Motion that the rules be suspended and that the clerk cast the unanimous ballot of the Board for Geo. A. Loescher. Carried. The ballot was cast and Geo. A. Loescher declared elected.

Mr. Loescher, in a few well chosen remarks upon taking the chair, thanked the members of the Board for the honor bestowed.

#### ELECTION OF VICE CHAIRMAN.

Motion that the rules be suspended and that the clerk cast the unanimous ballot of the Board for M. F. White. The ballot was cast and M. F. White was declared elected.

#### RULES.

Supervisor Voissem moved that the rules of the last supervisor year be adopted for the year 1923. Motion carried,

## RULES OF BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF WINNEBAGO COUNTY. Adopted May 5, 1923.

I. The meetings of this Board shall be held in the supervisors' room, and the hour for daily meetings shall be 10 a. m.

And the County Board shall continue in continuous session from day to day until adjourned, unless to a day certain or sine die.

II. At the first meeting of the board it shall be the duty of the chairman, or in the case of his absence the vice chairman, or in their absence,

the clerk, to call to order.

The clerk shall then call the roll of members.

A quorum being present, the Board shall proceed to the election of a chairman and vice chairman.

(Amended to provide for vice chairman as authorized by Ch. 110, of

III. It shall be the duty of the chairman to appoint the following standing committees, each to consist of the number of members as set after the name of each committee, viz:

Equalization, 9; finance, 8; general accounts, 7; illegal assessments, 5; justice and constables' accounts, 7; sheriff's and coroners' accounts, 7; insane, 3; poor and poor farm, 3; workhouse, 3; corporations, 3; public buildings, 5; roads and bridges, 5; per diem and mileage, 5; printing, 3 bonds and salaries, 5; county abstract and tract index system, 3; rules, 3; education, 3; sanatorium, 5.

IV. The Board may adjourn for such time as shall be necessary for the chairman to prepare the list of committees and no business can be done until

the same shall be announced.

V. The chairman, or in his absence, the vice chairman, shall take the chair at the hour to which the Board may from time to time stand adjourned, call the Board to order and direct the calling of the roll of members by the clerk.

VI. Upon the appearance of a quorum, the journal of the preceding day shall be read by the clerk, and any mistake therein shall be corrected by the Board; provided, that upon the last day of the session the journal for that day will be read and, before the final adjournment, corrected.

VII. After the reading and correction of the journal, the order of busi-

ness shall be as follows:

1. Reception of petitions, memorials, accounts, etc.

2. Presentation of resolutions and disposition of same.

3. Reports of standing committees.

4. Reports of select committees.

5. Consideration of miscellaneous business.

VIII. The chairman shall preserve order and decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Board; and shall clearly and distinctly state every motion or question before debate.

IX. The chairman shall be entitled to vote on all questions taken by ayes and noes, and his name shall be called last; when the vote on any ques-

tion is a tie, it shall be deemed to have been lost.

X. Every motion or amendment shall be reduced to writing when a request therefor shall be made by any member; and all petitions, memorials and substitutes shall be reduced to writing and read before they shall be considered by the Board.

XI. Every written resolution shall have attached thereto the name of the person introducing it; and when referred to a committee, the names of

such committees shall be endorsed thereon.

XII. Every member, previous to speaking, shall rise and address the

XIII. When two or more members rise at once, the chair shall designate the member who is to speak first; but in all cases the member who shall first rise and address the chair shall speak first.

XIV. No member shall speak more than twice upon the same question without leave; and when called to order by the chairman shall take his seat, and shall not be allowed to proceed without leave of the Board.

A vote on any question shall be taken by ayes and nays when called for by any member; and SHALL be so taken on all questions involving the expenditure of money; and whenever a vote is so ordered and taken, the members voting in the affirmative and negative, as well as those absent or not voting, shall be recorded at length in the records of the proceedings of the County Board.

(Amended to conform to Sec. 709, Stat. of 1898.)

XVI. No account or claim against the county shall be audited unless it be made out in items and duly verified and be filed with the clerk of the Board, except as otherwise provided by law.

XVII. When a motion is under consideration, no motion shall be entertained except:

To adjourn.

To lay on the table.

- 3. For the previous question.
- 4. To postpone to a day certain. 5. To commit to a committee.
- 6. To amend or to substitute.

To postpone indefinitely

These several motions shall take precedence in the order in which they stand in this rule.

XVIII. A motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, and for the previous question, shall be decided without debate, except as hereinafter provided.

XIX. A motion to postpone indefinitely or to a day certain or to commit shall not be again entertained on the same day or in the same stage of the proposition.

XX. A substitute shall be open to amendment the same as the original proposition; but when adopted, shall not be subject to amendment. If an amendment or substitute is lost, another substantially the same shall not be entertained.

XXI. When a motion or question has once been determined, any member voting with the majority may move a reconsideration of the vote, but such motion shall be made and acted on at the same or next succeeding meeting, and shall not thereafter be made except by unanimous consent.

XXII. The previous question may be moved by any member, and the chairman shall then say: "It requiring five members to second this motion, those in favor of sustaining the motion will rise." If five or more members then rise, the previous question shall thereby be seconded and an opportunity then be given to any two members opposed thereto to briefly state their objections. The question shall then be: "Shall the question be now put?" which, if carried by a vote of two-thirds of the members present upon a call of the ayes and nays, the Board shall immediately proceed to vote upon the pending amendment, if any, and upon the main question.

