

REPORT OF BUILDING COMMITTEE.

Ex-Supervisor Nash submitted the following report accompanied by plans and specifications, which, upon motion by Supervisor Heise, was accepted and placed on file.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

GENTLEMEN: Your Committee on Public Buildings, with your Chairman and Supervisor Schneider, beg leave to report, that in pursuance to a certain resolution introduced by Supervisor Arneman, and adopted at the March session of the County Board, authorizing said committee to select plans and specifications and receive bids for the erection and construction of a County Jail and Sheriff's residence, suitable to the wants of this County, at a cost not to exceed \$25,000, and submit the same to the State Board of Control for their approval, your committee only advertised for plans, specifications and bids. Your committee received five sets of plans and specifications, and with bids and estimates as to cost. After due and careful investigation and examination of the same, your committee accepted those submitted by the Champion Iron and Steel Company of Kenton, Ohio, which we considered most to the advantage of the County, the amount of the bid being \$21,982.00, and herewith submit the same to this Board.

TO BUILD JAIL AND BORROW MONEY FOR THE SAME.

Supervisor Arneman submitted the following resolution, No. 2.

WHEREAS. The Committee on Public Buildings, of the County Board of Winnebafo County, in accordance with a resolution adopted at the March, 1899, session of
said Board, have selected, adopted and approved certain plans and specifications
for the construction and erection of a County Jail and Sheriff's residence, submitted by the Champion Iron Company, of Kenton, Ohio, and

WHEREAS, Said Committee has approved and accepted the bid of said Champion Iron Company to construct said jail and Sheriff's residence, now therefore be it

Resolved, By the said County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, That said plans, specifications and bids be approved by this Board, and that the Committee on Public Buildings of this Board be and they hereby are authorized and directed to proceed and secure the erection, construction and completion of said iali and Sheriff's residence, in accordance with said plans and specifications, as nearly as may be practicable, and for the best interests of the County; that they

enter into and execute all necessary contracts therefor, and supervise and direct the performance of the same; that they secure and receive, subject to the approval of the District Attorney, proper and sufficient bonds and securities for the performance of said contract and work, and that they are hereby vested with plenary power to carry out the purposes of this resolution. Be it

Further resolved, By said County Board that said Committee on Public Buildings be, and they hereby are authorized, in their discretion, to employ a competent superintendent at wages not to exceed three and 50-100 dollars (83.50) per day, for such time or times, and in such manner as they may deem proper, to superintend said work, to advise with and aid the said committee, and to see that all contracts, plans and specifications are fully complied with. Be it

Further resolved, By said County Board, that the County Treasurer and the Chairman of this Board, be and they are hereby authorized and instructed to borrow such sums of money as they may deem necessary, for the purpose of the erection and construction of said jail and Sheriff's residence, at such time or times as it may be needed, not to exceed the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000.00) at a rate of interest not to exceed four per cent per annum, and to be payable as nearly as may be in instalments of five thousand dollars a year, in one, two, three, four, and five years respectively, at the office of the County Treasurer; that said Chairman and Treasurer, in their official capacity shall execute and issue proper notes for the amounts which they shall borrow, and that the County of Winnebago shall be responsible for the same; that there shall be levied and collected annually upon the taxable property of said County, a sum of money sufficient to pay the interest upon said notes as it becomes due, and also to pay and discharge the principal thereof as they become due. Be it

Further resolved, By said County Board that orders be drawn by the County Clerk and the Chairman of this Board to pay for the construction and erection of said jail and Sheriff's residence, upon certificates therefor issued and signed by the Chairman of the Committee on Public Buildings and two other members of said committee.

Dated May 2, 1899.

Supervisor Nugent moved its adoption.

Supervisor Chase moved an amendment making the Chairman of the Board ex-officio member of the Building Committee.

The motion was carried.

On call of aye and nay vote, the resolution was adopted by ayes 37, absent 2. Wahle and Zentner.

TO BUY LOT

Supervisor Chase submitted the following resolution, No. 3, and its adoption was moved by Supervisor Gove.

Resolved, By the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, That said County of Winnebago do purchase for the said County, for a sum not to exceed Twenty-eight hundred dollars (\$2800.00,) the following described real estate situated in the City of Oshkosh, Winnebago County, Wisconsin, to-wit:

Lot No. nineteen (19), and the west one-half of lot. No. eighteen (18), and the west one-half of the south forty-eight and nine-tenths (48 9-10) feet of lots six (6), seven (7), and eight (8), all in block nineteen (19), of the first addition to Oshosand known as the west one-half of lots seventeen (17), eighteen, (18), nineteen (19), and twenty (20) of block No. nineteen (19), L. M. Miller's First addition as per Palmer's map of the Second Ward of the City of Oshkosh.

Further resolved, That the District attorney examine the abstract and deed of said property, and see that the same are good and sufficient, and that upon the

conveyance of the same to Winnebago County, by a good and sufficient deed, the County Clerk and Chairman of this Board be authorized to draw an order payable to the grantor or grantors of said property out of any funds at the disposal of the County, for the payment thereof in accordance with this resolution.

The amendment was adopted.

The motion as amended was carried.

TO SELL HOUSE.

Supervisor Ganzer submitted the following resolution, No. 4, and Supervisor Nugent moved its adoption.

Resolved, By the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago county, Wisconsin, That the Building Committee be and they are hereby instructed to sell the house on lots No. 19 and west one-half of lot No. 18, and west one-half of lots No. 6, 7 and 8, in block No. 19, Second Ward, City of Oshkosh, to the highest bidder.

Supervisor Edwards moved an amendment to make the resolution read "buildings" instead of "house."

The amendment was lost.

The resolution was adopted.

TO ADJOURN.

NOVEMBER SESSION.

TUESDAY-FIRST DAY.

SUPERVISORS' ROOM, OSHKOSH, WIS., November 14, 1899, 10 o'clock A. M.

The County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County convened in Annual session at the Court House, in the City of Oshkosh, on the 14th day of November, A. D. 1899, a ten o'clock in the forenoun and was called to order by Chairman John Harrington.

On call of the roll all the members were present.

Chairman Harrington called the attention of the Board to the business before it, urging a speedy dispatch of the work of the Board at this session. He also called the attention of the Board to the condition of the new Jail, stating that the Chairman of the committee on Public Buildings, would make a further detailed report later.

That the Chairman of the Board and the County Treasurer pursuant to authority given them, had made a loan of \$22,000, at 3 per cent. on the notes of the County, \$2,000 payable April 1, 1900; \$5,000 April 1, 1901; \$5,000 April 1, 1902, 1903, 1904.

The Governor of the State having urged a special meeting of the Board for the relief of the sufferers at New Richmond, the Chair, upon consultation with various members of the Board, deemed it best to let each member solicit subscriptions in his own town or ward,

which was done, and the amounts collected forwarded to the Governor, and receipts obtained for the same.

In regard to Miss Sampson, confined in the Industrial School for Girls, the State Board of Control deemed it imprudent at the present time to allow her removal or parole. The Chair not stating positively, thought that perhaps the \$2.50 a week for the care and support of inmates from this County, might have had some influence on their judgment.

The Chairman then, at the request of the members, rearranged the committees on Equalization, Printing and Corporations as follows:

Equalization—Supervisor Zentner stricken off, and Supervisor Pfeiffer substituted.

Printing—Supervisor Pfeiffer stricken off, and Supervisor Zentner substituted.

Corporations—Supervisor Marx placed at the end of the committee, and Supervisor Derby made Chairman.

Various accounts were presented and referred to appropriate committees.

Supervisor Tuttle moved that the election of the various County officers be made the special order of business for Wednesday, Nov. 22nd, at 10 o'clock A. M.

The motion was carried.

Supervisor Edwards moved that the Board visit the County Poor Farm Tuesday, Nov. 21, 1899.

Supervisor Loscher moved as an amendment, that the County Clerk and District Attorney be invited to visit the County Farm with the Board.

Supervisor Chase moved as an amendment, to include the newspaper reporters of each paper in the County.

The motion, as amended by the two several amendments, was carried.

Supervisor Tuttle moved that all the County officers be invited to visit the County Poor Farm with the Board.

The motion was carried.

Supervisor Tullar moved that the Board adjourn for Committee work to Wednesday at 9 A. M., Nov. 15, 1899.

The motion was carried.

WEDNESDAY-SECOND DAY.

SUPERVISORS' ROOM, OSHKOSH, WIS., November 15, 1899, 9 o'clock A. M.

Board called to order by Chairman Harrington.

On call of the roll all the members were present except Supervisor Loscher.

The minutes of previous meeting were read and approved.

Accounts presented and referred to appropriate committees.

Report of the Trustees of the Insane Asylum was presented and read by W. W. Noble, one of the Trustees.

ANNUAL REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF COUNTY ASYLUM.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin:

GENTLEMEN: We herewith submit our annual report as Trustees of the Winnebago County Asylum for the Chronic Insane, for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 1898 and ending September 30, 1899.

During the past year there has been nothing unusual to disturb the general harmony at the County Asylum and Poor Farm, and we have been able to keep the expense account within the usual limit. Within the past few months there has been a decided advance in prices all along the line, and if they continue, of course it will cost more to meet our obligations next year than it has the past.

We desire to thank your Honorable Body for your liberal appropriation of \$1000.00, made last March, to be expended in repairs and necessary improvements about the institution. Most of the work contemplated at that time has been completed and the whole will be completed soon, and within the appropriation.

There has been expended up to the present time, \$707.61 of the appropriation. Five porches of the Poor House building have been repaired, painted and put in first class condition.

The large barn has been shindled, and a new hog house, 24x80 feet, containing eighteen pens, besides a feed and cook room, has been built.

The floors in the cellar of the Poor House are yet to be repaired.

There has also been constructed a new dairy building, with cream separator, churn, butter worker, etc., complete for making first-class dairy butter.

The dairy building and outfit complete has cost \$379.54.

Since July 10, 1899, there has been made 862 pounds of first-class dairy butter, worth at a fair valuation, \$175.49. It will be readily seen that the dairy will soon pay for itself, and continue to yield a handsome revenue. It was a question just how we were to succeed in making a first-class article of butter when we first started, but we found a man equal to the occasion in the person of Superintendent Austin. He proved to be an expert, and we invite a careful examination, by you, of the dairy and its products.

