Supervisors' Room, Oshkosh, Wis. Tuesday, April 15, 1947.

By virtue of Chapter 59.04 (B) this April Session of the Winnebago County Board is called to order for the purpose of organization and doing any and all regular business which, according to law, may come before this board.

The meeting was called to order by Arthur E. Hedke, County Clerk. Roll call showed all supervisors present. Nayes 26. Absent—Caswell, Crowley, Ginnow.

Supervisor Mortensen, Chairman of the Personnel Committee, gave a verbal report on salaries. On motion that when board adjourns that it adjourn until Tuesday, May 13th, CARRIED.

On motion board adjourned until 1:30 P. M.

ADJOURNED APRIL SESSION

Supervisors' Room, Oshkosh, Wis., Tuesday, May 13, 1947.

Winnebago County Board met pursuant to adjournment and called to order by Vice Chairman Joseph Drexler.

Roll call showed all members present with the exception of Supervisor Geiger.

Minutes of previous meeting approved as read.

Veronica Byrnes, who recently resigned as Home Demonstration Agent, addressed the board, thanking them for the splendid cooperation received from the members while employed by Winnebago Country.

Supervisor Mortensen, chairman of the Personnel Committee, gave a detailed report on the salary survey made by the State Bureau of Personnel. Questions of the board members were answered by Mr. Mortensen. The schedule was thoroughly discussed.

Hon. Sen. Taylor Brown addressed the board on legislation regarding the use of the present quarters for juvenile delinquents, urging the board to take action and notify our two assemblymen of their desires.

The salary schedule was further discussed by the board.

Another paragraph to Report-Resolution No. 1 was added as follows: "Be it further resolved that the maintenance item of Traffic Officers be increased from \$100 to \$115 per month" was announced by the Personnel Committee to be included in the Report Resolution.

On motion board adjourned until 1:30 P. M.

AFTERNOON SESSION

Board met pursuant to adjournment and called to order by Chairman J. F. Shea.

As a special order of business, the Winnebago Bar Association, through a committee composed of the following attorneys: L. C. Magnusen, C. H. Velte, Melvin Crowley, Chas. A. Barnard and E. J. Dempsey, addressed the board relative to increased salaries for the County and Municipal Judges.

EMPLOYEES SALARY SCHEDULE

The following Report-Resolution No. 1 was presented: TO THE HONORABLE WINNEBAGO COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS:

Gentlemen:

Your Personnel Committee beg leave to report they have had under consideration the matter of salaries for Winnebago County employees employed at the Winnebago County Courthouse as per instruction by

resolution adopted at the November, 1946 session of the County Board. Your committee wishes to report that the sub-committee created for the purpose of formulating a salary schedule engaged the Wisconsin Bureau of Personnel to make such a salary survey. The Bureau of Personnel called a meeting of all employees and outlined the program to be undertaken and requested that a form questionnaire be filed with them by each employee, Following this, members of the bureau visited the various offices to get a more complete picture of the service performed by each employee.

Your committee further wishes to report that the bureau made a preliminary report to this committee just prior to the April session of the County Board and since then have forwarded their complete report. A copy of their report is being distributed to each supervisor, and one copy is being attached hereto as a part of this report.

Following receipt of the reportt, your Personnel Committee had two meetings and recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

WHEREAS, it is recognized there is need for a salary schedule for employees working at the County Courthouse in order that employees when hired may know what the salary range is for the job to be performed, and

whereas, the Wisconsin Bureau of Personnel have completed a salary survey, which is attached hereto, setting forth recommended job titles, rates, etc.

NOW, THEREFORE. BE IT RESOLVED by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors that the report and recommendations of the Wisconsin Bureau of Personnel be and the same are hereby adopted as the wage schedule for Winnebago County employees,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that prior years of service be credited in applying this plan as follows:

Less than one year's employment, minimum.

Over one year but less than five, first intermediate step.

Five years or over, second intermediate step.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the next intermediate step be applicable to all employees presently engaged be effective January 1, 1948, and each January 1 thereafter until the maximum has been reached.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that any employees hired after May 1, 1947, will be eligible for intermediate step increases one for each full year of employment until maximum rate has been reached.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the occupations listed on page 11, covering elective or appointive employees who are under contract are not included in this report and these recommendations but will be handled by a separate report and resolution.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Schedule III of the merit plan for pension department employees be adopted as recommended by the Bureau's report.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the classification for charwomen of \$100-\$130 per month is based on full-time employment and shall be adjusted on ratio of part time work to full-time employment, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that since this survey and these recommendations have been prepared on the basis of the business index of 152, as released by the Bureau of Labor Statistics, this salary schedule in its full entirety shall move up or down in conformity to the Bureau of Labor Statistics business index when such change has been sufficient to effect a \$5.00 increase or decrease to a majority of the employees. Such increases or decreases shall become effective when the business index changes sufficiently to warrant same and when approved by the Personnel Committee for the next succeeding pay period following such change.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that when changes of this nature are made the salary shall be fixed on the next nearest \$5.00 bracket as computed, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the sum of \$15,000 to provide for these increases for the balance of the year 1947 be and the same is hereby appropriated and transferred from the contingent fund for said purpose.

TAXATION COMMITTEE—SCHMITT ABSTRACT CO.—RENTAL

The following Report No. 5 was read:

TO THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF WINNEBAGO COUNTY, WIS. Gentlemen:

Your Taxation Committee has thoroughly investigated the request of the Harry M. Schmitt Abstract Company to provide space in the Courthouse for installation of a small photostat machine, and we find as follows:

That a machine, such as Mr. Schmitt has purchased, will undoubtedly tend to speed up abstract work, which is, of course, very desirable. That there is sufficient and suitable room in the Register of Deeds' vault for a small machine of the type being purchased, and that water and sewer connections can very easily be made.

Mr. Schmitt has guaranteed that he will under no circumstances use his photostat machine except for his own work, so no conflict can develop as between his operations and those of the county.

However, we believe that the rental figure mentioned is too low and that a fair rental for the facilities would be \$25.00 per month.

THEREFORE, we recommend the passage of the following resolution:

BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin, that the Public Buildings Committee be authorized to enter into a contract with the Harry M. Schmitt Abstract Company for rental of the space under consideration, for the sum of \$25.00 per month, with thirty days' cancellation clause for either party, and with the understanding that all costs of moving equipment now in room to be provided be borne by Mr. Schmitt, together with all costs of installation of his equipment. It is understood that water, sewerage, light and heat are to be provided by the county. It is also understood that said contract should embody proper provision for liability insurance to be carried by Harry M. Schmitt to indemnify the county against injury on the premises to his employees.

TAX COMMITTEE—CHARGE FOR PHOTOSTAT WORK

The following Report No. 6 was read: TO THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF WINNEBAGO COUNTY, WIS.

Your Taxation Committee, to whom was referred the problem of recommending a scale of charges for photostatic work done, both for the various departments of the county and the outside public, begs leave to report as follows:

That in their opinion no charge, other than actual cost of materials and labor used for producing such copies, should be charged to other county departments, but that for work done for outside interests, a fee be charged sufficient to cover all expenses, and with a profit sufficient to help take care of depreciation and amortization of the equipment.

We therefore recommend passage of the following resolution:

The following Resolution No. 7 was presented:
A GENERAL ORDINANCE OF THE COUNTY OF WINNEBAGO,
REGULATING TRAFFIC UPON THE PUBLIC HIGHWAYS OF SAID
COUNTY, PROVIDING FOR IMPOSITION OF PENALTIES AND
FORFETTURES, THE COLLECTION AND ENFORCEMENT THEREOF, AND REPEALING PRIOR ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT THEREWITH

The County Board of Supervisors of the County of Winnebago and State of Wisconsin, do ordain as follows:

SECTION ONE

DEFINITIONS:

(1) VEHICLE. Every device in, upon, or by which any person or property is or may be transported or drawn upon a public highway, excepting vehicles used exclusively upon stationary rails or tracks.

(2) MOTOR VEHICLE, Every vehicle, as herein defined, which is

self-propelled.
(3). OPERATOR. Any person who is in actual physical control of a vehicle.

(4). HIGHWAY. A highway is every way or place of whatever nature open to the use of the public as a matter of right, for the purpose of

vehicular travel.

(5). OTHER WORDS DEFINED. Any words or expressions hereinafter used in the within Ordinance which are not hereinbefore defined in this section, and which are given a definition by Section 85.10 of the Statutes of Wisconsin for 1945, and the various subsections thereof, shall, for the purposes of this Ordinance, have the definitions given to them by Section 85.10 and appropriate subdivisions of the Wisconsin Statutes for 1945.

SECTION TWO

OPERATION BY INTOXICATED PERSONS OR USERS OF NARCOTIC DRUGS PROHIBITED

It shall be unlawful for any person who is an habitual user of narcotic drugs, or who is subject to epilepsy, or any person who is under the influence of intoxicating liquor or narcotic drugs, to operate any vehicle upon any highway.

SECTION THREE

PENALTY:

RECKLESS DRIVING:
It shall be unlawful for any person to operate any vehicle upon a highway carelessly and heedlessly, in wilful or wanton disregard of the rights or safety of others, or without due caution and circumspection or in any manner so as to endanger or to be likely to endanger the property, life or limb of any person, or without due regard to the traffic, surface, width of the highway, and any other condition of whatever nature then existing nature then existing

SECTION FOUR

Any person violating Section TWO or Section THREE of this Ordinance, shall, upon conviction thereof, forfeit to Winnebago County. Wisconsin, the sum adjudged and determined by the Court, not to exceed (\$100.00) and in default of payment thereof shall be imprisoned in the Winnebago County Jail, until said forfeiture and costs assessed and taxed are paid, not to exceed ninety days, and for the second or each subsequent conviction for violation of Section TWO or THREE of this Ordinance, within one year, the offender shall forfeit to Winnebago County, Wisconsin, a sum adjudged and determined by the Court, not to exceed (\$200.00), and in default of payment thereof shall be committed to the Winnebago County Jail until such forfeiture and costs assessed and taxed are paid, not to exceed six months.

SECTION FIVE

The General Ordinance of this County, passed and approved November 25th, 1941, entitled "A GENERAL ORDINANCE OF THE COUNTY OF WINNEBAGO REGULATING TRAFFIC UPON THE PUBLIC HIGHWAYS OF SAID COUNTY," is hereby repealed.

