ORGANIZATIONAL SESSION COUNTY BOARD MEETING TUESDAY, APRIL 16, 1996

County Clerk Linda Wolfe called the meeting to order at 6:00 P.M. in the Supervisors' Room, Fourth Floor, Courthouse, Oshkosh, Wisconsin.

The meeting was opened with the Pledge of Allegiance led by Corporal Timothy Egan of the U.S. Marine Corp and son of Supervisor Egan, and an Invocation by Supervisor Wagner.

Roll Call: All present except Supervisor Kramer who was excused. County Executive Steinhilber congratulated the supervisors on their re-election to the board and introduced the department heads and elected officials. Judge Robert Haase was introduced and administered the oath of office for the supervisors. The benediction was given by Supervisor Rankin, followed by a short recess.

ELECTION OF COUNTY BOARD CHAIRMAN

Motion by Supervisor Albrecht and seconded to nominate Supervisor Maehl as Chairman. Motion by Supervisor Frassetto and seconded to close nominations for Chairman. Carried. Motion to nominate Supervisor Maehl as Chairman - CARRIED BY UNANIMOUS VOICE VOTE.

ELECTION OF COUNTY BOARD VICE CHAIRMAN

Chairman Maehl took his seat and called for nominations for Vice

Chairman. Motion by Supervisor Hue and seconded to nominate Supervisor Albrecht as Vice Chairman. Motion by Supervisor Arne and seconded to close nominations for Vice Chairman. Carried. Motion to nominate Supervisor Albrecht as Vice Chairman - CARRIED BY UNANIMOUS VOICE VOTE.

Motion by Supervisor Lauson and seconded to accept the minutes of March 12 and March 26, 1996. CARRIED BY VOICE VOTE.

COUNTY EXECUTIVE'S REPORT

Executive Steinhilber reported that a Courthouse water pipe broke over the weekend causing damage to Circuit Court Branch 4, the Microfilm Department and the Treasurer's Office. Branch 4 has been temporarily moved to the first floor of the Courthouse in the old Personnel Office. The pipe that broke was over sixty years old and is a good indication that preventive maintenance needs to be done on the plumbing to avoid additional problems. Insurance should cover the cost of repairs.

APPOINTMENT OF INFORMATION SYSTEMS DIRECTOR

Executive Steinhilber introduced John Main to the Board. Mr. Main has been the Corporate Controller, MIS Manager and Personnel Manager for Zaug's, Inc., in Appleton.

Motion by Supervisor Montgomery and seconded to confirm John Main's appointment as Information Systems Director. CARRIED BY UNANIMOUS VOICE VOTE.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Supervisor Watry told the Board about an international convention she attended for the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh.

Supervisor Sundquist informed the Board that a Children's Health and Safety Fair will be held at Park Plaza, Oshkosh, on Sunday, April 21.

Supervisor Montgomery told the Board that he is selling ribbons as a fund raiser for the Boys and Girls Club. The ribbons will be available at the County Clerk's Office and asked that the Supervisors stop in and purchase one.

PUBLIC HEARING

There were no comments from the public.

COUNTY BOARD CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Chairman Maehl thanked the Board for electing him as Chairman. Chairman Maehl thanked Supervisor Wagner for the flowers she provided to the Board members and for arranging to have pizzas delivered for their recess.

REPORTS, RESOLUTIONS & ORDINANCES AMENDED MOTION NO. 1-496 — Adoption of Proposed Rules of the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors

Your undersigned Supervisors as former members of the Judiciary and Public Safety Committee of the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors hereby move the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors to adopt the proposed Rules of the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors which are herewith attached and made a part of this Motion by reference.

Motion by Supervisor Rengstorf and seconded to adopt. Supervisor Rengstorf presented the proposed rules and explained the changes as proposed. Motion by Supervisor Diakoff and seconded to amend proposed rules by adding "Maintenance Department" after "Purchasing Department" on Line 650. CARRIED BY VOICE VOTE. Motion by Supervisor Schwartz and seconded to delete, ", who are serving on Community Programs Board" on Lines 546 & 547. CARRIED BY VOICE VOTE. Supervisor Rengstorf noted that a correction should be made to Line 796 by deleting the words, "and Water" from the name of the Land Conservation Committee.

Vote on proposed rule changes: Ayes - 36, Nays - 0, Excused -2 (Barker and Kramer). CARRIED.

The final rules as adopted are as follows:

1996-1998 RULES OF THE WINNEBAGO COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

1.0 TIME AND MEETING PLACE

- 1.1 The meetings of the County Board shall be held in the Board of Supervisors' Room at 6:00 p.m. on the third Tuesday of the month. When an election falls on the third Tuesday of the month, the County Board meeting shall be held on the fourth Tuesday of the month.
- 1.2 The Board shall be in continuous session from day to day until adjournment to a day certain or sine die.

2.0 ORIENTATION MEETING

- 2.1 The Chair shall present an orientation program with an explanation of the work of the Board and the manner in which it functions, the appointment of committee membership, the projects of various departments, long range planning, and the status of various projects of the Board. He may ask for the help of the committee chairs or department heads in making such explanation.
- 2.2 The County Clerk shall make an explanation of procedure and the manner in which votes are taken and in particular the method of use of the electronic voting machine.
- **2.3** The Corporation Counsel shall also address the Board on the functions of his office.
- 2.4 The Personnel Director will explain the personnel forms required by that office.
- **2.5** The Chairman of the Judiciary & Public Safety Committee will explain the County Board rules.
- **2.6** All newly-elected supervisors who attend the Orientation Session prior to the Organizational Meeting shall be entitled to a half-day per diem at the existing rate.

3.0 ORGANIZATION MEETING

3.1 At the statutory Organization Meeting to be held in April of

- even-numbered years, it shall be the duty of the County Clerk to call the County Board to order. The Clerk shall call the roll and establish presence of a quorum and proceed with the preliminary ceremonies.
- 3.2 No resolutions or ordinances shall be considered at the Organization Meeting, except those relating to new rules and rule changes passed during the last term.
- **3.3** A quorum being present, the Board shall proceed to the election of a Chairman and Vice Chairman.
- 3.4 The Chairman shall appoint a Committee on Committees to advise the Chairman in the selection of committee members.
 The Committee on Committees shall consist of five Board members.
- 3.5 The proposed rules of the new Board shall be made available to the Board membership prior to the Organization Meeting.
- **3.6** There shall be an explanation of the present and proposed rules of the County Board.
- 3.7 The proposed rules of the Board shall be presented and rules adopted at the Organization Meeting of even-numbered years by a majority vote.
- 3.8 The Rules of the Board shall be amended during the twoyear period only by a two-thirds vote of those present at a meeting, except at the Annual Organization Meeting, at which time a majority of those present shall rule.
- 3.9 After the adoption of the Rules of the Board and other activities as noted in 3.0 through 3.8, the Board shall recess that Organization Meeting to the following Tuesday.
- 3.10 The Board, as the first order of business at the recessed meeting of the Organization Meeting shall officially approve all committee members by a majority vote of those present.
- 3.11 At the first regular session following the Organization Meeting, all members of each committee shall then meet for one-half hour to select committee officers and then report the results of such elections to the Board as a whole.
- **3.12** Any committee may, if the Committee membership so decides, postpone election of committee officers for not more than one month.
- 3.13 Between Organization meetings, should a vacancy occur, or the need arises to adjust a standing committee, then the County Board Chairman shall make appointments to fill the

vacancy.

3.14 Between the Organization Meeting and the first regular session, the Chairman shall be authorized to conduct an emergency committee meeting with any of the former members of that committee.

4.0 BUDGET SESSION

- **4.1** The procedures to be followed during the budget session and calendar year (except as stated in 4.2, 4.3 and 4.4 shall be:
 - 1. Open each meeting during the budget session with time allowed for a public hearing.
 - 2. No vote will be taken on any resolution or amendment until it has had a public hearing.
- **4.2** The first public hearing, as required by law, on the proposed annual budget shall be held at 7:00 p.m. on the date selected.
- 4.3 The Finance Director shall report to the Board any errors in the budget. The corrections shall be made prior to the presentation of any amendments. The Board shall by a majority vote accept the report of the Finance Director to correct the errors in the Budget.
- **4.4** Proposed changes in the Annual Budget shall be submitted in the form of amendments to the resolution.
- **4.5** After all proposed amendments to the Budget Resolution have been considered by the Board, the Budget Resolution, as amended, shall be voted upon by the Board.

5.0 POWERS OF CHAIRMAN AND VICE-CHAIRMAN

- 5.1 The Chairman of the County Board, or in his/her absence the Vice-Chairman, shall take the Chair at the hour to which the Board may from time to time stand adjourned, or recessed, or continued, call the Board to order and direct the calling of the roll by the Clerk.
- 5.2 In absence of both the Chairman and Vice-Chairman, the County Clerk shall preside until a Chairman Pro-Tem is elected.
- 5.3 The Chairman shall be responsible for the preparation and order of the written agenda of the County Board as assisted by the County Clerk and Corporation Counsel.
- 5.4 The Chairman shall act as ex officio member of all commit-

tees of the County Board and, as ex officio committee member, shall have power to vote in such committee only in the absence of one or more committee members. The Chairman may delegate this power to the Vice-Chairman.

- 5.5 The Chairman shall receive an additional \$1,500 per year.
- 5.6 The Chairman shall receive all requests and communications not specifically addressed to any committee or official of the County and refer such matter to the appropriate committee or official.
- 5.7 The Chairman shall be entitled to vote on all questions before the Board.
- 5.8 When the Chairman wishes to participate in the debate on a matter before the Board, the Chairman shall relinquish the Chair to the Vice Chairman (if the Vice Chairman has or wishes to participate in the debate, then any Supervisor not participating in the debate shall be selected, by the Chairman, to act as Chairman until the matter is resolved by the Board) prior to participating in the debate, except at the Organizational meeting.
- 5.9 The County Board Chairman shall advise, by mail, all members of the Board of the Chairman's recommendations for Committee membership.
- **5.10** The Chairman's appointment to fill a County Board vacancy shall be listed in the written agenda.
- 5.11 The Chairman's appointment to fill a County Board vacancy shall be made not later than 60 days after the vacancy occurs.
- 5.12 The Chairman shall review policy issues and recommend appropriate policy goals and legislative action to be taken by the County Board relating to the County Auditor. The Chairman will also review the budget of the County Auditor.

6.0 ORDER OF BUSINESS

- **6.1** The Order of Business shall be as follows:
 - A. Call to Order
 - B. Roll Call
 - C. Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag
 - D. Prayei
 - E. Approval and correction of minutes of the previous meeting.

- F. Communications, Petitions, Memorials, Accounts, Etc.
- G. Reports of Committee, Commissions and Boards.
- H. Adopt Written Agenda
- I. Public Comments.
- J. Report of the County Executive (at his option).
- K. Confirmation of County Executive and County Board Chairman appointments.
- L. County Board Chairman's Report
- M. Presentation of Resolutions and Ordinances previously tabled or laid over to a day certain, and disposition of same.
- N. Presentation of new Resolutions and Ordinances and disposition of same.
- O. Consideration of miscellaneous business.
- P. Adjournment.
- 6.2 The Roll Call shall be made by use of the voting machine, or in the event of malfunction, by roll call of the County Clerk.
- 6.3 Monthly Reports of Committees, Commissions and Boards of the County Board may be made in writing, said reports to be included in the agenda packet mailed, or otherwise delivered, to each Board Member.
- 6.4 Public comments will be heard by the Board at the appropriate time in the Agenda, but in any case shall begin no earlier than 15 minutes after the Call to Order and no later than 60 minutes after the Call to Order.
- **6.5** Public comments will be heard by the Board only on those Resolutions and Ordinances on the adopted agenda for that meeting.

7.0 HANDLING OF RESOLUTIONS AND ORDINANCES

- 7.1 Every written resolution shall be prepared in block form and shall be as concise as possible and shall have attached to it the name of the Committee, Commission or Board and/or the names of the Supervisors introducing it.
- 7.2 All resolutions that come from Committees, Commissions or Boards shall show the vote of that Committee, Commission or Board.
- 7.3 All items to be acted upon by the Board which are included on the adopted agenda may be referred to by the title and number and need not be read by the Clerk unless requested

- by a Supervisor.
- 7.4 Every motion or amendment shall be reduced to writing if requested by a Supervisor.
- **7.5** Every resolution having monetary implications must have a fiscal note attached or included.
- 7.6 Any resolution referred by the County Board to a Committee, Commission or Board shall include a date for return to the County Board.
- 7.7 Any Committee of Jurisdiction may submit to the County Board a request which has been rejected by Personnel and Finance Committee. However, this request resolution must have a two-thirds affirmative vote of the County Board membership for adoption except at the County Board Annual Budget Session.

8.0 WRITTEN AGENDA

- 8.1 Under the direction of the County Board Chairman, the County Clerk, with the help of the Corporation Counsel, is hereby authorized and instructed to prepare a written Agenda for each meeting of the County Board.
- 8.2 For an item to be printed on the agenda, it must be presented to the County Clerk's office no later than noon on the Wednesday prior to the meeting of the County Board.
- **8.3** This Agenda, along with appropriate attachments, shall be mailed or otherwise deposited for delivery to each Supervisor at least five days before each meeting.
- 8.4 This Agenda and attachments shall be furnished to any person so requesting it from the County Clerk.
- **8.5** A copy of the agenda shall also be mailed to all Town Clerks, Village Clerks and City Clerks, and Mayors.
- 8.6 All items not appearing on the written Agenda or not delivered with the Agenda shall be out of order and shall not be considered by the Board at the particular meeting.
- 8.7 Any item on the Agenda for consideration by the Board may be withdrawn at any time before action is taken on it, but only by its sponsor or if sponsored by a committee, the Committee Chairman or a designated alternate in his/her absence.
- 8.8 In the event of withdrawal of any item as per 8.7, the Chairman will announce the withdrawal and the name of the

- sponsor or Committee Chairman withdrawing it. Co-sponsored resolutions may only be withdrawn upon the concurrence of all sponsors or Committee Chairmen.
- 8.9 Special orders of business may be scheduled by the County Board Chairman for presentation to the County Board on the 1st Tuesday of the months of January, March, June and September. Announcement of these special meetings shall be made by the County Board Chairman at the regularly scheduled County Board Meetings held the 3rd Tuesdays of the months of December, February, May and August.
- 8.10 Any capital expenditure (improvement project) to be considered by the County Board at any session other than at the budget session, the estimated cost of which is in excess of \$100,000.00, shall require a special orders of business meeting of the County Board prior to consideration of any appropriation resolution by the Board relating to such capital expenditure.

9.0 DEFINITIONS

- **9.1** Agenda: The formal listing of Resolutions and Ordinances to be considered at a meeting of the County Board.
- **9.2** Memorials: Something in a speech, ceremony or written document that commemorates recognition of a person, place or occurrence.
- **9.3** Motion: The formal mode in which a member submits a proposed measure or resolution for the consideration and action of the committee, commission or board.
- 9.4 Resolution: A written, proposed matter for the consideration and action of the County Board. Upon approval, a resolution is a decision made by the County Board for a definite purpose.
- **9.5** Ordinance: A law set forth by a governmental authority, a municipal regulation.
- 9.6 Petition: A formal written document embodying a request of action to be taken by the Winnebago County Board or one of its agencies or departments.
- **9.7** Policy: As used in these Rules, a policy is a general principle established by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors to guide the management of Winnebago County government.

- 9.8 Meeting: A meeting is a single official gathering of the members of the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors to transact business for a length of time during which there is no cessation of proceedings and the members do not separate, unless for a recess, and may last from a few minutes to several hours.
- 9.9 Session: A session of the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors is a meeting or series of connected meetings devoted to a single order of business, program, agenda or announced purpose, in which, when there is more than one meeting each succeeding meeting is scheduled with a view towards continuing business at the point where it was left off at the previous meeting.
- 9.10 Recess: A recess is a short intermission within a meeting which does not end the meeting or destroy its continuity as a single gathering of the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors and after which proceedings are immediately resumed at the point where they were interrupted.
- **9.11** Veto: The refusal of assent by the County Executive to a resolution or ordinance passed by the County Board.
- **9.12** Partial Veto: The refusal of assent by the County Executive to any portion of a resolution or ordinance passed by the County Board which contains an appropriation.
- 9.13 Veto Over-Ride: A vote by two-thirds of the members elect (38) to pass a resolution or ordinance, or part thereof, which has been vetoed or partially vetoed by the County Executive and has been reconsidered by the County Board.

10.0 PRIVILEGE OF SPEAKING

- **10.1** Every member previous to speaking shall be recognized by the Chairman. When two or more members desire to speak, the Chairman shall designate the order of speaking.
- 10.2 No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without leave of the Board, except to answer questions from the Chairman or the Floor. The Chairman must enforce this rule when a violation is called to the attention of the Chairman.

11.0 VOTING AND ROLL CALL

11.1 A vote on every question shall be taken by ayes, nays, or

- abstentions, and shall be recorded in the records of the proceedings.
- 11.2 A unanimous oral vote shall be considered and recorded as an affirmative unanimous roll call vote.
- 11.3 A tie vote on any question shall indicate that question is lost.
- 11.4 The Chairman shall direct the County Clerk as to when a roll call vote is to be taken. After the Chairman so directs the Clerk and the Clerk begins the roll call, no more debate shall be allowed on the question.
- 11.5 A voting error shall be brought to the attention of the Chairman before a vote is called on the next item before the Board or no corrective action will be taken.

12.0 MOTIONS

- **12.1** When a motion is under consideration, no other motion shall be entertained except:
 - A. To adjourn.
 - B. To lay on the table.
 - C. For the previous question.
 - D. To postpone to a day certain.
 - E. To commit to a committee.
 - F. To amend or to substitute.
 - G. To postpone indefinitely.

These motions shall take precedence in the order in which they stand in this section.

- **12.2** A motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, and for the previous question shall be decided without debate.
- 12.3 A motion to postpone indefinitely or to a day certain or commit shall not again be entertained on the same day or in the same stage of the proposition.
- **12.4** A substitute shall be open to amendment the same as the original proposition.
- 12.5 If an amendment or substitute is lost, another substantially the same shall not be entertained.
- 12.6 The previous question (a motion to end debate) may be moved by any member and shall require two-thirds affirmative vote of the members present for passage.
- 12.7 When a motion or question has once been determined, any member with the prevailing side may move for reconsidera-

- tion of the vote, but such motion shall be made and acted upon at the same or next succeeding adjourned (business) meeting and shall not thereafter be made except by unanimous consent.
- 12.8 A motion to reconsider a resolution which has been partially vetoed by the County Executive will be in order at the same meeting during which the County Board acts on the County Executive's partial veto.

13.0 SUSPENSION OF RULES

13.1 Any of the Rules may be suspended by two-thirds vote of the members present, except Rules Number 3.8, 7.5, 11.0-11.5, 12.7, 13.1 which are not suspendable.

14.0 ROBERT'S RULES

14.1 The rules of parliamentary practice included in the latest edition of "Robert's Rules of Order" so far as they remain in common use and are practicable and applicable and consistent herewith, shall govern the Board.

15.0 PUBLICATION OF REPORTS

15.1 Reports presented to the Board shall be kept on file by the County Clerk for reference purposes but not published in their entirety in the official proceedings unless so ordered by the Board by a majority vote.

16.0 QUORUM AND VOTE REQUIRED ON BUDGET TRANSFERS

- **16.1** Wisconsin Statutes, Sec. 59.02(3), gives the general rule requiring a majority of supervisors to be present in order to have a quorum for the transaction of business.
- 16.2 Under Wisconsin Statutes, Sec. 59.02(3), all questions before the Board are determined by a majority of the supervisors present unless otherwise provided.
- 16.3 Wisconsin Statutes, Sec. 65.90(5), has some additional requirements for changes in the budget after it has once been adopted. Changes in the amounts appropriated and changes in the purposes for which amounts are appropriated may not be made after adoption of the budget except by a two-thirds vote of the membership of the Board.

- 16.4 There is an exception, however, within this Statute, to-wit: The County Board hereby authorizes its standing Personnel & Finance Committee to transfer funds between items within a department or office if these items are separately appropriated, and further authorizes the Personnel & Finance Committee to supplement appropriations for a particular office, department or activity by a transfer from the Contingency Fund. Additional funding for unbudgeted funding requests shall be made from the General Fund undesignated fund balance or in the case of a self-supporting proprietary fund, the funds would come from their own fund balance.
- 16.5 Personnel & Finance Committee transfers from the Contingency Fund shall not exceed the amount set up in the Contingency Fund as adopted in the annual budget, nor aggregate in the case of an individual office, department or activity in excess of 10 per cent of the funds originally provided for such office, department or activity in such annual budget. The publication provisions of Sec. 65.90 (5)(a) and (b), Wis. Stats., shall apply to all committee transfers from the Contingency Fund.

18.1 COMMITTEES, COMMISSIONS, BOARDS		
18.2 The County Board shall be the Board of Jurisdiction for all		

County Board standing committees.

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- **18.3** Any decision of any Standing Committee may be appealed to the Board by any Supervisor at any regular or special Board meeting.
- **18.4** Any County Board Member may attend, without voting privileges, any open or closed meeting of any County Board Committee, Commission or Board.
- **18.5** The public may attend any open meetings of the County Board, and/or its Committees, Commissions, or Boards.

19.0 ANNUAL TOUR

- 19.1 The County Board shall make an annual inspection of County owned properties and facilities during the month of May.
- **19.2** The agenda for this tour shall be compiled by the County Board Chairman.

20.0 PER DIEM, MILEAGE, EXPENSES

- 20.1 Each Board Member shall be responsible for compiling his own expense sheet for payment by the County of per diem, mileage and other expenses.
- **20.2** Such expense sheets must be submitted to the Personnel Office no later than the 7th of each month.
- 20.3 Any and all expenses and other items listed on a Supervisor's expense sheet shall be paid by the County except those which are in excess of sums permitted by County Resolution or Ordinance, or State Statute, in which case the legal limit shall be paid upon approval by the County Board Chairman.
- 20.4 Pursuant to the County Ordinance, attendance at meetings, conferences or educational seminars that were not identified specifically at the time the budget was adopted must first be approved by the County Board Chairman as a condition precedent to expense reimbursement.
- 20.5 No Supervisor shall submit for payment any item of expense or per diem which said Supervisor has not actually made or earned.
- **20.6** Per diem and expenses shall be reimbursed while attending meetings for the Winnebago County Board as follows:

All claims for reimbursement of expenses incurred for lodging per the foregoing schedule shall be accompanied by a receipt, and no claim for reimbursement shall be paid unless accompanied by such receipt.

21.0 ACCESS

21.1 All County Board Members shall have reasonable access during normal business hours to departments or offices of Winnebago County not prohibited by State Statutes or Federal Regulations.

22.0 COMMITTEE MEETINGS

- **22.1** All Committee, Board and Commission meetings shall be held in the County Courthouse or on public property if possible. Meetings held on private property must be accessible to the public.
- 22.2 The County Clerk is to be notified of all meetings prior to the time of the meeting so that public notice can be given by the County Clerk.
- 22.3 Public notice of all meetings shall be given as soon as the members of the Committee, Board or Commission are notified of such meeting and not less than 24 hours before the meeting except as hereinafter provided.

- 22.4 In emergencies, when a meeting must be held with less than 24 hours notice, the County Clerk shall notify the press as soon as possible.
- 22.5 Minutes of each meeting, as required by State Statutes, shall be filed with the County Clerk within ten days of the meeting except for closed meetings.
- 22.6 Minutes of closed meetings shall be kept and shall be filed with the County Clerk when no reason exists for such minutes to be kept private.
- 22.7 Minutes of each meeting shall be kept by the secretary of the Committee, Commission or Board, or other person so designated by the Committee, Commission or Board Chairman.
- 22.8 Meetings shall be held at the call of the Committee, Commission or Board Chairman, or at the call of a majority of its members.
- **22.9** Officers shall be elected during the Organization meeting and shall serve a term corresponding to the Supervisor's term except as otherwise provided in these rules.
- **22.10** Any Committee, by majority vote, may elect new officers after one year or when a vacancy exists for any officer's position in that Committee.

24.0 DUTIES OF COUNTY EXECUTIVE

- **24.1** ADMINISTRATIVE AND MANAGEMENT FUNCTIONS
- 24.2 The County Executive shall coordinate and direct all administrative and management functions of the County Government not otherwise vested by law in Boards or Commissions, or other elected officers.
- 24.3 The County Executive shall appoint the heads of all departments except those elected by the people and except where the law provides that the appointment shall be made by a board or commission or by other elected officers, but he shall also appoint all department heads where the law provides that the appointment shall be made by the Board Chairman or the County Board. Such appointments shall require the confirmation of the County Board (Wis. Stats., Sec. 59.031).
- 24.4 The County Executive may file charges for the removal, discharge, or suspension of any persons so appointed, said charges to be filed with the County Board.
- 24.5 Appoint the members of all boards and commissions where the law provides that such appointment shall be made by the County Board or the Chairman of the County Board. All appointments to boards and commissions by the County Executive shall be subject to the confirmation of the County Board.
- 24.6 The County Executive shall, annually and otherwise as necessary, communicate to the County Board of Supervisors the condition of the County, and recommend such matters to them for their consideration as he deems expedient. Notwithstanding any other provisions of the law, he shall be responsible for the submission of the annual budget to the County Board and may exercise the power to veto any increases or decreases in the budget as provided for in Wis. Stats., Sec. 59.032(6).
- 24.7 The County Executive is charged with the responsibility to

examine, settle and allow all general accounts against the county and to cause to have issued County orders therefore, except any account where payment is otherwise specifically provided for by rule or statute.

25.0 GENERAL DUTIES OF STANDING COMMITTEES

25.1 UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN EDUCATION, EXTENSION & AGRICULTURE COMMITTEE

This committee shall be composed of five County Board supervisors and shall be the "Committee on Agriculture and Extension Education" as referred to in Sec. 59.87, Wis. Statutes. The Committee shall review policy issues relating to the County University Extension program, County Library Services, and Winnebago County Fair and advise and recommend appropriate policy goals and legislative action to be taken by the County Board.

The members of the committee shall also be members of the Winnebago County Land Conservation Committee. Two members of this committee shall function as Winnebago County members of the Board of Trustees of the University of Wisconsin - Fox Valley campus.

25.2 AVIATION COMMITTEE

This committee shall be composed of five County Board Supervisors. The committee shall review policy issues relating to Wittman Field Airport and other aviation matters of concern to Winnebago County and advise and recommend appropriate policy goals and legislative action to be taken by the County Board.

25.3 PROPERTY MANAGEMENT & MAINTENANCE COM-MITTEE

This committee shall be composed of five County Board Supervisors. The committee shall review policy issues related to Winnebago County buildings, grounds, office equipment, furniture and fixtures in all county-owned or leased facilities; long-range development plans for buildings and office space; review policy goals relating to the Purchasing Department and Maintenance Department; and recommend appropriate goals and legislative action to be taken by the County Board.

25.4 COUNTY PLANNING AND ZONING COMMITTEE

This committee shall be composed of five County Board Supervisors and shall be the "county zoning agency" as referred to in Sec. 59.97 (2)(a)1, Wis. Stats. Committee members shall include at least one, but not more than two, County Board Supervisors from an incorporated area. All members shall be appointed by the County Board.

As provided in Sec. 59.95 (2) (bm), the county zoning agency shall be a policy-making body determining the broad outlines and principles governing the administrative powers and duties specified in Sec. 59.97, Wis Stats. and shall be a quasi-judicial body with decision-making power including, but not limited to conditional use, planned unit development and rezoning.

In addition, the committee responsibilities shall be as follows:

- Responsibility for all matters of procedure relating to the Winnebago County Zoning Ordinance (this would include basic zoning provisions, floodplain/shoreland provisions and airport zoning provisions), except those designated to Board of Adjustment's jurisdiction.
- Creation and maintenance of the County development plan.
- Committee of Jurisdiction for the County Planning Department.

The Committee shall review policy issues relating to the County Zoning Department and County Planning Department and advise and recommend appropriate policy goals and legislative action to be taken by the County Board.

25.5 LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE

The Committee shall be composed of the chairman of the following committees and boards: Those committees listed in Sections 25.1 through 25.4 and 25.6 through 25.11 of these Rules; the Community Programs Board, the Social Services Board, the Health Board, and the Solid Waste Management Board. The committee shall review proposed federal and state legislation and administrative regulations impacting upon the County and shall provide and inform area legislators of the recommendations of the County Board, if feasible, or the committee as to such legislation.

The committee shall report its actions to the County Board as well as any pertinent information relating to such legislation.

25.6 JUDICIARY & PUBLIC SAFETY COMMITTEE

This committee shall be composed of five County Board supervisors. The committee shall review policy issues and advise and recommend appropriate policy goals and legislative action to be taken by the County Board relating to the following departments or activities:

Clerk of Courts, Sheriff, District Attorney, Coroner, Corporation Counsel, Family Court Commissioner, Veterans Services, Register of Deeds, County Clerk, Court Commissioner Law Library, Emergency Government, Child Support Agency and Juvenile Intake Office.

In addition, the duties and responsibilities of this committee shall be:

- Submit recommendations for County Board rules to be considered at the County Board organization meeting or at other County Board meetings.
- 2. Submit recommendations for apportionment of supervisory districts in Winnebago County.

This committee shall serve as the County Emergency Government Committee as referred to in Sec. 166.03 (4)(c), Wis. Stats.

25.7 PARKS AND RECREATION COMMITTEE

The Parks Committee shall consist of five members. The County Board, through its Committee on Committees in accordance with Rule 3.4, shall appoint the standing committee.

It shall be responsible for obtaining maintenance, operation and development of all Winnebago County parks and recreation areas, including boat landings, recreational travel areas, associated programs and wildlife preservation areas.

It shall recommend to the County Board from time to time for its action, the necessary rules and regulations for all Winnebago County owned recreational areas.

25.8 PARK VIEW HEALTH CENTER COMMITTEE

The Park View Health Center Committee shall be composed of five members of the Winnebago County Board appointed by the Chairman of the County Board. This committee shall be a policymaking body determining the broad outlines and principles governing the administration of nursing home services provided at the Park View Health Center consisting of the Park View Rehabilitation Pavilion and the Pleasant Acres Nursing Home. This committee shall review policy issues relating to the Park View Health Center and advise and recommend appropriate policy goals and legislative action to be taken by the County Board.

25.9 PERSONNEL & FINANCE COMMITTEE

This committee shall be composed of five County Board supervisors. The committee shall review policy issues and advise and recommend appropriate policy goals and legislative action to be taken by the County Board relating to the following departments: County Treasurer, Finance Department, Data Processing Department, Personnel Department, Risk Management Department, General Services and Microfilm Department.