XXIII. In filling blanks, the largest sum and the longest time shall be first put.

These rules shall not be changed, amended or repealed, unless the proposition or amendment is introduced in writing and the same laid over to some subsequent meeting of the Board, not less than five days intervening, and then only with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

XXV. Any of these rules may be suspended upon any pending measure by unanimous consent or by two-thirds of the members present.

XXVI. These rules and all amendments or additions thereto which may hereafter be made shall govern the Board until altered or repealed, as herein provided.

XXVII. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in "Jefferson's Manual," so far as they remain in common use and are practicable and applicable and not inconsistent herewith, shall govern the Board.

XXVIII. Whenever the Board shall have gone into a committee of the whole and shall have arisen, the Board shall at once be in session for the receiving and acting upon the report of the committee of the whole, and for the transaction of any and all other business of every kind.

XXIX. No resolution for the appropriation for money shall be in order until the day after its presentation and reference, except upon the consent

of two-thirds of the members of the County Board present.

Supervisor Jourdain moved that a recess of thirty minutes be taken to give the chairman time to select the standing committees. Motion carried.

### TRANSFER OF COUNTY FUNDS FROM THE GENERAL FUND TO THE MENASHA-APPLETON ROAD FUND FOR RE-CONSTRUCTION OF HIGHWAY.

Resolved, by the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin: Whereas, this County Board, by resolution adopted at a November, 1922, session, appropriated the sum of \$10,000 00 for repairing the Menasha-Appleton road for a distance of 3,000 feet at and adjacent to Gmeiners' Corners immediately south of the city of Appleton; and

Whereas, the road and bridge committee of the county, upon investigation, find it necessary to reconstruct said 3,000 feet of road of concrete,

which would involve an expenditure of \$18,000.00; now, therefore,

Resolved, that the county road and bridge committee be and they are hereby authorized and directed to proceed to reconstruct said 3,000 feet of

highway of concrete 20 feet in width.

Resolved further, that the county treasurer be and he is hereby authorized and directed to transfer from any moneys in the general fund of the county heretofore not appropriated into the fund to be known as the Menasha-Appleton road fund, and that he place therewith the said sum of \$10,000.00 heretofore appropriated for repair of said road and now in the federal maintenance fund, the same to constitute a fund of \$18,000.00 for the reconstruction of said Menasha-Appleton road.

That the building committee of the County Board be and they are hereby authorized and directed to make such alteration in the office of the county clerk as may be necessary to conveniently accommodate the county clerk, a deputy, a bookkeeper and county treasurer and facilitate the operation of the uniform system of accounting of the county at an expense not to exceed \$1,200,00, the same to be paid by the county treasurer out of any moneys in the general fund not heretofore appropriated and upon vouches properly audited by the building committee.

#### SLEIGHS TO BE THE SAME WIDTH AS WAGONS AND AUTOMOBILES.

Supervisor Grimes offered the following Resolution No. 9:

Resolved, by the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin: \*That it is the sense of this body that the roads of the county could be greatly improved for the use of vehicles of all kinds, including sleighs, by legislation providing for the widening of all sleighs to the width of wagons and automobiles.

Further, that it is the sense of this Board that a portion of the moneys received from automobile licenses and returned to the respective counties should be used for the purpose of compensating owners for the expense of widening their sleighs if such widening is necessitated by law.

Application for such license shall be made in writing by the person destring the same to the county board at the office of the county clerk not less than five days before the date of the dance and shall state the name of the person or persons conducting the any dance to which the public is ad-mitted, or conduct, establish or man-age any public dance hall, pavillon or place or premises where the dance is

to be held, the legal description of the county board, this license to be the premises on which the dance is granted upon a written application to be held, the date of the dance and to be made by person wishing to conto be held, the date of the dance and as near as possule the number of persons expected to be present; and a liceuse fee of \$10 shall be paid with each such application, the same to be paid into the county treasury, and in each case where a liceuse for a dance shall be refused, the liceuse fee so paid shall be refunded.

No person required to have such license shall conduct a dance to which the public is admitted except in the presence and under the supervision of

tounty dance supervisor.

3. No person who is the proprietor of any dance hall, or who conducts, manages, or is in charge or any dance hall or pavilion in this county, shall or pavilion in this county, shall or pavilion the use of intoxicating liquor, or the presence of any intox-icated person in such dance hall, or no the premises on which said dance hall, or on the premises on which said dance hall is situated, or the presence of any child of sixteen years of age, or less, who is not accompanied by his parent or lawful guardian.

4. Any child of the age of sixteen

years or less who is not accompanied by his or her parent or lawful guardian who shall frequent, attend or be present at any public dance or shall wrongfully misrepresent his or

shall wrongfully misrepresent his or her age shall be guilty of a mis-demeanor and shall be punished ac-cording to the provisions of chapter 48 of the statutes regarding delin-quent children.
5. No person shall conduct any amusement park in the county of Winnebago without first obtaining from the county board of Winnebago county license to conduct said park. license to be issued on application giving name of person in charge of, and conducting, said park, stating for and conducting, said park, stating for and conducting, said park, stains for what purpose park is to be used, and accompanying this application shall be the sum of \$10, this amount being the license fee for each year, the year to end on Jan. No carnival or street fair shall be conducted in the county of Winnebago until the person wishing to con-duct such carnival or street fair shall first obtain from the county board of Winnebago county license for the first obtain from the Winnebago county license for the conducting of carnivals and street fairs. The parties wishing to fairs, and street fairs conduct carnivals and street shall, in order to obtain lic first present application to county board of Winnehore license. board of Winnebago county, on ap-plication giving names of parties es of parties carnival and wishing conduct to street fair, place where carnival or street fair is to be conducted, and by paying at the time of filing application \$8 for each day that carnival or street fair is to operate.

