ORGANIZATION MEETING Tuesday, April 20, 1982

By Virture of Chapter 59.04 (1) (c) of the Wisconsin Statues, the April Session of the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors is called to order for the purpose of organization and doing any and all business which according to law may come before the board.

The Winnebago County Board of Supervisors was called to order at 6:00 p.m., in the Supervisors Room, Courthouse, Oshkosh, Wisconsin by the County Clerk Dorthy L. Propp.

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. The meeting was opened with the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag and Invocation by the Reverend Gilbert O. Halverson.

The Honorable Judge William E. Crane, Honorable Judge Thomas S. Williams, Honorable Judge Robert A. Hawley and the Honorable Judge Robert A. Hasse administred the Oath of Office to the newly elected supervisors.

Roll Call showed full board present.

Mr. James P. Coughlin welcomed the supervisors and introduced the Winnebago County Elected Officials and the department heads of the Courthouse.

The Reverend Gilbert O. Halverson concluded the ceremony with benediction.

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The first order of business was the election of a Chairman for the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors for a term of two years.

- 1983: Continuance of the County's full payment of the single premium. Increase of \$10.00 in the County's payment of monthly family premiums (single premium plus \$75.00).

2. RETIREMENT (Article 28)

- 1982: Increase in the County's monthly contribution toward the employee's share of retirement costs by \$12.00 to a total of \$47.00.
- 1983: Increase in the County's monthly contribution toward the employee's share of retirement costs by \$12.00 to a total of \$59.00.

3. POSITION UPGRADES (Appendix A)

- 1982: a. Upgrade in the pay for the position of Case Aide I by \$15.00 per month beyond the normal salary adjustment rate provided.
 - b. Creation of a new classification of Case Aide III - Lead Worker with a new maximum base pay rate of \$50.09 per month above that of Case Aide II.
- 1983: Upgrade in the pay for the position of Case Aide I by \$25.00 per month beyond the normal salary adjustment rate provided.
- 4. WAGES (Appendix A & B)
 - **1982:** 7.0% across-the-board for all positions effective 1-1-82.
 - 1983: 7.5% across-the-board for all positions effective 1-1-83.
- 5. HOLIDAYS (Article 11)

6. OVERTIME (Article 21)

7. SICK LEAVE (Article 13)

1982: Effective as of the contract signature date, retiring employees would be eligible for a cashpayment for half of their accumulated unused sick leave in excess of 30 days. Maximum total payment eligibility of 45 days' pay provided.

8. LONG TERM DISABILITY INSURANCE (Article 18)

1983: Provision for long term disability income protection insurance for all employees. Total County premium liability in 1983 is \$5,000.

9. FAIR SHARE (Article 26)

Addition of a new provision in the Fair Share article holds the County harmless in the event of any dispute or litigation involving the deduction of the equivalent of union dues from the wages of non-union but represented employees.

In addition to the above, the new contract provides for minor alterations to contract language in the articles covering layoff, job posting and holiday dates.

CREATE SECTION 9.04 OF THE CODE OF GENERAL ORDINANCES: PUBLIC PEACE AND GOOD ORDER

The following Ordinance was presented April 27, 1982 TO THE WINNEBAGO COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS:

WHEREAS, sec. 342.40(3), Stats., authorizes counties to enact and enforce an ordinance governing the removal and disposal of abandoned vehicles and provide a forfeiture in addition to providing for the recovery of the cost of impounding and disposing of the vehicle.

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the provisions of sec. 342.40(3), Stats., the County Board of Supervisors of the County of Winnebago does ordain as follows:

CREATED SECTION 9.04 IS ATTACHED HERETO Submitted by, JUDICIARY AND PUBLIC SAFETY COMMITTEE

PUBLIC PEACE AND GOOD ORDER 9.04

9.04 ABANDONED VEHICLES.

(1) AUTHORITY. This section of the Code is adopted under the authority granted by S.342.40(3), Wis. Stats.

(2) JURISDICTION. This section of the Code shall apply in the unincorporated areas of the County.

(3) VEHICLE ABANDONMENT PROHIBITED. No person shall leave unattended any motor vehicle, trailer, semitrailer or mobile home on any public highway or private or public property, for such time and under such circumstances as to cause the vehicle to reasonably appear to have been abandoned. Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, whenever any vehicle has been left unattended without the permission of the property owner for more than 72 hours, the vehicle is deemed abandoned and constitutes a public nuisance. A motor vehicle shall not be considered an abandoned motor vehicle when it is out of ordinary public view, or when designated as not abandoned by the Sheriff or his duly authorized representative.

(4) REMOVAL AND IMPOUNDMENT OF ABANDONED VEHICLES.

(a) <u>Removal</u>. Any sheriff's deputy who discovers any motor vehicle, trailer, semitrailer, or mobile home on any public highway or private or public property which has been abandoned shall cause the vehicle to be removed to a suitable place of impoundment. Upon removal of the vehicle, the deputy shall notify the sheriff of the abandonment and of the location of the impounded vehicle.

(b) <u>Impoundment</u>. Any vehicle in violation of this section of the Code shall be impounded until lawfully claimed or disposed of under sub. (5) except if the Sheriff or his duly authorized representative determines that the cost of towing and storage charges for the impoundment would exceed the value of the vehicle, then, the vehicle may be junked or sold by the County prior to expiration of the impoundment period upon determination by the Sheriff that the vehicle is not stolen or otherwise wanted for evidence or other reason. All substantially complete vehicles in excess of 19 model years of age shall be disposed of in accordance with sub. (5).

(5) DISPOSAL OF ABANDONED VEHICLE.

(a) <u>Notice to Owner and Lienholders</u>. Any vehicle which is deemed abandoned by the Sheriff or his duly authorized representative and not disposed of under sub. (4), shall be retained in storage for a minimum period of 10 days after certified mail notice has been sent to the owner and lienholders of record to permit reclamation of the vehicle after payment of accrued charges. Such notice shall set forth the year, make, model, and serial number of the abandoned motor vehicle, the place where the vehicle is being held, and shall inform the owner and any lienholders of their right to reclaim the vehicle. The notice shall state that the failure of the owner or lienholders to exercise their rights to reclaim the vehicle under this section of the Code shall be deemed a waiver of all right, title, and interest in the vehicle and a consent to the sale of the vehicle.

(b) <u>Sale of Vehicle</u>. Each retained vehicle not reclaimed by its owner or lienholder may be sold. The County may dispose of the vehicle by sealed bid or auction sale. At such sale, the highest bid for any such motor vehicle shall be accepted unless the same is deemed inadequate by the Sheriff or his duly authorized representative, in which event, all bids may be rejected. If all bids are rejected or no bid is received, the County may either readvertise the sale, adjourn the sale to a

definite date, sell the motor vehicle at a private sale or junk the vehicle. Any interested person may offer bids on each abandoned vehicle to be sold. The description of the vehicle and terms of sale shall be published as a Class 1 notice and posted not less than five (5) days before the The posting of the notice at the Sheriff's sale. department shall be in the same form as the certified mail notice sent to the owner or lienholders of record. Upon sale of an abandoned vehicle, the County shall supply the purchaser with a completed form designed by the department enabling the purchaser to obtain a regular certificate of title for the vehicle. The purchaser shall have 10 days to remove the vehicle from the storage area, but shall pay a storage fee of \$2.00 for each day the vehicle remains in storage after the 2nd business day subsequent to the sale date. Ten days after the sale, the purchaser shall forfeit all interest in the vehicle and the vehicle shall be deemed abandoned and may be sold again. Any listing of vehicles to be sold by the County shall be made available to any interested person or organization which makes a written request for such list. The County may charge a fee of \$2.00 for the list.

(c) <u>Disposition of Proceeds of Sale</u>. After deducting the expenses of impoundment and sale, the balance of the proceeds, if any, shall be paid into the County treasury.

(6) RESPONSIBILITY OF OWNER. The owner of any abandoned vehicle, except a stolen vehicle, is responsible for the abandoment and all costs of impounding and disposing of the vehicle. Costs not recovered from the sale of the vehicle may be recovered in a civil action by the County against the owner. Whether or not the County recovers the cost of towing and enforcement, the County shall be responsible to the towing service for requisitional towing service and reasonable charges for impoundment.

(7) NOTICE OF SALE. Within 5 days after the sale or disposal of a vehicle as provided in sub.(4) or (5), the County shall advise the State Motor Vehicle Department of the sale or disposition on a form supplied by the department.

COUNTY EXECUTIVE'S REPORT

Mr. James P. Coughlin presented his report to the County Board outlining to the new supervisors the various activities of the departments and the future activities and programs. Mr. Coughlin recommended extending

snowmobile trails. Nature trails at Waukau. Boat landings should be established east of Winneconne and Wolf River. Highway 21 should be worked on and promoted. The Landfill Site will be interested in more land very shortly. The Airport should continue to promote aviation to the industry. Winnebago will host Alice in Dairyland in 1983 and in 1985 will host Farm Progress Day. Mr. Coughlin told the County Board that Winnebago County could be proud of their elected county officials. Eventually the fifth floor of the Courthouse will house Circuit Court Mr. Couahlin asked that the board consider additional 5. parking space for the courthouse in the future.

COUNTY EXECUTIVE'S FINANCIAL REPORT

Winnebago County's Financial condition continued to improve in 1981 as evidenced by the increase in overall fund balance. General fund balance, both designated and undesignated increased to \$8,162,876 from \$7,748,083, an incease of \$414,793. This improvement was a combination of two main factors - revenues were higher than anticipated due to the high interest earning \$915,203 and secondly the County's actual expenditures were less than budgeted amounts due to the restraint exercised by the department heads.

Due to the excellant financial condition, Winnebago County was able to increase the amount of fund surplus used to balance the 1982 budget. This designated fund balance was increased to \$2,775,048 for 1982 versus \$1,670,092 in 1981. This allowed Winnebago County to again reduce both its overall equalized tax rate, and the total tax levy dollars in 1982 compared to the 1981 tax rate. In this era of high inflation and economic stagflation, Winnebago County has been able to offer its taxpayer some relief.

The increased use of fund surplus to balance the budget has reduced our undesignated (Unrestricted) fund balance to \$5,387,828 in 1981 versus \$6,077,991 in 1980. Winnebago County has been following this prudent practice of using some accumulated surplus to assist in offering property tax relief and will continue to do so as long as it is financially prudent.

In addition to improving the over all County financial condition, we are in the process of reorganizing our present financial reporting capabilities. This is being accomplished by centralizing our finance department. During the past several years, the finance department has centralized many of the receivables and billings along with the purchasing functions in order to determine some

42

accountability and set up better internal control over county assets.

Recently, with the mutual agreement of the social services and finance, several financial functions and positions were transferred in an effort to continue this process. Upon completion and implementation of the new financial software system, the County further hopes to continue this process by pulling in other financial functions - notably at Park View Health Center and the Highway Department. When this centralization process is complete, the County will be in a better position to issue monthly financial statements and provide current, timely financial information both to the County Executive's office and to the County Board. Being better informed on a more timely basis will allow us to make Winnebago County a better place to live.

PUBLIC HEARING

Mrs. Barbara Galica, secretary of the Fair Association, presented a report to the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors as follows:

The W.C.F.A. met at a Stockholders meeting on April 28, in the Courthouse Lounge to dissolve the present corporation. We worked under the guidance of Mary Gunderson, Coorporation specialist from Madison. We met to dissolve and vote to accept our new reorganization system.

After the meeting we finished paper work and while Mary was preparing to file the same, she discovered our State report which George Ryf files, showed 800 shares whereas we actually have only 147 existing. The 800 was never changed from the time it was formed in 1910.

Because of this we needed to file a corrected report showing those dead are left untransferred, and thus have another meeting with a current voting list. Leo is currently working on this item. We presently are operating under the old organization because until a new filing takes place we are still a legal group.

A new meeting is set and another attempt will be made.

At the time we accept the new by-laws and articles the high points in my opinion are that anyone can become a stockholder for one year at the cost of \$10.00. This will encourage you to attend meetings and take an active part in the future of the fairgrounds.

Also it will clear up the fact that the present stock was considered a donation or membership fee and there is no value to it.

Also the Directors will be on a three year rotation schedule 7 for three years, 6 for 2 years and 6 for one year. At the end of each year they can be re-elected or changed.

Directors of the fair, and they are 19, have the obligation of attending all fair meetings and evaluating procedures, problems, and new ideas the management has. They make the final decisions as to how fair management may explore possibilities or spend.

Next comes the Executive Board. The Executive Board meets prior to each board meeting to discuss current items, initial bills for the Secretary to pay and read correspondence. They evaluate fair schedules and make final decisions on fees to be charged during fair. They will be included in long range planning and improving of grounds. They currently include: Phil Grundy, Gordon Raddatz, Arden Winkenwerder, Fred Behlendorf, George Ryf and Mark Krings.

Our President Phil Grundy is our direct person to report all items of discussion too. He makes final decisions in the event of a tie and evaluates and changes requests other than our guidelines of operation.

Our Secretary-Treasurer, George Ryf, is a receiving and paying secretary. He checks all bills and payments, records, deposits and issues checks authorized by the Executive Board to be paid. As Treasurer he works closely with our accountant firm, Clifton Gunderson & Co. and files necessary State reports.

The managers are Leo and Barb Galica. Leo is full time day and night managing events and improvements going on steadily at the grounds. He does the lay outs, issuing of contracts, insurances, and all physical changes and State Inspections.

Barb spends evenings and weekends, June 3rd thru August 29th full time writing contracts, advertising, promotional stories, contacting new leassee's, concessions and employment. She also is recorder at all meetings and sends out all pertinent letters. She is responsible for ordering, horseshows, craft/flea markets and now bingo. She is Agent for the Bingo license while Leo is agent for the beer license.

Maintenance and grounds upkeep is done by Mike Galica and Robin Miller, two young men who have been employed part-time by the Fair for the past eight years.

At this time I'm going to into events and activities. As you probably are aware we have but one building that can be heated and that is the Maxwell building. The heaters are very bad, somewhat antiques. But struggle along, Leo goes on the roof and continues to light and restart them. They'll suffice until we have some money to improve upon them.

You have a fair schedule that will implemented in August of 1982. The only thing omitted on it are some admission charges that must be approved by the Executive Board.

Also is an off-season rental schedule. Keeping up with additions has put us up to the 5th draft in only April. I'm sure there'll be more additions.

New, starting June 2, will be Bingo. To update you an organization must be non-profit, their help must be volunteer and no wages paid to anyone working. The proceeds which we are currently estimating at \$800.00 per night must be spent back into grounds improvements or charity. Naturally I chose the grounds improvement specified a new-heating system for our Maxwell building. By playing the two nites a month I feel by fall I can replace the existing heating system and possibly continue on throughout the year.

Another new idea I've proposed to my Executive Board and am waiting for their support is my fall finale is "Fun in Fairgrounds Park". This I hope to make into a big event annually. At this time I have the following idea. Starting on Friday, September 24 and running thru Šunday, September 26. The Maxwell building will house a Craft/Flea Market, the Grandstand will house the Pet and Animal World-from City to Farm animal care, the Exposition building will house the Home, Sports and Energy Conservation Show. The Sheep & Swine Hall will provide free space for all clubs and organizations that wish to promote membership drives, explain their purposes etc. This could include Boy Scouts to Police Explorer groups, Kiwanis to Noon Optomists, Mental Health, Social Service and the like. In the Pavilion I hope to inspire our High Schools and local University to take part in continuous performances. On Friday nite the infield will provide for baseball games for men, on Saturday afternoon a game for teen boys and Sunday P.M. a pre-teen group. Saturday nite between 7:00 P.M. to 11:00 P.M. a concrete dance between the Grandstand and the Expo. building with music provided by a local dance band.

Saturday afternoon could provide for our scheduled Horse show. I feel I want this admission free with income to finance from beer and food stands, rent from Craft/Flea Market and space from the Home, Sports and Energy Conservation Show.

I will ask my board for their final approval at our next meeting schedule shortly and wish to get a verbal approval from you.

At this point I feel that I have talked long enough, I hope I have introduce you to the operation of your local fairgrounds and want you to take an active part in our operation. I need your support and this means I need YOU I'm asking each one of you ta take my schedule there! that's in your packet, also the off-season schedule and mark the dates on your calendar. When it fits into your schedule I wish each of you would come to my office and check in for the amount of time you'll be present. At this time I'll be requesting you to host our State Inspectors, Judges, Show Personnel and other dignitaries that come daily. I feel you represent the city and county and can give them the welcome we now lack. I can't take time out to leave my office so I feel you people are very valuable to me at this point.

Last, but certainly a new high point - 1 am about finished preparing an informational folder 1 plan to produce to hand out with every lease and contract. This folder will contain local businesses and industries who will provide service to large or small shows with services whether it be food, housing, repairs, towing or selling of new. Hours and times of availability will be published so that we can help our customers better. I became aware of this need at our horseshow in September when a large horse carrier had a damaged tire and our help was another show person from Michigan who loaned a spare with a promise of return at another show.

The Winnebago County Board of Supervisors was called to order at 6:00 p.m., in the Supervisors' Room, Courthouse, Oshkosh, Wisconsin by the Chairman Herman J. Brandt.

Roll Call showed full board present with the exception of the following excused supervisors: Kettner, Warning and Jero.

The meeting was opened with the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag and Invocation by Supervisor Daggett.

Motion made by Supervisor J.C. Pawlowski and seconded that the minutes for the meeting held on May 18, 1982 be approved as printed. CARRIED by Voice Vote.

A communication from Nick Dane Hansen, 402 Ninth Street, Neenah, Wisconsin presenting a claim for payment for the use by the County of the strip of land that runs the length of the rear parking lot of the county's building on 211 North Commercial Street, Neenah was read. Referred to the Buildings & Grounds Committee.

