of it resulted in finding that gain for personal or group compensation has been at the bottom of it all. Regardless of what the effect of it will be on this Honorable Board of

Supervisors I feel justly proud of it.

Two years ago when I signed my contract I sold to Winnebago County my services and my judgment and I can only say that at no time have I delivered anything else.

A year ago the Agricultural Committee and my District Supervisor from the College of Agriculture, outlined a program of work for me as follows:

1.4-H Club Work with a goal of 600 members.

Π Minor Projects.

Live Stock Improvement 1.

2. Soil Improvement.

3. Miscellaneous.

(a) Orchard Improvement.

(b) Cooperative Marketing.

(c) Poultry Improvement.

4-H CLUB WORK

4-H Club Work was made my major project and it is deserving of that place in my County Agent Program. After all, boys and girls are our principle crop. The future of civilization will depend on what they make it—and what they make it will depend largely on what we do for them. In other words, we will tend to mold the future with the same hand that we direct the development of our boys and girls. The thought brought out in the verse composed by Ella Wheeler Wilcox is always appropriate in club work.

"One ship drives East and one drives West

By the self same wind that blows, It is the set of the sails and not the gales

Which determines the way it goes."

Regardless of the depression or anything else, we have had the t successful year in club work than ever before. The greatest develobst successful year in club work than ever before. The greatest devel-opment has been in the girls' work. This is due to the fact that we now have had a full time club leader this year.

I have not given the time to club work that I had planned a year ago, because we have had so much extra work this year; the fact that we have had on the average 171 office calls a month during the months of April, May, June, July and August, the months we should be working on club work, is largely responsible for my not devoting more time on this major project-nevertheless we have had exceptionally good results.

The County Fair is the show window of our club work. Not all the members exhibit at the Fair but a good many of them do, and it gives the public a good idea of the work carried on. Livestook members exhibited 82 calves, 85 hogs, 72 chickens, ducks and geese, 4 lambs and 10 rabbits. In the open class this year the club members won more than ever before at the Fair, showing that they are improving the quality of their insector. of their livestock.

In the Cattle Department about one-third of the entire cattle show

In the Cattle Department about one-third of the entire cattle show where 4-H club animals. In the Swine Department 80% of the animals shown were 4-H club hogs. In the Farm Crops Building one entire side of the building was taken up by 4-H club booths. The prize money at all the Fairs was cut down a great deal and many classes were entirely eliminated, so that the total cash earnings this year were not as large as last year. A total of \$1,276 was won by the boys and girls at the Fairs this year. If we had had the same amount of money to compete for that we had three years ago we should have had the winch winch winch would amount to about the no trouble winning over \$2,000 which would amount to about three times the prize money that was won four years ago. This is a very good indication of the progress we have made in club work. In this work we not only aim to train the boys and girls in better

livestock practices but we also aim to improve the livestock in Winnebago county.

I believe our exhibit at the National Swine Show this year will prove that we are accomplishing our aim in that direction. A pen of Winnebago County hogs sired by a 4-H club pig won first in the heary class and RESERVE GRAND CHAMPION of the entire show. In that show there were 365 fat hogs exhibited from 10 states, so you can see that the competition was keen.

If space would permit much more could be said about 4-H club work, but Miss Jean McFarlane, County 4-H Club Leader and Home Demonstration Agent, will discuss this subject more thoroughly in her report.

Livestock Improvement

About 88% of the entire income of Winnebago County farmers is from livestock and livestock products, so that live stock improvement should take a prominent part in our program. We have in this county about 35,000 cows and heifers milking. If we can raise the efficiency of the dairy cow in this county one pound of butter.per cow per year, figuring butterfat at 40c a pound, it will make a net income or net earnuring butterfat at 40c a pound, it will make a net income or net earn-ing to Winnebago County farmers of approximately \$14,000. Each year there are produced in Winnebago county about 26,000 pigs. If we can raise the efficiency of our hogs 25c per cwt. it would mean a net earn-ing or value of about \$13,000. The foregoing facts are what we have in mind when we carry on livestock improvement work. The most important project we are carrying on in this work is culling dairy cattle by the Dairy Herd Improvement associations. Right now I wish to remind you again that we have the only Pure Bred Test-ing association that has concated successfully for four years and started

ing association that has operated successfully for four years and started its 5th. It is the only one of its kind in Wisconsin and perhaps in the United States.

In the two associations that we have been operating, we are culling what is equal to 29 average herds of pure bred cattle. In this movement we are eliminating a large number of low producing pure bred cattle and building herds of high producing animals, also enabling farmers to secure bulls from ancestors of known production

We conducted three bull sales during the year at the Winneconne At these sales we supplied the farmers with catalogs, Sales Pavilion. which they could read and understand and these were made in our office. At these sales we talked selecting and taking and testing, primarily to interest our farmers in more efficient production. At the last sale we held last month 12 animals sold for an average of \$64.90 a head, all except two of

It is difficult for an average of yorso a nota, in comparison of the second sec I think I am safe in saying that in the past year this office has assisted farmers to secure not less than 90 bulls and 75 hogs for breeding purposes.

SWINE IMPROVEMENT

In the Swine Improvement work we selected breeding stock, assisted breeders to exhibit their live stock at the National. State and County shows. During the year we hold four killing tests, three at a local market and one at Milwaukee. For these tests we had farmers bring in different types of hogs and have them slaughtered. We then cut the carcasses for retail trade and at that point figured out the values of the different types of animals.

One of the most important educational features in our Swine Improvement work this year was the Fat Barrow Show at the County Pair. There were 113 hogs exhibited, different breeds and types, by 18 Fair. There were 113 nogs exhibited, different breeds and types, by 18 farmers. The animals were placed by a packer buyer. After the show they were shipped to the Plankinton Company, Milwaukee, where each lot was killed separately and again judged on the rail. From the table which we derived on this cutting test, which appears on the next page, it is easily seen that the type of hog we are promoting in Winnethe feeders.

