#### RULES OF BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF WINNEBAGO COUNTY, ADOPTED MAY 7, 1935

The meetings of this board shall be held in the supervisors' room, and the hour for daily meetings shall be 10 a. m., and the county board shall continue in continuous session from day to day until adjourned, unless to a day certain or sine die.

II. At the first meeting of the board, it shall be the duty of the chairman, or in case of his absence, the vice chairman, or in their ab-

sence, the clerk to call to order.

The clerk shall then call the roll of members.

A quorum being present the board shall proceed to the election of

a chairman and vice chairman.

III. It shall be the duty of the chairman to appoint the following standing committees, each to consist of the number of members as set

after the name of each committee viz:

after the name of each committee viz:
Equalization, nine; finance, eight; general accounts, seven; illegal assessments, five; justice and constables' accounts, seven; sheriff's and coroner's accounts, seven; insane, three; poor and county home, three; corporations, three; public buildings, five; per diem and mileage, five; printing, three; bonds and salaries, five; abstractor and register of three; three collection three; senatorium, five; budget. deeds, three; rules, three; education, three; sanatorium, five; budget, four (county clerk, ex-officio); county fair, five; aviation, five; old age, assistance, three; insurance, three; investments, three; seed loan, three.

IV. A county highway committee consisting of five memebrs to represent cities, towns and villages, and all other elective committees and elective officers, are to be elected annually at the November ses-

sion of the board.

The board may adjourn for such time as shall be necessary for the chairman to prepare the list of committees, and no business can be

done until the same shall be announced.

VI. The chairman, or in his absence, the vice chairman, shall take
the chair at the hour to which the board may from time to time stand
adjourned, call the board to order and direct the calling of the roll of
members by the clerk. In the absence of both the chairman and the vice chairman, a chairman pro tem shall be elected.

Upon the appearance of a quorum, the journal of the preceding day shall be read by the clerk, and any mistake therein shall be corrected by the board provided, that upon the last day of the session the journal for that day will be read and, before the final ajourn-

ment, corrected.

After the reading and correction of the journal, the order

of business shall be as follows:

Reception of petitions, memorials, accounts, etc. Presentation of resolutions and disposition of same.

Reports of standing committees.

4. Reports of select committees.

Consideration of miscellaneous business. IX. Every subject matter that shall come before the board shall be referred to the appropriate committee by the chairman, without motion.

X. The chairman shall preserve order and decide questions of X. The chairman shall preserve order and shall clearly and distinctly order, subject to an appeal to the board and shall clearly and distinctly

state every motion or question before debate.

XI. The chairman shall be entitled to vote on all questions taken by ayes and nays, and his name shall be called last; when the vote on any question is a tie, it shall be deemed to have been lost, but any member voting on either side of the question may present the same question again at such a time as provided in Section XXIII.

XII. Every motion or amendment shall be reduced to writing when a request therefor shall be made by any member; and all petitions titions, memorials and substitutes shall be reduced to writing and

read before they shall be considered by the board. XIII. Every written resolution shall have attached thereto the name of the person introducing it; and when referred to a committee,

the names of such committees shall be endorsed thereon. NIV. Every member previous to speaking, shall rise and address

XV. When two or more members rise at once, the chair shall design the chair. nate the member who is to speak first, but in all cases the member who shall first rise and address the chair shall speak first.

XVI. No member shall speak more than twice upon the same question without leave; and when called to order by the chairman shall take his seat, and shall not be allowed to proceed without leave of the

XVII. A vote on any question shall be taken by ayes and nays when called for by any member: and SHALL be so taken on all questions involving the expenditure of money; and whenever a vote is so ordered and taken, members voting in the affirmative and negative, as well as those absent or not voting shall be recorded at length in the records of the proceedings of the county board.

XVIII. No account or claim against the county shall be audited unless it be made out in items and duly verified and be filed with the

clerk of the board, except as otherwise provided by law.

XIX. When a motion is under consideration, no motion shall be entertained except.

To adjourn.

To lay on the table.

3. For the previous question

To postpone to a day certain. To commit to a committee.