COUNTY EXECUTIVE REPORT

Mr. James P. Coughlin, County Executive, presented his report to the County Board. Mr. Coughlin informed the board members that the Oshkosh Congress Avenue Bridge

would be dedicated on July 16, 1982. On June 7, a treeplanting ceremony was held at the Social Service Building ground recognizing Child Abuse Week. The Federal Census for Winnebago County as of April 1, 1980 is estimated to be 131,772 and housing units 49,751. The Twin City Office Building has been renovated and when completed will be in first-class condition with new carpeting and furniture. Mr. Coughlin recommended that the strip of land in question at the Twin City Office Building be purchased by the county. The Fifth Floor remodeling at the Courthouse is almost completed and a study will be made to determine the feasibility of moving a court room on the fifth floor of the Courthouse. A personnel study will also be made of the employees of the Clerk of Courts. A contract has been signed for Computer mapping for \$99,000. County saved \$20,000 by receiving a State Grant. The amount of interest Winnebago County received for the month of May was \$1,200,000. Winnebago County has been the recipient of three national awards - Tactical Squad, Therapeutic Community Unit and the Industrial Development Board. Mr. Coughlin recommended to the board members adoption of the contract for the Winnebago County Employees Courthouse Association.

Supervisor Broas who was recently elected Chairperson of the Wisconsin Association to Social Services Board recommended adoption of Resolutions 6 and 14. Supervisor Broas outlined her duties as President of the Wisconsin Association.

COUNTY BOARD CHAIRMAN'S APPOINTMENT - COUNTY LIBRARY STUDY COMMITTEE

Chairman Herman J. Brandt submitted his appointee, Mrs. Geneva Laabs, to the County Library Study Committee, to fill the unexpired term of Joseph Olson. Motion made by Supervisor R. Olson and seconded to approve the appointment. CARRIED by Voice Vote.

CREATE SECTION 9.06 OF THE CODE OF GENERAL ORDINANCES: PUBLIC PEACE AND GOOD ORDER: PROHIBIT CERTAIN ACTS BY MINORS AND OTHER PERSONS RELATING TO ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES

The following Ordinance No. 8 was presented:

TO THE WINNEBAGO COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

WHEREAS, Chapter 79, Laws of Wisconsin, 1981, created \$125.10(1), Stats., which enables a county to adopt an ordinance regulating the possession or procurement of beer and liquor by minors and the furnishing of intoxicants to minors; and

WHEREAS, your Judiciary and Public Safety Committee recommends that the County Board enact an Ordinance prohibiting certain acts by minors and other persons relating to alcoholic beverages.

NOW, THEREFORE, the County Board of Supervisors of the County of Winnebago, does ordain as follows:

CREATED SECTION 9.06 IS ATTACHED HERETO

PUBLIC PEACE AND GOOD ORDER 9.06

9.06 PROHIBIT CERTAIN ACTS BY MINORS AND OTHER PERSONS RELATING TO ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES. (1) AUTHORITY. This section of the Code is adopted under the authority granted by \$125.10(1), Stats.

(2) RESTRICTIONS AS TO MINORS.

(a) SALES OF ALCOHOL BEVERAGES TO MINORS.

Stat. Ref \$125.07(1) (a)1. No person shall procure for, sell, dispense or give away any fermented malt beverages to any person under the age of 18 years not accompanied by his or her parent, guardian or adult spouse, or procure for, sell, dispense or give away any intoxicating liquor to any person under the age of 18 years.

(b) PRESENCE OF MINORS IN PLACES OF SALE.

Stat. Ref \$125.07(3)(a). No person under the age of 18 years, not accompanied by his or her parent, guardian or adult spouse, may enter or be on the premises for which a license or permit for the retail sale of alcohol beverages has been issued, for any purpose except the transaction of business pertaining to licensed premises with or for the licensee or his or her employee. The business may not be amusement or the purchase, receiving or consumption of edibles or beverages or similar activities which normally constitute activities of a customer of the premises. This section does not apply to:

(1) A person under the age of 18 years who is a resident, employee, lodger or boarder on the premises controlled by the proprietor, licensee or permittee of which the licensed premises consists or is a part.

(2) A person under the age of 18 who enters or is on a "Class A" retail intoxicating liquor premises for the purchasing edibles or beverages other than alcohol beverages. Any person under the age of 18 years so entering the premises may not remain on the premises after the purchase.

(3) Hotels, drug stores, grocery stores, bowling alleys, cars operated by any railroad, regularly established athletic fields, stadiums or public facilities as defined in §125.51(5)(b)1.d., Wis. Stats., which are owned by a county or municipality.

(4) Concessions authorized on State-owned premises in the State parks and State forests as defined or designated in Chs. 27 and 28, Wis. Stats., and parks owned or operated by agricultural societies. PUBLIC PEACE AND GOOD ORDER 9.06(2)(b)(5)

(5) Ski chalets and golf clubhouse.

(6) Premises operated under both a Class "B" fermented malt beverage or a "Class B" intoxicating liquor license or permit and a restaurant permit where the principal business conducted is that of a restaurant. If the premises are operated under both a Class "B" fermented malt beverage or "Class B" intoxicating liquor license or permit and a restaurant permit, the principal business conducted is presumed to be the sale of alcohol beverages, but the presumption may be rebutted by competent evidence.

(7) A person under the age of 18 years who enters or remains on a Class "B" fermented malt beverage premises or a "Class B" intoxicating liquor licensed premises for the purpose of transacting business at an auction or market as defined in \$125.32(4)(b)1., Wis. Stats., if the person does not enter or remain in a room where alcohol beverages are sold or furnished.

(c) MISREPRESENTATION OF AGE.

(1) No person shall represent that he or she is 18 years of age or over for the purpose of receiving alcohol beverages from a licensee or permittee. Stat, Ref. \$125.07(5)

(2) Proof of the following facts by a seller of alcohol beverages to a person under the age of 18 years is a defense to any prosecution for a violation of this section: Stat. Ref. § 125.07(6)

(a) That the purchaser falsely represented in writing and supported with other documentary proof that he or she was 18 years of age or over.

(b) That the appearance of the purchaser was such that an ordinary and prudent person would believe the purchaser to be 18 years of age or over.

(c) That the sale was made in good faith and in reliance on the written representation and appearance of the purchaser in the belief that the purchaser was 18 years of age or over.

PUBLIC PEACE AND GOOD ORDER 9.06(3)

(3) Every retail alcohol beverage licensee or permittee shall cause a book to be kept for the purposes of this section. The licensee or permittee or his or her employee shall require any person who has shown documentary proof which substantiates that the person is 18 years of age or over to sign the book if the person's age is in question. The book shall show the date of the purchase of the alcohol beverages, the identification used in making the purchase, the address of the purchaser and the purchaser's signature. Stat. Ref. \$125.07(7)

(d) **POSSESSION OR CONSUMPTION IN PUBLIC PLACES.** Stat. Ref. § 125.07(4) No person under the age of 18 years not accompanied by his or her parent, guardian, or adult spouse shall knowingly possess or consume in public any intoxicating liquor or fermented malt beverage. This section shall not prevent a person under the age of 18 years in the employ of a licensee or permittee from possessing fermented malt beverages for sale or delivery to customers.

(e) **POSSESSION ON SCHOOL GROUNDS.** (1) PRO-HIBITED. Except as provided by sub. (2), no person shall possess or consume alcohol beverages: (Stat. Ref. § 125.09(2)(b)

(a) On school premises.

(b) In a motor vehicle, if a pupil attending the school is in the motor vehicle.

(c) While participating in school sponsored activities.

(2) **EXCEPTIONS.** (Stat. Ref. §125.09(2)(c) Alcohol beverages may be possessed or consumed on school premises, in motor vehicles or by participants in school sponsored activities if specifically permitted in writing by the school administrator consistent with applicable laws and ordinances.

(3) **DEFINITIONS.** (Stat. Ref. § 125.09(2) (a) In this section, terms shall have the meanings prescribed below:

(a) **Motor Vehicle.** A motor vehicle owned, rented or consigned to a school.

(b) **School.** A public, parochial or private school which provides an educational program for one or more grades between grades I and 12 which is commonly known as an elementary school, middle school, junior high school, senior high school or high school.

PUBLIC PEACE AND GOOD ORDER 9.06 (3) (3) (c)

(c) **School Administrator.** The person designated by the governing body of a school as ultimately responsible for the ordinary operations of a school.

(d) **School Premises.** Premises owned, rented or under the control of a school.

(f) **PENALTY.** (1) Any person who commits a violation of this chapter shall be subject to a forfeiture as provided in \$25.04 of this code.

(2) Any person under 18 years of age who commits a violation of this chapter shall be subject to a forfeiture not to exceed \$25.00, except that disposition in proceedings against a person under 18 years of age on the date of disposition shall be provided by \$48.344, Wis. Stats.

(3) Any license or permit issued to a person who commits a violation of this chapter may be revoked by the court.

(4) A violation of this chapter by an authorized agent or employee of a licensee shall constitute a violation by the licensee.

(3) **CITATION METHOD.** The citation procedures established in §778.25(1), Wis. Stats, shall apply to all actions to recover a forfeiture for violations of the following subsections:

- 9.06 (2) (a) 9.06 (2) (b) 9.06 (2) (c)1. 9.06 (2) (d)
- 9.06 (2) (e)

(4) **JURISDICTION.** This section of the Code shall apply within all of Winnebago County except within any city or village or within any town that has adopted or adopts an ordinance under any of the statutory references in sub. (2).

(5) **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section of the Code shall take effect on July 1, 1982.

REMOVE COUNTY ELECTED OFFICIALS FROM WINNEBAGO COUNTY ADMINISTRATIVE SALARY SCHEDULE AND COMPENSATION PROGRAM (HAY STUDY)

WHEREAS, the practice of electing County Officials at stated salaries and then raising those salaries during their term of office has been creating an unfavorable impression on the voters; and

MRS. BARBARA GALICA'S REPORT TO THE COUNTY BOARD County Board Report July 20, 1982

Thank you for allowing me to come back and update you on the Fair and the Fairgrounds.

First, with less than a month before Fairtime the electricity contracted with Witzke Electric is completed with the exception of a couple of 220 connections which will be installed at Fairtime when they see where they are most needed. Extra lighting will be needed in the infield as we have five implement dealers coming in with huge farm displays.

The grandstand is being torn apart for repairs. At this time they have found the repairs as indicated by Stadelman Engineering Inspectors. We hope to have it ready for the Fair.

Booths and outdoor space is pretty well sold out. At this time we are taking reservations for any cancellations of like products.

In the past we have rented pens and cages from the Fond du Lac Fair. We were notified that we could no longer rent them. Since time and money was a factor Leo called the Agricultural Department and agreed to spend 2 days and three men in Fond du Lac to help them repair their equipment. He also agreed to repair it after use so that we could rent them one more year. We must look into securing our own another year. This will be budgeted.

The 4-H exhibitors were 650 in '81 while this year they are down to 630. However since they may bring more entries last year they had 5½ per exhibitor while this year they registered 8½ entries per exhibitor. Open class is on the up swing but since entries are accepted til August I, we do not have a number count. Tentative plans for a tent have been made if the need arises.

Bingo was started at the Fairgrounds the 1st and 3rd Wednesdays of each month. We found that it was difficult to remember which Wednesday we played and the Kiwanis offered to run the other two weeks to help us raise funds, so as of July 28th we will be running Bingo every Wednesday with the hopes that we can install new heating and fans before winter. Adjourned April Meeting (Tuesday, July 20, 1982)

I am meeting with the Saddlebred Association as soon as I leave here tonight. They are designing a new show ring and viewing area for the Charity Horseshow which they plan to be able to come up with complete financing. All horseshows would benefit from this and at this time horses are the thing.

Our fall rental schedule has filled the Maxwell Building. We are getting estimates on heating and installation for the Exposition building. If costs are not too high, this might be possible in the near future and we could lease it year round.

I've extended the time I was allowed. I want to close by telling you that I have been invited to the International Fair Convention in Las Vegas in the end of November to assist in a work session. I have accepted the invitation and will be representing the Winnebago County Fair Association and Winnebago County.

TO SUPPORT THE STATE'S USE OF COUNTIES TO ADMINISTER THE COMMUNITY SERVICES BLOCK GRANT (Dated June 15, 1982)

The following Resolution No. 6 was presented: TO THE WINNEBAGO COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS:

WHEREAS, the Federal Government is now allocating funds to Wisconsin in the form of general community service block grants which are aimed at the provision of services to persons in need of employment, education, health, and/or emergency financial assistance; and

WHEREAS, the State of Wisconsin has historically advocated local control and accountability; and

WHEREAS, counties have established departments of social services and 51.42/51.437 boards which have the statutory authority to provide the kinds of services to be funded under the community services block grant; and

WHEREAS, the various county departments of social services and the 51.42/51.437 systems have demonstrated a high degree of fiscal responsibility and accountability while maintaining quality services; and

WHEREAS, the fragmented distribution of funds to a variety of organizations for similar purposes decreases the funding available for actual services; and WHEREAS, counties have demonstrated their ability to cooperate and plan services without unnecessary duplication or gaps in service through a coordinated planning and budgeting process; and

WHEREAS, the funding of other organizations, such as the community action agencies, further fragments funding; and

WHEREAS, for fiscal year 1983, there is no federal mandate that requires the state to fund community action agencies; and federal legislation stipulates that the state may involve local governments in the administration of the community service block grant programs and funds;

NOW, THEREFORE, LET IT BE RESOLVED, by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors, that the Winnebago County Board supports a state/county partnership in the adminstration of the community services block grants so that related programs can be administered at the local level by county government.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Winnebago County Board supports the practice that the community services block grants planning be accomplished through the established framework of a needs assessment process, coordinated plan and budget, and public hearings.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Winnebago County Board supports the option that would allow counties to contract for services, to administer the provisions of the block grant, with a public or private non-profit agency, or an association of governments such as a regional commission, under the guidelines established by the Department of Health and Social Services.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the County Clerk be and she is hereby authorized to send a copy of this Resolution to all Wisconsin Legislative members elected by the citizens of Winnebago County and to the Executive Director of the Wisconsin County Boards Association and to Mr. Donald Percy, Secretary, Department of Health and Social Services, State of Wisconsin.

WHEREAS, the County's Affirmative Action officer, in cooperation with the County's Affirmative Action commission, has revised such policy accordingly.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors, that the following policy be Adjourned April Meeting (Tuesday, July 20, 1982)

and the same is hereby approved as the official Equal Employment Opportunity Policy of Winnebago County:

THE WINNEBAGO COUNTY EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY POLICY

It is the official policy of Winnebago County to provide equal employment opportunities for all qualified and reasonably qualifiable persons without regard to race, color, religious or political beliefs or affiliation, national origin, marital or parental status, pregnancy, sex, sexual orientation, age, handicap, or any other nonmerit factors except where age, sex or physical requirements constitute a demonstrable bona fide occupational qualification. Arrest and conviction records shall not be considered in employment decisions except where permitted by law.

This policy is applicable to all aspects of employment including job structuring, classification, promotion, recruitment, selection, appointment and placement, testing, training, layoff and recall, disciplinary action, termination, salary and benefits administration, and all other components of the Winnebago County personnel system.

In additon, harassment on the basis of sex, or any other protected status, shall be prohibited as a matter of official policy.

The County Executive and County Board of Supervisors, therefore, direct that the policies, procedures, rules and regulations of all of its departments, agencies and facilities and that the provisions of labor contracts be amended, if necessary, to assure compliance with the provisions of Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 as amended by the Equal Employment Opportunity Act of 1972 and the Pregnancy Discrimination Act of 1978, Presidential Executive Order 11246 as amended by Executive Order 11375, OFCCP Affirmative Action Guidelines (Revised Order No. 4); Title 29, Chapter 1607 of the Code of Federal Regulations; the Equal Pay Act of 1963, the Age Discrimination in employment Act of 1967 as amended in 1974, the Federal Contract Compliance Act of 1965, the Viet Nam Era Veterans Readjustment Assistance Act of 1974, and the Rehabilitation Act of 1973.

In order to effectively implement this policy and directive, an annual affirmative action plan shall be developed by the Affirmative Action Officer and the Affirmative Action Commission. Such affirmative action plan shall be presented to the Personnel and Finance Committee for approval. After presentation to the County Board, copies of the Plan shall be distributed to all department heads and shall be made available to all employees.

BÉ IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Policy shall supercede and replace any and all previously existing policies of Winnebago County affecting equal employment opportunity.

EXPLANATION: Town of Oshkosh is proposing an amendment to the Official Zoning Map for the Town of Oshkosh to add C-1 Conservancy District zoning to preserve and protect specific existing surface water drainageways. Referred to the Planning & Zoning Committee.

COUNTY EXECUTIVE'S REPORT

Mr. James P. Coughlin, County Executive, presented his report to the County Board. Mr. Coughlin introduced Mr. John A. Bodnar, Assistant Corporation Counsel. Mr. Coughlin informed the board members that instructions for his 1983 budget have been forwarded to all department heads. Winnebago County has reached over \$3 billion dollars in equalized valuation. The City of Menasha received a grant from HUD through the County Housing Authority for the construction of 40 homes. The County has purchased 12 residences for the Tri-County Expressway

and there are 4 more to buy. These houses are being rented to individuals and the county is receiving rent money from \$175.00 to \$450.00 per month. Twelve parcels of land have been purchased and there are approximately 44 more to buy. In excess of \$2 million dollars has been paid for the property for the Tri-County Expressway. Mr. Coughlin stated that an architect has given an estimate of \$210.00 for remodeling the Fifth Floor of the Courthouse for a courtroom and judge's chambers. Another elevator might be needed which would cost about \$140,000. If the remodeling is decided upon, it would necessitate a holding cell and an elevator door on the 4th Floor, which would cost about \$31,000. Mr. Coughlin stated that perhaps the ceiling could be lowered in one of the courtrooms for the office of the Clerk of Courts. Federal Revenue Sharing money would be used for the remodeling. Matt Nebl has been reclassified as Tax Listing and Assessment Coordinator. The Courthouse has been placed on the National Register of Historic Places.

