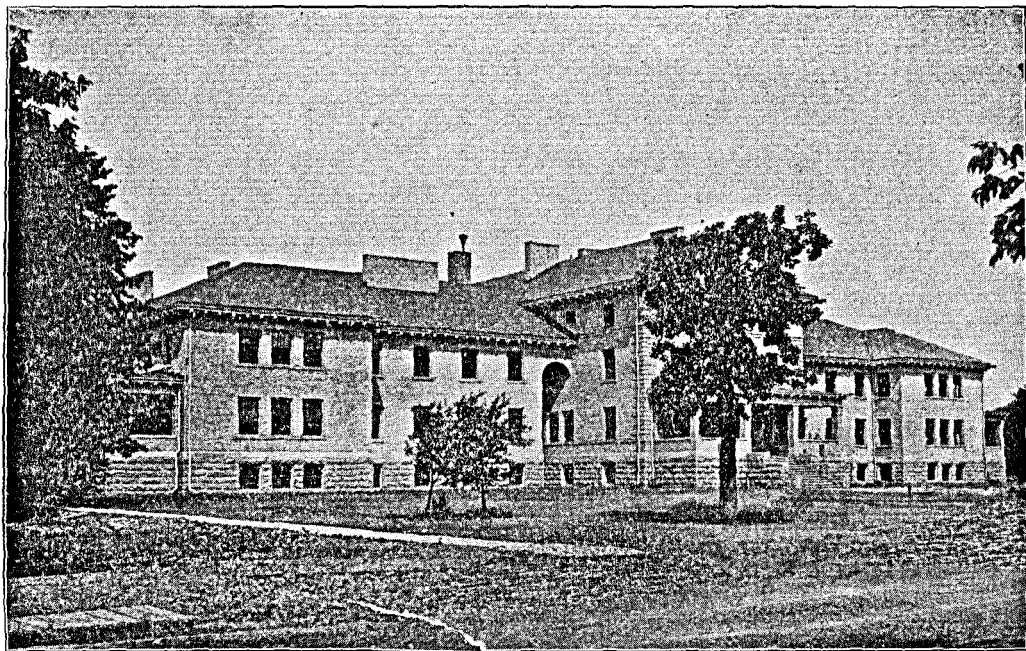

Election of Chairman.

Chairman Lawson appointed Supervisors Manuel and Atwood as tellers and called for an informal ballot for Chairman, which resulted as follows:

Supervisor Kellogg moved that the rules be suspended and that the informal ballot be made formal. Carried, and Supervisor Lester H. Lawson was declared elected Chairman of this Board.

Supervisor White moved that an informal ballot be taken for Vice Chairman. Carried.

The informal ballot resulted as follows:

Supervisor Tuttle, having received a majority, was declared elected Vice Chairman.

Supervisor Ream moved that the rules of the Board for the last Supervisor year be adopted for this year. Carried.

Supervisor Ganzer moved to adjourn to 1:30 p. m., to give Chairman Lawson an opportunity to select his committees. Carried, and the Board adjourned.

#### Report of Committee on Poor Farm.

Supervisor Dunham offered Report No. 1, and Resolution No. 1, as follows:

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Gentlemen—Your Committee on Poor and Poor Farm, who, by resolution of the County Board passed at the March session of 1906, were authorized to procure plans and specifications and advertise for and receive bids for the full completion of a new poor house at the County Farm, beg leave to report that they have procured the plans and specifications and advertised for and received bids, seventeen in all, but owing to the advance in price of building material, the lowest bid,

including architect's fees, exceeds your appropriation of \$50,000 by \$11,408.70, making the lowest bid \$61,408.70. Therefore, as your committee had no power to go beyond your appropriation, your committee, at a meeting held April 26, 1906, decided to place the figures before the Board and ask for an additional appropriation.

RESOLUTION NO. 1.

Whereas, At the March session of the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County a resolution was duly and regularly passed by said Board authorizing the erection and construction of a Poor house on the County Farm of Winnebago County, and

Whereas, The Poor and Poor Farm Committee of said Winnebago County were, by said resolution, given full and complete authority and power in said matter, and

Whereas, Said committee were not authorized to spend more than \$50,000, a true and correct copy of which resolution is attached hereto and made a part hereof and marked "Exhibit A"; now therefore, be it

Resolved, By the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, that the authority and power heretofore granted by said resolution be in all things, and the same is hereby fully confirmed; and be it further

Resolved, By the County Board of Supervisors aforesaid, that in the erection and completion of said building, as aforesaid, not more than \$60,000 shall be expended; and that said sum of \$60,000 shall include all expenses heretofore had in said matter, and include architect's fees, and include the cost of said building when completed, including heating, lighting, and extras.

EXHIBIT A.

Be it, Resolved, By the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, that the Poor and Poor Farm Committee of said County Board of Supervisors aforesaid, be and they are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to build on the Poor Farm of Winnebago County a County Poor House, the construction and building of which, when fully completed, shall not exceed in cost to Winnebago County the sum of \$50,000, said sum to include not only the building of said Poor House, but also the heating, lighting and any extras thereon; and be it further

Resolved, By this Board, that said committee as aforesaid, are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to act for and on behalf of Winnebago



County in the selection and adoption of the plans and specifications for said Poor House and for the letting and executing of all contracts for the building and erection of said poor house on behalf of Winnebago county; and be it further

Resolved, By this Board, that said committee are hereby authorized, directed and empowered to secure and adopt proper plans and specifications for all of said work, and are hereby given full power and authority to adopt the present plans of William Waters, with such modifications or changes therein as they may see fit, for fully carrying out the purposes of this resolution, it being understood that they shall have the right and power to decide upon, determine and adopt proper plans or specifications, or change or modify any as they see fit, in order to carry out the purpose of this resolution; and said committee is hereby directed, empowered and authorized to perfect proper plans and specifications for the erection of said Poor House, including the heating and lighting thereof, as soon as properly may be done, and are authorized, directed and empowered thereupon to advertise for and receive bids for the full completion of said work and to secure the erection, construction and completion of said Poor House in accordance with said plans and specifications; and they are hereby further authorized and directed to enter into and execute all necessary contracts therefor, and for the securing of an architect for the supervision of said work. It is hereby further

Resolved, By said Board, that in the advertising for bids for the performance of said work and in letting of all contracts connected with said work said committee act in conjunction with the District Attorney of said County, who is hereby directed to see to and approve all contracts, bids, writings, and instruments necessary to carry into full effect the purpose of this resolution. It is hereby further

Resolved, By this Board, that said committee is given plenary power to act for and on behalf of this Board, and on behalf of the County of Winnebago, in carrying out the purposes of this resolution. It being understood, however, that the cost of said building, when completed, including heating, lighting and extras, also including architect's fees, shall not exceed the sum of \$50,000; and said committee is hereby directed to adopt such plans, drawings and specifications and let such contracts on behalf of Winnebago County as will insure the completion of said building according to the intent and purpose of this resolution, for the sum of \$50,000; and be it further

Resolved, By said County Board, that said Committee on Poor and Poor Farm be, and they are hereby authorized to secure and employ a competent architect and superintendent for the supervision of said work, and to advise with and aid said committee and to see that all contracts, plans and specifications are fully complied with; and said committee shall reserve to itself in all contracts let and entered into, the right, power and authority to determine at any and all times who shall be the representing architect to determine for Winnebago County all questions which may arise in the construction and building of said Poor House under any contracts let, and to determine the question of whether all contracts are being carried out in accordance with plans, drawings and specifications; and be it further

Resolved, By the said County Board, that the County Treasurer and the Chairman of this Board be and they are hereby authorized and instructed to borrow such sums of money as they may deem necessary for the purpose of the erection and construction of such Poor House at such time or times as it may be needed, not to exceed the sum of \$50,000, at a rate of interest not to exceed 5 per cent. per annum, and be payable as nearly as may be in installments of \$5,000 or more per year, until paid, at the office of

the County Treasurer; that said Chairman and County Treasurer, in their official capacity, shall issue and execute proper notes for the amount which they shall borrow and that the County of Winnebago shall be responsible for the same; that there shall be levied and collected annually upon the taxable property of said county a sum of money sufficient to meet the interest upon said notes as it becomes due, and also to pay and discharge the principal thereof as it becomes due; and, be it further

Resolved, That orders be drawn by the County Clerk and Chairman of this Board to pay for the construction and erection of said Poor House upon certificates therefor, issued and signed by the Chairman of the Committee on Poor and Poor Farm, and two other members of said committee.

Supervisor Dunham moved adoption of report and resolution.