COUNTY PHYSICIAN'S REPORT.

To the Honoruble Board of Trustees of Winnebago County Asylum and Members of the County Board:

GENTLEMEN: I again have the pleasure of presenting to you my report as County Physician, embracing the period from September 30, 1898, to September 30, 1899.

I am pleased to report that the general health of the inmates confined in the various institutions has been even better than the year preceding. There have been no acute or contagious diseases of any form.

I have made regular visits each week to the County Asylum and Poor House and such other times as were necessary. At the County Asylum there have occurred five deaths, all due to chronic conditions.

The general health here has been remarkably good when you consider the physical condition of the inmates, confined as they necessarily have been for years. Most of the deaths have been due to tuberculosis and this will be the case for years to come, for among such a number as are confined here, many are affected with this disease and they will communicate it to others.

The sanitary condition has been excellent. I have never discovered any odor or filth about the building. The food has been good, well cooked, and served in the right amount and proportion for the health of the patients. The bedding is clean and well kept. Every patient is given a bath once a week, which contributes much to the health by keeping an active condition of the skin.

At the Poor House there have occurred eleven deaths, all due to chronic diseases.

Two births have occurred during this time.

The general health of its inmates has been very good, considering their age and condition. Probably every inmate of the Poor House is afflicted with one of the many chronic diseases which they have had for years and always will have. Assembled in heated rooms, with little exercise, more sickness is to be expected among them. There have been a number sent here during the year in a bed-ridden condition, some having died shortly after their admittance.

All have been supplied with medicine freely, when in my opinion their condition required it. Not a great amount has been used, for in old chronic cases as a rule, the less medicine given, the better for the patient.

The sanitary condition of such an institution as this has been excellent. Food plenty and good and well cooked. Mr. Austin has filled his duties as guardian to the inmates of these institutions in a most creditable manner. He is kind, courteous and considerate of them, sparing no time for himself but constantly looking after the interests of these unfortunate people, and considering the different phases of life found here, this is truly a difficult task.

The Matrons in fulfilling their tasks have done so in a most creditable manner. They have much to contend with, and many tastes to suit.

Some improvements have been made at the Poor House which have bettered the condition and safety of its inmates. But I would again suggest the putting in of electric lights. This will be far safer from fire, and add much to the purity of the atmosphere.

At the County Jail we have no severe sickness. The sanitary conditions are as good as they can be under the circumstances. The food has been good and well served. I have answered all calls here and made frequent inspection. I am pleased that this class of prison-

ers will soon find a more comfortable abiding place in the new jail in course of construction.

At the Work House there has been but very little sickness. I have answered all calls and made frequent inspection. It has been kept exceedingly clean, the food good and plenty and well cooked and well served. It is surprising that we have not had some contagious or acute diseases here, the class of prisoners being of the lowest and most filthy kind, but nothing of the kind has occurred.

Mr. Abrams is certainly a good man in his place. His house and inmates are kept clean, and he treats them all kindly and gentlemanly.

It is the opinion of the Board that the Asylum authorities should select a reputable and competent asylum physician on his merits, and pay such compensation for his services as they may establish.

PRINTING PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD.

Supervisor Chase presented the following resolution, No. 2, and moved its adoption:

Basolved, By the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, That the County Clerk be, and he is hereby authorized and directed to cause to be printed, in pamphlet form, 1,000 copies of the proceedings of this Board for Special Session, 1899, November Session, 1899 and January Session (if held), and March Session, 1900, together with such statistics and tables as are usually contained therein; said pamphlet to be indexed in a similar manner as in previous years, and that said County Clerk deliver to each member, twenty copies thereof; that said proof thereof be carefully read and corrected by said County Clerk or by his direction and that the contract for said pamphlets shall require their delivery to the County Clerk, on or before July 1, 1900, and coupled therewith a forfeiture clause of fifty cents per day for each and every day that the delivery of said pamphlets shall be delayed after the foregoing date limit, and that the Purchasing Agent is hereby instructed to withhold the amount of said forfeiture (if any) from the contract price of said job, when he audits and pays said bill, and

Further Resolved, That said work be let to the lowest responsible bidder and not accepted unless completed in a workmanlike manner.

On call of the roll, the resolution was adopted by a vote of 39 ayes and no noes.

APPROPRIATING MONEY TO SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 9.

Supervisor Gallinger presented the following resolution, No. 2:

Resolved, By the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, that Whereas, School District No. 9, in the Town of Oshkosh, has had taken from its tar roll, lands occupied by the Northern State Hospital and County Farm amounting to 620 acres, all of which is exempt from taxation; and

WHEREAS, Children from the County Farm are, from time to time, receiving

the benefit of said school, therefore be it

Resolved. By the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, That there be and bereby is appropriated out of any money not otherwise appropriated, the sum of twenty-five (\$25) dollars from the County Treasury and that the Chairman and Clerk of this County Board are hereby authorized and instructed to issue a County order therefor to the Treasurer of School District No. 9, of said Town of Oshkosh.

Supervisor Kenny moved its adoption.

On call of the roll, the resolution was adopted by a vote of 39 ayes, and nays not any.

Supervisor Edwards moved that the Rev. J. P. Dysart be allowed to address the Board, regarding the care of homeless and dependent children.

There being no objection, leave was granted, and Mr. Dysart addressed the Board, stating the objects of the society he represented, and the good it had already done to Winnebago County by the placing

of several children, now a County charge, in homes where they were no longer a burden to the County. He also stated that in his opinion, the State kept children committed to the several State institutions, more for the revenue received than the good of the children.

Supervisor Ganzer moved that the Board adjourn to 9 A. M. November 18th, for Committee work.

The motion was carried and the Board adjourned.

SATURDAY-FIFTH DAY.

SUPERVISORS' ROOM, OSHKOSH, WIS., Nov. 18, 1899, 9 o'clock A. M.

The Board was called to order by Chairman Harrington.
On call of the roll all the members were present.
Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.
Accounts were presented and referred to appropriate committees.
Supervisor Tuttle from the committee on Sheriff and Coroners'
Accounts presented the following report:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SHERIFF AND CORONERS' ACCOUNTS.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

GENTLEMEN: Your committee, to whom was referred the communications from the physicians and surgeons of Oshkosh, beg leave to report; that we have given the communication careful consideration. The first contention made in the communication is that the County Board has failed to deal justly with the physicians and surgeons in the matter of fees for the performance of autopsies in cases involving legal questions. We are not sure but that the Board may have failed to allow a sufficient fee in certain cases, but if such is the case, the main fault lies with physicians and surgeons who render the bills. For the following reasons:

First. They have failed to render intelligent bills to the County Board; in some cases they have even failed to give the name of the deceased, or the nature or the date of the service rendered, which makes it impossible for the Board to trace the case. Other bills are presented for services rendered two or three years in the past which leaves the Board in doubt as to whether or not, the bill may have been paid before. Time will not permit the searching of records of the past in order to be sure to do justice to the claimant; and in nearly all bills no explanation is given of the extent of importance of the work rendered to the county. Again, the bills coming from the various physicians, are far from being uniform for the same service

For instance, many bills are rendered which read "autopsy" with a charge of \$5 attached. Other bills will read "autopsy" with a charge of \$10 attached and still others will read "autopsy" with a charge of \$50 affixed. Not in one bill in one hundred, however, is any information given of the extent of the services rendered. With these conditions before us, it is impossible in the time we have at our disposal, to tell which physician should have \$5 and which should have \$50.

Winnebago county is ready and willing to pay a reasonable and respectable fee for autopsies, when bills are rendered intelligently and according to the law. We care not what Outagamie County, or other counties may do, the County Board of Winnebago County feels that it has a duty to the tax payers as well as to the claimant, for pay to his services rendered to the county. When the Board is left to guess at the merits of a bill, through the fault of the one by whom the bill is rendered, then it is the duty of the Board to give the tax-payer the benefit of the doubt.

We would further report that we have many bills before us for additional pay upon bills that have been passed upon by the Board in the past and not allowed in full in inquest cases, and we would recommend that they be disallowed for the reason that by allowing these bills we make an opportunity for an endless chain of bills to be put in against the county for services rendered in such cases by disaffected claimants.

We would further recommend that all physicians and surgeons rendering services in inquest cases, be required to explain in their bills, the extent and nature of the services rendered, the name of the deceased and before what justice the inquest was held, together with the date of the performance of the services; or on failure thereof that the bills be disallowed or returned. We would also call the attention of the Board to the fact that as the county increases in population and the cities grow in size, the number of inquest cases is constantly increasing, until at the present session we have between forty and fifty inquest cases. We would also call your attention to the opportunity there is for fraudulent practices to creep into the management of these cases by the justices. Inquests are often ordered where the cause of death is beyond dispute. Adjournments are frequently taken carrying the cases into two or three days; two and sometimes three physicians are allowed in the case when one would answer the same purpose.

It is right and necessary that inquests should be held, but in order that justice shall be done to the taxpayers, it behooves the Board to carefully scrutinize the bills and reports that are sent into the county to be acted upon and paid.

ANNUAL REPORT OF COUNTY SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

County Superintendent Pederson then read his annual report as follows:

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

I again have the pleasure of submitting to you my annual report of the Common schools of this county. As a whole, it has been a successful and prosperous year for the schools with a sufficient number of teachers.

I received word from a school clerk the other day, requesting me to send him a teacher, and incidentally he remarked that they had not had a single application for their school this year. A year or two ago hardly a school escaped with less than four or five applications, and some ran as high as ten. This condition is not due to the fact that there are not any teachers in the market; on the contrary there are a great many of them, but they have drifted into other lines of work where their labor is more remunerative than that of teaching.

It is not at all surprising that teachers of ability and scholarship refuse to teach in the district schools. The average wages paid in this county to female teachers is twenty-five dollars per month

Now let us see how much she earns a year teaching and compare it with the lady that does ordinary housework.

Two hundred dollars income minus one hundred and six dollars for expenses leaves the magnificent sum of ninety-four dollars for her year's work.