The duties and responsibilities of this committee shall be:

- 1. Receive all personnel requests from Committees and Boards of Jurisdiction for study and recommendation.
- 2. Review proposed personnel policies and amendments as submitted by the Personnel Director and County Executive and submit recommendations to the County Board for consideration and legislative action.
- 3. Review personnel actions in all county departments as reported by the Personnel Director.
- 4. Recommend to the County Board, prior to the earliest time for filing nomination papers, a salary schedule for elected officials, appointed officials and other employees of Winnebago County unless otherwise determined by agreement or law.
- 5. Authorize budgetary alterations as permitted in Sec. 65.90(5), Wis. Stats. in either of the following situations:
 - A. A transfer of funds between budgeted items of an individual County Department if such budgeted items have been separately appropriated, and
 - B. Supplementation of appropriations for a particular office or department by transfer from the Contingency Fund. The limitation on the dollar amount set aside in the budgetary alteration shall be

the amount set aside in the Contingency Fund or the sum of \$3,000.00, whichever is the lesser sum.

This committee may refuse to authorize a budgetary alteration in whole or in part or may grant any such alteration conditionally as it deems appropriate.

- 6. Review all financial reports submitted to the County Board by the County Executive, by County officials and by auditors retained by the County. (The County Executive is charged with the responsibility to examine, settle and allow all general accounts against the County and to have issued County orders therefore.)
- Advise the County Treasurer and County Executive in the matter of investment of county funds and report to the County Board from time to time regarding county finances.
- Examine all claims filed against the County for illegal taxes of any kind and shall make a report and recommend to the County Board on all matters pertaining to illegal taxes.
- 9. Perform such responsibilities as are indicated in Sec. 3.03 of the General Code of County Ordinances concerning properties taken by the county on tax deeds.
- 10. Advise with the County Insurance Administrator and County Executive in the matter of establishing appropriate insurance coverages for Winnebago County.
- 11. Review all claims filed against Winnebago County pursuant to Secs. 59.76 and Sec. 893.80, Wis. Stats. and submit its recommendation to the County Board for consideration and legislative action. Submit an annual report on the disposition of all claims.
- 12. Review and adopt affirmative action plans submitted by the Affirmative Action Committee.

25.10 HIGHWAY COMMITTEE

This committee shall be composed of five County Board supervisors.

As provided in Sec, 83.015(2)(b), Wis. Stats., this committee shall be a policy-making body determining the broad outlines and principles governing administration of County Highway programs.

The committee shall review policy issues relating to the

Winnebago County Highway Department and other highway matters of concern to Winnebago County and advise and recommend appropriate policy goals and legislative action to be taken by the County Board.

25.11 LAND CONSERVATION COMMITTEE

This committee shall be composed of seven members appointed by the County Board pursuant to Sec. 92.06(1)(b), Wis. Stats., as follows:

Five persons who are members of the University of Wisconsin Education, Extension & Agriculture Committee, one person who is chairperson of the Winnebago County USDA Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee or other such committee member designated by such chairperson, and one person who is a citizen member.

The primary duties and responsibilities of such committee shall be as follows:

- 1. It shall be the committee of jurisdiction for the Land and Water Conservation Department.
- It shall develop and adopt standards and specifications for management practices to control erosion, sedimentation and nonpoint source water pollution throughout the county.
- It shall distribute and allocate federal, state and county funds made available to the committee for cost sharing programs or other incentive programs for improvements and practices relating to soil and water conservation on private or public lands.
- 4. It shall carry out prevention and control measures and works of improvement for flood prevention and for conservation, development, utilization and control of water within the county. These preventative and control measures and works of improvement may be carried out on lands owned or controlled by that state or any of its agencies, with the cooperation of the agency administering and having jurisdiction of the land, and on any other lands within the county upon obtaining the consent of the landowner or the necessary rights or interests in the land.
- 5. It shall prepare long-range plans which include inventories of natural resources in the county, a description of

present natural resource uses and a projection of future trends, an assessment of resource conservation problems in relation to use practices and actions necessary to correct those problems including specific goals and provisions for the development, management and conservation of soil, water and related natural resources.

This committee shall be a policy-making body determining the broad outlines and principles governing administration of Winnebago County soil and water conservation.

The committee shall review policy issues relating to the Winnebago County soil and water conservation programs and advise and recommend appropriate policy goals and legislative action to be taken by the County Board pursuant to Secs. 92.06 and 92.07, Wis. Stats.

26.0 SPECIAL MEETING OF ANY BOARD

Wisconsin Statute 59.04(2) states: A special meeting of any board shall be held:

- (a) Upon a written request of a majority of the supervisors delivered to the clerk, specifying the time and place of meeting. The time shall be not less than 48 hours from the delivery of the request. Upon receiving the request the clerk shall forthwith mail to each supervisor notice of the time and place of the meeting. Any special meeting may be adjourned by a vote of a majority of all the supervisors. The county board by ordinance may establish a separate procedure for convening the county board in a "declared emergency" as defined by county ordinance.
- (b) For the purpose and in the manner described in Sec. 31.06, with the right to adjourn the special meeting from time to time by a vote of a majority of all the supervisors entitled to a seat. The clerk shall mail written notice of the special meeting, specifying the time, place, and purpose thereof, to each supervisor not less than 2 weeks before the day set for such a meeting.

Supervisor Hue asked that it be noted that an "abstain" vote, where a two-thirds majority vote is needed, counts as a "no" vote. The electronic voting machine does not indicate that, so an adjustment will need to be made to the vote printout.

Motion by Supervisor King and seconded to adjourn to April 23, 1996, at 6:00 p.m. CARRIED BY VOICE VOTE. Meeting adjourned at 7:30 p.m.

Chairman Joseph N. Maehl called the meeting to order at 6:00 P.M. in the Supervisors' Room, Fourth Floor, Courthouse, Oshkosh, Wisconsin.

The meeting was opened with the Pledge of Allegiance and an Invocation by Supervisor Wagner.

Roll Call: All present except Supervisors Savas and Kramer.

Supervisor Planalp moved and it was seconded to change the agenda order by having the public hearing first and then acting on Ordinance No. 17-496 and Ordinance No. 18-496. CARRIED BY VOICE VOTE.

COMMUNICATIONS, PETITIONS, ETC.

Notice of Claim from Robert J. Probst regarding alleged financial loss due to actions on the part of the Winnebago County Department of Community Programs was referred to the Personnel & Finance Committee.

An article from the Post Crescent was read commending Chairman Maehl's re-election as chairman.

An article was read from the Wisconsin Counties Association magazine featuring Supervisor King and the naming of the Orrin H. King Administration Building.

The Town of Wolf River submitted a resolution in opposition of

Ordinance No. 17-496, "Amend Sec. 16.12 of the General Code of Winnebago County (Holding Tank Fees)."

An invitation from Ken Nelson, Local Government Specialist with the University of Wisconsin Cooperative Extension, to attend a County Board Supervisors Workshop was read. The workshop will be held on different dates in various Wisconsin cities through the month of May. A change of date for the Menomonee Falls workshop was noted. It was originally scheduled for May 28, but that date has been changed to May 30.

A letter from Darla Hium, Deputy Director, Wisconsin Counties Association, regarding the 1996 NACo Conference was read. Registration and housing information was also included. The deadline for early registration is May 28.

Letters from Rep. Al Ott and Sen. Michael Ellis were read and placed on file.

An invitation to attend a WCA Seminar entitled, "Trends in Information Technology" was read and placed on file. This seminar will be held on May 20, 1996, in Stevens Point, Wisconsin.

Notice of a Wisconsin Department of Transportation Public Hearing regarding the proposed reconstruction of Jackson Street, City of Oshkosh, was read. This public hearing is scheduled for May 13, 1996, from 4:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m., in Room 404, Oshkosh City Hall.

An invitation to attend a mini-conference entitled, "The Impact of State Government Reorganization on Local Governmental Units" was read. This conference is co-sponsored by the East Central Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission and the UW-Extension Offices in the East Central Region. It will be held on Friday, April 26, 1996. No advance registration is needed.

A copy of the Winneconne Community School Expansion Agricultural Impact Statement was placed on file.

Petition for Zoning Amendment from Joyce A. Moon for change from A-2 to R-2 for existing single family subdivision was referred to the Planning & Zoning Committee.

Petition for Zoning Amendment from Debra L. and David A. Lueders for change from A-1 to A-2 to remove "non-conforming status" of a residence in an existing 20 acre parcel was referred to the Planning & Zoning Committee.

Petition for Zoning Amendment from Harrison Sturgis, Jr., for change from B-2 to R-3 for residence and storage of vehicles and equipment was referred to the Planning & Zoning Committee.

Petition for Zoning Amendment from Carl Borchert for change from A-1 to R-3 for construction of duplexes was referred to the Planning & Zoning Committee.

Petition for Zoning Amendment from Marion S. Kester for change from M-2 to R-1 for construction of a single family residence was referred to the Planning & Zoning Committee.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Supervisor Barker reported that as the Chairman of the Lower Fox/Green Bay Remedial Action Plan, she attended an awards ceremony honoring individuals and businesses for their efforts in environmental protection. She encouraged the Supervisors to recommend people and businesses in their districts for these awards.

Supervisor Barker attended the dedication of the Volunteers Center of East Central Wisconsin in Appleton. They are the clearinghouse for all volunteers in the area.

Supervisor Montgomery asked the Supervisors to purchase ribbons to help raise money for the Boys and Girls Club of Oshkosh.

Supervisor Sievert explained to the Board why the Planning & Zoning Committee withdrew the Historical Preservation Ordinance. The Planning & Zoning Committee felt that it is more appropriate to have historical preservation issues handled at the local level; and that there are other avenues available, such as the National Register of Historical Places.

Supervisor Wagner told the Board that the Property Management & Maintenance, Judiciary & Public Safety and Highway Committees met with Executive Steinhilber and David Schmidt, County Planner, to discuss plans for the old Highway Department facility.

Supervisor Schwartz encouraged the Board to attend the public hearings on Department of Community Programs services. The hearings will be held on Tuesday, May 7, 1996, from 1:00 to 2:00 p.m. at the Oshkosh Human Services Building, and Thursday, May 9, 1996, from 6:00 to 7:00 p.m. at the Menasha Public Library.

Supervisor Crowley reported that funding has been secured for the additional help that the Access Department of Social Services requested. They will have a report for the County Board in a couple of months.

Brian Grunske, 9097 U.S. Highway 45, Neenah, spoke in opposition of Zoning Report No. 002, and Amendatory Ordinance No. 04-02-96.

ORDINANCE NO. 6-496 — Create Section 11.10 of the General Code of Winnebago County (Social Services Board)

WHEREAS, Winnebago County has, for many years, established and operated its Social Services Board pursuant to Winnebago County Board of Supervisors Rules; and

WHEREAS, it is procedurally proper for the composition, appointment and term of the Winnebago County Social Services Board to be established pursuant to a County Ordinance as opposed to being established pursuant to a Winnebago County Board of Supervisors Rule.

NOW, THEREFORE, the County Board of Supervisors of the County of Winnebago does ordain as follows:

The creation of Section 11.10, General Code of Winnebago

County which shall read as follows:

11.10 COUNTY SOCIAL SERVICES BOARD.

- (1) Pursuant to Section 46.22, Wisconsin Statutes, there is established a Winnebago County Social Services Board. The Social Services Board shall have those powers and duties as enumerated in Section 46.22(2g), Wisconsin Statutes.
- (2) MEMBERSHIP. (a) The Winnebago County Board of Social Services shall consist of five (5) members. All of the members shall be members of the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors.
- (3) APPOINTMENT. (a) Appointment to the Winnebago County Social Services Board shall be made by the Winnebago County Executive, subject to confirmation by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors.
- (4) TERM. (a) All members of the Winnebago County Social Services Board shall serve a term of two (2) years. Said term shall run concurrent to the term of the members upon the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors. Vacancies within the Board shall be filled as provided pursuant to (3), above.
- (5) REMOVAL. (a) A member of the County Social Services Board may be removed by the County Executive for cause. (b) The resignation or removal of a member of the Winnebago County Social Services Board from the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors shall automatically result in said person being ineligible to continue to serve as a Winnebago County Social Services Board member and said person shall be removed from the Social Services Board.
- (6) LICENSURE OR CERTIFICATION OF SOCIAL SERVICES BOARD MEMBERS.
 - (a) The Winnebago County Department of Social Services shall not license or certify any Winnebago County Social Services Board member for any purpose during the term of that person upon the Winnebago County Social Services Board. Should a Winnebago County Social Services Board member apply to the Department of Social Services for certification or licensure, said application shall be referred to an outside social services agency for review and decision upon said application.

ORDINANCE NO. 12-496 — Amend Sec. 11.02 of the General Code of Winnebago County (Rules for Park View Health Center)

WHEREAS, the Administrator of Park View Health Center and the undersigned Committee have recently reviewed Sec. 11.02 of the General Code of Winnebago County, Rules for Park View Health Center; and

WHEREAS, upon review of said Ordinance, it is apparent that said Ordinance is out of date and not in compliance with present State Statutes or Administrative Code Regulations; and

WHEREAS, the proposed amendment to said Ordinance shall bring said Ordinance into compliance with present State Statutes and Administrative Code Regulations.

NOW, THEREFORE, the County Board of Supervisors of the County of Winnebago does ordain as follows:

That Section 11.02 of the General Code of Winnebago County be amended to read as follows:

11.02 RULES FOR PARK VIEW HEALTH CENTER

- PURPOSE. (a) To establish the admission requirements for residency at Park View Health Center (Pleasant Acres and the Rehabilitation Pavilion Nursing Home).
- (2) INITIAL REQUIREMENTS. No person less than 18 years old shall be admitted unless approved for admission by the State Department of Health & Social Services. Requests for approval to admit a person under the age of 18 years shall be made in writing and shall include:
 - (a) A statement from the referring physician stating the medical, nursing, rehabilitation, and special services required by the minor;
 - (b) A statement from the administrator certifying that the required services can be provided;

- (c) A statement from the attending physician certifying that the physician will be providing medical care;
- (d) A statement from the persons or agencies assuming financial responsibility.
- (3) (a) Applications must include personal, health and financial information.
 - (b) The completed application is to be sent to the Director of Social Services, Park View Health Center, 725 Butler Avenue, P.O. Box 10, Winnebago, Wisconsin 54985-0010.

(4) LIMITATIONS ON ADMISSIONS

- (a) Bed capacity no facility may house more residents than the maximum bed capacity for which it is licensed.
- (b) Care Levels. 1. No person who requires care greater than that which the facility is licensed to provide may be admitted to or retained in the facility.
 - No resident whose condition changes to require care greater than that which the facility is licensed to provided shall be retained.
- (c) Other conditions. The facility shall comply with all other conditions of the license.
- (5) OTHER LIMITATIONS ON ADMISSIONS. (a) Persons requiring unavailable services. Persons who require services which the facility does not provide or make available shall not be admitted or retained.
 - (b) Communicable diseases. 1. Restriction. No person suspected of having a disease in a communicable state shall be admitted, unless the facility has the means to manage the condition as provided by subd. 2.
 - (c) Destructive residents. Residents who are known to be destructive of property, self-destructive, disturbing or abusive to other residents, or suicidal, shall not be admitted or retained, unless the facility has and uses sufficient resources to appropriately manage and care for them.
 - (d) Developmental Disabilities. 1. No person who has a developmental disability may be admitted to a facility unless the facility is certified as an intermediate care facility for the mentally retarded, except that a person who has a developmental disability and who requires skilled nursing care services may be admitted to a skilled nursing facility.
 - 2. Except in an emergency, no person who has a develop-

mental disability may be admitted to a facility unless the county department under s. 46.23, 51.42 or 51.437 Stats., of the individual's county of residence has recommended the admission.

- (e) Mental Illness. Except in an emergency, no person who is under age 65 and has a mental illness as defined in Sec. 51.01(13) may be admitted to a facility unless the county department under Sec. 46.23, 51.42 or 51.437, Stats., of the individual's county of residence has recommended the admission.
- (6) Admission will be conducted seven days a week. A person shall be admitted when an application is processed, approved and requirements complete.
- (7) PROCEDURES FOR ADMISSION, DISCHARGE AND TRANSFER OF RESIDENTS. Procedures for admission, transfer and discharge of residents shall be governed by the provisions of Wisconsin Administrative Code Chapters HSS 132.52 and 132.53 and any subsequent amendments thereto.
- (8) RATES. (a) Private Pay. Resident rates at Pleasant Acres and the Rehabilitation Pavilion shall be established by the Park View Health Center Committee consistent with the cost of care and operation of Pleasant Acres and the Rehabilitation Pavilion. These rates may be adjusted periodically by the Committee if conditions warrant. Park View Health Center will provide thirty (30) days written advance notice of change.
 - (b) Medical Assistance (Title XIX). Rates established by the State for Title XIX reimbursement shall be utilized. These rates shall be appealed if not consistent with costs.
 - (c) One month payment of the established rate for the resident's care at Pleasant Acres or the Rehabilitation Pavilion shall be payable in advance upon approval of the applicant's admission to Park View Health Center. All subsequent payments shall be made one month in advance. Accounts that are not settled by the fifteenth (15) of the month shall be considered delinquent. An added fee may be charged for delinquent accounts.
 - (d) No refund of charges will be made for the first seven (7) days of residence at Pleasant Acres or the Rehabilitation Pavilion or any portion thereof. Refunds will be made thereafter based on the actual number of days in resi-

dence. Residents will not be charged for the day of discharge. Refunds may take up to thirty (30) days to process.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors that this Ordinance shall take effect on the date following the date of its publication.

- (1) HOW CONSTITUTED. Pursuant to Sec. 166.03(4)(c), Statutes, the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors hereby designates its Judiciary and Public Safety Committee as the County Emergency Management Committee. The Chairperson of the County Emergency Management Committee shall be designated by the Chairman of the County Board.
- (2) DUTIES. Pursuant to Sec. 166.03(4)(c), Statutes, the County Emergency Government Committee shall have policy-making

and rule-making powers in the establishment and development of County Emergency Management plans and programs.

WHEREAS, your undersigned Committee believes that the proliferation of holding tanks within Winnebago County should be discouraged both on an environmental and an administrative basis; and

WHEREAS, as a means of discouraging the proliferation of holding tanks within Winnebago County, your undersigned Committee recommends that the permit fee for a holding tank be increased to \$2500.00 from \$165.00.

NOW, THEREFORE, the County Board of Supervisors of the County of Winnebago does ordain as follows:

Section 16.12 of the General Code of Winnebago County be amended to read as follows:

ORDINANCE NO. 18-496 — Amend Sections 18.08, 18.10, 18.56 and 18.65, General Code of Winnebago County (Subdivision Ordinance)

WHEREAS, your undersigned Committee has recently completed a review of Chapter 18 of the Winnebago County General Code, which governs subdivision of property within Winnebago County's unincorporated areas; and

WHEREAS, your undersigned Committee recommends that the following amendments to said Ordinance be adopted by Winnebago County.

NOW, THEREFORE, the County Board of Supervisors of the County of Winnebago does ordain as follows:

That Section 18.08, 18.10, 18.56 and 18.65 of the General Code of Winnebago County be amended to read as follows:

GENERAL PROVISIONS

18.05 JURISDICTION. The jurisdiction of this chapter shall include all unincorporated lands within the County. In addition, this chapter has jurisdiction in incorporated areas as an approval authority of minor land divisions within the airport zoning district of the Winnebago County Town/County Zoning Ordinance and as an objecting authority of major land divi-

- sions as provided in Section 18.01. However, in no instance shall the provisions of this chapter apply to:
- (1) Transfers of interest in land by will or pursuant to court order.
- (2) Leases for a term not to exceed 10 years, mortgages or easements.
- (3) Sale or exchange of parcels of land between owners of adjoining property if additional lots are not thereby created and the resultant lots are not reduced below the minimum size required by these regulations, the County Zoning Ordinance or other applicable laws or ordinances. For the purpose of this section, an additional lot is deemed to be created if the parcel being sold or created is not combined with the adjoining parcel by means of a new legal description in accordance with Section 18.07.
- **18.06** COMBINING LOTS. Lots shall be combined into one parcel according to s. 18.07 when one or more of the following occurs:
 - (1) The requirements of s. 18.05(3) are not met.
 - (2) A use, structure, or structural addition that occupies more than one lot under the same ownership.
 - (3) Existing substandard lots on record platted according to Ch. 236 Wis. Stats. when, in the determination of the Zoning Administrator, the intent of the district will not be maintained at the time of construction.
- **18.07** COMBINING DESCRIPTION. Land described in s. 18.06 shall be combined into one parcel by Certified Survey Map procedures and recorded in the County Register of Deeds Office.
- 18.08 COMPLIANCE. Division of land located within the jurisdictional limits of these regulations which results in a land division, replat or condominium plat as defined herein shall not be entitled to recording and/or improvements to the land unless it is in compliance with all the requirements of this chapter and:
 - (1) Duly approved County Zoning and Private Sewage System Ordinances
 - (2) County Access Control Ordinance.
 - (3) Applicable local ordinances.
 - (4) Provisions of Chapter 236, Wisconsin Statutes.
 - ** (5) Provisions of the Winnebago County Land Records

Ordinance as enumerated in Section 8.05 of the Winnebago County Code.

- 18.09 LAND SUITABILITY. No land shall be divided which is held unsuitable for any proposed use by the County Planning and Zoning Committee (hereafter referred to as committee) for reason of flooding, inadequate drainage, soil and rock formations with severe limitations for development, severe erosion potential, unfavorable topography, inadequate water supply or sewage disposal capabilities or any other feature likely to be harmful to the health, safety or welfare of future residents of the proposed subdivision or of the community. The Committee in applying the provisions of this chapter shall in writing, cite the particular facts upon which it bases its conclusion that the land is not suitable for the proposed use and afford the applicant an opportunity to present evidence regarding such suitability at a public hearing. Thereafter, the Committee may affirm, modify or withdraw its determination of unsuitability.
- 18.10 VARIANCES. (1) In any particular case where it can be shown that by reason of exceptional topographic or other physical conditions, strict compliance with any requirement of this chapter would cause practical difficulty by exceptional and undue hardship, the Committee may relax such requirement to the extent deemed just and proper so as to relieve such difficulty or hardship, provided such relief may be granted without detriment to the public good and without impairing the intent and purpose of this chapter or the desirable general development of the County.
 - (2) The Committee at its discretion, if it determines it necessary for the public good, may conduct a public hearing to permit parties of interest to comment on the variance request.
 - (3) If a hearing is determined necessary, the applicant shall be responsible for payment of a hearing fee as established by the Zoning Department Fee Schedule. The Committee shall then fix a reasonable time and place for the hearing. Notice of the time and place of such hearing shall be given by publication in the County Class 1 notice, under Ch. 985. A copy of such notice shall be mailed by certified mail to the Town Clerk of each town affected by the proposed amendment and all property owners within 300 feet of the subject site

- as listed on official tax property rolls as of the date of application shall be notified by first class mail with an Affidavit of Mailing at least 10 days prior to the date of such hearing.
- (4) A majority vote of the entire membership of the Committee shall be required to grant any modification to these regulations and any modification thus granted shall be entered in the minutes of the Committee setting forth the reasons which, in the opinion of the Committee, justified the modification.
- ** (5) Shoreland Notice and Decision
 - (a) Written notice shall be given to the appropriate District Office of the Department of Natural Resources at least ten (10) days prior to consideration by the Planning and Zoning Committee.
 - (b) Written notice of the decision shall be submitted to the appropriate District Office of the Department of Natural Resources within thirty (30) days of the decision.
- 18.11 VIOLATIONS. No person shall build upon, divide, convey, record or monument any land in violation of this chapter or the Wisconsin Statutes. No permit shall be issued authorizing the building on or improvement of any subdivision, replat or condominium plat within the jurisdiction of this chapter and not of record as of April 15, 1969, until the provisions and requirements of this chapter have been fully met. The County may institute appropriate action or proceedings to enjoin violations of this chapter or the applicable Wisconsin Statutes.
- **18.12** PENALTIES. (1) Recordation improperly made shall be subject to the provisions of Sec. 236.30, Wisconsin Statutes.
 - (2) Conveyance of lots in unrecorded plats shall be subject to the provisions of Sec. 236.31, Wisconsin Statutes.
 - (3) Monuments disturbed or not placed shall be subject to the provisions of Sec. 236.32, Wisconsin Statutes.
 - (4) Assessor's plat may be ordered by the County when a subdivision is created by successive divisions as provided in Sec. 236.31(2), Wisconsin Statutes.
 - (5) Any person failing to comply with the provisions of this chapter shall be subject to a penalty as provided in Sec. 25.04 of the Winnebago County General Code.
- 18.13 APPEALS. Any person aggrieved by an objection to a plat or failure to approve a plat may appeal therefrom as provided in

- Sections 236.13(5) and 62.23(7), Wisconsin Statutes.
- **18.54** BLOCKS. The widths, lengths and shapes of blocks shall be suited to the planned use of the land, zoning requirements, need for convenient access, control and safety of street traffic and the limitations and opportunities of the topography.
 - (1) LENGTH Blocks in residential areas should not as a general rule be less than 500 feet nor more than 1,500 feet in length unless otherwise dictated.
 - (2) WIDTH Blocks shall have sufficient width to provide for two tiers of lots of appropriate depth, except where otherwise required to separate residential development from through traffic or where lots abut a lake or stream. Width of lots or parcels reserved or laid out for commercial or industrial use shall be adequate to provide for off-street service and parking required by the use contemplated and the area zoning provisions for such use.
- 18.55 UTILITY EASEMENTS. All utility lines for electric power and telephone service shall be placed on mid-block easements along rear lot lines whenever carried on overhead poles, except where lots abut a lake or stream or where such location is deemed engineeringly unfeasible by the utility company involved.
- 18.56 LOTS. The size, shape and orientation of lots shall be appropriate for the location of the subdivision and for the type of development and use contemplated. The lots should be designed to provide an aesthetically pleasing building site and a proper architectural setting for the building contemplated.
 - Side lot lines should be at right angles to straight street lines or radial to curved street lines on which the lots face. Lot lines shall follow municipal boundary lines rather than cross them.
 - (2) Double frontage and reversed frontage lots shall be prohibited, except where necessary to provide separation of residential development from through traffic or to overcome specific disadvantages of topography and orientation.
 - ** (3) Lot frontage.
 - (a) Unless otherwise noted in Table 1, lots created within County zoning jurisdiction shall have a minimum frontage of 33' on a public street, and where applicable, a minimum frontage of 33' on navigable water.

- (b) Lots created in areas solely under a Town zoning ordinance shall front or abut a road or street for a minimum distance of at least 33'.
- ** (4) Area and dimensions of lots shall conform to the requirements of the Table 1 of this Ordinance; and in areas not served by public sewer; shall in addition conform to the requirements of the D.I.L.H.R. 85 Wisconsin Administrative Code. Whenever a tract is subdivided into parcels with area in excess of the zoning requirements, such parcels should be arranged and dimensioned so as to allow re-division of any such parcels into normal lots in accordance with the provisions of this chapter.
 - (5) Lots should be designed and a suitable proportion between width and depth. Neither long narrow or wide shallow lots are normally desirable. Normal depth should not exceed 2 1/2 times the width nor be less than 150 feet.
- ** (6) Width of lots shall conform to the requirements of Table 1, or a local municipal ordinance.
 - (7) Corner lots shall be designed with extra width to permit adequate building setback from both streets.
- ** (8) Garage lots shall be established only in accordance with the intent of Section 17.10(1) of the County Zoning Ordinance. Area and width requirements of Table I of this ordinance shall be followed provided that administrative authorization to modify lot area is allowed in circumstances where unique conditions exist. In addition, the following standards shall be required of all garage lots:
 - (a) The garage lot shall be located directly across from the "house lot"; and
 - (b) The garage lot must be deed restricted by separate instrument to the house lot, said restriction to be submitted for recording at the time of submittal of the Certified Survey Map. The restriction shall specify that it is a perpetual restriction that may only be removed by written authorization of the Winnebago County Zoning Office at such time as the garage lot is being enlarged so as to meet other buildable lot standards.
- 18.57 BUILDING SETBACK LINES. Building setback lines shall conform to the requirements established in the County Zoning Ordinance. In those towns which have not adopted the County

- Zoning Ordinance, the required setback lines shall be shown on the face of the plat.
- 18.58 SURFACE WATER DRAINAGE. Purpose. The intent of this section is to protect property and structures from damage caused by increased surface water runoff due to commercial, industrial, and proposed subdivision, the local municipality furnishing such service and the Committee shall determine the feasibility of service and the procedures to be followed by the subdivider in joining the system. Also the following shall apply:
 - (1) MAJOR LAND DIVISIONS and MAJOR CONDOMINI-UM PLATS shall be served by a public sanitary sewage system, major holding tank on a sanitary district as part of a public sewer system, or an on-site soil absorption system in accordance with DILHR Ch. 85. Private holding tanks are expressly prohibited.
 - (2) MINOR LAND DIVISIONS and MINOR CONDOMINI-UM PLATS may be served by holding tanks provided no alternative methods are available.
- **18.65** DEFINITIONS. In the construction of this chapter, the definitions contained in this section shall be observed and applied except when the context clearly indicates otherwise.
 - ALLEY A public or private right-of-way which provides secondary access to abutting properties.
 - (2) ARTERIAL STREET A street used, or intended to be used, primarily for fast or heavy through traffic. Arterial streets shall include freeways and expressways, as well as standard arterial streets, highways, and parkways.
 - (3) BLOCK A group of lots existing within well-defined and fixed boundaries, usually being an area surrounded by streets or other physical barriers and having an assigned number, letter or other name through which it may be identified.
 - (4) BUILDING A structure having a roof supported by columns or wall. When separated by division walls from the ground up and without openings, each portion of each building shall be deemed a separate building.
 - (5) COLLECTOR STREET A street used, or intended to be used, to carry traffic from minor streets to the major system or arterial streets, including principal entrance streets to

- residential developments.
- (6) COUNTY Reference to County shall mean Winnebago County and shall include any agency, department or committee thereof.
- (7) COUNTY PLANNING AND ZONING COMMITTEE -The County Planning and Zoning Committee, as authorized by Sec. 59.97, Wisconsin Statutes, or any other committee created by the County Board and authorized to plan land use.
- (8) COUNTY PRIVATE SEWAGE SYSTEM ORDINANCE The County Private Sewage System Ordinance which is included as Chapter 17 of this General Code.
- (9) COUNTY ZONING ORDINANCE The Winnebago County Town/County Zoning Ordinance which is included as Chapter 17 of this General Code.
- (10) CUL-DE-SAC STREET A minor street with only one outlet and having a turn around for the safe and convenient reversal of traffic movement.
- (11) EXTRATERRITORIAL PLAT APPROVAL JURISDIC-TION - The unincorporated area within 1 1/2 miles of a fourth-class city or village and within 3 miles of all other cities over which cities and villages may exercise plat approval, provided they have enacted an official map ordinance or subdivision control ordinance in accordance with Sec. 236.10, Wisconsin Statutes.
- (12) FINAL PLAT The map of plan of a subdivision and any accompanying material as described in Sec. 18.35 of this chapter.
- (13) FRONTAGE The length of the front property line of the lot, lots or tract of land abutting the right-of-way of a public street, road or highway.
- (14) FRONTAGE STREET A minor street auxiliary to and located on the side of an arterial street for control of access and for service to the abutting development.
- (15) GRADE The slope of a road, street or other public way, specified in percent.
- (16) IMPROVEMENT, PUBLIC Any sanitary sewer, storm sewer, drainage ditch, water main, roadway, park, parkway, public access, sidewalk, pedestrian way, planting strip, off-street parking area or other facility for which the County or

- Town may ultimately assume the responsibility for maintenance and operation.
- (17) LAND DIVISION The act or process of dividing land into two or more parcels.
- ** (18) LOT Designated parcel tract or area of land established by plat, subdivision or as otherwise permitted by law to be used, developed or built upon as a unit, and containing the minimum frontage, width, and area sufficient to meet building, parking, setback, open space, sanitary, or other requirements.
- ** (19) LOT AREA The total square footage lying within the peripheral boundaries of a parcel of land. In any zoning jurisdiction, the area of a lot specifically excludes:
 - (a) the right-of-way of a public or private street;
 - (b) areas of navigable water.
 - (20) LOT CORNER A lot abutting two or more streets at their intersection, provided that the corner of such intersection shall have an angle of 135 degrees or less measured on the lot side.
 - (21) LOT, LEGAL A unit of land existing under a single ownership which complies with the applicable basic district standards for the Zoning District in which such lot is situated or meets the definition of a "lot of record" of this Ordinance, which is provided with the minimum frontage upon a public road, and which complies with all applicable Subdivision and Laws and Ordinances.
- ** (22) LOT LINES The peripheral boundaries of a parcel of land.
 - (23) LOT OF RECORD A legal lot of record shall mean a lot legally created and recorded in the Winnebago County Register of Deeds Office prior to or according to the Winnebago County Subdivision Ordinance of May 1, 1969, meeting applicable State County Zoning and Subdivision Laws and Ordinances.
 - (24) LOT, THROUGH A lot which has a pair of opposite lot lines among two parallel streets and which is not a corner lot. On a through lot both street lines shall be deemed front lot lines.
- ** (25) LOT, WIDTH The mean horizontal distance between the side lot lines of a lot measured at right angles to the depth.