Remarks by Supervisor Gustavus, who, after reading Resolution No. 11, of November, 1905, session, and Resolution No. 4, of March, 1906, session, offered an amendment to the adoption of the report, as follows:

Whereas, The Committee on Poor and Poor Farm was empowered and directed by a resolution duly adopted by the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, November 25, 1905 (a copy of which is found on page 385 of the Journal of the Board of Supervisors), to cause to be made the necessary repairs and improvements to the County Poor House at the Poor Farm, as provided by said resolution, and said committee having failed to act in accordance with said resolution, and

Whereas, A resolution was duly adopted by the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, March 9, 1906 (a copy of which is found on page 442 of same Journal), by which the Committee on Poor and Poor Farm was vested with all the right and power of the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago to cause to be erected a Poor House on the Poor Farm, and to procure and adopt plans and specifications and to let contract, employ a superintendent architect to superintend said construction, to make alterations and changes in any plans and specifications approved by said committee for construction of said Poor house; and

Whereas, the said committee having again failed to act in accordance with said resolution, be it

Resolved, By the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, that all right and power vested in said committee by the passage of said resolution to act in any way or manner for the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, be and the same is hereby rescinded, and that the said resolution passed by the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County be and the same is hereby repealed. Be it further

Resolved, By the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, that the County Clerk of Winnebago County be and he hereby is instructed to advertise and receive plans and specifications for a suitable Poor House to be erected on the Poor Farm, the construction and building for which, when fully completed, shall not exceed Fifty Thousand Dollars, said sum to include heating, lighting, architect's fees, and any and all extras, and submit all plans and specifications at the next session of the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County for their approval and discussion.

H. F. GUSTAVUS.

Remarks were made by Supervisors Tuttle, Gustavus, Davis, Dunham, Arnemann, Ganzer, Beduhn and Kenny.

The Clerk read the resolution of March, 1906, session, No. 4.

Further remarks were made by Supervisors Arnemann, Beduhn, White, Audiss, Tuttle, Gustavus, Nigl and Kenny.

District Attorney Jackson also addressed the Board, after which the Clerk was asked to read both the report and the amendment now before the Board.

On roll call the amendment was lost by the following vote:

Ayes—Atwood, Beduhn, Cook, Davis, Frees, Ganzer, Gustavus, Kenny, Kellogg, Koplitz, Menzel, Mayer, Merrill, Neitzel, Nigl, Pride, Weber—17.

Nays—Arnemann, Audiss, Dunham, Ellis, Gunderson, Heffron, Hofberger, Jakowski, Jensen, Christoph, Manuel, Mackie, Rollins, Ream, Riley, Phillips, Smith, Tipler, Tuttle, Uvaas, White, Lawson—22.

The original resolution was lost by the following vote:

Ayes—Arnemann, Dunham, Ellis, Gunderson, Heffron, Hofberger, Jensen, Kellogg, Christoph, Manuel, Mackie, Rollins, Ream, Riley, Phillips, Smith, Uvaas, White, Lawson—19.

Nays—Audiss, Atwood, Beduhn, Cook, Davis, Frees, Ganzer, Gustavus, Jakowski, Kenny, Koplitz, Menzel, Mayer, Merrill, Neitzel, Nigl, Pride, Tipler, Tuttle, Weber—20.

Remarks were made by Supervisors Tuttle, Davis, Arnemann and Frees.

Supervisor Tuttle said that it would be better to compromise than to fight, and moved an additional \$5,000 to the \$50,000 be appropriated.

The motion was carried by the following vote:

Ayes—Arnemann, Dunham, Davis, Ellis, Gunderson, Hofberger, Jakowski, Jensen, Kellogg, Christoph, Manuel, Mackie, Rollins, Ream, Riley, Phillips, Smith, Tuttle, Uvaas, White, Lawson—21.

Nays—Audiss, Atwood, Beduhn, Cook, Frees, Ganzer, Gustavus, Heffron, Kenny, Koplitz, Menzel, Mayer, Merrill, Neitzel, Nigl, Pride, Tipler, Weber—18.

Supervisor Ganzer said that unless another \$5,000 be added the plans adopted by the committee will need to be modified, therefore he moved that another \$5,000 be appropriated, making the total appropriation \$60,000.

The motion prevailed by the following vote:

Supervisor Menzel moved that Supervisor Beduhn's name be added to the Committee on Poor and Poor Farm. Carried.

TRUSTEE'S ANNUAL REPORT.

Trustee W. W. Noble read his annual report No. 1, of the Trustees of the County Asylum and Superintendent of Poor Farm, as follows:

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Gentlemen—We take pleasure in presenting our annual report for the year ending June 30, 1906.

Nothing unusual has occurred to disturb the general harmony existing at the Asylum.

Among the most important improvements made this year are the following:

A new steel ceiling in the bakery to take the place of the lath and plaster, which was continually falling and causing no end of trouble.

A tile floor in the kitchen, a fire escape from the third floor dormi-

tory, and a general repair of all the eave troughs on the building.

The well which supplies the institution with water has been throwing up a very fine grit and made trouble by cutting out the brass pump rods. We have overcome this difficulty by digging a reservoir 28 feet deep and putting 12 inches of concrete around the outside to keep surface water out. Thus far it works very satisfactorily. We still have the same supply of water and no grit in the pump. Depth of reservoir, 28 feet 6 inches. Diameter 4 feet.

We have contracted for 1,000 tons of West Virginia Splint Coal at \$4.15 per ton. This coal will supply us until some time in June.

#### COUNTY PHYSICIAN'S REPORT.

County Physician Frank Brockway read his annual report No. 2, as follows:

To the Honorable Board of Trustees of the County Asylum, and Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Gentlemen—I herewith respectfully present to you my report as



County Physician for the fiscal year, ending July 1st, 1906:

#### THE COUNTY ASYLUM.

I have made regular visits, twice a week, to the County Asylum during the year, and special visits whenever called.

During the first quarter of the year there were two deaths, both males, one due to paretic dementia, and the other to consumption.

Aside from these cases there was very little sickness among the inmates during these months.

During the second quarter there were two deaths, both males, one from paralysis and the other from inflammation of the meninges of the brain. The only major accident of the year occurred during the quarter, in the month of November, a broken arm, caused by the patient slipping and falling on the hard wood floor of the ward. During this quarter we had one case of pneumonia, which eventually made a perfect recovery.

In the third quarter, the last of the winter months, there were four deaths, three males and one female. Of these, one was due to tuberculosis, one to scrofula and tuberculosis, one to apoplexy, and one to locomotor ataxia.

There were two deaths during the last quarter, both males, and both due to dementia. This period, as usual, was one of the most healthful of the year, the patients being almost entirely free from any acute illness.

The percentage of the deaths due to tuberculosis is lower this year than last, and I do not find as many cases developing the disease as formerly. I believe this to be due largely to greater care and more rigid disinfection. While we are unable, from lack of room, to isolate the tubercular patients, the next best course, that of careful disinfection, is rigidly followed out. As a matter of statistics, I have taken the average age of patients confined in the Asylum during the year and find it to be 44 years. This is twenty years younger than the average age of inmates of the Poor House for the same period, which was 64 years. The inmates of the Asylum have been well cared for during the year. The Superintendent and Matron have seen that they were well fed and comfortably clothed during health, and carefully nursed in sickness, the attendants have been kind and humane in their treatment of their charges, and everything that would tend to ameliorate the condition of these unfortunates has been carefully performed.

#### THE COUNTY POOR HOUSE.

I have made regular visits to this institution twice a week, besides a number of special visits. There were eight deaths during the year, five males and three females. The sickness here has been mostly ailments due to old age, which is to be expected when we consider the

average age of the inmates, 64 years.

There were four children born this year, all females.

The inmates have been made as comfortable as the condition of the old building would permit.

I have no recommendations to make in regard to this institution for the reason that the new building in process of construction will leave absolutely nothing to be desired. The arrangement of the rooms will allow of perfect sanitation, and the provisions for hospital rooms are unsurpassed. This county may well be proud of the new Poor House.

#### THE COUNTY JAIL.

The calls to the Jail have been quite frequent this year, probably due to a larger number of prisoners confined there.

The greater number of the cases of illness occurred soon after the prisoners were brought in and were caused by excessive use of liquor or by some chronic ailment. In a few cases I was called on to prescribe for some acute illness, which was usually light. The replacement of the old hammocks by steel bunks improved the sanitary conditions of the Jail as well as adding to the comfort of the prisoners. The Jail has been kept in a clean and sanitary condition by the Sheriff and his assistants.

#### THE WORK HOUSE.

I received one call to the Work House this year, a case of frostbit-ten feet. I have visited and inspected this place several times during the year and have always found the sanitary conditions excellent. Superintendent Abrams spares no pains in trying to make the conduct of the institution perfect. The sanitary conditions of all the county institutions, except the Poor House, have been good throughout the year, and the management of all of them have safe-guarded the health of their charges to the best of their ability.

In closing, I wish to thank the Trustees and Board of Supervisors, as well as the managements of the county institutions, for the assistance given and good will shown me in my work.

#### SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS REPORT.

Superintendent Overton offered the following report, No. 3:

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Gentlemen—It is with pleasure that I come before you to present my annual report. The conditions of the schools for the past year has been generally the most satisfactory year which I have had the honor

to supervise. Among the most potent influences which have caused these conditions are the better preparation of the teachers. Last year less than four of our teachers had never been to high school or the normal. Of those who had been to high school more than three-fourths were graduates of the four-year course. Of those who had attended the Normal, all but a very few had entered upon their second year of the work. This better grade of teachers is attracted to this county by the increased wages that many of our school boards are offering to trained teachers.

Another influence is the coming back of the old-fashioned pride in the local school. People are taking more thought of what their children are doing in the schools and are encouraging them to continue on till they complete the common school course and receive a diploma. A few years ago we only averaged about thirty diplomas a year. This year fifty-four were granted.

One of the minor incentives to better attendance is the certificate plan. In this plan, at the end of the school month a small certificate is given to the children who are not absent or tardy during that month. At the end of the school year all who have received five or more certificates are given a Certificate of Award. All of those who have been neither absent nor tardy during the school year receive a Certificate of Honor. This plan has been in force for three years and the teachers report that it is a success, and the results justify its continuance.

Another influence is the better condition of the school buildings. We are not making any monster strides in advancement along this line, but I note a healthy progress. Every district has done something, and many districts have done a great deal. The children are taking pride in these bettered surroundings and now it is the exception rather than the rule to see lewd pictures and fresh jack knife work on the houses and out-buildings. Much yet remains to be done, especially in the matter of out-buildings. School boards are not following the directions that experience has shown to be the right course. While most of the buildings are well finished outside they are generally crude in the extreme in their interiors. Often they are absolutely without light when the door, the only screen, is closed. To make these buildings what they should be they should have plenty of light through glazed windows, the interiors should be ceiled with good lumber and nicely painted. The benches should be painted and then they should receive the same attention as to cleaning that any other part of the premises should receive. When this is done the pupils will take pride in keeping them clean and wholesome.

Beginning on July 30, and continuing for ten days, we held the usual annual institute. The attendance this year was not quite as large as in previous years. This was due in a measure to the fact that many of the older teachers who had attended faithfully in past years, took trips

around the country which were very much more valuable to them than more of the school room methods. The spirit shown by the younger teachers in the work itself and in the regularity of attendance was greatly to be commended.

Agriculture has now been placed regularly in the course of study by state law, and the work has been organized so that some of the facts of elementary agriculture are so taught that this is one of the most interesting, as well as most important branches of the curriculum.

The laws of 1905 provide that a convention of the school boards shall be held annually. This was a wise provision. During the same session of the legislature a rural school inspector was provided for. One of the duties of this inspector was to attend these conventions and address the assembled school officers on topics of general interest to the schools. In Inspector L. W. Wood, the State Superintendent made a very wise selection. He is a man of broad experience and sterling common sense, and his advice to school officers is of such a practical turn that it is of the utmost value.

The convention in this county was held on January 3. The attendance was large and included not only the school clerks, but in many cases the entire school board. All but six districts were represented by some of their officers. The meeting was productive of a great deal of immediate and lasting good in the way of improvements to the buildings, and in procuring of long-needed supplies and apparatus, including supplementary reading and small dictionaries.

The inspector was in this county in May and inspected our schools. He expressed his satisfaction at the conditions he found in this county, and in the case of the school known as the "Ball Prairie School," he said this school would easily class among the best that he had visited in the state.

One result of his visit and talks to the patrons of schools is the erection of a new building at District No. 2, Winchester, and the employing of two teachers and placing the school on the State Graded School List. The district will now be entitled to special state aid from the graded school fund.

We have one other new building now nearly completed. This building is of the modern style as regards lighting and in heating and ventilation. When completed it will be one of our very best buildings and will rank with the best to be found anywhere.

In the matter of heating and ventilating, not enough is being done in some districts where conditions are favorable to installing a modern plant cheaply. In some districts a modern plant could be installed for a very few dollars, and the cost made up inside of two years in the saving of fuel. Testimony of business men who are using similar plants in this city reveals that they are saving from 25 to 33 per cent. of the fuel they formerly used in heating, yet school boards are slow

to take hold of this.

During the past few years a sentiment has grown in this state which has resulted in placing the school libraries on a better footing. The State Superintendent has directed that all teachers receive instruction in library methods and be trained to classify their school libraries. In our county these directions were not needed, for this movement is now more than three years old with us and many of our libraries are in excellent condition already. The books are being classified and good card catalogues provided. This makes a library usable and in a large measure dispenses with an expensive set of encyclopedia, as all of the information that is needed is to be found in the school library if some means is only at hand to get at this information when it is wanted. This the card catalogue does.

Your honorable body, at the March session, put this county in the way of having the very best catalogue of the books in the school district libraries in this state by providing an elegant case and material for cataloging the libraries. Our scheme has received very much favorable comment from those who are skilled in library work. And I feel justly proud that Winnebago County should lead in the state in this matter, as well as in many others.

In conclusion I beg leave to express my appreciation to your honorable body for much help and many kind favors, both to the schools in my charge and to me personally.

## POOR AND POOR FARM COMMITTEE REPORT.

Supervisor Dunham offered Report No. 4, as follows:

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Gentlemen—According to a resolution passed March 9, 1906, instructing the Committee on Poor and Poor Farm to procure plans and specifications for building a new Poor House at the County Farm, beg leave to report that they notified the three leading architects of Winnebago County and received plans from two, and your committee decided to adopt the plans of Wm. Waters.

Your committee further report that on the seventh day of April they advertised in the Daily Northwestern and Neenah Times for bids for building the new home.

Your committee met on the 26th of April and opened the bids, six in all, and decided to accept the bid of Anton Nielsen of Neenah, for \$48,910; addition to chimneys, \$80.

And the bid of W. S. Patterson Company of Appleton for plumbing, which was the lowest bid of five, for \$2,474.

Your committee decided to reject all bids for the heating and re-advertise for the same, which they did on the 6th of June, and opened the same on the 18th of June and adopted the bid of Dickershien Company, which was the lowest, for \$8,429.

Your committee received three bids for wiring, but did not consider the lowest bid of \$246 because there was no certified check, as advertised, but accepted the bid of P. S. Bixby of Oshkosh, the next lowest, for \$300.

Total, \$60,193, without the architect fees.

Your committee decided they would have to get busy. They have sold old material, as follows:

Your committee was notified that they would have to put new sills and floor in the creamery, and they decided it would be better to furnish a room in the basement for a creamery, which we have made a contract for, and also a washroom and coathroom for the help, at an extra expense of \$537.90, making the total to date \$56,803.90; drawn on estimates, \$32,924; balance in fund, \$27,076.

Your committee would further report that in laying out the new building it was necessary to remove the southwest hydrant, and your committee decided that to get the best fire protection it would be better to lay the main around the building and connect with the northeast hydrant, giving a circuit and much better protection. For which your committee has made a contract with Ralph Mierswa at one dollar per lineal foot, and \$30 for putting on the old six-inch pipe line, one six-inch valve and box. As your committee learned it would take thirty or forty days to get the pipe they deemed it for the best interests of the county to let the contract at once, which they did.

Your committee would further report that they have shingled barn No. 2; also tool house and granary, and have put new treads on the old Poor House stairs.

Your committee would recommend that there be an appropriation made to furnish the new house so that we would not be obliged to move the old furniture into the new building.

Considering that it was a matter of much importance to the property owners of Winnebago County, your committee has taken the matter up carefully and thoroughly. We have corresponded with a large number of officials of the different counties in the state. We have made personal examination of the Abstract Books kept by some of the counties. We have obtained by correspondence a large amount of information tending to show the advantage of any county having an abstract office of its own. (This correspondence is herewith submitted to your honorable body.)

After careful consideration it is our opinion that it is entirely feasible and advisable that this County Board proceed to have a complete set of Abstract Books or indexes established in connection with the office of the Register of Deeds, where a complete abstract or chain of title can be furnished to any property owner by the County.

We would further recommend that as soon as practicable the office of the Register of Deeds be made a salaried office, and that provision be made for the establishment of a County Abstract office (said County Abstract office to be under the supervision and control of the County Board of Supervisors), believing that the County would receive considerable financial benefit therefrom.

## TRACT INDEX.

The Clerk read a letter from John Harrington, as follows:

Oshkosh, Wis., November 14, 1906.

To the County Board of Winnebago County:

Gentleman—I learn from the newspaper report of your proceedings yesterday that the County Board seems to contemplate the maintenance of a County Abstract office in connection with the office of Register of Deeds. As an ex-member of the County Board, a citizen and taxpayer, I ask the privilege of offering a few suggestions. It would be a matter of great expense to the County to prepare the necessary records for a reliable abstract office, which might be useless in a few years. Already bills have been before the State Legislature for the adoption of the Torrens land title system in some form in this State, and without doubt such a measure will be presented at the coming session of the Legislature.