The average housekeeper gets now \$3.00 per week. This may be putting it rather high, but you must remember that hired girls are scarce and most people are glad to get them even for that amount.

The hired girl has no incidental expenses or board bill, so what she

earns is hers to keep. \$3.00 a week for 52 weeks is \$156.00, which is \$62.00 in excess of what the teacher earns.

In this comparison nothing has been said about the three, four or five years of extra study which the teacher must do, before she is prepared to teach. But you ask, what can we do about it? How can we change this condition, so that it will be acceptable to the people and beneficial to the schools?

In my opinion, there are two changes that can be made with little or no opposition. 1st. Enlarge the unit of taxation. 2nd. Consolidate all the small schools with an average attendance of less than fifteen pupils.

In order that you may better understand what I mean I will quote a part of my last year's report.

"State Superintendent Wells of this state reported in 1894 'that this state had 183 districts whose average attendance the previous year was not more than five each; that 858 others were not above ten each; while 2,481 more did not exceed twenty each.' In other words, he said, '3,522 country districts, about three-fifths of the total number, have an average attendance not exceeding twenty, and about two-fifths above that average, with the great majority near the lower margin.' In Fond du Lac county there were (in 1897) sixty-seven schools that paid their teachers between \$17 and \$20 a month. Several of these had only one pupil enrolled during the whole winter term. If they had been under the township system how easy it would have been to consolidate most of the smaller districts and thus enable them to pay respectable wages to those that were employed."

INSTITUTES.

The Annual Teachers' Institute was held in this county last spring with Prof. W. C. Hewitt, of this city, and President Cheever of Milwaukee, as institute conductors. It was a lively, interesting and instructive institute from beginning to end, and I might add, if our other institutes have been good, this was better.

The two conductors above named are masters in their crafts, and the peers of any two men in their line of work in this state. Acting upon the advice of the State Superintendent, I have discontinued the holding of one day institutes.

Hereafter this county will probably hold its annual institute during the summer vacation for a period of at least two weeks. It seems to be the general opinion among educators that a long institute during the summer produces ultimately much better results than any number of short institutes can do. The long institutes will make it much more arduous and expensive for the teachers, but there seems to be no other way of obviating these difficulties in order to give them the training and drill in the theory and practice of teaching which is necessary they should have.

EXAMINATIONS.

The regular semi-annual examinations have been held, as required by law, in four different parts of the county. The number of applicants for certificates is becoming less and less every year. It would be an easy matter, as far as numbers are concerned, to have all applicants for certificates take the examination at one place, and it would be much better for the schools if the examinations were held only once a year. This would do away with all limited certificates: it would also conduce toward encouraging school boards to hire teachers by the year instead of by the term. "In the cities, teachers are always hired by the year, and there is no question but what they have a great advantage over the district school in getting more thorough work and generally better teachers. In the first place, school boards are liable to be more careful as to the kind of a teacher they hire, when they engage him for a year. It also gives the teacher a much better chance to do good thorough work. It quite often occurs, especially when the school is in a poor condition, that a teacher teaching her first term in a certain district, finds that it takes a whole term to get the school in a quiet working order, ready to turn out results that would be gratifying to parents and pupils alike; when at the close of the term she learns that she has made just enemies enough to cause a demand for a change of teachers, whereas if she had stayed. the result would have been a good year's work and satisfaction to all" Even under the most favorable circumstances a teacher can not show her full worth in one term's work. It should be remembered that the true teacher must not only study the school its environments. and nativity of the pupils, but every child has its peculiar temperament and disposition, which should be humored, watched and studied in the most careful manner. All of this takes time and patience. Several of the counties in this state, notably Fond du Lac, have made this change in their examination. They hold just one examination, at one place, generally the county seat, during the year.

The results obtained from the change have been very gratifying indeed. However, the superintendents that have made this change

have assumed a great responsibility.

It is a direct violation of the law, which says that at least one examination shall be held semi-annually in every four town-ships of the county. A certified copy of the fees collected, money expended for institutes and the amount on hand has been filed with the county clerk.

SCHOOL LEGISLATION.

One of the most encouraging signs of the future is the healthy and interesting discussions that have been going on, during the last year, for the betterment of the common schools.

Since the advent of Mr. L. D. Harvey as State Superintendent

there has been an awakening and improvement all along the line.

Mr. Harvey seems to fully realize where the weak part of our educational system is. He is a courageous and conscientious officer, with whom it is a pleasure to co-operate in educational work. There were several quite important school laws passed during the last legislature. Among the most important is (a) the increase of the teachers' institute fund by one huudred per cent; (b) changing the minimum number of school months; (c) a law making it mandatory upon a chairman of every annual school meeting to appoint a committee of three taxpavers to examine the accounts of the school board for the past year. said committee to report to the people at the annual school meeting.

Probably the most important bill presented to the last legislature but which failed to become a law, was the "County Superintendents" Bill," the primary object of which was to make the office of county superintendent of schools appointive instead of elective. Inasmuch as this measure was endorsed by nearly all the county superintendents of the state, by the State Teachers' Association, by practically all the leading educators of the state, and the fact that it is quite sure to be seriously agitated again, I deem it not out of place to make a brief mention in this report.

The principal clause in the bill was section 2, and reads as follows: SEC. 2. There is hereby created a State Board of Supervision of common schools. Said Board shall consist of the person who shall be appointed by the State Board of Regents of the University as the head of the school of education in the University; the persons appointed by the State Superintendent as the Board of Examiners for state certificates, and the persons from each of the State Normal schools who shall be appointed by the State Board of Regents of Normal schools as the institute conductor for said schools respectively.

The principal duties of this Board of Supervisors was to divide the state into one hundred and fifteen inspection districts, or rather superintendent districts. The reason given for changing from county lines to district lines was because a great many counties are too large for one superintendent to supervise, hence the object of dividing the state into one hundred and fifteen equal superintendent districts, thus giving each superintendent charge of about seventy schools. The next and by far the most important change which this bill proposed was the appointment of all these superintendents for a term of four years each. It will be noticed this Board was to be composed of eleven members, all holding high positions in educational work in the state, and each residing in different parts of the state. This Board, it would seem, was as competent and non-partisan as it was possible to make it.

As I understood it, the three principal objects of this bill were first; to take the selection of the superintendent of schools entirely out of politics, and by the way, this is the only educational position in this state in which politics play any part whatever. Second: To make the superintendent entirely independent in his official acts from political or other influences that would in any way interfere with him in performing his full duty. Third: To bring about a more strict and harmonious supervision of the schools; also to enable the State department to bring about more definite results in any direction that might be of benefit to the schools.

This last object is very plausible indeed; there is a certain laxity and lack of harmonious action under present conditions that makes supervision very important in many counties. In most cases it is due to superintendents having too many schools to supervise. The serious objections raised against the bill were the centralization of power and the taking away from the people the right to choose their superintendents.

Both of these charges are true and undeniable. The question we should ask ourselves is, Wherein is the good or wherein is the harm that these changes would bring about?

"If this Board of Supervision" is quite likely to be more careful, more competent and more interested in the choice of a superintendent, is it not just to conclude that at least in this case the centralization of power is a good thing? Assuming that the principal and only object the people have in choosing a superintendent is to get a person that will perform the duties in a fearless, competent and worthy manner, is not the discussion as to how he should be chosen, silly and useless?

It is only a few years ago that one of the leading political parties in this county nominated a man for superintendent of schools that never attended a public school in this county a day in his life. He could not even speak a sentence of correct English. Does any one in this audience think that this board of educators would select such material for superintendent of schools?

I have seen delegates so drunk that they staggered, vote for candidates for superintendent of schools.

I have seen a man work days to carry a delegation in a town in order to avenge in the convention, the superintendent for refusing his incompetent daughter a certificate.

I know of one man who influenced a majority of delegates in a convention to the extent of defeating a competent superintendent and thereby causing the nomination of a very incompetent man, because their superintendent refused this gentleman's sister a certificate.

Probably the most serious charge brought against this bill was, that this Board of Supervision would in time become a huge political machine that would distribute patronage to the party in power. This is certainly a serious charge, and if true, it is a good thing for the people of Wisconsin that the bill was defeated. Now the only way to prove the truth or falsity of this charge is to compare what

other similar Boards of Education have done.

I would like to ask, How many of you know to what political parties the different Normal school presidents of this state belong, or to what political parties any of its instructors belong? You simply don't know; neither do I. When vacancies occurred in any of these schools, did you hear or read the political creeds of the several candidates discussed in connection with their qualifications as educators? Why of course you didn't. Public sentiment would never tolerate any such a discussion. My acquaintance among educators in this state will number among the hundreds, but I don't know the political opinion of half a dozen of them, simply because I never think of associating them with politics or politicians. It is out of their line of business.

Notwithstanding the many very plausible features of this measure, so great was the hue and cry against this so called centralization of power that the bill was killed before it was born.

This measure was first introduced in the legislature six years ago through the influence of Mr. O. E. Wells, then state superintendent. It was re-introduced at the last legislature through the influence of. Mr. Harvey, our present state superintendent. There is no need of questioning the motives of either of these gentlemen. Their whole lives have been one continued record of devotion to the interest of the common school. What we have reason to deprecate the most is the insistency of a few newspapers and demagogues in bringing every discussion and measure pertaining to education down to the mire of politics. This is an unfortunate condition. The result is simply to retard indefinitely, legislation that would be of real benefit to the schools.

Let us hope that the desire to make political capital out of educational questions will soon be a thing of the past.



REPORT OF PROGRESS OF BUILDING COMMITTEE.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin:

GENTLEMEN: Your Committee on Public Buildings to whom was referred the task of building a new jail and sheriff's residence, respectfully beg to present a report of progress, covering briefly the main features of the work of this Committee up to this date.

This Committee was appointed at the Special Session of this Board, held on the second day of May, 1899, and have acted since that time, under and in accordance with the resolutions adopted at said Special Session. The plans and specifications of the new building were se-1-cted and adopted by the preceding Committee on Public Buildings, and approved by this Board at its Special Session, and the building is The contract to erect the being constructed according thereto. building was awarded to the Champion Iron Co., of Kenton, Ohio, and was entered into and signed by the agent of said company for said company, and by your Committee on behalf of the County, on the 3rd day of May, 1899. The price for erection and construction of said building being \$21982.00; and the work to be completed on or before the 1st day of November, 1899. The company furnished a surety bond in the sum of \$10,000 for the faithful performance of the contract on their part.