OBJECTION TO CONSIDERATION OF RESOLUTION NO. 4 PROCEDURE RE: PUBLIC BIDDING

Supervisor Utech objected to consideration of Resolution No. 4 - Procedure re: Public Contracts, public bidding, reports to County Board concerning expenditure in excess of \$5,000. REPORT OF WINNEBAGO COUNTY EXTENSION HOME ECONOMIST

Chairman Brandt, County Board Members, and guests, thank you for this opportunity to speak tonight, and to tell you about Extension Home Economics.

As you may well, know, the UWEX office consists of five full-time agents:

Agriculture and Office Chairman Garry Blomberg, Farm Management Agent Jeff Key,

Two Youth Agents, Jim Barthel and Linda Chambers, who direct the 4-H program of 33 clubs and about 970 youth and adults, And myself, the Extension Home Economist, who acts as advisor to the Extension Homemaker Program in addition to my other program responsibilities.

We also have a half-time Continuing Education agent, Gene Gibas, who we share with Outagamie County. He is housed at the UW Center campus at Menasha.

Because of our high population we also employ a summer Horticultural agent, who this summer is Tim Helke. We will be manning a Horticultural booth at the Fair.

We come to you from three levels of government: We are hired by the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture, where we have a federal appointment. The University of Wisconsin employs us on the state level, where we must earn our faculty status. I have been with University Extenion 12 years, and am an Associate Professor with University Extension. On the county level, we come to you from the County Agriculture and Extension Education Committee, who supervise our programs, and see to it we are meeting the needs of our county. If you haven't received one, I have some of our UWEX brochures with me tonight, and will leave them on the back table. They tell you a bit more about our office.

I consider my role as UWEX agent one of a circuitriding teacher: We load up our cars with teaching materials, and go out to the community to teach what is needed. We take current, up-to-date information that comes from the University of Wisconsin and the U.S. Department of Agriculture and is founded in research, translate it to a level that is appropriate to the needs of the community.

Specifically, I work in the area of Home and Family Living, and right now I want to elaborate on the most prevalent of my programs.

By far, the largest program area is Foods and Nutrition. There is a great deal of food faddism and misinformation floating around, particularly due to the emphasis on dieting. About 40% of the U.S. population has a weight problem and quick weight loss diets are very attractive. Extension Home Economists preach that many of these diets are not healthy, downright dangerous, and also very expensive. I think every other week my newspaper article discusses these diets and good nutrition. I'd like you at this time to take a few minutes and fill out the quiz you have on your desk.

I spend much time teaching general nutrition, eating patterns for good health, and weight control. I've spoken to the American Legion Auxiliary, Fox Valley Women in Management, Business and Professional women's groups, and to the Boy Scout office staff in Menasha, to name a few.

A regular program that I do monthly, is at the Alcohol and Chemical dependency Ward of the State Hospital and Theda Clark Hospital. Often these people, due to the metabolism of Alcohol, are suffering from a malnutrition problem, and are quite interested in learning good eating habits. This group has had, on the whole, little training in nutrition, so they welcome this information. On the other hand, people who have learned misinformation are harder to teach. Another group I am involved with is the Winnenbago County Prenatal Classes. I work with the County Nurses' Office to provide nutrition information to pregnant women during this critical time in their lives.

I represented the UWEX Office at the EAA Convention this year with the Presentation "Cockpit Goodies for Crosscountry Flying". This has been an annual program, and I'm pleased to have the opportunity to teach this. About 170 pilots, spouses and convention-goers heard my lecture, which discussed the importance of complex carbohydrates as snacks aboard a plane, rather than highly sugared foods.

In a few weeks, I and Connie Eisch, the W.I.C. Nutritionist, will provide an Inservice for UW-O dormitory staff on nutrition and fad diets, so they can recognize eating disorders. I think this is a good opportunity to get sound nutritional information out into the community.

Now let's get back to the quiz you took. All the answers are false (At this point I elaborated on individual questions.)

This is a busy season in my office. The garden produce is coming in, and there's an immediate need to preserve it. I get phone calls from veterans and beginners at food preservation. I help them solve problems, learn proper processing and unlearn one information. My goal in this is preventing waste of food, time and money, and preventing food poisoning. During this time I can get from 300 to 400 calls a month.

Another busy program area is consumer economics. deal with the wise use of money, and selection of goods and services. I get a lot of calls on purchasing of appliances, particularly microwave ovens. A few years back | prepared a budgeting program and with it | trained the Advocap staff for Fond du Lac and Winnebago Counties. The materials were also used to provide inservice for Social Services staff. I have revised those materials and used them for Extension Homemakers and the Catholic Marriage Preparation Class, and for a vocational school "Supermarket Strategies" has been another very class. popular program. It deals with wise buying in the grocery store by comparing prices and brands and understanding information on the labels, and using that information. This program was taught to the Oshkosh Newcomers, Extension Homemakers, church groups, women's clubs and a special program at the library.

One of the concerns I'm dealing with a lot these days is special diet products that are on the market, and a new concern we have is imitation milk. The product will be legal to sell in Wisconsin January 1983. The price right now is not competitive with our milk products but I expect it will soon be. It is not an offensive product, qualitywise, so we must be concerned that it will compete with milk.

I think a lot of my programming deals with leadership development, teaching others to present programs at their club meetings, or teacher-officer roles. I act as advisor to the Winnebago County Extension Homemaker's organization. It's composed of 29 clubs and about 400 members. Their newsletter comes out of our office and I work with their county officers and program chairmen. I present most of their leader training programs and prepare the literature that accompanies the lesson. As Co-Chairman of the Oshkosh Women's Network, I prepare their newsletter and help arrange programs that have to do with their concerns in the community. For example, this fall two programs will be political debates.

It really sounds like I'm going in all directions at once, but the programs I modify and use with other groups; and according to our state program planning format I do not do programs in all the areas at the same time because it would be impossible to be efficient. Some of the committees I'm involved with include: The Oshkosh Senior Citizens Center Health Committee, the Consumer Panel of the Oshkosh Daily Northwestern, UW-O Continuing Education Committee, and Winnebago County Nutrition Coalition. I have also been working with Calumet and Outagamie Counties Home Economists on a "Growing in the 80's" lecture series that has been very successful over the past two years, drawing over 350 people.

Right now our big event is the County Fair, and today was Entry Day. Attached to your Extension News is a schedule of events, and we'd like to encourage you to attend the Fair and tour the Youth buildings and view the All the agents will be out at the Fair during exhibits. this week. In establishing our program directions for 1982, I will be working with my nutrition area, on food additives, and relationship of diet to disease. Family relationships is a growing area in the county, and programming here will be assertiveness, coping with the death of a loved one, and family communications. Consumer economics will also be an area I'll be working in for the coming year.

We in the University Extension office develop our annual programs through advisory committees with members representing communities in Winnebago County. We welcome your participation and contribution of concerns that you see in the community, and hear from your constituents.

Again, I thank you for this opportunity to tell you about my programs.

Also, under "Special Airport Provisions," the Fourth paragraph, fourth line, shall be amended to delete "(Map 'A') and shall now read as follows:

"No structure shall hereafter be constructed, erected or installed, or be permitted to remain in a designated height zone until the owner or his agent shall have applied in writing for an airport height permit and obtained such permit from the Winnebago County Zoning Administrator. Except, structures to be located beyond the half mile limit or half mile limit extended and which will be at, or below, seventy-five feet (75') maximum height above ground at the building site shall not require a height permit.*"

"The boundary of the flood plain districts and, where shown, the flood fringe and floodway district shall be those areas designated with the official flood plain zoning maps for Winnebago County and shall include the County's mapped Conservancy Districts established July 24, 1968, and all subsequent revisions. The following mapping data are on file in the County Zoning Office:

Mr. James P. Coughlin, County Executive, presented his report to the County Board, Mr. Coughlin told the board members that Winnebago's Therapeutic Community Unit Pro,gram won an award at the 1982 NACO Conference, in Baltimore, MD. for their patient treatment program/within its specialized nursing home facility. The 1980 population for Winnebago County was 131,772 and in 1982 the population showed an increase with the population at 132,811. Mr. Coughlin told the board that he had reached an agreement with the Town of Clayton and the Town of Vinland regarding their library tax. The CETA program has received approximately 2 million dollars and is working with the private sector in training employees. The Housing Authority has returned \$40,235 of the \$150,000 which they borrowed from Winnebago County. November 8 was proclaimed Employees Day and/all employees wore pins and labels proclaiming the day. The Computer Mapping program is progressing very well and there is a areat deal of interest from the outside sector.

The Chair announced that at this time the public would be allowed to discuss the County Executive's 1983 Budget or any resolution or ordinance which appears on the Agenda. There was no one present in the audience on either the budget or the resolutions.

We have now completed our budget presentation. I would like to state that you all received the budget in plenty of time for review and questions before October 25th when the Public Hearing was held.

It was published in the newspapers 10 days before the hearing, giving all citizens an opportunity to appear and comment on the budget.

Before I started my budget presentation on the evening of October 25th, I stated I was willing to take as much time as necessary to answer all questions and give a full explanation of the budget.

If there were any questions I could not answer, Mr. La Marche, our Finance Director, was here to assist me.

I also stated when I was through with my presentation, it was my hope that all Supervisors understood the budget and all questions were answered to everyone's satisfaction.

On Tuesday I continued my presentation and finished that afternoon.

You came back Wednesday and worked all day on Resolutions pertaining to the Budget. This was the time for additions or deletions, which you did by resolutions. All of these resolutions were signed by me.

After that you adjourned to November 9th, which is today, to give the Finance Department time to contact the state for any increase in aids and to implement the changes made by the Board to the budget. This has been done and the changes were presented to you tonight.

It would seem to me this Board has no alternative but to adopt this budget as you amended it during the Budget Session.

The other units of government in the county are awaiting our action tonight to complete their budget processes.

It is easy for misinformed people to editorialize on what is acceptable and what is not.

You and I know what has to be done, and we have done it together in this budget.

It is no longer the "Executive's Budget" -- it is the "County Budget", and we can all take pride in it.

We have kept faith with our employees by standing by the contracts that this board voted to accept, and I signed.

We are fulfilling the many obligations we have to the people of this county in a fiscally responsible way. They

will not only appreciate our courage in adopting this budget, but also for our foresight in looking to the future.

I sincerely hope that you give a good affirmative vote on this budget. Please show your confidence in me tonight as you have in the past.

In the event that an employee upon reaching the age of 70 years desires to continue employment beyond the end of the calendar year within which the employee reaches such age, the employee's employment may be extended on a year-to-year basis upon recommendation of the employee's department head and the Director of Personnel and subject to the approval of the County Executive. Denial of any such employment extension shall not be grievable under Chapter 7, <u>Grievance Procedure</u>.

c) Hazardous and Strenuous Occupation. Persons employed in hazardous occupations, as defined in 41.02(11)(a), Stats., and individuals employed in other physically strenuous occupations may be required to undergo annual or periodic physical examinations for the purpose of determining their level of fitness to perform the duties of their jobs. In the event that serious health conditions are detected that render any such employee physically unfit to continue to perform the essential functions of the jobs, and that any such disability cannot in the event reasonably acommodated within the County's affirmative action program in reference to handicapping conditions, then such employees may be mandatorily retired.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Resolution supersedes any previously passed Resolution relative to the Mandatory Retirement of County employees, but that such does not supersede any duly negotiated provision in any collective bargaining agreement covering represented County employees.

I.II FEES AND LEGAL CUSTODIANS:

PUBLIC RECORDS.

(1) AUTHORITY. This section of the Code is adopted under the authority granted by secs. 59.07(6) and 19.35(3), Wis. Stats.

(2) DEFINITIONS.

(a) "Authority" means any of the following having custody of a record: an office, elected official, agency, board, commission, committee, council, department or public body corporate an politic of Winnebago County created by constitution, law, ordinance, rule or order; or formally constituted subunit of the foregoing.

(b) "Record" means any material on which written, drawn, printed, spoken, visual or electromagnetic information is recorded or preserved, regardless of physical form or charactaristics, which has been created or is being kept by an authority of Winnebago County.

"Record" includes, but is not limited to, handwritten, typed or printed pages, maps, charts, photographs, films, recordings, tapes (including computer tapes), and computer printouts. "Record" does not include drafts, notes, preliminary computations and like materials prepared for the originator's personal use or prepared by the originator in the name of a person for whom the originator is working; materials which are purely the personal property of the custodian and have no relation to his or her office; materials to which access is limited by copyright, patent or bequest; and published materials in the possession of an authority other than a public library which are available for sale, or which are available for inspection at a public library.

(3) LEGAL CUSTODIANS.

(a) A Winnebago County elected official is the legal custodian of his or her records and the records of his or her office, but the official may designate an employee of his or her staff to act as the legal custodian.

(b) Unless otherwise prohibited by law, the County Clerk or the Clerk's designee shall act as legal custodian for the Winnebago County Board and for any committees, commissions, boards or authorities created by ordinance or resolution of the Winnebago County Board.

(c) For every authority not specified in subs. (a) or (b), the authority's chief administrative officer is the legal custodian for the authority, but the officer may designate an employee of his or her staff to act as the legal custodian.

(d) Each legal custodian shall name a person to act as legal custodian in his or her absence or the absence of his or her designate. This subsection does not apply to members of the Winnebago County Board.

(e) The designation of a legal custodian does not affect the powers and duties of an authority under this subchapter.

(4) FEES.

(a) Each authority shall impose a fee upon the requester of a copy of a record which may not exceed the actual, necessary and direct cost of reproduction and transcription of the record, unless a fee is otherwise specifically established or authorized to be established by the law.

(b) Each authority shall impose a fee upon the requester of a copy of a record for the actual, necessary and direct cost of photographing and photgraphic processing if the authority provides a photograph of a record, the form of which does not permit copying.

(c) Each authority shall impose a fee upon the requestor of a record not in printed form on paper such as films, computer printouts and audio or video tapes, which may not exceed the actual, necessary and direct cost of a copy of such record.

(d) Except as otherwise provided by law or as authorized to be prescribed by law, an authority shall impose a fee upon a requester for locating a record, not exceeding the actual, necessary and direct cost of location, if the cost is \$50 or more.

Each authority shall impose a fee upon (e) a requestor for the actual, necessary and direct cost of mailing or shipping of any copy or photograph of a record which is mailed or shipped to the requester.

(f) An authority may provide copies of a record without charge or at a reduced charge where the authority determines that waiver or reduction of the fee is in the public interest.

(g) authority shall require Each prepayment by a requester of any fee or fees imposed under this subsection if the total amount exceeds \$5.

(5) EFFECTIVE DATE. This Ordinance shall take effect on January 1, 1983. Motion made by Supervisor Olson and seconded to adopt

Only at that time will Winnebago County be asked to provide its share of funds for the projects petitioned, if it feels at that time they are able to provide them.

DESIGNATING THE SECRETARY OF TRANSPORTATION AS AGENT FOR WINNEBAGO COUNTY: EXECUTE AGENCY AGREEMENT: WITTMANN FIELD (AIP-02 PROJECT)

TO THE WINNEBAGO COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS: The following Resolution No. I was presented:

WHEREAS, the said County of Winnebago, hereinafter referred to as the Sponsor, being a municipal Body Corporate of the Sate of Wisconsin, authorized by law (sec. 114.11, Wis. Stats.) to acquire, establish, construct, own, control, lease, equip, improve, maintain, and operate an airport, and;

WHEREAS, the Sponsor desires to develop the Winnebago County Airport project to:

Purchase a crash-fire-rescue vehicle and construct a 1300 foot runway and taxiway extension for Runway 18/36 and install automated weather broadcast system and associated sensors. Along with any necessary related work.

WHEREAS, it is recognized that the items listed above will be funded individually or collectively as funds are available, with specific project costs to be approved as work is authorized, the proportionate cost of the airport development projects described above which are to be paid to the Secretary of the Wisconsin Department of Transportation, hereinafter referred to as the Secretary, to be held in trust for the purposes of the project; any unneeded and unspent balance after the project is completed is to be returned to the Sponsor by the Secretary; the Sponsor will make available any additional monies that may be found necessary, upon request of the Secretary, to complete the project as described above; the Secretary shall have the right to suspend or discontinue the project at any time additional monies are found to be necessary by the Secretary, and the Sponsor does not provide the same; and

WHEREAS, the Sponsor is required by law (sec. 114.32 (5), Wis. Stats.) to designate the Secretary as its agent to accept, receive, receipt for and disburse any funds granted by the United States under the federal Airport and Airway Development Act, and is authorized by law to designate the Secretary as its agent for other purposes.

WHEREAS, the efforts of the special General Relief Committee resulted in the creation of an ordinance concerning general relief medical payments by Winnebago County adopted February 16, 1982; and

WHEREAS, your Social Service's Board has continued the efforts started by the special committee and is now submitting an ordinance covering authorization of all other items of general relief such as food, shelter, utilities, clothing, and the like; and

WHEREAS, with the adoption of the attached Ordinance, Winnebago County will be in compliance with State and Federal requirements concerning the need for standards, policies and procedures relating to general relief administration.

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the provisions of secs. 46.22(5)(b) and 49.02, Wis. Stats., the County Board of Supervisors of the County of Winnebago does ordain as follows:

HEALTH AND SOCIAL SERVICES 11.04 11.04 GENERAL RELIEF ADMINISTRATION.

(1) AUTHORITY. Winnebago County has elected to furnish general relief to all eligible dependent persons within the County but not having a legal settlement therein by virture of secs. 49.02 and 49.03 (1)(b), Wis. Stats.

(2) PURPOSE. The purpose of this section of the Code is to obtain compliance with the requirements of Chapter 49, Wis. Stats., and sec. PW-PA 20.15, Wis. Administrative Code, concerning the administration of general relief by Winnebago County to establish the policies and procedures whereby public assistance and applicants and recipients shall be ensured of their rights as provided in sec. 49.001, Wis., Stats.

(3) DEFINITIONS. For the purposes of this Ordinance:

(a) "Applicant" means any person who applies for relief from the County under these standards and Chapter 49, Wis. stats.

(b) "Board" means the Winnebago County Social Services Board.

(c) "Coordinator" means the General Relief Coordinator or his or her designee assigned to administer General Relief for the Department.