On irregularly (non-perpendicular) shaped lots, the width shall be the average width of the lot computed according to DILHR 85, Wisconsin Administrative Code. Lot width shall be measured at the street setback line applicable to the zoning district the parcel is located within. In the shoreland jurisdiction, the lot width shall also be measured at the shore yard setback line applicable to the zoning district the parcel is located within. At least 50% of the lot shall be greater than or equal to the required lot width.

- (26) MAJOR CONDOMINIUM PLAT Condominiums in which land is allocated into parcels or building sites, whether the individual portions of land are defined as "units" or "limited common elements", are subject to review and approval of this Ordinance if five (5) or more parcels or building sites of five (5) acres or smaller in size and created within any five (5) year period from a lot parcel or tract which existed on the effective date of this chapter.
- (27) MAJOR LAND DIVISIONS The creation of five (5) or more parcels or building sites of five (5) acres or smaller in size by successive divisions within a period of five (5) years. Within the classification of MAJOR LAND DIVI-SION, there shall be subclassifications of:
 - (1) SUBDIVISION, COUNTY (Subdivisions satisfying this classification, are subject to County review, and do not require State review). The subdivision of a lot, parcel or tract of land by the owner thereof or the owner's agent for the purpose of sale or of building development, where:
 - (a) The act of division creates five (5) or more parcel or building sites, each of which is larger than one and one-half (1 1/2) acres and which is five (5) acres or smaller in size: or
 - (b) Five (5) or more parcels or building sites of which is larger than one and one-half acres and which is five (5) acres or smaller in size and created by successive divisions within a period of five (5) years.
 - (2) SUBDIVISION, STATE (Subdivisions satisfying this classification are subject to mandatory State review under Chapter 236 of the Wisconsin Statutes in addition

- to County review under this Ordinance). The division of a lot, parcel or tract of land by the owner thereof or the owner's agent for the purpose of sale or of building development, where:
- (a) The act of division creates five (5) or more parcel or building sites, each of which is larger than one and one-half (1 1/2) acres and which is five (5) acres or smaller in size: or
- (b) Five (5) or more parcels or building sites of one and one-half (1 1/2) acres each or less in area are created by successive divisions within a period of five (5) years.
- (28) MAJOR STREET Arterial and collector roads primarily intended for through traffic with a secondary function for direct access.
- (29) MINOR CONDOMINIUM PLAT Condominiums in which land is allocated into parcels or building sites, whether the individual portions of land are defined as "units" or "limited common elements", are subject to review and approval of this Ordinance if one (1) but not more than four (4) parcels or building sites of five (5) acres or smaller in size are created within any five (5) year period from a lot parcel or tract which existed on the effective date of this chapter.
- (30) MINOR LAND DIVISIONS The creation of one (1) but not more than four (4) parcels or building sites which divide land into a parcel or parcels of five (5) acres or smaller in size. Minor land divisions shall be created by Certified Survey Maps. Not more than four (4) parcels may be created by means of minor land division procedures within any five (5) year period from a lot, parcel or tract which existed on the effective date of this chapter.
- (31) MINOR STREET A street used or intended to be used primarily for access to abutting properties.
- (32) OBSTRUCTION, DRAINAGEWAY This Ordinance refers to two different types of obstructions:
 - (1) ARTIFICIAL OBSTRUCTION Any obstruction other than a natural obstruction that is capable of reducing the carrying capacity of a stream or drainageway or may accumulate debris and thereby reduce the carrying capacity of a stream; such as fences, dams, planted trees and shrubs, and

- any other obstructions instituted as a result of human activity.
- (2) NATURAL OBSTRUCTION Includes any rock, tree, gravel or analogous natural matter that is an obstruction and has been located within the stream or drainageway by a non-human cause.
- (33) OUTLOT A remnant parcel of land not to be used for building purposes, so designated on the plat.
- (31) PARCEL Lot Created by a division of land. A parcel(s) which is owned, controlled or managed as a single entity shall be treated as a single tract, unless separated by a public road and navigable and non-navigable waters. A parcel is created as of the date the deed, land contract, lease, etc., is recorded with the Register of Deeds Office.
- (34) PLANNING ADMINISTRATOR The person designated by the County Planning and Zoning Committee to administer this chapter.
- (35) PRELIMINARY PLAT A map showing the salient features of a proposed subdivision submitted to the County Planning and Zoning Committee for purposes of preliminary consideration as described in Section 18.30 of this chapter.
- (36) PUBLIC WAY Any public road, street highway, walkway, drainageway or part thereof.
- ** (37) SHORELAND JURISDICTION The area within 1,000' of the ordinary high water mark of a navigable lake, pond or flowage; or within 300' of the ordinary high water mark of a river or stream; or to the landward side of a floodplain, whichever distance is greater.
- ** (38) STREET (Public) The right-of-way of any street, road, highway, lane, etc., dedicated to the public which generally provides access to abutting properties.
- ** (39) STREET (Private) The right-of-way of any private road, highway, lane, street, access easement, easement, etc., where the defined street or easement provides access to more than one parcel or principal structure.
 - (40) TOWN Reference to town shall mean any town in the County including the Town Board, Town Clerk or any other designated Town Committee.
 - (41) TRACT A contiguous area of land which exists or has existed in single ownership.

Garage lots will be allowed only when their use has been authorized by the County Zoning Office in accordance with the intent of the ordinance section 17.10 (1).

SIZE: Garage lots may only be sized to accommodate the maximum allowable garage size and required setbacks.

MAXIMUM of 3,000 square feet. Corner lots will be allowed slightly more as allowed by zoning office. If zoned R-l, maximum garage = 1,200 square feet

If zoned R-2, maximum garage = 900 square feet

ORDINANCE NO. 19-496 — Amend Section 3.05(4)(a)(1), General Code of Winnebago County (Automobile Mileage Expense)

WHEREAS, the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors has deemed it appropriate to amend its rules to state that automobile mileage reimbursement should be at the rate established by the Internal Revenue Service for employee deduction purposes; and

WHEREAS, Section 59.03(3)(g), Statutes, states, "Each supervisor shall, for each day the supervisor attends a meeting of the board, receive mileage for each mile traveled in going to and returning from the meetings by the most usual traveled route at the rate established by the Board pursuant to Section 59.15 as a standard mileage allowance for all county employees and officers."; and

WHEREAS, the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors has not taken any action so as to amend Section 3.05(4)(a)(1) regarding automobile mileage expense reimbursement and, as a consequence, supervisors cannot be reimbursed at the Internal Revenue Service rate until such time as said Ordinance is amended, pursuant to the provisions of Section 59.03(3)(g), Wisconsin Statutes.

NOW, THEREFORE, the County Board of Supervisors of the County of Winnebago does ordain as follows:

That Section 3.05(4)(a)(1) of the General Code of Winnebago County be amended to read as follows:

3.05 ATTENDANCE AT MEETINGS OR SCHOOLS.

- (4) Expense Reimbursement.
 - (a) Automobile Mileage Expense:
 - (1) Automobile mileage shall be reimbursed at the same rate as is established by Internal Revenue Service regulation for employee deductions for business mileage.

of Supervisors that this Ordinance shall be effective as of May 1, 1996.

Chairman Joseph Maehl called the meeting to order at 6:00 P.M. in the Supervisors' Room, Fourth Floor, Courthouse, Oshkosh, Wisconsin.

The meeting was opened with the Pledge of Allegiance and an Invocation by Supervisor Wagner.

Roll Call: All present except Supervisors Koziczkowski, Kramer, Finch, and Arne.

Supervisor Lauson moved and it was seconded to accept the minutes of the April 16 and 23, 1996, County Board Meetings. Chairman Maehl told the Board that a correction should be made on page 15 changing the date of the County Board meeting from "August 2" to "August 20". CARRIED BY VOICE VOTE.

Supervisor Planalp moved and it was seconded to adopt the agenda with a change to the order of the resolutions. He asked that Resolution Nos. 33-596 and 34-596 be introduced first. CARRIED BY VOICE VOTE.

COMMUNICATIONS, PETITIONS, ETC.

A letter from Governor Thompson regarding land use planning was read. Notice of Claim from Lori Stumpf regarding damage to jeans by the Winnebago County Jail staff was referred to the Personnel & Finance Committee. Notice of Claim from Katherine C. Krock on behalf of her daughter, Heidi K. Brucks, regarding damages to vehicle and injuries as a result of an accident with a Winnebago County Maintenance Department vehicle was referred to the Personnel & Finance Committee. Notice of Claim from Robert L. Ray regarding damage to trees due to Winnebago County Highway Department snow plowing was referred to the Personnel & Finance Committee

An article from the May 6, 1996, *Post Crescent*, announced that Patricia Maehl, Chairman of the Winnebago County Committee on Aging, received the 1996 Distinguished Service Award of the Wisconsin Association of Homes and Services, Inc. She was presented with the award in Milwaukee on May 9.

Petition for Zoning Amendment from George E. Mathwig for change from R-1 to R-3 for construction of a duplex was referred to the Planning & Zoning Committee. Petition for Zoning Amendment from William Drews for change from A-2 to R-1 for construction of a single family dwelling was referred to the Planning & Zoning Committee. Petition for Zoning Amendment from Leonard L. Baer for change from A-1 to R-1 for construction of two single family dwellings was referred to the Planning & Zoning Committee.

Petition for Zoning Amendment from Peter Brockman for change from B-3 to M-1 for construction of a mini-warehouse was referred to the Planning & Zoning Committee.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Supervisor Schwartz commented on the good, nutritious meal the Supervisors were served at Park View Health Center during the tour on Monday, May 20. These are the same meals that are distributed to various meal sites for elderly and low-income people. The cost for each meal is \$5.25—\$3.00 for the food and \$2.25 to cover administrative expenses, ie. drivers, supplies, etc.

Supervisor Lauson distributed copies of the Exposition Center 1996 events schedule. He commented on the addition at the Expo Center and how it will fill a great need. The fee structure for the Expo Center is on a sliding scale.

Supervisor Putzer read a letter he received from Senator Carol Buettner expressing her support of pro-life issues.

Supervisor Sundquist spoke about the tour of the Safety Building and the need for additional space and facilities. He said that HNTB

ORDINANCE NO. 21-596 — Amend Section 9.14 of the General Code of Winnebago County (Smoking in County Buildings)

WHEREAS, a continuous mountain of studies performed by health professionals continues to indicate that the effects of secondhand smoke have a deleterious effect upon the health of persons exposed to said smoke; and

WHEREAS, the Winnebago County Health Board believes that it is in the best interest of Winnebago County employees and citizens utilizing Winnebago County buildings and vehicles that their exposure to the effects of second-hand smoke be minimized.

NOW, THEREFORE, the County Board of Supervisors of the County of Winnebago does ordain as follows:

That Section 9.14 of the General Code of Winnebago County be amended to read as follows:

9.14 SMOKING IN COUNTY BUILDINGS.

- (1) <u>AUTHORITY</u>. This Section of the Code is adopted under the authority granted by Section 101.123(c), Wisconsin Statutes.
- (2) DEFINITIONS. As used in this Section.
 - (a) "Building" means any enclosed, indoor area of a structure owned by the County or any enclosed, indoor area of that part of a structure leased by the County.
 - (b) "Community-based Residential Facility" shall have that meaning as defined in Section 50.01(1g), Wisconsin Statutes.
 - (c) "County-owned" means any buildings, as defined in this Section, owned by the County, but not including buildings owned by the Winnebago County Housing Authority or the Public Safety Building Board.
 - (d) "County-leased" means any part of a building, as defined in this Section, which is leased by the County, but not including buildings leased by the Winnebago County Housing Authority.

- (e) "In-Patient Health Care Facility" shall have that definition as provided in Section 140.86(1), Wisconsin Statutes.
- (f) "Office" means any area that serves as a place of work at which the principal activities consist of professional, clerical or administrative services.
- (g) "Smoking" means carrying a lighted cigar, cigarette, pipe or any other lighted smoking equipment.
- (h) "Vehicles" means any automobile, truck, or other motorized piece of equipment having an enclosed cab or operating compartment.
- (3) <u>SMOKING PROHIBITED</u>. No person shall smoke in any County-owned or County-leased building, office or vehicle at any time.

(4) EXCEPTIONS.

- (a) The prohibition in Subsection (3) shall not apply to the following structures or the following areas:
 - Designated resident smoking areas of County-owned or County-leased in-patient health care facilities or nursing facilities.
 - (2) County-owned or County-leased Community-Based Residential Facilities.
 - (3) Facilities leased by the County to non-County entities and occupied by such entities, wherein such lease commences before July 1, 1996.
- (b) The County Department Head who controls, governs, or directs any facilities which are listed as exceptions, above, shall be the "person in charge" of such facilities as defined in Section 101.123(1)(d), Statutes, and shall designate specific smoking areas in those structures or areas which are exceptions to this Ordinance, upon the advice and consent of the appropriate policy-making committee or board of jurisdiction, pursuant to that authority provided in Section 101.123(4), Wisconsin Statutes.
- (5) <u>RESPONSIBILITIES</u>. The County shall post signs prohibiting smoking in all County-owned and County-leased buildings. The signs shall be: (a) Of uniform dimensions and of distinct colors; (b) be posted at every public entrance in a County-owned building and every entrance to the County-leased portion of a County-leased building.
- (6) PENALTIES AND ENFORCEMENT.

- (a) Any person who shall violate any provision of this Section of the Code shall, upon conviction thereof, forfeit \$25.00, together with the costs of prosecution and in default of payment of such forfeiture and costs of prosecution, shall be imprisoned in the County Jail until such forfeiture and costs are paid, but not exceeding five (5) days.
- (b) Citations may be issued for violations of this Section of the General Code as provided for in Section 25.04(4) of the General Code of Winnebago County.
- (7) <u>EFFECTIVE DATE</u>. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect as of January 1, 1992.

WHEREAS, 1995 Wisconsin Act 77 created Section 938.06(5), Wisconsin Statutes; and

WHEREAS, Section 938.06(5), Wisconsin Statutes, provides that the board of supervisors of any county may, by resolution, authorize the court to use short-term detention as a disposition;

WHEREAS, Section 938.06(5), Wisconsin Statutes, provides that the use by the Court of short-term detention as a disposition is subject to any resolution adopted by the county board of supervisors; and

WHEREAS, authorizing the use of short-term detention as a disposition is consistent with the objectives of the Juvenile Justice Code; NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors that:

- The Winnebago County Board of Supervisors hereby authorizes the Court to use placement in a secure detention facility, juvenile portion of a county jail, or in a place of non-secure custody as a disposition under Section 938.34(3)(f), Wisconsin Statutes, subject to the conditions and limitations set forth herein:
 - Placement may be for any combination of single or consecutive days totaling not more than 30 days;
 - A juvenile must be given credit against the period of detention or non-secure custody imposed for all time spent in secure detention in connection with the course of conduct for which the period of detention or non-secure custody was imposed;
 - c. A juvenile may be released from the secure detention facility, juvenile portion of the county jail, or place of non-secure custody during specified hours to attend school, attend work, and/or attend or participate in any activity the Court considers beneficial to the juvenile;
 - d. That short-term detention shall not be used as a dispositional alternative for a juvenile except as recommended by the Winnebago County Department of Social Services in a court report. The court report shall be in writing. The Court shall not order short-term detention as a dispositional alternative unless the court report states all of the following:
 - That sufficient physical resources (space in a secure detention facility, juvenile portion of a county jail, place of non-secure custody) presently exists for the shortterm detention of the juvenile; and
 - That the Winnebago County Department of Social Services budget presently contains sufficient appropriations to fund placement of the juvenile in short-term detention; and
 - A statement recommending a specific period of detention and designating a specific detention facility for the juvenile.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors that invalidation of any part of this Resolution by a

Court of competent jurisdiction shall result in the immediate revocation of all authority provided to the Court pursuant to this resolution.

RESOLUTION NO. 34-596 — SHORT-TERM DETENTION FOR VIOLATION OF ORDER

WHEREAS, 1995 Wisconsin Act 77, creating the Juvenile Justice Code, was enacted on November 17, 1995, and takes effect on July 1, 1996; and

WHEREAS, 1995 Wisconsin Act 77 created Section 938.355(6d), Wisconsin Statutes; and

WHEREAS, Section 938.355(6d), Wisconsin Statutes, provides that the board of supervisors of any county may adopt a general written policy regarding the use of short-term detention for violation of an order; and

WHEREAS, the use of short-term detention for violation of an order is consistent with the objectives of the Juvenile Justice Code; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors that:

- 1. The Winnebago County Board of Supervisors hereby authorizes the Court to use short-term detention for violation of an order under Section 938.355(6d), Wisconsin Statutes, subject to the conditions and limitations set forth herein; and
 - a. The juvenile has been adjudged delinquent (or been found to be in need of protection or services pursuant to Section 938.13, Wisconsin Statutes) and violates a condition specified in Section 938.355(2)(b)7, Wisconsin Statutes; and
 - If at the Dispositional Hearing the Court explained those conditions to the juvenile and informed the juvenile of the possibility of short-term detention for violation; or
 - If before the violation occurs the juvenile has acknowledged, in writing, that he or she read (or has had read to him or her) and understood those conditions and the possibility of short-term detention for violation; and
 - b. As to a juvenile adjudged delinquent, the caseworker may, without a hearing, take the juvenile into custody and place the juvenile in a secure detention facility or the juvenile portion of a county jail for not more than 72 hours while the alleged violation is being investigated.
 - c. As to a juvenile found to be in need of protection or services pursuant to Section 938.13, Wisconsin Statutes, the caseworker may, without a hearing, take the juvenile into custody and place the juvenile in a place of non-secure custody designated by the caseworker for not more than 72 hours while the alleged violation is being investigated.
 - d. If the short-term detention for violation exceeds 72 hours, the juvenile is entitled to a hearing. The hearing must be conducted in the manner provided in Section 938.355(6) or 938.21, Wisconsin Statutes (except that the hearing must be held within 72 hours after the time that the decision to hold the juvenile is made and a written statement of the reasons for continuing to hold the juvenile in custody may be filed rather than a petition).

RESOLUTION NO. 35-596 — Intention to Participate in the National Association of Counties Unfunded Mandates Reform Act

WHEREAS, county leaders and some associations of counties worked effectively with the National Association of Counties in launching a massive public relations and lobbying campaign that generated grass-root support for mandate relief legislation and led to the passage of the Unfunded Mandates Reform Act, which was signed by the President on March 22, 1995 and took effect January 1, 1996; and

WHEREAS, during the last two decades unfunded federal mandates have forced Winnebago County, Wisconsin, like many other states and local governments across the nation, to spend an increasing share of its budget on federal requirements; and

WHEREAS, under the new law, before a vote is taken on the House or Senate floor, a cost estimate must be prepared for any new mandate expected to cost state and local governments \$50 million or more annually, and Congress must either provide funds to pay for such a mandate or impose the cost on state and local governments by getting a majority vote in both houses to waive these requirements; and

WHEREAS, NACo considers the passage of the legislation a significant victory for state and local governments but warns that this is merely the first phase of the campaign to stop unfunded federal mandates and that counties must now work with NACo to establish a sound data base that can be used to help ensure accurate cost estimates on future federal mandates; and

WHEREAS, NACo is asking counties to participate in its mandate cost estimation program by passing a resolution indicating a willingness to participate and by designating a mandate coordinator who could be responsible for providing NACo cost data on proposed federal mandates.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Winnebago

County Board of Supervisors expresses its firm support for NACo's mandate cost estimation program and do hereby notify all departments and agencies of the county to cooperate with the county's mandate coordinator in collecting the necessary cost data on proposed federal mandates targeted by NACo.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors that the mandate coordinator is hereby ordered to complete the appropriate forms to notify NACo of the county's willingness to participate in its program and provide the necessary data on proposed federal mandates at the appropriate time.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors that it hereby authorizes Winnebago County Auditor, Gary Mayer, to act as the County's Mandate Coordinator in relationship to this matter.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Supervisor Hue reported on a 4-H Program called "Adventures in Dairyland" which allows urban youth to visit farms in the area. He read letters from two young people who enjoyed their visits.

Supervisor Rengstorf announced Joanne Evans, Assistant District Attorney, received a scholarship to attend a seminar on the abuse of children.

Supervisor Barker reported on a bus trip to Racine with Rosemary

COUNTY BOARD CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

REPORTS, RESOLUTIONS AND ORDINANCES RESOLUTION NO. 36-696 — Authorize Execution of Lease with Oshkosh Truck Corporation (Old Highway Garage)

WHEREAS, Oshkosh Truck Corporation has approached Winnebago County with regard to the possibility of entering into a short-term lease for the use of the old Winnebago County Highway Garage for the purpose of working on oversized trailers within that facility; and

WHEREAS, the Winnebago County Highway Committee and Winnebago County Planning Director have reached a tentative agreement with the Oshkosh Truck Corporation wherein the Oshkosh Truck Corporation would rent said facility for a six-month period at a rate of \$54,000 per year (\$4,500 per month) with Oshkosh Truck Corporation having an option to extend that lease on a month to month basis thereafter with the approval of Winnebago County; and

UPDATE ON SUNNYVIEW OFFICE BUILDING

Tom Martin of the Hoffman Corporation reported a decision has been made to proceed with the county part of the Sunnyview Office building and add the Department of Natural Resources later if they decide to join in on that building. The present schedule is: Now until Sept. 6 - Design Phase; Sept. 9 to Oct. 1 - Bid Phase; Oct. 7 - July 11, 1997 - Construction. Occupancy is scheduled for July of 1997.

If the D.N.R. is added, additional parking across the entry road might be needed. The D.N.R. has expressed an interest, but has given the county no firm indication they will be a part of the building. The

county has been in a holding pattern from last October until this June waiting for a response from the D.N.R.

It will be a 2-story building, with the initial story partially submerged about 4 feet. They feel a full basement might encounter water problems. An elevator would be necessary. The design of the building is with separate pods for the different departments with a common lobby and corridors. Brey Architects interviewed the department heads to determine the space needs.

Supervisor Putzer asked what revenues the county would receive from the non-county departments occupying the building. County Executive Steinhilber stated that has not been determined yet. The security for the 911 Center was discussed and that will be decided later. Supervisor Sundquist stated the 911 location in the basement of the Public Safety Building seemed safer for violent weather and other safety factors.

Supervisor Lauson suggested the Highway Committee consider improvements to County Road Y due to the increased traffic after the building is completed.

Mr. Martin stated he will report back to the County Board as the plans progress.

COUNTY AUDITOR'S REPORTS

County Auditor Gary Mayer reported on his Cellular Telephone Use Study. He recommended that a further study of those departments with low cellular phone usage to find out what is the reason for it. He recommended that the county bid out the cellular phone service on an annual basis. He did not feel there was any abuse of the cellular phone service. Supervisor Albrecht moved and it was seconded to accept the report. CARRIED BY VOICE VOTE.

Mr. Mayer presented his Vehicle Inventory Audit Report. Supervisor Footit stated he would like to know who is using the vehicles and for what purpose. Mr. Mayer will submit an amended report to include Supervisor Footit's requests. Supervisor Montgomery asked that it be prepared prior to the budget process. Winnebago County has 7 vehicles using propane, but is not going to convert any additional vehicles. Propane is only 40 cents a gallon, which includes a road tax. Supervisor Pech asked if county employees had to keep a personal use record for IRS purposes when using county vehicles. Law enforcement personnel are exempt from the IRS ruling, but other employees are not. Supervisor Schaidler asked if a cost analysis has

been done on propane vs. gas powered cars. Mr. Mayer felt it was a good idea but has not been done. Motion by Supervisor Troxell and seconded to accept the report. CARRIED BY VOICE VOTE.

Discussion was held on the Veteran's Service Office Audit Report. Supervisor Lawson noted that labor has increased more than 100% in ten years.

Supervisor Planalp commended Mr. Mayer on his report on the conference he recently attended. Supervisor Planalp moved and it was seconded to accept the Veteran's Service Office Audit Report. CARRIED BY VOICE VOTE.

SHERIFF'S REPORT

In lieu of the Juvenile Intake Report, Sheriff Mike Brooks gave an overview of the Sho-Cap Project, which was designed to address the serious habitual juvenile offender. In Winnebago County, six juvenile offenders will be supervised and dealt with quickly. This program is an offshoot of a federal adult program called Vi-Cap. A detective has been assigned to work Gang Intelligence in the Valley and disseminate information back to law enforcement agencies in Calumet, Outagamie, Fond du Lac and Winnebago Counties.

He discussed the Sexual Predator Facility being planned for Oshkosh. It will be a 300-bed facility with 475 employees and a \$20,000,000 payroll. Construction costs would be \$25,000,000 if built in Oshkosh and \$35,000,000 if built elsewhere. Supervisor Rengstorf contacted Department of Health & Social Services Secretary Joseph Leann and asked him to contact Chairman Maehl about making a presentation to the County Board about this facility.

COUNTY EXECUTIVE'S REPORT

County Executive Steinhilber reported that Parks Director Jeff Christensen has resigned effective July 12, 1996. He praised the work he has done for the past 22 years, and said he will be missed. A replacement will be sought.

He announced that license changes at Park View Health Center has resulted in a reduction in the Table of Organization by \$480,000 and revenue reductions, for a total in reductions of \$714,000.

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS PROGRAM REVIEW

County Executive Steinhilber reviewed his Capital Improvements Program with the board. Supervisor Diakoff suggested the \$94,215

included for the Airport Master Plan could be eliminated and put on the tax levy. Finance Director Orenstein estimated it would cost about \$30,000 to bond for this project.

Supervisor Schaidler asked what the rent will be for the USDA - Farm Services Office in the new Sunnyview Office Building. County Executive Steinhilber stated that has not been negotiated yet, but the lease will be for five years. Supervisor Rankin asked what will happen at the Courthouse when some of the offices move out. Mr. Steinhilber stated there would be room for a new courtroom and court-related offices then. Supervisor Planalp suggested monies be included in the Capital Improvements Program for a juvenile detention center, which is needed. Supervisor Crowley asked why the county is fixing up the airport terminal to rent it out, when it was intended for airport business.

John Main, Information Systems Director, gave a presentation on current needs and future goals for the county's computer technology. For 1996, he is proposing to spend \$130,000 for upgrading the Courthouse. Supervisor Troxell asked about leasing vs. purchasing computer equipment. Finance Director Orenstein felt it would be more expensive to lease. Mr. Main stated leasing is a financing position, not a purchasing position. Private industries sometimes lease because they can write it off on their taxes, while the county cannot. Supervisor Metzig feels the approach should be to increase productivity and to reduce staff whenever possible.

OUTAGAMIE-WINNEBAGO AIRPORT OVERLAY

Supervisor Joanne Sievert gave a history of the Outagamie-Winnebago Airport Overlay. The Airport Overlay became law in 1981. In the late 80's, Winnebago County, the Town of Menasha and Outagamie County met. Winnebago County and the Town of Menasha were advised there was an overlay, but it was not going to be implemented. There was nothing in writing. The Town of Clayton and Clayton School District were never advised about the overlay until recently. Winnebago County will now administer and interpret the zoning for the Airport Overlay, except in Zones 1 and 2A. There is one home in Zone 1 and 7 homes in 2A which could never be rebuilt if something would happen to them (i.e., fire, tornado). Supervisor Sievert would like a compromise with Outagamie County where these few homes would be grandfathered in and could be rebuilt if they were destroyed by fire or other means or that

Outagamie County would agree to purchase the lot at market value if something happens to the home. She asked for County Board support on this compromise.

Supervisor King moved and it was seconded to adjourn until Tuesday, June 18, 1996 at 6 P.M. CARRIED BY VOICE VOTE. Meeting adjourned at 9:00 P.M.

The Winnefox Library System Annual Report and System Evaluation is on file in the County Clerk's Office.

The County Clerk reported that a letter, signed by a number of concerned citizens in opposition of a sexual predator prison in Oshkosh, was received and is on file in her office. A letter from Senator Carol Buettner regarding a sexual predator prison in Oshkosh was also received and is on file in the County Clerk's Office.

Supervisor Kollath reminded the Board that Saturday, June 23, is the centennial of the Menasha Public Library. He encouraged them to attend.

Supervisor Barker commended Patricia Maehl on the outstanding job she did on the "Living in the 90's" Convention.

Supervisor Wagner reported that she attended the ground breaking ceremony at UW-Fox Valley Campus for the new Science/Student Services Center, and that it was a very nice ceremony.

Supervisor Hue commented on the Menasha Public Library and stated that he hopes the City of Neenah will follow their lead at their library.

PUBLIC HEARING

Walter Chrapla, 721 Mitchell Street, Neenah, Wisconsin; Penny Baugrud, 3293 Vinland Center Road, Neenah, Wisconsin; and Thomas Ziolkowski, 2557 County Trunk GG, Neenah, Wisconsin, spoke in opposition of Amendatory Ordinance No. 6 - Wisconsin Tissue Mills. Raymond Batley, 1519 Cowling Bay Road, Neenah, Wisconsin, Chairman of the Town of Vinland, introduced Supervisors Alfred Luebke and Donald Kunde, Town of Vinland, and spoke in support of Amendatory Ordinance No. 6 - Wisconsin Tissue Mills.