There has been great delay on the part of the Champion Iron Co. especially on the sub-letting of contracts and in beginning building operations. We have no apologies to offer for the company; and for ourselves we can say only that we knew of no action we might take until

the first day of November had arrived, at which time it is possible the contract might be rescinded. We urged the beginning of operations through correspondence to the utmost. On the 15th day of August, the first stone for the foundation was laid without ceremony.

Your committee found it wise in their judgment to order certain changes and additions in the original plans and specifications for the purpose of securing a durable, well-constructed, modern building, and to avoid the greater expense of repairs and alterations in the near future. These changes and alterations have cost to this date the sum of \$799.04, in addition to the original contract price. Some further changes may be found necessary before the building is completed. At the coming March session of this Board your Committee hope to be able to make a detailed and itemized statement of all the changes and alterations found necessary, with the cost of the same. We wish to state that no changes have been made by your Committee until the price of the same was first agreed upon between the Committee and the builders.

We have further to report that we advertised for bids, and sold to the highest bidder, the old buildings necessary to be removed from the grounds in order to make way for the new jail building as follows:

REPORT OF INDIGENT SOLDIERS' COMMISSION OF WINNEBAGO COUNTY FOR 1899.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

GENTLEMEN: I have the honor to lay before you our annual report for the year ending with November, 1899, as drawn up by our secretary. The figures do not show any material difference from that of previous years, the total number of beneficiaries having increased from ninety-three in 1898 to ninety-nine in 1899. The amount distributed, however, has been reduced from \$3,337.25 in 1898, to \$3,195.75 in 1899, showing a decrease of \$141.50

The favorable change is due to the general prosperity of the country and the ability of the applicants to obtain labor, and also the fact that several of our former wanting friends have taken advantage of the beautiful Soldiers' Home at Waupaca. As this is crowded almost to suffocation, we cannot anticipate that many more will be able to obtain admission for some time to come. Besides, the old veterans of the great civil war, their wives and widows continue to grow older and more helpless as time runs on. They will need assistance for years in the future. We do not doubt that the patriotism of the country will see that all necessary assistance shall be rendered as cheerfully as in the days gone by.

Without repeating the figures of the Secretary's lucid statement, I would recommend the same appropriation be made as for the last year. The fund now in hand subject to appropriation is \$963.72. The payment to be made in December is estimated at about \$350, leaving a balance of \$613.72, with which to begin the new year.



Your Committee, after careful examination, find this statement of facts to be true and believe the three certificates to be illegal because tax levied thereon has been paid before the sale thereof, and therefore recommend that they each be cancelled and that the petitioner, the owner thereof, upon surrendering said certificates to be cancelled, be paid the money paid therefor, with interest, as follows, to wit:

Supervisor Fridd requested the District Attorney to address the Board regarding several charges in the bill of the Sheriff.

District Attorney Quatermass then stated that in his opinion the County was not liable for the board of vagrants committed by Justices to the County Jail, nor for guarding prisoners sentenced to the County Jail at hard labor, nor for livery hire or conveyance within the County, and further submitted the following written report.

REPORT OF THE DISTRICT ATTORNEY.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

It having been reported that certain justices of the peace were sending to the County Jail, persons convicted of certain offenses, which said persons should have been committed to the Work House instead, I have been requested to give my opinion upon the law in question and to point out a remedy, if possible, for its violation. I know that I can make you understand the situation, and I think that I can make an erring justice of the peace even understand it also. I think that I can make him further understand what his duties are in the premises, when a vagrant or other person, whom the law says

should be committed to the Work House instead of the County. Jail, is convicted in his court. And if, in violation of the statute, such justice of the peace issues a commitment that is invalid upon its face, I think I can make a police officer or sheriff acquainted with his duties under the circumstances.

Prior to the enactment of Chapter 290, of the laws of 1895, which is more commonly know as the Work House law, there were and there now are general statutes upon the statute books providing for the punishment of persons convicted of vagrancy, vagabondage, petty larceny, drunkenness and disorderly conduct.

These general statutes in substance provide that upon the non-payment of their fines, persons convicted of the offenses should be committed to the County Jail. But side by side with the general statutes are the Work House statutes, originally Chapter 290, of the laws of 1895, as aforesaid, and now found in the Wisconsin statutes of 1898, sections 697a to 697k, inclusive. The Work House statutes in substance provide that persons convicted of the above named offenses, in case of non-payment of fines, 'shall be punished by imprisonment in the Work House at hard manual labor, and the commitment shall be to such Work House at hard manual labor." Now what is the explanation of the apparent conflict of the statutes?

Section 697a of Wisconsin statutes of 1898 in part provides: "Any County Board may, by a majority vote of all the members thereof, at any general or special meeting, provide for the establishment, erection and maintenance within the county, of a Work House." Now it is not obligatory upon a county to build a Work House, and a county may do so or not as it chooses. As a result of the Work House law, the counties of Fond du Lac, Winnebago, Outagamie and Brown for instance, have built Work Houses, while such counties as Calumet, Waushara, Waupaca and Green Lake have built no Work Houses

It ought to be obvious even to justices of the peace that the Work House statutes in such counties as Calumet and Waupaca, Waushara and Green Lake have no application whatever in those counties, but it ought equally to be apparent to such justices of the peace, that when a Work House is once established, as in the County of Winnebago, or Fond du Lac, or Brown, or Outagamie, such Work House statutes take the place of the general statutes and govern justices of the peace, as to the place where vagrants, drunks and petty thieves should be committed.

Section 697c provides among other things: 'Upon the completion of any such Work House, the County Clerk shall notify in writing, each justice of the peace, police justice and the judge of every court held in his county, of the fact, and thereafter, whenever any male person over sixteen years of age shall be convicted within such courty on the charge of vagrancy, vagabondage, petty larceny, drunkenness or disorderly conduct, he shall be punished by imprisonment in

the Work House at hard manual labor, and the commitment shall be to such Work House at hard manual labor."

At the time of the completion of the Work House, July 1, 1896, every justice, police justice and judge interested in its completion, was notified of that fact. The Work House of Winnebago County has been completed now over three years, and it is passing strange that any man sufficiently intelligent to occupy the position of justice of the peace, police justice or judge has not heard of its completion.

It will be observed that the above statute reads that "the commitment shall be to such Work House" How anyone can mistake the meaning of the statute, it is hard to imagine. But if there was any doubt that the legislature of 1895 didn't know what it meant by the language it employed, the legislature of 1897 removed that doubt. By chapter 318, of the laws of 1897, now sections 6970 to 697w, Wisconsin statutes of 1898, Counties were empowered to establish Work Houses in immediate connection with the County Jail. Section 697p provides: "Every male person over sixteen years of age who shall be convicted by any court or magistrate within a county which has elected trustees of the County Jail and erected the Work House or buildings herein provided for, on the charge of vagrancy, vagabondage, petty larceny, drunkenness or disorderly conduct, or shall be convicted of violating any of the provisions of section 4556a to 4556c inclusive, shall be punished as provided in section 697c." In other words a person convicted of any of the above offenses is to be sent to the Work House whether such Work House be in connection with or separate from the Jail. But the legislature of 1897 was very careful to say in section 12 of Chapter 318, 1897, that said Chapter was not to "be construed as in any manner restricting, repealing or amending any part of said Chapter 290, of the laws of 1895, nor of any of the acts amendatory thereof." But it will be observed that the Work House statutes, Chapter 290, of the laws of 1895, did not especially provide that persons convicted of violating sections 4556a to 4556c inclusive, which by the way relates to vagrants, should be committed to the Work House as Chapter 318 of the laws of 1897 especially provided. So the revisors of the Wisconsin statutes of 1898 in section 397 w, extended the provision of 697p to cover the offenses named in sections 4556a to 4556c, inclusive, so that all persons convicted of violating those sections are to be punished by imprisonment in the Work House. Whether the Work House is separate from or in connection with the County Jail as above mentioned, all commitments now for the above named offenses are to be to the Work House and not to the Jail. So there is no excuse or justification for the commitment of persons convicted of any of the crimes specified, to the County Jail. The moment the Work House is established in a county the otherwise dormant.Work House statutes are in force, and become effective, and the general statutes then become dormant and not effective in such

particular county, while they remain in full force and effect in all such counties which have in no wise provided for a Work House.

It has been reported to me that the legislature that met in 1899 passed a law amending the Work House law. There is no such amendment of the Work House law. Chapter 91 of laws of 1899, relates to punishment of vagrants, but it specifically refers to and it is an amendment of section 1546, Wisconsin statutes of 1898. Section 1546 has reference only to such counties that have in no wise built or established Work Houses. Consequently Chapter 91 of laws of 1899, has absolutely no reference whatever to the commitment of vagrants or other persons above mentioned convicted in the County of Winnebago.

I am further advised that certain justices of the peace, out of the kindness of their hearts, have seen fit to annul and abrogate the statutes passed by the legislature of the State of Wisconsin, and when in their opinion a person is so sick that he cannot be sent to the Work House they send him to the County Jail. Where a justice of the peace obtains his power, I am unable after diligent search, to discover, nor has anybody been able to point out to me any such power on the part of a justice of the peace.

It is not to be assumed that the superintendent of the Work House will treat a sick prisoner any more harshly than the Sheriff of Winnebago County will. The statutes make no such assumption and no justice of the peace has the right to make any such assumption. He should commit to the Work House and there is ample provision take care of any sick prisoner committed to the charge of the superintendent of the Work House, and it may be assumed that he will properly take care of such sick prisoner.