(d) "County" means Winnebago County.

(e) "Denial" means refusal to approve or grant benefits to an applicant and includes termination or modification of previously approved benefits.

(f) "Department" means Winnebago County Department of Social Services which is responsible for the adminstration of General Relief granted by the County.

(g) "Dependent or Dependent Person" means a person without present available money, income, property, credit or other means by which the same can be presently obtained, sufficient to provide necessary commodities and services for decent, safe and sanitary living in the County as specified in sec. 49.01(1), Wis. Stats.

(h) "Eligible" means a dependent person as hereinbefore defined and includes State Dependents under sec. 49.04, Wis. Stats.

(i) "Employment" means full-time or part-time work for compensation.

(j) "Hearing Examiner" means the County official responsible for making a determination on an appeal from a denial of relief. The hearing examiner shall be designated by the Board.

(k) "Relief" means such services, commodities or money as are reasonable and immediately necessary under the circumstances to provide food, housing, clothing, fuel, light, water, medicine, medical, dental and surgical treatment, including hospital care, optometrical services, nursing, transportation and funeral expenses, and includes compensation for work relief.

(1) "Work Relief" means any compensation granted to a dependent person entitled to relief who has been required by the County to labor on any work relief project. (m) "Work Relief Project" means any undertaking designated as such by the Board or its designee and performed in whole or in part by persons receiving work relief.

(4) GENERAL STANDARDS. (a) Relief shall be granted to any eligible dependent person by the proper authorities of the County in accordance with the standards in this section. Age, transient status, citizenship, or student status of an applicant shall not in itself be a bar to receiving relief from the County. The coordinator may approve prorated relief benefits until such time as arrangements have been completed to facilitate benefits under another program administered by the County, State or Federal Government.

(b) The board has the following authority:

l. To set standards relating to income, assets, employment, eligibility, receipt of other assistance, remimbursement agreements and work relief for all applicants for relief.

2. To determine categories of assistance granted by the County under this program.

3. To adopt and set a schedule, subject to adjustments and prorations, for the granting of relief under this program, such schedule to be reviewed at least annually to adjust the schedule for changes in the cost of living.

4. To adopt such other standards as may from time to time be required in the administration of the program.

(5) APPLICATION FOR RELIEF. Each applicant shall complete a written application for relief on a form provided by the County. Such application shall be signed and dated by the applicant and witnessed by the coordinator or his designee. The completed application shall be retained by the Department and shall be available for inspection by the applicant and the staff of the Department or designated representatives of a General Relief Agency filed upon by non-resident notice or otherwise directly involved. The Board shall have the authority to develop, revise or amend application forms as is necessary.

(6) INVESTIGATION. Upon receiving an application for relief, the coordinator shall examine the applicant regarding the factual circumstances supporting his or her claim to eligibility, needs and the corresponding amounts and thereafter shall make such other investigations as may be deemed reasonably necessary under the circumstances. It shall be the responsibility of the applicant to provide reasonable verification regarding factual information supplied in the application which is necessary for the coordinator to determine the eligibility of the applicant.

(7) FORM OF GRANT. Assistance shall be granted by the vendor or voucher system payable directly to the merchant, medical facility, physician, grocer, or other vendor. Cash grants of assistance may be made at the discretion of the coordinator in those instances in which it may be found to be reasonably necessary to do so.

(8) DENIALS. (a) Any applicant or recipient who is determined to be ineligible for relief shall be issued a prompt written denial of benefits. Such written denial shall be delivered to the applicant or recipient by mail to his or her last known address within three (3) working days of the date of application if a completed application has been filed, or the date of determination of ineligibility. The written denial shall clearly state the specific reason(s) for denial of benefits and shall contain a notice to the applicant or recipient of his or her right to appeal such denial. A copy of any denial shall be filed in the applicant's or recipient's case record.

(b) Except when an application is withdrawn, the Department shall not deny relief except for one or more of the following reasons:

I. The applicant does not meet the standards of eligibility as set forth by the Board.

2. Except in cases involving emergency medical referrals, the applicant has refused to submit a written application or to complete any portion of the application, or to sign the application.

3. The applicant has failed or refused to supply sufficient information from which a good faith determination can be made of the applicant's identity, residence history or eligibility.

4. The applicant or recipient has failed or refused to seek or obtain employment with Wisconsin Job Service after the applicant or recipient has been given notice and opportunity to do so. Such notice and opportunity shall be deemed to mean that the applicant or recipient has been notified of at least two (2) suitable job opportunities commensurate with his or her physical ability, skills and training, and has either failed or refused to contact the employer, make application for the position, or to accept the position if offered it.

5. The applicant or recipient has failed to complete or make a good faith effort to complete assigned hours under the Work Relief Program.

6. The applicant or recipient has failed to sign an assignment of claim for third party liability

agreement or reimbursement agreement as provided in secs. 49.08 and 49.65, Wis. Stats. 7. The applicant's or recipient's eligibility

7. The applicant's or recipient's eligibility or need is dependent on the truth of representation which the Department has reasonable cause to believe is a false representation.

8. The applicant or recipient has refused a bona fide offer of employment or training without good cause, or has accepted and subsequently given inadequate performance through willful neglect.

9. The applicant or recipient has refused or failed to take full advantage of other resources available.

10. The applicant or recipient has refused or failed to cooperate with the investigation of the validity of his or her application.

II. An emergency medical referral received by the Department has been found to be defective.

(9) APPEALS. (a) Any person whose application for relief is not acted upon with the time limitations as set by the Board, or whose application is denied in whole or in part, or whose aid is discontinued, suspended or reduced, or who believes his or her award of aid to be insufficient, may petition the Department for an appeal hearing any time within thirty (30) days of the date of the contested action by the Department. When an appeal hearing is requested, it shall be held within five (5) working days after the receipt by the Department of the appeal request.

(b) Aid shall be terminated pending the appeal of a discontinuance. Aid shall be maintained at the reduced level pending an appeal of a reduction. Aid shall not be granted during an appeal of a denial of such aid.

(c) The appeal hearing shall be conducted by a hearing examiner not directly involved in the County administration of relief. The Department shall give the appeal petitioner timely written notice of the date, time and location of the hearing. The appeal petitioner shall have an opportunity to do the following:

I. Examine all documents and records to be used at the hearing or before the hearing.

2. Present his or her own case with or without the aid of others including legal counsel. The County is not obligated to furnish or pay for appeal petitioner's legal counsel.

3. Bring witnesses.

4. Establish all pertinent facts and circumstances.

5. Question or rebut any testimony or evidence, including the opportunity to confront and cross examine adverse witnesses.

(d) The appeal petitioner shall be notified of the decision in writing, and of his or her right to judicial review. The decision shall be based exclusively on evidence and other materials introduced at the hearing and shall indicate the reasons and evidence relied upon for A copy of the decision shall be furnished the decision. to the appeal petitioner within five (5) working days after the hearing.

(10) JUDICIAL REVIEW. The appeal petitioner or the County may seek judicial review of the hearing examiner's decision in Section (9) (d) by certiorari within thirty (30) days of receipt of the aforementioned decision pursuant to sec. 68.13(1), Wis. Stats. (11) INTERPRETATION. This section of the Code shall not

supersede Section 11.03 of the Code.

(12) EFFECTIVE DATE. The effective date of this section of the Code shall be upon passage and publication as provided by law.

25.0001 ALCOHOL BEVERAGES. (1) AUTHORITY. This Chapter of the Code is adopted under authority granted by sec. 125.10(1), Wis. Stats.

STATE STATUTES ADOPTED. The provisions of (2) Chapter 125, Wis. Stats., hereinafter specified which define and regulate the sale, procurement, dispensing and transfer of alcohol beverages, including provisions relating to the penalty to be imposed or the punishment for violation thereof, are adopted and made a part of this Chapter of the Code by reference. Any act required to be performed or prohibited by any statute incorporated herein by reference is required or prohibited by this Chapter of the Code. Sections of Wis. Stats. adopted herein by reference shall have the same number in this Code and may be so cited.

(3) SECTIONS ADOPTED. The following sections of Chapter 125, Wis. Stats., are adopted by reference:

- 125.07 (1) Sales of alcohol beverages to minors.
- 125.07 (2) Sales of alcohol beverages to intoxicated persons.
- 125.07 (3) Minors present in places of sale; penalty.
- 125.07 (4) Minors possession of alcohol beverages; consumption in public places; penalties.
- 125.07 (5) Misrepresentation of age; penalty.

125.07 (6) Defense of sellers.

- 125.07 (7) Books kept by licensees and permittees.
- 125.09 (2) Possession of alcohol beverages on school grounds prohibited.

125.11 Penalties.

125.68 (2) **Operators'** licenses.

125.68 (4) Closing hours.

(4) STATE FORFEITURE STATUTES. Any forfeiture for violation of any section of Wis. Stats. adopted by reference in this Chapter of the code shall conform to the forfeiture permitted to be imposed for violation of the comparable state statue including any variations for subsequent offenses.

(5) UNIFORM SCHEDULE ADOPTED. The Uniform Deposit and Misdemeanor Bail Schedule of the Wisconsin Judicial Conference, January 1983, is hereby adopted and by reference made a part of this Code.

(6) CITATION METHOD. (a) The citation procedures established in sec. 778.25(1), Wis. Stats., shall apply to all actions to recover a forfeiture for violations of the following sections:

(b) The citation procedure as provided in sec. 25.04(4) of this Code shall apply to all actions in this Chapter other than those enumerated in sec. 125.0001(6) (a).

(7) JURISDICTION. This Chapter of the Code shall apply within all of Winnebago County except within any city or village or within any town that has adopted or adopts an ordinance under sec. 125.10(2), Wis. Stats.

(8) REPEAL. Chapter 9.06 of the Code of General Ordinances is repealed upon effective date of this section of the Code.

(9) EFFECTIVE DATE. This Chapter of the Code shall take effect upon passage and publication as provided by law.





A History of Sunny View Sanatorium

1915 - 1971



Oshkosh, Wisconsin

One hundred years ago, in March of 1882, a German physician, Robert Koch, reported to a meeting in Berlin, Germany his discovery of the bacillus that caused tuberculosis. That report paved the way to control of a disease that had been a scourge since ancient times.

Tuberculosis reached its peak of contagion during the Industrial Revolution when people crowded the cities, living and working in dark, dirty buildings. The bug flourished in the fatigue--ridden impoverished sweat shop environment.

Until Koch's discovery, medical leaders hotly debated the cause of tuberculosis, which was also called "consumption", "white plague" and Captain of the Men of Death".

Koch's bacteriological studies and development of a substance called tuberculin, which aided in diagnosis, won him a Nobel Prize in 1905.

Through subsequent studies, doctors learned that the tubercle bacilli can reproduce as fast as every 20 hours and that in just 10 days it can produce a colony of 5,000 organisms, enough to create a nodule in the lung. In less than a month, a tubercle bacillus can produce one billion organisms, enough to create a cavity in the lung.

Because of its fast rate of growth and extreme contagiousness, early detection of tuberculosis was of utmost importance. Isolation of the tuberculosis patient was also a necessity so that the patient would not spread his disease to family and friends.

The first voluntary sanatorium in America was established in 1885 at Saranac Lake, New York, by Dr. Edward Livingstone Trudeau, who demonstrated the value of fresh air and good food with a simple, straightforward experiment.

He innoculated ten rabbits with tuberculosis and kept half of them in a dark cellar on a poor diet. All five died. The other five rabbits were placed in a cage in the fresh air and fed liberally. All of them survived.

His experiment proved the value of a sanatorium in a country setting, which soon became a familiar sight in America.

An early advocate of statewide tuberculosis santoria was Dr. Fred W. A. Brown, Winnebago County's Physician, who submitted the following report to the County Board on November 12, 1901:

"While Wisconsin can proudly point to the numerous institutions for the care and treatment of the insane, which dot the surface of her fair domain, institutions which stand as monuments to the humanity of her people and their zeal for the unfortunate; and while we stand in the van of progress, marking time on the onward

march for the welfare and amelioration of unfortunate mankind, we must again be up and doing.

Once more we hear the Macedonian cry 'Come and help us'. In pleading tones it comes loud and strong from the bereaved, and in plaintive wail with the pathos of subdued resignation from the afflicted. It comes from the rich and it comes from the poor; from Dives and Lazarus; from the country and the town; the palace and the hovel; from the pavements to the gutters; from the bereft husband and the widowed wife; from the weeping parent and the wailing orphans; from the synagogues of the righteous and the gilded haunts of hell. Help! For what? From what?

There is a disease so mortal that it is credited with causing one-seventh of all deaths. In the United States Census reports for 1890, 102,188 deaths were reported to be due from consumption. A low estimate gives 150,000 deaths annually in the United States from some sort of tuberculosis. Dr. Vaughn gives as an estimate, based on that census report, the total number of persons infected with tuberculosis as 1,050,000, or one in every sixty of the population. These are dread facts. Appalling! Alarming! And this is the condition, even while E. F. Wells states that the evidence is in favor of a positive decline in the prevalence of the disease.

Even so, shall we wait while our loved ones pass away without putting forth an energetic effort to stay the ravages of the disease?

What do we advocate? In the past, Wisconsin has done nobly; but she must not sit and smirk complacently o'er deeds done, but rather, spurred on by achievements already accomplished, press forward with untiring zeal. Progress, with pen dipped in the fountain of undying love, has written in words of flaming fire across the broad bosom of her charity --'State Sanatoria'.

Wisconsin must not lag. It must be abreast of the times. It must do its duty. It may be asked: 'Is there any use of trying to cure consumption?' As well might it be asked: 'Is it of any utility to care for our unfortunate insane?' The question is to be answered in the affirmative. I will mention a few celebrated men who have been cured of consumption: The German poet, Goethe; Napoleon I; Peter Cooper.

Dr. Herman Brehmer, one of the foremost German physicians, was a consumptive when he started the first sanatorium for tuberculous patients in 1859, over which he presided for more than thirty years.

Dr. Dettweiler, his most celebrated pupil, entered Brehmer's Sanatorium as a consumptive, became his assistant, and has been for twenty-five years the Medical Director of the Falkenstein Sanatorium. The late Dr. Pean, of Paris, declared phthisical at 20 died at 65, and there are many more cases that can be cited.

Statistics from Sanatoria for Consumptives, where patients in all stages of the disease are received, show that twenty-five percent leave as absolutely cured, and forty to fifty per cent are much improved. Surely, it is the duty of this State to do all in its power to bring about such a desirable state of affairs.

I advocate State Sanatoria on the same grounds as are given for State Hospitals for the Insane. I beg to make the following extracts from the prize essay of Dr. S. A. Knopf, of New York, entitled, 'Tuberculosis as a disease of the masses and how to combat it', in reply to the questions, 'What are State Sanatoria?' and 'What evidence exists that by taking care of consumptives in special institutions and by hygienic measures, tuberculosis as a disease of the masses can really be successfully combatted?'

'A State Sanatorium in the United States means an institution for the exclusive treatment of patients suffering from Pulmonary Tuberculosis, created by the funds of the State and supported entirely or in part by the State. The first State Sanatorium in America was erected a few years ago near Rutland, Mass. In this institution, patients pay fifty cents a day. Recently, other States, New York, New Jersey, Iowa, Illinois and Maine have projected the building of similar institutions.'

While it is gratifying to note that some States have undertaken to care for their consumptive poor, and while noble men and women have privately undertaken to care for some of these unfortunate sufferers, there is yet a great deal to be done. In view of the great number of consumptives with little or no means in our thickly populated States, it is evident that the existing institutions are like a drop of relief in an ocean of woe. Then let us hope that the good work will go on and that the new century will see the multiple creation of State and Peoples' Sanatoria in the United States.'

"That such special institutions and thorough hygienic measures are well calculated to combat tuberculosis as a disease of the masses, we shall try to prove as follows: In England there have existed special institutions for the treatment of consumptives, that is to say, hospitals and sea coast sanatoria, in relatively large numbers for over fifty years. As a result of the maintenance of these institutions and the enforcement of a most excellent general public hygiene, it was possible to reduce the mortality from tuberculosis during the last few years in a most surprising manner and more rapidly than in any other country in the According to the following statistics compiled world. by Dr. Tatham, the statistical Superintendent of the Registrar-General's office, the mortality from tuberculosis among the population of England and Wales has been reduced from well nigh one-half of that which it was thirty years ago.

The death rate per million of the population of England and Wales from pulmonary tuberculosis was in 1870 -2410; 1875 - 2202; 1880 -1889; 1885 - 1770; 1890 -1882; 1893 - 1468; 1894 - 1385; 1895 - 1398; 1896 -1397.

Surely these quotations are enough to warrant the assumption of State care for the tubercular by the commonwealth of Wisconsin. Also the benefits which must accrue to the community by the return from a Sanatorium of a cured or much improved sufferer, is inestimable, as he will be a peripatetic dictionary of information in disseminating knowledge of the workings and advantages of such an institution."

Dr. Hoyt Dearholt, Executive Secretary of the Wisconsin Anti-Tuberculosis Association, was an ardent promoter of sanatoriums in Wisconsin. At a County Board meeting on May 19, 1910, he urged the Supervisors to build a sanatorium in Winnebago County.

The County Board was not overly enthusiastic about spending money for a facility for an almost always fatal disease. However, public sentiment encouraged them to build a sanatorium, and construction began September 16, 1914. The sanatorium offically opened on June 30, 1915. It remained in service until September 21, 1971, when it officially closed its doors -- the few remaining TB patients transferred to other facilities.

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The advent of over ten effective drugs against tuberculosis assisted in the control of the disease and the closing of Sunny View. Today, tuberculosis in the United States is a rarity, but unfortunately still in existence. In Winnebago County, there were 5 cases reported in 1980 and 2 cases in 1981. The State of Wisconsin recorded 190 cases of TB in 1981. Worldwide, tuberculosis kills at least three million people each year, particularly in undeveloped countries where most cases remain undetected.

It appears that tuberculosis will always be with us until every last person infected by it is brought to treatment. Until that happens, the disease will continue to be spread by its victims to their families, friends and associates. Control is possible -- eradication seems only a pipe dream.