COUNTY EXECUTIVE'S REPORT

Executive Steinhilber spoke in support of Resolution Nos. 47-696, "Authorize the Remodeling of Courthouse Facility", 49-696, "Authorize Transfer of Jurisdiction of County Trunk "X" and State Highway 150", and 50-696, "Authorize Airport Director to Approve Assignment of Airport Operator's Agreement and Ground Lease from Basler Flight Services, Inc., to Dale Trudell".

Executive Steinhilber reported that the remodeling of Branch IV has been completed and they are moved back into their offices. The remodeling has made Branch IV's office layout more efficient, and they hope to make similar changes in Branch III. He also stated that the Clerk of Courts Office will not be moving because there isn't enough space on the first floor of the Courthouse. He stated that pas-

sage of Resolution No. 47-696 would cover most of the costs of remodeling the Courthouse.

Supervisor Schaidler asked why the Sunnyview Complex project isn't being included in the 1997 budget. Executive Steinhilber stated that it is in the Capital Improvement Program.

Ms. Lowe's award was for the "Park View/Oshkosh West High School Intergenerational Program". Ms. Wolfe's award was for the "Reduction in Election Costs through County Coordination Program".

COUNTY BOARD CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Chairman Maehl told the Board that he had had the privilege of attending Lt. Van Airsdale's graduation from the U.S. Naval Academy in Annapolis, Maryland. He said it was a very moving experience, and that it makes you think about and appreciate all that the United States stands for. He wished all the Supervisors could have shared the experience with him.

Chairman Maehl then introduced Charlene Lowe, Park View Health Center Administrator, to present the 1996 Distinguished Service Award of the Wisconsin Association of Homes and Services,

Inc., to Patricia Maehl, Chairman of the Winnebago County Committee on Aging.

Chairman Maehl announced that Supervisor Lauson had recently retired from the Neenah Fire Department and was also celebrating his birthday. Chairman Maehl congratulated him and called for a short recess for the Board to have coffee and birthday cake.

WISCONSIN CENTRAL RAILROAD PROPERTY REPORT JEFF CHRISTENSEN, PARKS DIRECTOR

Jeff Christensen, Parks Director, reported to the Board that, after further communication with Wisconsin Central Railroad, they would be willing to sell to the County a 20' wide strip of land along their rail line from Harrison Street to Dixie Road for use as a bike trail. Mr. Christensen told the Board that their input is needed because the purchase of this property for use as a bike trail would be a substantial project, costing approximately \$10,000/mile. This strip of land would need to be surveyed, drained in some areas, raised and excavated. The railroad also would require fencing because of the close proximity to the railroad tracks.

The Board discussed the situation and feels that they don't want to lose the opportunity to acquire this land, but are not interested in making an offer at this time. Mr. Christensen does not feel that anyone else would be interested in this property, so it's not a decision that has to be made quickly.

ADJOURNED SESSION COUNTY BOARD MEETING TUESDAY, JULY 16, 1996

Chairman Joseph N. Maehl called the meeting to order at 6:00 P.M. in the Supervisors' Room, Fourth Floor, Courthouse, Oshkosh, Wisconsin.

The meeting was opened with the Pledge of Allegiance and an Invocation by Supervisor Wagner.

Roll Call: All present except Supervisors Crowley, Barker, Savas, King and Watry.

Supervisor Planalp moved and it was seconded to accept the minutes of June 18, 1996. CARRIED BY VOICE VOTE.

Supervisor Planalp moved and it was seconded to approve the agenda with the change of acting on Amended Resolution No. 60-796 after Resolution No. 41-696. CARRIED BY VOICE VOTE.

COMMUNICATIONS, PETITIONS, ETC.

A petition received by Supervisor King from Mr. & Mrs. Guilford M. Wiley, Jr., and signed by 49 citizens opposing a sexual predator treatment facility in the Oshkosh area, was read.

A petition containing 17 signatures in opposition to Planning & Zoning Report No. 002 and Amendatory Ordinance No. 07-02-96 (Nina Cowan property) was read and referred to the Planning & Zoning with a copy going to the Industrial Development Board.

Notice of Claim from Mr. & Mrs. Raymond Gieringer regarding damages to lawn and sidewalk by wrecker service after drowning incident on Lake Butte des Morts was referred to the Personnel & Finance Committee. Notice of Claim from Michael J. Stevens regarding revocation of foster home license by Winnebago County Department of Social Services was referred to the Personnel & Finance Committee.

Petition for Zoning Amendment from Joachim E. Weigel & Mary Alice Eisch for change from A-1 to R-1 for creation of one single-family lot was referred to the Planning & Zoning Committee. Petition for Zoning Amendment from Tom Rusch and Tim Rusch for change from A-1 to R-2 for development of a single-family sub- division was referred to the Planning & Zoning Committee. Petition for Zoning Amendment from Stuart Struensee for change from B-2 to R-1 for reconstruction of an existing single family residence was referred to the Planning & Zoning Committee. Petition for Zoning Amendment from Harold Toson for change from A-2 to P-1 for construction of a new church was referred to the Planning & Zoning Committee.

A thank-you note from Orrin King for the flowers, phone calls and cards that he received while he was recuperating was read.

An invitation to attend the July 29, 1996, WCA Educational Seminar, "Focus on County Finance: Revenue, Debt, Investments and Audits", was read.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Supervisors Rankin and Brennand presented their "top ten" reasons to attend the Winnebago County Fair. They encouraged the Board to attend and see what a great event it is. The dates of the fair are August 14-18.

Supervisor Wagner requested a report on the "Shabang" and "Country America" music festivals held at the fairgrounds.

Supervisor Lauson stated that they had met with the promoters last week and was told that the "Country America" festival had been more successful than "Shabang". He told the Board that the Parks & Recreation Committee will be discussing a four-year contract with the promoters for "Country America"; but that because of the complaints about noise, they aren't sure about holding another "Shabang" festival.

Supervisor Montgomery asked that the Parks & Recreation Committee not rule out another "Shabang" festival. He told the Board that rock & roll fans from other parts of the state attended the event, which was an economic benefit to Winnebago County.

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Supervisor Montgomery recommended that the Supervisors read the article, "Psychiatric Justice", that was distributed to them at a prior County Board meeting. He said that he had extra copies of the article available if they no longer had theirs.

Supervisor Schaidler commented about the revisions to the Town-County Zoning Ordinance that had been placed on their desks, specifically Page 17-176 (10), "Standard for Rezoning in A-1, Agri-Business District." He stated how the vagueness of these guidelines makes it very difficult for the Planning & Zoning Committee to come to decisions in these matters. He asked that the Supervisors that are involved with committees at the state level, do what they can to influence the clarification of these guidelines.

PUBLIC HEARING

Walter Chrapla, 721 Mitchell Street, Neenah, spoke in opposition of Resolution No. 55-796, "Authorize the Infrastructure Replacement at the West Wing Office Center - Wittman Regional Airport" and Resolution No. 41-796, "Authorize the Construction of a New Sunnyview Complex".

Kenneth Larie, 4081 County Road X, Oshkosh; Mark Cook, 4159 County Road X; and Marjorie Poublon, 4097 County Road X, Oshkosh; spoke in opposition of Zoning Report No. 002 and Amendatory Ordinance No. 07-02-96 regarding rezoning of Nina Cowan's property.

LaVerne Sturgis, 1120 West Larsen Road, Neenah, spoke in opposition to the Westside Arterial Roadway Project portion of Resolution No. 60-796, "Authorizing the Borrowing of Not to Exceed \$8,740,000; and Providing for the Issuance and Sale of General Obligation Promissory Notes Therefor".

PRESENTATION BY REPRESENTATIVE GREGG UNDERHEIM

Rep. Underheim presented Linda Wolfe, County Clerk, and Sheriff Michael Brooks with pens used by Governor Thompson to sign Assembly Bill 608 allowing law enforcement officials access to confidential information on marriage license applications.

COUNTY EXECUTIVE'S REPORT

Executive Steinhilber told the Board that Resolution No. 41-696, "Authorize the Construction of a New Sunnyview Complex", will have the cost amounts amended on the floor. He asked for their sup-

port of this resolution.

Executive Steinhilber urged the Board to support Resolution No. 55-796, "Authorize the Infrastructure Replacement at the West Wing Office Center - Wittman Regional Airport". He told the Board that the terminal building needs repair work done on the heating system, airconditioning, exterior glass, gutters and down spouts; and the electrical wiring and plumbing needs to be brought up to code. Any further delay in having these repairs done, will cause further deterioration of the terminal.

Executive Steinhilber spoke in support of Ordinance No. 59-796, "Create Section 3.10 of the General Code for Winnebago County—Establish Duties and Procedures for Recovery of Real Estate Taxes and Costs Against Persons". He asked the Board to support this Resolution.

COUNTY BOARD CHAIRMAN REPORT

Chairman Maehl presented Linda Wolfe, County Clerk, with her

"Certificate of Professional Development" from the Wisconsin County Clerks Association. This award is received after the education requirement of 100 points are earned through experience, education and specifically designed courses.

Chairman Maehl extended happy birthday wishes to Supervisors Wagner, Kramer, Sievert and Widener, and the numerous department heads who celebrate birthdays in July. He invited the Supervisors to have a birthday treat brought by Supervisor Wagner.

Chairman Maehl congratulated Gerald Bougie, Planning Department, on the "Best of Class Award" they received for the advertisement on Winnebago County displayed at Wittman Field Airport. The award was presented by Mid-America Economic Development.

UPDATE ON SEXUAL PREDATOR FACILITY

Joseph Leean, Secretary of the Department of Health & Family Services (formerly Social Services) spoke to the Board on the possibility of locating a sexual predator facility in Winnebago County. He explained that Chapter 980 of the Wisconsin Statutes requires that a facility be built to house people who have served their prison terms, but are considered too dangerous to be released back into society.

Currently, about half of the people housed at the Wisconsin Resource Center on the Winnebago Mental Health Institute grounds are considered sexual predators.

Mr. Leean explained that a site for this facility needs to be selected soon, but that Oshkosh is not even on the Governor's list of possibilities. The reason for this is because so much of the area's public opinion seems to be against locating a sexual predator facility in Oshkosh. Senator Buettner and Representative Underheim have also gotten negative responses to locating this facility in Oshkosh.

Mr. Leean stated that he would like to have the facility in Oshkosh for several reasons. Primarily, because it would be easier and more economical to add on to an existing facility like the Wisconsin Resource Center. It is also advantageous to have an existing administration and infra-structure to work with.

Some of the positive aspects for the community that is selected for the facility are economic. At a 300 bed facility, they would employ over 400 people and the payroll would be around \$16,000,000, with the average salary being approximately \$35,000. Also, there is a high ratio of doctors and specialists employed at this type of facility making higher salaries.

Mr. Leean introduced Phil Macht, Director of the Wisconsin Resource Center in Oshkosh. Mr. Macht told the Board that the Wisconsin taxpayers would be saved approximately \$12,000,000 if the sexual predator facility was built in connection with a facility like the Wisconsin Resource Center.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors that the easement shall be subject to the following conditions:

- 1. An opening no more than 10 feet in width shall be cut in the existing cyclone fence separating the properties.
- 2. That the temporary construction easement over County-owned land shall be 15 feet in width and 60 feet in length.
- 3. That all contractors performing work on the easement over County-owned land shall meet current Winnebago County insurance regulations and shall present certificates of liability insurance to the County Purchasing/Risk Management Department for approval prior to commencing work.
- 4. That Joseph Belongia, his agents or assigns shall provide restoration of land and fence to their former states upon completion of sanitary construction activities.
- 5. That said easement shall be granted for the period July 17, 1996 to and including November 1, 1996 or upon completion of sanitary construction and restoration, whichever occurs first.

RESOLUTION NO. 57-796 — Authority to Execute 1995-1997 Labor Agreement with the Winnebago County Department of Social Services Employees Union Local 2228, AFSCME

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors, that the County Executive and the County Clerk be, and they hereby are authorized to execute a three-year Agreement on behalf of Winnebago County and the Winnebago County Department of Social Services Employees Union, Local 2228, AFSCME for the years 1995, 1996 and 1997 effective January 1, 1995, which Agreement will provide the following major changes from the previous Agreement:

1) WAGES:

3.0% across-the-board effective 1-1-95

3.0% across-the-board effective 1-1-96

3.0% across-the-board effective 1-1-97

In addition to the across-the-board adjustment in 1995:

Effective October 1, 1995, increase all rates in the pay schedule for paraprofessional employees by \$0.25 per hour.

Effective October 1, 1995, increase all rates in the pay schedule for the positions of Volunteer Service Coordinator and Social Worker and Step A for the position of Social Work Specialist by \$41 per month.

Effective October 1, 1995, increase Step B through Step E of the pay schedule for the position of Social Work Specialist by \$17 per month.

In addition to the across-the-board adjustment in 1997:

Effective October 1, 1997 increase all rates for the following positions in the pay schedule for paraprofessional employees by \$0.25 per hour: Clerk I, Clerk Typist II, Word Processing Operator, Social Services Aide and Social Services Case Aide.

Effective April 1, 1997, move the position of Clerk II to the pay range for the position of Social Services Aide.

Effective April 1, 1997, add \$41 per month to all rates in the pay schedule for the positions of Volunteer Service Coordinator and Social Worker and to Step A of the pay schedule for the position of Social Work Specialist.

No retroactive wage adjustments are to be provided to individuals who terminated prior to the date of contract signing. This provision does not apply to any employees who retired.

2) WISCONSIN RETIREMENT

Effective January 1, 1996, increase the Employer's maximum contribution rate toward the Employee's share of Wisconsin Retirement by 0.3% (6.5%).

- ARTICLE 5 PROBATIONARY EMPLOYEES
 Redefine the probationary period for newly hired employees as 975 paid hours but not less than 6 months.
- 4) ARTICLE 12 VACATIONS

Allow for the use of vacation time in one hour increments.

In addition to the foregoing, the new Agreement includes minor revisions to the preamble and articles covering union bulletin boards, rules, regulations and policies, grievance procedure, holidays, sick leave with pay, non-discrimination, salary schedule - provisions for change, fair share agreement, retirement, and the pay schedules.

RESOLUTION NO. 58-796 — Authorize corporation counsel to represent interests of public in juvenile guardianship proceedings.

WHEREAS, 1995 Wisconsin Act 275 was enacted on April 22, 1996, and takes effect on July 1, 1996; and

WHEREAS, 1995 Wisconsin Act 275 permits the appointment of a guardian for a child adjudged Child in Need of Protection or Services or Juvenile in Need of Protection or Services under certain circumstances; and

WHEREAS, 1995 Wisconsin Act 275 specifies the procedures for the appointment of a guardian under the provisions created by the Act; and

WHEREAS, 1995 Wisconsin Act 275 provides that the Corporation Counsel, if designated by the County Board of Supervisors, may represent the interests of the public in guardianship proceedings under the provisions created by the Act; and

WHEREAS, the use of guardianship proceedings under the provisions created by 1995 Wisconsin Act 275, and designation of the Corporation Counsel to represent the interest of the public in each proceedings, is consistent with the objectives of Chapter 48, Wisconsin Statutes.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors that:

1. The Corporation Counsel shall represent the interests of the public in guardianship proceedings under Sec. 48.977,

Wisconsin Stats., as created by 1995 Wisconsin Act 275;

2. This resolution shall apply to guardianship proceedings pending or commenced on, or subsequent to, August 1, 1996.

ORDINANCE NO. 59-796 — Create section 3.10 of the general code for Winnebago County—establish duties and procedures for recovery of real estate taxes and costs against persons

WHEREAS, Section 74.53, Wisconsin Statutes, authorizes counties or cities to bring civil actions against a person to recover amounts that are included in the tax roll for collection of delinquent real estate property taxes, special charges, special assessments, and special taxes; the cost of razing and removing property and restoring the cite to a dust-free and erosion-free condition or filling an excavation incurred if the person owned the property when the property was razed and removed and the site restored or the excavation was filled; and the cost of abating a public nuisance if the person owned the property when the nuisance was created; and

WHEREAS, said Statute also authorizes the Court to appoint a receiver to take charge of property included in the tax certificate if a county proceeds against the owner of the property, under said Statute, for the purpose of allowing that receiver to manage the property, collect rents and apply income to the payment of delinquent real property taxes; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 74.53, Wisconsin Statutes, no action against a person to collect delinquent real estate taxes, etc., as described above, may be commenced unless it is approved by the county board with the exception that the county board may abrogate its duty to approve and notice each action to be commenced by adopting an ordinance waiving the duty and specifying procedures by which an action under Section 74.53(1), Wisconsin Statutes, may be commenced; and

WHEREAS, the Winnebago County Treasurer and your undersigned Committee recommends the adoption of an ordinance pursuant to Section 74.53(5), Wisconsin Statutes, specifying procedures by which an action for personal liability for delinquent taxes and other costs may be commenced against persons and waiving the duty of the county board to authorize every specific action.

NOW, THEREFORE, the County Board of Supervisors of the County of Winnebago does ordain as follows:

That Section 3.10 of the General Code of Winnebago County be created which shall read as follows:

3.10—PROCEDURES FOR RECOVERY OF REAL PROPERTY TAXES AND COSTS AGAINST PERSONS.

- (1) <u>Authority</u>—This ordinance is adopted pursuant to the authority provided under Section 74.53(5), Wisconsin Statutes.
- (2) The Corporation Counsel for Winnebago County, upon the request of the Winnebago County Treasurer, is hereby authorized and may commence an action to recover real property taxes and costs against persons pursuant to Section 74.53, Wisconsin Statutes, for any of the following amounts that are included in the tax rolls for collection and any of the amounts under subparagraphs (b) and (c) that are not included on the tax rolls for collection:
 - (a) Delinquent real property taxes, special charges, special assessments, and special taxes, not including amounts under subparagraphs (b) and (c), that were delinquent during the period that the person owned the property;
 - (b) The cost of razing and removing property and restoring the site to a dust-free and erosion-free condition incurred under Section 66.05(2),(5), (8), (bg), or (10), Wisconsin Statutes, or filling and excavation incurred under Section 66.05(6), Wisconsin Statutes, if the person owned the property when the property was razed and removed and the site restored or the excavation was filled;
 - (c) The cost of abating a public nuisance under Sections 254.595 or 823.04, Wisconsin Statutes, if the person owned the property when the public nuisance was abated;
- (3) Upon the commencement of an action as is described in (2), above, the Corporation Counsel is authorized to petition the Court to appoint a receiver to take charge of property included in a tax certificate under Section 74.557, Wisconsin Statutes, against the owner of the property. The receiver shall manage the property, collect rents, and apply income to the payment of

delinquent real property taxes;

- (4) No action shall be commenced against any person under this ordinance unless at least two years has elapsed after the date of the issuance of the tax certificate with regard to the real property, except that an action may be commenced after one year has elapsed after the date of issuance of the tax certificate if razing, removing, and restoring the site to a dust-free and erosion-free condition has resulted in costs incurred by any city or village which are included in the amount due for taxes;
- (5) The Winnebago County Treasurer shall report to the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors with regard to any actions commenced pursuant to this ordinance within 60 days after the filing of said actions with the Court;
- (6) <u>Effective Date</u>—This ordinance shall take effect on August 1, 1996.

RESOLUTION NO. 60-796 — Authorizing the borrowing of not to exceed \$8,440,000; and providing for the issuance and sale of general obligation promissory notes therefore

WHEREAS, the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin (the "County") hereby finds and determines that it is necessary, desirable, and in the best interest of the County to raise funds for the purpose of paying the cost of Courthouse remodeling, renovation, and improvement; acquiring rights of way and constructing a portion of the West Side arterial roadway; constructing additions to and remodeling and improving the County Exposition Building; constructing a new UW Fox Valley Science/Student Services Center; constructing a new County office facility at the Sunnyview site; constructing a landfill gas migration control system and pipeline; and acquiring equipment and furnishings (the "Project"), and there are insufficient funds on hand to pay said costs;

WHEREAS, the County Board of Supervisors hereby finds and determines that the Project is within the county's power to undertake

and therefore serves a "public purpose" as that term is defined in Section 67.04(1)(b), Wisconsin Statutes;

WHEREAS, counties are authorized by the provisions of Section 67.12(12), Wisconsin Statutes, to borrow money and to issue general obligation promissory notes for such public purposes; and

WHEREAS, the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors hereby finds and determines that general obligation promissory notes, issued in one or series, in the aggregate amount of not to exceed \$8,440,000.00 should be issued, and it is now necessary and desirable to authorize their issuance and sale.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors as follows:

Section 1. Authorization of the Notes. For the purpose of paying the cost of the Project, there shall be borrowed pursuant to Section 67.12(12), Wisconsin Statutes, the principal sum of EIGHT MILLION FOUR HUNDRED FORTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$8,440,000.00) from a purchaser or purchasers to be determined by competitive sale (the "Purchaser").

Section 2. Sale of the Notes. To evidence such indebtedness, the Chairperson and County Clerk are hereby authorized, empowered, and directed to make, execute, issue, and sell to the Purchaser for, on behalf of and in the name of the County, general obligation promissory notes, issued in one or more series, aggregating the principal amount of EIGHT MILLION FOUR HUNDRED FORTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$8,440,000.00) (the "Notes").

Section 3. Notice of Sale. The County Finance Director (in consultation with the county's financial advisor, Robert W. Baird & Co. Inc.) is hereby authorized and directed to cause a notice of sale to be published at least one time in either the Oshkosh Northwestern, the official newspaper of Winnebago County, or in The Bond Buyer, a financial newspaper published in New York, New York, prior to the date set for the sale of the Notes.

Section 4. Official Notice of Sale. The County Finance Director (in consultation with the County's financial advisor, Robert W. Baird & Co. Inc.) shall also cause an Official Notice of Sale to be prepared and distributed and may prepare or cause to be prepared and distributed an Official Statement or other form of offering circular.

<u>Section 5. Award of the Notes.</u> Following receipt of bids for the Notes, the County Board of Supervisors shall consider taking further action to provide the details of the Notes; to award the Notes to the

lowest possible bidder or bidders therefore; and to levy a direct annual irrepealable tax sufficient to pay the principal of the and interest on the Notes as the same becomes due as required by law.

Section 6. Conflicting Resolutions: Severability: Effective Date. All prior resolutions, rules, or other actions of the County Board of Supervisors or any parts thereof in conflict with the provision hereof shall be, and the same are, hereby rescinded insofar as the same may so conflict. In the event that any one or more provisions hereof shall for any reason be held to be illegal or invalid, such illegality or invalidity shall not affect any other provisions hereof. The foregoing shall take effect immediately upon adoption and approval in the manner provided by law.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Supervisor Barker reported on the NACo Convention she attended in Houston, Texas. The convention was centered around challenges that communities will be facing as we approach the year 2000. She found the convention to be very interesting and informative.

'Supervisor Albrecht spoke to the Board about the 1996 EAA Convention. He reported that over 800,000 people attended the convention this year, making it the third best attended convention in its

history. Representatives from the FAA, U.S. Customs Bureau, NASA and the National Safety Transportation Board were in attendance. In addition, over 76 nations were represented. Supervisor Albrecht reported that there were no major accidents or incidents at this years convention. He also reported that at the convention, the FAA presented Winnebago County with a grant check for Wittman Regional Airport for \$1.5 Million.

Supervisor Sundquist reported that the Public Safety Building Board had received a Phase I preliminary report from HNTB Space Study Consultants identifying space problems at the Safety Building. The Board voted to proceed with Phase II of the space study, which will be a cost study.

Supervisor Planalp commented on Linda Wolfe's report on the National County Clerks' Convention she attended. She mentioned in the report that David Schmidt, Winnebago County Planner, was a guest speaker on "GIS - A Chance to Re-engineer Government" and that he gave an excellent presentation. Supervisor Planalp wanted to extend his thanks to Mr. Schmidt for all his efforts in implementing GIS in Winnebago County.

Supervisor Griesbach added a thirteenth item to his "Courthouse Renovation Plan" that had been distributed to the Board in their packets. The additional item comes under "Current Projects" and is the relocation of the Microfilm Department to the basement of the Courthouse, in what was formerly the Zoning Department.

Supervisor Robl invited the Board to attend an open house at the new Highway Department facilities on Saturday, September 28.

Supervisor Egan invited the Board to attend Waukau's 150th Anniversary Celebration to be held September 14 and 15 in Waukau.

COUNTY EXECUTIVE'S REPORT

Executive Steinhilber thanked Supervisor Albrecht for his report on the EAA Convention and told the Board that he had been there for a number of the events. He stated that he appreciates all that the EAA does for the City of Oshkosh, Winnebago County and the State of Wisconsin. Executive Steinhilber recognized and commended Chairman Maehl for his moving performance of "Taps" after the air show battle reenactment in tribute to the Korean and Vietnam war veterans.

Executive Steinhilber spoke in support of Resolution No. 66-896, "Authorize the Winnebago County Executive to Initiate Procedures for the Annexation of Wittman Regional Airport Property to the City of Oshkosh". He stated that this annexation is necessary to continue sewer and water service to this part of the airport. When the City of

Oshkosh provided sewer and water to the two existing buildings in this area, the County assured the city that annexation procedures would begin to insure that these services would continue and be extended to future development in this area. Property taxes will continue to be paid to all entities except the Town of Nekimi.

Executive Steinhilber told the Board that at the EAA, the FAA presented Winnebago County with a check for \$1.5 Million dollars for the airport master plan.

Executive Steinhilber reported that they had received an excellent bid of 4.72% from First of America Securities, Inc., Kalamazoo, Michigan, for the general obligation promissory notes. He asked for the Boards approval of Resolution No. 67-896, "Awarding the Sale of \$8,740,000 General Obligation Promissory Notes; Providing the Form of the Notes; and Levying a Tax in Connection Therewith".

Executive Steinhilber spoke in support of Resolution No. 68-896, "Authorize Winnebago County Department of Social Services to Apply to the State of Wisconsin to Administer the W-2 Program". He told the Board that our Social Services Department has been very involved in the W-2 program and that AFDC has gone down dramatically with the development of work source programs.

Executive Steinhilber reported that the 1996 Budget book was awarded the Governmental Finance Office Association's distinguished budget award. He congratulated Chuck Orenstein, Finance Director, for his work on the budget book and for receiving the award.

Executive Steinhilber mentioned that the "Courthouse Renovation Plan", submitted by Supervisor Griesbach, shows that we are making changes that will maximize the efficient use of space. The plan also shows that they are repairing and updating the wiring and plumbing at the Courthouse.

Executive Steinhilber reported that the County Mutual Insurance Company has informed Winnebago County that we will receive a \$139,011.00 refund for the years 1993, 1994 and 1995.

COUNTY BOARD CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Chairman Maehl announced that the Register of Deeds Office had received a \$3,410 rebate from the Department of Revenue on state transfer fees, as well as, a letter commending them for their collection efforts.

Chairman Maehl extended "happy birthday" wishes to Supervisors Hue, Planalp, Montgomery and Robl, and department heads Larry Smerling, Bob Braun, Leonard Leverence and Julie Pagel.

Chairman Maehl spoke to the Board regarding the public hearing portion of these County Board meetings. He stated that out of 72 counties in Wisconsin, only three have public hearings at their monthly county board meetings. The other 69 counties only have a public hearing at their budget session, which is required by state statute. He commended the people who attend our meetings and those that participate in the public hearing portion. He encouraged them to continue to do so.

The bid proposal of First of America Securities, Inc., Kalamazoo, Michigan (the "Purchaser") is hereby accepted, said proposal offering to purchase the \$8,740,000 Winnebago County General Obligation Promissory Notes (the "Notes") for the sum of EIGHT MILLION SIX HUNDRED SEVENTY-FOUR THOUSAND ONE HUNDRED SIXTY-FOUR DOLLARS AND 40/100 (\$8,674,164.40), plus accrued interest to the date of delivery. The Notes bear interest as follows:

Section 3. Terms of the Notes. The Notes shall be designated "General Obligation Promissory Notes"; shall be dated August 15, 1996; shall be in the denomination of \$5,000 or any integral multiple thereof; shall be numbered 1 and upward; and shall mature serially on April 1 of each year, in the years and principal amounts as set forth above. Interest is payable semi-annually on April 1 and October 1 of each year commencing on April 1, 1997.

Section 4. Redemption Provisions. At the option of the County, the Notes maturing on April 1, 2004 and thereafter shall be subject to redemption prior to maturity on April 1, 2003 or on any day thereafter. Said Notes shall be redeemable as a whole or in part, and if in part, from maturities selected by the County and within each maturity by lot, at the principal amount thereof, plus accrued interest to the date of redemption.

<u>Section 5. Form of the Notes.</u> The Notes shall be issued in registered form and shall be executed and delivered in substantially the form attached hereto as <u>Exhibit E</u> and incorporated herein by this ref-

erence.

Section 6. Direct Annual Irrepealable Tax Levy. For the purpose of paying the principal of and interest on the Notes as the same becomes due, the full faith, credit and resources of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged, and there is hereby levied upon all of the taxable property of the County a direct annual irrepealable tax in the years and in the amounts as follows:

The direct annual irrepealable tax hereby levied shall be carried onto the tax roll and collected in addition to all other taxes and in the same manner and at the same time as other taxes of the County for said years are collected. So long as any part of the principal of or interest on the Notes remains unpaid, the tax hereinabove levied shall be and continues irrepealable except that the amount of tax carried onto the tax roll may be reduced in any year by the amount of any surplus in the Debt Service Fund Account created by Section 7 hereof.

Section 7. Debt Service Fund Account. There is hereby established in the County treasury a fund account separate and distinct from all other funds or accounts of the County designated "Debt Service Fund Account for \$8,740,000 Winnebago County General Obligation Promissory Notes dated August 15, 1996", which fund account shall be used solely for the purpose of paying the principal of and interest on the Notes. There shall be deposited in said fund account all accrued interest paid on the Notes at the time the Notes are delivered to the Purchaser, any premium, all money raised by taxation pursuant to Section 6 hereof and all other sums as may be necessary to pay principal of and interest on the Notes as the same becomes due. Said fund account shall be used for the sole purpose of paying the principal of

and interest on the Notes and shall be maintained for such purpose until such indebtedness is fully paid or otherwise extinguished.

Section 8. Borrowed Money Fund: Reimbursement. The proceeds of the Notes (the "Note Proceeds") (other than any premium and accrued interest which must be paid at the time of the delivery of the Notes into the Debt Service Fund Account created above) shall be deposited into an account separate and distinct from all other funds and disbursed solely for the purposes for which borrowed or for the payment of the principal of and the interest on the Notes.

Any expenditures already paid by the County for which the County is to be reimbursed with Note Proceeds (a) were paid no earlier than 60 days prior to the date on which the County Board of Supervisors adopted the Authorizing Resolution or an officer of the County made a Declaration of Official Intent to reimburse the County from the Note Proceeds for any expenditures on the Project which it paid from other funds of the County prior to receipt of the Note Proceeds or (b) are preliminary expenditures relating to the Project (such as architectural, engineering, surveying, soil testing, costs of issuance and similar costs but not including land acquisition, site preparation and similar costs incident to the commencement of construction) which are in an amount which is less than 20% of the issue price of the Notes. This declaration and the Resolution of which it is a part, shall be publicly available in the official books, records or proceedings of the County Board of Supervisors.