Now what is the remedy? So far as vagrants are concerned, the remedy is clear and positive. The statutes expressly provide that the Sheriff shall receive no compensation for any tramps not duly committed to his care. The Sheriff is bound to know the law, and when he receives a commitment which shows upon its face that the person committed should not have been committed to his care, but should have been committed to the care of the superintendent of the Work House, he is bound to know that he cannot recover compensation for the care and keeping of such prisoner. A commitment is precisely like a warrant. If it is valid upon its face, it protects the officer. It it is, on the other hand, invalid upon its face, it is no protection to the Sheriff. He can't fall back upon the commitment, for he is bound to know whether such commitment is valid, and this applies not only to vagrants, but, in my opinion, to other cases where the statute does not specifically say that he shall recover no compensation for the care and keeping of persons not duly committed to his charge.

But the same principle applies to the officer to whom a commitment, invalid upon its face, is delivered. It is presumed that he knows the

law. Nor is the presumption a violent one, for the statutes in relation to tramps and vagrants have received the most assiduous care and study from both justices of the peace and police officers. No lawyer ever studied the subject with so much attention. I apprehend that when the County Board discovers an officer making claims for services for traveling upon commitments, invalid upon their faces, it has a right to disallow such officer's claims, and I so advise you.

And when a justice of the peace makes out a commitment that is invalid upon its face, I advise the County Board to disallow any claim for compensation for such commitment. If an officer inadvertently and occasionally travels on such a commitment, I should not advise the disallowance of his claim. It is only where he travels time after time on such commitments that I advise the disallowance of his claims.

But there is another method of reaching and suppressing the evil. Publicity is the one thing above all others that violators of the law don't want. Publicity and the fear of publicity are conducive to honesty. The legislature deemed it wise to provide for a Work House Committee to supervise the Work House.

If such a Committee is of any use and benefit to the County of Winnebago, why should not a similar Committee be equally beneficial whose duty it would be, from time to time, to visit the County Jail, and examine as to whether such Jail is properly conducted or not, to see whether there are persons there in that Jail who ought to have been committed to the Work House. I have no doubt that it is within the general power of the County Board to appoint such a Committee, and if the Work House Committee is of any value, I see no reason why another such a Committee to inspect the County Jail would not be of equal value, if not more so. My opinion is that the County Board could empower the Work House Committee to inspect the County Jail as well as the Work House. But if I am mistaken as to that, section 6971, Wisconsin statutes of 1893 expressly provides: "The County Board of any County may, by a majority vote at any annual meeting, provide for placing the County Jail under the supervision of a Board of three trustees of the County Jail. They shall be elected by the County Board at any annual meeting thereof; at the first election they shall be elected for a term of one, two and three years respectively, and thereafter one trustee shall be elected for a term of three years, and such trustees shall receive the same compensation for services rendered as such trustees, as is allowed to members of County Boards."

Section 697n states the duties of such trustees. They must visit the Jail at least once each month; they must examine the Sheriff's accounts; they must examine into the condition of the Jail as to the health, cleanliness and discipline of the inmates. And the keeper of the Jail must lay before such trustees "a calendar setting forth the

name, age, and cause of commitment of each prisoner" With this calendar before them, it could be readily determined whether any persons were in the Jail that should have been committed to the Work House.

It is provided in section 697v that instead of electing a Board of trustees whose special duty it should be to inspect the Jail, the County Board may by resolution declare the trustees of the asylum for the chronic insane ex officio trustees of the County Jail, with all the powers conferred upon the Board of trustees of the County Jail. I believe that the Work House Committee has saved the County thousands of dollars, and I believe that another Committee to inspect the Jail would be the cause of an equal saving to the County. All the older members of the Board know that this is no new theory of mine. Long before the present Sheriff was elected. I had spoken of the matter to various individual members of the Board, although I was never before called upon to address the Board as a body upon the subject. The tramp evil dies hard. Those days, that were as golden to justices of the peace and to police officers if to no one else, are not so far distant in the past that the present justices and officers, looking back across the wilderness through which they have come, can't help but sigh for the days when "in the land of Egypt" they "sat by the flesh-pots."

Resolved, By the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, That the bill of the County of Winnebago against the City of Oshkosh for board of John Purcell, for the sum of \$78.21 be disallowed for the reason that he never gained a legal residence in Oshkosh. He is a charge of Kaukauna.

Supervisor Ganzer moved that the Board adjourn to 9 A M., Tuesday, Nov. 28, 1899.

The motion was carried and the Board adjourned.

TUESDAY-THIRTEENTH DAY.

SUPERVISORS' ROOM, OSHKOSH, WIS. Nov. 28, 1899, 9 A. M.

The Board was called to order by Chairman Harrington.

On call of the roll all the members were present.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

Supervisor Chase submitted the following resulution, No. 21, and moved its adoption.

Resolved, By the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, That there be and hereby is appropriated to W. W. Quatermass, District Attorney, the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars, the same being for office rent during the year 1889. (Actual amount paid.)

Remarks on the question of the adoption of the same were then made by Supervisors Chase and Rosenkranz and District Attorney Onatermass.

The resolution was then adopted by the following vote:

Supervisor Edwards moved that the bill of Dr. Streeter, reportdisallowed by the Committee on Sheriff's and Coroners' Accounts, be llowed at \$30.

Supervisor Fridd moved as a substitute that the report of the Committee on Sheriff's and Coroners' Accounts be referred back to the Committee for correction.

The substitute was adopted.

Supervisor Chase presented the following resolution, No. 22, and Supervisor Tullar moved its adoption.

Resolved, By the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, That the Chairman of the Board be and he is authorized and requested to approve the journal of this day's session, after the County Clerk shall have completed the record of the same.

Supervisor Tuttle from the Committee on Sheriff's and Coroners' Accounts then presented the amended report of the Committee and moved its adoption.

Supervisor Chase presented the report of the Committee on Work House, together with the resolution contained therein.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON WORK HOUSE.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

GENTLEMEN: Pursuant to the provisions of section 7, chapter 290, General Laws of 1895, as amended by section 1, chapter 27, Laws of 1897, requiring the Committee on Work House to report to the County Board, at each session, the condition and general welfare of the Work House, and the management thereof, your Committee beg leave to submit the following report:

The continued good results arising from the mission of the County Work House, during the past year, are gratifying to those who have it under their immediate supervision, notwithstanding the humiliating fact that a limited number of the magistrates in the north end of the County, contrary to law and in violation of the sanctity of their oaths, seem determined to nullify the Work House law, by sending tramps and drunks to the County Jail to be fed and cared for at an expense each per week, of \$3.25, instead of committing them to the Work House, as the law strictly enjoins, where no additional expense is incurred. We are glad, however, to note, that since the March session, when the County Board unanimously determined that all bills thus incurred will be promptly disallowed, the practice has nearly ceased. This fact simply shows the binding force of the object lesson thus portrayed to them, but only exemplifies the provisions of the law, with which they were already familiar, but, for personal gain, they had resolved to disregard.

The bills which these official law-breakers sought to extract from the tax-payers aggregate nearly \$1000 during the half year of their transgressions.

While other counties are struggling with the tramp question, Winnebago has it so effectually solved that, but for the aforesaid infractions, a very limited number of tramps would dare to cross the boundary line of this county. In view of these facts, we feel that this Board cannot too emphatically condemn and punish such offenders.

And we further trust that the righteous judgment of a betrayed constituency will remind them when they again present themselues for their votes that their services, as public servants, are no longer needed. We therefore recommend that this Board continue to disallow all bills for such and similar evasions of said law and that the District Attorney be authorized and directed to defend, on behalf of the County, any actions commenced for the collection of said disallowed bills. And in his discretion, prosecute, criminally, any officer who may hereafter persist in evading the provisions of said law.

There have been no material changes in the rules or operation of the Work House during the past year. The inmates, as prescribed by law, are required to labor ten hours per day, pounding stone, in the stockade attached to the prison portion of the building; they sleep in hammocks, swung in the second story, being supplied with sufficient amount of bed-clothing to make them comfortable; their food is abundant, substantial and well cooked.

DISCIPLINE.

Discipline under the firm but humane restraint of the Superintendent in charge, coupled with the silent admonition of the dark dungeons which, in several instances have been fully tested as to their capacity and convenience for sleeping and eating apartments, has been good.

SICKNESS AND SANITATION.

There has been but little sickness, during the past year, among the inmates. And, notwithstanding the fact that many of them are of the most degraded and filthy class, no contagious disease has found a foothold therein. This is due largely to the complete sanitary condition of the hammocks, apparel and Work House at all times, and the enforced cleanliness of the inmates.

And before closing this portion of our report, we can but commend the faithfulness and valuable services of Mr. and Mrs. Abrams, Superintendent and Matron, and accord to them a full meed of credit for their unexcelled local management of the Work House.

REPAIR APPROPRIATION.

At the November session, 1898, the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars was appropriated for repairs and other contingencies, from which the following expenditures have been made:

These bills have been duly audited by the Committee and paid by county orders. Detailed vouchers are on file in the County Clerk's office. Of the aforesaid amount \$96.68 was expended for the construction of an addition to the barn, which is used for a carriage house and wood shed.

We have also, since the last annual session, purchased a steel cooking range and apparatus for the sum of \$50. This should have been paid for out of the previous year's appropriation, but it was not delivered until after the close of the 1898 November session, consequently was paid from the last appropriation, which makes an apparent overdraft of \$18.87.

We therefore recommend that there be appropriated for similar purposes, aforesaid, during the current year, the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars, less eighteen dollars and eighty-seven cents, leaving a balance of one hundred and thirty-one dollars and thirteen cents in said appropriation to be expended if required, and to provide therefor we offer the following resolution:

Resolved, By the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, That there be and hereby is appropriated the sum of one hundred and thirty-one and thirteen one hundredths dollars, to be known as Work House Repair and Contingent, to be used for the purposes thereby indicated and such portion thereof as is required be expended under the direction of the Work House Committee, same to be disbursed by county orders duly audited by said Committee.



Your Committee further report on the bill, No. 15, of Fond du Lac County against Town of Black Wolf and disallowed. We hereby submit the opinion of the District Attorney: "Winnebago County has nothing to do with said bill; Fond du Lac County must collect from Town of Black Wolf."

The bill, No. 13, of Dr. R. N. Nintzel for professional services and medicine to Albert Behlke: disallowed for the reason, the City of Oshkosh, by the proper authorities, neglected and refused to notify the County Clerk and so no official notice was given the County Physician.