The following history was prepared in two parts -- the first part begins with the first resolution to build a sanatorium in Winnebago County and continues with the history of Sunny View up to the early 1930's. This part of the history was apparently given as a speech, possibly by one of the trustees. Unfortunately, it was unsigned and so the author is unknown.

The second part of the history continues from the early 1930's until the closing of Sunny View and to the eventual demolition of the main building. This section was prepared from minute books, annual reports, and other historical documents which were retained upon the demise of Sunny View.

Because I am a firm believer that history should be preserved and because I spent from September, 1940 to April, 1943 as a patient at Sunny View, I have a very deep interest in the place and many fond memories.

My health was restored, my faith was strengthened, my personal values and ambitions were changed and my appreciation of our county was greatly enhanced.

I went into the sanatorium a very sick person and came out with my health restored at no cost to me or my family.

I wish to express my appreciation to Linda Wolfe, my Confidential Secretary and good friend, who gathered the facts and wrote the second part of the history. Without her dedication and effort, it could not have been accomplished.

DEDICATION *****

We dedicate this history to all the employees, superintendents and doctors who served with distinction and faithfulness at Sunny View Sanatorium at a great risk to their own health.

The facts and dates of this history are taken from the minutes of the County Board proceedings and of the monthly meetings of the Board of Trustees of Sunny View Sanatorium. Such facts and dates are being used to give you a comprehensive understanding of the building up through the years of Sunny View Sanatorium to its present state of efficiency in curing tuberculosis patients and teaching them how to guard their health so that they may again become useful citizens.

The first resolution to build a sanatorium for the care of those suffering from tuberculosis was introduced before the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors on May 18, 1910. This resolution was instigated by Dr. Hoyt E. Dearholt, Executive Secretary of the Wisconsin Anti-Tuberculosis Association and interested citizens of this county. The County Board was favorably impressed but no immediate action was taken.

At a special meeting of the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors on April 25, 1913, a committee was appointed and on May 23, 1913 filed their report on sites and plans for the building of a sanatorium. On July 29, 1913 there was another special meeting to select one of the sites among the five submitted and to talk about finances, but the matter was again postponed. Not until May 14, 1914 did the committee finally decide on the present site which was approved by the State Board of Control and the Wisconsin Anti-Tuberculosis Association. Auler and Jensen were chosen as architects and building plans were submitted. The exact date construction began is not known, but C. R. Meyer and Sons were the contractors and construction progressed satisfactorily under the supervision of the Building Committee of the County Board.

It was not until March 3, 1915 that the County Board of Supervisors held a meeting for the purpose of selecting a Board of Trustees. At that meeting, the following members were appointed: Mr. C. R. Smith, President; Dr. M. E. Corbett, Vice-President, and Dr. B.C. Guddon, Secretary.

On March 16, 1915 the board members held their first official meeting. Mrs. Leola Trilkeld was appointed first Superintendent. An inspection of the grounds and buildings was made. At the second meeting, April 12, 1915, Mrs. Elizabeth Jackson of DePere, Wisconsin presented plans for planting the grounds about the building and on May 3, 1915 three hundred spruce trees were purchased. Arrangements were also made at the April meeting to install telephone and obtain rural mail route service. Sunny View's address at that time was R.F.D. #2, Oshkosh, Wisconsin. On May 7, 1915 the State Board of Control made its first inspection of the building.

Dr. B. C. Guddon was the first attending physician of Sunny View. He received his appointment at a Board of Trustees meeting May 13, 1915 to begin his duties June 1st. At this time, there were fifty-four patients on the waiting list.

A reception was held June 3, 1915. The books and gavel were delivered and a general inspection of the place was made.

A transfer of the sanatorium from the County Board Building Committee to the Board of Trustees of Sunny View Sanatorium took place June 30, 1915. The trustees in turn notified the State Board of Control of their acceptance of the sanatorium.

During the first meeting held August 3, after the trustees had taken control, a motion was made to build a garage for the shelter of cars. Mr. Duggan was employed to come once a month to take care of the bookkeeping. The trustees authorized all employees to be subject to routine physical examinations.

August 16, 1915, Mrs. Leola Trilkeld resigned due to ill health and Miss Raddatz was appointed to succeed her. Dr. Guddon authorized Miss Raddatz to subscribe to magazines for the patients, among them the "Journal of Outdoor Life". A number of games and other means of entertainment were also provided for the patients. It is observed from reading the minutes that further improvements were made in the details of the building and more planting was done during the autumn months.

Dr. Guddon resigned November 7, 1915 and Dr. H. H. Bessler was appointed to succeed him. He also held the position of secretary to the Board of Trustees. December 5, 1915 Dr. Corbett accepted the resignation of Dr. H. H. Bessler, and Dr. J. E. Schein was appointed as physician, acting also as secretary. At this meeting a motion was made to the effect that the Wisconsin Electric Company be approached relative to the matter of supplying light and power for the sanatorium.

An interesting fact taken from the minutes is that a motion was passed by the Board of Trustees stating that any persons, employee or visitor would be discharged or barred from the institution if found bringing to the patients, without the doctors' order, drugs, intoxicating liquors or tobacco in any form. Infringement of this rule gave the superintendent authority to act without mercy and to this day the rule is held in strict observance.

Miss Raddatz resigned after six months as superintendent and Miss Helen Anderson replaced her. Miss Anderson resigned on July 31, 1916. At a meeting held August 7, 1916, the Board of Trustees appointed Dr. J. W. Lockhart to succeed Dr. Schein as attending physician and Mrs. Leola Trilkeld was appointed superintendent in Miss Anderson's place.

During October 1917, the patients of Sunny View Sanatorium did their part in helping the war effort by making five hundred paper stoves for the Red Cross. They were contrivances made of paper and paraffin used by the soldiers to heat food in emergencies. Notice is also made of a program given by Eli Rice and quartette. At this time the patients raised pigeons from which they derived much pleasure and some profit as many of the homers proved of value.

Miss Helen Scheller, who was affiliated with the National Tuberculosis Association, succeeded Mrs. Leola Trilkeld as superintendent on March 14, 1918. Much was done for the comfort and entertainment of the patients under Miss Scheller's supervision.

During the early years of the institution's existence a great deal of inconvenience was experienced due to the lack of modern facilities such as are available today. Consequently it is noted that during the following months the Board of Trustees and superintendent proceeded with improvements.

After one year, ending June 26, 1918, Mrs. Neita Grueder resigned as secretary and bookkeeper. Miss Scheller was appointed to succeed her. At the end of the fiscal year in June it was noted that the past two years had proven so successful in the curing of tuberculosis patients that there was a waiting list anxious to enter the sanatorium and receive treatment.

A statement was sent out to all state and county institutions to observe the strictest economy in every way during the year of 1918. Sanatoriums were not exempt from doing their part at this time. Miss Scheller sent a letter to the United States Food Administration listing the various ways in which savings were made. In reply she received a letter of high commendation.

The next interesting fact noted in the minute book was that of September 30, 1919. Miss Scheller suggested that a new Nurses' Home be located on the west side of the present sanatorium, the main entrance to face south. Various advantages as to location were listed and at the November 1919 session of the Winnebago County Board it was brought to their attention that the fund bequeathed by Colonel John Hicks in his will, had not been used. Considerable thought had been given to the appropriate use of this money. The general opinion was that is should be used for a purpose of keeping fresh in the minds of everyone the memory of a man who saw the need of care being given to those suffering from tuberculosis. A Nurses' Home seemed to be the most outstanding need, but since space in the sanatorium used for employees was not needed for patients, the committee postponed the matter until such time as space would be required.

Occupational Therapy was also discussed at this time and the superintendent was advised to consult the Wisconsin Anti-Tuberculosis Association relative to securing a teacher. The following preliminary report was sent out by the Association: It was decided to recommend that one highly trained expert in occupational therapy be employed to organize and standardize all the work in the county institutions in the state and set as supervisor. Miss Majel R. Buckstaff was appointed director of occupational therapy. She visited each sanatorium in turn instructing a patient to carry on in her absence, employing assistants when the necessity for them existed.

On October 29, 1919 a meeting was held with the representatives of the Wisconsin Electric Company and the Wisconsin Telephone Company in regard to wiring the institution with electricity, all wires to be strung on the same set of poles, thus allowing more space for the planting of trees.

Saturday, November 29, 1919 at 8:40 P.M. a terrific windstorm did considerable damage. Pictures are available showing the extent of wreckage to the chimney, porches and other parts of the building. The Board meeting of December 31, 1919 was postponed due to the roads being impassable after a heavy snowstorm. Action was taken to keep them open the rest of the winter.

At a Board meeting held January 12, 1920, Sunny View's first occupational therapy teacher was employed to proceed with the work organized by Miss Buckstaff who had made considerable progress as director of the department. She had made arrangements to exhibit the completed articles. The wiring of the institution by Longstadt and Meyer was also progressing nicely.

Miss Scheller read a paper before a meeting of the Wisconsin State Nurses' Association on January 13, 1920. The meeting was held in Oshkosh and in her paper Miss Scheller stressed the fact that Sunny View Sanatorium should be the central power of work against tuberculosis in the county. February 14, 1920 Miss Scheller handed in her resignation to take effect March 14. April 2, 1920 Miss Catherine Bass was appointed superintendent. On May 15, 1920 Mrs. Neita Grueder accepted the position of secretary to the Board of Trustees during their meetings.

Action was taken July 15, 1920 to employ medical consultation services and to have consultations once a month.

A suggestion was made at the August 31, 1920 Board of Trustees meeting that a committee from the Winnebago County Board go to Green Lake, Waushara and Waupaca Counties

to confer with them relative to acepting an interest in Sunny View Sanatorium. At a fall meeting of the Winnebago County Board held November 17, 1920 a committee from Green Lake, Waushara and Waupaca Counties respectively visited and inspected the sanatorium. Further discussion was held with the three counties March 1, 1921 about the purchase of a part interest in the institution.

At the monthly meeting of the Board of Trustees on March 31, 1921 it was decided to increase the time given by the attending physician and to authorize necessary xray and laboratory work. Consultation from the Wisconsin Anti-Tuberculosis Association was discontinued. October 20, 1921 further consideration was given to a Nurses' Home in order to release more beds for patients.

Fond du Lac County was approached relative to buying a part interest in Sunny View Sanatorium on January 12, 1922 by a committee appointed to negotiate for a Tri-County Institution.

Action had been taken by the Baord on December 30, 1921 to purchase a Mercury Quartz Lamp at the request of Dr. J. W. Lockhart for the treatment of the patients. The lamp was purchased and installed February 10, 1922.

A meeting was held at the Winnebago County Courthouse February 21, 1922 by the Board of Trustees and members of the Tri-County Sanatorium Committee. The purpose was to formulate a contract to be entered into by Fond du Lac, Waushara and Winnebago Counties for combining ownership of Sunny View Sanatorium. A division of properties was discussed and it was decided that if the contract was entered into there was to be one Trustee from each county.

On March 7, 1922 the committee met and final arrangements were made for presenting the subject of part interests in the sanatorium to the County Boards of Fond du Lac, Wausahara and Winnebago Counties with the resolution that it be put into effect in the near future. The final meeting of the Winnebago County Board of Trustees of Sunny View Sanatorium was held June 30, 1922. On July 1, 1922 that body became a Tri-County Board of Trustees. July 7 was the date of the first official meeting of the Tri-County Board of Trustees. The superintendent, medical director and secretary were re-appointed and a tentative division of beds available in the institution were prorated according to each county's investment. The superintendent was instructed to provide new stationery bearing the names of the Tri-County officers. During the following months the new Board of Trustees functioned efficiently and notice is taken of the many improvements made.

Miss Catherine Bass resigned November 13, 1922 and on December 30, 1922 Miss Claudia M. Lindsey was appointed to succeed her as superintendent. Going back to a meeting held February 21, 1922 we learn that the attention of the Winnebago County Board was called to a sum of \$20,000 known as the "Hicks' Memorial Sanatorium Fund", which was available for the purpose of erecting a memorial to Colonel John Hicks. Mr. Hicks' will in this matter was probated December 6, 1916 and reads as follows:

"I give and bequeath to the County of Winnebago, Wisconsin, the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000) for the purpose of erecting or maintaining within said county a sanatorium or hospital for the treatment and cure of people afflicted with tuberculosis. My object is to encourage and assist in the movement to rescue victims of consumption and if the County of Winnebago has established such sanatorium when this will is probated, then the amount is to be expended in the work of enlarging and strengthening said sanatorium under the direction of the County Board of Winnebago County, Wisconsin." John Hicks

On a motion made June 10, 1922 it was resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County that the money in the county treasury known as the Hicks' Memorial Sanatorium Fund be used for the construction of a home for nurses at Sunny View Sanatorium, the same to be known as the Hicks' Memorial Home for Nurses.

The Sanatorium Committee appointed by the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors was authorized and directed to do all things necessary and proper, to carry into effect this resolution, and to cause to be erected a suitable building for use as a Nurses' Home. A reading of the minutes shows that necessary purchases were made from time to time for the Nurses' Home in preparation for its occupancy.

On November 22, 1923 the Sanatorium Committee of the County Board reported that the Hicks' Memorial Building was completed and furnished and that the same had been in use by the nurses since June 1, 1923. November 24 it was resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County that the Hicks' Memorial Home for Nurses be opened for public inspection on Sunday afternoon, December 2, from 2 until 4 o'clock and that the Chairman of the County Board and Sanatorium Committee act as reception committee. It was further resolved that the County Clerk be directed to send special invitations to Mrs. Mary Powers Hicks and Oscar J. Hardy to inspect said building a few days prior to the public inspection.

Because of the admission of children into the sanatorium, the Board of Trustees at their September 29, 1923 meeting purchased standard school books so that the children might receive credit for their studies. During the month of January, 1924, the Board of Trustees, always endeavoring to give the patients the best medical attention available, employed consultation services of the Wisconsin Anti-Tuberculosis Association.

Sunny View invited the Wisconsin Anti-Tuberculosis Association to hold its mid-year convention at the sanatorium in June, 1924. It was well attended and many interesting subjects were discussed.

September 30, 1924 Miss Lindsey resigned as superintendent and Miss Marion R. Ivory succeeded her.

The oldest member of our present Board of Trustees, Dr. G. B. McKnight, attended his first meeting on January 21, 1925, also becoming a secretary of that body succeeding Mr. C. J. Breitzman. Dr. J. W. Lockhart's resignation was accepted at this meeting and Dr. Frank Brockway succeeded him as attending physician. January 30, 1924 the resignation of Mrs. Neita Grueder, assistant secretary and bookkeeper to the Board of Trustees, was tendered and accepted. A note of thanks was given for her years of faithful service. At the next meeting of the Board of Trustees, February 27, 1925, action was taken to employ a resident stenographer and bookkeeper.

At a meeting May 28, 1925 it was considered advisable to employ an assistant physician and on June 29 it was reported that Dr. Frank Brockway had chosen Dr. R. H. Bitter to assist him in his work at Sunny View. This arrangement was in effect until May 11, 1925 at which time Dr. Bitter was appointed attending physician and Dr. Brockway became consultant. It was also at this meeting that the superintendent, Miss Marion Ivory, applied for a two months leave of absence and Dr. Brockway was appointed acting superintendent. On September 29, 1926 Miss Ivory tendered her resignation due to continued ill health. On October 30, 1926 Mrs. Mildred M. Lucia was appointed in her place.

June 30, 1926 Waushara County withdrew its interest in the Tri-County ownership of Sunny View Sanatorium.

Mr. E. R. Williams, present chairman of the Board of Trustees, attended his first meeting on January 27, 1927.

February 24, 1927 the following resolution was passed: "Whereas, it has pleased God to call to his 'everlasting life' our head physician, Dr. Frank Brockway, we, the Trustees of Sunny View Sanatorium, offer this brief tribute to his esteemed memory. His research and analytical mind obtained the respect of those in his chosen profession. The mingling of brotherly love and clear judgment in the treatment of his sick ones, gained their gratitude and confidence. Those whom he came to restore and those whom he soothed on their last journey felt his tender sympathy and scholarly skill. While yet young and in the midst of a career crowned with kindness towards all and a conscientious consideration of duties to be performed, he was taken, followed by the golden opinions and deep regret of all who knew him. In his chosen vocation he was a shining example of the profession of the beloved physician, St. Luke. Resolved that a copy of this resolution be given the bereaved family and also be kept in the annals of Sunny View Sanatorium."

Following Dr. Brockway's death, Dr. J.W. Lockhart was appointed consultant.

October 27, 1927 the members of the Goodfellowship Club, an organization of patients in the institution, made a request for a radio and a committee was appointed November 30 to obtain information about radio machines for the purpose of selecting a suitable one.

Another member of our present Board of Trustees, Mr. J. J. Davis, attended his first meeting on December 29, 1927.

The Board was first advised on July 31, 1928 that the smokestack, known to the citizens of Winnebago County as the "leaning tower of Pisa" was in need of repairs. The prompt attention of the Board was given.

August 30, 1928 the contracts were let for some remodeling of the main building and for the building of a garage for the employees' cars. Arrangements were made to secure title to the site for the location of said garage south of the Nurses' Home.

At a special meeting on October 7, 1929 with physicians, public health and social service workers of Winnebago and Fond du Lac Counties, the problems of the institution were discussed and the first plans laid for a separate Children's Department.

Organized fire drills and talks on action in case of fire are given from time to time by the Oshkosh City Fire Department. It has also been noted from the minutes that improvements in the matter of fire protection were made over a period of years until now there is a chemical extinguisher and a standpipe with one and a half inch hose on each corridor. A general fire alarm system has also been installed.

November 26, 1929 the youngest member of our Board of Trustees, Mr. F. T. Chittenden, attended his first meeting and this present Board has worked unceasingly and untiringly to better conditions in the sanatorium.