Bangs Disease Control

For the last two years we have been carrying on a Bangs Disease Control Program in the county in cooperation with the Department of Markets, Dr. V. S. Larsen supervising.

We are also demonstrating what cannot be done without isolating

the diseased animals.

Seven herds were selected for this work. The infection in these herds ran all the way from 10 to 75 per cent.

In every case where the diseased animals were isolated, we were able to clean up the herd the first year; where they were left in the herd, in every case we had a spread of this disease.

Poultry

We have assisted the people of the county in this work by giving out bulletins on poultry raising, disease control, poultry house construction, etc. Disease control work has been and no doubt will be a principle facfor in poultry raising. Each year we are being called on for more help in this line.

Poultry sanitation will be one of the principal lessons taught through extension work from now on.

A large number of birds were sent to Madison for medical examination.

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Soil Improvement

At the request of our extension supervisor, we decided to discontinue our fertilizer test plot work which we have carried on for a period of three years. As a result of the work we have carried on in the past we have had an increase in the number of calls in regard to soil improvement work. Without putting out any notices that we would test soil or

ment work. Without putting out any notices that we would test soil or hold a soil school, people in the cities as well as in the country brought in soil to be tested every month of the year. Our crop loan service has increased our soil improvement work as it brought in a large number of people. In most cases, people who applied for a seed loan were people who should be interested in soil im-provement work. We found that when these people learned of the services they could get through this office they became frequent callers. About the usual amount of service nas been offered in drainage work. We surveyed for tile on 13 farms and ditches on three roads.

Orchard Improvement Work

During the winter with the cooperation of Prof. C. L. Kuehner of the College of Agriculture, we held orchard schools throughout the county and also at Farmers Institutes. The farmers were interested in the scientific methods of orchard improvement. Last summer we held an orchard tour to show the results of proper orchard improvement. We found that where farmers had taken care of their orchards properly, about 90% of the fruit was clean and saleable, and orchards that were not properly taken care of, not more than 10% of the fruit was fit to be used.

With the help of Mr. Kuehner, Fruit Specailist, we put up a booth at the County Fair in the Farm Products Building, displaying sprayed and unsprayed apples.

Cooperative Marketing

Although Cooperative Marketing was not made a major project we have spent considerable time in this line of work. The Larsen Shipping association called for our service in reorganizing their association. This association was organized and has been shipping since the first of May. I think that it has not been a success so far, because the volume of business is not large enough but, we are hoping, that it will increase in the future.

We assisted the Oshkosh Fluid Milk Producers in setting up their organization and up to the present time it is working very satisfactorily. We have heard very many favorable comments on the work, especially from those who opposed this movement in the beginning.

We spent three days in soliciting members for the Wisconsin Wool At this time we do not know just how successful we have been Pool. in this undertaking, as the wool is not all sold, but we do know that during the time we were working on this project, wool was being bought in the county for about 13c a pound and at the present time it is selling for about 33c a pound. We have been unable to get a definite account on the wool that has been marketed through the pool as a great deal of it was taken down to Milwaukee by the farmers themselves, some of it coming from Fond du Lac and some from Green Lake counties, but I would estimate that about 10,000 lbs. was shipped from Winnebago county to the pool.

I would say off-hand that the farmers will receive an increase in price of about 15c a pound which will net them a profit of approximately \$1,500.

Farm Crops

Farm crop work has again played a very important part in our year's activities. We have encouraged the use of sudan grass for pasture, soy activities, we nave encouraged the use of sudan grass for pasture, soy beans for emergency hay crop and sweet clover for green manure. As a permanent crop we have placed alfalfa first in our program. Sweet clover as a soil building crop and alfalfa as a forage crop stand out alone. We can maintain nitrogen in the soil and produce feed more efficiently with these crops than we can with any other crops. You have been told that we are over-producing—at the same time there is a market for every ton of good alfalfa that we have for sale in Winnebago county at about \$10 a ton clear. Another fact that we can bear in mind at this time—during the year 1929 there was \$435.

we can bear in mind at this time-during the year 1929 there was \$435-000 spent for feed in Winnebago county. This over production talk and those figures do not agree.

74

We have encouraged the use of No. 38 barley and I am sure that Winnebago county farmers have listened to us because of comparatively large percentage of the barley now grown in this county is the No. 38 variety. Over a period of four years since it has been introduced, I can safely say that it has out-yielded all other varieties at least 10 bushels to the acre.

There was produced in Winnebago county in 1933 about 13.000 acres of barley. If one out of 13 sowed No. 38 seed the increase would be 10,000 bushels on the 1000 acres, figuring 60c a bushel as the market price, the net earnings would be \$6,000.

Emergency

There has been more time spent on emergency work such as crop and federal farm loans than any two projects we have had. In the spring of the year we made out 34 crop loan applications. During the summer we made out 40 applications for the federal farm loan. It takes about 2 hours time to make out such an application. It was not only the applications that took our time but it was the people who came in for in-formation regarding such a loan and this took considerable time. In many cases when people learned what they had to offer for security they did not consider it. At the same time it took time to explain the system.

During the season a large percentage of the people who filed crop loan applications came into the office to have us take care of their crop reports and payments.

We were assigned the wheat allotment work but few people grow enough wheat in this county to pay them to sign up so we did not spend much time on it. At a county wide meeting held in this office only six contracts were signed.

Your petitioner therefore prays that said tax certificates be cancelled and the amount so paid for said tax certificates be refunded to petitioner with interest thereon at the rate of 7 per cent per annum until baid.