This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the date of its passage and publication Dated July 15th, 1947.

Of the village or city members first elected, one shall serve for a term of 1 year, one for a term of 2 years, and one for a term of 3 years; and of the town members first elected, one shall serve for a term of 1 year, one for a term of 2 years, and one for a term of 3 years. Thereafter, members shall each be elected for a term of 3 years

... The county superintendent shall serve as secretary of the committee, but shall not be entitled to vote.

- (2) NOMINATION OF COMMITTEE MEMBERS. The Education Committee of the County Board, or if no such committee exists, a committee designated by the chairman of the County Board shall nominate candidates for the County School Committee equal in number to the number of committee members to be elected . . . Persons nominated shall have a recognized interest in and understanding of, and sympathy for the problems of common schools.
- (3) ELECTION OF COMMITTEE MEMBERS. At the first meeting of each County Board following the effective date of this section, the board shall elect a County School Committee as provided in this section. If appointments are not made by any County Board or boards within the time limitations herein specified, the state superintendent shall forthwith make said appointments.

County Ordinance

GENERAL ORDINANCE OF THE COUNTY OF WINNEBAGO, REGU-LATING TRAFFIC UPON THE PUB-HIGHWAYS OF SAID COUNTY PROVIDING FOR IMPOSITION OF PENALTIES AND FORFEITURES. THE COLLECTION AND ENFORCE-MENT THEREOF, AND REPEALING PRIOR TRAFFIC ORDINANCES.

The following Resolution No. 2 was presented:

The County Board of Supervisors of the County of Winnebago, do ordain as follows:

SECTION ONE

SECTION ONE

Sections one, two, three, and four of
the General Ordinance of this County,
passed and approved July 15, 1947, entitled 'A GENERAL ORDINANCE OF
THE COUNTY OF WINNEBAGO, REGULATING TRAFFIC UPON THE PUBLIC HIGHWAYS OF SAID COUNTY,
PROVIDING FOR IMPOSITION OF
PENALTIES AND FORFEITURES, THE

THEREOF, AND REPEALING PRIOR
ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT THEREWITH," are hereby repealed.

SECTION TWO
DEFINITIONS.

DEFINITIONS.
(1) VEHICLE. Every device in, upon or by which any person or property is or may be transported or drawn upon a public highway, excepting, unless specifically included, vehicles used exclusively upon stationary rails or tracks or any vehicle propelled by the use of electricity obtained from over-

head trolley structures.
(2) MOTOR VEHICLE. Every vehicle herein defined which is self pro-

pelled.

pelled.

(3) OPERATOR. Any person who is in actual physical control of a vehicle.

(4) HIGHWAY. A highway is every way or place of whatever nature open to the use of the public as a matter of right for the purposes of vehicular travel. The term "highway" shall not be deemed to include a roadway or driveway upon grounds owned by private persons, colleges, universities or

criveway upon grounds owned by private persons, colleges, universities or other institutions.

(5) OTHER WORDS DEFINED. Any words or phrases hereinafter used in the within Ordinance, which are not hereinhefore defined in this section. and which are given a definition by section 85.10 of the Statutes of Wisconsin for 1945, and as amended, shall, for the purposes of this Ordinance, have the definitions given to them by section 85.10 of the Wisconsin Statutes for 1945, and as amended.

SECTION THREE

LIGHTING EQUIPMENT ON VE-

(1) No motor vehicle shall be operated upon or occupy any public high-way unless such vehicle is provided way unless such vehicle is product with sufficient lights, as required by this section, or as designated by the Motor Vehicle Department of the State of Wisconsin. All headlights, tail lights, clearance lights and lights on road machinery required by this section shall be kept lighted from one-half hour after sunset until one-half hour before sunrise.

(2) LIGHTS REQUIRED. (a) Head-lights. Every motor vehicle in use on the public highways except motor driven cycles shall be equipped with at least 2 headlights in good working or-der. Such headlights shall display a white light of sufficient illuminating power under normal atmospheric con-ditions to reveal any persons, vehicles or substantial objects 200 feet ahead of the headlights. Motor driven cycles and motor bicycles shall be equipped with at least one such headlight. Power driven cycles and motor bicycles shall be equipped with at least one such headlight. driven cycles shall be equipped with an electric headlight, tail light and cur-rent source. The headlight shall il-luminate an object 50 feet ahead of the vehicle; the lens shall be of the diffusing type; the bulb or bulbs shall diffusing type; the bulb or bulbs shall be of the prefocused type, or permit ready focusing; the headlight shall be so designed and attached to the machine that the height of the beam from the road may be readily adjusted: there shall be either 2 bulbs or a bi-focal bulb. The tail light, when illuminated, must be visible on a dark, clear night for a minimum of 500 feet from the rear or either side: there shall be the rear or either side; there shall be either 2 bulbs or a bifocal bulb. The current source shall be one of 3 types; by means of a wet battery and current generating source; or by means of a generator connected to motor direct. or by gears, chain, or belt; or, by means of a light coil incorporated into the means of a light coil incorporated into

means of a light coil incorporated liw the magneto.

(b) Every motor vehicle, including a motor-driven cycle, when in use or parked upon, or immediately adjacent to, the traveled portion of the high-way, shall display on the rear at least one lamp so constructed and placed as to show a red light from the rear plain-ly visible under normal atmospheric ly visible under normal atmospheric conditions from a distance of 500 feet to the rear of such vehicle. Reflective signals approved by the motor vehicle department may be used in lieu of tall lights on trucks. trailers, and semirights on trucks, trailers, and semi-trailers non electrically equipped, or power-driven cycles, and on parked vehicles, except as provided in para-graph (d) of this sub-section.

(c) Clearance Lights. Every motor vehicle having a width at any part in excess of eighty inches shall carry two clearance signal lights on the left side of such vehicle one located at the front and the other located at the rear of the vehicle. Such lights shall show a green, blue or amber light to the front and a red light to the rear. Re-flective signals approved by the motor vehicle department may be used in vehicle department may be used in lieu of rear clearance signal lights but the center of such signals shall not be more than forty-eight inches above the roadway. The foregoing requirements for clearance lights shall not be applicable to tractors, motor trucks, road machinery and equipment engaged in and used for maintaining public highways where such vehicles or equipment is lighted in accordance with the applicable standards promulwith the applicable standards promulgated by the motor vehicle depart-

(d) Lights to protect against stationary vehicles. No person shall, during any period of time from one-half hour after sunset to one-half hour behour after sunset to one-man hour truck, fore sunrise, permit a motor truck, truck tractor, trailer or semitrailer to stand upon any traveled portion of a highway outside of the corporate limits nighway outside or the corporate limits of any incorporated city or village, un-less such vehicle is protected by a burning fusee or flare placed on the extreme left side of the vehicle and by lights placed approximately one hun-dred twenty-five feet to the front and rear of the vehicle, to clearly indicate the presence of such vehicle. Such flares or lights shall be kept burning the entire time such vehicle is left standing. Every such vehicle operated on the highways shall be provided at all times with flares or other lights required to comply with this subsection.

(e) Auxiliary lights. If any vehicle is equipped with any auxiliary lights in addition to headlights, except a tall light, such lights shall be subject to all restrictinos governing the use of lights and, except in the case of emergency vehicles or road machinery, shall not show a red light to the front of

the vehicle.

(i) Spot lights. No spot light shall be (f) Spot lights. No spot light shall be used as an auxiliary driving light on any motor vehicle operated on the highways of this state except when such spot light is set or adjusted so that the rays of light shall be projected directly on the road surface at a distance not exceeding one hundred feet directly in front of the motor vehicle using such spot light and to the right of the center of the traveled way. of the center of the traveled way.

(g) Road machinery; lights required. (8) Moad machinery, lights required. No tractor, motor truck, road grader, road drag or other piece of road machinery used in road constuction or maintenance shall be used upon any public highway in this state which is puone nignway in this state which is open to traffic by the public unless such machinery shall carry at least two red danger signals in the daytimat at least two red signal lainterns or lights in the nighttime. Such signal and lights shall be so displayed as to give adequate warning of the presence of such machinery and to show safe clearances for passing vehicles. In lieu of such signals, lanterns or lights, such vehicles. machinery and equipment may be marked, designated and lighted in occordance with the standard method of marking and lighting such vehicles as promulgated by the motor vehicle department.

(h) Depressing headlights to avoid blinding drivers. Every person operating or driving a motor vehicle on the public highways shall, when approaching, and about to pass, any other person operating or driving a motor son operating or driving a motor vehicle and traveling in the opposite direction, dim, depress or tilt the front headlights on his motor vehicle, so that the rays projected therefrom will not blind the person whom such driver is approaching and about to pass. Suf-ficient light to see objects for seventy-

five feet ahead of the vehicle shall be maintained This paragraph to vehicles equipped This paragraph does not acetylene or similar gas lights.

(1) Lights on nonmotor From thirty minutes after sunset until minutes before thirty sunrise. thirty minutes before sunrise, no vehicle, other than a motor vehicle, shall be driven upon or occupy any public highway unless a light, or in lieu thereof a reflective signal approved by the motor vehicle department, is displayed on or from such vehicle so that it may be readily and distinctive near from build, such distinctly see⊓ from behind vehicle

(j) Lights on bicycles. Every bicycle, operated upon a public highway during any of the time between one-half hour after sunset until one-half hour before suarise, shall be equipped with a lamp on the front exhibiting a white light visible from a distance of at least five hundred feet to the front and with a lamp on the rear exhibiting a red light visible from a distance of five hundred feet to the rear, except that a red reflector approved by the motor vehicle department may be used in lieu of a rear light.

(3) CABIN TRAILER LIGHTS. Cabin trailers shall be equipped with a combination tail light and stop light, controlled and operated from the driver's seat of the propelling vehicle.

SECTION FOUR

OBEDIENCE, DIRECTION AND EXEMPTIONS IN TRAFFIC SIGNS AND

SIGNALS

(1) OFFICERS TO DIRECT TRAFFIC. (1) OFFICENS TO DIRECT TRAFFIC. It shall be the duty of the police and traffic departments of every political unit of government and each authorized department of Winnebago County to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance. Such officers are authorized to direct all traffic within their respective jurisdictions either in person or by means of visual or audible signal in accordance with the provisions of this Ordinance; but in the event of a fire or other emergency, officers of the police, traffic or fire department may direct traffic as conditions may require notwithstanding the provisions of this Ordinance

OBEDIENCE TRAFFIC (2) TO OFFICERS. It shall be unlawful for any person to refuse or fail to comply with any lawful order, signal or direc-tion of a traffic officer.

