Motion by Supervisor Parker that the rules be suspended and that the Clerk cast the unanimous ballot of the Board for Geo. A. Loescher. Car-The ballot was cast and Geo. A. Loescher declared elected.

Mr. Loescher, in a few well chosen remarks upon taking the chair, thanked the members of the Board for the honor bestowed.

ELECTION OF VICE CHAIRMAN.

Supervisor Jourdain moved that the rules be suspended and that the Clerk cast the unanimous ballot of the Board for M. F. White, after which

Mr. White declined to accept the nomination,

Supervisor Shrage moved that the rules be suspended and that the Clerk cast the unanimous ballot of the Board for Ira Parker. Motion carried. The ballot was cast and Ira Parker was declared elected Vice Chair-

RULES.

Supervisor Parker moved that the rules of the last Supervisor Year be adopted for the year 1922. Motion carried.

RULES OF BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF WINNEBAGO COUNTY. Adopted June 9, 1922,

The meetings of this Board shall be held in the Supervisor's Room.

and the hour for daily meetings shall be 10 a. m.

And the County Board shall continue in continuous session from day to day until adjourned, unless to a day certain or sine die.

II. At the first meeting of the Board it shall be the duty of the Chairman, or in the case of his absence the Vice Chairman, or in their absence, the Clerk, to call to order.

The Clerk shall then call the roll of members.

A quorum being present, the Board shall proceed to the election of a Chairman and Vice Chairman.

(Amended to provide for Vice Chairman as authorized by Ch. 110. of 1903.)

III. It shall be the duty of the Chairman to appoint the following standing committees, each to consist of the number of members as set after

the name of each committee, viz:

Equalization, 9; Finance, 8; General Accounts, 7; Illegal Assessments, 5; Justices and Constables' Accounts, 7; Sheriff's and Coroner's Accounts, 7; Insane, 3; Poor and Poor Farm, 3; Workhouse, 3; Corporations, 3; Public Buildings, 5; Roads and Bridges, 5; Per Diem and Mileage, 5; Printing, 3; Bonds and Salaries, 5; County Abstract and Tract Index System, 3; Rules, 3; Education, 3; Sanatorium, 5.

IV. The Board may adjourn for such time as shall be necessary for the Chairman to prepare the list of committees and no business can be done until

the same shall be announced.

V. The Chairman, or in his absence, the Vice Chairman, shall take the chair at the hour to which the Board may from time to time stand adjourned, call the Board to order and direct the calling of the roll of members by the Clerk.

VI. Upon the appearance of a quorum, the journal of the preceding day shall be read by the Clerk, and any mistake therein shall be corrected by the Board; provided, that upon the last day of the session the journal for that day will be read and, before the final adjournment, corrected.

After the reading and correction of the journal, the order of business shall be as follows:

Reception of Petitions, Memorials, Accounts, etc.

Presentation of Resolutions and disposition of same.

Reports of Standing Committees.
Reports of Select Committees.
Consideration of Miscellaneous Business.

VIII. The Chairman shall preserve order and decide questions of order. subject to an appeal to the Board; and shall clearly and distinctly state every motion or question before debate.

IX. The Chairman shall be entitled to vote on all questions taken by aves and noes, and his name shall be called last; when the vote on any ques-

tion is a tie, it shall be deemed to have been lost.

X. Every motion or amendment shall be reduced to writing when a request therefor shall be made by any member; and all petitions, memorials and substitutes shall be reduced to writing and read before they shall be

considered by the Board.

XI. Every written resolution shall have attached thereto the name of the person introducing it; and when referred to a committee, the names of such committees shall be endorsed thereon.

Every member, previous to speaking, shall rise and address the Chair.

When two or more members rise at once, the Chair shall designate the member who is to speak first; but in all cases the member who shall first rise and address the Chair shall speak first.

XIV. No member shall speak more than twice upon the same question without leave; and when called to order by the Chairman shall take his seat,

and shall not be allowed to proceed without leave of the Board.

XV. A vote on any question shall be taken by ayes and nays when called for by any member; and SHALL be so taken on all questions involving the expenditure of money; and whenever a vote is so ordered and taken, the members voting in the affirmative and negative, as well as those absent or not voting, shall be recorded at length in the records of the proceedings of the County Board.

(Amended to conform to Sec. 709, Stat. of 1898.)

XVI. No account or claim against the county shall be audited unless it be made out in items and duly verified and be filed with the Clerk of the Board, except as otherwise provided by law.

XVII. When a motion is under consideration, no motion shall be enter-

tained except:

To adjourn, 1.

To lay on the table.

3. For the previous question.

- To postpone to a day certain.
- To commit to a committee.

To amend or to substitute.

To postpone indefinitely.

These several motions shall take precedence in the order in which they stand in this rule.

XVIII. A motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, and for the previous question, shall be decided without debate, except as hereinafter provided.

XIX. A motion to postpone indefinitely or to a day certain or to commit shall not be again entertained on the same day or in the same stage of the proposition.

XX. A substitute shall be open to amendment the same as the original proposition; but when adopted, shall not be subject to amendment. If an amendment or substitute is lost, another substantially the same shall not be entertained.

XXI. When a motion or question has once been determined, any member voting with the majority may move a reconsideration of the vote, but such motion shall be made and acted on at the same or next succeeding meeting, and shall not thereafter be made except by unanimous consent.