To amend or to substitute. To postpone indefinitely.

These several motions shall take precedence in the order in which

they stand in this rule.

XX. A motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, and for the previous question shall be decided without debate, except as herinafter provided. XXI. A motion to postpone indefinitely or to a day certain or to commit shall not again be entertained on the same day or in the same

stage of the proposition. XXII. A substitute shall be open to amendment the same as the original proposition; but when adopted, shall not be subject to amendment. If an amendment or substitute is lost, another substantially the same shall not be entertained.

XXIII. When a motion or question has once been determined, any member voting with the majority may move a reconsideration of the vote, but such motion shall be made and acted on at the same or next succeeding day, and shall not thereafter be made except by unanimous

consent

the chairman shall then say: "It requiring five members to second this motion, those in favor of sustaining the motion." motion, those in favor of sustaining the motion will rise." If five or more members then rise, the previous question shall thereby be seconded and an opportunity then be given to any two members opposed thereto to briefly state their objections. The question shall then be: "Shall the question be now put" which, if carried by a vote of two-thirds of the members present upon a call of the ayes and nays, the board shall immediately proceed to vote upon the pending amendment if any, and upon the main question.

XXV. In filling blanks, the largest sum and the longest time

shall be put first.

XXVI. These rules shall not be changed, amended or repealed, writing and unless the proposition or amendment is introduced in writing and the same laid over to some subsequent meeting of the board, not less than five days intervening, and then only with the concurrence of twothirds of the members present.

XXVII. Any of these rules may be suspended upon any pending

measure by two-thirds of the members present.

XXVIII. These rules and all amendments or additions thereto which may hereafter be made shall govern the board until altered or

repealed, as herein provided.

XXIX. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in "Roberts' Rules of Order," so far as they remain in common use and are practicable and applicable and not inconsistent herewith, shall govern the the board.

Whenever the board shall have gone into a committee of the whole and shall have arisen, the board shall at once be in session for the receiving and acting upon the report of the committee of the whole and for the transaction of any and all other business of every kind.

No resolution for the appropriation of money shall be in order until the day after its presentation and reference, except upon the

consent of two-thirds of the members of the county board present. XXXII. All reports, resolutions and petitions must be presented in typewritten form in a triplicate so that one copy will be immediately available to the local press, and the same to be read by the clerk of

the board.

All resolutions calling for an appropriation of money, and all resolutions, the adoption of which will require an ultimate expenditure of money or an appropriation by the county board, shall be presented to the county clerk of Winnebago county ex-officio member of the budget committee, at least ten (10) days prior to the opening day of the annual November session of the county board, and no bill or resolution calling for an appropriation of money shall be received by the board without the unanimous consent of the board after that time

On motion adjourned to 1:30 o'clock, to give the chairman and vice

chairman time to appoint the committees of the board.

Whereas, Winnebago County now owns the property situated at the northwest corner of Jackson Drive and Algoma Boulevard, and commonly known and referred to as the Clark-Kennedy site, and Whereas, the aforesaid Clark-Kennedy site was acquired by Winnebago County with the view of utilizing said site for the erection thereon of a new Winnebago County Court House and Jail and allied appurtenances, and

Whereas, questions have arisen as to the legal right of Winnebago County to utilize the aforesaid so called Clark-Kennedy site for the erection thereon of a new Court House and County Jail and allied

and necessary appurtenances, now therefore be it Resolved, by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors, that the District Attorney of Winnebago County, be, and he is hereby requested to submit to this Winnebago County Board of Supervisors, his written opinion on the following enumerated questions, towit; First, Is Winnebago County amenable to the zoning ordinances of the City of Oshkosh, Wisconsin?

Second, Can Winnebago County be held liable in Law or in Equity for damages caused or alleged to have been caused through depreciation in value of the property of any person, firm or corporation and which damage or alleged damage is sustained or alleged to have been sustained by any such person, firm or corporation because of the erection by Winnebago County of a new Court House and Jail and their allied and necessary appurtenances on the aforesaid socalled Clark-Kennedy site?

Third, Under the zoning ordinances of the City of Oshkosh. Wisconsin, as they existed in January, 1935, was Winnehago County legally entitled to erect at its pleasure a new Court House and Jail and allied and necessary appurtenances, the language of the aforesaid zoning ordinances of the City of Oshkosh, Wisconsin, to the contrary

notwithstanding?

Fourth, Can a suit at Law or in Equity, instituted by any person, firm or corporation and claiming compensatory or punitive damages, either or both, lie against Winnebago County by reason of Winnebago County erecting on its aforesaid property a Court House and Jail with their allied and necessary adjuncts?

#### LEGAL OPINION RESOLUTION NO. 2—MAY SESSION

The following Legal Opinion was presented: To the County Board of Supervisors, Winnebago County, Wisconsin. Gentlemen:

Resolution No. 2, dated May 7, 1935, asked me for a written opinion on the following questions:

First: Is Winnebago County amenable to the zoning ordinance of

the City of Oshkosh, Wisconsin? Second: Can Winnebago County be held liable in law or in equity for damages caused or alleged to have been caused through depreciation in value of the property of any person, firm or corporation and which damage or alleged damage is sustained or alleged to have been sustained by any such person, firm or corporation because of the erection by Winnebago County of a new courthouse and jail and their allied and necessary appurtenances on the aforesaid so-called Clark-Kennedy Site?

Third: Under the zoning ordinances of the City of Oshkosh, Wisconsin, as they existed in January, 1935, was Winnebago County legally entitled to erect, at its pleasure, a new courthouse and jail and allied and necessary appurtenances, the language of the aforesaid zoning ordinances of the City of Oshkosh, Wisconsin, to the contrary notwith-standing?

Fourth: Can a suit at Law or in Equity, instituted by any person, firm or corporation and claiming compensatory or punitive damages, either or both, lie against Winnebago County by reason of Winnebago County erecting on its aforesaid property a courthouse and iail with their allied and necessary adjuncts?

In writing this opinion I am not concerned with the advisability of changing the location of the courthouse. This is a matter within the power of the County Board to decide and I am concerned only with the interpretation of the law as to whether the county can legally build a new courthouse on the so-called Clark-Kennedy Site.

Answering your first question, it is my opinion that the county is amenable to the zoning ordinance of the City of Oshkosh, so far as it is reasonable and not arbitrary, discriminatory or oppressive as set forth in this opinion.

Answering your second question, it is my opinion that if Winnebago County has the legal right to build a courthouse and jail on the so-called Clark-Kennedy Site, as I believe it has, then Winnebago County cannot be held liable at all in damages to anybody because of the depreciation in value of their property, if any, as the result of the building of the courthouse and jail on said site.

Answering your third question, it is my opinion that notwithstanding the City of Oshkosh zoning ordinance, Winnebago County can, upon proper legal procedure being taken, build a courthouse and jail

on the so-called Clark-Kennedy Site.

Answering your fourth question, it is my opinion that no damages could be collected against Winnebago County because of the building of a Courthouse on the said site in the event Winnebago County has a legal right to build a courthouse and jail on said site.

The City of Oshkosh has derived its power to enact zoning ordinances under and by virtue of Section 62.23 of the Statutes of the State of Wisconsin. That Statute, under Section 62.23 (6) states that—
(a) The council may by ordinance regulate the size of buildings

hereafter erected and the area of yards, courts and other open spaces, and such regulation is declared to be for public health, safety and welfare. This subsection shall be literally construed in favor of the city

and not as a repeal of any power elsewhere granted.

(b) To carry out this power, districts may be established, and regulations, which may differ between districts, shall be uniform for each class of buildings within each district, may be made in the manner provided in paragraph (c) of subsection (5), except that if the city has a board of public land commissioners, the duties therein imposed upon a city plan committee of the council shall rest upon such board.

The question as to whether a zoning ordinance in its application to a particular piece of property is for the "public health, safety and welfare," of a community is a question that is subject to judicial review, and if the ordinance is unreasonable, arbitrary, discriminatory or oppressive, in regard to any specific piece of property, the courts in their power may declare that part of the ordinance unconstitutional

and void.

State ex rel Tingely vs. Gurda, 209 Wisc. 63,

177 Northeastern, 427. 180 Northeastern, 767,

In the case of State ex rel Tingely vs. Gurda, the court set aside and declared as unconstitutional the zoning law as applied to a specific piece of property indicating that, without question, the courts have the power to inquire into the reasonableness of a zoning ordinance, with reference to a particular piece of property.

In the case of State ex rel Carter vs. Harper, 182 Wisconsin. 148. which is a case dealing with the zoning ordinance of the City of Mil-

waukee, the Court, on page 152, stated as follows:

Those cases establish the principle that whether a given situation presents a legitimate field for the exercise of the police power placing restraints upon the use of property or upon personal conduct, depends upon whether the situation presents a reasonable necessity for the imposition of restraint in order to promote public welfare, and whether the means adopted bear a reasonable relation to the end sought to be accomplished. It goes without saying that the legislature may not, in the exercise of its police power, pass a law expressly prohibited by the constitution. It is also accepted doctrine, we think, everywhere that laws imposing restraints interfering with the use of property or personal liberty, in the absence of some public necessity therefore, cannot be sustained.

(See also La Crosse vs. Elbertson, 105 Wisc. 207, at page 211)

In deciding whether a zoning ordinance is arbitrary, unreasonable discriminatory or oppressive, with special regard to a given piece of property, all the courts consider the physical facts and circumstances existing in the immediate neighborhood where the property in question is located, together with the general trend of property in that lo-

cality.

The Clark-Kennedy Site is located on two main State Trunk Highways, one running in front of the property and one running on the side. Immediately across the street, to the south of the site, is a home used for a doctor's office and place for the treatment of the sick. The house is rather run down and has had signs across the front and in the yard, indicating anything but the use of the property for strictly residential purposes. Immediately to the west of this property is an old large home that has not been occupied for at least fifteen years. If it were not owned by people of considerable wealth it naturally would be in a bad state of repair, because it has not brought in any apparent income for a number of years. On the same side of the street with the Clark-Kennedy Site and immediately to the rear, on Jackson Drive. Is an old home formerly occupied by wealthy residents, which is now divided into apartments and rented. Immediately to the north of this house is another old home, which is now occupied and being used by the City of Oshkosh as a Poor Relief Center. On the other side of Jackson Drive and to the art of the City of Wennedy property is a different Drive and to the east of the Clark-Kennedy property is a different zoning district. On the corner of Church Street and Jackson Drive is a large empty lot not being used for anything and upon which business

property could be built, and no doubt would be built, in the event of the erection of the courthouse on the site in question. Immediately to the south of this lot is a large old house which has not been occupied for many years and which apparently will never again be used as a home. This house is in need of considerable repair and has brought no apparent income for many years last past. On the northeast corner of Jackson Drive and Algoma Boulevard is another old home that has been for sale for many years and which is now being operated as a restaurant and rooming house. Kitty-corner from the site in question is a large gasoline filling station.

The zoning ordinance of the City of Oshkosh purports to create four zoning districts. In the Class A Residential districts, among other

buildings, the following types of buildings are permissable:-

1-One family dwellings. 2-Two family dwellings.

3-Private clubs, fraternities and lodges, excepting those the chief activity of which is a service customarily carried on as a

4-Boarding or lodging houses.

5—Hospitals 6—Churches.

7-Schools and colleges and telephone central offices.

8—Libraries and museums.

9-Parks, playgrounds, golf clubs, recreational and community buildings owned by the city

10—Farming and truck gardening.

11-Railroad right of way.

12-Nurseries and greenhouses and conservatories.

There is no place in the entire ordinance or the map referred to, permitting the building of a courthouse and jail anywhere in the City of Oshkosh, nor does the ordinance anywhere, expressly forbid the building of a courthouse and jail in any of the four zones. If the zoning map indicates where a community center should be built, including a courthouse and jail, with no regard to zoning districts, I believe it to be unreasonable, arbitrary, discriminatory and would not be upheld by the courts.