Section 9. Arbitrage Covenant. The County shall not take any action with respect to the Note Proceeds which, if such action had been reasonably expected to have been taken, or had been deliberately and intentionally taken on the date of the delivery of and payment for the Notes (the "Closing"), would cause the Notes to be "arbitrage bonds" within the meaning of Section 148 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code") and any income tax regulations promulgated thereunder (the "Regulations").

The Note Proceeds may be temporarily invested in legal investments until needed, provided however, that the County hereby covenants and agrees that so long as the Notes remain outstanding, moneys on deposit in any fund or account created or maintained in connection with the Notes, whether such moneys were derived from the Note Proceeds or from any other source, will not be used or invested in a manner which would cause the Notes to be "arbitrage bonds" within the meaning of the Code or Regulations. The County Clerk, or other officer of the County charged with responsibility for issuing the Notes, shall provide an appropriate certificate of the County, for inclusion in the transcript of proceedings, setting forth the reasonable expectations of the County regarding the amount and use of the Note Proceeds and the facts and estimates on which such expectations are based, all as of the Closing.

Section 10. Additional Tax Covenants; Two Year Expenditure Exemption from Rebate: Qualified Tax-Exempt Obligation Status. The County hereby further covenants and agrees that it will take all necessary steps and perform all obligations required by the Code and Regulations (whether prior to or subsequent to the issuance of the Notes) to assure that the Notes are obligations described in Section 103(a) of the Code, the interest on which is excluded from gross income for federal income tax purposes, throughout their term. The County Clerk or other officer of the County charged with the responsibility of issuing the Notes, shall provide an appropriate certificate of the County as of the Closing, for inclusion in the transcript of proceedings, certifying that it can and covenanting that it will comply with the provisions of the Code and Regulations.

Further, it is the intent of the County to take all reasonable and lawful actions to comply with any new tax laws enacted so that the Notes will continue to be obligations described in Section 103(a) of the Code, the interest on which is excluded from gross income for federal income tax purposes.

The County covenants that at least 75% of the available construction proceeds of the Notes shall be used for construction expenditures with respect to property owned by the County as provided in Section 148(f)(4)(C)(iv) of the Code. It is expected that at least 10% of the available construction proceeds of the Notes (including investment earnings thereon) will be expended for the governmental purposes of the issue within six months of the Closing; at least 45% will be expended for such purposes within one year; at least 75% will be expended for such purposes within eighteen months; and 100% will be expended for such purposes within two years. If for any reason the County did not qualify for the two year expenditure exemption or any other exemption from the rebate requirements of the Code, the County covenants that it would take all necessary steps to comply with such requirements.

The County Board of Supervisors hereby designates the Notes to be "qualified tax-exempt obligations" pursuant to the provisions of Section 265(b)(3) of the Code and in support of such designation, the County Clerk or other officer of the County charged with the responsibility for issuing the Notes, shall provide an appropriate certificate of the County, all as of the Closing.

Section 11. Execution of the Notes. The Notes shall be issued in typewritten or printed form, executed on behalf of the County by the manual or facsimile signatures of the Chairperson and County Clerk, authenticated by its fiscal agent, if any, sealed with its official or corporate seal, if any, or a facsimile thereof, and delivered to the Purchaser upon payment to the County of the purchase price thereof, plus accrued interest to the date of delivery. In the event that either of the officers whose signatures appear on the Notes shall cease to be such officers before the delivery of the Notes, such signatures shall, nevertheless, be valid and sufficient for all purposes to the same extent as if they had remained in office until such delivery. The aforesaid officers are hereby authorized to do all acts and execute and deliver all documents as may be necessary and convenient to effectuate the Closing.

<u>Section 12. Payment of the Notes.</u> The principal of and interest on the Notes shall be paid in lawful money of the United States of America by the County Clerk or County Treasurer.

Section 13. Persons Treated as Owners; Transfer of Notes. The County shall keep books for the registration and for the transfer of the Notes. The person in whose name any Note shall be registered shall be deemed and regarded as the absolute owner thereof for all purposes and payment of either principal or interest on any Note shall be made only to the registered owner thereof. All such payments shall be valid and effectual to satisfy and discharge the liability upon such Note to the extent of the sum or sums so paid.

Any Note may be transferred by the registered owner thereof by surrender of the Note at the office of the County Clerk, duly endorsed for the transfer or accompanied by an assignment duly executed by the registered owner or his attorney duly authorized in writing. Upon such transfer, the Chairperson and County Clerk shall execute and deliver in the name of the transferee or transferees a new Note or Notes of a like aggregate principal amount, series and maturity and the County Clerk shall record the name of each transferee in the registration book. No registration shall be made to bearer. The County Clerk shall cancel any Note surrendered for transfer.

The County shall cooperate in any such transfer, and the

Chairperson and County Clerk are authorized to execute any new Note or Notes necessary to effect any such transfer.

The fifteenth day of each calendar month next preceding each interest payment date shall be the record date for the Notes. Payment of interest on the Notes on any interest payment date shall be made to the registered owners of the Notes as they appear on the registration book of the County at the close of business on the corresponding record date.

Section 14. Utilization of The Depository Trust Company Book-Entry-Only System. In order to make the Notes eligible for the services provided by The Depository Trust Company, New York, New York ("DTC"), the County agrees to the applicable provisions set forth in the Blanket Issuer Letter of Representations previously executed on behalf of the County and on file in the County Clerk's office.

Section 15. Undertaking to Provide Continuing Disclosure. The County hereby covenants and agrees, for the benefit of the holders of the Notes, to enter into a written undertaking (the "Undertaking") required by SEC Rule 15c2-12 promulgated by the Securities and Exchange Commission pursuant to the Securities and Exchange Act of 1934 (the "Rule") to provide continuing disclosure of certain financial information and operating data and timely notices of the occurrence of certain events in accordance with the Rule. The Undertaking shall be enforceable by the holders of the Notes or by the Purchaser on behalf of such holders (provided that the rights of the holders and the Purchaser to enforce the Undertaking shall be limited to a right to obtain specific enforcement of the obligations thereunder and any failure by the County to comply with the provisions of the Undertaking shall not be an event of default with respect to the Notes).

The County Clerk, or other officer of the County charged with the responsibility for issuing the Notes, shall provide a Continuing Disclosure Certificate for inclusion in the transcript of proceedings, setting forth the details and terms of the County's Undertaking.

Section 16. Conflicting Resolutions; Severability; Effective Date. All prior resolutions, rules or other actions of the County Board of Supervisors or any parts thereof in conflict with the provisions hereof shall be, and the same are, hereby rescinded insofar as the same may so conflict. In the event that any one or more provisions hereof shall for any reason be held to be illegal or invalid, such illegality or invalidity shall not affect any other provisions hereof. The foregoing shall take effect immediately upon adoption and approval in the manner

provided by law.

RESOLUTION NO. 73-896 — Create County Board Rule 8.11: Procedure Governing Vetoed Resolutions and Ordinances

WHEREAS, your undersigned Committee believes that it would be in the best interests of Winnebago County that the procedure which shall be followed by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors subsequent to the County Executive vetoing a Resolution or Ordinance be reduced to writing and placed in the Rules of the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors that Section 8.11 of the Rules of the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors be created to read as follows:

8.11 PROCEDURE GOVERNING VETOED RESOLUTIONS AND ORDINANCES

Section 59.031(6), Wisconsin Statutes provides as follows:

(6) COUNTY EXECUTIVE TO APPROVE OR VETO RES-OLUTIONS OR ORDINANCES, PROCEEDINGS ON VETO. Every resolution or ordinance passed by the county board shall, before it becomes effective, be presented to the county executive. If the county executive approves, the county executive shall sign it, if not, the county executive shall return it with his or her objections, which objections shall be entered at large upon the journal and the board shall proceed to reconsider the matter. Appropriations may be approved in whole or in part by the county executive and the part returned in the same manner as provided for in other resolutions or ordinances. If, after such reconsideration, two-thirds of the members-elect of the county board agree to pass the resolution or ordinance or the part of the resolution or ordinance objected to, it shall become effective on the date prescribed but not earlier than the date of passage following reconsideration. In all such cases, the votes of the members of the county board shall be determined by ayes and nays and the names of the members voting for or against the resolution or ordinance or the part thereof objected to shall be entered on the journal. If any resolution or ordinance, is not returned by the county executive to the county board at its first meeting occurring not less than 6 days, Sundays excepted, after it has been presented to the county executive, it shall become effective unless the county board has recessed or adjourned for a period in excess of 60 days, in which case it shall not be effective without the county executive's approval.

Any vetoed resolution or ordinance shall be placed on the next County Board Meeting's Agenda. The vetoed resolution shall be brought onto the floor pursuant to a motion to reconsider the resolution or ordinance. Said motion may be made by any member of the Board, regardless of their vote on the original resolution or ordinance. The motion for reconsideration shall not be debatable. If the majority of those present vote in favor of the motion for reconsideration, the vetoed resolution or ordinance shall be reconsidered by the Board. A motion may then be entertained to override the County Executive's veto of the resolution or ordinance. No motion shall be entertained to amend the vetoed ordinance or resolution. Voting upon the motion to override the County Executive's veto shall be by roll call. Should two-thirds of the members-elect of the Board vote to override the veto, the vetoed ordinance or resolution shall become effective as of the date contained therein, but no earlier than the date of passage or, in the case of an ordinance, no earlier than the date of publication.

ORDINANCE NO. 74-896 — Create Section 9.24, Winnebago County General Code: Obscenity Ordinance

WHEREAS, your undersigned Committee believes that it is necessary and in the best interests of Winnebago County to combat the obscenity industry within Winnebago County through the passage of an Ordinance prohibiting obscene material and performances;

NOW, THEREFORE, the County Board of Supervisors of the County of Winnebago does ordain that Section 9.24 of the General Code of Winnebago County shall be created to read as follows:

9.24 OBSCENITY ORDINANCE

- (1) AUTHORITY. This Section of the Code is adopted under the authority granted by Sections 59.07(64) and 944.21, Wisconsin Statutes.
- (2) INTENT. The County Board intends that authority to prosecute violations of this Section shall be used primarily to combat the obscenity industry and shall never be used for harassment or censorship purposes against materials or performances having serious artistic, literary, political, educational, or scientific value. The County Board further intends that the enforcement of this Ordinance shall be consistent with the First Amendment to the United States Constitution; Article 1, Section 3, of the Wisconsin Constitution; and the compelling State interest in protecting the free flow of ideas.
- (3) DEFINITIONS. In this Section:
 - (a) "Community" means the State of Wisconsin.
 - (b) "Internal Revenue Code" has the meaning specified in Section 71.01(6), Wisconsin Statutes.
 - (c) "Obscene material" means a writing, picture, sound recording, or film which:
 - 1. The average person, applying contemporary community standards, would find appeals to the prurient interest

if taken as a whole;

- 2. Under contemporary community standards, describes or shows sexual conduct in a patently offensive way; and
- 3. Lacks serious literary, artistic, political, educational, or scientific value if taken as a whole.
- (d) "Obscene performance" means a live exhibition before an audience which:
 - 1. The average person, applying contemporary community standards, would find appeals to the prurient interest if taken as a whole;
 - 2. Under contemporary community standards, describes or shows sexual conduct in a patently offensive way; and
 - 3. Lacks serious literary, artistic, political, educational, or scientific value if taken as a whole.
- (e) "Sexual conduct" means the commission of any of the following: sexual intercourse, sodomy, bestiality, necrophilia, human excretion, masturbation, sadism, masochism, fellatio, cunnilingus, or lewd exhibition of human genitals.
- (f) "Wholesale transfer or distribution of obscene material" means any transfer, for valuable consideration, of obscene material for purposes of resale or commercial distribution; or any distribution of obscene material for commercial exhibition. "Wholesale transfer or distribution of obscene material" does not require transfer of title to the obscene material to the purchaser, distributee, or exhibitor.
- (4) Whoever does any of the following with knowledge of the character and content of the material or performance and for commercial purposes is subject to the penalties under Subsection (6):
 - (a) Imports, prints, sells, has in his or her possession for sale, publishes, exhibits, or transfers any obscene material.
 - (b) Produces or performs in any obscene performance.
 - (c) Requires, as a condition to the purchase of periodicals, that a retailer accept obscene material.
- (5) Whoever does any of the following with knowledge of the character and content of the material is subject to the penalties under Subsection (6):
 - (a) Transfers or exhibits any obscene material to a person under the age of 18 years.
 - (b) Has in his or her possession, with intent to transfer or

- exhibit to a person under the age of 18 years, any obscene material.
- (6) PENALTIES. Any person violating Subsection (4) or (5) shall forfeit not less than \$500 nor more than \$10,000. Each day a violation under Subsection (4) or (5) continues constitutes a separate violation under this Section.
- (7) A contract printer or employee or agent of a contract printer is not subject to prosecution for a violation of Subsection (4) regarding the printing of material that is not subject to the contract printer's editorial review or control.
- (8) (a) The County Board finds that the libraries and educational institutions under Paragraph (b) carry out the essential purpose of making available to all citizens a current, balanced collection of books, reference materials, periodicals, sound recordings, and audiovisual materials that reflect the cultural diversity and pluralistic nature of American society. The County Board further finds that it is in the interest of the County to protect the financial resources of libraries and educational institutions from being expended in litigation and to permit these resources to be used to the greatest extent possible for fulfilling the essential purpose of libraries and educational institutions.
 - (b) No person who is an employee, a member of the Board of Directors, or a trustee of any of the following is liable to prosecution for violation of this Section for acts or omissions while in his or her capacity as an employee, a member of the Board of Directors, or a trustee:
 - 1. A public elementary or secondary school
 - A private school, as defined in Section 115.001(3r), Wisconsin Statutes.
 - Any school offering vocational, technical, or adult education that:
 - a. Is a vocational, technical, and adult education district school, is a school approved by the educational approval board under Section 38.51, Wisconsin Statutes, or is a school described in Section 38.51(9)(f), (g), or (h), Wisconsin Statutes; and
 - b. Is exempt from taxation under Section 501(c)(3), Internal Revenue Code.
 - 4. Any institution of higher education that is accredited, as

- described in Section 39.30(1)(d), Wisconsin Statutes, and is exempt from taxation under Section 501(c)(3), Internal Revenue Code.
- A library that receives funding from any unit of government.
- (9) In determining whether material is obscene under Subsections (3)(c)1 and 3, a judge or jury shall examine individual pictures or passages in the context of the work in which they appear.
- (10) SEVERABILITY AND NON-LIABILITY. The provisions of this Section, including the provisions of Subsection (8), are severable, and if any Section, clause, provision, or portion of this Section is adjudged unconstitutional or invalid by a Court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder of this Section shall not be affected thereby.
- (11) JURISDICTION. This Section of the Code shall apply in all unincorporated areas of Winnebago County.
- (12) EFFECTIVE DATE. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect as of October 1, 1996.

ORDINANCE NO. 75-896 — Create Section 9.25, General Code of Winnebago County: Coin-Operated Moving Picture Houses

WHEREAS, your undersigned Committee believes that it is necessary and in the best interests of Winnebago County to regulate coinoperated moving picture houses within Winnebago County for the purpose of preventing the spread of communicable diseases in Winnebago County;

NOW, THEREFORE, the County Board of Supervisors of the County of Winnebago does ordain that Section 9.25 of the General Code of Winnebago County be created to read as follows:

9.25 <u>COIN-OPERATED MOVING PICTURE HOUSES ORDI-NANCE</u>

- (1) AUTHORITY. This Section of the Code is adopted under the authority granted by Section 59.07(54), and Chapter 251, Wisconsin Statutes.
- (2) INTENT. The intent of this Ordinance is to control the transmission of communicable diseases which may, or could, occur in establishments which show videotapes, coin-operated movies, or pictures to individuals in viewing booths in these establishments. This Ordinance establishes standards for booth construction and regulations for customers as well as managers of these establishments to prevent the spread of communicable diseases.
- (3) PRIVATE VISUAL PRESENTATIONS IN COMMERCIAL ESTABLISHMENTS. Commercial establishments which offer private viewing of movies, tapes, slides, pictures of live performances of any kind must comply with the following requirements:
 - (a) <u>Booth Access</u>. Each booth shall be totally accessible to and from aisles and public areas of the establishment. Access to a booth shall be unobstructed by doors, locks, or other control-type devices and open to an unobstructed view by the individual manager, supervisor, clerk, owner, or employee responsible for the operation of the establishment.
 - (b) Booth Construction.
 - 1. Any booth used to view a movie, tape, slide, picture, or live performance of any kind must be so constructed as to discourage sexual activity and the spread of communicable diseases by including, but not being limited to, the following requirements:
 - a. Every booth shall be separated from adjacent booths and any nonpublic areas by a wall.
 - b. Every booth shall have at least one side totally open to a public and a lighted aisle so that there is an unobstructed view at all times of anyone occupying the booth.
 - c. All walls shall:
 - 1) Be solid without any openings.
 - 2) Extend from the floor to a height of not less

than six (6) feet.

- 3) Be light-colored, non-absorbent, smooth-textured, and easily cleanable.
- 2. The floor must be light-colored, non-absorbent, smooth-textured, and easily cleanable.
- 3. The lighting level of each booth when not in use shall be a minimum of 10 foot candles at all times.
- (c) Booth Occupants. Only one individual shall occupy a booth at any time. No individual occupying a booth shall, at any time, engage in any type of sexual activity, cause any bodily discharge, or litter while in the booth. No individuals shall damage or deface any portion of the booth.
- (d) Operator Responsibility. It shall be the responsibility of the owner, lessee, operator, licensee, and employees of the establishment to:
 - 1. Maintain the premises in a clean and sanitary manner at all times.
 - 2. Maintain at least 10 foot candles of light in the public portions of the establishment, including aisles, at all times.
 - 3. Insure compliance of the establishment and its patrons with the provisions of this Section.
 - 4. Post the regulations concerning booth occupancy on signs, with lettering at least one inch high, that are placed in conspicuous areas of the establishment and in each of the viewing booths.
- (4) ENFORCEMENT. Both the Health Department and the Sheriff's Department shall have the authority to inspect the premises during operating hours and to enforce the provisions of this Section.

(5) PENALTY.

- (a) Conviction. Upon conviction of a violation of this Section, violators shall be fined not less than \$50 nor more than \$1,000. Each and every act of violation shall constitute a separate offense. Each day of violation, disobedience, omission, neglect, or refusal shall constitute a separate offense. Upon default of payment, the violator shall be imprisoned no less than three (3) days nor more than thirty (30) days.
- (b) Public Nuisance. Violation of any provision of this Section

constitutes a public nuisance.

- (6) SEVERABILITY AND NON-LIABILITY. If any Section, clause, provision, or portion of this Ordinance is adjudged unconstitutional or invalid by a Court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder of this Ordinance shall not be affected thereby.
- (7) JURISDICTION. This Section of the Code shall apply in all unincorporated areas of Winnebago County.
- (8) EFFECTIVE DATE. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect as of October 1, 1996.

dar year of 1997 and to provide funding to Winnefox Library System to fulfill this purpose in an amount not to exceed \$1,330,279.00.

RESOLUTION NO. 78-896 — Authorize Extinguishment of Tax Certificates Upon Tax Key Number 902- 0302, 208 Bowen Street, City of Oshkosh

WHEREAS, as of March 1, 1996, tax certificates for unpaid real estate taxes upon property located at 208 Bowen Street, City of Oshkosh, Wisconsin, Tax Key Number 902-0302, exist in the amount of \$22,310.88; and

WHEREAS, the former use of said property was as a gasoline filling station and automobile repair facility; and

WHEREAS, given the age of the facility, it is believed that underground gasoline storage tanks located at said site have leaked, or are leaking, gasoline into the ground underneath said site, thus causing environmental contamination to said site; and

WHEREAS, the main owner of said property, Robert Rasmussen, has effectively abandoned said property, and his whereabouts are unknown and have been unable to be established despite a diligent search on the part of the Winnebago County Treasurer and other Winnebago County agencies; and

WHEREAS, on March 1, 1996, Winnebago County's Treasurer, Burton C. Schmidt, as an interested party, petitioned the Court to appoint a receiver for said property based upon Winnebago County's tax interest in the property, and based upon the fact that said property was likely contaminated and posed a nuisance to those in the surrounding area; and

WHEREAS, on April 1, 1996, the Circuit Court for Winnebago County appointing Attorney Paul W. Swanson as the receiver for said property based upon the Petition of Winnebago County; and

WHEREAS, Winnebago County petitioned for the appointment of a receiver in this matter in lieu of tax foreclosure so as to avoid Winnebago County's being placed in the chain of Title with regard to said property and consequently opening itself to unlimited potential liability as the result of the likely environmental contamination upon said property; and -

WHEREAS, the appointed receiver has located a potential buyer for said property, Lang Oil Incorporated, who has offered to purchase the property for a minimal sum from the receiver, to remedy the pollution upon said property, and to return the property to a useful state which would no longer provide a blight to the neighborhood surrounding the property; and

WHEREAS, the potential buyer of said property has indicated that he will not complete the purchase of the parcel unless Winnebago County extinguishes its tax certificates thereupon; and

WHEREAS, Winnebago County will receive valuable consideration as a result of the deeding of the property by the receiver to Lang Oil Incorporated in that it will eliminate any potential environmental liability to Winnebago County, place the property upon the tax roles at an increased value, and eliminate a blighted area within Winnebago County; and

WHEREAS, your undersigned Committee believes that no greater compensation would be received by Winnebago County should Winnebago County foreclose upon the above-referenced property pursuant to a tax foreclosure action and subsequently sell the property to the highest bidder.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors that it hereby authorizes the Winnebago County Treasurer to extinguish all tax certificates and interest upon said certificates relating to a parcel of property located at 208 Bowen Street, City of Oshkosh, Tax Parcel Key Number 902-0302, up to the date upon which conveyance of said property is made by the receiver of said property to Lang Oil Incorporated.

SPECIAL ORDERS OF BUSINESS SESSION COUNTY BOARD MEETING TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 3, 1996

Chairman Joseph Maehl called the meeting to order at 6:00 P.M. in the Supervisors' Room, Fourth Floor, Courthouse, Oshkosh, Wisconsin.

The meeting was opened with the Pledge of Allegiance and an Invocation by Supervisor Wagner.

Roll Call: 35 present. Excused: 2 - O'Brien and Lauson.

Supervisor Planalp moved and it was seconded to adopt the agenda.

CARRIED BY VOICE VOTE.

COMMUNICATIONS, PETITIONS, ETC.

Notice of Claim from Scott A. Zak regarding damage to car while supervising client in Juvenile Restitution Program was referred to the Personnel & Finance Committee. Letter from Department of Revenue notifying Winnebago County that \$17,714.50 will be remitted from 35,429 lottery credit claims. Chapter 12 of the Winnebago County Code on records retention is available in the County Clerk's Office.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Supervisor Wagner asked supervisors to speak into their microphones so the TV audience can hear them. Supervisor Putzer questioned the TIF districts in the City of Oshkosh and Mr. Orenstein stated he would look into them. Supervisor Sundquist announced the final report on Public Safety Building space needs will be completed by the next meeting.

PUBLIC HEARING

Circuit Court Judge Bruce Schmidt spoke on behalf of Teen Court and stated he has been working on this for the past 2 years. A Coordinator was hired 3 months ago. It is not totally County funded, but funds are needed to start it up. It is an early intervention program for first-time teen offenders and they are judged by a court of their peers. The budget of \$3,000 per court for Teen Court was deleted by the County Executive. The Chinn Report also recommends a Teen Court. They will request the \$3,000 be reinstated at the budget hearings. Supervisor Robl reminded Supervisors that an Open House will be held at the new Highway Department Office on Saturday, September 28th at 9 A.M. The public is also invited.

COUNTY BOARD CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Chairman Maehl reported Iris Ost will be a presenter at the Wisconsin Counties Association Convention. He announced Wisconsin Health Care Insurance Company has refunded \$55,000 for Park View Health Center and \$7,000 for Community Programs Department. He expressed his regret upon receiving Orrin King's resignation from the County Board and noted that he was named "Mr. Winnebago County" a year ago, and the Administration Building was named after him last May for his many years of distinguished service. He read a letter to Mr. King from County Executive Steinhilber, and displayed the plaque that will be presented to him. Mr. King will also be honored on Friday by the Wisconsin County Mutual Insurance Company, an organization that he helped start.

APPOINTMENT OF PARKS DIRECTOR

Supervisor Troxell moved and it was seconded to confirm the appointment of Robert A. Way as Parks Director/Exposition Site Manager effective September 23, 1996. CARRIED BY UNANI-MOUS VOICE VOTE.

AUDIT REPORT - ADDENDUM TO VEHICLE INVENTORY

County Auditor Gary Mayer presented his addendum to the Vehicle Inventory, dated August, 1996. Supervisor Footit stated there are more questions to be answered and policies to be set, such as who drives a county car home, what determines "on call", what determines "frequently" needing a county car, and how are the employees treated for tax purposes if driving a county car. He would like to know if there is any policy that requires departments to have a County logo on the cars to show which department they represent, or who determines if a county employee can drive a county car out of the county to their home each night. He questioned why some county cars have municipal plates and some Wisconsin plates.

Supervisor Finch questioned the liability of the county for persons using county cars on week-ends and nights and possibly after having a few alcoholic drinks. Corporation Counsel Bodnar stated that it was very possible the County would be involved in a lawsuit if a county employee driving a county car was in an accident.

Supervisor Footit stated the Chief Maintenance Engineer does not take a county vehicle home, and he probably should be allowed to do so since he makes many trips back to the Courthouse and Safety Building after hours and on week-ends.

AUDIT REPORT - STORAGE OF RECORDS

County Auditor Mayer presented his report on the storage of records. Space available for storage is at the old Highway Department at 1221 Knapp Street, Oshkosh (74,223 cubic feet) and at the Neenah Human Services building (49,505 cubic feet). Other areas for storage include the Sunnyview building, Airport West Terminal, and a house at 229 Northwestern Ave., Oshkosh.

The report recommends the County Executive issue a memo requesting that records retention guidelines be adhered to. He also recommended the County adopt a policy regarding secure retention of highly sensitive documents and photos. Representative Carol Owens has been asked to determine if retention guidelines could be made less restrictive by the state.

COUNTY EXECUTIVE'S VETO MESSAGE OF ORDINANCE #74-896

Pursuant to Section 59.031(6), Wisconsin Statutes, I am hereby vetoing Ordinance #74-896 (Winnebago County's Obscenity Ordinance), and returning it to the County Board with my objections. The County Board of Supervisors, in passing this Ordinance, obviously expressed a well-meaning intent to prevent the sale of obscene

material and the exhibition of obscene performances within Winnebago County. The County Board's actions, no matter how well intended, however, may result in negative consequences to Winnebago County taxpayers without any appreciable benefit to them. Moreover, the passage of this Ordinance may have the opposite effect of what has been intended by the County Board of Supervisors.

The Ordinance, which the County Board passed, copies almost word for word the Wisconsin Criminal Statute, Section 944.21, prohibiting obscene material or performances. That statute makes the first conviction pursuant to it a Class A forfeiture, the second conviction a Class A misdemeanor, and any subsequent convictions a Class D felony.

Obviously, the purpose of the criminal statute is to target those who habitually sell, distribute, or exhibit obscene material with a tough penalty, with possible incarceration.

On the other hand, the County Ordinance is only a forfeiture action. It provides no criminal penalty for violating the Ordinance. While the court may levy a heftier fine each time the person is convicted of the offense, repeated convictions result in no criminal record for the offending party.

If a person is charged with an obscenity violation under the criminal statute, and if that person is acquitted, the defendant has no recourse against the State of Wisconsin for his costs or attorneys fees in defending himself. On the other hand, if the defendant is convicted, he may be assessed with costs of prosecution as a part of the restitution which the defendant may be ordered to pay.

On the other hand, prosecution under a County Ordinance is a forfeiture proceeding. If the judgment is for a defendant in a forfeiture proceeding, the defendant is entitled to all costs allowable under civil law with regard to his or her defense of the matter. The County would be assessed these costs. These costs include service fees, photocopying costs, postage, telephone bills, deposition costs, witness fees, expert witness fees, and mileage for witnesses and attorney's fees of up to \$100.00. Moreover, if the defendant appeals the conviction and prevails, the County would be assessed with any costs related to the appeal. Given the present costs of litigation, it is obvious that it would not take very long for costs involved in such a proceeding to easily exceed \$1,000.

Obviously, there are some advantages to charging obscenity violations under an Ordinance. One is that the District Attorney need not obtain permission from the Attorney General to charge the case. (It is my understanding that such permission has never been denied to the Winnebago County District Attorney's Office by the Attorney General. Moreover, Senator Carol Buettner has indicated her intent to introduce a Bill during the next legislative session to revoke this statutory requirement.) A 5/6th verdict is required to convict in a forfeiture case. The standard of proof in such a case is that of "clear and convincing evidence" as opposed to that of "beyond a reasonable doubt". Given the nature of the cases involved, however, in my opinion these advantages provided to the prosecutor are slight when compared to the obvious disadvantage of county taxpayers being required to reimburse pornographers for their costs of defense. Such advantages also pale when one realizes that persons in the business of distributing obscenity who are prosecuted pursuant to the Ordinance will have no criminal record. As a result, prior convictions under the Ordinance will not allow a prosecutor to charge the defendant with a misdemeanor or felony for subsequent violations.

If citizens or police officials within the County believe that the obscenity statute is being violated, complaints may be forwarded to the District Attorney's Office, and the District Attorney's Office may prosecute these complaints. Obviously, the imposition or criminal sanctions against these offenders will have a greater impact upon them in deterring their activity not only in Winnebago County but throughout the State of Wisconsin as opposed to simply levying a forfeiture against them. Moreover, the taxpayers of Winnebago County will never contribute to the costs of the defense of these offenders if all of these cases are prosecuted criminally.

For all of the above reasons, I am returning this Ordinance to you for reconsideration, and I hope you will agree with me and sustain this veto.