XXII. The previous question may be moved by any member, and the Chairman shall then say: "It requiring five members to second this motion, those in favor of pastivity and the same of the company of the those in favor of sustaining the motion will rise." If five or more members then rise, the previous question shall thereby be seconded and an opportunity then be given to any two members opposed thereto to briefly state their objections. The question shall then be: "Shall the question be now put?" which, if carried by a vote of two-thirds of the members present upon a call of the ayes and nays, the Board shall immediately proceed to vote upon the pending amendment, if any, and upon the main question.

XXIII. In filling blanks, the largest sum and the longest time shall be

XXIV. These rules shall not be changed, amended or repealed, unless the proposition or amendment is introduced in writing and the same laid over to some subsequent meeting of the Board, not less than five days intervening, and then only with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members

XXV. Any of these rules may be suspended upon any pending measure

by unanimous consent or by two-thirds of the members present.

XXVI. These rules and all amendments or additions thereto which may hereafter be made shall govern the Board until altered or repealed, as herein provided.

XXVII. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in "Jefferson's manual," so far as they remain in common use and are practicable and applicable and not inconsistent herewith, shall govern the Board.

XXVIII. Whenever the Board shall have gone into a committee of the whole and shall have arisen, the Board shall at once be in session for the receiving and acting upon the report of the committee of the whole, and for the transaction of any and all other business of every kind.

XXIX. No resolution for the appropriation for money shall be in order until the day after its presentation and reference, except upon the consent of two-thirds of the members of the County Board present.

Supervisor Parker moved that a recess of thirty minutes be taken to give the Chairman time to select the standing committees. Motion carried.

REPORT ON JOINT OWNERSHIP OF THE COUNTY SANATORIUM OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE.

Chairman Loescher offered the following report, No. 1: To the County Board of Winnebago County, Wisconsin.

Gentlemen: Your committee, who was appointed to investigate the matter of the joint ownership and operation of a Tri-County Tuberculosis Sanatorium by the counties of Fond du Lac, Waushara and Winnebago, beg leave to report as follows:

We report that various meetings of committees representing the three

counties interested have been held and the matter of a tri-county institution has been carefully investigated and gone into and the following information

obtained and the following conclusions arrived at:

1. The County of Winnebago is the owner of its tuberculosis sanatorium, known as Sunnyview Sanatorium, located approximately three and one-half miles north of the City of Oshkosh and approximately three-fourths of a mile from the Soo Line and Northwestern Line stations at Winnebago. This institution has been built by Winnebago County at a cost of \$122,138.55, and should be valued for the purpose of joint ownership and operation by the interested counties at \$100,000.00.

 That the present assessed valuation of the three counties interested is as follows: Fond du Lac County, \$103,271,789.00; Winnebago County, \$102. 104,204.00, and Waushara County, \$24,145,057.00; and it is the sense of your committee that as a basis of purchase of said property the percentages of value for the three counties should be as follows Fond du Lac County, 45%,

Winnebago County, 44% and Waushara County, 11%

We report further that there is land available for purchase for the use of said sanatorium for building additional buildings, owned by Winnebago County, which, if located north, west or south of said institution, can be purchased for \$200.00 per acre, and if located east of said institution for \$300.00 an acree, from Winnebago County. We report further that there is need at said institution for the erection of a building to be used as a nurses home, and that there is available for said purpose the sum of \$25,000, which Winnebago County may use for constructing such a building, and that the same should be built by Winnebago County and maintained by the counties interested, and that Winnebago County is willing to construct such building.

4. We report further than in case of the purchase of an interest in said Sunnyview Sanatorium by Fond du Lac County and Waushara County, that payments therefor be made in five equal installments, the first payment to be made April 1, 1923, and succeeding payments to be made annually thereafter with interest at 5% per annum after July 1, 1922, on all unpaid sums

of the purchase price.

That upon the operation of said institution by the three counties, the state shall pay in accordance with the state law, \$7.00 per week. The balance of the per capita cost for indigent patients shall be borne by the counties from which such patients come, provided that not less than \$14.00 per week shall be charged for each patient per week; that the matter of maintaining the institution shall follow the provisions of Section 46.20-6 b of the Wisconsin Statutes.

6. That the management of said sanatorium should be in the hands of three trustees, one from each county, chosen as provided in Section 46.20-4

of the statutes.

7. That the general operation, maintenance and supervision of the said institution is governed by and provided for in Section 46.20 of the statutes

We recommend and report that in our opinion the proposed plan is feasible and desirable and should be entered into by the three counties interested at the earliest possible date.

We further recommend the adoption of this report and the passage of the attached resolution.

RESOLUTION FOR THE JOINT OWNERSHIP OF THE COUNTY SANATORIUM.

Chairman Loescher offered the following resolution, No. 5: Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin: 1. That the County of Winnebago enter into an agreement with the Counties of Fond du Lac and Waushara, for the joint ownership, operation and management of the Sunnyview Sanatorium now owned and operated by Winnebago County, Wisconsin; that said property be purchased and owned by the Counties of Winnebago, Fond du Lac and Waushara in proportion of 44%, 45% and 11% respectively, said purchase to include the lands, premises and equipment now owned by Winnebago County and used for such sanatorium, including water system and readway now used over lands of Winnebago County, together with a permanent easement for the same over the lands of Winnebago County for the use of said tri-county sanatorium; the said property to be valued at \$100,000.00 for the purpose of this agree--

ment, purchase and ownership; such transfer, however, not to include any building that Winnebago County may have or build as a nurses' home with the Hicks Memorial Fund or any other fund of said county, the title to which home shall remain in Winnebago County, the same including building and premises to be used in connection with Sunnyview Sanitorium and to be maintained by the counties interested in the same manner as the sanatorium; and the County of Winnebago shall furnish proper deed and abstract of title and proper description of the lands and property conveyed based up on the survey to be made by them for such purposes.