7. No person shall conduct a bathing beach in the county of Winnebago until the same has been licensed by

after one o'clock a. m.

10. Nothing in this act shall be construed to prevent the attendance of children under 16 years of age at

bathing beaches.

11. This ordinance shall not apply to any duly incorporated city or village which has by ordinance provided for the licensing and regulation of dances, dance halls, amusement parks, carnivals, bathing beaches and places of amusement.

12. Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordi-nance shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$25 or more than \$200 or by imprisonment in the county jall for not less than thirty days or more than six months, and for a second con-

viction of any violation of this ordinance the court shall revoke the license of the person so convicted.

13. This ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage and publication.

In relation to the Oshkosh-Fisk road we report that we have had difficulty in getting stone, which has necessitated purchasing stone from other sources from those originally depended upon at an extra cost. We also used reinforcing steel, which is costing more than originally provided, and these items will necessitate an additional \$18,000 in order to complete the said

road to Oshkosh city limits.

In relation to the Fremont-Zittau-Winchester road, we beg leave to report that the construction of this road has involved an extra expense owing to the fact that the Rehfeldt hill was found to be composed of rock, necessitating blasting for a considerable distance and to a depth of four or five feet, which has been expensive, and in addition, the reinforcing steel, together with the stone obtained in that locality, have cost more than anticipated, which necessitates providing \$32,000 to complete this work.

# COUNTY NURSE

Mary V. McLean offered the following Report No. 15: To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin.

Gentlemen: Following is the report of Miss Wenonah Winsey's work for November and December, 1922, as shown by her records. I am unable to give a full report of Miss Winsey's work, but will give what I have found on her reports:

At Christmas time the Elks bought an artificial eye for a country school boy. Within a few weeks this eye was accidentally broken, due to a drooping of the lower lid. A short time ago I made arrangements to have the boy's eye operated on, thus drawing up the lid. and as soon as all soreness and inflammation has disappeared, we will get him another artificial

eye through some relief organization.

Miss Winsey worked until Jan. 15, 1923, and I started my work on that

date. Following is my report from that time to Nov. 1:

In submitting this report, it may be well to dwell a few moments on

the public health program:

We realize that it is the right of every child to be well when born, and it is the duty of every citizen in a community to maintain that right. We all realize that the foundation stone for a public health program is with the children for this reason—a great part of a nurse's time is spent in the school and making home calls in regard to the children.

Number of home calls made ......370

This was in regard to 583 babies, school children, expectant mothers, tuberculosis cases, and crippled children.

Shortly after I came to the county the state reeducational board held a bone clinic or clinic for crippled cases, with Dr. Gaenslen of Milwaukee as the examining physician. I was able to locate only three crippled children in the rural and village districts at that time, and two of these attended the clinic. The other one was ill at the time, so was unable to go.

One of these cases was a boy about sixteen years of age, who had his hand amputated in an accident. Since he had had only fifth grade work, his future as an independent, self-supporting citizen was not very promising. At present he is attending a village school, taking up manual training arithmetic and a few other subjects. Then it is the plan of the state board of reeducation for the handicapped to teach him a trade or job that he can become efficient at with one hand, and thus be an independent, self-supporting citizen.

When roads opened up in the spring so I was able to get into the rural schools. I made a list of all crippled or handicapped people. I located ninteen crippled cases and two cleft palate and hair lip, and seven serious eye

cases which were in need of attention.

One of the bone cases was a girl thirteen years of age who was unable to walk on her heel. Her toes would touch the floor, so it was rather difficult and tiresome for her to walk any great distance. I called on her parents and they promised that they would take her to a physician to see if any correction could be made. They responded and as usual I made a second call within a few weeks to do some more urging, and when I called the second time, the correction had been made. The girl walks on her heel. I interviewed the doctor and we have shown the teacher, the girl and the parents how she should exercise, so as to reduce the stiffness in the ankle, as you all realize that after ten or eleven years of no use of the ankle, that it would be rather stiff, but she walks with but very little stiffness.

Two of the other crippled children are waiting their turn to enter the

hospital for corrective work; also one cleft palate case is to go soon.

I do not secure consent from parents to have bone defects corrected the first time I make a home call. It takes a great many calls, but believing in the old adage, "If you don't first succeed, try, try again," I am still follow-

ing up the other fourteen cases.

One little boy I found in school, rather lame, and the teacher reported that he had become more lame during the year. A home call was made, urging medical care, and arrangements had been made for a physician to see the boy on the following Monday, and on the Saturday before the father brought the boy in to me, to see if I could get medical help for him, as they could not afford the care that he should have. I called Dr. Lockhart and he very willingly examined the boy and we found that an old wound he had, had recently opened up. Upon taking an X-ray we found a tuberculous condition of the bone. Drs. Lockhart and Clark operated on the boy free of charge, and the hospital made the bill reasonable, so the father was able to pay that part. As soon as the boy was able to leave the hospital we had him admitted to the sanatorium.

I could enumerate to you many very interesting cases, and I know that every township or village has among its citizens some person, possibly more than one, who is blind, crippled, has tuberculosis or some other serious physical defect that could be corrected if noted in time.

A chest clinic was held in Oshkosh in February, of which the people in the rural districts might take advantage, but due to one of the numerous blizzards, only two people from the county attended. They were both diagnosed as suspicious tuberculosis. Both immediately received instructions from their family physician. I have kept in touch with them since,

In August a chest clinic was held at Omro and Winneconne, one day

each place, and sixty-seven people were examined. The findings were:

Four presumptive or active tuberculosis.

Five suspicious tuberculosis.

Four healed or inactive cases.

Besides these, many other defects were found and recommendations were made for corrective work.

I have followed up these tuberculosis cases and found the results are very satisfactory. All but one have consulted their family physician, and all are taking proper precautions to prevent the spread and to effect a cure. These two clinics were financed by the Red Cross in both communities.

When I make a call on a tuberculosis patient, I teach them how to take their temperature if the doctor recommends that. We usually obtain a specimen of sputum. I give the patient and family instructions as to proper care of the patient and also how to protect other members of the family, emphasis being made as to rest, food, fresh air, and to the disposal of the sputum. According to case records on file in the office, I find twentyfour reported cases of tuberculosis and none of that number are healed or inactive cases which once were active cases.

Of course we all know that many cases of tuberculosis are not found until quite advanced, and one big feature of health work is urging yearly physical examination, so early signs of lung, heart and kidney trouble can

The available figures for tuberculosis death rate have been reduced from 2,509 in 1908 to 1,809 in 1922. If the death rate had not been cut down during those years, we would have lost 1,100 people more from tuberculosis

in the year 1922 than we did.

During the school year 1922-1923 all schools were visited and all pupils present were inspected, weighed and measured. Number of hours spent in school ..... Number excluded because of skin diseases, lice, colds, etc..... 52 Number with defective eyes or vision ..... 140 Number with corrected vision ..... 52 An eye clinic was held at Winneconne on June 23, with two eye special-

ists and a corps of workers assisting. One hundred twenty-seven were examined. Of this number, 100 received recommendations of some sort in regard to their eyes. Three school children were found to be in a rather serious condition, and they were urged to have corrective work very soon as there was a possibility of their losing their eyesight. They have had their corrections made, but I still keep in touch with them.

A girl who attended the clinic had strabismus or cross eyes. It was

hard for her in school. After the clinic we had her eyes straightened and

she now has resumed her school work.

Three children of school age were at the clinic who were practically blind. One of these was referred to the school nurse of the city in which she lives; one is to have his operation at Christmas time, and I am still honing that the parents will consent to have the other child's eyes taken care of

Many calls come from the teachers to visit their schools because some child is at home ill or some child's eyes are poor, and I have endeavored to answer these calls at once, as it is only through early recognition of a disease that we are able to reduce illness and mortality and loss of school attendance.

No health work was carried on at the county fair, as Mrs. Smith, a member of the public health committee, and I went to the fair grounds and we felt that the space available for the work was inadequate and unsuitable. We hope that next year a change may be made in the ladies' rest room, making it more private and quiet, and having chairs and cots there, so some worth while health program can be carried out.

Several groups of women have sent in petitions asking for the child welfare special for next year, and I believe we will secure this for our county for at least two weeks' work some time during the summer. As you know, this child welfare special will come to our county without any additional expense, and it carries a physician and nurse with it. They examine

all pre-school children, giving instructions to the parents.

You may wonder if there is need of that form of work here. In compiling statistics we find that the death rate of babies under one year is such that 67 babies die out of every 1,000 live births. This is only under one year of age, and is not including our three cities. Should we not do something?

A county health officers' meeting was held early in August. Nine of the

township health officers attended and considerable interest was shown in health rules and regulations. I hope to have another meeting this coming

having marked physical defects.

This year I have left a communicable disease chart, rules and regulations of contagious diseases, and rules and regulations of skin diseases with each teacher as I visit the school, which they can refer to, also urging each one to call me in case of illness, so that follow-up work can be carried on

A great deal of credit is due the teachers and parents in aiding in health work, as it is only through co-operation that results can be obtained Then our results will

I hope to have closer co-operation in the future. be greater. Respectfully submitted, MARY V. M'LEAN.

# SUPERVISING TEACHERS' REPORT.

Elizabeth King offered the following Report No. 16:

To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsın.

Gentlemen: The year for the supervising teacher begins in August and consists of ten months, ending some time in June. The work of this teacher is under the direction of the county superintendent of schools and consists of several lines. First in importance is visiting schools to find out in regard to buildings, equipment and supplies; to assist and advise the teachers in regard to school organization, classification of pupils, course of study, methods of teaching, and care of buildings and materials. Members of school boards and school patrons are visited to confer on matters of interest of the school. All teachers' meetings and institutes held in the county are attended, and such assistance rendered there as the county superintendent may direct. Evening meetings in school houses, such as school programs and community gatherings, are participated in when possible.

Once each year the state superintendent of public instruction calls a conference of supervising teachers at Madison for one week. There directions for the work and plans and suggestions are given by the members of

the state department.