It would seem to me much more advisable for the County Board to instruct the members of the Legislature from this County to use their best efforts to secure the adoption of the Torrens land title system, and thus do away with the use of abstracts entirely, than to take steps to establish an abstract office.

If the Torrens system should be adopted in this State, as I think it is sure to be sooner or later, it is most likely to be adopted as an optional system, leaving it to each county to adopt it at its option by the action of the County board. We should be encumbered in that case by an expensive abstract office already paid for by the taxpayers, and we might not feel free to adopt the Torrens system.

I respectfully submit to your honorable body the advisability of looking into the merits of the Torrens system before making a large investment in a County Abstract Office.

#### FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERVISOR OF ASSESSMENTS, 1906.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Gentlemen—Pursuant to Section 8, Chapter 445, Laws of Wisconsin, for year 1901, I have the honor to present my fifth annual report.

I attended the meeting, called in February of 1906, by the State Tax Commission, for a conference on the subject of taxation, and for the instruction of the County Supervisor.

The Commission is composed of three able men, who are making a study of the tax system. Much valuable information is received at these annual meetings. The Supervisor of Assessments is the connecting link between the local Assessors and the Commission. If this office had not been created the Commission would not have the influence over the local Assessors that it now has. It would be impracticable for the Commission to call together at Madison, the several hundred Assessors of the State of Wisconsin, but under the present system much valuable information is conveyed from the Commission to the local assessor by the Supervisor of Assessments, who is authorized by law to call a meeting in April of each year, of the local Assessors of the County.

I called the annual meeting of the Assessors of the County in April, and am pleased to say that all the Assessors of the County were present. In addition to the information and knowledge gained, there is a great gain in the improved spirit of "Good Government" in the desire to comply with the intent of the law.

I regret that the cities of this county do not adopt that portion of

the general charter which provides that the Supervisors shall be members of the Boards of Review. If the Supervisors were members of the Board of Review they would come in contact with the work of the Assessor and be in a better position to assist in the work of equalizing the County, and particularly in his own district. I care not what a man's profession or ability is, he may be doctor, lawyer or layman, if he is not acquainted, to some extent, with the assessment of property in the different parts of his district he can have no correct idea of the ratio of assessment to true value, taking the district as a whole.

I wish to commend the work of the Assessor of the Town of Black Wolf for the faithful discharge of the duties of his office. Upon the assurance from this office that no injustice would be done his town by a full assessment, he commenced the work of assessing on May 1, 1906, with that spirit which every good citizen should have, namely, to comply with the law. He ignored the figures of the previous assessment, also the value placed by the County Board on the town as a whole, and the result is that his valuation of the town is \$23,300 more than it was equalized at by the County Board of 1905. The work of the Assessor has placed the Supervisor of that town in a position where he does not have to ask for favors, but he can demand justice.

All of the other districts of the County show a slight gain over the 1905 assessment except the towns of Omro, Rushford, Utica, and the Village of Omro, which show a loss in the assessment of 1905. With the exception of the Village of Omro there was no reason why the assessment of those districts should be less than it was in the year 1905.

The State Tax Commission recommends two methods of testing the work of the Assessor and arriving at the true value of the real estate in each district. One method is to take the sales of parcels of property for the last three or five years in each district, compare the consideration in the deed with the assessed valuation of the same parcels, and ascertain what percentage the assessed value is to the selling value of the parcels so taken and upon such percentage applied to the assessed value of all real estate in the whole district compute the true selling value of the real estate in each district. While this method may be accurate in some counties of the State, we all know that any valuation of the real estate of this County, made on the basis of sale values without a thorough investigation and correction of the same is not correct. With few exceptions the high land in this County, outside the cities and villages, is used for farming purposes, and in most cases the owners of those farms have in connection with, and for use thereon, personal property ranging in value from \$200 to \$5,000, and in 70 per cent of the sales of farm real estate, the consideration in the instrument of conveyance includes a portion or all of the personal property kept in connection and for use on the farm. Also in the cities and villages

other things of value are sometimes included in the purchase price of the real estate, as personal property, good will, etc., and in some cases the amount in the deed is fixed by mutual consent at a larger sum than the agreeing price. Also in some cases throughout the entire County the transfer is between parent and child; in most of those sales the consideration is less than the true or market value of the property.

Should it happen that more of the last mentioned sales would take place in one district than in another, then the district having the larger number of such sales would be benefited by an equalization based on sale values as found in the deed.

The second method is for the Supervisor to inspect a number of parcels of real estate in each district, and estimate the same, compare the assessed value of the same parcels with the estimate and apply the percentage in the same manner as in the first method. The second method is the one used by me, for the reason that I consider it the fairest as between the different districts of the County.

Special form "B" of this report will show the number of parcels of real estate inspected in each district, the valuation by me, the assessment of the same, and the ratio of assessed to true value.

Table 8 shows the number of acres assessed in each district the aggregate value and the average value per acre as fixed by the Assessor and also shows the aggregate and average value per acre as fixed by me.

Tables 1 to 7 show any and all changes made in personal property in the County.

Table 9 shows the aggregate assessment and true value of all real estate, the aggregate assessed and true value of personal property, and also the aggregate assessment of real and personal property and the true value as fixed by me.

In submitting this report to you, I invite free investigation and criticism as to the methods I have employed and the conclusions I have reached in regard to the relative value of all taxable property in the County.

Following is a table showing the assessment of the year 1901, the year before this office was created, as compared with the assessment of 1906.

Rhyner does, for and in consideration of a certain sum hereinafter mentioned, agree to board, wash and mend for all prisoners who may be confined in the Jail of Winnebago County, and to furnish good, wholesome and well prepared food in sufficient quantity, for three dollars and twenty-five cents (\$3.25) per week of twenty-one meals, and all parts of the week or day. The board to be computed on the same basis of twenty-one to make a week's board, and in no case to charge for more meals than are actually furnished; and said Joachim G. Rhyner agrees to keep the register so as to show the hour of taking in and out of all prisoners.

It is further agreed that no bills shall be presented to the County Board for articles used in the preparation of food for said prisoners, nor in doing the mending and washing for the same; and it is further agreed by and between the said County of Winnebago and said Joachim G. Rhyner, that said County of Winnebago shall provide all heat and light for said Jail, Sheriff's residence, including fuel for cooking purposes for said jail and residence.

For and in consideration of the faithful performance of the above agreement by said Joachim G. Rhyner the County of Winnebago agrees



to cause to be paid to said Joachim G. Rhyner the sum of three dollars and twenty-five cents (\$3.25) per week, as above stated.

Gentlemen—Pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 290, General Laws of 1895, and amendments thereto, known as the "Work House Law," we have the honor to submit the following report for the year ending October 31, 1906:

In doing so we are pleased to note that during the year just closed nothing has occurred to detract from nor lessen the practical usefulness of the County Work House. The local management, under the experienced guidance of the Superintendent and Matron, Mr. and Mrs. Abrams, who have been at the helm from its inception to the present time, has been a sure guidance of success. They have never for a moment relaxed their zeal and faithfulness to duty. By firmness and watchful care, complete discipline, cleanliness, humane treatment and

sanitation have been maintained, all aiding in the conclusion that the Work House has been and will be a continuous blessing to the taxpayers of the County, a panacea for and a protection from the "tramp nuisance" which menaced the County prior to its installation in 1896.

Your committee would further report that they have considered the report of County Treasurer Benj. Your committee further report that they have examined the proposal of the different banks referred to them and recommend the following resolution:

Resolved, By the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County that the proposal submitted by the German National Bank of Oshkosh, being the most advantageous of the several proposals submitted, be and the same is hereby accepted, and the German National Bank of Oshkosh is designated as the County Depository.

The following is a copy of said proposal, viz:

The German National Bank will receive on deposit the funds or moneys belonging to the County of Winnebago, Wisconsin, as made from time to time during the year 1907, and allow interest on daily balances at the rate of three and one-eighth (3 $\frac{1}{8}$ ) per cent. per annum, the same to be computed monthly and placed to the credit of the County at the end of each month; the said funds or moneys so on deposit to be held subject to draft and payment at all times on demand, and to furnish as security any bond to the County required by law.

We furthermore agree to make no charge to the County or to the Treasurer for any exchange on drafts received or remitted, nor any collection charges on checks of the County or its Treasurer.

We furthermore offer the services of our bank experts, if desired at any time to examine or verify the books of the County Treasurer, or otherwise, and the County Board or its Treasurer, in any way relating to its financial affairs connected with its treasury.