On February 27, 1930, after thorough investigations, and with the recommendations of our physicians, the first unit of our present x-ray equipment was purchased, a fluoroscope, together with a stereoscope to enable the physicians to more efficiently keep in touch with the patients' condition and to more fully study the x-ray pictures which were being taken in the city. Following Dr. R. H. Bitter's return from the National Tuberculosis Conference, formal report of the convention was given on May 27, 1930, the purpose of which was to emphasize the need for a Children's Department at the sanatorium.

June 7, 1930 the Mid-Year Convention of County Sanatoria for Wisconsin was held at Sunny View and was very well attended.

All through the years in which this institution has been operating, trouble has been evidenced in the heating equipment. It was through the recommendations of Charles A. Cahill and Sons of Milwaukee that a decision was made to install a high pressure boiler. Plans for remodeling the heating system were completed in September, 1930 and in the summer of 1932 the other high pressure boiler was installed. The Nurses' Home was included in this heating schedule, the equipment being sufficiently large to take care of the institutions needs for years to come.

On April 24, 1930 an appropriation was made by the Board for the purchasing of trees and shubbery. Boy Scout Troop Ten did the planting assisted by the courtesy of interested people.

At a meeting October 9, 1930 during the time of the remodeling of the heating plant, provisions were made for the children to have a schoolroom. The men's quarters were made more comfortable at this time, also.

October 30, 1930 it was decided by the County Boards of Fond du Lac and Winnebago Counties that a regular sum appropriated to the institution for capital he expenditures. The request for such an appropriation to be in the form of a resolution to be presented at the annual meeting of the county boards every fall. The Board considered its financial condition thoroughly last November and omitted such requests for funds that year due to the general financial distress felt in business. At this same meeting the first petition for hard surfacina the crossroad between Highway 41 and Lake Shore Drive was made. At a recent meeting of the County Board, action was taken to do some work on the road which was duly appreciated.

It was with regret that the Board of Trustees accepted the resignation of Mrs. Mildred Lucia August 27, 1931 to take effect September 15, 1931. After consideration of several applications, Miss Cava Wilson was appointed superintendent.

The Sanatorium Committee of the County Board met with the Board of Trustees September 15 to discuss the proposed Children's Department and acquaint themselves with the needs, plans and probable amounts for appropriation. All members were understanding of the necessity for segregating the children from the adults. There were several meetings at this time with the Board of Trustees, architect and members of the Wisconsin Anti-Tuberculosis Association for perfecting the plans and financing the same. October 29, 1931 the plans were presented to the Sanatorium Committee of the two counties. After all plans and finances were completed, a decision was made that only a moderate appropriation was needed from each county for the unit as proposed.

The medical staff strongly urged the building of this department as it was impossible to keep the children in the sanatorium away from the adult tuberculosis patients and there was constant danger of infection from the tubercle bacilli. At a meeting of the County Boards of Fond du Lac and Winnebago Counties November 13, 1931 Mr. E. R. Williams, Chairman of the Board of Trustees of Sunny View. presented a petition for the building of such a unit and appropriations were made. Bids were advertised for on November 25, 1931 and on December 24 the bids were awarded. Construction began on December 26, 1931. In their endeavor to avoid any mistakes and to include every convenience, several meetings were held with the Board of Trustees, architect and doctors to discuss all matters of a detailed nature in the building of the Children's Department.

October 29, 1931 a report was given by the Neenah Health Council of their willingness to furnish a two months demonstration of medical social service work. This was to help the patients by contacting their families. January 6, 1932, Miss Irene Niland was secured from the Wisconsin Anti-Tuberculosis Association for the demonstration of social service work.

Since this work was new in the sanatorium's administration, it was thought advisable to have a general meeting with the different agencies which she would contact during her stay. It was with this in mind that a dinner was given on January 6 to which Public Health Nurses, City Nurses, Red Cross workers, members of the County Board of Supervisors, Judges, School Superintendents and others interested in a social service program were invited. Dr. H. E. Dearholt of the Wisconsin Anti-Tuberculosis Association was auest speaker and others were induced to express themselves on this subject during the evening. The demonstration was completed in the early part of March and was very beneficial to the institution. Action was taken by the Board of Trustees to continue the program at some future date.

Dr. R. H. Bitter tendered his resignation January-13, 1932 to the Board of Trustees and Dr. E. B. Pfefferkorn was appointed as attending physician.

At a Board of Trustees meeting held April 28, 1932 plans for general remodeling of the institution were

discussed, Mr. Hay being present. This remodeling program was to make adequate room for a medical department including doctors' office, sound-proof examining room and laboratory, also for a separate dining room for the staff, a large dining room for the patients and a spacious lounge. This remodeling generally improved facilities of the whole building.

Action was also taken to employ a social service worker to visit in the homes of children needing sanatorium care and to investigate applications on file for admission when the Children's Department was opened. The minutes show that the Children's Unit was being rapidly completed and furniture was also being purchased. An occupational therapy department was likewise provided for the children in the basement of the new unit. On July 18, 1932 the department opened with eighteen children as patients.

February 25, 1932 specifications were presented and prices submitted for suitable x-ray equipment for Sunny View. At a special meeting of the Board of Trustees July 8, 1932, the x-ray problem was discussed and action was taken to authorize advertising for bids for equipment. July 26 bids were opened and after due and careful deliberation, the Westinghouse Electric X-ray equipment was purchased and installation made in the room provided by the remodeling of the building.

In January, Dr. J. W. Lockhart resumed his duties, returning to the staff as consultant after several months' leave of absence. During his absence, consultation service was given by the Wisconsin Anti-Tuberculosis Association on a bi-monthly basis.

At the time the Winnebago County Sanatorium for Tuberculosis was completed in 1915, a name had not been chosen. Therefore, a decision was made to have a contest in the newspapers of the county, persons to send in suitable names. The person submitting the chosen name was to receive a sum of ten dollars. The contest was held from May until November, 1915. The name Sunny View was chosen by the judges, said name being sent in by a little girl who won the ten dollar prize.

Reference was often made to the hearty cooperation received from the public health nurses, leading nursing units and all welfare organizations. Records show that many health lectures and meetings were held for the interest and welfare of the patients and those concerned in their cure. From time to time reports were made listing the condition of the patients and the progress they were making, showing that there was an active interest in the work the institution was doing. Sunny View always endeavored to keep up its contacts with the outside counties and the state at large. Steps have been taken to provide adequate insurance for the institution so that the interests of the county would always be protected.

Through the untiring efforts of the present Board of Trustees, the sanatorium has been brought to the standard of an up-to-date institution by the installation, during the last two years, of modern facilities used for diagnosing and combatting tuberculosis, and the addition of a Children's Department where those who have come in direct contact with open cases and who are in a run-down condition can be built up so as to resist the disease and be taught how to take care of themselves in the future.

During the years, continued improvements have been made in the details of the building. Future plans along this line will be to provide adequate dental service, a large light treatment department, and a social service program. At all times efforts were made to improve and enhance the institution in every way, it being particularly noted that each year appropriations were made for further beautifying and landscaping the grounds about the sanatorium and Nurses' Home.

Many rules and regulations passed in the early days of organization governing the operation of Sunny View are still in effect today, showing that much thought and consideration were given to each subject as it was brought to the notice of those responsible for the institution.

The first case record we have of patients entering the institution is No. 52, but we know that the institution was open for about a year previous to this date. To date we have had about 1,346 patients admitted. Of this number, 52 were children, 25 of which have been discharged leaving that department filled to capacity with 29 patients. It is observed from reading the minutes of this institution that in all remodeling, steps were taken to add more beds for patients.

The most interesting part of a history of any institution are not the written words, but the personal efforts and sacrifices. The attitudes of communities and other incidents make an institution a living thing in the community. Sunny View was no exception, and there are many in the audience who remember the time when Sunny View was referred to as only a place to go in which to die. Many people knew that this dread place stood in the field on county property, and all effort to interest those who could be helped seemed to be in vain.

This institution's goal was to get patients to enter before their situation was hopeless. Also, to further educate the public in what could be done to eradicate tuberculosis in their communities. One of the most outstanding points in a study of the history of Sunny View is the concerted effort which has been given by everyone connected with the institution to improve its service to the patients and to the community.

The sanatorium has always followed the prescribed treatment as it was known to medical science through all the years. When it was first opened, very few people knew of the methods of diagnosing the disease that are known to the ordinary layman today. Scientists at home and abroad are working daily upon a cure for this disease. There are many angles to the subject that are being studied and today we are combatting the disease by prevention.

It is the wish of all in this work that you carry away from this meeting today the knowledge that something can be done for those suffering from tuberculosis and the results depend upon the time the disease is discovered. Early discovery means early recovery. You have seen this slogan used throughout the United States and there was never a slogan more true. Add to that early discovery, prompt treatment, and early recovery will be indeed a fact.

The symptoms of early tuberculosis can be so easily confused with those of other diseases that it behooves every one of use to keep in close touch with the family physician at the first manifestation of illness. It is only with an enlightened public who are constantly on the look-out for tuberculosis that we will be able to eradicate the disease.



Miss Cava Wilson, who became Superintendent of Sunny View on September 15, 1931, came from Shreveport, Louisiana, where she was the Superintendent of a 100-bed institution. She was highly recommended for the job from a standpoint of education, hospital training, managerial efficiency, as well as personality and character.

After a few weeks on the job, she stressed the need for a Children's Unit and a Social Services Case Worker to assist in finding persons carrying the deadly tuberculosis germs and getting these persons to Sunny View for treatment. The following year, 1932, she had obtained both of her requests.

In her first year as Superintendent, per capita costs were reduced by 14% through careful and efficient management. In 1932, her second year, she managed to cut another 24% from the per capita costs.

The addition of the Children's Unit raised the capacity of Sunny View to 91, making it the fourth largest county sanatorium in the state.

The "Great Depression" had its effect on everyone in these years, and in 1932 all employees' salaries were cut by 10% to help curb costs.

The Children's Unit opened on July 18, 1932 with a population of eighteen children. Miss Alice Dillon was in charge of the Children's Unit, and tried to make the children as comfortable and happy during their stay as possible.

A Parents' Group was formed for parents of children with tuberculosis to help the parents cope with the seriousness of the illness which faced their children and help them understand how to care for their children upon release.

Out-of-county patients were admitted with the understanding that they would have to be transferred elsewhere if Fond du Lac or Winnebago County applicants were in need of care at Sunny View.

Constant remodeling and updating occurred throughout the years at Sunny View to help modernize it and provide more effective treatment. In 1932, an x-ray room and laboratory were added to allow for more extensive study of each case.

Besides the first x-ray taken on admission, one was taken routinely of all patients every four months and more often if the physician ordered them. Employees were also examined and x-rayed every six months.

The Depression lingered on, and in 1933 "economy" was the watchword of the Board of Trustees. They did not undertake any projects or improvements which were not absolutely necessary in their opinion. Approved projects included: sidewalks, grading and sodding in front of the new Children's Unit, partitioning the basement for a Children's Exercise Room, addition of playground equipment and lawn furniture, and adding storm windows to the Nurses' Home. The parking lot was covered with crushed stone, and it was hoped that finances in the future would allow for hard surfacing.

Miss Cava Wilson made an appeal to the Board of Trustees and County Board in her Annual Report for additional improvements by stating:

"By ceasing to grow one does not fulfill his duty to the charges in his care. I urgently request that every consideration be given to the installation of a well-equipped light treatment department. The equipment is used very advantageously in the treatment of intestinal tuberculosis, tuberculosis of the throat and general radiation. It supplies the benefits derived from daily exposure to the sun which is lacking for patients who are confined to bed for long periods of time. The installation of such equipment in many institutions has more than paid for itself by decreasing the length of stay for patients, and I hope that equipment can be secured to further aid our patients in effecting a cure."

Her other request for the upcoming year was to remodel the six-bed wards to private or semi-private wards in order to isolate the positive from the negative cases.

As Miss Wilson stated, tuberculosis affected not only the lungs, but other parts of the body as well. Documented cases at Sunny View included TB osteomyelitis of the knee, which was helped by surgery, urinary tuberculosis, and a patient with TB of the spine which was so severe, his vertebrae collapsed and he had to wear a brace.

Nursing home patients and employees were in the "high risk" group for tuberculosis. Welfare clients had a high incidence of TB, probably because living standards were inferior. Welfare clients had five times as many tuberculosis cases as the general population.

Many persons were involved in seeing that persons with tuberculosis received treatment and care at Sunny View. They included: Fond du Lac County Judge Lawson E. Lurvey; Winnebago County Judge D. E. McDonald; Miss Ruth Pfeil, Fond du Lac County Nurse; Miss Sena Peterson, Winnebago County Nurse, and clergymen who gave spiritual aid and comfort to the patients, Reverend E. A. Koch, Reverend Aloysius Bastian and Mr. Ernest Schlerf.

In 1933, a Dental Department was added with Dr. R. C. Geary being the first Dentist at Sunny View. Prior to this, the dental program at Sunny View was chiefly one of meeting emergencies when required for relief of pain and some simple restorative services. The new program called for an examination of every patient every three months as a regular routine. After several months' time, results could be seen in improved mouth hygiene and masticating efficiency, two factors essential in the treatment of tuberculosis.

The Board of Trustees, along with the Chairman of the County Board, Mr. George Young, took advantage of several federal work programs to have all the patients' rooms and some of the buildings and grounds renovated. The federal government provided materials in the amount of \$7,300 and the county's share was \$4,700 on the repairs and improvements.

Miss Wilson's previous request to change the six-bed wards to double rooms became a reality. It appears that few of her requests were denied, as she was held in very high respect by the Board of Trustees and the County Board.

Her powers of persuasion were used on a former patient, Mr. Frank Pechman, who was enlisted to paint murals on the walls of the dining room and play room in the Children's Department.

The Civil Works Administration's projects were discontinued on March 31, 1934, and a new entranceway was only partially completed when funding ran out. The per capita cost was again reduced, but not at a sacrifice of service to the patients.

On July 18, 1934, the Children's Department celebrated its second anniversary of operation by inviting all discharged patients to return for the day. Two groups were entertained, the children and the adults. There were 75 children present who were weighed and measured to compare their weights and measurements on discharge.

The adults were entertained on the front lawn and about 150 guests were present. As a result of this gettogether, a Patients' Club was formed, which was thought to be a great help in following-up patients who had been discharged.

During this year, the institution was filled to capacity, with people being placed on a waiting list. Even with the large number of identified TB cases, the death rate during this year was the lowest in the history of the sanatorium.

On July 15, 1935, another anniversary celebration was held. Sunny View was 20 years old now. Discharged patients and their families were invited and over 200 attended. The Eagles Band provided music for the occasion. The two living members of the original Building Committee of Sunny View, Mr. George Stilp of Menasha, and Mr. Charles Fiss of Oshkosh were invited. Mr. Fiss attended and gave a short address. Education of the public was considered vital in the control of tuberculosis. Radio Station KFIZ in Fond du Lac donated 15 minutes of air time each week for a public broadcast on the subject of tuberculosis.

Miss Viola Pagel resigned as Head Nurse on June 1st to be married, and a two-year staff member, Miss Agnes Mattson replaced her.

During these years, legislators worked long and hard to enact legislation which would assist in the battle of the war against tuberculosis. In 1935, a controversial bill Number 336 was passed by the Wisconsin legislature, which left the decision of a tuberculosis patient's ability to pay and final disposition of the patient's property upon death up to the State Board of Control, rather than with a local County Judge.

Before this law was enacted, Wisconsin had some of the most advanced legislation in the care of the TB sick as the law was broad enough to permit those who could pay to pay, and those who in the discretion of a County Judge could not pay, to be cared for at County expense.

Sunny View Trustees felt the decision on ability to pay should be with a County Judge who was closer to the situation and better able to decide, and not with the State Board of Control.

After this controversial bill passed, a Winnebago County woman was asked to pay \$2.00 a week out of her \$17.00 a week salary for the care of her husband. Out of the remainder, she had to support herself, pay for transportation to Sunny View (cab fare was 75 cents one way), and buy small gifts for her husband. This presented quite a burden on her and was felt to be quite unjust from past practices.

In 1935, the federal government again assisted Sunny View in making improvements, by funding 45% of the cost of an eight-room brick addition to the Nurses' Home, a tencar brick garage to house the Nurses' automobiles and the installation of an Otis elevator in the sanatorium. In addition, a sun porch was added to the Children's Unit and the entrance lane was widened.

The waiting list for admission increased during the year partly due to the tuberculin test and x-rays given to the public and school children.

The tuberculin test, or "skin test" was done by injecting a small amount of tuberculin (a chemical derived from the tubercle bacilli) into the skin. If a slight swelling or redness appeared, it indicated a "positive" reaction and meant that the person had been in contact with an active case of TB and the tubercle bacilli were probably still alive. somewhere in the body, usually in spots in the lungs, or in a lymph node. A positive skin test meant that at some time in your life you had contact with TB and some of the bacteria which caused the disease had gained entry to your body. In the United States, such contact most often occurred by droplet infection in the air close to someone who had active TB. In other countries, the disease was also spread by milk from infected cows.

The majority of admissions during these years were in the advanced stage of the disease, making it necessary to furnish many months and sometimes years of hospitalization and some type of surgery was required in almost every instance to effect a recovery.

Over 210 patients were treated at Sunny View during the year 1935, and of that number, 14 died. Death was on the minds of all the patients in those days, and a cheerful atmosphere, planned activities and nourishing food was given to keep the patients' spirits high. The cost of food steadily increased over the years, so a garden was grown to help defray the food costs. The average prepared meal cost for the year was approximately thirteen cents, yet they were able to maintain a well balanced diet at all times.

Dr. E. B. Pfefferkorn resigned in 1935 to join the staff of the State Board of Health in Madison. Dr. George C. Owen was appointed to succed him for a six-month period on a "temporary basis" and stayed for the next seven years.

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Isolation of tuberculosis patients in an institution accomplished much in controlling the disease, but knowing that each case was contracted from another case, there were always two questions to be asked: From whom did this patient contract the disease? and, To whom has he spread the disease?