The bill, No. 14, of Dr. R. N. Nintzel for medical services for Ida Bublitz commencing June 1, 1897. We find said Ida Bublitz to be a resident of the Town of Wolf River and has been for ten or twelve years and we fail to find where any notice was served on the County or Town of Wolf River; said bill disallowed by your Committee.

The bill, No. 16, the Village of Omro, for care of Frank Myers, who is by all information received, a resident of Milwaukee, your Committee disallowed in the item of services rendered by Dr. M. E. Corbett, amount claimed \$50 and allowed at \$25.

The bill of S. G. Pake, No. 7, for services rendered Victor Morjenskie, the sum of \$5 was disallowed in the item of operation.

The bill, No. 9: your Committee do not consider said bill properly itemized. It reads, "care of non-resident poor." No date given nor title of the officer.

The bill, No. 12, of Dr. J. R. Barnett for \$20, disallowed, not complying with section 1512. Said bill should be paid by the City of Neenah.

Your Committee further report in regard to resolution No. 1, introduced by Supervisor Tullar and referred to them, that Paul Steindel, a poor person, now at the County Poor Farm, charged to the Town of Neenah, after inquiring into the case, we believe said Steindel to be a County charge. We therefore recommend the adoption of said resolution.

Your Committee further report that they have considered the motion of Supervisor Pfeiffer of the town of Black Wolf, reterred to them, pertaining to a person named Bernard Gallinger at the County Poor Farm and charged to the Town of Black Wolf. We have inquired into said case and believe said Bernard Gallinger was a County charge. We therefore recommend that the sum of \$34.29, now charged against the Town of Black Wolf for care of Bernard Gallinger at County Poor House be made a charge against Winnebago County.

The Chair also called the attention of the Board to the matter of insurance of the County buildings. Mr. Harrington finds that it is

one of the duties of the County Board to see that the buildings are kept properly insured, and also that it is the duty of the County Treasurer to keep the County buildings insured when so ordered by the County Board.

Various accounts were presented and referred to appropriate Committees.

Supervisor Pinkerton moved that the matter of insurance be placed in the hands of the Building Committee.

Supervisor Vosburg moved as an amendment that the Chair appoint a special Committee,

On call of aves and navs the amendment was lost.

The original motion was carried.

Supervisor Vosburg moved to adjourn until 9 o'clock A. M, Wednesday, March 7th, for Committee work.

The motion was carried and the Board adjourned,

WEDNESDAY—SECOND DAY.

SUPERVISORS' ROOM, OSHKOSH, WIS.

The Board met pursuant to adjournment.

All the members were present except Supervisor Chase.

The minutes of the last meeting were read, corrected and approved.

Various accounts were read and referred to appropriate Committees.

The Clerk then read a communication from the Trustees of the County Asylum, containing resolution, No. 1, as follows:

NEW BUILDINGS ON COUNTY POOR FARM.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

GENTLEMEN: We would respectfully call your attention to the fact that the present buildings on the County Farm are totally inadequate for the proper storing of hay, grain and fodder raised on said farm, and the housing of cattle thereon. In our judgment it is absolutely necessary that a new barn be erected as soon as practicable, sufficient in capacity to meet the needs of the farm. You are doubtless aware the low cost per capita of maintaining the chronic insane of our county, to a very large degree, is due to the products produced on the farm, and the proper care of the stock is an important element in the successful management of the farm. In our opinion the estimated cost of a barn, sufficient in capacity to meet the requirements

needed, would cost not to exceed Four Thousand (\$4000) Dollars, and not less than Thirty-five Hundred (\$3500) Dollars.

We would also invite your attention to the necessity of enlarging the present dining room, it not being of capacity sufficient to seat the present number of inmates. There is also urgent need of an operating room, where surgical and other operations may be performed, and a store room. These two rooms may be added in the enlargement of the dining room. An estimate cost of this improvement would be not to exceed Three Thousand (\$3000) Dollars, nor less than Twenty-nine Hundred (\$2000) Dollars. We would therefore recommend the passage of the annexed resolution.

OPINION OF DISTRICT ATTORNEY.

OSHKOSH, WIS., Feb. 28, 1900.

W. C. KIMBALL, Trustee:

Dear Sir: You ask me to construe the statutory power of the Trustees for the County Asylum as to improvements, etc. If improvements should consist of extensive additions, I should hold that the County Board, and not the trustees, had the power to decide, Sec. 604, Wis. Statutes, 1898. But if the improvements consist of an alteration in the building, not materially adding to it, I should hold that the trustees have the power to make estimates of the cost of such improvements, and thereupon the County Board shall appropriate an amount equal to the lesser sum received in the estimate of the trustees, Sec. 604g, Wis. Statutes, 1898. I should hold a mere enlargement of the dining room a mere improvement of Sec. 604g.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ILLEGAL ASSESSMENTS.

Supervisor Hamilton, chairman of the Committee on Illegal Assessments, submitted the following report, which on motion of Supervisor Arneman, was adopted, ayes 37, absent 2.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Your Committee on Illegal Assessments beg leave to report that

they have examined and considered the several petitions and matters referred to them and recommend as follows:

The petitition of Silas Bullard for cancellation of two tax certificates, one numbered 615, face of certificate \$106.57, the other numbered 74, face \$1.69, both dated May 15 1894, and both containing the same description of land, to-wit: "The west ½ of lot 11, block 55, subdivision of lot 10, block 55, Fourth Ward, Menasha," for the reason that the description is erroneous and void, and other reasons which we find not true or material.

Block 55 in Fourth Ward has a subdivision of lot 10, containing block 1 and 2, and each has a lot 11, but the description does not locate the lot in either of these blocks. Block 55 also has a lot 11, and that evidently was the lot intended to be assessed and was, in fact, so assessed as "west ½ of lot 11 in block 55," and the city treasurer of Menasha in his return of said lot as delinquent, added to this description "in subdivision of lot 10, in block 55," by which erroneous description the lot was sold by the county treasurer. Your Committee find the description in both certificates erroneous and indefinite, and therefore recommend that they both be cancelled and that the owner thereof, upon surrendering the same for cancellation, be paid the face thereof and interest at 7 per cent, from May 15, 1894, to the 6th day of March, 1900, to-wit:

And that when so paid the total amount thereof be charged back to the City of Menasha.

The petition of M. M. Schoetz for the cancellation of tax certificate No. 353, sale of 1893, for the sum of \$8.93, of lots 17 and 18 in block 11, Second Ward, City of Menasha, for the reason that the tax had been paid to the city treasurer, and afterwards wrongfully returned by him as delinquent and sold by the county treasurer. No receipt has been filed by the owner with the county clerk or furnished us by the petitioner, but after a long and persistent search among the dusty, promiscuous mass of "stub books" in the county clerk's office, we finally unearthed a "stub receipt," No. 602, purporting to have been made by the city treasurer of Menasha, February 13, 1892, showing payment of the tax on said lots for that year. Although not the best, we deem it sufficient evidence that the taxes on said lots were paid and afterwards wrongfully returned as delinquent and sold by the county treasurer.

We therefore recommend that said certificate be cancelled, and the amount paid therefor, together with interest at 7 per cent from the date of said certificate, be paid the owner, to-wit: On certificate No. 353, face \$8.73, interest \$4.11, total \$12.84, upon the owner (the petioner) surrendering said certificate for cancellation, and that when

so paid the amount so paid be charged back to the City of Menasha.

The petition of M. M. Schoetz for cancellation of seven certificates, Nos. 147, 148, 149, 150, 151, 152 and 153, sale of 1899, for the reason that the lots described therein are owned and used for railroad purposes, and what little is left is worthless.

The lots described in said certificate are lots 41, 42, 43, 44, 45, 46 and 47, all in block 12, Second Ward, City of Menasha, and are all owned by the C. & N. W. R. R. Co.

The railroad track, or right of way crosses or touches lots 41, 42 and 43.

The assessment of lot 41 excepts the right of way and only assesses that part of the lot not used for railroad purposes.

Lots 44, 45, 46 and 47 are not used by railroad for railroad purposes and are properly assessed. Your committee therefore recommend that the cancellation of these certificates, to-wit: Nos. 147, 150, 151, 152 and 153 he not concelled.

Lots 42 and 43 are each partly occupied and used by Railroad Co., by the track and right of way and are each assessed without excepting the right of way which is exempt from taxation.

Your committee believes this invalidates said certificate and therefore recommend that certificates Nos. 148 and 149 be cancelled and that the petitioner, the owner, be paid the amount he paid therefor with interest, upon surrendering said certificates to be cancelled as follows, to-wit:

And that when so paid the several amounts be charged back to the City of Menasha.

Another petition of M. M. Schoetz for cancellation of eight tax certificates of the tax sale of 1894 by the county treasurer of Winnebago County. The numbers of said certificates and the lots described therein are as follows. to-wit:

The last three sold for special tax.

The petitioner asks for the cancellation of these certificates for the reason that the said tax of 1898 had been paid before the return of said lands as delinquent and wrongfully sold by the county treasurer. The petitioner, though requested, has furnished your committee with

no satisfactory evidence supporting his claims of payment of said tax but your committee, after diligent search, have found a duplicate receipt among the stub books of the City of Menasha, on file in the County Clerk's office, showing that the tax of 1893 on lots 12 and 13, Round's addition, Fourth Ward, Menasha, must have been paid to the city treasurer, who afterwards returned said lots as delinquent. Certificate No. 623 (the first above mentioned) represents this tax.

Your committee therefore recommend that certificate No. 623, sale of 1894, be cancelled and that the petitioner (the owner) upon surrendering the same for cancellation be paid the amount paid therefor, with interest at 7 per cent from the date thereof, as follows:

And that when so paid said total amount to be charged back to the City of Menasha.

Your committee further report that they have been unable, after diligent search, to find any evidence tending to show payment of tax, as alleged in the petition on the lots described in the other seven certificates. We therefore recommend that the same, to-wit, certificates numbered 574, 612, 613, 614, 719, 720 and 729, sale of 1894, herein above described, and in said petition mentioned, be laid over to the next session of this Board to enable the petitioner to furnish, if possible, evidence of the payment alleged in the petition.