In addition to this, the supervising teachers of the state have a separate organization of their own, the purpose of which is to help better the supervision of rural schools. Three times a year this organization issues an Exchange, a paper devoted to rural school supervision.

No figures were available to show exactly how many visits were made in 1922-23, but it may be of interest to know how the first three months of

1923-24 have been spent.

The supervising teacher went on duty Aug. 16, 1923. Since that time all Saturdays have been spent in conferences with the superintendent and rural teachers at the office. One week was spent at Madison at the state conference; three days at the state fair in charge of the girl who won in the county spelling and arithmetic contests and was therefore sent to the state contest.

Two days were given to assisting at the county institute, Aug. 31 and Sept. 1; two days to arranging and caring for the county school exhibit and

two to judging a school exhibit at the county fair.

Since schools opened Sept. 3 nearly all school days have been used in visiting rural schools. In nearly every case the visit is for one-half day of school and as much more time as may be needed for conferences with teacher board and natrous

After each visit made, the county superintendent sends to the clerk of the district and to the teacher a copy of the report of that visit with such suggestions as he may deem necessary in regard to building, equipment, or

the work of the teacher.

In regard to the financial support:

Between the first and the tenth days of July each year the county superintendent must file with the state superintendent a report of the salary and expense of the supervising teacher, after which the county is reimbursed from the state treasury for all money paid out for such salary and expenses.

It might appear that since under the present law all teachers must have training before they may begin to teach, it should not be necessary to give them more supervision than the county superintendent can do. But such is not the case. Every employer of labor knows that every employee needs constant supervision. The city schools have long had thorough supervision of their teachers, but the rural schools have had much less, for it is not possible for one person to do much with more than 100 schools located miles apart. The work is not entirely satisfactory when he has one assistant, for as can be seen she cannot visit each teacher oftener than once in three or four months. The younger and less experienced teachers receive the earliest and most frequent attention, but even at best every supervising teacher feels that the real need is for more and still more supervision of rural schools.

1—That the report of the secretary of the Winnebago County Fair Association be received and placed on file.

2-That \$1,000 be paid on the contract with Nevitt Brothers.

3—That \$2,000 be appropriated for the maintenance of the county fair.

4—That the sum of \$8,000 be appropriated for the permanent improvements on the county fair grounds, such improvements to be located on the land belonging to the county or contracted for by the county.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION-1:30 P. M. REPORT NO. 19-ANNUAL REPORT OF COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT:

To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin.

Gentlemen: I herewith submit the annual report of the county agricultural agent for the year ending Oct. 31, 1923, in the form of a brief summary of the most important lines of work carried on and results accomplished. GUSTAV SELL. County Agricultural Agent.

1. Greater Use of Pure Bred Sires-

Your agricultural agent held seven pure bred bull sales in co-operation with the three county breeders' associations. Eighty animals were sold.

Some went to men that never had a pure bred before.

Agricultural statistics collected by our assessors as of May 1 this year show over 1,000 farmers using pure bred sires. As this part of the form was new, we doubt that this is the full number. Yet it is greater by nearly 300 than the number of farmers reporting last year as owning a pure bred

2. Dairy Cattle Marketing-

As reported last year, most of this work has been gradually done more and more through the various breeders' associations. But instead of narrowing our field of service, this development widens it very greatly, for we have a number of trained, reliable men now to take buyers around and make satisfied customers. Through this system more cattle have been sold out of the county with less time and travel expense on the part of your county agricultural agent.

3. Cow Testing Associations-

Assistance was given in reorganizing two of our three cow testing associations, and other services rendered. All three associations are doing nicely. The Wolf River association last year ranked sixth in average butterfat production among all cow testing associations of Wisconsin. 126 in number. Some preliminary work has been done towards starting another association before snow flies.

4. T. B. Clean-up-

A drive was made last winter to secure names on petitions for a county area test. Good progress was made, over 1,000 signatures of cattle owners secured, when closing of roads and difficulty of getting petitions circulated in certain sections halted this work. Plans now in the making contemplate more educational work and another drive to get the required 60% of cattle owners on these petitions to favor the county wide test of cattle. When last year T. B. was found in 86 of the 270 herds tested, it seems high time to give serious thought and effort towards concerted action to stamp out or at least reduce this prevalence of this disease. 5. Swine Improvement-

One project of pigs seif fed on pasture was carried on with results that

were very gratifying in showing the economy of this method.

A "ton litter" contest was conducted by the county agent with the help of a swine specialist and the co-operation of the county fair. The latter offered good premiums for the best litters. This encouraged trying to save pigs, raise large litters, and to feed for rapid gains because they are the cheapest gains. Considerable interest was taken in this contest, and promises are of much greater interest another year.

6. Poultry Culling-

Seven demonstrations in this were given this current year. Average attendance was from fifteen to twenty. As a result of such demonstrations the last few years, hundreds of Winnebago county farmers have learned how to cull their hens, and their flocks are showing improvement. The demand for this work is such that perhaps nearly twenty demonstrations will be held this fall yet.

7. More Alfalfa-

Our acreage in this queen of dairy hays made another marked increase, going from 4,709 to 7,240 acres. This is no doubt due in part to the seed order pool conducted by the Farm Bureau and in which the county agent co-operated. The pool combined the orders of mist of the co-operative groups as well as individuals, gave them all the benefit of a quantity price, and assured them of good seed. Orders for about 30,000 pounds of alfalfa seed were pooled, and the seed handled by local agencies.