The Sunny View Trustees had two laws which they could resort to in an emergency when they could not get a tuberculosis victim to treatment. One law permitted someone in the community to declare the person a public menace. When that was done, the patient usually went to the institution willingly and made a very good patient. The alternative to commitment was jail, and they usually agreed to the sanatorium.

Another law more frequently used was the clause to the Children's Code pertaining to neglected children. This law was used in cases where a child was exposed to someone with an active case of TB. In this instance, the child could be declared neglected and taken from the home unless the patient accepted care. Experience was that they only needed to threaten to use that law and the patient would cooperate. It was also used as a deterrent to patients who were set on going home against the advice of a physician. Patients' admissions were voluntary. A sanatorium could not force them to stay. People who left were categorized as "discharged" or "left against medical advice". Those who were discharged were deemed cured, and those who left against medical advice were still considered a public menace and could infect family and friends with whom they came in contact.

The patients at Sunny View edited, compiled and typed the sanatorium newspaper "The Vox Sanitas" which gave the news of the patients and happenings of the day. It was also a form of occupational therapy for the patients.

An ultra-modern fire alarm system was installed in 1936, which, within fifteen seconds upon detection of a fire, would notify the Western Union Telegraph Office of Oshkosh and the fire department. This was of utmost importance, since they had an average population of 96 patients, 73 of whom were bedridden, and 50 officials, nurses and employees.

Sunny View received a notice from the State Board of Health to cease draining its raw sewage into Lake Winnebago. A study was conducted with the Winnebago County Farm and Winnebago State Hospital who also received notices, to determine the best and most effective method of handling their sewage. An agreement was reached to transfer the sewage to the State Hospital and then connect with the sewage system of the City of Oshkosh, with each paying a part of the cost.

Since people with TB had been on a waiting list from one to four months and valuable time was being lost in treating them, it was decided to utilize one-half of the Children's Unit for adults, and the rooms were fully occupied as soon as construction was completed.

The installation of the elevator proved to be a great help, especially for very ill patients to be taken to the examining room on second floor via the elevator rather than the stairs, and for the housekeeping department which previously carried the supply of linen up two flights of stairs.

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The old nurses' call system which utilized buzzers became obsolete and could no longer be repaired so a new system with signal lights was installed. The plugs from the old call system were connected so that radios could be used on the wire, with connections controlled at the Nurses' Station so the radios could not be played during rest hours. Radios in the rooms had been taboo since the nurses could not control their use.

A Follow-Up Worker, Miss Alice Willoughby, joined the staff of Sunny View Sanatorium on June 1, 1937. It took four months of searching to find a well-trained and experienced person to do tuberculosis follow-up. Miss Willoughby, resigned July 1, 1938. The Sunny View automobile, a 1929 Chevrolet, was replaced in February, 1938, the successful bidder being the Thom Motor Company of Oshkosh, with a low bid of \$998.00 for a 1938 Studebaker Commander. The following is a reprint from "Vox Sanitas", the Sunny View newspaper: "Autobiography of An Old San Car--

I was a 1929 model Chevrolet and arrived at Sunny View that same year, the pride and joy of the institution, and as said, "a darn swell job'. I was immediately put into service, service of mercy, business and pleasure, and if I do say so I did them well. Through storm and tempest, rain and snow, sleet and sunshine, I was always on the job. I carried all nationalities. I attended religious services and all kinds of meetings and conventions. I have had my day and am ready to retire. I'm just an old jaloppy now, and 'Study Baker', it is up to you. We welcome you. May you render service equal, if not better, and may your years be many."

Sunny View was fully accredited by the American College of Surgeons in this year, indicating it had met their standards in the way of equipment and medical care for tuberculosis patients.

An Intern was hired on September 21, 1937, who resided at Sunny View and was available for emergencies as they arose and to see patients daily so that new developments in their disease could be given immediate attention.

In order to supply a cool drink of water, an electric Frigidaire water cooler was purchased in April, 1938, which replaced the old upside-down contaminated crock in the patients' dining room.

Welcome was extended to Mr. M. G. Walsh who succeeded President E. R. Williams (who had served since 1927). Mr. Walsh began his duties on January 1, 1939 as a member of the Board of Trustees. Trustee J. J. Davis was elected President at the Board Meeting.

It was at the Board of Trustees meeting on February 23, 1939 that Superintendent Cava Wilson submitted her resignation to be effective June 1, 1939, after having served as Superintendent since 1931. The resignation was accepted with regrets as the sanatorium and the community were well aware of the loss of a most capable and efficient woman.

She had served as President of the Wisconsin Sanatorium Superintendents' Association, and it was through her perseverance and endless work that Sunny View became fully accredited with the American College of Surgeons, and as President of the State Superintendents, encouraged all state sanatoria to also become accredited. Her interest in participating in educational work, especially teaching prevention of tuberculosis and care of those afflicted with the disease was apparent in the entire tuberculosis field in Wisconsin.

Her resignation coincided with her announcement to marry Mr. Will Ross, a widely known manufacturer of hospital supplies, and who was very active in the service for those afflicted by tuberculosis. They met at a meeting they both attended concerned with the care of tuberculosis patients. Mr. Ross' interest in helping those with tuberculosis stemmed from his own recovery of the disease.

A surprise shower was held for Miss Wilson following the monthly religious services conducted by Reverend E. A. Koch. All of the patients who were able had gathered in the lobby for the services and they presented Miss Wilson with a lovely gift and flowers, a tribute to her popularity as Superintendent.

Many other parties and showers were given for Miss Wilson, and at one, a toast was presented to the bride-tobe:

"Here's to the Rosses and Wilsons -

Then our glasses let us fill

And drink a glass of happiness for Cava and for Will The Rosses are a famous clan,

Or so we've been instructed.

Betsy made the stars and stripes

While Charlie got abducted.

Now Willie comes along and puts the others in the shade

By winning for himself a charming, clever little maid. The Wilson clan is famous, too,

No matter what you thought of 'em.

But Woodrow Wilson had just fourteen points

While Cava has a lot of 'em!"

They were married May 10, 1939 in the Reception Room of the Nurses' Home at Sunny View. The Reverend E. A. Koch read the marriage vows before a group of the couple's intimate friends, members of the sanatorium's Board of Trustees and members of the Sunny View staff.

Because of the appreciation the bride felt toward the late Colonel John Hicks for his donation of the Nurses' Home, the large fireplace in the reception room over which his portrait hung was chosen as the setting for the wedding. The fireplace was banked with a profusion of lovely white flowers and ferns, with the portrait as the center of the decorative theme.

Her thoughts and concern for the patients at Sunny View carried over even on her wedding day. During the reception held immediately after the ceremony, the patients at Sunny View were also served refreshments.

A new era began on March 31, 1939, with Miss Agnes Mattson being appointed Superintendent to replace Miss Wilson. Miss Mattson had served as Head Nurse for four years, so was well acquainted with the operations of Sunny View. She was a very dedicated lady with a reputation as a "tough Swede who ran a tight ship".

Shortly after she took charge, a patient's radio was broken during a move to another room. She told him having radios was a special privilege and Sunny View cannot be held responsible. She informed the Trustees about the incident, saying, "If they are going to fuss, we will take the radios from them and they can use earphones again."

She supervised all food served to patients and wanted all meals to be attractive in appearance because meals were the highlight of the day's activities. A dietician was not needed since she served in that capacity.

Although she was regarded as strict, she was also very compassionate. A patient who suffered a relapse with TB was given a personal visit and words of encouragement by Miss Mattson.

She never married, and regarded her patients as "very passionate people". She tried to enforce very strict rules to keep the men and women apart. Despite her rules, romances did bloom at Sunny View and upon their release, a number of former patients who met at Sunny View were married.

By 1940, more patients at Sunny View were served than at any other time in its history. A total of 207 patients were treated during the year.

More modern sterilizing equipment was added which made minor surgery to the phrenic nerve possible, which proved to be very beneficial to many patients.

Several years had passed since having the services of a Follow-Up Worker. On January 1, 1940, Mrs. Pauline Greene, a graduate medical social worker from the University of Minnesota joined the staff to follow-up on discharged cases and on contact cases.

Handicraft played a large part in the lives of many patients. An average of about 53 people took part in activities which included sewing, embroidery, knitting, crocheting, leather tooling, painting, camera work, and wood and metal shop. It helped to pass the many hours of waiting for the disease to finally leave or subside.

With a war threatening in Europe, Sunny View was aware of the world situation while maintaining its own 'defense program' on the war against tuberculosis with fresh air, plenty of rest, and good food. The kitchen and diet kitchen were completely modernized in 1940.

The Intern Program was discontinued due to the nation's defense program being stepped up.

Upon the resignation of Mrs. Pauline Greene, Miss Josephine Miller, R.N., joined the staff as Follow-Up Worker. Dr. Owen urged that despite the depletion of personnel and the diversion of energies required by the national defense effort, other efforts in the control of TB must be increased rather than diminished at this time due to the fact that alarming increases in tuberculosis were being reported from Europe. His motto was "Tuberculosis is communicable, preventable and curables"

With the advent of Pearl Harbor and World War II, Dr. Owen was called into the service. Dr. G. L. Bellis served as Attending Physician during his absence. Dr. Bellis was provided with living quarters at the Sanatorium through the conversion of the sun parlor in the Nurses' Home to two rooms, a bathroom, vestibule and outside entrance, making it comfortable and attractive for him, plus giving the convenience of having a doctor on the premises on a 24-hour basis.

Dr. R. C. Geary, Sunny View's Dentist, was also inducted into the service, being replaced by Dr. F. M. Wheeler who was on "loan" from the Winnebago State Hospital on Saturday afternoons for the duration of the war

Scarcity of materials curtailed some of the improvements and repairs at Sunny View, however, since linoleum was not rationed the corridors on the first floor were recovered.

Tuberculosis claimed the lives of eleven Sunny View patients during the year 1942, and on a brighter note, 77 patients were discharged. Sixteen patients left against medical advice, which was a dangerous thing for them to do as they were still deemed to have active cases of tuberculosis.

A root cellar was added in 1943 for the storage of fruit and vegetables grown at Sunny View. The orchard yielded nearly 200 bushels of apples annually. In addition, they could buy vegetables in quantity and have a storage place for them.

Personnel shortages became a critical problem, with many serving in the military, and some leaving to work at much higher wages in war-related industries. There were also shortages of tires and gasoline, but the sanatorium's many friends continued visiting, bringing gifts and giving assistance.

The "Free Care Bill" was passed by the Wisconsin Legislature in 1945, making it no longer necessary for the County Judge to determine the ability of patients to pay for their care in whole or in part. Patients were provided free care in state, county, or private sanatoria, regardless of their financial status, provided they had legal residence and resided in Wisconsin for five or more years. If they were not a legal resident, a County Judge would determine their ability to pay for part or all of their care. In the fiscal year 1944-1945, Sunny View experienced the greatest number of vacancies in its history, which was welcome to a certain extent because of the shortage of nurses and other personnel. Re-admissions were greater in this year than at any time, and the second breakdown usually took longer to heal than the first.

When the war ended, it was felt that Sunny View could return to normal operating procedures. However, this was not the case, as the shortage of personnel, supplies and uncertainty of conditions were felt, not only among the staff, but also among the patients. Many patients became critical and uncooperative. When the Sanatorium was filled to capacity with a waiting list, criticism and fault-finding of the nurses and administration were at a minimum. But since there were vacanies, the reverse was true.

Dr. Owen did not return to Sunny View upon his release from the Army, so Dr. Bellis continued to serve as Medical Director.

After World War II, Bill 250A was introduced to the Wisconsin Legislature which would permit TB ex-servicemen to be licensed to sell food, candy bars, ice cream, etc. as peddlers without license fees. Trustees at Sunny View objected violently to this bill, stating no TB person should be permitted to handle or peddle food. The TB germ in an ex-serviceman could do just as much harm as in any other indiviudal.

Another bill objected to by the Trustees was Bill 1595, which discouraged sanatoriums from hiring expatients. The Trustees disagreed with this bill, stating that ex-TB nurses gave the best of care to patients and were more understanding to the problems of being faced with tuberculosis.

Due to the extreme contagiousness of the disease, a law was passed in 1945 which forbade TB patients from handling food in public restaurants, entering public places or conveyances or attending public schools.

In 1946, mass BCG vaccinations were being conducted in European countries. After studies by the Public Health Service, it was not recommended for use in the United States since its effectiveness had not been determined. They felt that vaccination might lead to a false sense of security which could result in failure to observe precautions that should be taken.

A new drug, Streptomycin, became available in 1947 at Sunny View. It was tried on many patients, however, some patients developed a loss of hearing through its use and there were over 700 lawsuits filed nationwide. Dosage was reduced to less than half of what was used in the initial stages, and loss of hearing became very rare.

Another treatment method was the "equalizing pressure chamber", which operated in reverse of an iron lung, which it resembled. Sunny View obtained its first chamber in 1947. Only the desperately ill were selected for treatment in the chamber. Most of these patients were too ill for surgery and had failed to respond to other types of treatment.

The pressure chamber completely immobilized the lungs, thereby providing the complete rest required. Dr. Bellis felt there was definite value in using the chamber in the treatment of pulmonary TB patients, and many of these critically ill patients showed improvements following its use.

Being the first sanatorium west of the Alleghenies to obtain a pressure chamber, Sunny View drew hundreds of visitors to view the new machine, especially sanatorium nurses, physicians, public health officials, etc. to secure first-hand information.

Dr. Bellis was besieged with letters from all over the United States asking for more information on the pressure chamber. He was becoming an expert in the field of pressure chambers, and gave a speech on the subject at the American Medical Association Convention in Chicago in 1948, and presented a paper and case reports to a large group of TB physicians and chest surgeons at the Veterans Hospital in Milwaukee. Another article, "Total Lung Rest for Pulmonary Tuberculosis" was written by Dr. Bellis and published in The Beacon, the Wisconsin State Tuberculosis Sanatorium magazine in 1948.

Sunny View had obtained 3 of the 20 pressure chambers being used nationwide (one of which was donated by the Oshkosh Junior Chamber of Commerce). Use of the pressure chambers was discontinued in the early 1950's as new drugs had been found which had a greater effect on tuberculosis.

The Children's Department was closed in 1946 due to a staff shortage, and only six children were being treated. They were moved and isolated on the north corridor of the main building. The second floor of the Children's Unit had been occupied by adults for the past ten years due to the decreased population of children being admitted. By 1948, only one child was being treated.

Times were changing, and employees no longer wanted to live at the same place where they worked. A modern Nurses' Home was no longer a selling point to nurses or other workers. Workers who wanted to live in Oshkosh found they had a transportation problem since there was no bus service to Sunny View. Most employees arrived to work by private automobiles or joined a car pool.

During the year, new case-finding was promoted by the State Board of Health through the use of a mobile x-ray unit. Large groups of industrial workers, students and others were x-rayed and few cases found.

Another new drug was being used in 1948, an antibiotic called Para Aminosalicylic Acid (PAS). The supply was limited and expensive. The drug was used in addition to the established methods of therapy -- plenty of rest, good food, fresh air and sunshine.

In 1948, Dr. Bellis brought to the attention of the County Board the fact that some people were abusing the "free care" provided at Sunny View. Most of these freeloaders were hoboes or jobless vagrants who sought refuge in the winter and knew they could fake some TB symptoms and be admitted and tested. Usually the testing and evaluating took two to three months, which took them through the coldest part of the winter, and they received excellent food, good care, and were provided with room and board and even recreational activities.

Under state law, it was only necessary that the presence of tubercle infection be "suspected" to secure a free sanatorium bed. Dr. Bellis wanted the law changed to prevent those not in need from entering TB sanatoriums.

Great strides were made over the years in controlling the spread of tuberculosis. In 1909, there were 7 deaths per day from tuberculosis, and by 1948, there were only 7 deaths per year. The tuberculosis rate was highest among people over age 45. Among the elderly, the case rate among men was four times greater than among women. No one knows why.

Trustee F. T. Chittenden of Ripon died on March I, 1950. He had served as Trustee since 1929. He was remembered by associates as having a keen interest in the patients' welfare. An F. T. Chittenden Memorial Fund was given to Sunny View, and a lovely painting was purchased and placed in the lobby in his memory. Mr. Gilbert Lambert, Executive Vice President of Ripon State Bank, replaced Trustee Chittenden.

Dr. Bellis retired in 1951, and was replaced by Dr. Vernon Guenther, who had assisted on the Medical Staff at Sunny View for several years. Dr. Guenther continued to serve until the closing of Sunny View in 1971.

1952 was a year of discovery: the atom, radar, and other scientific discoveries which made for a faster and more efficient moving world, and tuberculosis entered this category. The entire picture of TB was revolutionized with the new drugs, streptomycin and para-aminosalicylic acid, and with a greater number of patients having surgery, such as lobectomy (removal of the diseased lobe of the lung), and segmental resection where just a segment of the lung containing the localized infection was resected. These procedures reduced the time a patient was hospitalized, which in turn, reduced the cost to the county. All chest surgery was now being done at St. Agnes Hospital in Fond du Lac rather than at Wisconsin General Hospital, which reduced the cost and travel time.

In 1953, Dr. C. W. Leonard replaced Board of Trustees Vice-President W. A. Hill. Dr. Leonard was an ex-TB patient and it was felt he would serve in a very understanding manner.

On November 24, 1952, Winnebago County lost an outstanding citizen. Mr. E. R. Williams had served on the Board of Trustees for 27 years. He had served on the Board of Directors and Executive Committee of the Wisconsin Anti-Tuberculosis Association for nine years. A resolution was passed by the Wisconsin Anti-Tuberculosis Association, which praised him for his faithful attendance at meetings, his lively interest in W.A.T.A., cheerful good nature and reasonableness with which he approached all questions. Someone once said, "The good citizen in thought and deed embodies loyal service to enrich the common life." Trustee Williams was the good citizen personified.

On June 30, 1953, Dr. F. M. Wheeler terminated what was to have been a "temporary appointment" for the duration of the war when the former dentist was called into the service. Dr. Wheeler continued at this post for ten years. Dr. R. B. Stamborski of Oshkosh replaced him as the Sunny View Dentist.