(3) OBEDIENCE TO TRAFFIC SIGNS AND SIGNALS It shall be unlawful for the operator of any motor vehicle or for the operator of any street car to disobey the instructions of any official traffic sign or signal placed in accordance with the provisions of this Ordinace nance unless otherwise directed by a traffic officer.

(4) PUBLIC EMPLOYEES TO OBEY TRAFFIC REGULATIONS. The provisions of this Ordinance shall apply to the operator of any vehicle owned by or used in the service of the United States Government, or of this state or any political subdivision thereof, and it shall be unlawful for any said operator to violate any of said provisions except as otherwise provided.

(5) EXEMPTIONS TO AUTHORIZED EMERGENCY VEHICLES. The provisions of this Ordinance regulating the movement, parking and standing of vehicles shall not apply to authorized emergency vehicles while the operator of such vehicle is operating the same in an emergency in the necessary performance of public duties. This exemption shall not, however, protect the operator of any such vehicle from the consequence of a reckless disregard of the safety of others.

(6) PERSONS PROPELLING PUSH CARTS OR RIDING BICYCLES OR ANIMALS TO OBEY TRAFFIC REG-ULATIONS. Every person propelling any push cart, bleycle, or riding a bicycle or animal, or driving or leading any animal upon a roadway shall be subject to the provisions of this Ordinance, applicable to the operator of any vehicle, except those provisions with reference to the equipment of vehicles and except those provisions which by their very nature would have no application.

SECTION FIVE

INTOXICATED PERSONS OR USERS OF NARCOTIC DRUGS PROHIBITED FROM OPERATING VEHICLES.

It shall be unlawful for any person who is a habitual user of narcotte drugs, or who is subject to epilepsy, or any person who is under the influence of an intoxicating liquor or narcotte drug, to operate any vehicle, including a street car used on stationary rails or tracks, or any vehicle propelled by the use of electricity obtained from overhead trolly structures upon any high-way.

SECTION SIX

PROHIBITED SIGNS AND SIGNALS. (1) DISPLAY OF UNAUTHORIZED SIGNS AND SIGNALS PROHIBITED. It shall be unlawful for any person to place or maintain or display upon or in view of any highway or steam or electric railway crossing any sign, red light or reflector (other than as one of warning), signal or device, which purports to be or is an imitation of or resembles or may be mistaken as an official traffic sign or signal, or which attempts to direct the movement of traffic or which hides from view any official sign or signal: excepting that a federal yellow flag, 24"x24", bearing either the words "Safety Patrol" or "School", attached to a light weight pole 8' or less in length, may be used by members of school safety patrols standing adjacent to but off the highway to warn traffic that children are about to cross the street. Every such prohibited sign, signal or device is declared to be a public nuissance and any police or traffic officer is empowered to remove the same to cause the same to be removed.

(2) INTERFERENCE WITH SIGNS AND SIGNALS PROHIBITED. It shall be unlawful for any person to willfully deface, injure, move, obstruct or interfere with any official sign or signal.

SECTION SEVEN

ACCIDENTS INVOLVING VEHICLES. (1) ACCIDENT INOLVING DAMAGE TO VEHICLE. (a) The driver of any vehicle involved in an accident resulting only in damage to a vehicle which is driven or attended by any person shall immediately stop such vehicle at the scene of such accident or as close thereto as possible but shall forthwith return to and in every event shall remain at the scene of such accident until he has fulfilled the requirements of subsection (2) of this section. Every such stop shall be made without obstructing traffic more than is necessary. Any such person falling to stop or comply with said requirement under such circumstances shall be subject to

a penalty and forfeiture.

(2) DUTY TO GIVE INFORMATION AND RENDER AID The driver of any vehicle involved in an accident resulting in damage to any vehicle which is driven or attended by any person shall give his name, address, and the registration number of the vehicle he is driving and shall upon request and if available exhibit his driver's license to the person struck or the driver or occupant of or person attending any vehicle collided with and shall render to any person injured in such accident reasonable assistance, including the carrying, or the making of arrangements for the carrying, of such a person to a physician, surgeon or hospital

son to a physician, surgeon or nospital for medical or surgical treatment if it is apparent that such treatment is necessary or if such carrying is requested by the injured person.

(3) DUTY UPON STRIKING UNATTENDED VEHICLE. (a) The driver of any vehicle which coilides with any vehicle which is unattached shall immediately stop and shall then and there either locate and notify the operator or owner of such vehicle of the name and address of the driver and owner of the vehicle striking the unattended vehicle and shall leave in a conspicuous place in the vehicle struck, a written notice giving the name and address of the driver and of the owner of the vehicle doing the striking and a statement of the circumstriking the striking and address of the driver and of the owner of the vehicle doing the striking and a statement of the circumstriking and circumstrikin

stances thereof.

(4) DUTY UPON STRIKING FIXTURES
UPON A HIGHWAY. (a) The driver of
any vehicle involved in an accident
resulting only in damage to fixtures
legally upon or adjacent to a highway
shall take reasonable steps to locate
and notify the owner or person in
charge of such property of such fact
and of his name and address and of
the registration number of the vehicle
he is driving and shall upon request
and if available exhibit his driver's
license and shall make report of such
accident when and as required by
Section 85.141 (6) (a) Wisconsin
Statutes.

SECTION EIGHT

OPERATION OF VEHICLES.
(1) OPERATE ON THE RIGHT SIDE OF HIGHWAY. Upon all highways of sufficient width, except upon one-way highways, the operator of a vehicle shall operate the same upon the right

half of the roadway and shall operate a slow moving vehicle as closely as practical to the right-hand edge or curb of the roadway, unless it is impractical to travel on such side of the roadway and unless overtaking and passing as set forth in this Ordinance except as provided in subsection (12) of Section eleven. The foregoing provisions of this subsection shall not be deemed to prevent the marking of lanes for traffic upon any roadway and the allocation of designated lanes to traffic moving in a particular direction or at designated speeds.

(2) LIMITATIONS ON OVERTAKING AND PASSING. It shall be unlawful for the operator of a vehicle to operate on any portion of the left side of a highway in overtaking and passing another vehicle proceeding in the same direction unless such left side is clearly visible and is free of oncoming traffic for a sufficient distance ahead to permit such overtaking and passing to be made in safety. The provisions of this subsection shall not apply upon one-way highways or upon highways laned for traffic; and in all cases of the latter, vehicles traveling in marked lanes shall move in the direction permitted in such lanes.

(3) OPERATING ON DIVIDED HIGH-WAYS. On highways that are divided longitudinally by a parkway, viaduct, wall or other form of division, vehicles shall keep to the right of such division unless directed to do otherwise by an official traffic sign or signal or by a traffic officer.

(4) MEFTING OF VEHICLES. Operators of vehicles proceeding in opposite directions shall pass each other to the right, each giving the other at least one-half of the main traveled portion of the roadway as nearly as possible.

SECTION NINE

RULES FOR PASSING. (1) SIGNALS FOR PASSING. The operator of an overtaking motor vehicle not within a business or residence district shall give audible warning with his warning device before passing or attempting to pass a vehicle proceeding in the same direction.

(2) VEHICLES TO KEEP IN TRAFFIC LANES. The operator of a vehicle upon a roadway shall not deviate from the traffic lane in which he is operating without first ascertaining that such movement can be made with safety to other vehicles approaching from the rear.

(3) OVERTAKING AND PASSING ANOTHER VEHICLE. The operator of any
vehicle overtaking another vehicle proceeding in the same direction shall
pass such vehicle at a safe distant to
the left thereof and shall not again
operate to the right side of the roadway until safely clear of such overtaken vehicle.

(4) CONDUCT OF OPERATOR BEING (4) CONDUCT OF OPERATOR BEING PASSED. The operator of a vehicle about to be overtaken and passed by another vehicle approaching from the rear shall give way to the right if

practical in favor of the overtaking vehicle on suitable and audible signal being given by the operator of the overtaking vehicle and shall not increase the speed of his vehicle until completely passed by the overtaking vehicle.

(5) PASSING ON CURVES AND GRADES RESTRICTED. It shall be unlawful for the operator of a vehicle to operate on the left side of the highway upon any part of a grade or upon a curve in the highway where the operator's view along said highway is obstructed within a distance of one thousand feet.

(6) PASSING AT RAILEOAD GRADE CROSSING AND HIGHWAY INTER-SECTIONS PROHIBITED. It shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle to overtake and pass any other vehicle proceeding in the same direction at any steam, gas or electric railway grade crossing or at an intersection of highways unless permitted to do so by a traffic officer or upon highways which are properly marked by traffic lanes.

(7) PASSING STREET CARS ON TWO-WAY HIGHWAY. It shall be unlawful for the operator of a vehicle on a twoway highway to overtake and pass on the left any street car proceeding in the same direction whether such car is actually in motion or at rest.

(8) PASSING STREET CARS ON ONE-WAY HIGHWAYS. The operator of a vehicle on a one-way highway may pass on the left, any street car actually stopped for the purpose of receiving or discharging passengers, at a speed not greater than fifteen miles an hour and with due regard for the safety of pedestrians, except when directed to do otherwise by a traffic officer or official traffic signal.

(9) PASSING STREET CAR WHILE LOADING OR UNLOADING PASSEN-GERS THE CONTROL OF THE CAR WHILE

(9) PASSING STREET CAR WHILE LOADING OR UNLOADING PASSENGERS. The operator of a vehicle overtaking any street car actually stopped for the purpose of receiving or discharging any passenger shall stop such vehicle to the rear of the nearest door of said car and shall remain stationary until any such passenger has boarded such car or reached the adjacent sidewalk, except that where a safety zone has been established, a vehicle need not be brought to a full stop before passing any such car but may proceed past such car at a speed that is reasonable and proper and in no event greater than fifteen miles an hour and with due regard for the safety of pedestrians. This provision shall apply to busses when at a safety zone.

when at a safety zone.