8. Emergency Hay Crops—

There was no occasion for a great drive on emergency hays last spring. A few farmers, however, whose clover and alfalfa killed out, found soy beans and Sudan grass, alone or mixed a practical substitute. But next spring, on account of the poor clover catch this summer, there undoubtedly will be lots of places for these two crops to help out in the emergency and supply our dairymen with some legume hay.

9. Orchard Improvement-

Seven pruning demonstrations were held in early spring with the assistance of an orchard expert. Two spray rings were formed with twenty one orchards. It was quite fully demonstrated that the average farm orchard can produce good, clean fruit for home use and for sale at a profit. Here are the facts on the Clemansville spray ring:

Three apple grading demonstrations were held in season to get this fruit in right shape for market. And as a wind-up an apple grading exhibit was put on at the fair. This attracted a great deal of attention and no doubt will start more home orchard owners on the way to getting good, clean fruit instead of the "apple worm hash" they have mostly been getting.

10. Drainage—

Tiling systems were layed out and complete surveys made therefor on six farms; about 23,000 feet of tile was put in there.

On other places preliminary surveys were made.

A number of miscellaneous leveling jobs were done, such as laying out cellar drains, open ditches, etc.

11. Home Grounds Beautifying Demonstrations-

Three demonstrations have been carried on in this for some four years under F. A. Aust, professor of landscape design at the "U." More plantings were made this year. Another season we can likely hold demonstration meetings at these places.

12. Women's Clothing Groups-

Four classes or groups of women were organized this fall for practical instruction in clothing work by a home economics specialist from the "U." The work includes testing of materials, making of dress forms, using patterns, making over clothes, etc. These classes are now meeting, and beginning to carry the ideas back to their friends. If there is anyone that deserves a little encouragement in their work, and some help in planning to do it the easiest possible way, it certainly is the overworked farm women. 13. Perhaps the most valuable piece of work done all year was the organization of the Fox River Valley Co-operatively through the Wisconsin Cheese of handling cheese to be sold co-operatively through the Wisconsin Cheese Producers' Federation. The Farm Bureau had initiated the movement, and a county-wide committee had charge of the work. The county agent was called into more direct participation last spring on the final drive and helped the committee make plans, arrangements, meetings and drives. Enough cheese has been signed up to make for economical operation of the warehouse at Neenah; over \$10,000 worth of stock has been sold in the warehouse company. Contracts have been let; and the building is going up right now. It is oud hope, and that of the far-sighted farmers behind this movement, that by co-operative marketing we may improve not only marketing

conditions, but also the quality of the product, and thereby merit somewhetter returns for the producer.	vhat

The work in connection with the rural communities has been most interesting both from the point of view of education as well as from the social phase. Since the last County Board meeting many improvements have been made in the equipment of the schools.

Improvements.

Many of the schools have the new single steel adjustable seats and desks, adjusted for the comfort of the child. The office is urging that more of these seats be provided. Lighting and heating as well as ventilation of a number of schools have been greatly improved. There are only a few schools left to be supplied with playground apparatus. Outbuildings, though not satisfactory in every instance, have been repaired and placed in a sanitary condition. Reference books, supplementary readers and suitable seat work have been supplied.

New Nekimi School.

In the town of Nekimi, what is known as the Jackson School is nearing completion. The building is supplied with the proper lighting, heating and toilet facilities. The district merits a great deal of credit for having erected one of the most modern rural school buildings in Wisconsin.

#### Consolidation.

There is a great tendency to accept the progress of consolidation as a

fair measure of the progress of rural school education. The cost of consolidation is not unreasonable, which is governed largely by local conditions. Meetings were held during the year to discuss the feasibility of consolidation, and we find many people in favor of it. There is in Wisconsin, however, a movement which is quite as important and effective. That is the gradual development of one room rural schools into graded schools. There are now more than 600 of these graded schools, about two-thirds of which have two teachers, the rest three or more.

Only 20% of our rural teachers are graduates of normal schools. On the other hand, 35% of the state graded school teachers are normal school graduates. The state graded school places itself under more careful in-

spection and direction by the state.

The training of the teaching force of our one-room rural schools is still far from satisfactory. No one can teach who has not had at least one year of teacher training. This training may be superimposed, until 1925, upon two years of work beyond the grades; after that until 1927 upon three years of work beyond the grades; after that upon four years of work beyond the grades;

Only 7% of the total cost of maintaining our elementary and high schools is state aid. In five states the percentage of state aid is about 40.

In Texas, the state aid is 54%.

The benefits of consolidation may be summed up as follows: The graduates, at least between eighty and ninety per cent, would receive their training at home, under home influences. The cost is relieved somewhat because of state aid. Courses of study could be provided which are specially adapted to their needs. Children as citizens of the state have a moral right to the same educational opportunities.

County Nurse.

Social health surveys tell of a distressing absence of health education and of inadequate enforcement of health laws. They reveal much parental ignorance and lack of control, and a record of youthful lives stunted be cause of undernourishment and disease. The county nurse is very competent and is accomplishing gratifying results. We feel that more can be done if she has the hearty co-operation of every parent and patron in the county.

Parents Visit School.

It is recommended that parents visit school at least once a year. Every parent who is vitally interested in the welfare of his or her child, should make it a point to visit school. Complaints are only justified after a visit has been made.

Warm School Lunches.

The idea of warm school lunches has been fostered for a number of years. About one-third of the schools were active in this regard last year. The teachers are willing to take charge without additional pay. I am in hopes that all of the schools will have warm lunches this winter.

Salaries.

In many counties the teachers have demanded minimum wages based on training and experience. It would be fairer to base the salary on local conditions. The office is only too willing to keep school boards informed as to possible candidates.

County Fair.

Interest is developing in the educational department for the Winnebago County Fair. A revised premium list will be published soon. It is hoped that every school will be represented at the fair next year, with at least a few educational exhibits if not a school exhibit. Our biggest handicap in showing an exhibit of any size is lack of space. The most desirable arrangement would be to have a separate educational building so as to take in Omro, Winneconne, Neenah and Menasha. We ask the co-operation of the citizens and especially the County Board in this regard.

Committee on Common Schools.

I am truly sorry to learn that the committee on common schools has been done away with. There should be an active committee in the county for the superintendent to rely upon. I am informed that there is an educational committee of the County Board. I shall be very glad to co-operate with them in regard to educational matters.

Teachers' Meetings.

Several teachers' meetings were held the past year. A two day institute was held Friday and Saturday before the opening of school, at which the plans for the year were outlined and methods of teaching discussed. Some arrangement should be made so that the teachers could attend either the Northeastern Teachers' Association of the State Convention, or both. If the teacher attends both, the school board should allow her expenses.

Traveling Library.

There are at the present time about fifty boxes of books which are each year sent out to the various villages and schools and may be exchanged at the end of the year. We find that many schools have had a set of books for a longer period than is desired. The state is also making it possible for the schools to have a set of twenty-four well graded books for a period of six weeks for the small sum of 25c. We feel sure that the Oshkosh Public Library is open to the service of the public at any and all times.

Certification of Teachers.

It is to be noted under the present statutes that the superintendent of the county in which a training school or department is located must grant a certificate to those who complete the rural teacher-training course. A superintendent may establish for his county, subject to the approval of the state superintendent, a standard of attainment in each branch of study which must be reached by each applicant before receiving a certificate. This makes it possible to fix seventy-two different standards of attainment in the state.

If it is the function of the state to train public school teachers, then it is also a state function to certificate them.

I believe that the recommendations made by Mr. Anderson, assistant state superintendent, would help to solve the above difficulty.

 All teachers' certificates should be issued by the state superintendent upon recommendation of the state board of examiners.

2. All such certificates issued should be valid throughout the entire

3. The subjects required for certification should be fixed by the state superintendent and not specified by statute. (This would make possible the reorganization of rural teacher training curricula without legislative enactment)

4. The minimum educational and professional qualifications for rural teachers should be fixed by statute. The state superintendent of public instruction should be authorized to issue regulations from time to time raising these qualifications as the visible supply of teachers makes it possible.

There is hereby appropriated under the provisions of Section 83.03 the sum of \$13,089.53 to meet the first one-half of said state aid allotment to be placed on the state trunk highway system, thus making available for this purpose the sum of \$21,815.88, which shall be expended as follows:

1. The sum of \$75.58 to pay the deficit existing on the construction price of the Pansy bridge on State Trunk Highway No. 91.

2. The balance of \$21,740.30 for the improvement of the Oshkosh-Ripon road, known as State Trunk Highway 91, by constructing the same of concrete and beginning at the southerly end of the northerly stretch of concrete on said road in the Town of Nekimi, and extending as far southwest-

erly as the money available will construct.

Section II. And in accordance with Section 83.03 of the Statutes, the second one-half portion of the state aid allotted to the county, amounting to \$8,726.35, hereinbefore undistributed, together with the sum of \$17,452.70 to be raised by the county, making available the sum of \$26,179.05, shall be expended as follows:

1. To pay the deficit in the construction price of the Bergen bridge, in

the Town of Rushford, the sum of \$124.46.

2. The sum of \$9.027.29 shall be used for the improvement of the Omro-Eureka road by building the same of gravel and beginning at the west end of the concrete at the Waukau Creek bridge, and extending along said road toward Eureka as far as said sum will construct the same.

3. The sum of \$9.027.30 shall be used to improve with gravel County Highway C, known as the Waukau road, beginning thereon at the town line between the Towns of Rushford and Omro, and building the same as far

toward the City of Oshkosh as the money available will construct.

3A. The balance of said sum, \$8.000, to be used in improving with concrete, Third street in the City of Menasha, commencing at the east line of Manitowoc street to the west line of Racine street, and of Depere street from the intersection of Third street with said Depere street to the north line of the pavement now constructed thereon.

Section III. The said County Board does hereby appropriate the following sums to be provided by a general tax levy for the purposes set forth.

- 1. For the county's share of the cost of state aid improvements on the state trunk highway system provided for in section 1 of this resolution, the sum of \$13.089.53.
- 2. For the county's share of the cost of improvements on portions of the county system of prospective state highways, not portions of the state trunk highway system, as set forth in Section II of the resolution, the sum of \$17,452.70.

3. For the maintenance of county systems of state trunk and prospective state highways and county trunk highway system and any other road determined upon by the road and bridge committee, the sum of \$50,000.00.