RECONSIDERATION OF ORDINANCE NO. 74-896 — Create Section 9.24, Winnebago County General Code: Obscenity Ordinance

WHEREAS, your undersigned Committee believes that it is nec-

essary and in the best interests of Winnebago County to combat the obscenity industry within Winnebago County through the passage of an Ordinance prohibiting obscene material and performances;

NOW, THEREFORE, the County Board of Supervisors of the County of Winnebago does ordain that Section 9.24 of the General Code of Winnebago County shall be created to read as follows:

9.24 OBSCENITY ORDINANCE

- (1) AUTHORITY. This Section of the Code is adopted under the authority granted by Sections 59.07(64) and 944.21, Wisconsin Statutes.
- (2) INTENT. The County Board intends that authority to prosecute violations of this Section shall be used primarily to combat the obscenity industry and shall never be used for harassment or censorship purposes against materials or performances having serious artistic, literary, political, educational, or scientific value. The County Board further intends that the enforcement of this Ordinance shall be consistent with the First Amendment to the United States Constitution; Article 1, Section 3, of the Wisconsin Constitution; and the compelling State interest in protecting the free flow of ideas.
- (3) DEFINITIONS. In this Section:
 - (a) "Community" means the State of Wisconsin.
 - (b) "Internal Revenue Code" has the meaning specified in Section 71.01(6), Wisconsin Statutes.
 - (c) "Obscene material" means a writing, picture, sound recording, or film which:
 - The average person, applying contemporary community standards, would find appeals to the prurient interest if taken as a whole;
 - Under contemporary community standards, describes or shows sexual conduct in a patently offensive way; and
 - 3. Lacks serious literary, artistic, political, educational, or scientific value if taken as a whole.
 - (d) "Obscene performance" means a live exhibition before an audience which:
 - The average person, applying contemporary community standards, would find appeals to the prurient interest if taken as a whole;
 - 2. Under contemporary community standards, describes or

- shows sexual conduct in a patently offensive way; and
- Lacks serious literary, artistic, political, educational, or scientific value if taken as a whole.
- (e) "Sexual conduct" means the commission of any of the following: sexual intercourse, sodomy, bestiality, necrophilia, human excretion, masturbation, sadism, masochism, fellatio, cunnilingus, or lewd exhibition of human genitals.
- (f) "Wholesale transfer or distribution of obscene material" means any transfer, for valuable consideration, of obscene material for purposes of resale or commercial distribution; or any distribution of obscene material for commercial exhibition. "Wholesale transfer or distribution of obscene material" does not require transfer of title to the obscene material to the purchaser, distributee, or exhibitor.
- (4) Whoever does any of the following with knowledge of the character and content of the material or performance and for commercial purposes is subject to the penalties under Subsection (6):
 - (a) Imports, prints, sells, has in his or her possession for sale, publishes, exhibits, or transfers any obscene material.
 - (b) Produces or performs in any obscene performance.
 - (c) Requires, as a condition to the purchase of periodicals, that a retailer accept obscene material.
- (5) Whoever does any of the following with knowledge of the character and content of the material is subject to the penalties under Subsection (6):
 - (a) Transfers or exhibits any obscene material to a person under the age of 18 years.
 - (b) Has in his or her possession, with intent to transfer or exhibit to a person under the age of 18 years, any obscene material.
- (6) PENALTIES. Any person violating Subsection (4) or (5) shall forfeit not less than \$500 nor more than \$10,000. Each day a violation under Subsection (4) or (5) continues constitutes a separate violation under this Section.
- (7) A contract printer or employee or agent of a contract printer is not subject to prosecution for a violation of Subsection (4) regarding the printing of material that is not subject to the contract printer's editorial review or control.
- (8) (a) The County Board finds that the libraries and educational

institutions under Paragraph (b) carry out the essential purpose of making available to all citizens a current, balanced collection of books, reference materials, periodicals, sound recordings, and audiovisual materials that reflect the cultural diversity and pluralistic nature of American society. The County Board further finds that it is in the interest of the County to protect the financial resources of libraries and educational institutions from being expended in litigation and to permit these resources to be used to the greatest extent possible for fulfilling the essential purpose of libraries and educational institutions.

- (b) No person who is an employee, a member of the Board of Directors, or a trustee of any of the following is liable to prosecution for violation of this Section for acts or omissions while in his or her capacity as an employee, a member of the Board of Directors, or a trustee:
 - 1. A public elementary or secondary school
 - 2. A private school, as defined in Section 115.001(3r), Wisconsin Statutes.
 - Any school offering vocational, technical, or adult education that:
 - a. Is a vocational, technical, and adult education district school, is a school approved by the educational approval board under Section 38.51, Wisconsin Statutes, or is a school described in Section 38.51(9)(f), (g), or (h), Wisconsin Statutes; and
 - b. Is exempt from taxation under Section 501(c)(3), Internal Revenue Code.
 - Any institution of higher education that is accredited, as described in Section 39.30(1)(d), Wisconsin Statutes, and is exempt from taxation under Section 501(c)(3), Internal Revenue Code.
 - 5. A library that receives funding from any unit of government.
- (9) In determining whether material is obscene under Subsections (3)(c)1 and 3, a judge or jury shall examine individual pictures or passages in the context of the work in which they appear.
- (10) SEVERABILITY AND NON-LIABILITY. The provisions of this Section, including the provisions of Subsection (8), are severable, and if any Section, clause, provision, or portion of

this Section is adjudged unconstitutional or invalid by a Court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder of this Section shall not be affected thereby.

- (11) JURISDICTION. This Section of the Code shall apply in all unincorporated areas of Winnebago County.
- (12) EFFECTIVE DATE. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect as of October 1, 1996.

Motion by Supervisor Wagner and seconded to adopt. District Attorney Joe Paulus spoke in favor of the ordinance. Pre-approval to prosecute from the Attorney General's Office is currently required under State Statutes. This is the only law that the Attorney General's office must give approval to prosecute. The County Ordinance, which would be a forfeiture action, would allow quicker and more frequent prosecution. He felt it would send a message to these types of businesses that they are not welcome in Winnebago County. This ordinance does not affect the Cities or incorporated areas. He said child pornography is covered under federal and state laws and has much stricter penalties.

Vote to adopt ordinance: Ayes: 30. Nays: 5 - Klitzke, Pech, Footit, Lawson, Hue. Excused: 2 - Lauson and O'Brien. CARRIED. VETO OVERRIDDEN.

CHINN STUDY ON JUVENILE JUSTICE SYSTEM

Sparty Hammett of Chinn & Associates gave a review of the Final Report on Organizational Study of Services for Youth Offenders. He said the Second Chance Program is one of the best programs he has seen. He said the Early Intervention Program was another good program. He also praised the Teen Court Program, Volunteer Programs and Mediation Program.

He said Winnebago County juveniles detained in Outagamie County is a good deal, but we cannot rely on them for long-term detention needs. Construction costs for a 16-bed secure detention facility (with expansion capability) would be \$95,000 per bed or \$1,520,000. The County could consider renovation of an existing facility. Operating costs would range from \$120 to \$150 per day, or annual costs of \$700,800 to \$876,000.

He gave some recommendations for system improvements, including:

- 1) Juvenile offender supervision caseloads are too high to provide quality services. Caseloads should be at a maximum of 40 to 1, instead of the current 50-65 to 1. A base probation sentence of 6 months instead of one year would reduce the caseload.
- 2) Implement staff hours that are more conducive to client needs so that evening hours are available.
- 3) Merge the Substitute Care Unit with the Child and Family Teams to stop duplication of services and confusion.
- 4) Split the North and South Child and Family Teams into CPS and Juvenile Offender units.
- Intake should be consolidated into one unit to enhance consistency of decision-making.
- Consideration should be given to converting the counseling contract to 2 full-time counselors to work nights and weekends.
- Expand the restitution program and hire a permanent social worker specialist.
- 8) Consider dedicated juvenile judges.
- 9) Data should be maintained on a consistent basis in order to analyze trends. The Court should make system enhancements to track dispositions and to split out CHIPS versus delinquency cases.
- 10) School districts should consider implementing truant programs similar to Oshkosh.
- 11) The Early Intervention Program should be utilized more by Court intake.
- 12) Most staff advocated a detention center to deal with problems in gang activity, weapons cases and assaults.
- 13) Many staff noted there is no accountability in the juvenile offender system for offenders or parents.

The Implementation Strategy was given as follows:

- 1) Establish Juvenile Justice Coordinating Council
- Institute Organizational and Management Changes within the Youth Offender System
- 3) Begin Development of Risk/Needs Assessment Criteria
- 4) Establish Office of Youth Offender Services

- 5) Expand the Continuum of Youth Offender Services Offered by the County
- 6) Develop and Expand the Data and Information System of the County
- 7) Develop a Secure Detention Facility
- 8) Develop additional Shelter Care Capacity
- 9) Establish Performance Measures and Monitor Program Success and Organizational Changes

MASTER PLAN UPDATE

Vice-Chairman Albrecht stated the EAA Fly-In drew a crowd of 800,000 people and 11,000 planes. It had an estimated \$85 million dollar impact on the city, county and state. EAA and the EAA Foundation spent more than \$9.9 million dollars to design, build and develop the convention site. Another \$1.5 million will be spent to construct 2 indoor exhibit hangars. There were 148,387 admissions to the museum in 1995. The museum brought more than \$8.4 million dollars to Winnebago County in one year. The museum provides complimentary admissions to county residents during the annual Christmas In the Air Open House and the annual Winnebago County Airport Days in March and April.

The EAA paid \$185,000 in 1995 for airport property leased, and \$105,000 for part of EAA's pledge of \$625,000 in support of airport improvement programs under the Master Plan. When the lease was renegotiated in 1993, the County's \$20,000 allocation was eliminated. The total payroll in 1995 was \$383,425. City and township taxes paid were \$216,766. \$101,000 state and sale taxes were paid on items sold. Under the 1993 lease, the net value to the county is \$3,130,000 from EAA payments.

Ninety acres of land was added to the airport under the Master Plan. The major things left to be done are land acquisition with a trade of one parcel for another, a taxiway P2 which is under construction, and taxiway P1 to be started in the spring. Knapp Street Road was closed to Waukau.

Senator Feingold came to the convention and was so impressed. He gave a 15-minute speech on the Congressional Record in Washington, DC. Copies will be obtained. Winnebago County received \$1.2 million from the FAA for airport improvements.

They have been working on Wittman Field becoming a cargo airport for several years.

TOUR OF INFORMATION SYSTEMS DEPARTMENT

The County Board took a short break and toured the facilities of the Information Systems Department given by staff members.

ACQUISITION OF NEW FINANCE, PURCHASING, PAYROLL, HUMAN RESOURCES SOFTWARE

Finance Director Chuck Orenstein explained they can't get replacement parts for upgrades to the present system. They organized 3 teams to look at new software. The Data General mainframe is being phased out by 1998. The total projected costs for customization, implementation, data conversion and training is estimated at \$750,000, which is included in the Capital Improvements Program as a line item. Annual maintenance would be approximately \$75,000. It would pay for itself in reduction in storage space and personnel time. The present system was purchased in 1989 for \$80,000 and it wasn't designed for government. Purchasing is done manually now. The current system doesn't have a good budget package. They have studied new systems and narrowed them down to four vendors. Information Systems Director John Main explained we currently have a connected network of computer servers. We have 9 servers now and will have 15 next year. That will be adequate to run the new financial software. Mr. Main felt this could slow the growth of new employees. They will come back in January, 1997 with the best plan. Chairman Maehl asked to be advised of Team Meeting dates.

WISCONSIN COUNTIES ASSOCIATION RESOLUTIONS

Chairman Maehl reviewed the resolutions to be considered at the Wisconsin Counties Association convention this month and discussion was held on some of them. Winnebago County did not submit any resolutions to WCA.

Supervisor Wagner moved and it was seconded to adjourn. Meeting adjourned at 10 P.M. Next meeting will be Tuesday, September 24, 1996 at 6 P.M.

ADJOURNED SESSION COUNTY BOARD MEETING TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 24, 1996

Chairman Joseph N. Maehl called the meeting to order at 6:00 P.M. in the Supervisors' Room, Fourth Floor, Courthouse, Oshkosh, Wisconsin.

The meeting was opened with the Pledge of Allegiance and an Invocation by Supervisor Wagner.

Roll Call: All present except Putzer, Finch, Schaidler, Koziczkowski and Rankin.

Supervisor Lauson moved and it was seconded to accept the minutes of August 15, 1996. CARRIED BY VOICE VOTE.

Supervisor Planalp moved and it was seconded to approve the agenda. CARRIED BY VOICE VOTE.

COMMUNICATIONS, PETITIONS, ETC.

Notice of Claim from Gary L. Bezella re: wheel damage sustained in bike accident on chained park entrance was referred to Personnel and Finance Committee. Notice of advanced training in parliamentary procedure, open meetings and open records for local governments to be held on five Wednesdays in October was read. County Clerk Wolfe explained the County Board Proceedings are now to be kept in binders and an index will be inserted at the end of the County Board year in March. This will save printing costs and was suggested by Supervisor

Frank Frassetto. The recount for Clerk of Courts took four days and changed slightly from a 54 vote difference to a 49 vote difference between the candidates. The voting machines worked fine, but some voters did not fill in the oval properly. The Highway Department is hosting an Open House on September 28, 1996 from 9 A.M. to Noon. The public is invited.

Petition for Zoning Amendment from Eugene A. Radloff for change from A-1 to A-1 for agriculture was referred to Planning & Zoning Committee. Petition for Zoning Amendment from William G. Baldauf for change from A-1 to R-1 for single family residence was referred to Planning & Zoning Committee. Petition for Zoning Amendment from Peter Vander Wielen for change from M-1 to M-2 for mixed businesses was referred to Planning & Zoning Committee. Petition for Zoning Amendment from Margaret A. Berger for change from A-1 to A-2 for residential/agricultural was referred to Planning & Zoning Committee. Petition for Zoning Amendment from Patrick Metcalf for change from R-2 to R-3 was referred to Planning & Zoning Committee. Petition for Zoning Amendment from Leslie Powell for change from A-2 to R-1 for a single family dwelling was referred to Planning & Zoning Committee. Petition for Zoning Amendment for change from A-2/R-1 to M-1 was referred to Planning & Zoning Committee.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Supervisor Arne, as Commander of the American Legion Post, asked that when the Pledge of Allegiance is given, the words "one nation under God" be said with no pause. Supervisor Crowley urged supervisors to read the Chinn Study Summary Report and minutes of the Social Services Board and Judiciary & Public Safety Committee of August 20, 1996. Supervisor Sundquist stated the Public Safety Building Board and Property Management and Maintenance Committee met to discuss the Phase 1 Facility Evaluation and Needs Assessment report for the Public Safety Building prepared by Kimme & Associates and HNTB. Dave Bostwick of Kimme and Associates explained the report. They recommended the space be doubled for the non-jail departments in the Public Safety Building. One of the options for the future would be two separate facilities for the Sheriff's Department and Oshkosh Police Department. Increased space is recommended for the Court Commissioner to meet state standards. It is anticipated that over the next 10-15 years, another Court Commissioner will be needed. They did not do a comparison between the Sheriff's Department and Oshkosh Police Department's parking use. The Sheriff's Road Patrol is temporarily located at the Work Release Facility. The Jail is being studied separately since it has different needs. The Jail has a functional capacity of 85 beds, but the average daily population for 1996 is 109, with peaks in the 120's. The County should start to board inmates in other facilities after we reach the 85 functional capacity. With the present facility, the inmates are running the Jail with intermittent staff surveillance. Nearly 95-100 inmates are of medium to maximum security risks.

Supervisor Lauson stated that according to page 2 of the July 24, 1996 preliminary report, the Oshkosh Police Department uses 36% of the space in the Public Safety Building, but have been paying on the basis of 17% of the costs since it was built in 1980. For this Public Safety Building study, the City of Oshkosh paid 17% of the \$25,000 cost. Supervisors Sundquist and Pech stated that the September, 1996 report states the City of Oshkosh uses 8,000 square feet of the 81,000 square foot building, which would be around 15.4% of the building.

Supervisor Barker commended Sheriff Brooks on his assistance with a land problem she had recently.

PUBLIC HEARING

There were no comments from the public.

COUNTY EXECUTIVE'S REPORT

County Executive Steinhilber reminded supervisors of the Open House at the Highway Department on Saturday. He supports Resolutions 90-996, 91-996 and 92-996. The 1997 Executive Budget will be distributed at the next meeting. For the fourth year, he has projected a decrease in the tax rate. For the first time since 1990, the tax rate will be below \$5.00 per \$1,000.

COUNTY EXECUTIVE'S APPOINTMENT

County Executive Steinhilber appointed Cindy Earl Coughlin, Earl Litho Printing Co., Inc., P.O. Box 450, Menasha, WI 54952 to the above council for a term beginning immediately and expiring June 30, 1998. Motion by Kramer and seconded to confirm. CARRIED BY VOICE VOTE.

COUNTY BOARD CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Chairman Maehl asked supervisors to read the letter on their desks from John Main, Director of Information Systems, regarding meetings with vendors on financial software packages to be held in October and November. He read a letter from the Leach Company to Leonard Leverence, Solid Waste Manager, regarding a visit by guests from the United Kingdom and thanking him for the tour. He announced that Chris Kniep, Office Chairman at the University of Wisconsin Extension Office, received a Distinguished Service Award from the National Extension - Association of Consumer Sciences for her leadership, outstanding programs and unique and personal growth. Supervisor Hue added that Jim Barthel was appointed full Professor in the UW-Extension system and commended him. Wisconsin Counties Magazine, September issue, had an article on the County Clerk's 6th National Association of Counties Achievement Award.

Bob Wurtz, Wisconsin Counties Mutual Association, presented County Executive Steinhilber with a check in the amount of \$48,475.00 as a dividend to the county. This is the second installment on the capital returned to Winnebago County and is the largest check issued to any county to date. He commended former Supervisor Orrin King for his assistance in getting the Wisconsin Counties Mutual started and chairing the committee. Winnebago County received \$130,000 last year because of its outstanding loss control efforts. The county is paying less than two-thirds in premiums of what was paid in 1988 when it started. Iris Ost announced the replacement for Mr. King on the Board of Directors of WCMA is Supervisor Patrick Brennand.

WHEREAS, your undersigned Committee believes that said annexation will serve the best interests of the Snell Road Landfill and Gas Electrical Generation Facility.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors that it hereby authorizes the Winnebago County Executive to initiate procedures with the City of Oshkosh so as to effectuate the annexation of the Snell Road Landfill property into the City of Oshkosh, and to take whatever subsequent action is necessary, including the signing of any documents, so as to promote said annexation procedure to occur. The present legal description of said property is attached and incorporated as part of this resolution.

County Executive Steinhilber presented the 1997 Budget books to the Board. He recognized and thanked Art Merry and Mike Lukowicz for their photographs of the Oshkosh and Neenah Human Services Buildings that are on the cover of the budget books.

Executive Steinhilber told the Board that Winnebago County received the "Distinguished Budget Presentation Award" from the Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada for its 1996 Annual Budget.

Executive Steinhilber briefly went through the budget book and pointed out various sections. He explained that the total tax levy for 1997 is \$29,920,700, which is a 3.1% increase over 1996. He also explained that for the fourth year in a row, there is a reduction in the

property tax rate. This year it is a 8 cent rate reduction.

Executive Steinhilber reported that, according to the State of Wisconsin's Department of Administration report, Winnebago County's final population estimate of January 1, 1996, is 149,894. This shows an increase of 9,574, or 6.823%, over the 1990 census.

Executive Steinhilber reported that the Register of Deeds Office will begin to move back into their newly remodeled offices on Friday, October 11. He also reported that the jury rooms are being reconstructed to accommodate a new jury pool program that will be instituted by the end of the year.

Executive Steinhilber told the Board that part of the Child Support Agency will be moving to the first floor after those offices have been remodeled. They hope to have this completed by the end of 1996.

Executive Steinhilber stated that plans are being drafted for the Sunnyview Complex. David Schmidt, County Planner, and Executive Steinhilber will be meeting with the DNR tomorrow to see if they want space in the new complex.

Executive Steinhilber spoke in support of Resolution No. 96-1096, "Appropriate a Sum not to Exceed \$813,800 for Phase 2 of the Computer Systems Infrastructure Improvement Project".

Executive Steinhilber stated that with the completion of the studies by Kimme and Associates, Inc., and Chinn Associates, plans for the Safety Building renovation can be started.

Executive Steinhilber spoke on Resolution No. 97-1096, "Establish Compensation Plan for County Executive to be Elected in Spring, 1997". He feels that the County Executive's salary should be the highest salary paid by the County. The proposed salaries in this resolution still leaves some of the department heads making more than the County Executive.

Executive Steinhilber stated that Winnebago County will help the DNR dispose of their building on Bayshore Drive. Supervisor Albrecht questioned why Winnebago County trucks were at the DNR property today black topping the parking lot. Executive Steinhilber didn't know why they were there, but he will contact the Highway Department and find out.

APPOINTMENT TO THE VETERANS' SERVICES COMMISSION

Executive Steinhilber asked for the Board's confirmation of his appointment of Dale Witzke, 221 North 9th Avenue, Winneconne,

Wisconsin, to the Veterans' Services Commission. He would fill the unexpired term of Vernon Anderson who passed away recently. This term would end on December 31, 1996. Because this is normally a three-year term, Mr. Witzke's appointment would continue after December 31, 1996, for a full term ending on December 31, 1999.

Motion by Supervisor Hue and seconded to approve. CARRIED BY VOICE VOTE. Supervisor Crowley voting no.

COUNTY BOARD CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Chairman Maehl extended "happy birthday" wishes to Supervisors Rengstorf, Troxell, Egan and Arne.

Chairman Maehl commented on the official opening of the new Highway Department on September 28. He stated that this is a wonderful facility and urged the Supervisors to stop and see it for themselves.

Chairman Maehl told the Board that he had received a letter from Governor Tommy Thompson advising him that Winnebago County had met the caseload performance criteria and has "earned the right of first selection to be a Wisconsin Works (W-2) administrative agency." The Governor thanked Winnebago County for their efforts in implementing this program.

Chairman Maehl told the Board that Mayor Marigen Carpenter, City of Neenah, had written him supporting Resolution No. 96-1096, "Appropriate a Sum not to exceed \$813,800 for Phase 2 of the Computer Systems Infrastructure Improvement Project".

Chairman Maehl recognized Barbara Hart Key, County Court Commissioner, for her actions in a recent vandalism case in Winnebago County that involved juveniles from Brown and Dane Counties. The Chairman was impressed that she made the decision to place the youths in secure detention, when Dane and Brown Counties would not.

COUNTY BOARD CHAIRMAN'S APPOINTMENT SUPERVISORY DISTRICT 24 - DENNIS PAYNE

Chairman Maehl appointed Dennis Payne to Supervisory District 24. Mr. Payne will fill the vacancy in that district's seat created by the resignation of Orrin King. His term of office will begin immediately and end April 21, 1998. Motion by Supervisor Kollath and seconded to confirm. CARRIED BY VOICE VOTE.

Mr. Payne was sworn into office by Chairman Maehl.

ORDINANCE NO. 94-1096 — Establish Section 5.04 General Code of Winnebago County: Coroner's Fees

WHEREAS, Section 59.37, Wisconsin Statutes, authorizes the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors to set fees for all services rendered by the Coroner. Such fees may not exceed an amount reasonably related to the actual necessary costs of providing the service; and

WHEREAS, prior to a deceased person being cremated within the State of Wisconsin, the Coroner must issue a cremation permit; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 979.10, Wisconsin Statutes, a Coroner may not issue a cremation permit unless the Coroner signs a statement that he or she has viewed the corpse which is the subject of the permit and made personal inquiry into the cause and manner of death and is of the opinion that no further examination or judicial inquiry is necessary; and

WHEREAS, the bodies of most deceased persons who die within Winnebago County are shipped to Appleton for cremation; and

WHEREAS, the average time spent by the Coroner for travel and for viewing of the body of a deceased person whose next of kin desire to cremate them is approximately 1 3/4 hours; and

WHEREAS, the Coroner's salary and fringe benefits, when billed at an hourly rate, is the equivalent of \$26.00 per hour; and

WHEREAS, the cost of transportation from Oshkosh to Appleton, photography of the deceased person's body and development of said photographs add an approximate cost of \$15.00 to the cremation permit process; and

WHEREAS, your undersigned Committee believes that the actual average cost of the Coroner viewing a deceased person's body and issuing a cremation permit equals approximately \$60.00.

NOW, THEREFORE, the County Board of Supervisors of the County of Winnebago does ordain as follows:

The creation of Section 5.04 of the General Code of Winnebago County which shall read as follows:

5.04 CORONER'S FEES. (1) AUTHORITY. This Ordinance is adopted pursuant to the authority provided under Section 59.37, Wisconsin Statutes.

(2) CREMATION PERMIT FEE. A fee of \$60.00 is hereby established for the viewing of a body by a coroner and the issuance of a permit as a precedence to cremation, pursuant to that procedure outlined by Section 973.10, Wisconsin Statutes. The estate of the deceased shall be liable for payment of said fee, unless another party agrees in advance, in writing, to be responsible for the payment of said fee.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors that this Ordinance shall take effect on November 1, 1996.

Notice of Claim from Theodore J. Eckstein regarding alleged negligence on the part of Winnebago County Social Services Department was referred to Personnel and Finance Committee. Invitation to attend the WCA Educational Seminar entitled, "Open Government Openly Arrived At" was read and placed on file. Chairman Maehl's letter and sign up sheet for a Winnebago County Speakers Bureau was distrib-

uted. Wisconsin Counties Magazine, October, 1996 issue, featured a picture of Chairman Maehl at the annual convention.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Supervisor Wagner stated she viewed the Second Chance Program in the basement of Park View Health Center, and requested carpeting be installed there. She apologized for any problems resulting from this. Supervisor Montgomery assured the Board that Park View's Director, Charlene Lowe and the Maintenance Director are working with Second Chances on this. Supervisor Wagner urged supervisors to watch Channel 10's program on the Sexual Predator Facility to be broadcast again on October 29. Supervisor Schwartz reported the transportation funds referred to in Resolution 98-1096 passed on October 8, 1996 are \$158,569. Supervisor Widener attended the Hunger Coalition in Madison. She stated Winnebago County can be proud of the job being done to alleviate hunger, but there needs to be more assistance on week-ends. The University is working with the community to develop a partnership with faculty and students assisting to alleviate hunger. Chris Kniep, UW-Extension Director, is part of this group.

PUBLIC HEARING

Connie Owens Schulz, President of the Oshkosh Concerned Taxpayers Alliance and member of the Board of Directors of the Federation of Wisconsin Taxpayers Association, thanked the County Board for considering and working on the problem of unfunded liability. She stated other counties and municipalities are working to pay off their unfunded liability. Tom Lloyd, Basler Turbo Conversions, asked that Resolution 101-1096, Authorize Approval of Ground Lease Between Winnebago County and Wisconsin Venture Group, Inc., d/b/a Transtar Aviation, be reviewed further for three reasons: 1) Alternative use proposed for this facility seems to be more advantageous economically to the county; 2) There is an option granted in the Transtar lease that has no charge attached to it; and 3) Property layout is in a series of dislocated areas of the airport.

Judge Bruce Schmidt spoke in support of Amendment (2) - Add \$18,000 to Clerk of Courts Budget: Contractual Services - Legal Services (Teen Court). He introduced Katie Lacey of Lutheran Social Services and Alonzo Kelly, Coordinator of the Teen Court Program. They have received 120 applications from volunteers in the schools to

participate in Teen Court. The program is for early intervention for juveniles 12-16 years of age who have admitted to a specific offense and is a first-time offender. They would be assessed by a jury of their peers that would impose a sentence (except for jail time). The offender would also have to serve 3 additional times on the teen jury. Thirty states have instituted programs like this with great success. The 1997 budget is \$60,000, funded by Lutheran Social Services, Oshkosh Foundation, Chamber of Commerce, School Boards, donations and other sources. Supervisor Griesbach saw an article in the Sunday Post-Crescent on Teen Court and will see that copies are sent to the County Board. Authority for Teen Court comes from the Juvenile Code which was revised in July and does not require any resolution from the county. It requires authorization from the Chief Judge, which they received. Teen Court will be held one night a week, hearing 4 cases per night.

Joe Schiebinger, N9126 Lakeshore Drive, Van Dyne, WI sent a letter to the County Board expressing an interest in purchasing Hangar #3 at Wittman Field. He spoke in opposition to Resolution 101-1096 and asked that it be referred back to the Aviation Committee for more discussion.

Rick Sokol, Wisconsin Venture Group, 631 Bowen Street, Oshkosh, WI spoke in support of Resolution 101-1096. Supervisor Albrecht stated that Hangar #3 was never advertised for sale and is not for sale. He said it is the hottest property at the airport but there are reasons others want it and that is to thwart a particular business from going in. The last tenant owes back rent, took out a heating system, left the gas line uncapped, cut the electrical wires and left hot wires exposed, etc. Improvements made were supposed to stay with the building.

COUNTY BOARD CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Chairman Maehl encouraged supervisors to attend the American Legion luncheon on Tuesday. He asked supervisors to sign up on the Speakers Bureau sign-up sheet.

He felt the County Board should have been advised that the Command Vehicle funds were used up and approved additional funding. County Executive Steinhilber gave a recap of the events leading to the final purchase of a command vehicle. He stated they thought they could stay within the \$100,000 but it turned out they could not because wiring and other work needed to be done. The total cost will be approximately \$140,000. Cabinetry will be done in-house. \$6,000 has been donated, and they expect approximately \$9,000 in donations. Mr. Bodnar stated donations must be approved by the County Board before being accepted.

County Executive Steinhilber stated they are procuring a design consultant for the Veterans Service Office space at Wittman Field. There is some interest in renting part of it. On page 575, there is \$100,000 for the east side service road at Wittman Field. Discussion will be held with the City of Oshkosh since it is used by the public

more than the airport.

Highway Commissioner Ray Grigar stated there are plans to upgrade County Trunk A as funds become available and eventually make it a 4-lane facility. \$60,000 was budgeted for engineering work.

Supervisor Albrecht moved and it was seconded to adjourn until 1:30 P.M.

AFTERNOON SESSION

Students from area schools participating in the American Legion Government Day attended the session. They discussed and voted on whether Teen Court should be placed into law and the vote was 33 ayes, 4 nays and 1 abstention. Discussion held on whether the curfew for young adults should be abolished. A motion was made and seconded to abolish the curfew for anyone 16 and under and the vote was 21 ayes, 16 nays and 1 abstention.

County Executive Steinhilber continued his presentation of the 1997 Budget. He noted a correction should be made on page 330 - the Sanitarian should have an effective date of 7/2/97. Page 541 - the Department Head should be Paul Sundquist, not Orrin King.

Supervisor Footit asked who enforces the resolution that all county vehicles have the County logo displayed on them. Mr. Bodnar stated the County Executive enforces all resolutions.

Supervisor Sievert asked if each town could get a list of library card holders in their township. Mr. Steinhilber stated he would look into it. Supervisor Diakoff stated the library cannot give out the names of card holders. Finance Director Orenstein stated the County Auditor could do an audit of the library levy to townships. Supervisor Sievert asked if the towns would have an insurable interest in the library building since they are helping to pay for it.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Supervisor Barker invited all County Board members to the Courthouse Lobby on Saturday, December 7, 1996 at 10:30 A.M. for a tree lighting ceremony. 4-H members will trim the tree. Each supervisor will receive an ornament with their name and district on it to place on the tree. The ornaments were donated by Supervisor Barker. Refreshments will be served.

Supervisor Sundquist reported that a Task Force has been formed to study the second phase of the Kimme Report on Space Requirements.

Supervisor Crowley reported an Advisory Committee is working to implement recommendations from the Chinn Report. Judge Hawley is Chairman. Supervisor Crowley participated in the Meals on Wheels program and delivered 28 meals to shut-ins.