(10) PASSING VEHICLE AT INTERSECTIONS. Whenever any vehicle has
stopped at a marked or unmarked
crosswalk or at any intersection to permit a pedestrian to cross the highway,
it shall be unlawful for the operator
of any other vehicle approaching from
the rear to overtake and pass such
stopped vehicle.

supped vehicle.

(11) PASSING OR MEETING FRIGHT-ENED ANIMALS. The operator of any vehicle upon any highway, upon a signal by putting up the hand or other signal of distress made by a person

riding, driving or leading an animal which is frightened, shall cause such motor vehicle to stop unless a move-ment forward is necessary to avoid an accident or injury, and such operator shall, upon request, stop all motive power until such animal is under control

WHILE LOADING (12) PASSING SCHOOL BUSSES WHILE LOADING OR UNLOADING CHILDREN. The driver of a vehicle up-UNLOADING on meeting or overtaking any school bus which has stopped on the high-way for the purpose of receiving or discharging any school children shall discharging any school children shall approach or overtake such bus at a speed not to exceed 15 miles per hour. The term "school bus" as used in this subsection means any motor vehicle defined or referred to in section 110,-035 or section 40.347 (1) and which is painted substantially as prescribed in section 40.347 (1) of the Wisconsin Statutes of 1945 and as amended. The provisions of this subsection shall not apply to passing school busses within apply to passing school busses within the corporate limits of any city or village.

SECTION TEN
RULES FOR TURNING
(1) TURNING RIGHT. The operator
of a vehicle intending to turn to the
right at an intersection shall approach
the point of turning in the traffic lane nearest the right-hand edge or curb of

nearest the right-hand edge or curb of the highway and in turning shall keep as closely as practicable to the right-hand edge or curb of the highway. (2) TURNING LEFT. The operator of a vehicle intending to turn to the left at an intersection or into pri-vate highway shall make such turn from the traffic lane immediately to the right of and next to the center of the highway and shall pass immediate-ly to the left of the center of the in-tersection, passing as closely as practersection, passing as closely as practicable to the left of the center of the intersection, and shall leave the in-

intersection, and shall leave the intersection immediately to the right of the center of the intersecting highway.

(3) WHEN NOT APPLICABLE. The provisions of subsections (1) and (2) shall not apply to those vehicles that are required by local authorities to travel in such lanes that said provisions cannot be compiled with.

(4) TURNING AROUND AT CERTAIN INTERSECTIONS PROHIBITED At any intersection where traffis is controlled by a traffic control signal or by a traffic officer, it shall be unlawful for the operator of a vehicle lawful for the operator of a vehicle to turn such vehicle at the intersection so as to proceed in the opposite direction.

(5) TURNING AROUND IN MID-BLOCK PROHIBITED ON CERTAIN HIGHWAYS. It shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle operating on any street in a business district or on any artery for through traffic in a residence district to turn his vehicle so as to proceed in the op-posite direction at any place except at at intersection where such turns are permitted.

SECTION ELEVEN

RIGHT OF WAY

(1) RIGHT OF WAY AT INTERSECTIONS. When two vehicles ap-

proach or enter an intersection at approximately the same time, the driver of the vehicle on the left shall yield the right of way to the vehicle on the right, except as otherwise provided in this section. The driver of any vehicle driving at an unlawful speed shall forfeit any right of way which he might otherwise have hereunder. The driver of a vehicle approaching but not having entered an intersection shall yield the right of way to a vehicle within such intersection and turning therein to the left across the line of travel of such first mentioned vehicle; provided, the driver of the vehicle turning left has given a plainly visible signal of intention to turn as aforesaid. proach or enter an intersection turn as aforesaid.

(4) VEHICLES STOPPING FOR ARTERIES FOR THROUGH-TRAFFIC. The operator of any vehicle that has come to a full stop as required by section 38, upon entering an artery for through-traffic, as well as operators of vehicles on such artery for through-traffic, shall be subject to the provisions of subsection (1).

(5 VEHICLES TURNING LEFT IN INTERSECTIONS. The operator of a vehicle within an intersection intending to turn to the left across the path of any vehicle approaching from the opposite direction, may make such left turn where it is permitted only after affording a reasonable opportunity to the operator of such vehicle

(1) VEHICLES. Upon the approach of

any authorized emergency vehicle giv-ing audible signal by siren, the operator of every other vehicle shall immediately operate the same to a posi-tion as near as possible and parallel to the right-hand edge or curb of the roadway, clear of any intersection of highways, and shall stop and remain in such position unless otherwise directed by a traffic officer, until such authorized emergency vehicle shall have passed.

(2) STREET CARS. Upon the approach of any authorized emergency vehicle giving audible signal by a siren, the operator of every street car shall immediately stop such car clear of any intersection and keep it in such position until the authorized emergency vehicle shall have passed, unless otherwise directed by a traffic officer.

SECTION FOURTEEN

FOLLOWING EMERGENCY VEHICLE PROHIBITED.

It shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle other than one on official business to follow any authorized emergency vehicle in response to a call or alarm, closer than five hundred feet or to drive into or park any such vehicle within the block where fire apparatus has stopped in respone to an alarm.

SECTION FIFTEEN

CONDUCT AT SAFETY ZONES.

(1) DRIVING THROUGH SAFETY ZONES PROHIBITED. The operator of any vehicle shall not at any time operate through or over a safety zone when such safety zone is clearly indicated.

(2) PASSING SAFETY ZONES. The operator of any vehicle may pass on either side of a safety zone upon those

highways having two street rallway tracks, or upon one-way highways.
SECTION SIXTEEN

No person shall participate in any race or speed or endurance contest with a motor vehicle upon any high-

SECTION EIGHTEEN DRIVING THROUGH PROCESSIONS PROHIBITED FUNERAL

It shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle or street car to operate a vehicle between the vehicles comprising a funeral procession as pro-vided in subsection (6) of section

eleven, except when authorized to do so by a traffic officer.

SECTION NINETEEN

USE OF COASTERS, ROLLER
SKATES, AND SIMILAR DEVICES RE-STRICTED

STRICTED.

It shall be unlawful for any person upon roller skates or riding in or on a roller coaster, toy vehicle, hand sled, toboggan or similar device to go upon any roadway except while crossing a roadway at a crosswalk.

It shall be unlawful for the operator of any vericle pro-ceeding upon any street car tracks in front of a street car, upon any high-way, to fail to remove such vehicle from the tracks as soon as practicable after signal from the street car oper-after signal from the street car oper-

ator.

(2) INTERSECTION. When a street car has started to cross an intersection, it shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle to operate upon or across the car tracks within the intersection in front of the street car.

It shall be unlawful for any person It shall be unlawful for any person to place or cause to be placed upon a highway any foreign substance which is or may be injurious to or damaging to any vehicle or any part thereof.

SECTION TWENTY-FOUR

operator of a vehicle shall not back the same unless such movement can be

made in safety, and it shall be unlawful for any operator to back his vehicle into an intersection of highways upon which complete turns are prohibited, for the purpose of making such com-plete turn.

SECTION TWENTY-FIVE DISTANCE BETWEEN VEHICLES

FOLLOWING TOO CLOSELY (1) The operator of a motor vehicle shall not follow another vehicle more closely than is reasonable and prudent, having due regard for the speed of such vehicle and the traffic upon and the condition

of the highway.
(2) DISTANCE BETWEEN SLOW MOVING VEHICLES. The operator of any slow moving vehicle when operating upon a highway outside of a business or residence district shall not follow another slow moving vehicle within three hundred feet, but this provision does not prevent one slow moving vehicle overtaking and passing another nor does it apply to funeral processions

SECTION TWENTY-SIX

(1) ILLEGAL TO OPERATE SUCH VEHICLE. It shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle to operate the same when it is so loaded or when there are in the front seat such a number of persons, or any person so situated, as to obstruct the view of the operator to the front or to the sides, or to interfere with the operator having free use of both hands and feet to the operating mechanism or con-trols of the vehicle.

(2) ILLEGAL RIDING. It shall be un-

lawful for any passenger in a vehicle lawriu for any passenger in a venicie or street car to ride in such a position as to interfere with the operator's view ahead or to the sides or to interfere with the operator's control of the operating mechanism of the venicial.

(3) ONE ARM DRIVING. No person while operating a motor vehicle shall be so engaged as to interfere with the safe operation of such vehicle.

SECTION TWENTY-EIGHT

WINDOWS PROHIBITED. It shall be WINDOWS PROPHETED. It shall be unlawful for any person to operate any vehicle upon a highway with any sign, poster or other hontransparent material upon the front windshield, side wings, side or rear windows of such motor vehicle other than a certificate or cher paper required to be so displayed by law.

(2) WINDSHIELD WIPERS. MOTOR

PREVENTION OF NOISE AND SMOKE
No person shall operate a motor vehtele upon any highway unless such motor vehicle is equipped with a muffler in good working order and in constant operation to prevent excessive or unusual noise and annoying smoke.

SECTION THIRTY-ONE

MUFFLER CUT-OUT ILLEGAL It shall be unlawful to use a muffler cut-out on any motor vehicle upon a highway excepting authorized emergency vehicles.

SECTION THIRTY-TWO

SPILLING LOADS

No vehicle shall be operated or moved on any highway unless such vehicle is so constructed and loaded as to prevent its contents from dropping, sift-ing, leaking, or otherwise escaping therefrom.

SECTION THIRTY-THREE

(1) UNLAWFUL TO OPERATE VEH-CLE WITH PERSONS ON OUTSIDE F VEHICLE. It shall be unlawful for OF OF VEHICLE. It shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle to operate the same when any person is upon any portion thereof not designed or intended for the use of passengers when such vehicle is in motion.

(2) UNLAWFUL TO RIDE ON OUTSIDE OF VEHICLE. It shall be unlawful for any street.

ful for any person to ride on any street out for any person to ride on any street car or vehicle upon any portion thereof not designed or intended for the use of passengers when the vehicle is in mo-tion. This provision does not apply to an employe engaged in the necessary discharge of his duty nor to persons ridding rights. riding within truck bodies in space intended for merchandise

(3) LEADING ANIMALS FROMOTOR VEHICLES PROHIBITED. It shall be unlawful for any person to lead any animal upon a highway from a motor vehicle, trailer or semitrailer.

SECTION THIRTY-FOUR

SPEED RESTRICTIONS. (1) Except as otherwise provided in this section, the peed of any vehicle shall not be in excess of the following.