Also another petition of M. M. Schoetz for the cancellation of nine tax certificates, sale of 1894, and six certificates, sale of 1895, and seven certificates, sale of 1896, and seven certificates, sale of 1897, and six certificates, sale of 1898, in all thirty-five certificates, "for the reasons that the property described in said certificates is Railroad property and what little property there was left outside of right of way has gradually washed away and is no longer assessed by the City of Menasha."

Your committee believe that the value of these lots cannot be considered in determining the legality or illegality of these certificates, nor is the fact that the city has for the last two years omitted to assess these lots, material, for these certificates are evidence that the city did assess these lots before the sale of them by the county treasurer, but we find the other alleged reason given, viz: that these lots are Railroad property, to be true. The records show that the title of these lots is in the Chicago and North Western Rail Road Co, some of these lots partly used for right of way, balance of the lot as well as the other lots not used for Railroad purposes at all.

The certificates annexed to said petition, issued by the County Treasurer on sale of 1894, are numbered and described as follows, towit:

The Chicago and Northwestern Railroad track occupies a part more or less of each of these last named four lots, but the balance of said lots are not used for railroad purposes. As the lots and parts of lots not used for railroad purposes only are assessed, we believe the assessment proper and said above nine certificates, sale of 1894, legal and recommend that they be not cancelled.

Said petitioner also asks for the cancellation of six certificates, sale of 1895, for the same reasons herein above stated, said certificates being numbered and described as follows, to-wit:

No part of these lots, though owned by railroad companies, are used for railroad purposes. Believing these lots properly assessed, and therefore the sale legal, we recommend that they be not cancelled. The other four certificates, sale of 1895, are:

The railroad track or right of way of the C. & N. W. R. R. occupies a part of each of these lots. That part of said lots so occupied was evidently not taxable. No exception of that part is made in the amount or sale. We believe that this makes the sale of said lots and the certificates issued thereon illegal.

Your committee therefore recommend that each of said four certificates be cancelled and the owner thereof (the petitioner) upon surrendering said certificates for cancellation, be paid the amounts which he paid therefor, with interest at 7 per cent from the date thereof, as follows, to-wit:

We find that these three lots are owned by the Chicago and North Western Railroad Company, but that no part of lots 44 and 45 is used for railroad purposes and therefore are assessable, and that the track of said railroad crosses lot 39, but that said track or right of way does not use or occupy the whole of said lot and that the balance of said lot is not used for railroad purposes and that only the part not used was assessed and sold.

Your Committee therefore believes these certificates to be legal and recommend that they be not cancelled.

The other four of said certificates, sale of 1896, are numbered and described as follows, to-wit:

Your Committee finds that a part of each of these lots is occupied and used by the Chicago and North Western Railroad Company (who owns said lots) by its track or right of way but the balance of said lots is not used by the company. The fact that these lots were assessed without excepting the track and right of way used by said company, your Committee believes, makes the assessment and these certificates illegal, and therefore recommend that they be cancelled, and that the owner (the petitioner) upon surrendering said certificates to be cancelled be paid back the amount he paid therefor with interest from the date thereof at 7 per cent as follows, to wit:

As before stated these lots are owned by the C. & N. W. R. R. Co. Lots 41, 42 and 43 are occupied and used in part by the road bed and track of said company, and the balance of these lots are

not, and no part of the other lots are used for railroad purposes. Only the part of said lots not used for railroad purposes is assessed or told, the right of way being excepted in all of them.

Your Committee therefore believing these certificates to be legal, recommend that they be not cancelled.

The petitioner in the same petition also asks for the cancellation of six other tax certificates numbered as follows, to-wit: No. 102, 103, 104, 105, 106 and 107, sale of 1898, for the same reasons given for the cancellation of the others and hereinbefore stated. These certificates cover six of the same lots covered by the seven certificates, sale of 1897, to-wit: lots 42 to lot 47 inclusive, in block 12, 2nd ward, Menasha, which we have just considered and passed upon. As before stated, these lots are all owned by the C. & N. W. R. R. Co. Lots 42 and 43, included in certificates No. 102 and 103, are occupied and used in part by the right of way and tracks of said company, the balance of these lots and all of the others not being used for railroad purposes.

But lots 42 and 43 were assessed and sold without excepting that part used by the railroad company for right of way and track. That part of said lots used for railroad purposes was not taxable. Including it with that part taxable we believe vitiates the certificates.

Your Committee therefore recommend that certificates No. 102 and 103, sale of 1898, be cancelled and that the petitioner (the owner) upon surrendering said certificates for cancellation be paid the amount be paid therefor with interest at 7 per cent from the date thereof, as follows, to wit:

And that when so paid the several amounts be charged back to the City of Menasha.

The remaining four lots to-wit, Nos. 44, 45, 46, and 47, covered by certificates numbered 104, 105, 106 and 107 not being used for railroad purposes we believe were taxable and properly sold. Your Committee therefore recommend that said certificates, No. 104, 105, 106 and 107 be not cancelled.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ILLEGAL ASSESSMENTS.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

GENTLEMEN: Your Committee on Illegal Assessments beg leave to

report that they have examined and considered the several petitions and matters referred to them and would report and recommend as follows:

Your Committee have had under consideration the petition of W. W. Quatermass for the cancellation of the following certificates:

Tax certificate No. 44, tax of 1895, sale of 1896; amount, \$30.72, description, south 1 of south-west 1 of section 22, town 18, range 14.

Tax certificate No. 46, tax of 1895, sale of 1896, amount \$1.81; description, a piece of land commencing at a point where the quarter line intersects highway, running west 10 rods, thence north to the quarter line running east and west, thence east 10 rods, thence south to beginning, section 28, town 18, range 14.

Tax certificate No. 47, tax of 1895, sale of 1896, amount \$53.16, description, west 1 of south-east 1, section 28, town 18, range 14.

Tax certificate No. 49, tax of 1895, sale of 1896, amount, \$4.73, description, west \(\frac{1}{2}\) of south-east \(\frac{1}{2}\) of north-east \(\frac{1}{2}\), and the west \(\frac{1}{2}\) of north-east \(\frac{1}{2}\), of north-east \(\frac{1}{2}\), of north-east \(\frac{1}{2}\), of north-east \(\frac{1}{2}\), of north-east \(\frac{1}{2}\).

Petitioner prays that the above certificates be cancelled for the following reason as set forth in his said petition:

That in the year of 1896 he was a member of the firm of Finch and Quatermass, doing business in the city of Oshkosh, Wis.

That said law firm were attorneys for one, H. B. Winslow, administrator of the estate of Andrew Lansing, deceased.

That said Lansing died possessed of lands in the town of Rushford, Winnebago county, Wisconsin, upon which the taxes for the year 1895 were unpaid, and said lands were sold for taxes at the May sale of the year 1896. That affiant as attorney of the said estate bought the tax certificates, sale of May, 1896.

That said administrator, H. B. Winslow, on or about June 2, 18%, paid to your petitioner the amount of said sale, and on or about June 4, 1896, petitioner took up said certificates of sale; that said certificates are lost; also that petitioner, together with H. B. Winslow, has made a diligent search to find them, and said certificates cannot be found; that said certificates have not been assigned to any other person, and no other person has any rights in or to said certificates.

That by the purchase of said certificates by petitioner and said H. B. Winslow, the taxes upon said land were in truth and in fact paid, and said tax certificates are in truth and in fact no longer a claim upon said land.

That petitioner nor said H. B. Winslow make any claim upon said County of Winnebago for the return of any money to them or either of them.

Your Committee, after making a careful examination of the facts in said petition, would recommend that the prayer of the petitioner be granted; that the said tax certificates, to-wit; No. 44, 46, 47 and 49, of the tax sale of 1896, be cancelled, and the County Clerk be author-

tred to cancel said tax certificates of record, for the reason that it appears that said purchase was in truth and in fact a payment of said taxes upon the land in question; that said tax certificates are no longer valid; that the same are lost, and that no repayment is claimed or can be had from the County of Winnebago by said W. W. Quatermass or any other person.

Your Committee further reports that the petition of N A. Greenlaw for the tax certificate No. 104, tax of 1894, sale of 1895, for the reason that it covers railroad land and is exempt from taxation. And your Committee, after making diligent inquiry and upon the examination of the facts as stated in said petition, find that the property described therein is railroad land and used for railroad purposes, and therefore exempt from taxation.

Therefore your Committee would recommend the cancellation of said certificate and the owner thereof be paid the amount paid for such certificate, with interest thereon, upon surrendering said certificate for cancellation as follows:

Certificate No. 104, sale of 1895, west $\frac{1}{2}$ of lot 11, block "L," western addition; first ward, Oshkosh, 4 years and 10 months, face \$8.73, interest \$2.94, total \$11.67, and when so paid to be charged back to the city of Oshkosh.

Your Committee further reports that the petition of N. A. Greenlaw for the cancellation of tax certificate No. 450, tax of 1898, sale of 1899, for the reason that the land described therein is church property. And your Committee, after making diligent inquiry, and upon examination of the facts as stated in said petition, find that the property described in said certificate is used as and for a place of worship, and is owned by the German Methodist Church of Oshkosh.

Therefore your Committee would recommend the cancellation of said tax certificate, and the owner thereof be paid the amount paid for said certificate, with interest thereon, upon surrendering said certificate for cancellation, as follows:

Certificate No. 450, sale of 1899, lots 9 and 10, block 20, ninth ward, Oshkosh, 10 months, face \$24.20, interest \$1.40, total \$25.60, and when 80 paid to be charged back to the city of Oshkosh.

Your Committee further reports that the petition of N. A. Greenlaw for the cancellation of tax certificate No. 162, sale of 1899, for the reason that the lands of different owners are assessed together.

Your Committee, having inquired into these matters carefully, and finding after examination of the titles to said lands, that the lands are illegally assessed, we recommend that said certificate be cancelled and the owner thereof be paid the amount paid for said certificate, with interest thereon, upon surrendering said certificate for cancellation, as follows:

Certificate No. 162, sale of 1899, lots 21 and 22, block 34, city of Me-

nasha, 10 months, face \$17.52, interest \$1.00, total \$18.52, and when so paid to be charged back to the city of Menasha.

Your Committee further reports that the petition of N. A. Greenlaw for the cancellation of tax certificate No. 591, sale of 1899, for the reason set forth in said petition, which is as follows:

Tax certificate No. 591, sale of 1899, which said sale was a re-sale of taxes of 1895 of the May sale of 1896, of tax certificate bearing No. 48; that the owner of said land, one, Andrew Lansing, died and the estate was probated in the year 1896; that one, H. B. Winslow, was the administrator and one, W. W. Quatermass, was the attorney for said administrator; that on or about June 4. 1896, said Winslow and said Quatermass paid for and took up said tax certificate, No. 48; that such purchase was in truth and in fact a payment of the taxes upon said land; that said tax certificate No. 48, sale of 1896 has been lost, and that the same has been cancelled by the County Clerk; that there has been no re-payment of said tax certificate to said Winslow or said Quatermass or to the Lansing estate, nor could there be; that said tax certificate, No. 591, re-sale of 1899, on account of said payment by said Winslow and Quatermass is invalid, and no valid tax deed can be issued upon said tax certificate.

Your Committee, after making a careful examination of the facts as stated in said petition, would recommend that said tax certificate be cancelled, and the owner thereof be paid the amount paid for such certificate with interest thereon, upon surrendering said certificate for cancellation as follows:

. Certificate No. 591, sale of 1899, west ½ of east ½ of south-east ½, except 2½ acres to Nobel in section 28, town 18, range 14, 10 months; face \$20.24, interest \$1.20, total \$21.44, and when so paid to be charged back to the town or Rushford.

Your Committee further report that the petition of L. G. Arnold for the cancellation of tax certificate, No. 215, tax of 1890, sale of 1891, for the reason that the land described in said tax certificate was doubly assessed. And your Committee, after a careful examination of the records having been made and on examination of the tax roll of the city of Oshkosh for the year 1890, find that the land described in said tax certificate was not doubly assessed, and further that the tax roll shows that the tax for that year was unpaid; that a return thereof as unpaid, was made by the City Treasurer of the city of Oshkosh, as appears by the delinquent return for that year made by him.

Your Committee would therefore recommend that the prayer of the petitioner in this matter be not granted; that said tax certificate is a good and valid certificate and that the same shall remain in full force and effect.

The petition of the C. & N. W. R. R. Co. for the cancellation of certificate No. 271, sale of May 17, 1898, covering lots 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19 and 20 of block L of the western addition to the city of Oshkosh,

for the reasons that said lots are owned by said railroad company and used for railroad purposes.

Your Committee believe the allegations of the petitioner are true and that said company owns said lots and uses them for railroad purposes.

But the petitioner does not own said certificate but alleges that one L. G. Arnold purchased it and is now presumably the present owner of it.

Your Committee believe the owner of the certificate has a right to insist that his certificate is good and believe this Board has no right to cancel said certificate upon the petition of the owner of the lots described therein only, unless the consent of the owner of said certificate to the cancellation be endorsed upon or accompanies the petition of the owner. Your Committee therefore recommend that said petition be laid over to the next session of this Board for the petitioner to procure the consent of the owner of said certificate.

Also the petition of L. G. Arnold for cancellation of certificate No. 393, sale of 1895, covering lots 37, 38 and 39 in block 12, second ward, Menasha, except right of way, for the reason "that the property described in said certificate is washed away except what is used by the railroad."

Your Committee believe that said lots are owned by the C. & N. W. R. R. Co., and that a part of each lot is used by said railroad company by its track or road bed, but that the burden of said lots is not used by said railroad company for railroad purposes, and that that part of said lots not so used was assessed only—for the right of way is excepted.

Your Committee therefore believe that said lots were properly and legally assessed and are not illegal and therefore recommend that said certificate be not cancelled.

Your Committee further reports that there are other petitions upon which your Committee have not been able to report, which lack evidence to support the claim of petitioner, and others which require a personal investigation of the premises described therein in order to make an intelligent report thereon.

Your Committee asks that the petitions not herein reported on be laid over for investigation and examination until the next session of this Board.

WHEREAS, It appears that manufacturing plants in the cities of Oshkosh, Neenah and Menasha are assessed and equalized higher than those of Milwaukee. LaCrosse, Racine and other cities in the state, the same being also true as to residence property, and

WHEREAS, The last State Board of Equalization raised the assessed valuation of Winnebago county approximately a million dollars and made a corresponding decrease in that of Milwaukee and other counties, now be it

Resolved, By the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, That the Chairman appoint a committee of five of whom the Chairman shall be a member, to go to Madison and appear before said State Board of Equalization in the interests of Winnebago county, to the end that said county may receive fair and just equalization, if in the judgment of said Committee it is deemed advisable, and that the expenses of said Committee be borne by the County of Winnebago.

Supervisor Kenney made a motion to defer action on the resolution until the November session.

The motion was lost.

RULES OF THE COUNTY BOARD.

ADOPTED MAY 2 1899.

- I. The meetings of this Board shall be held in the Supervisors' room, and the hour for the daily meetings shall be 9 A. M., providing that on the first meeting in each week the hour of meeting shall be 10 A. M.
- II. At the first meeting of the Board it shall be the duty of the Chairman, or in his absence, the Clerk, to call to order.

The Clerk shall then call the roll of Members.

A quorum being present, the Board shall proceed to the election of a Chairman.

- III. It shall be the duty of the Chairman to appoint the following standing committees: Equalization, Finance, General Accounts, Illegal Assessments, Justice and Constables' Accounts. Sheriff and Coroners' Accounts, Insane. Poor and Poor Farm, Work House, Corporations, Roads and Bridges, Public Buildings, Printing, Per Diem and Mileage, Bonds and Salaries.
- IV. The Board may adjourn for such time as shall be necessary for the Chairman to prepare the list of committees, and no business can be done until the same shall be announced.
- The Chairman shall take the chair at the hour to which the Board may from time to time stand adjourned, call the Board to order and direct the calling of the roll of members by the Clerk.
- VI. Upon the appearance of a quorum, the journal of the preceding day shall be read by the Clerk, and any mistake therein shall be corrected by the Board; provided, that upon the last day of the session, the journal for that day shall be read and, before the final adjournment, corrected.
- VII. After the reading and correction of the journal, the order of business shall be as follows:
 - 1. Reception of Petitions, Memorials, Accounts, etc.
 - 2. Presentation of Resolutions and disposition of same.
 - 3. Reports of Standing Committees.
 4. Reports of Select Committees.

 - 5. Consideration of Miscellaneous Business.
- VIII. The Chairman shall preserve order and decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Board; and shall clearly and distinctly state every motion or question before debate
- IX. The Chairman shall vote on all questions taken by ayes and nays, except on appeals from his own decisions; provided, that when the effect of such a vote shall be to produce a tie, the question shall be deemed to be lost; and providing that in the order of voting, his name shall be called last.
- X. Every motion or amendment shall be reduced to writing when a request therefor shall be made by any member; and all petitions, memorials and substitutes shall be reduced to writing and read before they shall be considered by the Board.
- Every written resolution shall have attached thereto the name of the person introducing it; and when referred to a committee, the names of such committee shall be endorsed thereon.
 - XII. Every member, previous to speaking, shall rise and address the Chair.
- XIII. When two or more members rise at once the Chair shall designate the member who is to speak first; but in all cases the member who shall first rise and address the Chair shall speak first.

XIV. No member shall speak more than twice upon the same question without leave; and when called to order by the Chairman, shall take his seat, and shall not be allowed to proceed without leave of the Board.

XV. A vote on any question shall be taken by ayes and nays when called for by five members; and shall be so taken on all questions involving the expenditure of money; and whenever a vote is so ordered and taken, the members voting in the affirmative and negative, as well as those absent or not voting, shall be recorded at length in the records of the proceedings of the County Board.

XVI. No account or claim against the county shall be audited unless it be made out in items and duly verified and be filed with the Clerk of the Board, except as otherwise provided by law.

XVII. When a motion is under consideration, no motion shall be entertained except:

- 1. To adjourn.
- 2. To lay on the table.
- 3. For the previous question.
- 4. To postpone to a day certain.
- 5. To commit to a committee.
- 6. To amend or to substitute.
- 7. To postpone indefinitely.

These several motions shall take precedence in the order in which they stand in this rule.

XVIII. A motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, and for the previous question shall be decided without debate, except as hereinafter provided

XIX. A motion to postpone indefinitely or to a day certain or to commit shall not be again entertained on the same day or in the same stage of the proposition.

XX. A substitute shall be open to amendment the same as the original proposition; but when adopted, shall not be subject to amendment. If an amendment or substitute is lost, another substantially the same shall not be entertained.

XXI. When a motion or question has once been determined, any member voting with the majority may move a reconsideration of the vote; but such motion shall be made and acted on at the same or next succeeding meeting, and shall not thereafter be made except by unanimous consent.

XXII. The previous question may be moved by any member, and the Chairman shall then say: "It requiring five members to second this motion, those in favor of sustaining the motion will rise." If five or more members then rise, the previous question shall thereby be seconded and an opportunity then be given to any two members opposed thereto to briefly state their objections. The question shall then be, "Shall the question be now put?" which, if carried by a vote of two-thirds of the members present upon a call of the ayes and nays, the Board shall immediately proceed to vote upon the pending amendment, if any, and upon the main question.

XXIII. In filling blanks, the largest sum and the longest time shall be first put.

XXIV. These rules shall not be changed, amended, or repealed unless the proposition or amendment is introduced in writing and the same laid over to some subsequent meeting of the Board not less than five days intervening, and then only with the concurrence of two thirds of the members present.

XXV. Any of these rules may be suspended upon any pending measure by unanimous consent or by two-thirds of the members present.

XXVI. These rules and all amendments or additions thereto which may hereafter be made shall govern the Board until altered or repealed, as herein provided.

XXVII. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in "Jefferson's Manual," so far as they remain in common use and are practicable and applicable and not inconsistent herewith, shall govern the Board.