Supervisors Hue and Arne stated they received calls from concerned citizens regarding County Road A and were glad it was on the agenda so the public can speak on it.

Supervisor Rankin introduced Jennifer Overton who won a State oratory contest. She spoke on the danger of urban sprawl taking away valuable farm lands and a possible food shortage in the future.

Supervisor Montgomery reported there was no riot at the University after the Packer-Cowboys game and expressed his concern over the media's negative reports of the students. The majority of students do not take part in these types of activities.

COUNTY HIGHWAY A UPDATE

Chairman Maehl made a presentation on the upgrading of County Highway A in the future. He said funding was provided for engineering plans to be developed by the Department of Transportation from Bowen Street to Breezewood Lane on County Highway A. It is proposed to be 4-lane from Bowen Street to County Highway Y by 1999, but the entire road is not scheduled to be 4-lane.

Mr. Steve Spanbauer, Town of Neenah Chairman, stated the peo-

ple in the Town of Neenah were concerned about County Highway A becoming a 4-lane road. Sewers were recently installed and a 4-lane road would cause problems with that project. He would like the wording in the 1997 Budget changed to reflect that County Highway A is not going to be a 4-lane highway in its entirety. Karen Rudat, 1827 County Road A, Neenah, WI thanked the County Board for their assurance that County Road A will not be a 4-lane road. Marge Hinchley, 1831 County Road A, Neenah, WI thanked the County Board for lowering the speed limit on the road and was against it becoming a 4-lane road.

COUNTY EXECUTIVE'S REPORT

County Executive Steinhilber announced that he will not be a candidate for the office of County Executive in 1997. Jones received a state award for his involvement with the fair for the past 30 years. Mr. Hoeft felt the 1996 fair was the best in the last seven years. The tractor pull and demo derby set attendance records. The musical shows did not make money, though. Preliminary figures show \$228,519 in expenses and \$229,830 in income.

The Annual Meeting and Election of the Board of Directors will be held on December 12th. John Hoeft will ask for a 2-year contract at that time.

Fair Association President Tom Egan stated there was a loss of \$20,000 at the grandstand this year. He discussed judges for the 4-H project. ADJOURNED SESSION COUNTY BOARD MEETING TUESDAY, DECEMBER 17, 1996

County Board Chairman Maehl called the meeting to order at 6:00 P.M. in the Supervisors' Room, Fourth Floor, Courthouse, Oshkosh, Wisconsin.

The meeting was opened with the Pledge of Allegiance and an Invocation by Supervisor Wagner.

Roll Call: All present except Supervisors Lawson, O'Brien and Schaidler.

Supervisor Lauson moved and it was seconded to accept the minutes of November 19, 1996. CARRIED BY VOICE VOTE.

Supervisor Planalp moved and it was seconded to approve the agenda with the change of order of the resolutions and acting on Resolution No. 140-1296 immediately after Resolution No. 128-1196. CARRIED BY VOICE VOTE.

COMMUNICATIONS, PETITIONS, ETC.

Petition for Zoning Amendment from Richard J. Schramm for change from A-2 to R-2 for development of a single family subdivision was referred to the Planning & Zoning Committee.

Petition for Zoning Amendment from Joseph A. Nemecek for change from A-2 to R-2 for development of a single family subdivision was referred to the Planning & Zoning Committee.

Petition for Zoning Amendment from Henrietta Foundation, Inc., Melvin Mathison, Treasurer, for change from R-1 to R-4 for construction of an addition to an existing apartment structure was referred to the Planning & Zoning Committee.

The USH 10: Fremont to USH 45, Winnebago and Waupaca Counties Agricultural Impact Statement compiled by the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection has been received and is on file in the County Clerk's Office.

Notice of the "Turning Point 2000: Wisconsin Transportation Forum", sponsored by the WCA was received. This forum will be held on Wednesday, January 15, 1997, at the Concourse Hotel in Madison. If you're interested in attending, contact Linda Wolfe.

A letter from Joe Scheibinger expressing his continued interest in purchasing Hangar #3 at Wittman Field was distributed to the Board.

Linda Wolfe, County Clerk, told the Board that Com-tech, Inc., was contacted about the problem with the County Board voting machine. An adjustment will be made to the software so that it will correctly tabulate the number of votes needed for passage of resolutions and ordinances.

A preliminary agenda for the 1997 NACo Legislative Conference, scheduled for February 27-March 4, 1997, in Washington, DC, has been received and is on file with the County Clerk. Extra registration forms are also available.

L. Wolfe thanked Chris Kniep, the 4H and Supervisors Barker and Hue for the lovely Christmas tree they put in the lobby of the Courthouse.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Supervisor Wagner reported that the Property Management & Maintenance Committee toured the expansion at the UW-Fox Valley Campus. She said the expansion itself will cost between \$8 and \$9 Million, but it will have a \$24 Million impact on the community.

Supervisor Diakoff informed the Board of a problem the Planning

and Zoning Committee had with the Oshkosh Northwestern regarding publishing a legal notice for a public hearing. A legal notice was not run in the Oshkosh Northwestern at the proper time, so a public hearing had to be re-held, causing extra expense to the County and hardship for the citizens and their scheduled projects. Supervisor Diakoff inquired whether the County had been billed for this legal notice; and if not, suggested that the Oshkosh Northwestern write-off this bill.

Supervisor Hue thanked Supervisor Wagner for her efforts in keeping up with the expansion work at the UW-Fox Valley Center. He said that her efforts kept the proper people informed of problems as they came up.

Supervisor Footit spoke to the Board about the odor problem in Oshkosh near Highways 110 and 41. He encouraged people to make formal complaints to Doug Pearson of Chamco at 424-7700, Matt Hottstedt of the DNR at 492-5899: and Paul Spiegel, Oshkosh Health Department Director, at 236-5031.

Supervisor Montgomery reported that the funding formula for the library budget has been finalized. He reported that the City of Oshkosh has cut their funding to the library by \$50,000. There will be a meeting on Wednesday, December 18, 4:00 p.m. at the Oshkosh Public library, to discuss library funding.

Supervisor Troxell reported that he had attended the first teen court session and it was very successful. He said that all the participants were very sincere and did an excellent job. He also stated that they have many teen volunteers for this program.

PUBLIC HEARING

Hans Dettweiler of the Wisconsin Initiative for Safer Highways expressed his support of Resolution No. 136-1296, "Oppose Amendment of State Statutes and Administrative Regulations Allowing for the Expanded Use of Longer and Heavier Trucks".

COUNTY EXECUTIVE'S REPORT

Executive Steinhilber thanked and congratulated county employees for their participation in the United Way campaign. There is almost 100% of the departments participating and there is an 8% increase in the amount of total donations.

He told the Board that a new energy saving program to reduce natural gas costs that has been in effect at Park View Health Center, will be implemented in other county buildings. The estimated savings will be over \$10,000.

Executive Steinhilber recommended passage of Resolution No. 128-1196, "Appropriate Funds for the Construction of the New James P. Coughlin Building". He explained that there is an increase in the requested amount because of the inclusion of communications equipment and furniture.

Executive Steinhilber congratulated Chuck Orenstein, Finance Director, for receiving his fourteenth Comprehensive Annual Finance Award for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1995.

COUNTY EXECUTIVE'S APPOINTMENTS RE-APPOINTMENT OF HIGHWAY COMMISSIONER

Executive Steinhilber asked for the Board's confirmation of his reappointment of Raymond Grigar as Highway Commissioner. This would be for a two-year term beginning January 1, 1997, and expiring on December 31, 1998. A motion was made by Supervisor Robl and seconded to approve. CARRIED BY UNANIMOUS VOICE VOTE.

COUNTY BOARD CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Chairman Maehl thanked Supervisors Barker and Hue for their efforts in getting the beautiful Christmas trees and starting a new tradition of having members of the 4H come and decorate. He also thanked Pete Van Airsdale for donating the trees.

Chairman Maehl said that there has been seven responses to the speakers bureau. He encouraged the supervisors to promote this service.

Chairman Maehl spoke to the Board about the benefits of County Government Day and starting a similar program that would have a few students attend various County Board meetings during the year. He asked for the Board's support of this suggestion.

Chairman Maehl extended birthday greetings to Supervisors Koziczkowski and Brennand, Gary Mayer, Burt Schmidt and Susan Winninghoff.

Chairman Maehl informed the Board that the inauguration ceremony for the county officials elected in November is scheduled for Monday, January 6, 1997. He also reminded the Board about the NACo Legislative Conference to be held February 28 to March 4 in Washington, D.C. He encouraged the supervisors to attend.

UPDATE ON JAMES P. COUGHLIN BUILDING

Tom Martin, Hoffman Corporation and Rick Lundeen, Brey Associates, presented the floor plan and design for the James P. Coughlin Building. The offices to be housed in this building are: Land and Water Conservation Department, Parks Department, UW-Extension Office and the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA). There is also an area designated for possible expansion to include the Department of Natural Resources.

Mr. Martin explained that there is an increase in the size of the building and costs from what had originally been designed. These changes were needed to accommodate additional staff in the Land and Water Conservation Department; a volunteer room, storage, and an ETN Room for the UW-Extension Office; and additional space for the USDA.

These changes have increased the costs from the originally budgeted \$2,000,000 to \$2,995,000. This increase is broken down as follows: additional space - \$438,000; site/soil condition - \$115,500; communications/equipment - \$306,500; and furnishings - \$135,000. Another optional addition would be to put a basement under a portion of the building for an additional \$450,000.

ORDINANCE NO. 134-1296 — Amend Chapter 21 of the General Code of Winnebago County

WHEREAS, your undersigned Committee has recently completed a review of the Airport Ordinance and believes that changes should be made to the Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, your undersigned Committee believes that present economic conditions dictate that said land rental rates and fuel flowage fees be amended.

NOW, THEREFORE, the County Board of Supervisors of the County of Winnebago does ordain as follows:

That any reference in Chapter 21 of the General Code of Winnebago County to "Airport Manager" be amended to read "Airport Director".

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors that Sections 21.04(3),(4),(5) and (6) and Section 21.05(3),(4) and 21.05(6) of the General Code of Winnebago County be amended to read as follows:

21.04 PUBLIC PARKING.

- (3) PUBLIC PARKING LOT. Operators of motor vehicles making use of the public parking lot at Wittman Regional Airport shall observe and comply with regulatory and directional traffic signs for entry upon and departure from and shall pay the posted charges for the right and privilege of parking therein.
- (4) LOADING ZONES. No vehicle shall be parked within the designated loading zones in front of the Terminal Building for a period greater than five minutes.
- (5) VIOLATIONS. No person shall: (a) Park any vehicle in such manner so as to cause a hazard or in any way be an obstruction to vehicular or other traffic.
 - (b) Park in any areas designated and marked for the parking of taxicabs, limousines or automobiles offered for hire to the public or any other restricted areas of the Airport so designated by signs or markings.
 - (c) Tamper with, deface, break, destroy or impair the usefulness of any equipment installed for the regulation of

public parking at Wittman Regional Airport.

- (d) Park a vehicle in a non-leased parking lot area for a period of time which exceeds 28 consecutive days.
- (e) Violate any provisions of this chapter.

21.05 RATES AND CHARGES

(3) LAND RENTAL RATES. Land on the premises of Wittman Regional Airport, subject to approved developmental and use criteria, shall be rented at the following rates:

(a) Land for hangars, aprons, taxiways, tie down areas (less than 100,000 sq. ft.)

\$.08/sq. ft/yr (annual minimum \$350)

(b) Bare land for aeronautical purposes (unimproved land) (less than 100,000 sq. ft.)

\$.08/sq. ft/yr (annual minimum \$350)

(c) Bare land for nonaeronautical purposes \$.30/sq. ft/yr (annual minimum \$350)

(d) Paved ramps or parking lots (improved land)

\$.12/sq. ft/yr (annual minimum \$350)

(e) Land for unrestricted agricultural cultivation purposes

\$ 45.00/acre/yr

(f) Land for restricted agricultural cultivation purposes

\$ 34.00/acre/yr

(g) Land restricted to the cultivation of hay only

\$ 23.00/acre/yr

Owners of private (non-commercial) hangars who are not subject to commercial minimum standards shall be assessed a premium of 30% of the annual land rental rate if they elect to utilize airport sanitary sewer and water facilities.

WHEREAS, if a property owner fails to pay their property tax, the County is still required to reimburse the other taxing jurisdictions for the taxes which should have been collected for that property; and

WHEREAS, in Wisconsin there have been an increased number of environmentally contaminated properties; and

WHEREAS, it is quite common for the owners of environmentally contaminated properties to abandon said property. Despite the fact that this property is abandoned and often useless, counties are still required to reimburse the overlying taxing jurisdiction each year for the unpaid taxes; and

WHEREAS, your undersigned Committee believes that it is unfair for Winnebago County and other counties to pay to reimburse other taxing jurisdictions for taxes which are assessed to property which, because of its environmental contamination, is worthless until such contamination is remedied.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors that it hereby urges the Wisconsin State Senate and the Wisconsin State Assembly to take legislative action to provide, pursuant to Statute, that the County Board of Supervisors may reduce the taxes or assessments to the market value of any real property, regardless of whether said taxes have been previously levied or may be subsequently levied, if said property is tax delinquent and said property is environmentally contaminated. Said legislation should further provide that the County Treasurer shall be able to charge back the rescinded taxes in accordance with Section 74.41, Wisconsin Statutes.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors that a copy of this resolution be sent to all state legislators and senators representing constituents within Winnebago County and, to the Office of Governor Tommy Thompson and to the Wisconsin Counties Association.

COMMUNICATIONS, PETITIONS, ETC.

Letter from Senator Mike Ellis regarding electric utility industry deregulation was read and referred to the Legislative Committee. Notice of meetings from Wisconsin Counties Association: County Facility Management, January 29, 1997 and Creating a Safe Work Environment, January 27, 1997, both in Stevens Point, were read and filed.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Supervisor Lauson reported the Parks Committee has completed a

plan for the redesigning of the Community Park which will be presented at the April meeting. Drainage problems need to be addressed immediately. Supervisor Hue stated County Supervisors have been invited to speak at functions because of the newly-created County Board Speakers' Bureau. There is a 18-minute video on the county available through the Personnel Department. Vice-Chairman Albrecht reported the EAA hosted 3,100 people at their annual Christmas in the Air program. As Chairman of the Sesquicentennial Committee, he invited supervisors to attend an informational meeting on January 14, 1997 at 9:30 A.M. at the Expo Center. Supervisor Griesbach commented on the nice article in the Appleton Post-Crescent regarding the County Clerk's Office and accomplishments.

PUBLIC HEARING

Walt Chrapla, 721 Mitchell Street, Neenah, WI spoke regarding Resolution 142-197. He stated the interest was not reflected and stated the county borrows money at higher interest rates for bond issues, and then lends money at a lower rate of interest. He disagreed with that.

COUNTY BOARD CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Chairman Maehl stated the Department of Transportation sent its quarterly payment for road maintenance in the amount of \$346,890.96 on January 6th. He reminded supervisors that the reimbursement for mileage is 31 cents per mile. If the IRS rate goes up, they will be notified. He announced the February 18 County Board meeting will be changed to Tuesday, February 25, 1997 at 6:00 P.M. because of the election, and the March 4, 1997 Special Order of Business Meeting has been canceled.

REPORTS, RESOLUTIONS AND ORDINANCES RESOLUTION NO. 142-197 — Approve County Industrial Development Project - Provide Loan to City of Neenah For Use In Acquisition Of Southpark Industrial Center Expansion Project

WHEREAS, the City of Neenah began development of a Southpark Industrial Center in 1982; and

WHEREAS, with prior assistance from the Winnebago County Industrial Development Board, a 200 acre Class A Industrial Park was developed which is presently home to 45 businesses which employ over 2800 people; and

WHEREAS, the City of Neenah has indicated a desire to expand the Southpark Industrial area once again by adding 45 acres to that Park; and

WHEREAS, the City of Neenah projects that the expansion area will generate between 100 to 200 new jobs and will create 17 million dollars in new tax base and will be the source of over \$25 million dollars in capital investment by industry in the community and Winnebago County; and

WHEREAS, the City of Neenah has applied for an Industrial Development Loan from the Winnebago County Industrial Development Board in the amount of \$675,000 to fund the cost of land acquisition needed for the latest Southpark Industrial Center expansion project; and

WHEREAS, Winnebago County and its Industrial Development Board are empowered to make such loans pursuant to the authority vested by Section 59.071(6)(a), Wisconsin Statutes; and

WHEREAS, your Industrial Development Board is requesting that the County Board approve this project for funding at this time in order that the City of Neenah may acquire property for the expansion of the Southpark Industrial Center.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors that the aforementioned Winnebago County Industrial Development project being the same is hereby approved.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors that funds in the amount of \$675,000 shall be made available to loan to the City of Neenah, with such loan agreement for a period of five (5) years and an interest of 1/2 of prime rate on the date that the loan is made, with interest due yearly upon said loan and the principal of said loan to be due to the Winnebago County Industrial Development Board on the fifth year anniversary date of said loan.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors that the Winnebago County Industrial Development Board and any necessary Winnebago County officers are authorized to execute an agreement between Winnebago County and the City of Neenah for this project and for said loan.

TIP/TAP FINDINGS PRESENTATION

Chris Kniep and Jim Barthel of the University of Wisconsin-Extension Office gave a presentation on a Teen Assessment Project (TAP) and Tapping Into Parenting (TIP) survey they conducted. It was prepared for the Oshkosh Area School district in 1996. It was done to better understand the concerns, problems and perceptions of youth and to provide information to those agencies that work with young people so they can focus on the services needed. A total of 4,156 sixth through twelfth grade students participated in TAP anonymously. Some of the areas covered were teen concerns, alcohol and drug use, teen sexuality, mental health, personal safety, peers and time, family relations and school/community. Many times the parents' survey answers were closely in tune with the teens' answers. In some cases, there were great discrepancies between the two.

Presentations such as the one provided to the County Board will be given to various school groups and agencies dealing with young people to give them the statistics and answers found during the surveys.

DISCUSSION OF WISCONSIN COUNTIES ASSOCIATION ITEMS

Supervisor Lauson brought up several items which had been discussed by the Legislative Committee: Shared Revenue/Mandate Relief; Expenditure Restraint Program; Tax Delinquent Contaminated Land; and Duty Disability. Under Shared Revenue/Mandate Relief, Wisconsin Counties Association requests that shared revenue increases be indexed so counties receive at least proportionally the same increases as municipalities to provide for equity among local units of government. They also request that there be an increase in the mandate relief account allocation. This would provide property tax relief to county property taxpayers. Wisconsin Counties Association requests that assessors be required to value tax delinquent contami-

nated land at \$1 until the property becomes useful and is placed back on the tax rolls. Counties would no longer be required to "foot the bill" for the owners of tax delinquent contaminated properties. Wisconsin Counties Association requests that the recommendations of the Legislative Audit Bureau be codified to modify the duty disability program to more closely reflect the Legislature's intent to provide financial security to public servants injured in the line of duty while protecting the taxpayers from the burden of rapidly increasing costs to the duty disability system. The County Board passed Resolution 202-493 supporting these changes in 1993.

Supervisor Schwartz moved and it was seconded to adjourn until January 21, 1997 at 6:00 P.M. CARRIED BY VOICE VOTE. Meeting adjourned at 8:15 P.M.

Petition for Zoning Amendment from James and Lori Wachter for change from A-1 to A-2 for construction of a single family residence was referred to the Planning & Zoning Committee. Petition for Zoning Amendment from Rosemary A. Skell for change from A-1 to R-3 for a child day care facility was referred to the Planning & Zoning

Committee. Petition for Zoning Amendment from James H. Salm for change from A-2 to M-1 for mini-warehousing was referred to the Planning & Zoning Committee. Petition for Zoning Amendment to the Winnebago County Town/County Zoning Ordinance from the Winnebago County Planning & Zoning Committee by Robert E. Braun, Zoning Administrator, was referred to the Planning & Zoning Committee.

Notice of a mini-conference entitled, "How to Select a Consultant" was read and placed on file. The conference will be held at the Pioneer Inn, Oshkosh, on January 31, 1997, and is being offered by the East Central Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission and UW-Extension offices in the East Central Region.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Supervisor Schaidler reported that the Planning & Zoning and Highway Committees met with the Parks Department and discussed the plans for County Road "A" between Neenah and Oshkosh. They are also studying the possibility of running a bike trail along County "A" between the two cities. This proposal is in addition to the Fox Cities Greenways plans.

Supervisor Schaidler, on behalf of the Legislative Committee, asked for an acclamation from the Board supporting the Green Bay Packers in their quest for a victory at the Super Bowl in New Orleans on January 26. Upon a motion and second, it was carried by voice vote supporting this acclamation, a copy of which will be sent to the Green Bay Packers.

Supervisor Payne told the Board that he had been working to get permission to have the UW-Green Bay cheerleaders attend the Super Bowl. The UW-Green Bay cheerleaders perform at all the Packer games, but the NFL was not going to allow them to perform at the Super Bowl. They have now been given permission to attend, but they need to raise \$8,000. Supervisor Payne said that Associated Bank has set up an account to accept donations and he encouraged the Board to participate.

Supervisor Sundquist reported to the Board that the Public Safety Building Board met with the Judiciary & Public Safety and Property Management & Maintenance Committees and Sheriff Brooks, Chief Erickson and David Schmidt, to study options for the Safety Building. They are in the process of confirming staff and space needs, studying state trends in jails, identifying the constraints of the District Attorney,

and looking at alternatives. They will bring their recommendations to the County Board.

He told the Board how fortunate they are to have such knowledgeable people working with these committees on this issue.

Supervisor Rankin asked about the balance in the Contingency Fund as indicated in the November, 1996, Financial Highlights. Chuck Orenstein, Finance Director, indicated that the balance is in line with last year's balance.

Supervisor Rankin asked for an explanation of re-purchase agreements. Burt Schmidt, County Treasurer, explained that every night the balances in the County's accounts are used to buy treasury securities, with an agreement with the bank that they will buy the treasury securities back from us the next day. The money is then invested overnight and the interest is paid to the County. The next day, the bank buys the securities back for the same price the County paid for them the previous day.

Supervisor Kollath asked about the custodian position at the airport that is on the table of organization but wasn't filled. He also noted that the labor expense is over-budget because temporary help and overtime weren't included in the budget.

Supervisor Albrecht told Supervisor Kollath that this custodial position has now been filled.

PUBLIC HEARING

No one addressed the Board.

COUNTY EXECUTIVE'S REPORT — THE STATE OF THE COUNTY

One of my pleasant statutory duties as County Executive is to report to you annually the condition of the county.

I am, once again, pleased to report that Winnebago County continues to be in excellent condition.

I can say without hesitation that the people of this county continue to enjoy the advantages of a prosperous economy in the midst of a wholesome, natural environment.

COUNTY FINANCES

First, I want to review with you our fiscal condition — starting with budget trends. In recent years, we have held budget growth, that is, total spending, to annual increases no greater than the inflation rate.

The total tax levy has been somewhat larger than inflation because of larger debt service, but increases in property valuation have allowed us to reduce the county equalized tax rate each year. The 1997 budget submitted to you did include another reduction in the tax rate, but amendments adopted by this Board brought the rate back up to \$5.05 per thousand, the same as last year. (You may be interested to know that our neighboring Outagamie County reduced its current rate to \$4.98, and Fond du Lac County to \$4.09.)

Although our property values reached \$6,022,800,000, the growth in property valuation in Winnebago County did not keep pace with the growth in value for the last few years. It was about 5% (4.855%) higher, compared with about 8% annual growth for recent years – and a 7.64% average growth for the State. I have reason to believe this is only a temporary phenomenon – and that growth in valuation will return to a higher level when the next assessment is made.

Our County indebtedness at the end of 1996 is \$34,385,000. We issued bonds for \$9,740,000 in 1996 – at an interest rate of 4.72%. The rate of interest on our County bonds and notes over the past 4 years averaged 4.734% – which is among the lowest rates for municipal securities in the country. Our Moody's bond rating continues to be AA.

The debt service included in that \$5.05 tax rate was \$0.66, up from \$0.53 for the prior year, and \$0.44 for the year before that. The increased debt service is required to handle the investments in capital improvements we have undertaken over the past few years. It has been a most opportune time to take on this ambitious capital improvement program – given the favorable interest rates we have experienced. You know that all this doesn't happen in a vacuum. Part of the reason for our rating – and our fine reputation in the financial markets – is the sound condition of our county finances – year after year.

I want to call your attention to the growing strength in our balance sheet. In 1986 our undesignated fund balance was \$1,318,000. In five years – 1991 – the figure reached \$3,445,000. By 1995, the undesignated fund balance was \$8,205,000 and it is projected to be over \$8 million when 1996 figures are complete. This fund is a safety valve available for tax stabilization and unanticipated revenue reductions. It is an indicator to bond investors that Winnebago County is as "sound as a rock."

COUNTY PHYSICAL PLANT

I referred to our ambitious capital improvement program and

would like to switch now from our FISCAL condition to our PHYSI-CAL condition – a brief review of the capital improvements we are making with that added debt we took on.

The Courthouse. This is the vital center of county government

 housing the courts and county records, the county board and most of the county constitutional officers. This magnificent structure, after 50+ years, needs some rejuvenation – and is getting it now.

Re-wiring is nearly complete – the re-plumbing is in the bid process. Meanwhile, the Register of Deeds department was enlarged and remodeled and is now operating "at full steam" including a new, "state of the art" imaging system. The Child Support Agency has nearly completed its move to its new offices on the first floor. Other priorities include the enlargement of Circuit Court Branch III staff offices, remodeling of jury rooms on the third floor to accommodate a new "single panel" jury system, a new office for microfilming, and providing windows in the lower level of the Courthouse. There are many other improvements in our long range plan for the Courthouse but these are the most immediate ones.

- Orrin H. King Administration Building. Over the past year, the new Orrin King Administration Building was occupied – and has proven to be a most efficient location for the departments involved.
- 3) Highway Department. Late in 1995 the Highway Department office and garage moved to its new location and dedication was held this past fall. The department estimates that the new location resulted in savings in employee and equipment productive time estimated at "approximately \$80,000 in labor and \$93,000 in equipment productive time. This totals \$173,000 per year in savings and efficiency." Meanwhile, we are leasing the old Highway building to Oshkosh Truck Corporation which will continue for a few more months.
- Recycling Facility. 1996 saw the completion of a major addition to the recycling facility doubling its size and greatly increasing its efficiency.
- Exposition Building. Also, two new wings to our Exposition Building added greatly to its flexibility for use by groups of all sizes.
- 6) Airport. Our Airport Master Plan is proceeding within set pri-

- orities construction of taxiway P-2 was completed and 45 acres of land were acquired. Two runways were rehabilitated. The west wing of the terminal the old building is undergoing renovation to the basic structure heat, air conditioning, energy efficient windows and restroom. This will bring it up to rentable condition. Our new hangar, designed for four tenants, was completed and leased in 1996.
- 7) James P. Coughlin Center (formerly Sunnyview Office building). Plans are nearly complete for this new facility to house UW-Extension Services, Land and Water Conservation, Federal agricultural offices, and Parks and Recreation offices. We have space for a DNR wing for this building when the State is ready for its move.
- 8) <u>UW Center-Fox Valley</u>. We are participating with our partner, Outagamie County, equally in financing the new Fox Valley Center Science and Student Services Building. In addition, a new planetarium is planned, entirely paid for by donations from generous benefactors of the University.
- 9) Information Systems. We have commenced the process of a major update in our computer system. Fiber optic cable engineering is completed and the first half of the system should be installed by September 1. New financial and payroll software is being purchased and the vendor should be selected shortly with implementation over the next two years.
 - New systems for telephone call accounting, marriage license applications, jury management and courtroom applications are currently being installed.
- 10) Highways. Our highway improvements continue to make great progress with the completion this year of the major segment in the Town of Menasha of our Westside Arterial to be known as County Trunk CB; and the new Highway 10 the State's new east west link of 45 to 41 (which intersects CB) is likewise due for completion this year. The remaining segment of CB in the Town of Neenah from 150 to JJ will follow over the next two years.

THE CHALLENGES AHEAD

While we have completed several major projects in the past few years, there are always new challenges to meet.

1) Wisconsin Works. This W-2 program will be implemented in

1997. Welfare reform has been an ongoing process in Wisconsin – and AFDC rolls have been reduced over the past few years. Winnebago County is a good example where agencies have cooperated in evaluation, training, and job placement to help welfare recipients become more self-sufficient – "Work, Not Welfare" has been the watchword.

A partnership consisting of Fox Valley Technical College, Oshkosh Chamber of Commerce, Oshkosh Foundation, UW-Oshkosh, Winne-Fond Lake Private Industry Council, Wisconsin Job Service, Chamco, and Winnebago County Social Services is now engaged in planning a Workforce Development Center for our County. We are likewise participating in a similar cooperative endeavor with the Fox Cities Chamber of Commerce. This effort will be both an aid to employers in finding the workers they need, and a helping hand to people who want to work rather than rely on welfare. W-2 and Workforce Development will be among the most important tasks we have to tackle in the immediate future.

2) Public Safety Building. The Public Safety Building Board authorized a study by HNTB/Kimme Associates to study the present and future needs for the agencies now occupying the Safety Building. A task force chaired by David Schmidt was appointed by the Safety Building Board to use the study to look at alternatives. This task force has made a preliminary finding that a new jail should be built on a site on the north side of Oshkosh owned by the County – and that the Sheriff's entire office should be part of the building which would house the jail.

If this recommendation is followed, and the Sheriff's department is moved, then space would become available for other crowded agencies which are requesting more space, to-wit: Court Commissioner, District Attorney's Office, and Oshkosh Police Department.

Also, the present county jail, if vacated, could be used for other purposes – including juvenile detention – which leads us to:

3) The Chinn Study. This study by the Chinn Planning Partnership makes a number of recommendations for handling our juvenile offender population. I have appointed a "Juvenile Justice Coordinating Council" pursuant to one of the recommendations, and this council has been meeting for over two months under the leadership of Judge Robert Hawley. It is evaluating all of the major proposals of the Chinn Group, including:

- a) A consolidated Juvenile Justice Center with juvenile detention, shelter care and Intake services at one location
- b) An "Office of Juvenile Offender Services"
- c) A "home detention" program
- d) Electronic monitoring
- e) A day reporting center
- f) Various system improvements

It is important to remember that we are developing a <u>system</u>, not a <u>place</u>. We should have alternatives other than detention or probation, and a facility that is adaptable for meeting the needs of juveniles who have run afoul of the law.

4) Air Service. A major challenge facing us is to improve the availability and reliability of air service at Wittman Airport. It has been disappointing to see our carrier service decline, but, our airport manager is taking the action necessary to remedy the situation. The travelling public deserves better service than it is getting, and this project will require more attention in 1997.

CONCLUSION

As we face all of these challenges and more to come, we can be optimistic about our current prosperous economy. The economy of Winnebago County is booming!