2. That payment for said property by the counties of Fond du Lac and Waushara shall be made in five equal installments, the first payment to be made April 1, 1923, and succeeding payments to be made annually thereafter with interest at 5 percent per annum on all unpaid portions of the pur-

chase price after July 1, 1922.

3. That the management of said sanatorium shall be in the hands of three trustees, one from each county, chosen as provided in Section 46.20-4 of the Statutes. The trustee chosen from Waushara County to hold his office for the term of one year, the trustee from Winnebago County to hold his office for the term of two years, and the trustee from Fond du Lac County to hold his office for the term of three years, all according to law, and such trustees to receive as compensation the sum of \$5.00 per day and their actual expenses.

4. That said institution shall be operated by the three counties through the said three trustees; that the cost of maintenance charged for the patient per week shall not be less than \$14.00; that patients financially able to pay shall be charged the actual per capita cost of maintenance and in no case less than \$14.00 per week per patient; that the State of Wisconsin shall pay \$7.00 per week toward the maintenance of indigent patients and the balance of the per capita cost for such patients shall be paid by the respective counties from which they come, in accordance with the statutes in such case made and provided.

That upon the acquisition of said institution and lands the same shall be operated, maintained and supervised as provided in Section 46.20 of

the Statutes of the State of Wisconsin.

6. That the Chairman of the County Board and the County Clerk of this county be and they are hereby authorized and directed to carry out the provisions of this resolution and to execute and deliver and receive all papers necessary and proper for carrying the same into effect.

We report that the salary of the County Judge has been fixed for a term which does not expire for four years and cannot be changed at this time: that the salary of the Municipal Judge has likewise been fixed for his present term and cannot be changed at this time, and the salary of the Clerk of the Municipal Court likewise cannot be changed: that the salary of the Superintendent of Schools can be changed only at the last annual meeting preceding the spring election and cannot be changed at this time; that the salary of the Agricultural Agent has been fixed for two years and cannot be changed; that the register of Probate is under contract to do certain work for the County at \$2,400 a year; that to change his salary would result in a breach of contract between him and the County and would leave him free to charge the sum of \$10.00 a day for Court reporting, which, in our opinion, would tend to increase his salary rather than lower it, and we therefore recommend that it be not changed.

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Many Improvements.

Nearly all the schools have now discarded the wood or plaster black-boards and replaced them with slate. Many old seats and desks which caused little children to sit with their feet dangling in the air and to write on surfaces which had been carved by many a jack-knife have been replaced by new single steel adjustable seats and desks, adjusted for the comfort of each child. Many outbuildings have been repaired and placed in a sanitary condition. The lighting and heating of a number of schools have been greatly improved. Playground equipment has been supplied so that now there are few schools without some such apparatus. Supplementary readers, history texts, and reference books have been supplied as well.

New Nekimi School.

In the town of Nekimi one of the most modern rural school buildings in the state of Wisconsin is being erected. It is supplied with lighting from the left and rear of the pupils, plenty of blackboard space, an excellent heating and ventilating system, indoor chemical closets, a light, airy basement, where community socials and gatherings may be held, a library, teacher's closet, dinner pail and rubber closets set into the walls, and a number of other desirable features. It would be difficult to imagine a one room school that would be better planned or more modern.

One Room Schools Are a Poor Investment.

In spite of the improvements that have been made in the one room rural schools the form of their organization makes it impossible for them to equal the work being done in the graded schools of the villages and cities. Here the teachers, instead of having eight grades and class periods of only ten or fifteen minutes, have but one or two grades and class periods several times as long. During the past few years there has been developing a feeling of dissatisfaction with what rural schools can offer in the way of an education and a feeling that just because a child lives in the country he should not be condemned to a poor school. From all parts of the county questions have come as to the consolidation of schools, how it is carried out, what difficulties are to be overcome, and whether or not the cost of such schools is excessive.

Elk Mound Consolidated School.

Last spring the farmers of the one town raised money to send several of their number to visit a consolidated school at Elk Mound, near St. Paul. The men went with the idea of finding out not only the desirable, but any possible undesirable facts about the consolidated school. They rode out in the busses on the transportation routes, talked with the parents of children living near the ends of the routes as well as those living near the school, visited the classes in the grades as well as in the high school, and talked with the officers of the consolidated school district. The class work being done was excellent. The people of the district and the school officers, after having their consolidated school in operation for two years, seemed to be almost unanimous in their belief that the consolidated school was a great improvement over the rural schools, that the cost was not unreasonable and that the children were getting much more out of their school work than would have been possible with the former one room schools.

Attendance.

In this district where the snow was very deep last winter, particularly in February, the attendance record of the children in the consolidated school was over 95% while at nine one room rural schools near the consolidated school the attendance fell to between 40% and 60%, several schools being closed entirely for two or three weeks. During the entire time each of the seven busses made its trip on time without injury or hardship to any of the children. It is a peculiar fact that while some people who are unacquainted with transportation fear it a great deal, yet those who are sending their children to school in this way are most decided in their approval of the plan.

Cost of a Consolidated School for Nekimi.

Last spring in response to a number of requests from residents of the town of Nekimi, figures were collected as to the cost of the present one room schools and careful estimates were made with the aid of the State Department of Education of the cost of a consolidated school with a high school and transportation.

It was found that the present one room schools were costing the town on an average of 3.4 mills. A careful estimate of the cost of a consolidated school showed that the maintenance would cost 3.9 mills, or an increase of ½ mill, that the cost of building would be 1.6 mills for a period

of fifteen years, making a total cost during that time of 5.5 mills, or \$55 on a farm valued at \$10,000.

Reason for Low Cost.

The reason for this low cost is the fact that the state offers considerable aid to a consolidated school. There would also be the amounts at present raised for the payment of high school tuition to the cities. The income from these sources cut down the cost of a consolidated school materially and makes it possible for a group of eight or ten rural schools to join in a consolidated school at a cost that is not unreasonably high and in fact but little above the cost of the present one room schools.

High School Students.

Between eighty and ninety percent of the graduates of rural schools of this county are attending high schools, all of which are located in the villages or cities. It is necessary for some of the pupils to drive long distances or to room and board in town. It is decidedly unfortunate for parents to have to send boys and girls away from home influences just when they are awakening to the greater facts of life. In some cases it has meant the development of wrong interests and points of view. At best it

has tended to make them out of sympathy with rural life.

Advantages of a Rural High School

A rural high school would be within easy distance from each home in the town, would enable the pupils to be at home under the best of influences: would not deprive the home of their assistance and would provide courses of study specially adapted to their needs. When the city high schools refuse to admit pupils from rural districts, which is likely to happen sooner than we imagine, unless some rural high schools are being provided the situation will be serious. For all of the above reasons it is essential that the various towns begin to look into this matter before it is too late.

Present School Organization Unfair.

For many years people who have given any study to the question of financial support of rural schools have felt that the present system of local support is imperfect and unsatisfactory. The reason for this feeling is because the school districts vary so greatly in size and valuation. In one district there may be a relatively high tax and yet a poor school, while in the next district there may be a low school tax, but an excellent school because of the difference in valuation. These contrasts are not uncommon and mean that the child who happens to live in a relatively small or poor district has not the educational opportunity he would have in an adjoining school district.

The Rights of the Children.

Children are citizens of the state, not of the school district, town or county, and as citizens of the state they all have a moral right to the same educational opportunity. No school district has a right to condemn a child to a meager education, though this is sometimes the result because of limited financial resources. Education is a function of the state; it is not a local matter like whether there shall be lamp posts or a wider street. It is the business of the state to see that every child has a fair and equal opportunity for a good education.

Education Nt An Individual Matter.

Years ago it was thought that education was for the advantage of the individual rather than a national necessity. It was considered an accomplishment which few could afford. This idea has long been discredited. Today we recognize education as not only a necessity for each child but also for the perpetuation of our form of government. In spite of this fact, however, children do not have the same educational advantages in the school districts of any county of the state. The reason why California has good schools not only in the valleys and near the cities, but in the mountains and on the edge of the desert is because the schools are supported largely by state tax.

Great Difference in Valuations.

In some rural districts there is not enough property behind each child to run a decent school. In such communities the buildings are shameful to see, the school officers are almost compelled to seek the cheaper teachers, to get along with the poorest equipment, and in every possible way to keep down the cost of the schools. While there are few extreme cases of this kind in Winnebago County, yet there is a great deal of inequality in the valuations of the various school districts. The cities abandoned the idea of separate districts years ago, Appleton being the only city in the state that still has the old form of organization.

Too Many School Officers.

Another reason why many small districts are at a disadvantage is because of the great number of school officers they make necessary. Winnebago County, with about 100 teachers, has about 300 school officers. If Oshkosh were organized on the same plan instead of seven school officers it would have 600 and Milwaukee would have 7500 instead of five. It is a tremendous waste of time, energy, and money to have a fully organized school board for every school. The frequent change of school officers makes it necessary to educating new officers to an appreciation of the necessities of a good school. This takes time and means that such schools are apt to be more or less inefficient in the meantime. There is a growing conviction that the county is a nore suitable unit for taxation and administration,, even for the present one room rural schools. This would mean an equalization of taxaton between the various districts, but still more important, that every child in the county would have the opportunity to attend an equally good school.

Larger State and County Tax.

Economists who have given the question a great real of study believe that a state tax supplemented by a county tax should provide for much the greater share of the cost of the schools. They believe that it will never be possible to equalize the burdens nor the educational opportunities under the present form of district organization. Of course, no system of taxation alone, will solve the problem because under all forms of organized taxation the people are the final source of power, as they should be, but a larger county tax supplemented by a larger state tax and a corresponding decrease in the local tax would without question be fairer to taxpayers and more important still, t othe children for whom the schools are provided.

Some school districts provide a good school, a capable teacher, sufficient equipment, and then allow the children to be irregular in their attendance or to remain out of school for trivial reasons. Such a policy makes the school a very poor investment because the district is securing about one-fourth or one-third less training than the school should give.

Imagine a class of five pupils. Two of them stay out for a couple of weeks and then return. Before the teacher can get them up to grade, one or two others drop out for a few days, or a week or two. About the time they return, possibly the remaining child is absent. The result is that any child in the class that does remain in school is discouraged because it is necessary for the teacher to continually be going back over the old work so that those who have been absent can catch up. Little wonder that such a class fails to make much progress and at the end of the year has completed much less than a class where the children have been regular in at tendance throughout the year.

Illiteracy. The records of the bureau of education show that there are seven million illiterate people in the United States, that is, people over ten years In Germany there is of age who cannot read nor write in any language. less than one illiterate in every ten thousand of the population because in that country as well as in many other European countries parents are severely punished for failure to keep their children in school. In Winne bago County the yearly loss from absence runs up to thousands of dollars, a great deal of which could be avoided if all parents would co-operate with the schools in keeping children regular in their attendance. Some of the older children who now dislike school and would prefer to be at work, if kept in school by the foresight of their parents will in years to come thank their parents for their greater wisdom. Parents should realize that children are not capable of judging for themselves. Most parents desire to leave a good heritage to their children. Nothing in the way of farms and stock will ever take the place of a good education. This is a heritage which no matter what disaster may come can never be lost. For this reason parents should make every effort to keep their children regularly in school.

Parents Do Not Visit Schools Enough.

Many parents have not been in school during the time for regular work since they left the school as pupils. All of their information about the school is second hand and therefore unreliable. This condition should not exist because the schools belong to the people. They will be just as good as the parents desire or just as poor as they will tolerate.

Series of Health Talks.

During the past few years epidemics of contagious disease have spread over various school districts with alarming rapidity. In some cases they

have seemed to break out spontaneously in various sections. Last summer the State Board of Health offered to send a physician to discuss the prevention and control of contagious disease. We accordingly arranged for a week's series of talks on health by Dr. V. A. Gudex, starting Monday, October 9th. Dr. Gudex gave five talks in rural schools each day and one each evening to groups from several schools. He discussed the various so-called common diseases, outlined their symptoms and the methods of prevention. His talks were well received and I have no doubt but what they will help to improve the health situation during the coming year.

Warm School Lunches.

For a number of years we have been encouraging the idea of having a hot dish prepared at each rural school at noon, to be eaten in connection with the regular lunch brought from home. Cocoa, soup, rice, creamed potatoes, and various other warm dishes have been prepared in about one-third of the schools during the past year or two. By carefully organizing the work the teachers have been able to provide this warm dish without hardship to pupils or themselves. No argument is necessary to convince anyone who has had occasion to eat cold lunches that a warm dish is decidedly worth while and that school children who have this advantage are undoubtedly much better able to do their school work. About thirty-five or forty of the teachers have each year carried on these lunches without additional pay from the district, but because they believed it was worth while. As soon as the parents of the children in the fifty or sixty schools not having these lunches realize their value to the children they will demand that when the teacher is engaged there be an understanding that this work shall be carried on.

County Nurse.

The work of the nurses in Winnebago County has, as a whole, been productive of valuable results. They have found many children with physical defects which have been reported to the parents. We have been pleased at the large number of cases in which the parents have had these defects remedied. In many cases if no medical attention had been given these defects would have developed seriously and have rendered the children much less capable physically than would otherwise have been the case. Miss Wenonah Winsey, the present nurse, has visited nearly half of the schools already this year and is getting splendid results in her work.

Co-operation of Parents.

Regardless of how effective the work of the county nurse and teachers may be to keep the children in good health so that they are able to do their school work effectively, this will not be possible without the assistance of the parents. There is little use of sending a child to school whose eye-sight is so poor that he cannot see the blackboard or who is so undernourished that he hasn't the energy to study. The schools have a right to demand that children shall be put to bed at 8 o'clock at night so that they will not be coming to school sleepy the next day and with their nervous systems in such condition that they cannot work and that they shall be gotten up in the morning in time so that they can have their breakfasts before coming to school. On the other hand, the schools have no right to injure the health of the children, to make them bent backed by poor seats and desks, or to subject them to dust, dirt, lack of air, and light, to such an extent as to injure their health. It is only by the co-operation of the school and home that the best physical conditions for the children can be maintained.

Abnormal Children.

Quite a number of the schools in this county have one or more feeble minded children among their number, one school having as many as six. It is unnecessary to say that these children are a big drag on the progress of the classes and should not be allowed in the ordinary school. The cittes are making provision for these children in special schools and the time is coming when it will be realized that such children in the country must also be given special care.

Teachers.

It is a fact well known to everyone that during the past few years the supply of teachers has been short. During this time a considerable number of high school graduates have been teaching on special permits. Last year we had something less than a dozen in this county. This year there isn't a single teacher who is not legally qualified. While not all legally qualified teachers are capable, yet the probabilities are in their favor. There are undoubtedly fewer poorly taught schools than when it was necessary to have so many special permit teachers.

Salaries.

The question of teachers' salaries is an important one to teachers and school districts alike. During the war any teacher who could secure a license or permit could, because of the scarcity of teachers, get a position paying a good salary. However, this condition no longer exists and the incapable, indifferent teachers are gradually being weeded out of the teaching force. In many of the counties and cities the teachers have demanded minimum wages based on training and experience. While on casual examination this plan seems fair, yet when we stop to think of the fact that some teachers with much training and experience are very incapable while others with little training and experience are very efficient, we see that the plan is unfair to school districts and teachers alike.

A Fairer Plan. I believe the question of salary should be determined between the school district and the teacher on the basis of her individual success as a teacher, and the size of the school. Under this plan schools pay capable teachers good salaries and incapable teachers are not able to secure high salaries merely because they have taught for a considerable length of time. office stands ready to give school officers the facts with regard to a teacher's success so that no district need engage a teacher blindly only to be disappointed later on.

Teachers' Meetings.

During the past year a number of teachers' meetings and institutes have been held. Last March a meeting was held at the Oshkosh Normal. This fall a two-day institute was held before the beginning of the schools at which the plans for the year were outlined and methods of teaching On November 3rd the teachers of the county visited at the Normal school where special classes were taught by skilled teachers for the observation of the teachers of the county. The recitation periods were limited to fifteen minutes and other conditions made as nearly like those which rural teachers meet as possible. Many of the teachers stated that the demonstrations were even more helpful to them than the discussions that are commonly given.

Uniform Textbooks.

Four years ago the school officers of this county voted to adopt uniform textbooks throughout the county in place of the different kinds of books used in the schools, many of which were out of date. Contracts were made with the textbook companies so that the county would secure these books at a lower cost than in counties where such a plan had not been adopted. As a result we have been securing our textbooks in this county for less than cost during the past few years with the exception of the books published by one company, which refused to abide by its contract. The law provides that these books shall be used for five years, at the end of which time the County Textbook Committee must make a readoption. The committee will meet in January and it is likely that most of the books now in use will be re-adopted.

County Library Service.

About twenty years ago Winnebago County provided for county traveling libraries. At present there are about fifty boxes of books which are each year sent out to the various villages and schools and may be exchanged at the end of the year. While this service has been very meager, yet it was better than nothing and has been appreciated by many of the people. The time has now come, however, when the people are asking for

better opportunities to secure definite reading material.

During the past few years the Oshkosh Public Library has been allowing residents of the towns and villages to borrow books. The number of borrowers has increased to about one thousand. The library board feels that it cannot allow this condition to go on longer unless the county will provide for at least a portion of the expense. The city has offered to open up its entire library to the use of the people of the towns and villages, place branch libraries in many of the villages and small towns, as well as allow any individual from the county to secure books by parcel post or in person at the Oshkosh Public Library. This offer of the city is a very fairminded one and if accepted by the county will give a splendid opportunity to people from the rural districts to secure the reading they desire. APPROPRIATION FOR ROADS AND BRIDGES.

Supervisor White offered the following Resolution No. 30: Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin:

Section 1. Whereas the State Highway Commission has notified the county clerk of Winnebago county that the sum of \$17,640.84 has been alloted to the county under Sections 1317 M-1 to 1317 M-15 of the statutes;

Whereas Section 1317 M-5 requires that fifty percent of the foregoing sum, amounting to \$8,820.42 together with at least one and one-half times this amount of county funds shall be expended on the state trunk highway

system lines within the county.

There is hereby appropriated under provisions of Section 1317 M-1 to 1317 M-3 inclusive, the sum of \$13,230.63 to meet the first fifty percent of the state aid allotment to be placed on the state trunk highway system. thus making available for this purpose the sum of \$22,051.05, which shall be expended as follows:

The sum of \$1,600.00 to build the Pansy bridge in the Town of Nekimi said county, and the Falance of \$20.451.05 to be used in constructing 15 ft. concrete highway on the Fremont-Zittau-Winchester-Neenah road commencing in the Village of Zittau and ext din; easterly toward the City of

Neenah.

Section 2. In accordance with Section 1317 M-5 of the statutes there is hereby appropriated the sum of \$17,640.84 to meet the second fifty percent of said state 1d allotment making available for use on the county system of prospective highways the sum of \$26,461.26 of which \$5,000.00 shall be expended in completing the Oshkosh-Waupun road with gravel commencing at the south county line and extending northeasterly toward the City of Oshkosh to the present concrete roadway and the balance of \$21,461.26 shall be used to construct a roadway of gravel on the Waukau-Berlin road starting on the town line between Nepeuskun and Rushford and building toward the Village of Waukau as far as moneys will build.

It is hereby ordered that all balances of funds raised by the issuance and sale of bonds for road purposes and now in the county treasury be transferred to the Road and Bridge fund on or before March 1, 1923, all of

which amounts are directed to be expended as follows:

The sum of \$34,107.90 more or less shall be used in building the Oshkosh-Ripon road of concrete 18 ft. in width, said construction to commence in the construction limits of the City of Oshkosh and extending southwesterly toward the City of Ripon as far as the money will build.

The sum of \$5,892.10 shall be used in building the Oshkosh-Waupun road, said construction to commence at the south county line and extending

towards the City of Oshkosh, said road to be of gravel.

There is hereby ordered transferred from the general fund of the county into the Road and Bridge fund the sum of \$30,000.00, the said transfer to be made by the county treasurer on or before April 1, 1923, said money to

be used in addition to moneys heretofore appropriated in constructing a 16 ft. concrete road commencing at the Village of Zittau and extending easterly toward the City of Neenah.

Section 4. There is nereby assessed against the following municipalities as special benefits for the construction of roads already made, the follow-

ing amounts:

Special Work.

From the records left by Miss Jones I find this report of special work. In March a milk week was held and a milk survey was made. The school children wrote milk essays and made milk posters and from all reports considerable interest was shown.

The report of the milk survey was as follows:

A total survey of 1935 pupils.

Of these

515 drink milk occasionally.

1102 drink milk every day.

227 drink no milk.

963 drink tea or coffee.

114 eat no butter.

In one school with an enrollment of 36 pupils so much interest and cooperation was aroused that 32 gallons of milk were consumed by the children in that week.

During the winter one adult class and two high school classes in home

nursing were conducted.

A chest clinic was held in June

During the month of September there was no county nurse. In October I took charge of the work. Since October 1st I have attempted to get to as many of theschools in the out-lying districts as possible and practically all of the time up to the present date has been spent in inspecting school children and giving them health talks.