Your committee further report that the bond of said German National bank as such depository, be fixed at the penal sum of \$200,000, the same as the bond of the County Treasurer. We would further recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

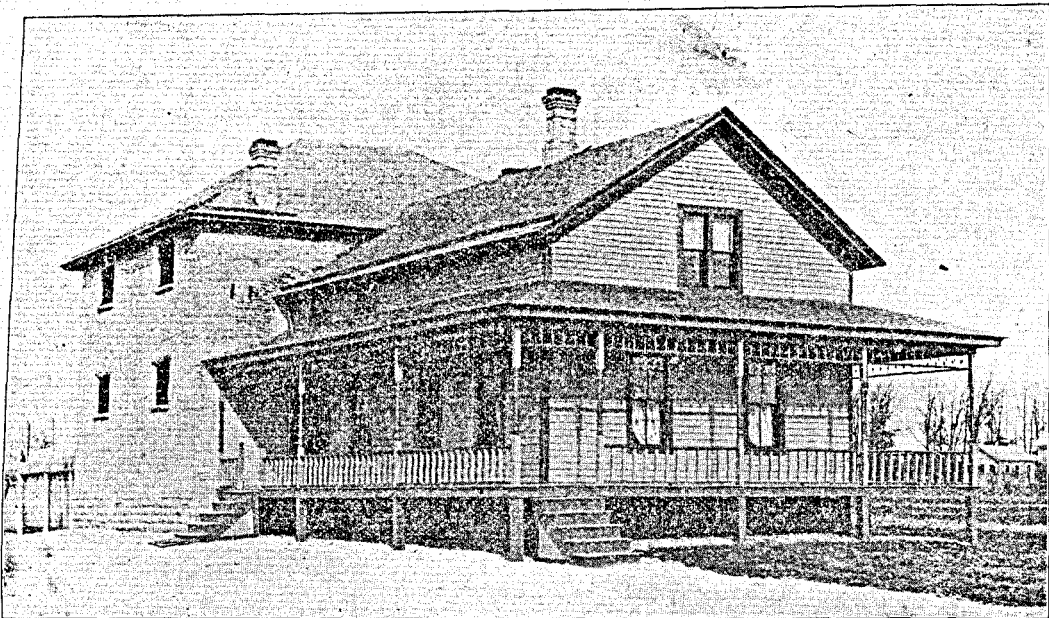
Be it resolved, By the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County that the County Treasurer be required to furnish as surety on his official bond some surety company of good standing, and that the commission of such company for such bond be paid out of the general fund in the County Treasury.

Your committee further report that after advertising for bids for furnishing bonds for the County Treasurer, and after examining the several bids received, that they would recommend the passage of the following resolution:

Be it resolved, That a special committee composed of the Chairman of the County Board, and not less than two additional members, enter into a contract with Bond Agent D. E. McDonald, he being the lowest bidder, the bid being \$59.50.

Your committee would also respectfully recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Be it resolved, By the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County that all bonds furnished by County officials, in accordance with the resolution of

BRIDGE AT EUREKA.

Supervisor Ellis offered Report No. 20, as follows:

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Gentlemen—Your Committee on Roads and Bridges, to whom was referred the petition of the Board of Supervisors of the Town of Rushford, County of Winnebago, which petition represents that said town has voted to repair the bridge across the Fox river, said bridge being located in the Village of Eureka, in said town, and that the cost of said repairs to said bridge will exceed one-eighth of one per cent of all the taxable property in said Town of Rushford, according to the last equalized valuation thereof; and that said town has provided for the payment of one-half the cost of said repairs, to-wit: The sum of one thousand dollars, that being one-half the cost of said repairs, as appears

from the said petition, your committee respectfully report that the Town of Rushford has complied with all requirements of law in providing for the cost of said repairs, and that the County is under legal obligation to provide for one-half the cost of the repairs to said bridge; and

Whereas, Your committee, upon investigating and getting further estimates, find that one-half the cost of said repairs will be in excess of the amount petitioned for; therefore your committee respectfully recommends that the sum of fifteen hundred dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary to defray one-half the cost of the repairs to said bridge be appropriated for such purposes with the proviso that five hundred dollars of said amount be not disbursed for the purpose aforesaid until the Town of Rushford has made provision for the payment of such additional five hundred dollars on its part, as required by law.

Your committee further recommends that the Chairman of the Board appoint two commissioners from towns exclusive of the Town of Rushford, and subject to the payment of their proportional parts of said appropriation, who shall act for and on behalf of the County in the disbursement of such appropriation, for the following towns and villages, to wit: Algoma, Black Wolf, Wolf River, Winchester, Clayton, Menasha, Neenah, Vinland, Winneconne, Winneconne Village, Poygan, Omro, Omro Village, Rushford, Oshkosh, Nepeuskun, Utica and Nekimi.

In order to provide for the Poor and Poor Farm Improvement Fund for the ensuing year your committee recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, By the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, that the sum of twelve thousand five hundred dollars (\$12,500) be and is hereby apportioned as a Poor and Poor Farm Improvement Fund for the year of 1907, and is hereby levied and assessed upon taxable property of Winnebago County as a County tax.

Your committee would further recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, By the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, that the sum of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500) be and is hereby appropriated as a Poor and Poor Farm Working Fund, and is hereby levied and assessed upon the taxable property of Winnebago County as a County tax for the year of 1906.

#### PAYMENT OF SHERIFF'S BILLS.

In order to provide for the payment of Sheriff's bills for board of prisoners for the ensuing year, it is recommended that the Chairman and Clerk of this County Board be and are hereby instructed and authorized to draw county orders from time to time, as bills may be presented, for two-thirds of amounts of said bills as now allowed and paid by the Sheriff of Winnebago County.

#### CONTINGENT POOR FUND.

Your committee recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, By the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, that the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200) be and the same is hereby apportioned as a contingent fund for Winnebago County. The Chairman and Clerk are hereby authorized to draw orders on said fund whenever it shall be for the interest of the County to do so, the Chairman to report annually to this Board all expenditures from such fund.

Your committee would further recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, By the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, that the Chairman of this Board and the Treasurer be and are hereby instructed to borrow in the name of, and, for Winnebago County, from time to time, such sums of money as may be necessary to meet the indebtedness of the County, upon the best terms possible as to rate of interest, and for the payment of such loans to issue notes in their official capacity, for which the County of Winnebago will be responsible.

Your committee would further report that in compliance with the Revised Statutes of Wisconsin, 1898, they have compared county orders issued and remaining uncalled for by the payee in the County Clerk's office, for two years, with descriptive list, as furnished this Board by the County Clerk, giving the amount, date, and to whom issued, and find same correct.

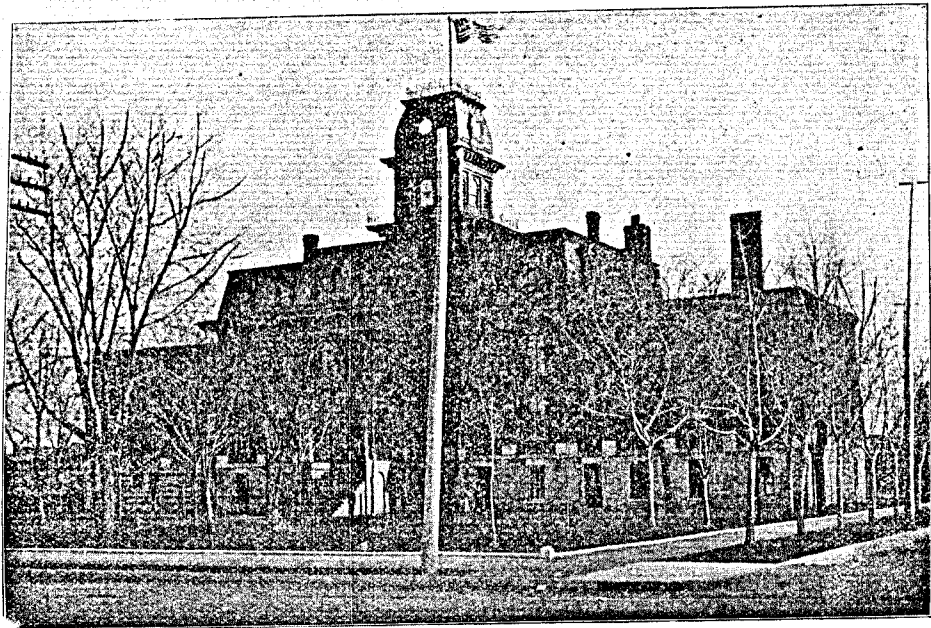

### COUNTY AGRICULTURAL SCHOOL.

Supervisor Joseph J. Nigl introduced the following resolution, No. 2:

Whereas, The subject of scientific agriculture is receiving more and more attention from year to year both by the National and State Governments, and has engrossed the attention of the leading economists of our country as being one of our leading questions of to-day; therefore be it

Resolved, That it is the sense of this body that the interests of Winnebago County would be greatly promoted and the prosperity of our greatest industry increased by the establishment of a County Agricultural School; and to this end be it further

Resolved, That a committee of three be appointed to gain all necessary information regarding the cost of maintaining, cost of installing, number of students served, quality of the student body, rate on the dollar of taxation, and any other information that they may deem necessary to report in order that this body may act intelligently on the question of the feasibility of establishing a County School of Agriculture in Winnebago County.

Present, full Board.

Accounts were presented and referred to appropriate committees.

**REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON POOR AND POOR FARM.**

C. A. Dunham offered the following Report, No. 1:

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Gentlemen—Your Committee on Poor and Poor Farm, to whom was referred the matter of the erection and completion of a new home at the County Farm for Winnebago County, beg leave to report on said matter to date as follows:

That for many years the old building has been in a very dilapidated condition and unfit for the use of the County. It had on several occasions been examined and inspected by the State Board of Control and pronounced unfit for the purpose intended. Your committee was informed by the State Board that they had brought the matter before former members of the County Board and were promised that steps would be taken to remedy the conditions.

Your committee, as well as the County Board, will remember the visit of ex-Chairman Gustav Kustermann, who was then chairman of the State Board of Control and the notice that he gave us not to compel the State Board to condemn the old building and leave a blot on our

County, and the beautiful tribute he gave our County, which is free from blot and graft.

At the March session, 1906, of the County Board, a resolution, No. 4, recommending the erection of a new home at the County Farm was adopted by a vote of 31 for, 6 against, absent, 2.

At the same session a resolution was adopted instructing the Poor and Poor Farm Committee to proceed and procure plans and specifications for the erection of a new building at a cost not to exceed fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000), and to select plans therefor suitable to the needs of the County.

At the same session a resolution was adopted authorizing the County Treasurer and Chairman of the County Board to borrow such sums of money as they deemed necessary for the erection and construction of said new home at such time or times as it may be needed, not to exceed fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000), at a rate of interest not to exceed 5 per cent. per annum, and be payable as near as may be in installments of \$5,000 or more per year until paid.

Your committee accepted the plans and specifications submitted to the Board March 5, drawn by William Waters, and also appointed him superintendent

Your committee further report that they, on the 7th day of April, did advertise for bids and met on the 26th day of April and opened the same—17 in all. As the bids were so high your committee decided that they could not build the building within the appropriation. They decided to ask the chairman to call a special session of the Board, which he did and the matter was laid before the board and discussed pro and con and a resolution offered by Dunham, Chairman of the committee, asking for an additional appropriation of \$10,000.00, which was granted May 9, 1906.

Your committee met on the 10th day of May and let the contract for the main structure to

The heating plan, to heat from the County Asylum, did not meet with the approval of your committee so they decided to readvertise for bids and heat with boilers in basement, which they did on the 6th day of June, and met on the 18th day of June and opened the same—five in all—and let the contract to the Durkershein Heating and Ventilating Co. for the sum of \$8,429.00.

Supervisor Arnemann and myself took the plans to Madison and laid them before the State Board of Control, and they were approved by them.

Your committee would further report that as the plans for the main structure were drawn to heat from the Asylum, there was no use for

a chimney, and none was provided; so when the plans were made to put the boilers in the new building a chimney had to be provided, which was done and a contract made with Antone Neilson for \$238.00.

As the heating plans showed the chimney to be made outside of the building and our contract called for it to be made inside, it compelled the heating contractor to change the bricking for the boilers, for which he has presented a bill for \$56.00, which has not been allowed as yet, which is the only change made in the building since the contract was let, for which any bill has been presented.

Your committee would further report that they advertised for and received three bids for the furnishing and installing in the County Asylum, one engine and dynamo, and connecting same with the new home for lighting purposes. Your committee did not accept the lowest bid on this job, which was \$1,935.00, but accepted the next lowest, of P. S. Bigsby for \$1,940.00. Your committee also let P. S. Bigsby the contract to furnish the fixtures for \$300.00.

Your committee further report that they received from each contractor a good and sufficient bond for the faithful performance of work on contracts. All bonds were approved by District Attorney Carl D. Jackson.

Your committee would further report that in locating the new building they were obliged to remove one hydrant at the end of the main, and for the protection of the building your committee decided to extend the water main around the building and connect with the water main in front of the old Poor House and locate two hydrants, one at the southwest and one at the northwest corner of the new building. We also put in three valves, which was done at a total cost of \$975.00.

We also bought 1,000 feet of hose, nozzles, and wracks for the same, at a cost of \$213.13.

Your committee would further report that they were notified by the butter maker at the farm that we would have to put in new floors and sills in the creamery. Your committee decided that it would be advisable to locate the creamery in the basement of the new building, as we had plenty of room, which was done at a cost to date of \$537.90.

At this time Superintendent Appley notified the committee that there was no provision made for slop-hoppers and they could not get along without them, and we made a contract with the plumber to put them in at a cost of \$450.00.

Your committee would further report that they have bought and had delivered at the new home furniture needed from a list furnished by Superintendent Appley, but as his list covered only about one-half that was needed it was a hard proposition for the committee to furnish the building within the appropriation.

Your committee would further report that they have disposed of the old building, of which a part was sold to Antone Neilson for



\$1,577.60, and the balance to William Gruenwald for \$500, a total of \$2,077.00 for the old building.

Your committee further report that our contract called for the completion of the building by the first of December, 1906, but there has been much delay in completing the building and the contractor cannot finish the front porch until the old building is torn down; aside from this it is practically done, but has not been accepted by your committee.

Superintendent Appley moved into the new building February 23, 1907, nearly three months after the specified time.

Your committee feel in voicing the statement made at the last visit to the new home of Mr. Kustermann. He said we had the best alms house in the State. We have the building, and that will speak for itself and be a credit to Winnebago County.

#### AGRICULTURAL SCHOOL.

Supervisor Manuel offered the following Report No. 2:

To the Honorable, the County Board of Winnebago County:

Gentlemen—Your Special Committee, to whom was referred the matter of ascertaining the feasibility of establishing a County School of Agriculture for Winnebago County, beg leave to report as follows:

We have gathered all the literature possible that was published by the schools now in operation in this State, and have written to the heads of the schools and to others who were interested in the establishment and operation of these schools.

Your committee visited the Marathon Country Agricultural School at Wausau on February 14. This school was selected as being the school that was founded under conditions most nearly conforming to those existing in this County. The school is established in a brick building 42x96 feet, two stories high, with a high basement. The entire second floor of this building is used for a County Training School, leaving the first floor and the basement to be used for the Agricultural School. A wing in the rear accommodates a boiler room, a blacksmith shop and a conservatory.

Without going into details, we visited and inspected the library, which is excellent; the Domestic Science Department, the Manual Training Department and the Laboratory of Agricultural Science. Besides the departments named each instructor teaches some one of the academic branches of the common school course.

The work that is being done in this school impressed the members of your committee as being practical, adapted to the ability of the students, thorough, and of such a nature as to afford the most excellent mental discipline to the boys and girls attending. The course of study in all departments has been planned with a great deal of care, and everything has a bearing on some phase of work on the farm, thus the boys and girls are educated toward the farm instead of away from it.

We found the students to be composed of all classes, from the rich man's son, who is being given a common sense education, to the poor boy who is working his way through the school. The middle class predominates. The same is true of the girls, though many of the

Wausau girls are students.

The attitude of the people in Marathon County has changed as the working of the school became better known and the results were shown up, from one of utter indifference, and, in many cases, of actual antagonism, to a condition where now the large majority of the people of the County would consider it a calamity if they were to be deprived of the school.

The enrollment of the school is now near 70, and the Principal informed us that they had enough bona fide applications for admission to bring the enrollment up to 100 next year. This is about as large a number as three teachers can handle to the best advantage. We did not get the ages of the students at Marathon County School, but at the Dunn County School the ages of the boys averaged 19½ years, and that of the girls about 17 years. This is about the same as those at the school visited.

On February 21 the committee visited the Webster Manual Training School at Omro. In this school we found work being carried on along similar lines in Manual Training and Domestic Science to those found in the Agricultural School, but under greatly different conditions. In this school the student body served has a greater difference in ages, also the purpose they have in view is greatly different, as in this school the work is carried along with an Academic and High School course. The building is exceedingly well planned and has an excellent equipment.

From figures obtained at Wausau, both from the printed reports and from those who placed the school in operation, we have found that the cost of placing such a school in operation would not exceed \$30,000. This would include a building and equipment, and about ten acres of land, all to be purchased outright by the County.

In both Marathon and Dunn counties the yearly cost of maintenance is about \$6,000. For last year (1905-6) the cost in Marathon County was: Salaries, \$4,100; all other expenses brought the total up to \$6,120.66. In Dunn County the cost was: Salaries, \$4,099.33, and other expenses brought the cost up to \$6,068.47.

After a county has established and maintained a School of Agriculture for at least eight months to the satisfaction of the State Department of Education then the State returns two-thirds of the cost of maintaining the school up to a limit by the State of \$4,000. Thus the cost to the taxpayers of the two Counties mentioned has been \$2,000.

In Dunn County the rate has been 20 cents on each \$1,000 of taxable property. This on a valuation of \$10,500,000. Marathon County, with a valuation of about \$20,000,000, has a rate of about 10 cents, and Winnebago County raising the same amount for maintenance would have to pay on each thousand dollars of taxable property the sum of

four cents. In Dunn County they are using their figures to show how insignificant the cost of the school shows up in their tax budget.

Your committee has received very favorable propositions from the Village of Omro and the Village of Winneconne offering sites and other inducements to the County if the school is located in their district. These propositions we have appended and made a part of this report.

Your committee has also received a memorial passed at a meeting of the voters of Joint District No. 5, of the Town and Village of Omro requesting the County Board to establish a County School of Agriculture and Domestic Economy for Winnebago County.

We, your committee, after investigating the matter as thoroughly as our limited time would permit, would respectfully report that in our opinion the establishment of a School of Agriculture and Domestic Economy in Winnebago County is entirely within the bounds of feasibility and would recommend the establishment of such a school in this County. To this end we would respectfully offer the following resolution:

Resolved, That a County School of Agriculture and Domestic Economy be established in Winnebago County under the requirements of Chapter 238, of the Laws of 1901, and amended by Chapter 143, of the Laws of 1903; and, be it further

Resolved, That the cost of establishing, location and such other details as are not already provided for by law, or by the terms of this resolution, be settled by this board.

Supervisor Kenny asked for the financial condition of the County.

Hon. E. R. Hicks again addressed the members of the Board in reference to Good Roads movement and Abstract matter.

Supervisor Arnemann asked to be excused on account of the death of his mother. Request granted.

On motion adjourned.

#### TRACT INDEX.

Supervisor Ream offered the following Report, No. 4:

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Gentlemen—Your Special Committee, appointed at the March session, 1906, to investigate and report at the November session, 1906, upon the advisability of Winnebago County establishing a Tract Index or Chain of Title System in connection with the Register of Deeds' office of Winnebago County, and said committee having made a favorable report, which said report was adopted by the County Board, and the committee re-appointed with authority to advertise for bids for establishing said Abstract or Chain of Title System, and was to report at the January session, 1907, hereby respectfully report:

Said committee not having had sufficient time, asked for time for making this report to be extended to the March session, 1907.

Your committee respectfully report that they advertised for bids, which said bids were received with plans and specifications for doing said work, four bids in all being received. The bid of Henry J. Weeks was \$13,000, the bid of Ralph Adams was \$16,000, the bid of Donald Boyd was \$16,000; the bid of the Greenlaw-Thomas Abstract Co. was for the entire business, \$50,000; for one complete set of Tract Index Books was \$28,000; for one set of Tract Index Books only containing volume and page, \$20,000, each bidder furnishing system and specifications.

Your committee not being satisfied with the systems and specifica-

tions received, upon further investigation and information from expert abstractors, formalized a system which, in their opinions, is necessary to establish a thorough system of abstracting by Winnebago County.

Said bidders were notified of the changes in the system and specifications and the matter was again taken up with said bidders.

All bids worthy of consideration, together with plans and specifications for same are herewith submitted.

The bid of Henry J. Weeks is \$13,000, including all material used in compiling said Chain of Title System, with books bound with the Demy patent binder, a sample of which said binding is herewith submitted.

Your committee have also had under consideration another petition of W. F. Gruenewald for the cancellation of Tax Certificate No. 176, sale of 1905, amount \$3.04, covering the north 100 feet of lot 1, and the north 100 feet of the west 10 feet of lot 2, block 16, in the Third ward, City of Oshkosh, for the reason that said property at the time of the assessment was church property, and what is known as the Benai Israel Jewish church on Ninth street, and exempt from taxation, being used for religious purposes only.

Your committee on examination of the premises and upon an examination having been made of the title to said land, find that it is owned by the Congregation Benai Israel, a religious society of Oshkosh, and used for church purposes, and on further investigation find that the tax levied and covered by said tax certificate is a tax for special improvement, being for the repair of sidewalk in front of and adjacent to the land described in said certificate and also for sprinkling in front of said premises and that said tax is a legal tax and a lien upon the real estate until paid. And we recommend that the prayer of the petitioner be denied.

Your committee have also had under consideration the petition of W. F. Gruenewald for the cancellation of Tax Certificate No. 382, sale of 1906, amount \$18.74, covering lot thirty-six (36), John Smith's second addition, Thirteenth ward, City of Oshkosh, for the reason that the assessment of said lot was placed on the assessment roll twice, and therefore is a double assessment.

#### EUREKA BRIDGE.

Supervisor Heffron offered Report No. 16, as follows:

To the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Gentlemen—Your Committee on the Eureka Bridge beg leave to report that they have performed the duties assigned to them, in the rebuilding and repairing of said bridge, and said bridge has been completed except in one particular. viz.: that the contractor, in making his estimate on the material for said bridge, made a mistake in the measurements of some of the stringers in the approach to said bridge, and when the material arrived it was found that it would be necessary to lengthen the aforesaid stringers. This necessitated the contractor securing further material, and at the time your committee met this material had not been received, and the bridge is not entirely completed in this one respect.

The contract was let to the Wisconsin Bridge and Iron Works for \$3,500, and the amount appropriated by the County of Winnebago at its November session, 1906, was the sum of \$1,500, this being one-half of the estimated cost of the rebuilding of said bridge.

Upon the contract being let and a further estimate being made, your committee found that the estimate of \$3,000 was not sufficient to complete the said bridge, and your committee let the contract for the rebuilding of the said bridge to said Wisconsin Bridge and Iron Company for the sum of \$3,500.

Whereas, the Town of Rushford has done everything necessary to entitle it to the appropriation from the County of Winnebago, and the County of Winnebago by law is liable for one-half of the cost of said work, and as the cost of said work exceeded the aforesaid estimate by the sum of \$500, it will be necessary for your honorable body to appropriate a further sum of \$250, the same being one-half of the amount necessary to complete said bridge in excess of the estimated price of \$3,000.

Your committee would therefore recommend that the County Board of Supervisors appropriate a further sum of \$250 for the purpose of completing the aforesaid contract, out of any monies not otherwise appropriated, and the same charged to the several towns and villages as set forth in the petition presented to this Board.

#### AGRICULTURAL SCHOOL.

Supervisor Frees offered Resolution No. 6, as follows:

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Whereas, The County Board voted to establish an Agricultural and Manual Training School at Winneconne, and as provided by Chapter 288, of the laws of 1901, as amended by Chapter 143, of the laws of 1903, the County Board is to elect two (2) members, not members of the County Board, to serve on the school committee, and that these two (2) members, elected by the County Board, as aforesaid, and the County Superintendent of Schools; whoever he may be, constitute what is termed a County School Board, which board is to superintend all details connected with the construction and establishment of the County Agricultural School and with the proper running of said school when it has been established, and

Whereas, Under the present law there is no provision made for compensating the members of said committee, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the two (2) members of the County School Board, elected by this body, be paid for every day of actual work performed by them as such board, and that they be paid the same per diem and in the same manner as paid for other committees appointed by the County Board.

## AGRICULTURAL SCHOOL

Supervisor Ganzer offered Resolution No. 7, as follows:

Resolved, By the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, that the County School Board of this County be and they are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to build on the site to be selected in or adjacent to the Village of Winneconne in this County, a County School of Agriculture and Domestic Economy. Be it further

Resolved, That said County School Board be and they are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to prepare or cause to be prepared plans and specifications and to let contracts for the building and erection of said County School of Agriculture and Domestic Economy, and they are hereby directed, empowered and authorized to perfect proper plans and specifications for the erection of said County School of Agriculture and Domestic Economy, including the heating, lighting, ventilating, furnishing and equipping thereof, and they are authorized, directed and empowered to advertise for and receive bids for the full completion of said work and to secure the erection, construction and completion of said County School of Agriculture and Domestic Economy in accordance with said plans and specifications, and they are authorized and directed to enter into and execute any and all necessary contracts therefor, and for the securing of an architect for the supervision of said work. Be it further

Resolved, That said committee be given full power to carry out the purpose of this resolution, and to build, construct, equip and organize said School of Agriculture and Domestic Economy, it being understood, however, that the cost of said building, when completed, including heating, lighting, ventilating, equipment, site and architect's fees shall not exceed the sum of \$31,000. Be it further

Resolved, That the County Treasurer and the chairman of this Board be and they are hereby authorized and instructed to borrow such sums of money as they deem necessary for the purpose of the erection and construction of said County School of Agriculture and Domestic Economy at such time and times as it may be needed, not to exceed the sum of \$25,000, at a rate of interest not to exceed five per cent. per annum, and to be payable as nearly as may be in installments of five thousand dollars or more per year until paid, at the office of the County Treasurer; that said Chairman and County Treasurer in their official capacity shall issue and execute proper notes for the amounts that they shall borrow, and that the County of Winnebago shall be responsible for the same; that there shall be levied and collected annually upon the taxable property of said County a sum sufficient to meet the interest on said notes as they become due, and also to pay and discharge the principal thereof as it becomes due. Be it further

Resolved, That orders be drawn by the County Clerk and the Chairman of this Board to pay for the construction and erection of said County School of Agriculture and Domestic Economy upon certificates therefor issued and signed by the President and Secretary of the County School Board.

Supervisor Tuttle moved that it be referred to the District Attorney. Carried.

Supervisor Tuttle offered his resignation as member of the Special



Committee on Tract Index Matter, which was not accepted, but Supervisor Arnemann was added to that committee.

District Attorney gave an opinion on the guarantee offered by the Village of Winneconne.

Remarks by Supervisors Tuttle, White and Jensen.

Supervisor Mayer moved that instead of the guarantee, a bond be taken, as offered by Supervisors White and Gunderson and Mr. Miller, guaranteeing the \$6,000. Carried.

A recess of thirty minutes was then taken to give District Attorney time to draw and have executed the bond.

#### WINNECONNE BOND.

District Attorney read the bond, which was as follows:

Know All Men by These Presents: That the Village of Winneconne as principal, and Geo. H. Miller and Merritt F. White and Peter J. Gunderson as sureties, are well and firmly bound unto the County of Winnebago in the penal sum of six thousand dollars (\$6,000) lawful money of the United States.

The condition of this obligation is such that whereas, the Village of Winneconne has agreed to appropriate to the County of Winnebago the sum of six thousand dollars in consideration of said County erecting and maintaining in or adjacent to the said village a County Agricultural School in accordance with resolutions passed by the County Board.

And, whereas, the Village of Winneconne agrees to pay said sum on demand, and it is a condition of this obligation that upon the said village paying said sum to the County Treasurer as agreed, this obligation to be null and of no force and effect.

In witness whereof the said Village of Winneconne has caused these presents to be signed by its President, and the said sureties hereto have placed their hands and seals this 9th day of March, A. D. 1907.

# RULES OF THE COUNTY BOARD.

ADOPTED NOVEMBER 13, 1906.

I. The meetings of this Board shall be held in the Supervisors' room, and the hour for the daily meetings shall be 9 A. M., providing that on the first meeting in each week the hour of meeting shall be 10 A. M.

II. At the first meeting of the Board it shall be the duty of the Chairman, or in his absence, the Clerk, to call to order.

The Clerk shall then call the roll of Members.

A quorum being present, the Board shall proceed to the election of a Chairman.

III. It shall be the duty of the Chairman to appoint the following standing committees: Equalization, Finance, General Accounts, Illegal Assessments, Justice and Constables' Accounts, Sheriff and Coroners' Accounts, Insane, Poor and Poor Farm, Work House, Corporations, Roads and Bridges, Public Buildings Printing, Per Diem and Mileage, Bonds and Salaries.

IV. The Board may adjourn for such time as shall be necessary for the Chairman to prepare the list of committees, and no business can be done until the same shall be announced.

V. The Chairman shall take the chair at the hour to which the Board may from time to time stand adjourned, call the Board to order and direct the calling of the roll of members by the Clerk.

VI. Upon the appearance of a quorum, the journal of the preceding day shall be read by the Clerk, and any mistake therein shall be corrected by the Board; provided, that upon the last day of the session, the journal for that day will be read and, before the final adjournment, corrected.

VII. After the reading and correction of the journal, the order of business shall be as follows:

1. Reception of Petitions, Memorials, Accounts, etc.
2. Presentation of Resolutions and disposition of same.
3. Reports of Standing committees.
4. Reports of Select Committees.
5. Consideration of Miscellaneous Business.

VIII. The Chairman shall preserve order and decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Board; and shall clearly and distinctly state every motion or question before debate.

IX. The Chairman shall vote on all questions taken by ayes and nays, except on appeals from his own decisions; provided, that when the effect of such a vote shall be to produce a tie, the question shall be deemed to be lost; and providing that in the order of voting, his name shall be called last.

X. Every motion or amendment shall be reduced to writing when a request therefor shall be made by any member; and all petitions, memorials and substitutes shall be reduced to writing and read before they shall be considered by the Board.

XI. Every written resolution shall have attached thereto the name of the person introducing it; and when referred to a committee, the names of such committee shall be endorsed thereon.

XII. Every member, previous to speaking, shall rise and address the Chair.

XIII. When two or more members rise at once, the Chair shall designate the member who is to speak first; but in all cases the member who shall first rise and address the chair shall speak first.

XIV. No member shall speak more than twice upon the same question without leave; and when called to order by the Chairman, shall take his seat, and shall not be allowed to proceed without leave of the Board.

XV. A vote on any question shall be taken by ayes and nays when called for by five members; and shall be so taken on all questions involving the expenditure of money; and whenever a vote is so ordered and taken, the members voting in the affirmative and negative, as well as those absent or not voting, shall be recorded at length in the records of the proceedings of the County Board.

XVI. No account or claim against the county shall be audited unless it be made out in items and duly verified and be filed with the Clerk of the Board, except as otherwise provided by law.

XVII. When a motion is under consideration, no motion shall be entertained except:

1. To adjourn.
2. To lay on the table.
3. For the previous question.
4. To postpone to a day certain.
5. To commit to a committee.
6. To amend or to substitute.
7. To postpone indefinitely.

These several motions shall take precedence in the order in which they stand in this rule.

XVIII. A motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, and for the previous question, shall be decided without debate, except as hereinafter provided.

XIX. A motion to postpone indefinitely or to a day certain or to commit shall not be again entertained on the same day or in the same stage of the proposition.

XX. A substitute shall be open to amendment the same as the original proposition; but when adopted, shall not be subject to amendment. If an amendment or substitute is lost, another substantially the same shall not be entertained.

XXI. When a motion or question has once been determined, any member voting with the majority may move a reconsideration of the vote, but such motion shall be made and acted on at the same or next succeeding meeting, and shall not thereafter be made except by unanimous consent.

XXII. The previous question may be moved by any member, and the Chairman shall then say: "It requiring five members to second this motion those in favor of sustaining the motion will rise." If five or more members then rise, the previous question shall thereby be seconded and an opportunity then be given to any two members opposed thereto to briefly state their objections. The question shall then be, "Shall the question be now put?" which, if carried by a vote of two-thirds of the members present upon a call of the ayes and nays, the Board shall immediately proceed to vote upon the pending amendment, if any, and upon the main question.

XXIII. In filling blanks, the largest sum and the longest time shall be first put.

XXIV. These rules shall not be changed, amended, or repealed unless the proposition or amendment is introduced in writing and the same laid over to some subsequent meeting of the Board, not less than five days intervening, and then only with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

XXV. Any of these rules may be suspended upon any pending measure by unanimous consent or by two-thirds of the members present.

XXVI. These rules and all amendments or additions thereto which may hereafter be made shall govern the Board until altered or repealed, as herein provided.

XXVII. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in "Jefferson's Manual," so far as they remain in common use and are practicable and applicable and not inconsistent herewith, shall govern the Board.

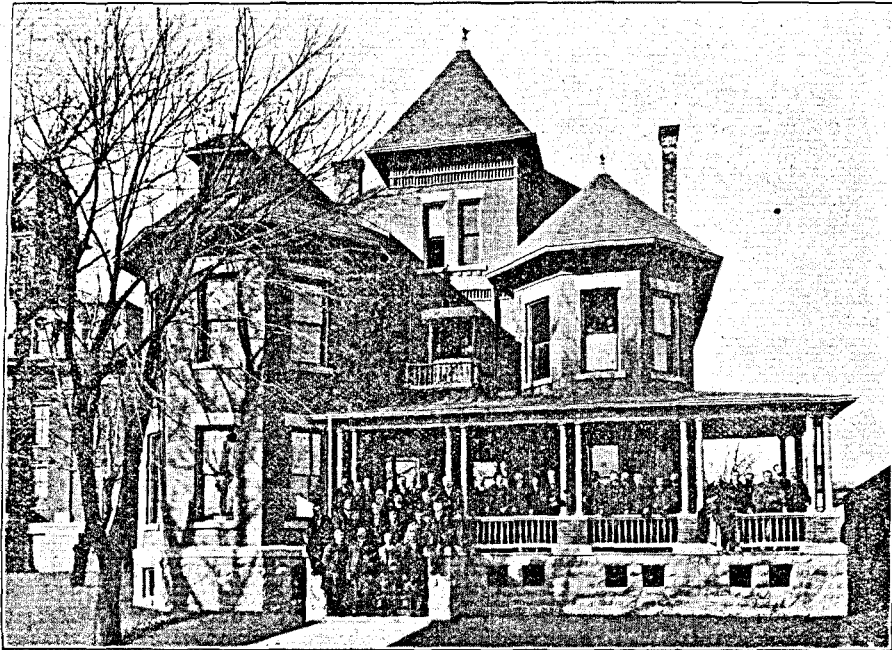