We have a labor shortage! The most recent labor statistics (November 1996) show Winnebago County with a 2.3% rate of unemployment – it has been <u>under</u> 3% since April – and <u>at</u> 3% in the first three months of 1996.

This is full employment. Our 2.3% rate is better than the State rate of 2.5% and the nation's rate of 5%.

The situation points up the importance of W-2 and Workforce Development in our economy.

As our industry expands and jobs increase – new industry needs a place to locate. Our Industrial Development Board has just completed action on two new loans which will <u>fully</u> use the assets of our County's Industrial Development Loan Fund (\$1,119,550):

(1) Neenah's South Industrial Park Expansion – a \$675,000 loan to acquire 45 acres of additional real estate.

(2) Winneconne – loan of \$59,000 to a manufacturer to expand its present plant.

As I look back with satisfaction on our many accomplishments – and view with pleasure the healthy economy we are blessed with, I can't help but be optimistic at our future.

Occasionally, I like to look at a favorite quotation from Article I, Sec. 22 of our Wisconsin Constitution:

"THE BLESSINGS OF A FREE GOVERNMENT CAN ONLY BE MAINTAINED BY A FIRM ADHERENCE TO JUSTICE, MODERATION, TEMPERANCE, FRUGALITY AND VIRTUE, AND BY FREQUENT RECURRENCE TO FUNDAMENTAL PRINCIPLES."

I have no doubt that if we follow these guidelines, laid down by our State's founders, and continue to look to Divine Providence for guidance – we can face the future with confidence.

Chairman Joseph N. Maehl called the meeting to order at 6:00 P.M. in the Supervisors' Room, Fourth Floor, Courthouse, Oshkosh, Wisconsin.

The meeting was opened with the Pledge of Allegiance and an Invocation by Supervisor Wagner.

Supervisor Planalp moved and it was seconded to adopt the agenda, but to consider Resolution 170-297 prior to 114-1196. CARRIED BY VOICE VOTE.

COMMUNICATIONS, PETITIONS, ETC.

Petition for Zoning Amendment from Bruce Steinacker for change from A-1 to A-2 for a residence, ponds, wetlands and native grass preservation was referred to the Planning & Zoning Committee.

Petition for Zoning Amendment from Stephen and Zaiga Maasen and John and Elizabeth Korger for change from A-2 to R-2 for residential use was referred to the Planning & Zoning Committee.

Petition for Zoning Amendment from Loretta J. Fryman for change

from R-1 to R-3 for two-family dwelling was referred to the Planning & Zoning Committee.

Petition for Zoning Amendment from Jeffrey P. Scherer for change from B-2 to B-3 for repair and sales of motorcycles business was referred to Planning & Zoning Committee.

Letter and resolution from Menasha Water and Light Commission supporting the Winnebago County fiber optics communication network was read and filed.

The East Wisconsin Counties Railroad Consortium Financial Report for 1996 was received and placed on file. A letter from Keith Laux, Program Director of the Community Programs Department supporting Resolution 173-297 - Long Term Care Financing - was read and placed on file. The Moraine Park Technical College advised there are three vacancies on their Board and sent application forms. A letter from the D.N.R. regarding a Spring Hearing and Conservation Congress meeting to be held on April 14, 1997 at 7 P.M. at Oshkosh North High School was read and filed. A letter from the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection regarding State Trunk Highway 110 proposed revisions was read and placed on file. A notice of a meeting sponsored by the Wisconsin Counties Association entitled "Resource Development: An Alternative to Increased Taxation". to be held on March 21, 1997 at Stevens Point was placed on file. A refund from Wisconsin Counties Association of \$50.00 was received for a prior conference.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Supervisor Wagner reported on the cleaning service at the Human Services Building-Oshkosh. This is the third company we have contracted with to clean the building. Iris Ost has given them notice if the cleaning does not improve, the contract will be terminated. New cleaning employees have been assigned to the building. This problem has nothing to do with the County's Maintenance staff. She offered some suggestions for location of the new jail, such as next to the present Safety Building or adding on to the present building. Supervisor Barker reported that she and Pete Van Airsdale, Land & Water Conservation Director, have been appointed to the Fox-Wolf Basin Study Committee by DNR Secretary George Meyer. No other counties have representation on this committee. Supervisor Sundquist reported the Public Safety Building Board and Judiciary and Public Safety Committee accepted the report of the Space Study Committee

and voted to do an engineering study on the present building.

PUBLIC HEARING

James Coughlin, representing the Winneconne Development Corporation, and Robert Haeussinger, Economic Development Coordinator for the Village of Winneconne, spoke in support of Resolution 170-297 - Approve County Industrial Development Project - Provide Loan to Village of Winneconne (\$69,000). Mr. Coughlin explained the loan is for a new company, Historic Floors of Oshkosh, locating in the Winneconne Industrial Park. He thanked the board for naming the new building at Sunnyview in his honor. Walt Chrapla, 721 Mitchell Street, Neenah, WI 54956 spoke on Resolution 155-297 - Appropriate the Sum of \$200,000 to Replace Airport Underground Maintenance Fuel Tanks. Since this is an enterprise fund, he felt any expenses should be paid by the fund. Mr. Orenstein explained that there wasn't enough money in the fund so it was included in the County Executive's Capital Improvements Program. All projects that exceed \$100,000 are in the Capital Improvements Program, even if they are in an enterprise fund. Mr. Chrapla quoted some articles from newspapers of many years ago regarding the Airport. Chairman Maehl stated that the comments by Mr. Chrapla printed in the January 7, 1997 minutes were not true. He stated the Industrial Development Board is a revolving fund that lends money for economic development and does not borrow money.

Ken Stoffel, Department of Community Programs and Lynn Tamms, Department of Social Services, spoke in support of Resolution 173-297 - Ensure County Participating in all Phases of Changing the Long Term Care Financing and Delivery Systems. The proposed changes will affect the elderly, mentally ill, developmentally disabled, chemically dependent. Many questions need to be answered: who is going to be eligible, who is going to control the system, and who is going to pay for it.

RESOLUTION NO. 156-297 — Establish Revised Appointment Procedures for the Position of Chief Deputy Sheriff

WHEREAS, in November of 1962, the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors adopted Resolution No. 22, which created the position of Chief Deputy Sheriff, and which also established certain appointment procedures that have become outdated and inappropriate; and

WHEREAS, with the present vacancy in the position of Chief Deputy Sheriff, the establishment of new appointment and removal policies is warranted and timely; and

WHEREAS, the Personnel and Finance Committee and the Judiciary and Public Safety Committee have investigated various policy options and have selected and endorsed the following appointment and removal policies for the position of Chief Deputy Sheriff:

- A. The duties, minimum qualifications (other than those contained herein) and salary range assignment for the position of Chief Deputy Sheriff shall be determined by the Director of Personnel with the advice and cooperation of the Sheriff, subject to the approval of the County Executive, and shall follow the same practice utilized for other non-represented County positions.
- I. As a minimum qualification, at the time of application, an applicant must have completed at least one year of service in a full-time sworn management position within the Winnebago County Sheriff's Department or a minimum of three years in a full-time sworn management position within another law enforcement agency.
- II. Recruitment may be limited to full-time sworn management personnel of the Sheriff's Department at the discretion of the Sheriff.
- III. The selection of an individual for appointment to the position of Chief Deputy Sheriff shall be made by the Sheriff from among the candidates certified as finalists by the Director of Personnel. Any qualifications disputes shall be reviewed and resolved by the County Executive
- IV. Following the successful completion of a one year probationary period, the person appointed to the position of Chief Deputy Sheriff shall enjoy tenure in the position in the same manner as other County employees covered by the Handbook

of Employment Policies Covering Appointed Non-Represented Employees of Winnebago County.

V. The Sheriff, at his discretion, may designate the Chief Deputy Sheriff as Undersheriff, and is encouraged to do so. In the event that the Sheriff designates a person other than the Chief Deputy Sheriff as Undersheriff, the person so designated shall receive no compensation for serving in such capacity.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors, that the appointment and removal policies for the position of Chief Deputy Sheriff, as set forth herein, be, and hereby are adopted; and

Changes to our juvenile and jail situation are going to be expensive and it's important to keep current on trends regarding these issues.

Chairman Maehl thanked the Post Crescent for their recent editorial on the NACo Conference in Washington, D.C., in which they supported his belief of the importance of attendance at conferences.

Chairman Maehl stated that, "to be smart, you have to be involved." This involvement at conferences gives the Supervisors the knowledge and information they need when they are making important and costly decisions involving tax-payers dollars.

Chairman Maehl then read Supervisor O'Brien's letter in which he supported the supervisors' attendance at the NACo Conference in Washington, D.C, and highlighted various aspects of the conference. Chairman Maehl congratulated Supervisor Crowley on being chosen to receive the "1997 Wisconsin Social Services County Board Member Award". She will be formally recognized at their seminar in Appleton on June 5.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Supervisors Wagner, Rankin, Griesbach, Arne, Crowley, Lauson, Barker and Troxell expressed their satisfaction with and appreciation of attending the NACo Conference in Washington, D.C. The interaction with county supervisors from across the country, federal legislators and government officials gives them the opportunity to learn and share important information. Some of the issues that were addressed at the conference were "Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act (ISTEA)", electric utility deregulation, welfare reform, juvenile justice and delinquency prevention and waste flow control.

Supervisor Schwartz asked if the supervisors that attended the conference could put their reports in writing, making it easier to share the information with others. Supervisor Planalp stated that the "C-Span" television station had very good coverage of the NACo conference.

BLUE RIBBON COMMITTEE FOR THE PREVENTION OF CHILD ABUSE AND NEGLECT

Supervisor Widener introduced Kelly Oppelt, Chairman of the Blue Ribbon Campaign; and Sandy Nadeau, Director of the Exchange Club Center for the Prevention of Child Abuse.

Ms. Nadeau told the Board that in 1979 the Exchange Club changed their focus to child abuse prevention. There are three centers across the state, one in Madison, Milwaukee and Oshkosh. They conduct various programs to teach positive parenting skills. The parentaid program works with parents of children up to the age of five. The parents are matched with volunteers that go into the home and work with the families. There is also a nurturing program that works with the parents of older children.

The "Blue Ribbon Campaign" began in 1989 to make people aware of the importance of our children and the need to protect them. Ms. Nadeau and Oppelt asked that the Supervisors participate by wearing one of their blue ribbons.

ADVOCAP REPORT

Supervisor Wagner introduced Dick Schlimm, Executive Director of Advocap, Inc. Mr. Schlimm told the Board that this is the 25th anniversary of their passage of a resolution establishing the Advocap program in Winnebago County.

Mr. Schlimm explained to the Board that the mission of Advocap is to help people living in poverty by providing meals, finding housing and jobs and helping them upgrade their standard of living.

The Winnebago County Nutrition Program provides hot, nutritious meals to approximately 450 elderly people daily. These meals are served at meal sites and delivered to people who are home bound. Mr. Schlimm explained that the meal sites provide the only social setting that many of these people get to enjoy. There are over 200 volunteers that make this program successful. The County has helped to offset the costs of this program, since federal funding for this program has not increased in the past seven years.

Advocap's employment programs help to place people with disabilities in jobs. There are over 100 people working in over 70 locations through these programs. Some of the people are making up to \$9.00 an hour and some hold down more than one job. Finding employment for people helps to break the cycle of poverty.

Advocap also participates in business development by working with low income people who want to start their own business. Advocap helps them with marketing and business plans, as well as,

financing for their business. Advocap serves as an intermediary lender of the Small Business Administration (SBA), which allows them to loan money from the SBA's funds. They have loaned out more than \$150,000 to help people get started in their own businesses.

Mr. Schlimm told the Board that Advocap also helps with housing for low-income people. They have three crews that do home weatherization and wrap water heaters to reduce energy consumption and lower utility costs. Advocap also works with area banks to help secure mortgage rates and terms that enable low-income people to purchase a home. Over \$7,000,000 in mortgages have been arranged through this program.

Mr. Schlimm thanked the County Board for their support of Advocap and its programs.

HMONG LAO AMERICAN ASSOCIATION REPORT

Supervisor Kollath introduced Ying Lee, President of the Hmong Lao American Association.

Mr. Lee told the Board that this association was organized in 1983 through Advocap, Inc., but is now a separate organization. Their objective is to assist the local Hmong and Laotian community to adapt to society here in the United States. They currently assist 306 families (2000 individuals); 76% of which live in the City of Oshkosh.

Mr. Lee explained that they offer support services to both the elderly and the young. He said that the elderly need special assistance to overcome problems with communication, transportation and isolation. Youth and family assistance involves preventing or reducing truancy and drop outs, gang involvement, early marriages and teenage pregnancy. He also pointed out that the services offered by this organization are available to all refugees and minorities.

This organization is concerned and is monitoring the welfare reform issue and its affects on the Hmong/Laotian community.

One of the changes that is of the most concern is the five-year exemption period for the refugees to receive federal and state assistance. Mr. Lee explained that these changes make it all the more urgent for these immigrants to be given the opportunity to apply for U.S. citizenship.

This organization holds citizenship classes to help the refugees study for their citizenship exam. They are planning a workshop session and will be inviting Sen. Herb Kohl and Dave Hamilton of Madison, to speak on welfare reform.

Mr. Lee thanked the Board for their past assistance and looked for-

ward to working with them in the future.

PARKS PLAN

Supervisor Lauson told the Board that in 1968, \$812,000 was authorized to begin Phases I & II for the development of the Community Park.

In 1985, a park master plan was presented for consideration, but because of the \$2.5 million cost, was never implemented.

Then, in 1996, R.H. Rettler & Associates, Inc., was hired to develop another master plan for the Community Park. This master plan was developed because of the need for improvements to the park. These improvements are needed because of the increasing urban development around the park, the development of the Sunnyview Exposition Center and the Fairgrounds, the changing needs of the park's users, increase in the number of users and an aging infrastructure (plumbing and roads).

Supervisor Lauson introduced Rick Rettler, President of R.H. Rettler & Associates, Inc., and Jeff Bahling, Architect, to the Board. They presented the master plan to the Board and went over the proposed improvements. They told the Board that they had met with the various user groups and organizations to determine their needs; as well as, the City of Oshkosh, Land & Water Conservation Department, DNR, GIS Department and Oshkosh Recreation Department to determine needs, ordinance requirements, zoning regulations, etc.

Phase I of the master plan would include grading for drainage control and development of soccer and other playing fields, developing a new roadway and better traffic circulation, providing domestic water, developing of six soccer fields with 189 car parking areas, taking care of required erosion control measures and establishing turf in all disturbed areas. The estimated cost of completing Phase I is \$1,475,960.00.

Two different plans (Concept Plan I and Concept Plan II) for the layout of the park were presented. Both plans have similarities and their own unique features. Aerial photos and diagrams were used to illustrate these plans.

FINANCIAL, PAYROLL & PURCHASING SOFTWARE UPDATE

Chuck Orenstein, Finance Director, updated the Board on the pro-

posed software package for the Finance, Payroll and Purchasing Departments.

In May, 1995, different software packages were evaluated and 28 vendors were contacted. Twelve vendors responded and four were invited to demonstrate their software. One of the four vendors dropped out; and of the three that were viewed, two were chosen as good candidates. They have selected PeopleSoft, Inc., as the best system and hope to have a resolution to the County Board on March 18 asking for appropriation of funds to purchase this system.

Mr. Orenstein explained that this system is needed because the Data General system we currently have will not be compatible with the year 2000 and would be very costly to have re-written. Projected costs for needed hardware and programming for the Data General would be \$200,000, plus a projected \$42,500 per year maintenance.

The PeopleSoft program will be beneficial because it will be a practically "paperless" system; reduce storage space requirements, eliminate unproductive manual bookkeeping systems and produce timely financial information to all connected departments.

The anticipated costs to implement this program, including the software, hardware, training and other costs, is \$1,350,000. Mr. Orenstein stated that there may be less expensive programs, but they may not have as long a life and be as functional. He also explained that they are still negotiating the price with PeopleSoft, because the County wants to use local consultants instead of the group from California that contracts with PeopleSoft. Using a local consultant would significantly reduce costs.

PUBLIC SAFETY BUILDING REPORT

Supervisor Sundquist presented the recommendations made by the Safety Building Task Force regarding the lack of office and jail space in the Winnebago County City/County Safety Building. These recommendations are made based on interviews with state and local staff and on past and future trends in the criminal justice system of the county.

They recommend that a new law enforcement complex be constructed to house the Sheriff's Department, the jail and hearing rooms. They further recommend that the complex be constructed on county-owned property at the intersection of U.S. Highway 45 and County Road "Y". This location is more centrally located to other areas of the county, it is less congested, allows for future expansion and has com-

patible land uses.

Their recommendations for the existing safety building is to relocate the District Attorney to some of the area now occupied by the Sheriff's Department on the first floor. The Oshkosh Police Department would also expand into the vacated Sheriff's Department space on the first floor and lower level. The city would lease this space from the county for five years. After that, it would be reviewed with the possibility that the County would purchase the city's equity in the building and the Oshkosh Police Department would relocate. The Court Commissioner would expand into the vacated District Attorney's area. The Task Force feels that these changes are only short-term solutions.

The vacated jail space on the second floor could be turned into a shelter care/secure juvenile detention area with office space for Youth Offender Services.

The Task Force also recommends hiring a structural engineer to determine the feasibility of adding another story to or remodeling the building. They also feel that because of the type of construction used to build the Safety Building, the structural engineer can determine which methods of construction would be best to use for remodeling.

Supervisor Schwartz moved and it was seconded to adjourn until March 18, 1997, at 6:00 p.m. CARRIED BY VOICE VOTE. The meeting was adjourned at 10:00 p.m.

ADJOURNED SESSION COUNTY BOARD MEETING

TUESDAY, MARCH 18, 1997

Chairman Joseph N. Maehl called the meeting to order at 6:00 P.M. in the Supervisors' Room, Fourth Floor, Courthouse, Oshkosh, Wisconsin.

The meeting was opened with the Pledge of Allegiance and an Invocation by Supervisor Wagner.

Roll Call: All present except Supervisors Savas and Lawson.

Supervisor Lauson moved and it was seconded to accept the minutes of February 25, 1997. CARRIED BY VOICE VOTE.

Supervisor Planalp moved and it was seconded to approve the agenda, but to consider Resolution 185-397 before Resolution 174-397. CARRIED BY VOICE VOTE.

COMMUNICATIONS, PETITIONS, ETC.

Notice of Claim from Gene A. Coplien regarding damage to vehicle by a Winnebago County Highway Department snowplow was referred to Personnel and Finance Committee. Notice of Claim from Frank McGinnis regarding damage to car due to potholes in road on County Trunk PP in the Town of Menasha was referred to Personnel and Finance Committee. Wisconsin Counties magazine featured a picture of Supervisor Rengstorf and County Board Chairman Joe Maehl,

plus an article on the WCA Environment and Land Use Steering Committee meeting hosted by Supervisor Jim Lauson, and a feature story on Winnebago County: The Arrowhead River, Rat River and Daggets Creek Priority Watershed in its March, 1997 issue. Letter from Senator Robert Welch was read and filed. A thank you letter from Rita Voight was read and filed.

Petition for Zoning Amendment from Kimberly-Clark Corporation for change from R-2 to M-2 was referred to the Planning & Zoning Committee. Petition for Zoning Amendment from Michael A. Haase for change from A-2 to R-1 was referred to the Planning & Zoning Committee. Petition for Zoning Amendment from Duane L. Fox for zoning change from wetlands to M-1 Light Industrial was referred to the Planning & Zoning Committee. Petition for Zoning Amendment from Orrin Prindle for zoning change from A-2 General Farming to R-2 Suburban Residential was referred to the Planning & Zoning Committee.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Supervisor Sundquist expressed his sorrow on the death of Warren Basler in a recent plane crash. Supervisor Arne expressed his sympathy to the families of the other three men who also lost their lives in the plane crash.

Supervisor Wagner stated the Property Management and Maintenance Committee toured the new construction of the Science Building at UW-Fox Valley Center. The Planetarium will be completed later and fund-raising efforts are underway. Chairs in the Planetarium are being offered to donors at \$1,000 each, and stars are \$25.00 each. School children will be attending Space Camp Classes and there are plans for a major Science Fair. Over \$1,000,000 in private funds have been raised for the Planetarium.

Supervisor Arne suggested that County Government Week be proclaimed from April 13-19, 1997 in accordance with a national effort to make citizens aware of what counties do. He stated something could be planned for the April 15, 1997 County Board meeting along those lines. Chairman Maehl said the County Speaker's Bureau will arrange for speakers for any group, large or small, to talk about county government.

Supervisor Robl gave an update on the Westside Arterial, County Road A and County Road Y. They opened the bids on the paving project from Highway 150 to County Road BB and the costs will be \$2,700,000 which will need to be bonded. In 1998, paving in the Town of Neenah will be \$900,000, with \$200,000 being paid from CHIP funds. In 1998, \$1,800,000 will be received in Federal STP funds from the Town of Neenah, but the County will have to expend \$800,000. He estimates it will cost over \$4-5 million dollars to finish the Westside Arterial.

Supervisor Robl stated the statement of qualifications for design work for County Road A will be received by March 20. They are proposing a 4-lane road from AA to Y. The design north of Y will include a study and recommendation for either a 2-lane or 4- lane road, depending on the needs, with an adjacent bike and pedestrian trail to Neenah. The study will be performed with input from East Central Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission, Winnebago County Parks Department, and the cities of Neenah and Oshkosh. The study is estimated to cost \$180,000. The cost of upgrading County Road AA to Y is \$2,400,000, of which \$1,000,000 will be bonded.

Supervisor Rankin inquired about a bike trail on County Road CB and Supervisor Robl stated the Town of Menasha is considering a bike trail. Supervisor Finch stated there will be a referendum question on a bike trail on the April 1st ballot in the Town of Menasha.

Supervisor Barker stated the Fox-Wolf Basin Study Team met and will focus on non-point pollution. The DNR will report to this committee and will work closely with them.

PUBLIC HEARING

Carol Zeinert, Chairman of the Town of Winchester, spoke in support of Amendatory Ordinance 3-01-97. Mick Salm, Chairman of the Town of Clayton, objected to Amendatory Ordinance 3-04-97 and would like to see this done at the town level. He spoke in support of Amendatory Ordinance 3-01-97. Mike Schwartzbauer spoke in support of Amendatory Ordinance 3-01-97. He and his wife want to build a home there, and possibly have a stable for horses. The land is high in front and goes down to wetlands in the back. They may raise pheasants also. Discussion held on land in Farmland Preservation being changed to A-2, General Farming District. Supervisor Schaidler explained the parcel is not in a transition zone for conversion from farmland. He said if they purchased 35 acres, they would not have to go through the zoning change.

Lee Vanden Heuvel of St. Raphael's Catholic Church, spoke in support of Resolution 185-397 - Authorize Rental of 229

Northwestern Avenue, Oshkosh to St. Raphael's Catholic Church. He stated the church will make the improvements that need to be made to bring it up to code. The church will sub-let the house to the Kurdish family. Rental insurance will be carried, as well as liability. The family arrived today, so they would like the lease signed as soon as possible. Jim Carpenter of Shelter Now spoke in support of Resolution 185-397. He stated the Kurdish children will be attending local schools and will be supervised after school. He said 50 individuals are expected to come. They will be eligible for Social Services benefits. The people are very employable. This is the only site in Wisconsin where these people are being settled. The renters will pay the utilities for the house.

Al Broullire urged people to vote on election day because if they don't vote, they have nothing to say.

Al Wenig, Recreation Director for the Oshkosh School District, spoke in support of Resolution 183-397 - Approve Winnebago County Park Master Plan. Tom Widzinski, President of Oshkosh Youth Soccer Club and representative of the Oshkosh United Soccer Club, spoke in support of Resolution 183-397. He stated they have worked with the county for the past 14 years to develop quality soccer fields. They have donated over \$85,500 and 3,375 hours of volunteer labor to upgrade the facilities. The Oshkosh Youth Soccer Club pledges to erect goal posts on all future fields for a cost of \$9,500 and 700 volunteer hours of labor. Oshkosh United Soccer Club pledges to purchase nets for each of the new fields for \$1,400, plus \$1,000 per year for 5 years to be used towards the planting of trees for the beautification of the soccer complex.

Dee Durkee, 1416 Beech Street, Oshkosh, WI, spoke in support of the religious group in the Town of Nepeuskun getting approval for a cemetery.

COUNTY EXECUTIVE'S REPORT

County Executive Steinhilber was saddened at the passing of Warren Basler, the fixed base operator at Wittman Field for the past 30 years. He expressed his deepest sympathy to Warren's wife. He encouraged supervisors to view the painting in Circuit Court Branch I of the trial of Chief Oshkosh. It was donated to the county by former County Supervisor Virginia Nolan.

Park View Health Center contracted out for custodial services at a savings of \$63,000. There will be no layoffs, but four vacant custodi-

al positions were not filled.

He supports Resolution 182-397 - Appropriate the sum of \$918,000 to the Business Applications Capital Project Fund and authorize the County Executive and County Clerk to enter into a contract with PeopleSoft, Inc. for the purchase of business applications software and related items. Proposals went out to 28 companies and 12 responded. It was narrowed to 4, and the recommendation for PeopleSoft was made. Implementation costs were high. A consultant was hired to assist in who to implement the system. This is a necessity and will take two years to implement.

He supports Resolution 183-397 - Approve Winnebago County Park Master Plan. He feels the park is somewhat underdeveloped, but it could be used by more people.

He supports Resolution 187-397 - Dedication of 60' Right-of- Way for Extension of Mason Street and feels this should increase the value of the county's property.

He gave the following report:

This is my final formal Board meeting — as County Executive. Where has the time gone? It seems like "only yesterday" that you and I began working toward some important goals...

- * Renovate our physical plant
- * Improve County services
- * Stop increasing taxes

The past 4 years have passed all too quickly.

They have been productive years. The problems we faced together 4 years ago have been largely resolved.

We have successfully tackled the problem of jail overcrowding with the new Huber Work Release Center which now houses nearly 100. Unfortunately, the number of <u>other</u> inmates at the jail <u>doubled</u> in the last 2 years — and now we are revisiting the jail issue.

The juvenile detention problem was resolved by an extended agreement with our neighbor, Outagamie County — an agreement that works well, and continues through 1999. But, youthful criminal activity requires new and diversified attention, and we are addressing it with a comprehensive approach outlined in the Chinn Report. One step forward was taken by our judiciary in agreeing to have the same judge handle cases of repeated offenses by a particular juvenile.

We completed a new Human Services building in Neenah and created a new home for our Human Services departments in Oshkosh at the former WNL building.

We converted the former Social Services building to our Orrin King Administrative Building.

We took the Highway building off the back burner and pushed it to completion.

We completed several Courthouse renovations to provide facilities and space for several basic offices, and that effort continues.

We completed the Recycling Facility and then enlarged it to increase its capacity.

We enlarged our new Exposition building at the fairgrounds with two added wings.

We are nearing completion of the West Side Arterial — a costly project, but one which will greatly help the flow of people and products in the northern part of the county — and a large part of this highway will open later this year!

The past few years aren't just about buildings and construction.

We entered into a long term lease with EAA which greatly improves County revenues — and we are continuing an airport Master Plan which will assure orderly public and private development of Wittman Field and its environs. The EAA lease and the Master Plan will insure continuity well into the next century.

On the drawing boards <u>now</u>, we have the James Coughlin Center - with construction about to begin — which will house all of our agricultural, recreational and environmental agencies — and someday, we hope, the DNR headquarters.

We are in the process of updating our County's information network. Our new fiber optics project will link together many public agencies throughout the county. And even now, our municipal fire and police agencies are working on a system to share information with neighboring communities throughout the Fox Valley.

As I have said before, Winnebago County has some challenges ahead — but with foresight and prudence in establishing priorities, they can be resolved so that the taxpayer is not crushed in the process.

Four years ago, I quoted Nobel Laureate, Economist Milton Friedman, to the effect that government spends 43% of the national income. When we realize that over 40% of the average taxpayer's income is spent on government — federal, state and local — we know how far America has traveled down the road to a different kind of society.

We have heard many sympathetic words about the tax burdens on the people — but little is actually done. People become cynical when words don't match deeds.

Well, we have matched words with deeds. <u>Four</u> budgets have been submitted to you with tax rate reductions — even with a major capital improvement program underway. We have taken some small steps to reducing that property tax burden. I hope you, in cooperation with my successor, whoever she may be, will continue in that effort!

Among the challenges ahead are the implementation of W-2 — but we have already taken great strides in reducing the welfare caseload — for example, in just one year — from 840 AFDC cases in January 1996 to 486 cases in January 1997.

As mentioned, the jail issue has reappeared — and alternative solutions are now being examined. There is always the danger of overreacting to statistics. For common sense solutions, a long-term perspective must be kept. As we all know, "the politician thinks of the next election, but the statesman thinks of the next generation."

There is good news on the juvenile justice front. Juvenile crime is going down — and we have had several months of lower juvenile detention statistics. So the sky isn't falling, and we must be doing something right. But of course, we must strive to do better.

I face retirement with mixed feelings. I have found these past 4 years exhilarating and I hope you have, too.

We've been through a lot — good times, tough times — but I think you will agree with me — we have accomplished much.

Let me leave with words that express my philosophy of government — and I hope it's yours, too:

"...a wise and frugal government, which shall restrain men from injuring one another, which shall leave them otherwise free to regulate their own pursuits of industry and improvement, and shall not take from the mouth of labor the bread it has earned. This is the sum of good government...." (Thomas Jefferson's First Inaugural Address-March 4, 1801).

Let's continue to promote that kind of government in Winnebago County!

- (a) Unless otherwise noted in Table 1, or an applicable Town Ordinance, all newly created lots shall have a minimum frontage of 33 feet on a public street, and where applicable, a minimum frontage of 33 feet on navigable water.
- (b) A CSM or Plat creating a new parcel without frontage on a

public street shall contain one or more of the following statements applicable:

- 1. Areas under County Zoning Jurisdiction: Applications for County zoning permits for residential structures (principal or accessory) and all other principal structures, except agricultural, shall not be considered for approval until the parcel meets the public street frontage and lot width requirements of the applicable non-agricultural zoning district (as noted in Table 1).
- 2. Areas under Town Zoning Jurisdiction:
 - a. Applications for County sanitary permits shall not be considered for approval until the parcel has a minimum of 33 feet of frontage on a public street.
 - b. Provision for a proposed CSM or plat for a parcel containing a valid sanitary permit: A parcel containing a valid sanitary permit shall not be further subdivided unless the newly created parcels maintain or create a minimum of 33' of frontage on a public street for the area containing the sanitary permit.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED by the County Board of Supervisors of the County of Winnebago as follows:

That Chapter 18 Table 1 of the General Code of Winnebago County be amended to read as follows:

Note 6: residential property within the Air-1 district requires a minimum of five (5) acres for new lot creations.

Note 10: A-1 & A-2 parcels >/= 5 acres are farm parcels.

A-1 & A-2 parcels </=5 acres are residential parcels.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED by the County Board of Supervisors of the County of Winnebago that Chapter 18 Table 1 of the General Code of Winnebago County be amended to read as follows:
