Supervisor White moved that Supervisor Geo. A. Loescher be nominated as candidate for chairman. Motion seconded and carried. Supervisors Fritzen and Spore were appointed tellers. Informal ballot resulted as follows: Loescher 41, Ryan 1, Getchius 1, total 43. Motion that the rules be suspended, the informal ballot be made formal, and the clerk cast the unanimous vote of the Board for G. A. Loescher as chairman; carried. Vote was so cast, and G. A. Loescher was declared elected

#### ELECTION OF VICE-CHAIRMAN.

Informal ballot resulted as follows: M. F. White 38, Thomas Ryan 1. G. A. Loescher 1, total 40. Motion that the rules be suspended, the informal ballot be made formal, and the clerk cast the unanimous vote of the Board for M. F. White as vice-chairman; carried. Vote was so cast, and M. F. White was declared elected.

Chairman Loescher, upon taking the chair, voiced his appreciation of the honor bestowed upon him, in electing him as chairman of the Board

O. C. Rollman of the state highway commission addressed the Board with reference to the new law pertaining to the state aid allotment for roads not on state and county system of highways, after which questions were asked by several Supervisors.

RULES.

Supervisor Fritzen moved that the rules of 1924 govern the Board for 1925. Motion carried.

#### RULES OF BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF WINNEBAGO COUNTY. Adopted May 4, 1925.

I. The meetings of this Board shall be held in the Supervisors' room, and the hour for daily meetings shall be 10 a. m.

And the County Board shall continue in continuous session from day to

day until adjourned, unless to a day certain or sine die.

II. At the first meeting of the Board it shall be the duty of the chairman, or in the case of his absence, the vice chairman, or in their absence, the clerk, to call to order.

The clerk shall then call the roll of members.

A quorum being present, the Board shall proceed to the election of a chairman and vice chairman.

(Amended to provide for vice chairman as authorized by Ch. 110, of 1903.)

III. It shall be the duty of the chairman to appoint the following standing committees, each to consist of the number of members as set after the

name of each committee, viz:

Equalization, 9; finance, 8; general accounts, 7; illegal assessments, 5; justice and constables' accounts, 7; sheriff's and coroners' accounts, 7; insane, 3; poor and poor farm, 3; workhouse, 3; corporations, 3; public buildings, 5; roads and bridges, 5; per diem and mileage, 5; printing, 3; bonds and salaries, 5; county abstract and tract index system, 3; rules, 3; education, 3; sanatorium, 5.

IV. The Board may adjourn for such time as shall be necessary for the chairman to prepare the list of committees, and no business can be done

until the same shall be announced.

V. The chairman, or in his absence, the vice chairman, shall take the chair at the hour to which the Board may from time to time stand adjourned, call the Board to order and direct the calling of the roll of members by the clerk.

VI. Upon the appearance of a quorum, the journal of the preceding day shall be read by the clerk, and any mistake therein shall be corrected by the Board; provided, that upon the last day of the session the journal for that day will be read and, before the final adjournment, corrected.

VII. After the reading and correction of the journal, the order of business shall be as follows:

Reception of petitions, memorials, accounts, etc.

Presentation of resolutions and disposition of same.

Reports of standing committees.

Reports of select committees.

Consideration of miscellaneous business.

VIII. The chairman shall preserve order and decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Board; and shall clearly and distinctly state every motion or question before debate.

The chairman shall be entitled to vote on all questions taken by ayes and noes, and his name shall be called last; when the vote on any ques-

tion is a tie, it shall be deemed to have been lost.

X. Every motion or amendment shall be reduced to writing when a request therefor shall be made by any member; and all petitions, memorials and substitutes shall be reduced to writing and read before they shall be considered by the Board.

XI. Every written resolution shall have attached thereto the name of the person introducing it; and when referred to a committee, the names of

such committees shall be endorsed thereon.

XII. Every member, previous to speaking, shall rise and address the

III. When two or more members rise at once, the chair shall designate the member who is to speak first; but in all cases the member who shall first rise and address the chair shall speak first.

XIV. No member shall speak more than twice upon the same question without leave; and when called to order by the chairman shall take his seat,

and shall not be allowed to proceed without leave of the Board.

XV. A vote on any question shall be taken by ayes and nays when called for by any member; and SHALL be so taken on all questions involving the expenditure of money; and whenever a vote is so ordered and taken, the members voting in the affirmative and negative, as well as those absent or not voting, shall be recorded at length in the records of the proceedings of the County Board.

(Amended to conform to Sec. 709, Stat. of 1898.)

XVI. No account or claim against the county shall be audited unless it be made out in items and duly verified and be filed with the clerk of the Board, except as otherwise provided by law.

XVII. When a motion is under consideration, no motion shall be enter-

tained except:

1. To adjourn.

To lay on the table.

- For the previous question.
- To postpone to a day certain. To commit to a committee.
- To amend or to substitute. To postpone indefinitely.

These several motions shall take precedence in the order in which they stand in this rule.

XVIII. A motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, and for the previous

question shall be decided without debate, except as hereinafter provided.

XIX. A motion to postpone indefinitely or to a day certain or to commit shall not be again entertained on the same day or in the same stage of the proposition.

XX. A substitute shall be open to amendment the same as the original proposition; but when adopted, shall not be subject to amendment. If an amendment or substitute is lost, another substantially the same shall not be entertained.

XXI. When a motion or question has once been determined, any member voting with the majority may move a reconsideration of the vote, but such motion shall be made and acted on at the same or next succeeding meeting, and shall not thereafter be made except by unanimous consent.

XXII. The previous question may be moved by any member, and the chairman shall then say: "It requiring five members to second this motion, those in favor of sustaining the motion will rise." If five or more members then rise, the previous question shall thereby be seconded and an opportunity then be given to any two members opposed thereto to briefly state their objections. The question shall then be: "Shall the question be now put?" which, if carried by a vote of two-thirds of the members present upon a call of the ayes and nays, the Board shall immediately proceed to vote upon the pending amendment, if any, and upon the main question.

XXIII. In filling blanks, the largest sum and the longest time shall be

first put.

XXIV. These rules shall not be changed, amended or repealed, unless the proposition or amendment is introduced in writing and the same laid over to some subsequent meeting of the Board, not less than five days intervening, and then only with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

XXV. Any of these rules may be suspended upon any pending measure

by unanimous consent or by two-thirds of the members present.

XXVI. These rules and all amendments or additions thereto which may hereafter be made shall govern the Board until altered or repealed, as herein provided.

XXVII. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in "Jefferson's " so far as they remain in common use and are practicable and ap-

plicable and not inconsistent herewith, shall govern the Board.

XXVIII. Whenever the Board shall have gone into a committee of the whole and shall have arisen, the Board shall at once be in session for the receiving and acting upon the report of the committee of the whole, and for the transaction of any and all other business of every kind.

XXIX. No resolution for the appropriation for money shall be in order until the day after its presentation and reference, except upon the consent

of two-thirds of the members of the County Board present.

XXX. All reports, resolutions and petitions must be presented in typewritten form, and read by the supervisor presenting the same.

#### PETITION No. 1 OF THE WISCONSIN NORTHERN LIGHT, HEAT AND POWER CO. FOR OPERATING WITHIN THE TOWN OF WOLF RIVER,

Supervisor Krenke read the following Petition No. 1: To the County Highway Commissioner of Winnebago County, Wisconsin: The undersigned, a Wisconsin corporation, hereby petitions the highway commissioner of Winnebago county for consent and permission that the undersigned, its successors and assigns, may occupy the streets, alleys, lanes, public highways, park or public grounds situated within the township of Wolf River, of said county, for construction, maintaining and operating lines with all necessary wires, condiuts and appurtenances, for the purpose of supplying electric current for light, heat, power or signals to said township; and also for the purpose of conveying electric current into and through said township for the purpose of furnishing light, heat, power or signals to points or places outside of said township; providing, however, that no permanent injury is done to any such highways or public grounds.

TO DESTROY OLD PAPERS IN OFFICE OF HIGHWAY COMMISSIONER. Supervisor Spore offered the following Resolution No. 1:

Whereas, records and papers relating to the office of the county highway commissioner have accumulated until there is no longer space to file and preserve the same, and

Whereas, the usefulness of such records is practically gone after six

years; now, therefore,

Resolved, that the county highway commissioner and the road and bridge committee be, and they are hereby authorized from time to time to destroy any records or papers in their office which in their judgment are no longer of any use or value to the county, and provided such papers shall be not less than six years of age, and provided that this authority shall anply to all papers and records which from time to time, in the opinion of the county highway commissioner and the road and bridge committee, shall be of no value, and shall have been on file for six years.

#### TO INVESTIGATE EXCESSIVE RATES FOR ELECTRICITY IN RURAL DISTRICTS.

Supervisor Getchius offered the following Resolution No. 2:

Whereas, there has been charged that unjust and excessive rates have been and now are being charged by the Wisconsin Public Service Corporation for electricity connections to the power lines of said company in Winnebago county:

And whereas the farmers of Winnebago county are in large numbers prevented from obtaining the use of the electric service offered by the said

corporation because of the excessive and unjust rates charged;

Now therefore, be it resolved that the chairman of this Board be empowered to appoint a committee of six from the membership of this Board, said committee to be authorized and directed to immediately conduct an investigation as to the legality and fairness of the schedule of rates of said company as applied to its patrons in the country, said committee to have the right and authority to employ necessary counsel to assist in conducting said investigation;

And be it further resolved that if in the judgment of said committee the findings of said committee so justify and warrant, that the said committee be and they are hereby authorized and directed to file a proper application with the railroad commission of Wisconsin for an adjustment of

And be it further resolved that there be and hereby is appropriated out of the general funds of the county, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) to be expended by and upon order of the chairman of said committee if necessary.

#### ROAD AND BRIDGE COMMITTEE TO CANCEL CONTRACT WITH WM. KIESOW.

Whereas the county road and bridge committee has heretofore entered into a contract with Mr. William Kiesow to furnish the necessary crushed stone to enable the completion of the Neenah-Winchester concrete road during the season of 1925;

And whereas it appears that the said William Kiesow will be utterly unable to finish and complete the crushing of sufficient rock to enable the

completion of this road during the season of 1925;

And whereas it appears that the contract entered into with the said William Kiesow by the county road and bridge committee is so unfavorable to the said Kiesow because of his lack of equipment and inability to perform;

Now therefore, be it resolved that the county road and bridge committee be and they hereby are instructed, with the consent of the said contractor, to annul and cancel said contract, and to immediately enter into a new contract with the Lutz Stone Company to furnish said stone necessary. for said road so that the construction of said road may be assured during the season of 1925.

TRIBUTE TO JOHN O'DONNELL.

Supervisor Korotev offered the following memorial. To the Honorable the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wis-

Ladies and Gentlemen: Again we are called upon to record the passing of one of our number, the Great Ruler having called from our midst, Brother John O'Donnell. It is fitting that we should pause in our labors to pay tribute to the memory of our brother.

We knew him as a co-worker-conscientious, tireless and just; as a friend-loyal, frank and true. #### REPORT OF COMMITTEE TO INVESTIGATE RURAL ELECTRIC RATES.

Supervisor Grimes offered the following Report No. 1: To the County Board of Winnebago County, Wisconsin.

Ladies and Gentlemen: Your committee appointed to investigate charges for electric light and power in the rural districts of Winnebago county beg leave to report:

That we have conferred with the managers of the local lighting utility. visited a number of customers of said utility, communicated with the Wisconsin railroad rate commission, and secured much data which we desire to submit for your consideration, before petitioning the rate commission for

a hearing on the charges in question.

We find and conclude from information at hand, that the high cost of delivering electric current to rural districts, coupled with the unfavorable financial conditions prevailing in those districts in recent years, constitute the principal impediments to the general use of available light and power facilities. We find the railroad rate commission in several cases where conditions and costs should be very similar to those existing in Winnebago county have ordered a very material reduction in the energy charge allowed. notably the case of the Northern States Power Company and the Midlands Public Service Company, where a charge of 10 cents per KWH for first 30 KWH each month, and 3 cents per KWH for all over 30 KWH. Such an order in reference to Winnebago county rates would save many dollars to Winnebago county users of electric current.

We find from Wisconsin Traction Heat and Power Company's bills that this company does not include a monthly service charge. Although their energy charge is 1 cent less per KWH than that of the Wisconsin Public Service Company, operating at Oshkosh, we find the actual charges to a rural customer of the Wisconsin Public Service Company to be the initial hook-up charge—\$110.00. Monthly service charge \$1.50, and the energy charge 12 cents per KWH, less 5% discount.

From all the information which we have been able to secure it appears there is little likelihood of an increase in rates through an order of the railroad commission. After a thorough investigation and understanding of the situation in Winnebago county, we are not in a position to state the expense of such an investigation, and recommend that the district attorney as well as a representative of the Wisconsin Public Service Corporation be given a hearing by the County Board before ordering such petition.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON COURT HOUSE SITE.

Supervisor Young offered the following Report No. 3:

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin.

Genetlemen: We, the undersigned committee, appointed by your honorable body on the 13th of July, 1925, empowering us to take options on such property and on such site as they see fit and report to this Board at the November, 1925, session, beg leave to report:

First: That your committee, together with city officials, city planning commission and other persons interested, have canvassed the situation and have come to the conclusion that Winnebago county ought and should build a new court house.

Second: That your committee have diligently canvassed available sites for court house purposes and report that they have concluded that there are but two available sites for said purpose. One is the property on Washington boulevard, east of Roe Park, extending between Washington boulevard and Northwestern avenue, north and south, and from Roe Park to the Northwestern depot, east and west, and the other site is the present grounds where the court house is now situated. The Washington boulevard site is 381 feet deep between Northwestern avenue and Washington boulevard, and 220 feet, east and West, on Washington boulevard. This takes in all of the property east of Roe Park except what is known as the Maxcy flat. But your committee has been unable to secure any option on any of this property except one piece of property known as the Webster place, and in order to secure this property condemnation proceedings would have to be instituted. The property is assessed for tax purposes east of Roe Park to the depot, except the Maxcy flat, for \$34,700.00. The Maxcy flat is assessed for \$20,000.00. There would be plenty of ground to build a court house on the property above described outside of the Maxcy property.

The present court house site is 336 feet deep between Otter street and Ceape street, and 200 feet fronting on Otter street. There are many objections to building a court house on the present site, among which are the switch track on Ceape street and the gas works on Ceape street, but we submit these two sites for your consideration. We would recommend that the Board determine a site for a new court house and provide for the raising of funds to build a new court house so that when the site is obtained the county could proceed to build. If the court house was built on the Washington street site it could use Roe Park for court house grounds

and would know that no buildings would ever be erected thereon.

Your committee would recommend that the County Board resolve itself into a committee of the whole during the November session and invite county and city officials, the city planning commission and interested persons to appear before the Board so that the Board could have the benefit of these agencies before acting.

Net gain of county fair operation in 1925, \$6,502.56, of which \$5,500

was spent for permanent improvements.

Of the \$10,000 received from the county board in 1924, \$250 was paid to the Wisconsin State Poultry Association, of Oshkosh, \$250 to the Twin City Poultry Association, of Neenah-Menasha, and \$9,500 on permanent improvements on the county's land. All improvements and buildings located on the Winnebago County Fair grounds are now paid for in full. We may consider our financial condition very healthy indeed, especially

when we look at the rlight of some of our sister fairs.

During the last two years, the Winnebago County Fair Association
has expended over \$22,000 from fair income, in permanent improvements

on the county's land.

Over 2,500 people had an active part in putting on the 1925 Winnebago county fair and exposition. Over 1,500 school children in Winnebago county had exhibits at the 1925 fair. This young generation of citizens in our county must be given an educational building in which to exhibit their worthy products at the 1926 fair. The "flower" of our educational exhibits has been crowded into a corner long enough.

The fame of our Winnelago county fair has grown by leaps and bounds. In a comparatively short time our gate receipts have jumped from \$4,600 to almost \$23,000. Authorities in the middle west have spoken of our fair as being among the very foremost county fairs in America

today.

Gentlemen: We, the undersigned tax payers residing on and adjacent to the highway below described and being patrons of mail route No. 2. which passes over said highway, request your honorable body to appropriate a sufficient sum of money to grade and gravel in first class manner the following described road:

Starting at the town house corner on highway E, near the Joe Quick farm in section 16, town of Nepeuskun, Winnebago county; and running west through section 17 and between sections 18 and 19 to the county line,

a distance of about two miles.

consin: Gentlemen: Following is the report of work carried on by the county nurse from November 1, 1924, to August 1, 1925:

The majority of these enlarged glands are undoubtedly enlarged thyroid

or goiter.

Publicity material was given out to each family on goiter, then material was sent to a woman in each school district; then a letter and material was sent to each school clerk asking them to bring up the matter at the annual school meeting so the goiter prevention work could be carried on over the county. The expense was small, about \$2 to a school district, and it is not in the experimental stage any longer, as it has been carried on in many cities in this state as well as others.

Work of this type was started at Omro, January, 1925, and carried on over the rest of the school year. Some parents reported that the goiters

had decreased in size.

There were two cases of diphtheria in a school in Winchester township and a great many people had been exposed due to a school entertainment being given. The school board took immediate action and called a doctor, who gave diphtheria antitoxin to the children and some adults. I took throat swabs and temperatures. Only one family refused to take antitoxin. The school was not closed and we had no further cases.

In December we had a very nice start on a smallpox epidemic. When it was discovered the health board of Utica immediately made arrangements for free vaccinations, the health officer and I talking vaccination until we had 142 vaccinated in this one township. It was interesting to note that as the disease progressed the more severe it was in a number of cases. No one broke out with smallpox that had ever been vaccinated.

A few reported a few of the symptoms.

A few of the schools closed on account of the epidemic, but we could not see that it was an advantage, except in the one district where so many pupils had the disease that it would not pay to keep school open. Schools were closed 82½ days due to contagious disease, and I firmly believe that same results would have been obtained if the majority of these schools had not closed.

We had an interesting scarlet fever epidemic at Allenville. New cases would continuously break out, and usually we can find what we call a missed mase then. I made numerous home calls and found several families who had suspicious symptoms of scarlet fever. This was reported to the health officer, who in turn called a doctor, and he diagnosed these cases as scarlet fever. In this instance school was closed, as the attendance was not so poor and we felt that if we closed until after the Christmas vacation, that attendance would be better, and it was.

During the entire year, I have found that if contagious cases are watched all the time and regulations followed, that these diseases could be reduced to a minimum, but it requires the cooperation of the teacher, school

board, parents and health officer, doctor and the nurse.

When a teacher knows that there is a case of measles in the district and she does nothing about it, we cannot expect to reduce these diseases, but rather we will increase them.

It might be of interest to you to know that our regulation in regard to

mumps is very inadequate. The rule states:

"All persons with mumps must be isolated for two weeks after onset of disease and one week after disappearance of swelling. Well children in family may return to school, but must be excluded upon the appearance of fever, cold or glandular swelling."

And it is not even a placardable disease. Consequently we find it very

difficult to check.

The vocational educational board at Madison is doing some very good re-educational work for handicapped, but could do a great deal more it handicapped cases would take an early advantage of this opportunity.

Last year I reported to you a case of a boy needing a new artificial leg. This was secured, but first of all the boy needed a few inches of the bone removed. I secured care at the hospital for him through the town board, and the doctor gave free service for the operation.

An interesting two-day chest clinic was held at Winchester and Omro, the State Anti-Tuberculosis Association conducting the clinic. Results were

as follows:

Three active cases. One quiescent or inactive. Three suspicious. Two healed cases.

Sanatorium care was advised for two and they both entered the sanatorium within a very short time.

Seventeen cases of decayed teeth. Six cases of pyorrhea. Goiters—43.

Heart disease—5. Smallpox vaccination was recommended for 48 people. Home calls or follow-up work is made on tuberculosis cases as well as

cases that I find in the school.

At this time I have twenty-seven cases of tuberculosis in the county ostile of the cities. I visit some of these about every three months, and a few more often, and the cases that we feel are healed, I have not planned to visit them more than about once a year.

Advice is given as to rest, taking of temperature, fresh air, sunlight,

and frequent examinations by the family physician.

Number of homes visited-208.

These were visited for tuberculosis, cripple, neglect, expectant mothers,

babies, school children, and contagious diseases.

During the winter the officials of a village asked me to help them with affailly of six children, where the mother was mentally far below normal, and the father illiterate and irresponsible. The two older children were in school, and not able to accomplish any work. In making a crude mental test, the mother had mentality of about a twelve-year-old. I believe you all realize that no girl of twelve could without help purchase food, clothing, and maintain a desirable home; not only that, but it is these type of people that are filling our state institutions.

These people were brought into court and the mother was sent to Chippewa Falls, father to the Northern hospital for treatment, and the children

to the state home at Sparta.

This type of work is very hard to do for several reasons. It seems very hard to break up the poorest kind of a home, and it is difficult to get neighbors to aid in bringing the family or parents before the court. It is this type of work that takes weeks of time to cover, as we must not form an opinion on home conditions the first time we see them.

I have a case of a young boy with inflamed eyes whom I have worked with ever since I have been in the county, and at last I got him into a hospital; and he had been there about two months when his parents took him home. A great deal of time, energy and money have been expended on him and unless some drastic procedure is applied, the boy may lose his eyesight

and have to receive a blind pension.

An interesting fact that has been noted this year is the number of requests by people of the county that has been made for the service of the nurse. One hundred and sixty-three such requests were made, for various types of work, contagious diseases, infant feeding, expectant mothers, to discuss defects found in a child, and neglected children.

Another interesting fact is in regard to follow-up school work, for abnormal teeth, tonsils, eyes. The mother often tells the nurse, "Well, I thought about it, but I really have not got around to do anything," and the response is much greater after the nurse is able to make her visit,

# REPORT TO COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF WINNEBAGO COUNTY, WISCONSIN.

Gentlemen: The following is the report of work covered by the county nurse from September 1, 1925, to November 1, 1925: School Work.

Special projects planned for this year's work is the goiter prevention campaign as outlined in the foregoing report of Miss McLean. The county health committee have purchased the iodine tablets, 1-6 gr., and are supplying them at cost to the schools cooperating in this work. A permission blank is sent to parents of each child. Only those children, whose parents so desire, are given treatment. Thirty-three rural schools with an enrollment of 736 pupils are receiving treatment up to date. Omro and Winneconne have also expressed their desire to cooperate, which will make an additional number of about 706.

To date no contagious other than skin infections have been reported in

the schools of the county.

Because we believe knowledge without action is of no value, we are publishing a monthly bulletin on health projects for the rural schools. We hope by this means to secure better health work in habit formation.

In Miss McLean's report you will note she urged the cooperation of all interested parties in the control of contagious diseases. May I also ask for

your cooperation?

Mothers' meetings are planned where possible to observe the school inspection. This we believe aids a great deal in getting corrective work done.

Rehabitation-State Aid for the Handicapped.

One high school girl has been aided in securing her scholarship to continue her high school education, which became impossible for her, due to an injury of her limb.

Another child has been receiving treatment at Milwaukee, which we

hope will result in his being able to use his right arm and leg.

To date seven cases of handicapped children have been investigated, with the object of putting them in a position where they will be able to earn their own living.

Social Service—Or Helping the Individual to Help Himself.

The nurse has given considerable of her time to investigation of cases where the problem is not primarily a health problem, but rather neglect, failure to provide, etc. The nurse is glad to be of service in this manner. Cooperation of township boards and interested parties is very necessary in really arriving at a solution of many of these problems. Without proper support much of our time is wasted in making innumerable calls.

# SUPERVISING TEACHER'S REPORT.

Miss Anna Ryss offered the following Report No. 10: To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin.

Gentlemen: In accordance with the law, the county superintendent appointed the supervising teacher for a term of ten months, beginning in Aurgust, 1925, and ending in June, 1926. Sec. 39.14, Wisconsin Statutes, explains in detail the duty of the supervising teacher as "to supervise and assist, under the direction of the county superintendent, the teachers employed in the schools, of the county or superintendent district, devoting special attention to the less experienced teachers. He shall, under the direction of the county superintendent, assist in organizing and administering the schools of the county, classifying them according to the character of the work done, and in grading pupils toward the development of their individual capabilities."

The state department of education directs the work of supervision by sending out bulletins and outlines from time to time. One of the inspectors of the state department of education visits the supervising teacher at least once a year, and discusses in detail the particular phases of work that should be given special attention. A conference of supervising teachers is held annually in Madison. The members of the state department discuss the plans for the year, and present in detail any new work that is proposed. The conference for the present school year was held in August. An intensive study of classroom technique and analysis of the recitation was made. The aim of this particular phase of work is to center the thought on the supervision of instruction in the schools.

The best school is the one wherein we find complete harmony between the teacher, the school board and the patrons of the district. In order to further this cause the supervising teacher plans to confer with members of the school boards as occasion demands, and to become acquainted with the

people of the various districts.

The total cost of the supervising teacher and expense for the school year 1924-25 was \$2,650.62. The state reimburses the county for this full

amount.

In the present year thirty-five days have been spent in school visite.

In the schools in the county have been visited. One hundred and twenty school visits have been made; six days were spent at the county fair, placing, caring for and judging the school exhibits; seven days have been spent at teachers' institutes, school board convention and teachers' conventions.

Reports of all the school visits are made to the county superintendent and these in turn are forwarded to the teachers and the school clerks. Suggestions are made in regard to the condition of the buildings, proper equipment and the teaching work observed. In the short time that I have served the county this year the work has been made very pleasant by the fine spirit of cooperation which the teachers have shown. Evidence of the good work done by former supervisors is reflected in the friendly attitude toward supervision in general. The high type of teaching work done in most of

the schools in the county is a direct result of good professional training and

close supervision in service.

The plan of issuing the six weeks' outlines or bulletins that was introduced last year is being continued. In connection with the outlines, ability tests are sent to the teachers. When the results of the tests come to the office a direct check can be made on the quality of work that is being done by the pupils. This reflects the teacher's work because the results obtained in the classroom is the only true test of a teacher's ability as an instructor.

in the classroom is the only true test of a teacher's ability as an instructor. During the months of November and December teachers' group meetings will be held on Saturdays. Demonstration teaching, and a general discussion of classroom procedure will be the main features of the programs. In community service we are desirous to respond to the calls that comform various sources. We want to meet the community groups. The good will and cooperation of parents and patrons in the districts are essential to our success in the county. Several community gatherings have been attended, and we are looking forward, with pleasure, to, meeting more of the

people in this way.

In spite of the plans that have been made as mentioned above, it is impossible to feel satisfied that the work is done as it should be. The visits to the schools are not frequent enough because of the distance that must be traveled to reach them. The time for community work is too limited. To obtain the best results, the supervisory district should be small enough to permit more intensive work. Every teacher should be visited once every four or six weeks. Our plea is for more and closer supervision of the rural schools. We are hopefully looking forward to the time when the rural school situation will cease to be a problem and when the country boy or girl is enjoying the same educational advantages and opportunities that the city boys and girls are now having. Money on hand June 30, 1925.....

Since making the report last year I have visited all of the 96 schools at least twice and some of them three times. During the school year 192425 I made 134 visits or an increase of 14 over last year, most of them one-fourth day visits in inspecting the schools and assisting the teacher. Detailed reports are made to the teacher and school clerk. To date, I have made 52 visits. Five night meetings have been held this year.

The work for the year is blocked out very definitely for the teachers, according to the state course of study, into periods of six weeks each. At the end of each period ability tests are given, which serve as a check on both teacher and pupil. Not only are these tests averaged at the end of the year with the final examinations, but they also afford an opportunity

for doing remedial work.

Two general institutes and five group meetings were held during the past year. Topics pertaining to the newer teaching methods are presented. Usually we have a teacher who is especially strong in a given subject to demonstrate the teaching of a lesson in that subject. Helps and procedures are sent out regularly during the year.

Improvements.

No new buildings were constructed during the year. Many have been repaired and will be recommended for special state aid during the coming year. Sixteen schools out of twenty-five received special state aid during the last year. The school known as the Banner School, No. 8, Rushford, through the efforts of Mr. Geo. S. Dick, of the state department, and myself, was able to get over \$1,000 back state aid after meeting certain requirements. It is indeed a pleasure to work when we have such hearty cooperation.

Certification.

In comparing the figures with those of last year, we find that 89 teachers have first grade certificates as compared with 69 of a year ago, 18 second grade as compared with 28, and 1 third as compared with 9. If possible, we want only first grade certificate teachers, which means that every teacher will have an average of 85 or above in all certificate subjects.

Attendance.

The average daily attendance for 1923-24 was 86%. In 1924-25 the average was lowered to about 83%, while the average for the state was 79%. The decrease was due largely to the contagious disease epidemic in the spring and work at home. We hope this year to better the record of 1923-24.

# Reading Circle Work.

The teachers of the county belong 100% to the local county teachers' association, which authorizes the superintendent to buy professional reading circle books. Written reports are made to the office and a certificate or seal is given. The teacher must have done her reading circle work each year that the certificate is in force in order to extend or renew same. Last year 1,939 pupils did reading circle work, an increase of 860 over 1924 and 1,160 over 1923. Much credit for this splendid increase is due to the efforts of the teachers. We hope to better this record next year.

#### County Fair.

Two years ago eight schools were represented at the county fair, while in 1924 twenty-two schools were represented. This year was a record year, with forty-five schools exhibiting, some taking away as much as \$20 in prize money. There were over 650 individual entries. Next year we will have an education building.

#### Products Exposition.

One hundred eighty-seven pupils wrote essays this year on "The Farm and Factory Dependent on Each Other, Create an Opportunity for Future Generatoins." Each contestant was given credit in language work. The winning boy and girl were given a two-day trip to the Milwaukee state fair, with all expenses paid. They were guests of the Wisconsin Manufacturers' Association.

#### Thrift.

The subject of thrift was introduced in the schools last year. Mr. R. E. Sanders, educational bank representative, sent out circular material and visited each school, giving a talk on thrift. We are pletsed to report that sixty schools out of a possible ninety had savings accounts. Twelve of the schools had 100% savings. So far we have reports from forty schools with a balance of \$1,390.00. This work will be pushed again this year.

Farm Record Books.

Farm account books were used in the seventh and eight grades last year. Credit is given in arithmetic for keeping the record. In some districts the pupils were given permission to use home figures. The idea is to encourage the farmer to keep an account of all business transactions on the farm. The books contain an interesting list of income tax reductions

Fire prevention was observed October 5 to 10. Friday, October 30, the annual school board convention was held. American education week will be observed November 16-22, with appropriate exercises each day of the week. Again I wish to publicly acknowledge the splendid cooperation I have had the past year with the following individuals and organizations: County Board, school boards, teachers, supervising teacher, county nurse, and county clerk.

The following is a good recipe for education:

To infinite patience add a little wisdom, carefully strained through profitable experience. Pour in a brimming measure of the milk of human kindness, and season well with the salt of common sense. Boil gently over a friendly fire made of fine enthusiasms, stirring constantly with just discipline. When it has boiled long enough to be thoroughly blended, transfuse it by wise teaching to the eager mind of a restless boy and set away to cool. Tomorrow he will greet you an educated man.

STATE INSURANCE ON SANATORIUM PROPERTY.

Waushara and Winnebago counties, in which they desire to have their property insured with the state insurance fund against loss by fire or tornado for a term of five years. The amount to be insured is to be 90% of the value of the building and contents.

We note further that you, as treasurer of Winnebago county, are to renew these policies as they expire, and we are, therefore, applying to you for a list of the policies expiring, giving the dates and amounts and what each policy covers, so that we may renew them as they expire.

The rural population for Winnebago county in 1920 is given at 16,350, and we have 3,127 books for these people. Number of library collections to send out.....

The law concerning county libraries is so far out of date that the people of Winnebago county are being cheated out of their share of pleasure and education by books. The cost of books and supplies has risen with other expenses, so that the small appropriation we have for the libraries is

entirely inadequate.

The child in the country goes to town only occasionally to be fitted to a pair of shoes or clothes. His parents are busy, so that they haven't time to buy him a book or to take him to the city library, and hence he gets little contact with books except those he gets at school. If we are unable to supply the schools with books to supplement the text books, what chance has the country child to read? He does not have an equal chance with his city friend, because he cannot have access to books.

We are more and more beginning to recognize the influence of books in the life of people. Now what can we do for the children and the citizens of Winnebago county? Is there not a means by which we can provide books for the people by an increased appropriation, so that we may name Winnebago county as a far-sighted, progressive county? If there is a legal possibility, we recommend that the County Board appropriate the sum of \$1,000 to be spent for books and the care of them so that the children at least may have an equal chance with those of the city.

# COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT'S ANNUAL REPORT.

A. Sell, county agricultural agent, offered the following Report No. 20: To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors, Winnebago County, Wis-

Gentlemen: I am pleased to submit herewith for your consideration the annual report of county agricultural agent work in Winnebago county for the year ending October 31, 1925, in brief outline form. GUSTAV A. SELL, County Agricultural Agent.

# T. B. Eradication.

To complete the petitions for county-wide T. B. cleanup in cattle, the county agent, with the help of local leaders in the several townships, made 552 personal calls. The importance of getting this disease under control was discussed at four meetings, with an attendance of 470; and moving pictures illustrating the work were shown at seven other meetings, with an attendance of 355. Through this direct personal work, mostly in sections where local canvassers had not gotten complete response, there were 445 more new names put on the petitions. This gives us a good margin above the required 60% of cattle owners.

The petitions were turned over to the state department of agriculture last April, checked by them, and found sufficient. The customary hearing will be held in the county possibly in the near future. The agricultural commissioner informed us recently that Winnebago county is fifth on the

waiting list, and will probably be reached by next July.

It is only fitting at this time to express thanks publicly to the hundreds of farmers and farm women who have made this possible. With an unbounded faith in the T. B. test as the only known means of controlling bovine tuberculosis, they zealously explained to their neighbors the danger from bovine tuberculosis to the human family. And especially will we be grateful to those men who helped circulate the petitions, starting at times in the face of criticism, but gradually changing opposition to support.

#### Sweet Clover for Pasture.

After several years of scattered trials with sweet clover pasture had proven it to be a bigger carrying capacity and a longer season of growth than our ordinary pastures, the agricultural committee this year made this one of the three major projects. The possibilities and problems of sweet clover pasture were given all possible publicity by your county agent-both in newspaper articles and at all kinds of meetings, farm institutions, school programs, caucuses, and special meetings. Good interest was manifested and quite a few local experiences brought to light.

That a goodly number of Winnebago county farmers took the suggestion of trying a little piece was demonstrated by the greatly increased sales of sweet clover seed. Many of the dealers reported having to repeatedly

send in rush orders for more.

Full twenty cooperators were lined up to put in trial demonstration plots. Fifteen of these are known to have actually gotten a stand started. From among this number we should undoubtedly have some fine demonstration sweet clover pastures next summer.

#### Poultry Improvement.

Ten culling demonstrations were held this fall with an attendance of 122 people. It is noticeable that the principles of telling a good and poor laying hen are becoming somewhat better known. It is our ambition to keep on holding these culling demonstrations until the majority of people interested in poultry can tell good egg laying type of hen as well as the majority of dairymen can tell good milk producing type of cow.

Another phase of poultry improvement work started last year was made use of. The flocks in which breeding pens had been selected with the assistance of our poultry specialist were referred to people looking for good foundation breeding stock. This line of work should be extended until there are at least sufficient good flocks to furnish breeding cockerels and

hatching eggs for the county.

A third line of poultry work in process of development now is the holding of a series of poultry schools with the help of our poultry specialist. These, it is planned to make partly in the nature of local leader training classes, similar to the organization of the women's work, so that the people who are unable to attend the school may get the work from local leaders.

#### Orchard Improvement.

This work for better fruit was built around the three principles of good pruning, thorough spraying and careful grading.

Four pruning demonstrations were held with an attendance of forty-

three.

Thorough spraying and timely spraying was not only given publicity from time to time in the newspapers, but was also carefully followed out in three organized spray rings with a membership of fifty-four. Two of these rings had been in operation last year and their operators under our supervision are becoming quite expert and thorough. The third ring is new this year, has had some supervision, but will need more before anything near perfection will be obtained.

Three apple grading demonstrations were held with the fruit specialist In these spray ring areas to call attention to the essential practice of successful marketing. A survey of spray ring members shows most of them to be practically sold out in spite of the heavy apple crop this year.

The reports on hand from fifteen spray ring members showed that they produced fifteen hundred and twenty-nine bushels of apples from 382 trees, used or kept for home use 472 bushels, sold 797 bushels for \$748.89, and their spraying cost was \$230.40.

# Alfalfa to Control Thistles.

There was no definite county wide campaign this year to promote alfalfa growing partly as a thistle control measure, but it was discussed in connection with most of the sweet clover meetings and also at other places, in addition-individual assistance and advice was given. The work of the past six or seven years on this project has put this crop in a position where it can now practically speak for itself. Only one other county in the state can now equal Winnebago county in the proportion of its cultivated acreage in alfalfa.

A new development in our alfalfa growing program is the arrangement for limestone grinding in the northern part of the county so that the sour soil areas in western Winchester and Wolf River may also be able to grow this crop. A grinder is being set up at the present time to serve this need.

Your county agent is serving on a committee with three local farmers to see that good material is going to be furnished.

Cow Testing Association Work.

Cow Testing Association work has been kept going as before, except that the Wolf River Association has quit temporarily on account of the difficulty to keep a tester the year around. The Oshkosh Association, after a summer vacation, with considerable canvassing, was reorganized in September. The Neenah Association just recently started their new year with practically all the old members in it.

More of these associations would be a big help to our dairy farmers in culling out their poor cows, making the production of milk more economical and hence the profits from dairying bigger: but somehow or other it is hard

to interest many people in this work.

Several other systems of cow culling are being tried in Wisconsin at the present time. These we are watching with interest to see whether something can be developed that more dairy farmers will use.

Swine Improvement Work.

Better pork prices brought a new interest this year to both the ton litter contest and pig pasture demonstrations held with the assistance of H. J. Brant, swine specialist, from the university. The ton litter contest was made interesting by the handsome prizes offered therefor by our County Fair Association. Three litters made over two tons of pork at 180 days of age, one of these with nine pigs averaging about 245 pounds each. Two of these litters were shown at the county fair.

Two very fine rig pasture demonstrations were conducted. One cooperator produced pork at a feed cost, including whey, of \$5.06 a hundred. The other for about \$7.00 a hundred. The former fed the required 233 pounds of grain to make the hundred pounds, which is only about half the amount required on dry lot feeding. The demonstrations showed alfalfa pasture to make good bone and growth and to save 25 to 50% of the grain

required without such pasture.

Drainage Work.

The demand for drainage work, especially at the beginning of the year, was rather light, undoubtedly on account of the hard times farmers have experienced for some years. Towards the latter part of the year more interest was again taken. Twelve jobs of surveying were done. Preliminary surveys in laying out draining systems were done for 430 acres of wet land, and over 5,000 feet of tile being laid, according to the county agent's specifications. Indications are that this service will be made more use of the coming year after the farmers are a little more prosperous.

Farm Bookkeeping.

Farm bookkeeping practice in the rural schools was carried on a second year with the cooperation of the county superintendent and his assistants. Four hundred and fifty seventh and eighth grade pupils completed practice farm account books with the given set of figures for a year's farm business, and they did it in a more thorough and satisfactory manner than the first year. This was done as extra arithmetic work and credit was given on the final examinations.

This year the eighth-graders who had that practice work are given opportunity to keep books on their own farm business, confidential, of course, and get some school credit therefor. The seventh graders will be furnished a given set of figures as done the year before. This accounting practice was nitiated to encourage the habit of careful accounting in these future farmers and farm wives so that when they take over the business it will be easy

and natural for them to keep systematic books on their business.

Women's Work for the Farm Home.

The women's work this year consisted of eight foods and cooking-classes—four in fall and four in spring, each one having a series of four lessons a month with the university home economics specialist. That made thirty-two meetings with the specialist. In addition, local leaders, mostly in the last four classes, held fifty-three meetings and passed the work on to their neighbors. The records show a total attendance of 1,956 at the eighty-five meetings. Thirty-five local leaders in the last four classes reach 241 separate women through their group meetings.

The work given covered a wide range of food and cooking subjects from infant and child feeding to planning balanced rations for the family as well as for the cows; to the making of attractive economical dishes from home grown supplies; down to the health qualities of various food products.

When the pension has been insufficient aid for the Oshkosh families, the Bureau of Family Service has supplemented the pension with clothing, fuel and groceries, as the case required. The amount of aid needed is determined by a budget for each family which is balanced with the family income. The Bureau is giving grocery allowances to three families, one receiving \$3 a week and two others \$5 a week each.

The families in Oshkosh have the advantage of free medical and hospital care when needed from Mercy Circle. In the year of 1925, Mercy Circle gave free hospital service to eighteen children at an expense of. \$100.30 To two mothers \$96.35 To one incapacitated father \$95.50 Board was given to one child, two weeks \$29.50 W.ray to one child \$6.00

\$252.15

An effort is being made to work out some plan by which families in other parts of the county may have similar aid. The mothers' pension is not sufficient to cover medical and hospital care.

Charity Circle, another local organization, is furnishing milk to four families, amounting to eight quarts daily. Clothing is furnished to children

by Service League and Thimble "B" societies.

Three children are being boarded in boarding homes. The mother of two of these children is at Sunnyview Sanatorium, and it is hoped and believed the mother will be in her home before the year is over, and the family reinstated. The other child's mother is in the home for the feebleminded at Chippewa Falls, and the father is in the county asylum. A small amount of money from the mother's estate is being cared for by the Oshkosh Savings and Trust Company, and this with a pension is caring for the child in a home. Dr. William Dealey of the Child's Guidance Clinic of the State Normal School gave this child a mental examination and advised as to the care to favor normal development. She did not have the privilege of being well born, but we are giving her the privilege of growing into a normal adult, which is possible is she is kept in a home with the normal home atmosphere instead of being sent to an institution.

The probation work has covered contacts with 32 families in addition to the 123 pension families. This makes a total of 157 families with whom the worker has been in as frequent contact as possible by the use of street car, bus and walking. The 32 families in which probation work has been done have not all come through the juvenile court, but were also referred by individuals and sometimes parents. The problems presented by these cases were juvenile delinquency, marital difficulties, intemperance and im-

morality.

The assistance of physicians, dentists, nurses, attorneys, churches, schools, men's and women's organizations and private individuals has been given generously and understandingly. The Big Brothers of the Kiwanis Club in Oshkosh have been doing fine work with boys. The Scout workers are also adding their share. In Neenah and Menasha the Red Cross societies have been most helpful and co-operative in the work.

Always is kept in mind five elements of normal life: Health, education, employment, recreation and spiritual development, and with the co-operation of outside forces an effort is made to bring into and strengthen these

elements in the lives of the families.

To rear successfully a family of children is no small task with the combined efforts of father and mother, and when fathers drop out and the entire burden rests upon the mother, when first confronted by her alone, it is often an overwhelming situation. Through the mothers' pension the family is helped to maintain the right standard of living, and through the understanding contacts of outside forces there is, in a considerable measuse, a removal of the stress and strain that tends to break both body and spirit and it is made possible to look upon today as the threshold of a bet ter tomorrow.

It is hoped that the County Board will feel that the money spent in this department for mothers' pensions, probation work and equipment that the work may be done properly, is well spent. There is no more important work than caring for our children-the coming generation.

PETITION—BRIDGES IN TOWN OF POYGAN.

Poygan, Winnebago county, Wisconsin, respectfully shows as follows: That the town of Poygan has voted to construct two bridges wholly within said town of Poygan, known as the Lee bridge and the Hart bridge, located in sections 19 and 27, in said town.

# STATE AND COUNTY AID CONSTRUCTION AND MAINTENANCE DURING THE CALENDAR YEAR 1926.

Supervisor Spore offered the following Resolution No. 26:

The County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago county, Wisconsin, regularly assembled, does hereby ordain that such funds as may be made available to the county for highway work under the provisions of Section 20.49 and Chapters 83 and 84 of the statutes, and the additional sums herein appropriated shall be expended as hereinafter set forth:

Section I. Whereas: The state highway commission has notified the county clerk that a sum of money estimated to be ninety-five thousand, four hundred thirty dollars, (\$95,430) will become available at the end of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1926, under the provisions of subsection (9) of section 20.49 of the statutes, for the improvement of the state and county trunk highway systems in the county, but that its exact amount will not

be known until after June 30, 1926, and

Whereas: Twenty per cent of the sum so to become available, or the sum of nineteen thousand, eighty-six dollars (\$19,086) is required by law (subsection (9) of section 84.03) to be set aside for the improvement of the county trunk highway system in the county, the county highway committee is hereby authorized and directed to expend the said sum for the improvement of said county trunk highway system during 1926 in the following manner, to-wit:

To construct Pumpkin Seed bridge on county trunk D in the town of

Poygan, five thousand dollars (\$5,000).

To continue the construction of the Omro-Eureka road of concrete 18 feet in width, commencing at the west end of the 1925 construction work on said road, ten thousand dollars (\$10,000); for maintenance of the county

system, four thousand eighty-six dollars (\$4,086).

Section II. Whereas: The state highway commission has estimated that the sum of \$76,344.00 will become available under subsection (9) of section \$4.03 as stated for the improvement of the state trunk highway system in the county, in accordance with the provisions of chapter \$3 of the statutes, of which amount the state has set aside fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) to use in the completion of state trunk highway 95 from Teela's Corners to the village of Winchester, and beyond westward to concrete already constructed, leaving the sum of twenty-six thousand, three hundred forty-four dollars (\$26,344) to be expended on the Cherry street extension from the city limits of the city of Appleton to state trunk highway 15.

Therefore, be it resolved that the said sum of twenty-six thousand, three hundred forty-four dollars (\$26,344) be expended for the improvement of the said Cherry street extension from highway 15 to the city limits of the

city of Appleton in the town of Menasha.

Section III. Whereas: It appears that certain additional highway improvements in the county are necessary and warranted, the said County Board does hereby appropriate the following sums for the purpose herein set forth:

The sum of one hundred thirty thousand dollars (\$130,000) for the construction of state highway 34 of concrete 13 feet in width, commencing at the north end of the bridge over Fox river in the village of Omro, and extending over highway 34 to Main street in the village of Winneconne.

The sum of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) for the construction of state trunk highway 26 of concrete 18 feet in width, commencing at Gillingham's Corners, extending north on state highway to the county line of Outagamie county, thence east one-fourth of a mile on the county line road.

There is hereby transferred the balance of thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000) more or less in the Neenah-Winchester road fund as follows: Twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) to the Omro-Eureka road, to be put with the ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) heretofore set out, to continue the construction of the Omro-Eureka road of concrete 18 feet in width, comencing at the west end of the 1925 construction work on said road and continuing as far as the money provided will build. Ten thousand dollars

(\$10,000) more or less to the Omro-Winneconne road, known as state trunk highway 34, in addition to the one hundred thirty thousand dollars (\$130,000) heretofore appropriated for said road.

There is hereby assessed as special benefits against the following municinalities for construction of roads completed during the season of 1925

the following:

Against the Town of Omro for the Waukau-Oshkosh road......\$1,000,00 Against the Town of Omro for the Omro-Waukau road...... Against the Town of Rushford for the Omro-Waukau road...... Against the Town of Rushford for the Waukau-Oshkosh road..... Against the Town of Algoma for the Waukau-Oshkosh road...... 3,400.00 Against the Town of Omro for the Omro-Eureka road...... Against the Village of Omro for the Omro-Eureka road.....

Section IV. Whereas: Appropriations are made herein in addition to the amounts available for work in the county under section 20.49 of the statutes, the County Board does hereby levy a tax on all the property in

the county to meet such appropriations, as follows:
For the construction of state trunk highway 34, between the village of Omro and the village of Winneconne, the sum of one hundred thirty thousand dollars (\$130,000).

For the construction of state trunk highway 26, from Gillingham's Corpers north to the Outagamie county line, the sum of fifty thousand dol-

The county clerk is hereby directed to levy the taxes named in section IV hereof in the county tax levy, and the county highway committee and the county highway commissioner are hereby directed to carry out the highway construction and maintenance for which provision is hereby made, in the manner provided by law, and to employ such patrolmen, laborers and foremen, as they may deem necessary for such purnose

### COST OF ROAD CONSTRUCTION.

as follows on concrete road construction for 1925: No. 1-Neenah-Winchester-Larsen roads, length 5.6 miles, width 18 ft. Road completed at a cost of \$22,091.00 per mile. Local stone was used and the sand shipped in. Grading \$14,281.39, culverts \$3,043.83, 20-foot bridge \$2,334.71, concrete surfacing \$100,807.59, engineering, inspection and supervision, \$3,243.50, a total of \$123,710.02.

No. 2-Omro-Eureka road, a project of 51/2 miles, of which 31/2 miles of surfacing is laid and 1/2 mile of the 31/2 miles shouldered. The original plans of the committee was for a 4-mile project when it was thought shipped in materials would have to be used, but later, when local materials were found of quality and sufficient quantity and could be gotten at a much lower cost than shipped in materials, the committee decided that the saving would build another 11/2 miles, so made the project a 51/2 mile job, but on account of the unseasonable weather were hindered in finishing the job this season. Total spent to date, \$81,630.98, less credit of cement sacks, sand and cement on hand of \$5,500, leaving \$76,170.98 spent on the 3½ miles of road.

The following report No. 35½ was presented: To the Honorable Chairman and Members of the Board of Supervisors of

Winnebago County, Wisconsin.

Gentlemen: I submit herewith my report covering the work of copying and redrawing certain recorded plats filed in the register of deeds' office. as authorized by the County Board during its January, 1925, session.

This work consisted of copying and redrawing all of the plats filed in plat books No. 6-A, No. 7, and No. 8, Books 6-A and 7 are combined in one

volume. Book 8 is a separate volume.

Because of the temporary nature and poor condition of some of these old plats it was found necessary to replace them with drawings made with waterproof ink, upon sheets which would preserve these records in permanent form.

All of this work was done under the direction of the abstract committee, consisting of Supervisors Zentner, Getchius and Oborn, with Supervi-

sor Zentner as chairman.

A preliminary survey of the work to be performed brought out the fact that a satisfactory sheet upon which to make these records in a permanent and substantial manner was not available, and that it would therefore be necessary to design and develop a special sheet for this particular purpose. It was not thought that any great difficulty would be encountered in the

preparation of a desirable sheet.

Ten samples of different kinds were made up by three large publishing and binding concerns, and three samples were subjected to a series of tests arranged to determine durability, strength, resistance to wear, and ability to receive and hold an ink record. Every sample failed under these tests. Sheets made entirely of paper were tried, and samples made with two pieces of paper having cloth glued between them were tested, all with unsatisfactory results. Pieces made entirely of cloth were also tried, but gave poor Some of these samples were durable and strong, but would not take ink; others would take ink, but would not stand up under constant handling. Finally, however, a really superior sheet was developed.

Ten samples were ordered from a Chicago manufacturer of high grade drawing materials. This factory made six trials before a perfect sheet was produced. This last sample was then subjected to all necessary tests for wear and ability to take and hold ink. Last of all it was given a destruction test of distreatment and abuse, and its behavior under this test convinced

me that it was the best and most durable record sheet obtainable.

The manufacturer then made up the order of ten sheets. Drawings of some of the plats to be copied were then made upon them, and submitted

to the abstract committee. The committee approved them.

The sheet as finally adopted is made of one piece of tough, flexible binders' board, covered with fine linen cloth specially treated. The cloth is one continuous piece extending from the binding strip across the front of the page, around the edge and back across the back of the page to the binding strip. A special flexible vegetable glue which will not harden with age is used to cement the cloth and binders' board together. All wrinkles and air bubbles are rolled out, and a perfect union obtained. The sheets thus made are then placed in a steam heated hydraulic press, and kept for four days under a pressure of ten tons. After being released from this press, holes for the covers are punched in the binding strip, and the sheets are ready for use. They have a smooth and firm surface for drawing and result in the work which can now be seen in the register of deeds' office.

Upon examination of the old plat books it was found that fifty-one (51) plats, comprising a total of sixty-four (64) sheets of books 6-A, 7 and 8, were in very poor condition as a result of damage from handling, and were rapidly losing their value as records. Work was started immediately to transfer these records to the new sheets and plat books so as to preserve these

records in permanent form.

The total cost of doing this is \$3,690.46.

This total figure includes the reproduction of the Menasha Map complete in seven pages of condensed work, which cost \$552.11 to produce. This leaves a balance of \$3,138.35 as the cost of the remaining 50 plats, which gives for each plat, including the redrawing and copying of the plats, and the checking and verification of information shown, an average cost of \$62.77 each. Some of these cost as much as \$240.00, and others as little as \$25.00.

The original number of sheets considered for redrawing was forty-six (46), and the price for doing this work was twenty-eight hundred seventy-five dollars (\$2,375.00). The committee then added eighteen more of the old sheets which also needed replacement, bringing the total to sixty-four. This increase of work would bring a proportional increase of cost of eleven hundred thirty-two dollars (\$1,132.00), but by properly organizing the work it was possible to do this for an increase of only eight hundred fifteen dollars

and forty-six cents (\$815.46).

Every modern engineering and drafting device that could be of any assistance was used on the job. The lettering and printing were systematized, and a standard method of transferring the certificates and resolutions was applied. In addition to this a special drafting machine was used. This machine takes the readings from a surveyor's transit, and transfers them in their true form and relation directly to the plat sheet without the use of the ordinary crude instruments and tools commonly available for this purpose, and without the use of calculations. In this manner all mistakes of drafting were eliminated, and many corrections made, so that the new records are much more valuable than the old ones.

Seven engineers and draftsmen were used on the job. Each of them was a specialist in his line, and was delegated to do his certain kind of

work on each sheet.

I would like to have every member of the Board inspect this work, and compare the old system of work with the new. As it is now worked out, the new system of filing will eliminate any further cost to the county for redrawing old records to preserve them, for the plats are properly drawn with proper materials upon the present standard sheet; you will have a fine record in permanent form. ### REPORT OF COUNTY AGRICULTURAL COMMITTEE.

The following report of the agricultural committee was read: To the Chairman and Members of the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County.

Gentlemen: Your county agricultural committee would like to call your attention at this time to some of the things that are under consideration by this committee, and the need for a small increase in the appropriation

that is to be made at this session of the Board.

In planning the work for the county agent for the coming year your committee had placed the woman's work on home making as one of the

committee had placed the woman's work on home making as one of the major projects, and this will increase to some extent the work of the county agent as well as his office assistant.

Perhaps there is no county agent in Wisconsin doing more thorough, painstaking work than is our Mr. Sell. And many of them are receiving a larger salary than he is, and so we are asking you to consider this matter carefully when making your appropriations. We are therefore recommending that you increase the county's share of his salary from \$1,000 to \$1,300 per annum. This would bring his salary in conformity with several offers made him from other sources.

The work connected with the T. B. petitions took a large part of his time this year and added to the traveling expenses so much that there is only \$40 left for travel and office expenses for the remaining two months. Next year we believe we can get along all right with the same expenses

fund as heretofore.

For the past two or three years, with the cooperation of the farm bureau, who has helped to pay our stenographer, we have asked for only \$720 per annum for this part of the work, but at the close of this year the farm bureau will not be paying in anything toward the expenses of this office, and we feel that Miss Schneider is entitled to an increase in her salary to about \$1,200 so as to correspond to the amount paid other stenographers doing similar work, devoting her time entirely to the work of the county agent and the county agricultural committee.

We are therefore asking you to increase the total amount of your last

appropriation from \$2,900 to \$3,680.

The question has just been raised this morning whether, if the county agent's clerk would not have the farm bureau work to do, she could handle the stenographic work asked for by the probation officer and be paid for that. This matter is to be investigated by the several committees this afternoon. If the proposal is found feasible, the agricultural committee will gladly revise its recommendations on next year's budget accordingly.

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RURAL ELECTRIC RATES.

Supervisor Grunska offered the following Report No. 59:

To the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin: Gentlemen: In compliance with the instructions previously received from County Board, the special committee, appointed to investigate rural electric rates, beg leave to submit the following summary of facts and conclusions.

We have written and conferred with the local officials of the Wisconsin Public Service Corporation who furnish the electric energy in the county and compared their schedule of charges with those of the Wisconsin Traction Heat, Light and Power company operating at Neenah and Menasha and find they vary slightly, but total practically the same.

We have solicited some reduction in the connection charge of \$110.00

assessed by the Wisconsin Public Service Corporation. We have requested said company to adopt the rural rate advocated by Professor Duffee of the University of Wisconsin, who was in charge of the experimental line at Ripon, Wisconsin, and we believe if the electric companies of the county would adopt said rate it would be all that rural patrons could reasonably expect at the present stage of development reached in electrically driven farm machinery, considering also the very material losses suffered by all companies in the transformed or step down apparatus necessary at the residence of each rural user of electric current.

Therefore, your committee recommend that no appeal be made to the railroad rate commission until the Wisconsin Public Service Corporation had sufficient time and opportunity to submit replies to the requests above mentioned, and therefore recommend that the matter be postponed to the

March meeting of this Board.

# REPORT OF ROAD AND BRIDGE COMMITTEE ON ROAD CONSTRUCTION.

Supervisor Spore offered the following Report No. 3:

To the Honorable County Board of Winnebago County, Wisconsin.

Gentlemen: Your committee on roads and bridges beg leave to report as follows, with respect to road building for the coming season of 1926:

Your committee reports that there is available in the form of state and federal funds, for the construction of Highway 95, from Teela's Corners to the east end of the concrete highway on the Fremont-Zittau-Winchester. Neenah road, the sum of \$250,000.

That the said highway commission has called for bids for the construction of said road by contract, which bids, together with the cost of the cement to be furnished by the state, and without the cost of the right-of-way.

blue prints, engineering inspection, approximate \$270,000.

It is the opinion of your committee that if the state will permit the same to be done, that said highway of eight and one-half miles should be constructed by the county committee by day labor, and that the same can be constructed by approximately the said sum of \$250,000, thereby saving a sum in excess of \$20,000.

Your committee is at this time unable to state whether the state highway commission will permit said highway to be constructed by the county by day labor, but is endeavoring to secure permission to construct said road

in said way.

If it is the sense of this Board that said Highway 95 shall be constructed by the county by day labor for the purpose of saving money, as hereinbefore set out, then it will be necessary that other road construction by the county be suspended for the season, and that the Omro-Winneconne Road, Omro-Eureka Road, known as No. 34, and Highway 26, north of Gillingham's Corners, wait until the season of 1927.

Your committee therefore recommends that your honorable body adopt a resolution suspending work for the season on the Omro-Winneconne Road. and on the Omro-Eureka Road, and on Highway 26, north of Gillingham's Corners, and that your committee be instructed, if possible, to arrange with the state highway commission to build said Highway 95 by day labor, during the 1926 road building season.

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RURAL ELECTRIC RATES.

Supervisor Grimes offered the following Report No. 5: To the County Board of Winnebage County, Wisconsin:

Gentlemen-Your committee appointed to investigate rural rates for

electric service, beg leave to report as follows:

We have secured considerable data from Railroad Rate Commission of Wisconsin, which suggests quite conclusively what the result of an appeal to that body for a lowering of the rates in Winnebago county would be.

We have secured, through the courtesy of the Oshkosh officials of the Wisconsin Public Service Corporation. a tabulated comparison of the monthly charge to each of that company's rural patrons, with the charge for equal amounts of electric energy under the schedule advocated by the Wisconsin Power and Light Company, for the two months June and November, 1925. From this comparison, we find:

1. That the Wisconsin Power and Light Company will finance rural extensions to the extent of \$400 per customer and the Wisconsin Public

Service Corporation pays \$100 per customer toward rural construction.

2. Rural users of electric current pay less per KWH under the Wisconsin Public Service Corporation schedule, than they would under the rates proposed by Wisconsin Power and Light Company for a consumption below 60 KWHs per month. The rates proposed by Wisconsin Power and Light Company are most advantageous to the rural customers, providing no interest on the investment is included in either case. If 7 percent on investments is included, the total monthly charges change in favor of the proposed Wisconsin Fower and Light Company schedule at 35 KWHs per month, as shown by Railroad Rate Commission tabulation.

3. We find the average consumption of current by Wisconsin Public Service Corporation patrons on rural lines in Winnebago county for the month of June, 1925 was 23 KWHs. The average for November was 50 KWHs each. The average for year 1925, therefore, would be 23 plus 50

divided by 2 or 361/2 KWHs per month each.

4. We find the conditions and provisions of the contract advocated by the Wisconsin Power and Light Company involve an expenditure for electrical equipment, by the customer, equal to the company's investment per customer, unless customer uses electrical energy to the extent of 100

KWHs per month.

5. We find the small consumption per customer on rural lines, coupled with the size of the investment necessary to serve a rural customer, are the two factors responsible for most of the dissatisfaction we hear expressed. And in view of the fact that the greater portion of the investment for line construction is furnished by the customer without participation in ownership, this dissatisfaction seems more less justified.

6. We find the average cost of new extensions is \$1,200 per mile. If there are three customers per mile, they pay \$300 each, or three-fourths of the cost, the utility paying \$100 per customer, or \$300 per mile. Yet the

electric company acquires title to the entire line when completed.

7. We find a large percentage of farms are equipped with gasoline engines which perform satisfactorily the work for which electric energy might be used, in conjunction with lighting the farm home. But to justify discarding these engines, cost of current must be greatly reduced.

We believe, in view of all the data collected relative to rural electric rates in Winnebago county, that the Railroad Rate Commission, if appealed to, would declare said local rates reasonable, while the average consump-

tion per customer remains so small.

And therefore recommend that such appeal be deferred until such time as the application of electric power to farm machinery becomes more practical, economical and general, the consumption per rural customer thereby materially increased and the demand for a reduction in cost of current to rural customer more readily justified before the state rate-making body.

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BONDS AND SALARIES.

Supervisor Korotev offered the following Report No. 16.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin:

Gentlemen—Your committee on bonds and salaries, to which has been referred the resolutions providing for an increase in the salary of the deputy register of deeds, the clerk of the municipal court, and the judge of the juvenile court, beg leave to report as follows:

In relation to the deputy register of deeds, your committee reports that it is the established policy of this board to pay beginners in this office the sum of \$100 per month, and to increase this salary as the holder of the office increases in efficiency. The present incumbent has served since May 1st, 1925, and it is the opinion and recommendation of your committee that her salary should be increased to \$125 per month, said increase to take effect from and after July 1st, 1926.

With reference to the application for an increase in the salary of the cleri of the municipal court, your committee reports that the present incumbent is receiving \$2,000 per year; and it appears to your committee that the present salary is not enough to provide a fair compensation for the

work to be performed.

The serious question before your committee has been whether, as the statutes have heretofore provided, the salary of the office in question could be increased, but your committee finds that Section 59,15 of the Statutes seems designed to cover this situation, and to be broad enough for that purpose, and your committee therefore recommends that the salary of the clerk of the municipal court be fixed at \$2,400 per year, to be at the rate of \$200 per month, said increase to take effect from and after March 1st, 1926, meaning hereby that the salary shall be \$2,000 for the remainder of the Year 1926, and \$2,400 a year for each year thereafter.

With reference to the resolution relating to the salary of the judge of the juvenile court, your committee is of the opinion that the statutes permit an increase of the salary for his office, at any annual meeting of this board, and your committee is of the opinion that the salary of the judge of the juvenile court should be increased from \$500 per year to \$1,000 per year, said increase to begin as of March 1st, 1926, meaning that the salary for said office shall be \$333.33 for the remainder of this year, and \$1,000 per year thereafter, and your committee recommends the passage of the ac-

companing resolutions.

Your committee reports further that it believes that the practice of increasing salaries during the year, or receiving of applications for increases for salaries during the year should be discouraged, and that all applications for increases of salary should be presented at this board at its annual November session, in order that the budgets of the different departments may be sufficient and in order that the Board may not be obliged to use its time considering salaries at any time except the regular November session.

# REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON CONSTRUCTION OF HIGHWAY NO. 95.

Chairman Loescher offered the following Report No. 19. To the Honorable, the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County,

Wisconsin.

Gentlemen: Your special committee, appointed to go to Madison and Interview the state highway commission relative to the construction of

highway 95 by Winnebago county by day labor, report as follows: We report that on the 5th day of March, 1926, we presented to the chief engineer of the state highway commission at Madison the position of Win-

nebago county relative to said matter.

We report that the statute provides that bids must be called for before federal aid will be permitted in the construction of state roads. That no road can be built by day labor unless the state highway commission determines that the bids received are unsatisfactory. That the experience of the United States government with the construction of roads by day labor has been very unsatisfactory, and the said government is, as a general rule, opposed to building roads other than by contract.

The state highway commission indicated to us that it considered that the lowest bid received for the construction of state highway 95 was a reasonable bid, and that it could not recommend to the federal government

that the road be built by day labor.

The state highway commission further indicated to your committee that the work heretofore done in the construction of roads by Winnebago county had been satisfactory, and equal in quality to that of any contractor.

We report further that there has been to date allocated to Winnebago county, out of federal funds, the sum of \$250,000 for road construction. That a portion of said federal moneys, not yet used, is in what is known as a "free fund," and that the state highway commission, in proper cases, may appropriate from this fund further assistance to localities deserving the same.

Your committee has been assured by the state highway commission that, while it was extremely improbable that the highway in question could be built by the county by day labor, nevertheless said highway would be built in the season of 1926; that it would be completed in the season of 1926, and that the highway commission would appropriate out of said "free fund" an amount sufficient to pay for the completion of said road in 1926.

We report further that we are advised that it is the intention of the state highway commission to readvertise for bids for the said construction of highway 95, for the purpose of determining whether the same cannot be constructed at a lower figure.

Your committee therefore reports that, while it is unable to secure per-

mission for the county to construct said road by day labor, that nevertheless it has secured, from the state highway commission, sufficient funds to complete said road at no additional expense to the county, and that the road will be completed, as desired by the county, during the season of 1926.

# REPORT OF DISTRICT ATTORNEY ON NEW COURTHOUSE SITE.

Chairman Loescher read the following Report No. 20.

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wis. Gentlemen-The following is submitted as a report to you on the ques-

tion of a site for a new county courthouse:

The questions growing out of the location of a site for a new county courthouse are of such importance that any committee, with but a short time for investigation, must needs hesitate to make any definite recommendations to your Honorable Body. The courthouse building, when erected, will undoubtedly be expected to serve the county for many decades, and this necessitates careful anticipation of all proper uses to which such a building may be put. The building should be, as far as possible, centrally located for the entire county. Architecturally, it should compare favorably with the best buildings in the county. It must be the pride of the entire county-something to which each citizen may gladly point-rather than an eyesore or an architectural failure.

The county, industrially and agriculturally, is in its infancy. No one can foretell its future. The service to be rendered our people through the various agencies which the new building will house are wholly undeveloped. New demands will be continually made, and must be met. Questions of traffic must be considered, and questions of convenience, utility, beauty,

and safety are all important.

The question, therefore, must be approached from various angles. us take them up in the following order, remembering that the building in question is for the county as a whole, and not for any particular municipality; that while plans for municipal development and civic centers are proper and to be respected, yet the interest of the county, as a whole, is paramount. With this in mind, the first question is that of location from the standpoint of convenience. While much has been said about the various sites available, the attention of this Board has been directed to a great degree, to the so-called Washington street site-the site bounded by Northwestern avenue on the north, the Northwestern tracks on the east, Washington street on the south, and Roe park on the west,

A second site suggested to your committee is the so-called Clark site. bounded by Jackson street on the east, Algoma street on the south, Church street on the north, and residence property on the west.

The great majority of persons visiting the county courthouse today come by automobile. The county officials go to and from their work by automobile, and with the use of automobiles distances are insignificant. highways leading into Oshkosh, and which will bring traffic, are 15 from the north and south, 95. 21, and 26. The spot to be chosen must be one which can be reached by these roads most conveniently, and with least danger from other traffic. Logically, then, the courthouse must be placed at a point reached by all highways, and one where the traffic can be assimilated without interfering with the normal use of the streets affected. From this standpoint the Clark site is, no doubt, preferable.

Taking next the convenience of the local people who use the courthouse. Starting from the corner of Main and Washington, which, perhaps, is a fair starting point, and measuring the shortest route to the present courthouse site, we have a distance of 1500 feet. Measuring from the same point to the Washington street site is a distance of 1250 feet, and to the Clark site is a distance of 1675 feet. This shows a slight preference in favor of the Washington street site, from the standpoint of distance to be traveled by persons starting from Main street.

Taking the city as a whole, the Clark site is 6900 feet from Lake Winnebago, 7500 feet from the west city limits, 10200 feet from the south city limits, and 9300 feet from the north city limits, or very near to the geographical center of the city; and, considering the convenience of all the people, is probably as near ideally located as possible.

From the standpoint of the county as a whole, the courthouse, as long as it is located in Oshkosh, must be at the extreme earterly part of the county, and somewhat south of the center, and so that any move to place it north or northwesterly from its present location will tend to move it

toward the north and south center of the county.

Considering the sites from the standpoints of safety, the Washington Washington street is narrow, and its center street site is badly located. is occupied by a street railway track. "The railway yards to the east of this location do not help matters. Northwestern avenue is hardly wider than an alley, and Roe park, at the west, if it is to be a park, does not help take care of the automobile traffic. Mt. Vernon street, which is the next street west, is narrow, and completely taken up by the traffic which now uses it. The traffic problem in the city of Oshkosh is to keep cars off of Main street, particularly at the most used crossings at Church, Washington, and Waugoo streets. To place the courthouse east of Main street means that every automobile going to it must cross Main street somewhere. It means gathering the traffic into narrow streets, without parking con-Washington street is already so crowded that there is a move to widen it, and the casual spectator who sees the busses and other vehicles coming in from the Northwestern trains will be convinced that it would be an error to throw more traffic to the east of Main street. On the other hand, the Clark site can be arranged to have a street on four sides, all of average width together with a sufficient parking space to take care of two hundred automobiles, and the tendency would be for this site, to

draw traffic back of Main street, rather than send it across.

This matter deserves very serious consideration because of the rapid increase in the number of automobiles on the public streets. It is easy to see that any site placed east of Main street, where traffic will be centered on Washington, Merritt, and Waugoo streets, will increase many times the danger to automobiles and pedestrians, and that such a situation will

be highly undesirable.

In this connection, we must look ahead and vizualize the uses to which a new building will be put. The old building is performing only a part of the uses which may rightfully be desired of it. The jury rooms are wholly out of date, uncomfortable, and unsanitary. The chambers of the circuit judge and county judge are not credit to Winnebago county. The register of probate and his assistant are confined in a vault. The county agent has one tiny room. The county nurse has another. The superintendent of schools and the highway commissioner are down in the basement. The district attorney has no office at all, and neither has the probation officer a room. The committees of the County Board wander around like lost souls searching for a place to hold a meeting.

In other words, the work of the county nurse has only begun. She must have an office and additional rooms for her equipment. The county agricultural agent is handicapped for room. The probation officer of the courts must be provided with an office. The county highway commissioner must have an office, and the road and bridge committee should have a

convenience, and the best in architecture.

place to meet, rather than be chased from room to room. Winnebago County is a \$127,000,000 corporation. It is: It is about to build a set of offices to last for a long time. Its servants have worked in dungeons, and dark places too long. It must build big and well, not only providing a place for actual work to be done, but it must do something for its people. Governments, whether city, county, or country, fail when they cease to do things for the average individual. This means that there should be rest rooms in the Court House, a place where men and women can sit down; where a lunch can be eaten, and where a tired babe can rest. It is not too much to expect that the new Court House will have in it, among other things, a large audience room; that the County Board may have a place where its visitors do not have to lean against the wall in It is not too much to expect that the up-to-date provisions will be had to enlarge the supervisors' room, or a court room to provide for a seating capacity sufficient to accommodate splendid county gather-Winnebago County has been slow, as a County, to speak its gratitude to ite boys who have died in the wars. It would not be too much for this Board to provide, in its new Court House, an auditorium, or gathering place, dedicated to its soldier dead, where the American Legion, or other bodies of its kind, as well as great civic gatherings, may come together. These things will all call for a splendid building, the latest in Such a building, if used, is going to draw traffic. Today the opening day of court draws fifty automobiles to the Court House. This number will be increased. Traffic will result. Parking places must be provided. The power of the county to look ahead a half century, and provide for its people, is going to be tested in the erection of a new Court House as it has never been tested before. Whether all of our people shall be contented, whether the ill feeling between cities and the country shall be wiped out, whether we shall understand each other, and profit by such understanding, may be affected materially by what we build.

From the standpoint of freedom from noises, we remember that one principle reason for abandoning the present Court House site is the proximity to the switch engines which pass along Ceape street. A part of the proximan of the city of Oshkosh, and one upon which it has been working for a long time, is the building of a union depot for the Northwestern and Soo lines, at, or near the present location of the Northwestern depot. If this materializes, and there is a possibility that it will come, then a court house, located on the Washington street site, will be within easy hearing of every train that passes, including the long Soo line freight trains, which have a habit of becoming stalled on every possible occasion. The Clark site is away from dirt and noise, and leaves nothing to be desired in that respect.

The city of Oshkosh has been to considerable expense and effort to provide for a civic center, and such center includes the location of the county court house on the Washington street site. While it should not be the desire of the county to interfere in any unnecessary way with the plans of the city, yet the county is larger than the city, and convenience, safety and other things should not be sacrificed for the preservation of a

plan.

It is submitted that to place the court house on the Clark site would be to aid the city in extending its civic center, and that, if the county performs its duty in the erection of a building, the structure will immensely

add to the proposed civic center.

The property immediately northwest of the present high school building, between Algoma boulevard and Church street, will undoubtedly be used by the city, at the proper time, for the extension of its school buildings, the growth of which has been rapid, and the ultimate result would be a series of splendid buildings, of which the city and county may both be proud.

Considering the matter from the standpoint of expense, the Washington street site is less expensive than the other, and is of less value. The plats submitted by your committee show the relative assessed valuation, and the relative area. A \$127,000,000 corporation, building for generations to come, should hesitate to practice false economy, but rather should build so that those who follow us will praise the wisdom used in selection of site, and construction of building.

There is one more point to which it is desired to call your attention. Assuming that it is the wish of the county to erect a building which shall stand as a structure of beauty, as well as convenience, your attention is called to the stand of white oak trees native to the ridge on which the High school buildings and other buildings extending northwesterly to the Normal school stand. The Clark property, in sheer natural beauty, cannot be duplicated in the city of Oshkosh. It has taken three centuries and more to grow the trees in question, and they constitute a source of beauty which should not be overlooked in the location of a county court house.

It is therefore recommended that the new court house be built on the so-called Clark site, the county purchasing and using as much thereof as may be found necessary and proper. It is further recommended that reasonable dispatch be used in the acquisition of such site, so that when the county is financially prepared to erect the building, all preliminary matters will have been taken care of.

It is further recommended that the county plan for the erection of a building in keeping with all the things hereinbefore mentioned, such building to be erected by the sale of bonds, such bonds to be issued after the payment of the outstanding road bonds, in such manner and at such times that the payment shall not constitute a burden upon the people of the county.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

# WINNEBAGO AND FOND DU LAC COUNTIES TO PURCHASE INTEREST OF WAUSHARA COUNTY IN TRI-COUNTY SANATORIUM.

Supervisor Starr offered the following Resolution No. 20.

Resolved, by the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago county, that the interest and share of Waushara county, in Sunnyview sanatorium (the same being an 11 percent interest) be purchased by and transferred to the counties of Fond du Lac and Winnebago, on the following terms: A. The consideration to be paid to the county of Waushara shall be

\$8,800.00

The counties of Fond du Lac and Winnebago shall each pay such portion of said purchase price as shall be apportioned to its present share in said sanatorium which is hereby determined to be as follows:

Fond du Lac county shall pay \$4,400.00; Winnebago county shall pay

\$4,400.00

C. The interest of Waushara county in the property purchased shall be conveyed to Fond du Lac and Winnebago counties in proportion to the amount paid by each therefor, to-wit: To Fond du Lac county, 50 per cent, and to Winnebago county, 50 per cent thereof, so that as between the counties of Fond du Lac and Winnebago the present ratio and proportion of interest and ownership shall be maintained.

D. The purchase price shall be due and payable, without interest, on 1st day of April, 1927.

E. As further consideration for such sale and conveyance, the county of Waushara is hereby relieved from all further liability on its contract for the joint purchase operation, and maintenance of Sunnyview sanatorium, excepting only its liability to pay to Winnebago county the sum of \$2,200.00, and interest thereon on the 1st day of April, 1926, and the said county of Fond du Lac to pay to Winnebago county, in addition to all sums which It is now obligated to pay,the further sum of \$1,100,00 on April 1st, 1927, with interest at 5 per cent from April 1st, 1926.

That the transfer herein provided for shall become effective on July

1st, 1926, provided the county boards of the counties interested shall consent thereto, and proper deeds and bills of sale, conveying and transferring all of the interest and share of Waushara county in and to the said Sunnyview sanatorium, and in all personal property owned and used in connection therewith, shall have been executed in accordance with this resolution, and delivered to the county clerks of Fond du Lac and Winnebago

counties.

Further resolved, that from and after April 1st, 1926, Sunnyview sanatorium be operated by the counties of Fond du Lac and Wiinnebago jointly, under the provisions of section 46.20 of the statutes.

Be it further resolved, that in consideration of the relief hereby granted

to Waushara county, the said county does hereby surrender all claim to any and all funds and moneys and balances provided for the financing of the said sanatorium, and remaining in the hands of the treasurer of Winnebago county after the transfer of said property becomes effected.