A 27-inch television set was donated by the Junior Chamber of Commerce of Fond du Lac, Oshkosh, Neenah and Menasha, which added much pleasure for the patients. Television was a rather new commodity and reception was poor, but it brought amusement to the patients who would watch black and white images across the screen fade in and out. Tag-team wrestling, the Friday night boxing matches, and "Captain Video" a space program, entertained the patients in those days. In addition, Mr. Harold Hurlbutt showed movies to the patients on a regular basis over a number of years, which was gratefully appreciated.

A study was being conducted on the effectiveness of the new drugs, streptomycin, PAS and isonicotinic acid, the latter being used in cases of tuberculosis meningitis as it was able to penetrate the spinal fluid. Drugs were found to be much more effective than the equalizing pressure chambers, which quickly fell out of favor as a treatment method and were no longer used.

Personnel problems seemed to plague Sunny View during 1954. The Head Nurse and Assistant Head Nurse were absent for several months with serious illnesses. Mr. Stuart White, X-ray and Laboratory Technician resigned May 1st, but was replaced by a former employee, Miss Ethel Liebl, on August 1st who returned after two years' absence. Mr. Frank Earle, Fireman, retired on April 8th after 28 years of loyal and faithful service. The shortage of personnel and having to work long and hard hours to continue with the necessary duties finally demoralized Superintendent Agnes Mattson. She submitted her resignation at a Board of Trustees meeting on June 29, 1954. The Board declined to accept her resignation and advised her to get additional competent help so as to give her the necessary assistance and lighten her workload.

That evening, a meeting was held with the Winnebago and Fond du Lac County Sanatorium Committees and the Board of Trustees. Miss Mattson again asked if they would accept her resignation. Lawrence Gaffney of Fond du Lac County was very critical of her. Winnebago County Board Chairman Joseph Drexler moved that Miss Mattson withdraw her resignation. A second to the motion was made by Fond du Lac County Board Chairman Walter Hollander. The motion carried, with the exception of a "No" from Mr. Gaffney. Most members expressed their full confidence in the Superintendent and her operation of the Sanatorium. After this vote of confidence, Miss Mattson resumed her duties with renewed effort and enthusiasm.

Perhaps the most striking development in the year 1954 was the unprecedented number of empty beds in tuberculosis sanatoria. It was said of physicians in the tuberculosis field that they were unique in having as their objective the eventual elimination of need for their services.

The death rate for tuberculosis had fallen from number one in the early 1900's to number 8 in 1954. The death rate had fallen from 188 to 12 per hundred thousand. The American Tuberculosis Association was pushing for "eradication of TB" rather than just merely controlling it.

A noted Montreal psychiatrist, Dr. Eric Wittkower, made this observation about tuberculosis patients: "TB and other chronic illnesses lead to a neurotic concentration on self. This and other emotional disturbances resulting from long-term illnesses sometimes cause patients to leave sanatoriums and refuse to return".

One patient walked out of Sunny View on three different occasions against medical advice, and stayed away on one instance for a year and a half. He infected his six-year old son during one of his home visits and his son became a patient at Sunny View in 1953.

Fire escapes and front entrance doors were installed to comply with State Codes in 1954.

Trustee (and Board President for many years) J.J. Davis resigned in 1955, after having served from 1927 to 1955. He was President of the Board from 1939 to 1955. He was known as a man of intelligence and ability who gave freely in every possible way to the betterment of Sunny View and the welfare of its patients. He was replaced by Mr. Lloyd Buhler. Mr. Buhler served until his death in 1969, and had also served as Board President for many years. He was responsible for affecting many changes at Sunny View in both care, treatment and physical plant.

Since Sunny View was now 40 years old, many repairs and replacements needed to be made. The twenty-five year old refrigerator, which had been converted from an icebox, finally gave out, and a new one was ordered, along with a new electric range and oven. The parking lot was sealcoated, and the outside trim on all buildings was painted.

Many gifts were donated to Sunny View by civic groups over the years, to help the efficient operation of the sanatorium and which made life more pleasant for the patients. In 1955, Sunny View was the recipient of 25 chairs for the Recreation Room, a piano, two portable record players, and four 21" TV sets.

Dr. Guenther reported in 1955 that a new drug was now available, called isoniazid, which seemed superior to streptomycin and PAS. All drugs, preventive as well as curative, can cause trouble, but so does the disease they are intended to prevent or cure. Isoniazid (better known as INH) which both prevented and cured tuberculosis was no exception. Its side effects included dizziness, skin rashes, nausea, and numbness of hands and feet.

An elderly patient at Sunny View developed mental aberrations due to the use of the highly acclaimed drug INH. Drug use was discontinued for him and he improved. INH was used abundantly because it was felt it prevented TB from developing in persons infected by or exposed to TB, by deactiviting the TB germs and preventing them from multiplying. Its popularity arose from the fact that it was effective, inexpensive and tasteless.

The number of admissions declined from 115 in 1944 to only 55 in 1954, due in part to the use of the new drugs, plus better casefinding and control of the disease. Unfortunately, the mortality rate did not decrease over the period, but remained pretty constant at 10.5%. However, many of the fatalities were those patients who died within hours or days following their discovery and transfer from a private hospital.

From 1953 to 1957 there was a decline of 39% in TB patients at sanatoria in Wisconsin, indicating the programs and treatments were working. The reduced patient population brought about the closing of Forest Lawn Sanatorium in 1957 and Lake Tomahawk State Camp. The Wisconsin State Sanatorium closed in 1958.

Although the patient count was down, the overhead costs remained constant, causing the per capita cost to increase to \$75.12 per day in 1957.

Trustee Charles Lines passed away in 1958. His keen interest in the welfare and treatment, of the tuberculous was twofold -- one, the humanitarian aspect, and the

other, he himself had been a patient at Sunny View. Miss Agnes Mattson stated "no one has ever been more conscientious in his responsibilities as a member of the Board of Trustees as Mr. Lines." He was replaced by Dr. E. B. Williams.

The Dutch Elm Disease invaded the beautiful elm trees at Sunny View, and some were lost to the disease. It was ironic that disease was a problem both inside and outside at Sunny View during the 1950's.

The problem of closing sanatoria loomed before administrators throughout the state, since the number of patients fell 49% from 1953 to 1959. Some were turned into nursing homes. Others were closed indefinitely.

Trustee Dr. C. W. Leonard resigned in 1959 and was replaced by Dr. W. C. Wojta of Fond du Lac, who served until 1971.

In 1960, a meeting was held with Oshkosh, Neenah, Menasha and Winnebago County Nurses and a uniform technique of skin testing was established. If a person was found to have a positive skin test, the next step would be to have x-rays to see if TB was present. If found, admission to a sanatorium would be recommended. (The x-rays were paid for through the proceeds of the sale of Christmas Seals by the Wisconsin Tuberculosis Association.)

Miss Agnes Mattson ended her reign as Superintendent for the past 28 years with her resignation on November 16, 1961. The Board of Trustees accepted her resignation with regret, as she had served faithfully and with distinction over the years. She was replaced by Mr. Roger Sievers, R.N., the first male Superintendent in Sunny View's history, on January 1, 1962.

During the 1960's building changes were made to comply with the State's Industrial Code. The heating plant was converted from coal-fired boilers to gas, and the kitchen was air conditioned.

The water supply became a major problem, with the water being a rusty color with a very bad odor. The purchase of a water softener did not help the problem, because it made the water salty tasting and the odor was still present. In 1963, the installation of a new water main was planned to alleviate the problem. Fire escapes and a fire alarm system were also installed in 1963.

Outpatient treatments were fast becoming the method of treating people who were no longer contagious, and Sunny View experienced a 300% growth in outpatient treatments from 1959 to 1963. In 1962, 1,530 outpatient treatments were recorded.

In 1963, the National Tuberculosis Association published the following statement:

"We are emerging from an era where the patient has been considered an object of fear. He was a person who was transferred to the nearest sanatorium as soon as possible, one whose mattress, pillows and bed linens were fumigated, sterilized or destroyed; one whose dishes were washed and sterilized separately; one who is to be contacted only when adequately protected by mask, gown and hand disinfectants.

The era of the mask and fumigation is not yet over, although new and more enlightening handling of the infectiousness of the TB patient has begun. New studies reveal that the danger of transmission of tuberculosis through contact with objects is slight, except for small children.

The air in the room of a patient in a sanatorium may not be dangerous to breathe for a short time, but the concentration of a bacilli may be high enough to produce an infection over a longer period of time. Sanitary ventilation (open windows) or air disinfection (ultra-violet radiation of upper air in rooms) is essential until the diagnosis is established and treatment is well underway."

Apparently it was not only the public who was misinformed and in fear of the dread tuberculosis, but also members of the medical profession. In the same year as the article appeared, Dr. Vernon Guenther, Sunny View's physician, scheduled a patient for lung surgery in Fond du Lac. According to a letter sent to Dr. Guenther from a Fond du Lac doctor, "The anesthesiologist refused to provide anesthetic services due to superstition and ignorance regarding resectional treatment of tuberculosis."

In 1963, Dr. G. W. Lambert resigned from the Board of Trustees due to ill health and died later that year.

1964 brought about the construction of a new water main, addition of combination storm and screen windows, and the remodeling of the examination offices and laboratory.

It was in this year that the program "KO-TB" was being promoted, which caused a large burden on doctors and nurses in performing additional tests and recordkeeping for the program. Eradication of TB was the ultimate goal of the program, however, "eradication" was later changed to "control" since eradication did not seem to be possible on a worldwide basis.

Due to the high number of empty beds at Sunny View, Superintendent Roger Sievers recommended transforming the Children's Wing of Sunny View to a Chronic Disease Hospital. The Trustees felt this was an excellent idea, and the Children's Wing was converted to a Chronic Disease Hospital with a capacity of 29 beds in 1965. An Open House was held on March 28, 1965 with several hundred visitors touring the new facilities and celebrating the 50th Anniversary of the opening of Sunny View. Mr. Wilbur Schmidt, Director of the State Department of Public Welfare, wrote a letter of commendation to officials of Winnebago and Fond du Lac Counties praising them for planning to effectively use this facility (as a Chronic Disease Hospital) since it was no longer needed in its entirety for TB patients.

The Chronic Disease Hospital officially opened on April 1, 1965, and admitted 3 patients. After 3 months of operation, 14 patients were being cared for, and by the end of the year, the Chronic Disease Hospital was filled to capacity.

The TB patients at Sunny View averaged around 20 at this time. Very few TB patients were having relapses, as was the case in the pre-drug era.

Donations continued to be made to Sunny View, and in 1965 the Oshkosh United Fund donated \$600 for an electrocardiograph machine. The Oshkosh TB Association donated two TV sets.

In 1966, the per capita costs were reduced from \$172 per patient per week to \$126.25. The reduction was due to the savings effected by dual operation of the Sanatorium and the Chronic Disease Hospital.

New cases of tuberculosis were still appearing. Cases tended to come in groups, often because one far-advanced patient had infected many others.

In 1966 the Sanatorium was dealt a blow by the loss of Superintendent Roger Sievers, who was drafted into the army for a two-year hitch. Although Mr. Sievers asked for a deferment due to his employment, his request was denied.

During the next year, Mrs. Carole Holtmeier, Administrative Assistant at Sunny View, became Acting Superintendent, with the assistance of Dr. Guenther. A critical shortage of nurses at Sunny View resulted in the early discharge of Mr. Sievers from the service to return to Sunny View as Superintendent.

Medicare became effective on July 1, 1966, which would now allow patients in the Chronic Disease Hospital to be eligible for benefits for up to 100 days.

This year, the Oshkosh TB Association's donation was used to purchase a portable x-ray machine, which could be rolled to the bedside of the patient. A pilot program was begun using the new portable x-ray unit for inmates in the County Jail.

When Superintendent Roger Sievers returned from the Armed Services, he was faced with 27 new admissions for tuberculosis -- 22 of these moderately advanced or far advanced cases. Four patients at Sunny View died this year, in spite of chemotherapy and modern methods of treatment. Over 1800 patients died at Sunny View from 1915 to closing. Many were young people. The really sick ones knew they were getting worse. Most of them just slipped into a coma and died. Some coughed until the cavity in their lungs hit a large blood vessel and they bled to death.

When the nurses heard the hemorrage bell, they dropped what they were doing and came running. Sometimes it was to no avail, and the hearse would come to take the victim away. If they had no money, they would be buried at County expense in Potter's Field (near Sunny View), with only a numbered stone marking their grave.

Superintendent Roger Sievers resigned in 1968, to be replaced again by Mrs. Carole Holtmeier who was Acting Superintendent until the hiring of Mr. Jesse Fissel in 1969.

As late as 1969, new drugs were still being tested on the national level for the cure and control of tuberculosis, which was important because there was always a small number of patients whose TB bacilli were resistant to all available drugs.

Mr. Will Ross, a pioneer in tuberculosis control and a former TB patient, pointed out the value of the sanatorium when he stated: "The great value of the sanatorium to the patient lies in the fact that the rigid discipline saves him from lapsing into ways or pursuits which would retard his recovery. He learns to observe the rules of treatment instinctively, and returns to his own home fitted to carry on his recovery without being a menace to his family."

One elderly female patient at Sunny View during its last years of operation did not learn to observe the rules of treatment "instinctively". She did not approve of doctors and had never been to see one prior to her admittance at Sunny View. Whenever a doctor tried to examine her, she would flail about with her cane and would not let him near her. She refused drugs, and her only interest was in regaining her freedom from confinement and in finding someone who would tell her that she did not have TB and was not a public health hazard.

She wrote to the Department of Health and Social Welfare complaining that the doctor had given her a shot two years ago and she had been dizzy ever since. She also asked how to go about obtaining a release from Sunny View. Her release would only have spread the disease to others since her tests continued to remain positive during her stay.

The closing of Sunny View Sanatorium was advocated by County Board Supervisors Hibbard Engler and Virginia Nolan as early as 1961, however, it was not closed for another ten years. In 1961, tuberculosis still remained the number 15 killer among diseases in the nation. Mr. Jesse Fissel terminated his employment at Sunny View on July 6, 1971. The few remaining patients were transferred to Park View Health Center or other sanatoriums in the state. The Board of Trustees' services were terminated on November 1, 1971. Members of the last Board of Trustees were: Dr. Edward Loftus, Chairman; John Ziebell and Carl Zick. They were commended by the County Board for their fine services.

Mr. Donald Zboray, Superintendent of Park View Health Center, assisted in the closing of Sunny view, and acted as Secretary to the Board of Trustees during the phase-out period. At the time of closing, there were 8 patients who were transferred to Park View, and 31 employees (a few of whom retired and many were hired by Park View).

Sunny View patients were a close-knit group, sharing their joys and sorrows with each other and their families. The employees also had a bond, and to this day continue to hold an annual reunion on the second Saturday in June.

Sunny View offically closed its inpatient services on September 21, 1971, after 56 years of operation. Many of the medical records were sent to Rocky Knoll Sanatorium. Later, an outpatient dispensary was set up at Park View Health Center for x-rays and follow-up under the auspices of Rocky Knoll Sanatorium, which also eventually phased out.

A plaque which was placed on Sunny View in 1954 tells the whole story of its reason for existence from 1915 to 1971:

"HAVEN OF CARE AND HEALING FOR THE TUBERCULOSIS SICK; STOUT WALL OF PROTECTION FOR THEIR FAMILIES AND ASSOCIATES; EMBODIMENT OF A PROUD AND CIVIC DETERMINATION THAT TUBERCULOSIS CAN BE FOUND, TREATED AND CONQUERED. "

In late 1972, the Winnebago County Board passed a resolution to purchase Fond du Lac County's interest in Sunny View for the price of \$84,000. This amount was arrived at following appraisals of the property and negotiations which had been conducted throughout the year. Fond du Lac County agreed to the sale.

A feasibility study to see if any of the buildings at Sunny View could be converted into usable office space was conducted in 1973. The findings were: the Nurses' Home could be converted into offices at a cost of \$200,000 (compared to a cost of \$300,000 to construct a new building of comparable size). Demolition costs were estimated at \$15,000 for the main building; \$15,000 for the Nurses' Home; \$3,000 to level the boiler plant.

One of the suggested uses for the Nurses' Home was a Juvenile Detention Center, however, this idea was discarded as being too costly for the 5-7 youths who would be housed there, and another idea was to use it for a Day Care Center to house minimum security prisoners while new quarters were being built.

At the November County Board meeting in 1973, the vote was 32 to 10 to raze the main Sunny View Sanatorium building, boiler plant and other small buildings. The Nurses' Home in which the Guidance Clinic was located, would be remodeled to accommodate the University Extension Office, Soil & Water Conservation Service, and Parks Department.

Demolition of the main building had its ups and downs. First, the Winnebago County Sheriff's Department and City of Oshkosh Police Department bombarded it with gunfire and tear gas in a training exercise. Then, the County Board voted against having the Highway Department raze the remainder of the building, and hired Lil' Giant Excavators of Neenah to finish the demolition. Lil' Giant Excavators ran into problems with the Department of Natural Resources when they used an illegal site near Lake Winnebago to dump the debris. Legal problems plagued Lil' Giant Excavators, and finally the Highway Department finished the job.

The Nurses' Home remains as a useful office building today, in 1982, housing the University Extension Office, Soil & Water Conservation Service, Parks Department, and Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Services Offices.

By all rights, tuberculosis should now be a rarity because it can be cured and prevented. At least ten drugs effective against tuberculosis have been developed over the last four decades. Nevertheless, the number of tuberculosis cases in the world is increasing, a situation the World Health Organization calls "a scandal".

Tuberculosis kills at least 3,000,000 each year throughout the world, particularly in the underdeveloped countries where, despite the often painful symptoms, most cases remain unnoticed by health officials because only a fraction of the population has access to health services. Statistics for 1981 show that 27,412 tuberculosis cases were reported in the United States, and 190 cases were discovered in the State of Wisconsin.

As Miss Agnes Mattson said upon her retirement, "Tuberculosis is not eradicated so long as one positive seed spreader remains undiagnosed and untreated."