The county treasurer is hereby directed to pay for the maintenance of the state trunk highway system from any funds in the county treasury that are not required for the purpose for which appropriated prior to Aug. 1, 1921, and to reimburse such funds from the sums received under paragraph H of Subsection 3 of Section 20.04, when the same are received from the state treasury.

#### ILLEGAL ASSESSMENTS.

Supervisor Korotev offered the following Report No. 42:

To the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin.

Gentlemen: The committee on illegal assessments, to which was referred the claim of the City of Oshkosh for \$612.10 as a refund of a part of the penalties charged by the county against the City of Oshkosh on the delinquent personal property tax of the Molle Typewriter Company for the year 1920 and paid by the City of Oshkosh, beg leave to report as follows:

We find that the Molle Typewriter Company since the collection of said tax and penalty has gone into bankruptcy. That the tax assessed by the City of Oshkosh was found excessive and incorrect by the referee in bankruptcy, causing a loss of a considerable amount to the City of Oshkosh by reason of the excessive tax collected from said company. We therefore think that in justice to the city the said claim should be allowed. It already has the approval of the district attorney and the county treasurer.

П

With reference to the petition of the City of Neenah relative to the tax on its dumping grounds, located in the Town of Menasha, we are of the opinion that said lands are exempt from taxation by the Town of Menasha and that said assessment is illegal, and we recommend the granting of the petition of the City of Neenah.

III.

With reference to the petition of the Oshkosh Council of Boy Scouts' relative to the taxes for 1922 on the Boy Scout hut in the Town of Black Wolf, it is our opinion that said property comes under Section 70.11 of the Statutes and should be exempt from tax, and we recommend that the petition be granted.

With reference to the petition of Leon Block for the refund of an income tax paid twice by him through error, we recommend that the petition be granted.

With reference to the Methodist Episcopal Church of Omro to have cancelled and set aside certain tax certificates issued against the property located in the Village of Winneconne for the sale of 1921, we find that at the time said taxes were assessed and taxed that the lands in the Village of Winneconne were owned by the Omro church and used wholly for religious purposes and were exempt from taxation. We recommend that the petition be allowed.

Your committee reports further with respect to the tax on the property of the Wisconsin Central Railway in the Fourth ward, City of Menasha, being subdivision of lot 15, of block 55, the abandoned right of way across lot 17 except the north 66 feet of lot 17, block 55, and also subdivision of lots 14, 15 and 16, block 55, the 100 feet north and south next south of the north 66 feet of lot 16, on the abandoned right of way of lot 16, block 55, that the said property appears to be in the name of the Wisconsin Central Railway Company and is therefore not subject to a regular local tax, and that the tax should be cancelled and the amount thereof charged back to the City of Menasha in which said property lies.

With reference to the petition of the City of Neenah for payment to it of the penalties and interest accrued on the taxes on the Brokaw property, the committee reports that the failure to pay such interest and penalties was not in any way the fault of the City of Neenah, and we recommend

that such interest and penalties be repaid to said city.

1. Such bond shall bear interest at the rate of 5 percent per annum. payable semi-annually on the 1st day of April and on the 1st day of October of each year, and the principal and interest on said bonds shall be payable at the office of the county treasurer of said County of Winnebago.

2. The number of such bonds shall be 440, and they shall be numbered

consecutively from 1 to 440, inclusive.

3. 4. Said bonds shall be negotiated by the county treasurer in such manner as shall appear most advantageous to the county, but in no case shall said bonds be sold at less than par value and accrued interest on the same.

Beginning at the southerly end of any concrete roadway on the Oshkosh-Ripon road, the same being a part of said road nearest to the City of Oshkosh and building southwesterly toward the City of Ripon as far as the sum of \$100,000.00 will build, said roadway to be of concrete 18 feet in width.

Beginning on the Neenah-Mikesville road in the southeast corner of the Neenah cemetery, running thence north and northwesterly on the County Trunk Highway B, thence west on County Highway B, also known as the Neenah-Winchester road, building the same of concrete 18 feet in width so

far as the sum of \$105.000.00 will construct the same.

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County that for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of said resolution and to build the said described roadway and to raise the sum of \$205,000.00 herein provided, that Winnebago county shall issue its non-taxable and semi-annual interest payment bonds in the sum of \$205,000.00, said bonds to be issued pursuant to Section 1317 M-12, of the Wisconsin Statutes for 1921, in the form provided by the state highway commission and in conformity with the following provisions, to-wit:

1. Such bonds shall bear interest at the rate of 5% per annum, payable semi-annually on the first day of April and on the first day of October of each year and the principal and interest on said bonds shall be payable at

the office of the county treasurer of said County of Winnepago.

2. The number of such bonds shall be 440, and they shall be numbered

consecutively from 1 to 440 inclusive.

Said bonds shall be issued in the following denominations, to-wit: 1 to 100, inclusive, of the denominations of \$100.00, and 101 to 390, inclusive, of the denominations of \$500.00 each, and 391 to 440, inclusive, of the denominations of \$1,000 each, and shall bear date of April 1, 1924, and shall mature April 1, 1929.

4. Said bonds shall be negotiated by the county treasurer in such manner as shall appear most advantageous to the county, but in no case shall said bonds be sold at less than par value and accrued interest on the same. Be it further resolved that there be and there is hereby levied upon all

the property, real or personal, within the County of Winnebago, subject to tax, a direct annual tax sufficient to pay the interest on such bonds as they