It is encouraging to note that in the schools where the nurse has been working recently the defects among the children are neither so numerous nor so marked as those among the children in the schools that have not

been visited recently.

In one school I found a child who is deaf and is having much difficulty in progressing in her school work because of her deafness. In another pehool there is a child who is very deficient mentally and who is harmful to the smaller children in the school. Both of these children should be placed in institutions where they can have the kind of attention they need. Further investigation is necessary and if possible these conditions will be remedied.

Recently six cases of scarlet fever have come to my knowledge and all have been reported in the health department. There are also several cases of chicken pox. These are being cared for properly and the children in the nearby schools instructed in recognizing early symptoms and in preventative measures.

In several schools there have been epidemics of pink-eye. I have endeavored to check the spread of this disagreeable condition by telling the children how to take care of their eyes.

About half of the 47 schools I have visited this fall are equipped for serving hot lunches. In most cases the hot lunches have proven to be very satisfactory and will be served again this year. Circulars giving teachers instructions as to equipment and menus are being sent to each school.

Also I am sending circulars containing important information about the most common diseases to which school children are subject.

In most instances I have met with hearty co-operation from both the teachers and children. Youngsters are very interested in being strong, healthy individuals. I firmly believe in the statement so often made—that "health is primarily education—then habit."

If we can instill into the boys and girls the importance of being strong and healthy and teach them the fundamental habits of health, then we shall be laying the foundation upon which the success and good citizenship

of the men and women of tomorrow will depend.

WINNEBAGO COUNTY TRAVELING LIBRARY.

Gentlemen: The statistical report of the Winnebago county traveling library for the year November 1, 1921-November 1, 1922, is as follows: Number ordered as new titles and replacements Number of library collections Number of library centers

During the last five years it has been necessary to refuse from ten to fifteen requests for library collections each year because of lack of books. For the same reason it has not been possible to grant requests for certain titles or material on specified topics. When teachers who wanted class room libraries for schools requested only juvenile books which would directly help them in their work with the children, because of limited resources it has been possible to send them only gneral collections of books. about one-third of which were for children, and two-thirds of which were for adults.

Circulation in 1921 6055

More than 15 library collections were returned from rural schools this year with no record of the issue of books. The method of making the record is very simple but if none is made none can be counted. Presumably the 750 books in these collections would have circulated at least 5 times each and if the record had been kept the circulation for the year would have been increased to 8490 with a gain over the previous year of 2435. This estimate is not allowable since it is only an estimate and not an accurate record and therefore the loss must be reported.

The Board of Supervisors to elect E. W. Thomas as county

abstractor for the term of two years, as provided for in section 5958 of the Revised Statutes of the State of Wisconsin.

II. Upon such election, E. W. Thomas agrees to accept such office, and take over such abstract department, and operate the same in a first class, reliable manner by keeping all tract indices and other records and files written up to date in a first class, reliable manner, and to furnish abstracts of title to all persons requesting same, written up in a first

class, up-to-date manner for the rates hereinafter specified.

III. E. W. Thomas, upon such election, to furnish to Winnebago County a bond in the penal sum of \$5,000 for the faithful performance of his duties as such abstractor, with sureties satisfactory to the Board

of Supervisors.

During the continuance of his term as such abstractor, the IV. Board of Supervisors is to fix the charges of such abstract department of furnishing abstracts at a sum not lower than the following rates, to-wit: 35 cents for each ordinary conveyance on such abstract not exceeding two folios in length, and 15 cents for each additional folio when such conveyance exceeds two folios; \$2 for each certificate attached to abstract; \$1 for each estate and guardianship appearing on such abstract where same does not exceed three folios, and 15 cents for each additional folio; 35 cents for all corporation records, certificates of heirship, affidavits and all other miscellaneous records not exceeding two folios and 15 cents per folio for each additional folio.

V. E. W. Thomas to furnish, at his own expense, proper blank books and loose leaves for same to keep the tract indices and other permanent records of the office, which books so furnished are to become the absolute property of Winnebago County; and also to furnish at his own expense all other supplies, stationery, paper, etc., to carry on such abstract business, and make abstracts of title, and employ at his own expense all

necessary clerks and clerical help to properly conduct said business.

VI. E. W. Thomas to have the use of all typewriters, supplies and

other paraphernalia now in use in the county abstract office, repairs, etc., on such typewriters to be made by him, the understanding being that the County of Winnebago shall be put to no expense of any kind in running said abstract business other than giving the said E. W. Thomas the use of the typewriters now in use and supplies on hand.

VII. E. W. Thomas to pay to the County Treasurer \$500 per annum, payable in monthly installments on the first day of each and every month.

VIII. The Abstract Committee of the Board of Supervisors to have general supervision of the making of all abstracts and general supervision of the running of such office.

In reference to assessments made on various cottages where the land on which the cottages are situated is not particularly described, would say that we have looked up the Wisconsin Statutes in reference to this matter and from such examination it is our opinion that the cottages described on the list submitted to me by the county treasurer are insufficient, certainly to comply with the statutes

Section 70.17 of the Statutes provides that all buildings on lands under lease or permit, including buildings located on railroad right of way, or on other lands not subject to local assessment, shall be assessed as real estate to the owners of such buildings, if known. The tax thereon may be enforced in the same manner as other real estate taxes or by action of debt as prescribed by Section 60.12 for the collection of taxes on personal property.