(a) 25 miles per hour in any business or residence district. (b) 35 miles per hour in outiying districts within any city, village or unincorporated village where on each of both sides of the highway there is an average distance. average distance of not less than 500 feet between buildings fronting thereon

(c) 15 miles per hour when passing a schoolhouse at those times when children are going to or from school or

are playing within the sidewalk area at or about the school.

(d) 15 miles per hour when passing an intersection properly marked with a "School Crossing" sign of a type approved by the state highway commission when children are crossing or are about to cross the highway.

(e) 15 miles per hour when passing

safety zone.

(f) 15 miles per hour when meeting overtaking any school bus stopped

or overtaking any school bus stopped outside the corporate limits of any city or village for the purpose of receiving or discharging school children.

(2) (a) At all other locations not enumerated in subsection (1), no person shall operate a vehicle at a speed greater than is reasonable and prudent under the conditions and having regard for the actual and potential hazards then existing. In every event the speed of the vehicle shall be so controlled as may be necessary to avoid colliding with any object, person, vehicle or other conveyance on or entering the highway in compliance with legal requirements and using due care.

vehicle (b) The operator of every vehicle shall, consistent with the requirements of paragraph (a), operate at an ap-propriate reduced speed when ap-proaching and crossing an intersection

or railway grade crossing an intersection or railway grade crossing, when approaching and going around a curve, when approaching a hill crest, when traveling upon any narrow or winding roadway, when passing school children or other pedestrians, and when special hazard exists with regard to other traffic or by reason of weather or highway conditions.

(c) The speed of all vehicles equipped with metal or solid rubber tires shall not exceed 15 miles per hour.

(3) (a) Whenever the state highway commission with respect to the state trunk highway system, and the local authorities with respect to highways under their jurisdiction, shall determine upon the basis of an engineering, and traffic investigation that any speed limit hereinbefore set forth, except in or railway grade crossing, when ap-

limit hereinbefore set forth, except in subsection (1) (c), (d), (e) and (f), or the actual speed of vehicles on such highways, is greater or less than is reasonable or safe under the conditions found to exist at any intersection or other place or upon any part of a highway, said commission and local authorities may determine and declare a reasonable and safe speed limit thereat, which shall be effective at all times at, which shall be effective at all times, or at such times as may be determined and indicated by appropriate signs giving notice thereof. The speed limits determined as the result of such engineering surveys shall be applicable to not more than 2000 miles of state trunk highways.

(b) Local authorities may increase speed limits as provided by this section, but may not decrease speed limits set forth in subsection (1) (a) and (b) nor establish speed limits at any location set forth in subsection (2) without the surroual of the state highway out the approval of the state highway commission, nor shall signs giving notice thereof be erected before such approval.

(c) All speed limit signs erected un-der the provisions of this section shall be of a type approved by highway commission.

(d) No liability shall attach to the state highway commission nor to the local authorities by reason of the posting of a speed limit under this section, nor shall such posting constitute a guarantee that it is reasonable and safe under all conditions.

(f) Local authorities shall place and

maintain upon all highways where the permissible speed is increased or de-creased by them in the manner pro-vided in this subsection, standard signs

giving notice of such speed.

(g) For the purpose of this section, the term local authorities shall mean county boards with respect to county trunk highways, town boards with respect to town highways, village boards with respect to with respect to village streets and city

with respect to village streets and city councils with respect to city streets.

(4) (a) The sheriff, chief of police, or clerk of the court having jurisdiction of violations of this section is authorized to receive at his office from any person who shall have been accused of violation of this section or any county ordinance enacted by authority of chapter 55, and who has been arrested therefor, a deposit in money not to exceed the amount of the been arrested therefor, a deposit in money not to exceed the amount of the maximum penalty, the imposing of which in such case may be authorized, and to release such person from arrest until the opening of the court having jurisdiction of such violation on the next succeeding day when such court may be in session, or until a time which may be fixed for the hearing of the case. the case.

the case.

(b) In case the person so arrested and released shall fall to appear, personally or by an authorized attorney or agent, before said court at the time fixed for the hearing of the case, then the money deposited with the sheriff or clerk shall be retained and used for the payment of the penalty, which may be imposed after an exparte hearing upon such person so arrested and depositing the same, together with the costs; and the surplus. gether with the costs; and the surplus.
if any there be, shall be refunded to the person who made such deposit upon his application; in case such person is acquitted, then the whole amount of such deposit shall be refunded to said

depositor upon application.
(c) The provisions of paragraphs (a) (c) The provisions of paragraphs (a) and (b) shall not be construed so as to make the county or municipality in any case liable for the whole or any part of the money deposited with such sheriff, chief of police, or clerk of court.

(5) The speed initiations set form in this section shall not apply to authorized emergency vehicles when responding to emergency calls and the operators thereof sound audible signal operators thereof sound audilie signal by siren or exhaust whistle, and when such emergency vehicle is equipped with at least one lighted lamp exhibiting red light visible under normal atmospheric conditions from a distance of 500 feet to the front of such vehicle. This provision shall not relieve the operator of an authorized emergency vehicle from the duty to operate with due regard for the safety of all persons using the highway, nor shall it pro-tect the operator of any such vehicle from the consequence of a reckless dis-regard of the safety of others.

SECTION THIRTY-FIVE SPEED LIMITATIONS ON BRIDGES AND VIADUCTS

(2) UNLAWFUL TO EXCEED SPEED LIMITATIONS ON BRIDGES, CAUSE-WAYS, VIADUCTS OR STRUCTURES. shall be unlawful to operate any vehicle upon any structure mentioned in subsection (1), section 85.41 Wis. Stats., at a speed which is greater than the maximum speed which can be maintained with safety thereto when such structure is sign-posted as pro-vided in said subsection.

SECTION THIRTY-SIX
PEDESTRIAN REGULATIONS
(1) PEDESTRIAN RIGHT OF WAY.
The operator of any vehicle shall yield
the right of way to a pedestrian crossing the highway within any marked or unmarked crosswalk at an intersection except at those intersections where the movement of traffic is being regulated by traffic officers or traffic control signals.

(2) PEDESTRIAN RIGHTS AND DU-(2) PEDESTRIAN RIGHTS AND DUTIES AT CONTROLLED INTERSECTIONS. At intersections where traffic is controlled by traffic control signals or by traffic officers, operators of vehicles shall yield the right of way to pedestrians crossing or those who have started to cross the highway on a green or "GO" signal and in all other cases pedestrians shall yield the right of way to vehicles lawfully proceeding directly shead on a green or "GO" signal. signal.

PEDESTRIANS ON . HIGHWAYS. Upon the intersections of divided highways, or highways provided divided highways, or highways provided with safety zones where in either case, traffic is controlled by traffic control signals or by traffic officers, the pedestrian shall have the right of way only on that portion of the highway between the highway limits and the spaces not used by traffic or safety

(4) PEDESTRIAN RIGHT OF WAY FORFEITED WHEN JAY WALKING. Every pedestrian crossing a highway at any point other than a marked or unmarked crosswalk shall yield the right of way to "ehicles upon the highway."

(5) PEDESTRIANS ON SIDEWALKS. Pedestrians upon any sidewalk shall have the right of way over all vehicles

crossing such sidewalk.

(6) PEDESTRIANS TO WALK ON LEFT SIDE OF HIGHWAY. Pedestrians using those highways not provided with sidewalks shall travel on and along the left side of such highway and the pedestrian, upon meeting a vehicle pedestrian, upon meeting a vehicle shall, if practicable, step off the trav-

shall, if practicable, step off the trav-eled roadway.

(7) SOLICITING RIDES UNLAWFUL.
It shall be unlawful for any person to be in the roadway for the purpose of soliciting a ride from the operator of any private vehicle.

(8) ALIGHTING FROM OR BOARD-ING MOVING STREET CARS OR VE-

HICLES PROHIBITED. It shall be un-lawful for any person to alight from or board any street car or vehicle when such street car or vehicle is in motion.

The county board declares that it would have passed the remaining parts of this Ordinance if it had known that such part or parts thereof would be de-clared invalid or unconstitutional.

SECTION FORTY-ONE JURISDICTION. The Municipal Court for the City of Oshkosh and County of Winnebago is given hereby exclusive jurisdiction of all cases arising under this Ordinance, and shall hear, try and determine said matters in a summary

SECTION FORTY-TWO DULE OF PENALTIES AND SCHEDULE FORFEITURES:

REPORT OF WELFARE COM.-CO. DEPT. OF PUBLIC WELFARE The following Report No. 3 was read:

Your Welfare Committee has held regular meetings in connection with the duties and responsibilities assigned to the Committee by the County Board of Supervisors, and has very carefully kept in touch with all phases of the welfare problems affecting Winnebago County in any

At the 1947 session of the Legislature changes were made in the Wisconsin Statutes which would make possible an increase in revenues by Winnebago County for Aid to Dependent Children in foster homes and for administrative expenses. In order to fully realize these increased revenues as well as other benefits provided by this newly-enacted legislation it will be necessary for the County Board to make certain changes in the organization of the present county pension department and the present county pension department and the

present county probation department.

The 1947 session of the Legislature enacted a law changing the Statutes with respect to the administration of foster home care in Wisconsin, and providing for state reimbursement of 33½ per cent of the cost of care for children in foster homes providing they have been placed there by a county agency and providing further that the foster home is under permit Chapter 526, Laws of 1947, creates section 49.19 (10) of the Wisconsin Statutes and makes the change above referred to. This law also provides the administration of this aid shall be the responsibility of the county agency administering Aid to Dependent Children. Up to the present time in Winnebago County arrangements for and payment of foster home care of children has been handled by the county probation department. county probation department

In order to fully realize all the advantages of the revised statutes it would appear desirable to consolidate the functions, duties and responsibilities of the present county pension department and the present county probation department into a single agency to be known as the county department of public welfare. A recently-enacted statute makes organization of such a county department possible and desirable.

This whole question of such a county department possible and desirable.

This whole question of organization and the relative merits and advantages so far as Winnebago County and the county agencies and children involved are concerned has been very carefully considered and has been discussed by your Welfare Committee with the County Children's Board, as well as with representatives of the various state departments who are interested At a contractive of the various state departments. Board, as well as with representatives of the various state departments who are interested. At a joint meeting of the County Children's Board and the Welfare Committee on October 22 the County Children's Board voted unanimously to recommend to the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors that a single consolidated county department. Of public welfare be set up and that the county children's board be disestablished. A letter from the county children's board confirming this action is attached. Your Welfare Committee is making the same recommendation after very careful and thorough study of all factors involved. We've been in contact with the Division of Child Welfare of the State Department of Public Welfare and with the Division of Public Assistance of the state Department of Public Welfare, and the change is recommended by all persons who are concerned and who are informed as to what is involved. A copy of a letter from the State Department of Public Welfare to the County Children's Board on this point is also attached.

These salaries are at present paid 100 per cent by the county since these workers are employes of the county probation department. (2) Reimbursement of approximately 70 per cent of the per diem and travel of the members of the county board of public welfare (now referred to as the Welfare Committee).

Since all factors involved point to the desirability of organizing a county department of public welfare, your Welfare Committee is introducing an ordinance to effect this change in organization and is recommending its adoption by the county board of supervisors.

AN ORDINANCE CREATING A COUNTY DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WELFARE TO SUCCEED THE PRESENT COUNTY PENSION DEPARTMENT AND COUNTY PROBATION DEPARTMENT.

The following Resolution No. 3 was presented:

The Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin, in annual session, do ordain as follows:

Section 1. COUNTY DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WELFARE. In order to further unify the welfare functions and services in this county and in order to take full advantage of state funds made available by the 1947 Legislature for reimbursement for Aid to Dependent Children in foster homes and in order to effect a saving in administrative costs

both through the more effective utilization of personnel and through added state reimbursement, there is hereby created a County Department of Public Welfare as authorized by sections 46.30 to 46.36 of the 1847 Wisconsin Statutes to succeed the present county pension department and county probation department. Such County Department of Public Welfare shall consist of a county board of public welfare, a county director of public welfare, and necessary personnel.

Section 2. COUNTY BOARD OF PUBLIC WELFARE. (a) The County Board of Public Welfare shall consist of five members of the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors appointed by the County Board of Supervisors at the organization meeting. The members shall serve for a term of one year but may be reappointed and shall receive the same compensation and per diem as members of county board committees pursuant to section 59.06 of the Wisconsin Statutes. A majority of the members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business and an organization meeting shall be held as soon as practical for the election of a chairman, vice chairman, and secretary, and for the adop-tion of rules governing meetings and the transaction of business, Meet-ings of the welfare board will be held upon call of the chairman of the board. Upon organization of the welfare board, the county clerk shall notify the State Department of Public Welfare of such organization and give the names and addresses of its officers and members. In the event any member, appointed while a member of the county board of supervisors shall cease to be a member of that board, he shall continue on the county board of public welfare until his successor has been appointed.

(b) The welfare board is authorized to meet for purposes herein outlined at the compensation rate as set forth in paragraph (a) of this

Section 3. DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE COUNTY BOARD OF PUBLIC WELFARE. The county board of public welfare shall supervise the department as a policy-making body, and shall determine the outlines and principles of administration of the departmental functions, Such board may appoint advisory committees of residents of the county to correspond to the county to dents of the county to serve without compensation.

Section 4. COUNTY DIRECTOR OF PUBLIC WELFARE. The county board of public welfare shall appoint a county director of public welfare whose qualifications are public welfare. lic welfare whose qualifications, compensation and tenure shall be in accordance with section 49.50 of the Wisconsin Statutes and the rules and regulations promulgated thereunder. The director so selected shall provide a \$5,000.00 bond to be approved by the Winnebago County Clerk and paid for by Winnebago County for the faithful performance of the duties of his office and the accounting of all funds that come into his possession or under his direction.

Section 5. DUTIES OF THE COUNTY DIRECTOR. The county director of public welfare shall serve as the executive and administrative officer of the department. In consultation and agreement with the county board of public welfare, he shall prepare and submit to the county board of suprevisors an annual budget and a full report of the operations and administration of the department. He shall after consultation and agreement with the and agreement with the county board of public welfare, appoint such employees as may be necessary to administer the functions of the department and whose qualifications, compensation and tenure shall be and regulations promules the theorem. and regulations promulgated thereunder.

Section 6. FUNCTIONS. DUTTES AND POWERS OF COUNTY DE-PARTMENT OF PUBLIC WELFARE. The county department of public welfare shall have the following functions, duties and powers and such other welfare functions as many horsestands. other welfare functions as may hereafter be delegated to it:

(1) The administration of Aid to Dependent Children under section 49.19 of the Wisconsin Statutes.

(2) The administration of Aid to the Needy Blind under section 49.18 of the Wisconsin Statutes

(3) The administration of Old Age Assistance under sections 49.20 to 49.38 of the Wisconsin Statutes.

(4) The administration of Aid to Totally Disabled Persons under section 49.61 of the Wisconsin Statutes,

- (5) The administration of relief to county-at-large charges as provided in section 49.02 (2) of the Wisconsin Statutes.
- (6) To administer child welfare services under and subject to the provisions of section 48.315 of the Wisconsin Statutes, thereby administering the functions otherwise administered by children's boards and licensed child welfare agencies.
- (7) To make such investigations which are provided for under section 322.02 (1) of the Wisconsin Statutes if the court having jurisdiction so directs.
- (8) To perform the duties and functions of a juvenile probation department as defined in section 48.03 of the Wisconsin Statutes when requested to do so by the juvenile judge of the county.
- (9) To make investigations relating to relief or welfare administration and admissions to state and county institutions upon request of court, superintendent district attorney, county veterans' service commission, or any other county official.
- (10) Furnishing services to the families or persons other than the granting of financial or material aid where such services may prevent such families or persons from becoming public charges or restore them to a condition of self-support.
- (11) To make certification or referral of eligibles for state or federal works or other assistance programs, eligibility for which is based on need, when designated to perform such certification or referral services, and to certify eligibility for and distribute surplus commodities and foodstuffs.
- (12) Make investigations which relate to welfare services upon request of the State Department of Public Welfare.
- (13) The maintenance of administrative and reporting relationships with all pertinent state departments
- (14) The department shall administer all laws, rules and regulations of this state pertaining to assistance or welfare services not required by law to be administered by some other department or agency within the county.

Section 7, MERIT SYSTEM STATUS OF PRESENT EMPLOYEES, As provided in sections 4 and 5 the director and personnel of the county department of public welfare shall be selected in accordance with section 49.50 of the Wisconsin Statutes, and the rules and regulations promulgated thereunder. Personnel of the County Pension Department and the County Probation Department shall be transferred to the County Department of Public Welfare subject to the provisions of Section 49.50 of the Wisconsin Statutes. Such status under section 49.50, Wisconsin Statutes, as may have been acquired by personnel of either department on the effective date of this ordinance shall not be deemed changed or interrupted by the provisions hereof.

Section 8, STATUS OF THE MEMBERS OF THE COUNTY WEL-PARE COMMITTEE. Members of the welfare committee of the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors on the effective date of this ordinance shall be and hereby are appointed as members of the county board of public welfare referred to in section 2 of this ordinance, and shall hold office until their successors have been appointed at the next organization meeting of the county board of supervisors.

Section 9. ABOLISHMENT OF COUNTY CHILDREN'S BOARD. The Winnebago County Children's Board established under section 48.29 (1). Wisconsin Statutes, is hereby abolished as of the effective date of this ordinance.

Section 10. REPEAL OF PREVIOUS ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH. All ordinances, resolutions, and actions of the county board of supervisors inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 11. TRANSFER OF RECORDS AND EQUIPMENT. All records, files and equipment of the Pension Department and Probation Department are hereby transferred to the County Department of Public Welfare.

Section 12. TRANSFER OF UNEXPENDED APPROPRIATIONS. All unexpended appropriations and monies in departments affected by this ordinance at the effective date of this ordinance are hereby transferred to the County Department of Public Welfare.

Section 13. The department shall submit an annual report to the county board at its annual meeting.

Section 14. To the end that the county may receive federal and state aid, the department and the board shall observe all laws and rules and regulations of the State Department of Public Welfare.

Section 15. The Wisconsin Statutes referred to in this ordinance are the 1947 statutes.

Section 16. The county clerk is hereby directed to transmit a certified copy of this ordinance to the State Department of Public Welfare. Section 17. EFFECTIVE DATE OF ORDINANCE. This ordinance

shall take effect and be in force January 1, 1948.

Your Public Buildings Committee made a trip to Madison and inspected the Elliott Addressing Machines in use at the Courthouse there. We found one Elliott machine, 15 years old, which was still in a good state of repair, and another Elliott machine, 10 years old, in use at said Courthouse, has had only \$48.00 worth of repairs in said length of time. Said machine does the tax work for three counties, Dane, Sauk, and Green, and there are over 93,000 pieces of property listed for said counties.

We also find, in our investigation, that an Addressograph machine which is 10 years older than the one in use at the Winnebago County Courthouse, is able to get repairs out of the Milwaukee department without any trouble.

The Elliott Addressing Machine Company will sell us a complete outfit, including cabinets and the stencil-cutting typewriter, for \$2,662.00, and will make an allowance of \$500.00 for the old equipment.

We believe that Winnebago County could get better service out of an Elliott machine than an Addressograph machine, and therefore put the matter up to the County Board of Supervisors for further discussion by the board

The request came to the County Board at the July 15th, 1947, meeting, when Don Colburn, Secretary of the Neenah-Menasha Chamber of Commerce, and John Catlin, Chairman of the Aviation Committee of the Neenah-Menasha Chamber of Commerce, appeared before the Board and explained their proposal for an airport to serve the northern part of the county. At that time a copy of their program, describing the project, and containing a description of the premises involved, and estimate on cost of purchase, was left with each member of the County Board. The matter of acquisition of this airport was thereafter referred to the Aviation Committee to the Aviation Committee.

to the Aviation Committee.

The Committee made a written request to the Civil Aeronautics and State Aeronautics Commission for a survey of aviation facilities in the northern party of Winnebago County, with particular emphasis on this Valley Airways Airport. Up to this time the Committee has received no reply from the Civil Aeronautics Administration relative to the desirability or necessity of an airport in the northern end of the county.

Your Committee reports that Mr. Don Colburn. Secretary of the Neenah-Menasha Chamber of Commerce, has turned over to the Com-

mittee a letter from the Executive Secretary of the State Aeronautics mittee a letter from the executive Secretary of the State Aeronautics Commission, stating that the Commission will not take any action, or state the results of the survey, until the petition is filed under Chapter 548 of the Laws of 1947, stating that a municipality wishes to develop an airport, and asking for a hearing on said matter. The Commission apparently is disinclined to advance an informal opinion relative to any particular site.

Your Committee has concluded that it does not have sufficient information available to enable it to reach a sound decision in this matter.

Our last report of March 4th, 1947, informed you that we had contracted for a ten place T hanger — that we were keeping in touch with the "Bell" interests — and that \$20,000.00 Federal aid had been alloted

As to the T hangers, it was not until late in the summer that enough material had arrived to permit taking a chance on advertising for bids for erection. The committee also had been working on plans for another operator's building, to take care of the interests of Calvin Mace and Ed. Wickman, who were the finalists, in what was previously known as the 'Bell' interests. About the time we reached an agreement with them, whereby a suitable building could be erected and satisfactory terms completed most of the Thanger material had arrived. The committee completed, most of the T hanger material had arrived. The committee then called for bids on the erection of the T hanger and construction of operator's building, each separate from the other. The erection of the T hanger was awarded to E. A. Precour, for the sum of \$3,488.00, and the construction of the T hanger was awarded to E. A. The T hanger job is about complete, and it is estimated that the operator's building will be finished about January of next year.

Referring to the hanger contract again — The Committee and engineer deliberated long on this. The bid of \$3,488.00 was pretty much out of line with the rest of them, and none had the answer as to why. It was not until about ten days after the contractor had been on the It was not until about ten days after the contractor had been on the job that the reason why showed up. The foreman on the job was having difficulty finding a place for all the material on the site. The matter was taken up with the inspecting engineer, and while each was looking at his prints, it was discovered that the contractor's prints showed no wall partitions, and about fifty less cement abutments. By some unknown happening, a wrong print had gotten into the contractor's hands, from which he had figured his bid. Mr. Precour was very agreeable in handling the situation, however. He showed the engineer how he had arrived at his bid figure, and agreed to do the extra work at the same rate schedthe studium, nowever. He showed the engineer how he had arrived abis bid figure, and agreed to do the extra work at the same rate schedule, making the total cost \$5,812.13. The next lowest bid was \$6,783.00. With an estimated amount of \$150.00 to be paid by the Luria Co., from whom the hangers were purchased, for extra work done by the contowest bidder.

The contract with Mace and Wickman is on the basis of \$125.00 per month, on a ten year lease, or \$1,500.00 a year, which will pay for the building at the time the lease runs out. REPORT OF SPECIAL ASYLUM BUILDING COMMITTEE

The following Report No. 43 was read: TO THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF WINNEBAGO COUNTY, WIS. Gentlemen

Your Special Asylum Building Committee begs leave to report that insamuch as the County Board, in the March session, did not see fit to authors the report of the countries the report of the session of the countries the report of the countries the countries that the countries the countries the countries that the countrie to authrize the preparation of plans and specifications for the proposed new County Asylum, due to the substantial increase in estimated cost of the project, any further action by your committee was naturally curtailed.

Your Committee, however, in order to ascertain for itself the future Your Committee, however, in order to ascertain for itself the future economic financial outlook, called a meeting on October 2nd, 1947, and invited a number of industrial leaders of the county, Present at this meeting were Mr. Witte of the Oshkosh Building Loan & Savings Association, Mr. C. Steiger of the Deltox Rug Company, Oshkosh; Mr. Clifford of the Kimberly-Clark Corp., Neenah, and Mr. A. R. Hedlund of Bergstrom Paper Company, Menasha. All of these men expressed the belief that, while it is difficult to determine the future economic trend with any degree of accuracy, the question as to whether or not to build should be determined by the need of the building. The general consensus of opinion, however, was that until such time when actual construction is begun, a substantial amount be appropriated annually to build up the fund, and that plans and specifications be completed in order to be ready to ask for bids when the opportune time arrives.

Your Committee desires to report that it concurs in these opinions,

and recommends the passage of its resolution calling for an appropriation of \$150,000.00 to augment the present Asylum Building Fund of \$208,067.33, and the resolution authorizing the completion of plans and

specifications.

In our report of November, 1946, we stated that your Committee would investigate the possibility of obtaining a Federal grant in connection with our asylum building program. Upon investigation we find that the Federal Government, in order to assist the states in the construction of public and other non-profit hospitals, Public Law 725, the Federal Act authorized an annual appropriation of \$75,000,000, starting with the fiscal year ending June 30, 1947, and for each succeeding fiscal year. Wisconsin's share will be \$1,622,000 annually. Under this Act, it becomes necessary for each state to adopt enabling legislation, whereby it would match % of each project against the Federal Government's %. It would match % or each project against the Federal Governments %. On August 1st, 1947, in a communication from Vincent F. Otis, Director of Hospital Survey and Construction, we were informed that the State Plan should be completed and publicized before the end of this year. The communication also stated that because the amount of Federal Funds will be limited, and since the Federal law requires that the funds be used for the most urgent projects it is, therefore, doubtful that Federal grants-in-aid will be available for mental hospitals, at least during the early years of the program. Under the circumstances, therefore, any assistance from this source seems very doubtful.

INSTITUTIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

The following Report No. 44 was read:

TO THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF WINNEBAGO COUNTY, WIS. Gentlemen:

Your Committee on Institutions herewith submits its report for the past year, during which time six (6) meetings were held, aside from those held during board sessions for the sole purpose of auditing the usual bills for examination of the insane.

Since the Annual Budget Session of the board was advanced to an Since the Annual Budget Session of the board was advanced to an earlier date this year, it has not been possible to analyze operating expenses of either Sunnyview Sanatorium or the County Asylum. We find, however, that the per capita cost of Sunnyview for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1947, is \$31.82 as against \$24.12 for the prior fiscal year, an increase of \$7.70. This increase is due to increased salaries and labor, subsistance as well as increases in general. As a result of this increase in costs Sunnyview Sanatorium finds itself confronted with a cash deficiency of \$36,000.00, which the trustees feel should be met by a direct appropriation of \$18,000.00 by both Fond du Lac and Winnebago Counties to create a reserve working fund to meet this condition.

ADDITIONAL WATER SUPPLY FOR COUNTY ASYLUM. Under Resolution No. 38, dated November 27th, 1946, the amount of \$5,000.00 was appropriated for the purpose of conducting a test of an old well on the County Asylum premises for the purpose of determining its capacity and provide for the necessary repairs to obtain desired results. After considerable effort we were able to obtain the services of the George L. Smith & Co. and the Nelson Machine Co., who have succeeded in increasing the well's capacity from 65 to 130 gallons per minute by removing a 3½-inch pipe from within the 6-inch outer casing and replacing a 1-inch air line with a 1¼-inch air line. It has been further recommended that a new 180-pound compression tank be installed to replace the one now in use and make certain repairs to the pump proper, as well as to the electrical controls. These costs have not been ascertained as of this date, but we feel confident that the entire cost will

as well as to the electrical controls. These costs have not been ascertained as of this date, but we feel confident that the entire cost will not exceed \$1,000.00.

RESPIRATORY CHAMBER. The Respiratory Chamber, for which an appropriation was made in the 1947 budget, was placed in operation on April 4th, 1947. The excellent results obtained prompted the trustees to order a second chamber, subject to the approval of the County Board of Supervisors. This chamber was placed in operation in July, 1947. Dr. Bellis is of the opinion that with the use of these chambers the period of individual confinement in the institution could be reduced by 60%. Your Committee is wholeheartedly in account with any up-to-date means in treating tuberculosis and recommends the passage of the resolution to be presented authorizing the purchase of this second chamber.

SEWAGE PUMPING STATION AND FORCED MAIN. Information has been received by Dr. Byron Hughes from Charles A. Halbert, State has been received by Dr. Byron Hughes from Charles A. Halbert, State Engineer, that bids on the sanitary sewer system for the State and County Institutions will be taken within the next two weeks. Consultation with the City Clerk of the City of Oshkosh revealed that the City of Oshkosh has erected the pumping station at Murdock and Bowen Streets, and that all facilities to receive State and County Institutions sewage at that point will be in readiness sometime in February.

GRANARY AND MACHINE SHOP. On July 15th, 1947, a resolution calling for an appropriation to cover plans and specifications designed to utilize a portion of the County Home Building wrecked by fire for a Granary and Machine Shop was referred back to your Committee for further information and data. Your Committee is not as yet prepared to give a comprehensive report in this matter.

Resolution Adopting and Approving the Execution of the Sponsor's Assurance Agreement to Be Submitted to the Administrator of Civil Aeronautics, U. S. Department of Commerce, to Obtain Federal Aid in the Development of Winnebago County Airport.

SECTION 1. That Winnebago County shall enter into a Sponsor's Assurance Agreement for the purpose of obtaining Federal aid in the

SECTION 2. That the Chairman of the County Board, J. F. SPONSOR'S ASSURANCE AGREEMENT

Section I

1. For and in consideration of the execution by the United States of a Grant Agreement obligating the United States to pay a portion of the allowable project costs of a project for development of the Winnebago County Airport under the provisions of the Federal Airport Act, and the Regulations promulgated thereunder, the Winnebago County, Wisconsin, hereinafter called the "sponsor," for itself, its successors, or assigns does hereby covenant and agree with the United States as follows:

a. AN terms used in this Agreement which are defined in the Federal Airport Act, and the Regulations promulgated thereunder, shall have the meaning given to them in such Act and Regulations.

b. Insofar as legally possible, the sponsor will maintain a master plan of the airport, including building areas, approach areas, and landing areas indicating wreathers. pian of the airport, including building areas, approach areas, and landing areas indicating present and future proposed development commensurate with the airport and with current approval of the Administrator; and in establishing additional improvements, the sponsor will conform to such master plan or approved changes thereto.

c. During the term of this agreement, the airport will be operated continuously as such and for no other purpose and will at all times be operated for the use and benefit of the public, on fair and reasonable terms and without unjust discrimination.

d. The sponsor will not hereafter use or permit the use of the airport exclusively for air carrier operations, unless there are ofher public airport facilities in the area adequate to serve other types of users; it will not grant, exercise, or permit the exercise of any exclusive right for use of the airport by one air carrier operator, or for rental of aircraft to the public, for conducting charter flights, or for operating a flying school, and that, after the date of this agreement, it will not grant or authorize the grant of exclusive right at the airport for selling aircraft aircraft rarks or equipment, or for renairing aircraft and enaircraft, aircraft parts or equipment, or for repairing aircraft and enaircrait, aircrait parts or equipment, or for repairing aircrait and eligines, or for carrying on other airport services or fixed base operations
of an aeronautical nature. Nothing contained herein shall be construed
to waive or abrogate the requirements of Section 303 of the Civil Aeronautics Act of 1938. In the interest of safety, the Administrator may
waive in writing compliance with any or all the provisions of this subcertion. section.

e. Except as provided in d, above, the sponsor will permit all qualified operators, on reasonable terms and without unjust discrimination, to use the airport for any aeronautical business or operation up to the capacity of the airport.

f. The sponsor will not hereafter grant to any one an exclusive right

to sell aviation gasoline or oil.

g. During the term of this agreement the sponsor will continuously maintain in good and serviceable condition and repair the entire airport and all buildings and other improvements, facilities, and equipment, other than facilities or equipment owned or controlled by the United States; provided, however, in meeting this requirement the airport is not expected to be operated and maintained for aeronautical uses during temporary periods when climatic or flood conditions interfere substantially with operation and maintenance during such periods. Essential facilities, including night lighting systems, when installed, will be operated in such a manner as to assure their availability to all users

of the airport.

h. The sponsor will replace and repair all buildings, structures, and facilities developed under the project if such are destroyed or damaged, replacing or restoring them to a condition comparable to that preceding

the destruction or damage.

 If the land or improvements thereon, acquired or developed under the project, are sold, condemned, or otherwise disposed of, wholly or in part, the United States will be reimbursed in proportion to its original investment in the property so disposed of, but not exceeding its original share in the portions so disposed of, except that if the proceeds are used by the sponsor for airport purposes within two years or if a transfer is made pursuant to this agreement to another public agency or agencies for operation as an airport, there shall be no reimbursement to the United States.

j. Insofar as is within its powers and reasonably possible the sponsor will prevent the use of any land either within or outside the boundaries of the airport, including the construction, erection, alteration, or growth of any structure or other object thereon, which would be a hazard to the landing, taking-off, and maneuvering of aircraft at the airport, or otherwise limits its usefulness as an airport. With respect to land outside the boundaries of the airport, the sponsor will remove or cause to be removed any growth, structure, or other object thereon which would be a hazard to the landing, taking-off, or maneuvering of aircraft at the

airport, or when such is not feasible, it will mark or light such growth, structure, or other object. The airport approach standards to be followed in this connection shall be those established by the Administrator in Office of Airport Drawing No. 672 dated September 1, 1946, unless otherwise authorized by the Administrator. Insofar as legally possible, the sponsor will adopt and enforce zoning ordinances and regulations as defined in the above mentioned drawing, prohibiting the creation, establishment, erection, and construction of hazards to air navigation; or insofar as reasonably possible, will acquire such easements or other interests in lands and air space as may be necessary to perform the covenants of this paragraph.

k. All facilities of the airport developed with Federal aid and all k. All facilities of the airport developed with rederal aid and all those usable for the landing and taking-off of aircraft will be available to the United States at all times without charge for use by military and naval aircraft in common with other aircraft, except, if the use by military and naval aircraft shall be substantial, a reasonable share, proportional to such use, of the cost of operating and maintaining fa-

cilities so used, may be charged.

1. The sponsor will furnish to any civil agency of the United States, without charge (except for light, heat, janitor service, and similar facilities and services at the reasonable cost thereof), such space in airport buildings as may be reasonably adequate for use in connection with any airport traffic control activities, weather-reporting activities and communications activities related to airport air traffic control, which are necessary to the safe and efficient operation of the airport and which such agency may deem necessary to establish and maintain at

the airport.

m. The sponsor will maintain a current system of airport accounts m. The sponsor will maintain a current system of airport accounts and records, using a system of its own choice, sufficient to provide annual statements of income and expense, balance sheet and affiliated fiscal reporting. It shall, upon reasonable request, furnish the Administrator with annual or special financial and operations reports. Such reports may be submitted to the Administrator on forms furnished by him, or may be submitted in such other manner as the sponsor elects, provided the essential data is furnished. The airport and all airport accounts and records will be available for inspection at any time, upon reasonable request by the regional Superintendent of Airports or his reasonable request, by the regional Superintendent of Airports or his authorized representatives.

n. The sponsor will not enter into any transaction which would operate to deprive it of any of the rights and powers necessary to perform any or all of the covenants made herein, unless by such transaction the obligation to perform all such covenants is assumed by another tion the obligation to periorm all such covenants is assumed by another public agency eligible under the Regulations issued pursuant to the Federal Airport Act, to assume such obligations and having the power, authority, and financial resources to carry out all such obligations. WELFARE COMMITTEE-OLD AGE ASSISTANCE FUNERALS

The following Report No. 5 was read:

TO THE WINNEBAGO COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS: Gentlemen:

Your Welfare Committee begs leave to recort that they have met with the Funeral Directors of Winnebago County, pursuant to their requests and have discussed the matter of burial of indigent persons under the jurisdiction of the Winnebago County Pension Department.

That they have been advised by said Funeral Directors that due to the increasing costs of labor, the increased costs of material, the in-creased cost of hearses and the discontinuance of the making of the two cheaper grades of caskets, plus the fact that they are not permitted to use wooden rough boxes in many places, that they are unable to provide a proper and suitable burial for such indigent persons at the present rate of \$100.00.

That there is a general feeling of dissatisfaction among some people that in certain instances the burial of indigent persons in the past has not been satisfactory, and that some more appropriate burials should be given such persons.

That pursuant to a change in the law made and provided for by the 1947 Legislature, the amount that may be allowed for burial of Old Age Pensioners has been raised from \$100.00 to \$150.00. That your undertakers have agreed that they will provide the same type of burial for dependent children, blind and other indigent persons not receiving old age assistance for \$100.00 as would be given Old Age Pensioners for \$150.00 because of the few cases of that type.

That your funeral directors have exhibited a picture of a casket which will be used for burials under the proposed \$150.00 burial, and will also be used for the other cases hereinbefore mentitioned for \$100.00, which picture is on file in the Pension Director's Office.

That your Welfare Committee desires an expression from the County Board as to what action they deem proper for them to take in the matter.

AVIATION COMMITTEE-AIRPORT LIGHTING

The following Report No. 6 was read: TO THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF WINNEBAGO COUNTY, WIS.

Gentlemen:

Your Aviation Committee wishes to make the following report in connection with the status of lighting of the Winnebago County Airport.

The enticipated cost of installation of runway lights, sewer, water, and power to amdinistration area is approximately \$60,000.00. Of this cost one-helf will be forthormine in the form of a Federal grant, and the sum of approximately \$11,000.00 will be in the form of State aid, and the balance of approximately \$19,000,00 will be paid for out of county funds. The State and Federal grants will not be made until the removal of certain obstructions, consisting principally of a high line on the Soo Line Railway being lowered or removed. The railroad has indicated to the committee that it will remove one high line completely, and is agreeable to lowering another, which are in the vicinity of Northeast, Southwest, Fast, and West runways. The Chief Engineer of the railroad has indicated that it would reduce this representation to writing for filing with the application, and the committee is hopeful that the grant will thereupon be approved.

The committee contemplates purchasing and installing lights approximately 27 to 36 inches high, 200 feet apart, and placed 10 feet cn either side of the runway. The committee has concluded, from investigation, that any other type of lighting is now obsolete, and that the proposed installation is the most modern and efficient procurable.

WHEREAS, the said Winnebago County, being a municipality of the State of Wisconsin, authorized by law (Section 114.11, Wisconsin Statutes) to acquire, establish, construct, own, control, lease, equip, improve, maintain and operate an airport and being an eligible sponsor of an airport development project with federal aid as provided by Section 2 (a) (7) of the Federal Airport Act, and having initiated a federal and state aid airport development project, namely, the Winnebago County Airport project, by petition filed with the State Aeronautics Commission; and the hearing in the matter having been held and a finding generally favorable to the development petitioned for having been rendered by the Commission, including an approximate estimate of the costs and the amount to be paid by Winnebago County; all as provided by Section 114.33, Wisconsin Statutes; and Winnebago County desiring as sponsor to develop the said airport project, and having acted toward providing its share of the estimated cost and notified the Commission as required by law; and desiring to proceed as provided by the applicable regulations of the Civil Aeronautics Administration:

regulations and applicable laws of this state:

AND the Commission being authorized (Section 114.32 (1), Wisconsin Statutes) to accept, receive and receipt for federal monies and other monies on behalf of the state or any municipality thereof for the acquisition, construction, improvement, maintenance and operation of an airport and other aeronautical facilities upon such terms and conditions as are or may be prescribed by the laws of the United States, and an airport and other aeronautical facilities upon such terms and conutions as are or may be prescribed by the laws of the United States, and to render financial assistance to spensors in matching federal aid (Section 114.35 (1), Wisconsin Statutes) and to act as agent of any mucipality of the state upon its request, in accepting, receiving and recipting for such monies in its behalf for airports, and in contracting for the acquisition, improvement, maintenance or operation of airports financed either in whole or in part by federal monies; and the governing body of any municipality being authorized to designate the Commission as its agent for such purposes and enter into an agreement

with it prescribing the terms and conditions of such agency;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Winnebago County Poard of Supervisors, Winnebago County, Wisconsin, that the Wisconsin State Aeronautics Commission be, and hereby is, designated as its agent and requested to act as such in all matters having to do with accepting, receiving and receipting for and disbursing all monies that may become available for the airport project and in making all receivary arrangements for its execution, including particularly all dealings with the Admen's for its execution, including particularly all dealings with the Administrator of Civil Aeronautics, Civil Aeronautics Administration, that may be involved in the acquisition of the site, the submission of the project request, the execution of the Sponsor's Assurance Agreement, the submission of the project application, the acceptance of the grant agreement and the arranging for executing its terms; payments of the United States' share of the costs of the project when due; and in the final acceptance of the costs of the project when due; and in the final acceptance of the completed project, all in accordance with the