Section 70.25 provides that in all assessments and tax rolls and in all advertisements, certificates, papers, conveyances or proceedings for the assessment and collection of taxes and proceedings founded thereon, as well heretofore as hereafter, any description of land which shall indicate the land intended with ordinary and reasonable certainty and which would be sufficient between grantor and grantee in an ordinary conveyance, shall be sufficient.

In the assessment in question, the description is "Cottage on Section 3," etc. This, in our opinion, does not comply with Section 70.25, as it does not describe the land with ordinary and reasonable certainty. Describing a cottage on Section 3 does not locate any particular land on which the cottage may be located. There may be a dozen different cottages on Section 3. so the description in question would be so indefinite that it would be impossible to locate the particular land on which the cottage was assessed.

Our opinion is that these cottages should be assessed to the owner thereof, or if he is unknown, to the occupant, and should describe with ordinary and reasonable certainty the particular land on which they are situated.

From the foregoing, our opinion is that all of the assessments in question are void for the reason that the land on which they are situated is not described with such ordinary and reasonable certainty as provided for in Section 70.35.

BONDS FOR ROAD CONSTRUCTION.

CONTRACT WITH SHERIFF-ELECT H. PETER CARLSON.

This agreement, made and entered into this 5th day of January, A. D. 1923, by and between the County of Winnebago, State of Wisconsin, and H. Peter Carleon, shortff-sleet, witnesseth as follows:

Peter Carlson, sheriff-elect, witnesseth as follows:

That the said H Peter Carlson, in consideration of the payment of the money herein provided for, agrees to board all prisoners who may be confined in the county jail of Winnebago County, except those prisoners confined at hard labor out of doors, to wash their clothes and mend the same and to furnish wholesome and sufficient food for the proper feeding and maintaining of such prisoners at a price of 25c for each meal so furnished such prisoners, with no extra charge for washing and mending the clothing of the said prisoners before trial. That for all prisoners so fed and maintained after trial and sentence the said sheriff shall receive \$4.20 per week.

In case of prisoners sentenced to hard labor out of doors the sheriff shall receive at the rate of 35c per meal for each meal so furnished during the actual time that such prisoners shall be working out of doors and other times he shall receive for such prisoners at the rate of \$4.20 per week.

times he shall receive for such prisoners at the rate of \$4.20 per week. It is understood that said amount is to be paid for all meals actually furnished said prisoners, and the sheriff agrees to keep the county register so as to show the hour of receiving and discharging such prisoners and the exact number of meals furnished to each. The said sheriff further agrees to board all prisoners as above set forth and in no case to make any extra charge for washing and mending; where necessary said meals are to be put up to be carried by prisoner to work and furnished at suitable times so that prisoners can go to their work.

It is further agreed that no bills shall be presented to the county or any charge made to it for any service rendered in connection with the purchase of food for said prisoners or in doing the washing and mending hereinbefore provided for or in furnishing any articles or materials in the way of preparing said food, and the County of Winnebago shall properly heat and light said jail and shall properly heat and light said jail for residence purposes and shall furnish heat for cooking purposes.

In consideration of the faithful performance of the above agreement by said sheriff the County of Winnebago agrees to cause to be paid to him the sum of 25c for each meal for regular prisoners before trial, the sum of \$4.20 per week for such prisoners after trial and the sum of 35c per meal for each prisoner sentenced to hard labor out of doors while performing such labor.

Beginning in the southwesterly end of any concrete so constructed on the Oshkosh-Ripon road and building southwesterly toward the city of Ripon as far as the sum of \$50,000.00 together with any other moneys available will build, said roadway to be of concrete, 18 feet in width.

Also beginning at the easterly end of any concrete road so constructed on the Fremont-Zittau-Winchester-Neenah road and building easterly toward the city of Neenah as far as the sum of \$67,000.00 together with any other moneys available will build, said roadway to be of concrete, 16 feet in width.

Resolved, by the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin: That for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of said resolution and to build the said described roadways and to raise the sum of \$117,000.00 as herein provided, that said county of Winnebago shall issue its non-taxable semi-annual interest payment bonds in the amount of \$117,000.00, said bonds to be issued pursuant to Section 1317 M-12 of the Wisconsin Statutes in the form provided by the state highway commission and in conformity with the following provisions, to-wit:

1. Such bonds shall bear interest at the rate of 41/2% per annum, payable semi-annually on the first day of May and on the first day of November of each year, and the principal and interest on said bonds shall be payable at the office of the county treasurer of said county of Winnebago,

2. The number of such bonds shall be 370, and they shall be numbered

1. We find that the records of the said municipal court are not at this time kept up to date and that it would probably not be possible for the pres-

ent clerk to do the current work and bring these records to date.

2. We have examined the act of the legislature establishing the said municipal court and find no authority therein for the employing of a permanent clerk

3. We, however, believe that the county board under its general powers has authority to have temporary help to bring the said records to date.

4. It is our opinion that the clerk could be hired for \$75.00 per month, who in two months would clean up the back work and bring it to date.

5. It is not our opinion that there should be a permanent clerk of the municipal court, as we believe that when this work is once brought to date one clerk ought to be able to do the work alone.

6. The judge of the said court, as well as the clerk, are paid two-thirds by the county and one-third by the city of Oshkosh, and we therefore recommend the adoption of the accompanying resolution providing the sum of \$100.00 to be used with \$50.00 to be appropriated by the city of Oshkosh for the purpose of hiring a clerk for two months to aid in bringing said court records to date.