In the case of State vs. DeBose, 128 Southern, Page 4, (Florida case), the city of Vera Beach, refused to permit the county to build a courthouse and jail because it did not comply with a zoning ordinance. The court in that case granted the county permission to build the

courthouse and jail.

The right of an owner to devote his land to any legitimate use is properly within the terms of the Constitution, and the Legislature may not under the guise of the police power impose unnecessary or unreasonable restrictions upon such use. State of Washington ex rel. Seattle Title Trust company vs. Roberge, 278 U. S. 116, 49 S. Ct. 50, 73 L. Ed. 210, and cases cited. It is true that this rule applies to, and may be invoked by, the individual as against the public, while in the case at bar we have the instance of one public instrumentality involving it against another. Since the rule was made for the protection of property rights under the facts shown to exist in this case, the place of vestiture of title becomes immaterial. This court is committed to the doctrine that title becomes immaterial. This court is committed to the doctrine that courts should not set aside the determination of public officers relative to municipal zoning ordinances unless it is clear that their action has no foundation in reason and is a mere arbitrary exercise of power without reference to public health, morals, safety or welfare. In its general scope the ordinance under attack is not shown to be violative of the state or Federal Constitution. But, on the showing made here as to the lands of appelant, we think it is arbitrary and unreasonable."

This case used the exact type of procedure that would be taken in the event Winnebago County were to start an action against the City of Oshkosh.

of Oshkosh.

The statute specifically provides that the classification shall be uniform for each class of buildings within each district. I believe it must be admitted that buildings of the same type must be permitted to be built in each zone of the same class. Upon reading the zoning ordinance and realizing that the Class A Residential district permits churches, hospitals, private clubs, schools and colleges, it is very difficult to understand how a courthouse or jail can be excluded from this district. I make this character particularly in the control of district. I make this statement particularly in view of the fact that

there is no mention in the entire ordinance classifying a courthouse

and jail.

In the case of Euclid vs. Ambler Realty Co., 272 U. S. Page 379, the zoning ordinance, which is a very elaborate one, classifies a courthouse in the same zoning district as churches, schools, public libraries, private clubs, hospitals and playgrounds, indicating that a courthouse and jail is considered to be the same type of building as churches, hospitals, schools and other buildings listed in the Class A Residential Ordinance of the City of Oshkosh.

One of the main reasons why I believe the county could build a courthouse and jail on the property in question is the fact that immetiately across the street is another zoning district, which admittedly permits the use of said property for commercial purposes. It seems to be the rule of law that land on both sides of a street should be in the

same zoning district.

In the case of Forbes vs. Hubbard, 180 Northeastern, (Illinois case) the court granted the defendant permission to build on a piece of property when the testimony showed that the use of three of the four corners was put to commercial purposes and that the streets upon which the property was located had bus lines operating along the streets. One of the witnesses, a planning expert, who was a professor of civic designing at the University of Illinois stated that considerable weight should be given to the use and occupancy of property across the street from a given district for the reason that in all cases the opposite sides of streets bear very close relationship to each other. Property on one side of the street is always influenced, to a marked degree, by the character and use of the property on the other side. Consideration, in this case was also given to the fact that in the event the property in question was not permitted to be used for commercial purposes the property on the premises might deteriorate and degenerate into a condition which would be more detrimental to the property in that immediate vicinity than if the property were used for commercial development. It might be noted, in passing, that the homes in this vicinity are not being used, generally, for residential purposes.

I call special attention to the property being used by the City of Oshkosh for the administration of poor relief. Also, the homes immediately across the street to the east of the site, and two homes imme-

diately across the street to the south of the site in question.

The court in this case, on Page 770, states a very general rule of

law, as follows:—
"The public welfare is a dominating consideration in cases of this character. Where it appears that the restrictions of a zoning ordinance bear substantial relation to the public health, safety, morals, or general welfare, such a consideration is determinative regardless of the fact that individuals may suffer an invasion of their property. This has been often recognized by this and other courts and the rule need not be laid again here.

149 Atlantic, 644 Taylor vs. Haverford. In this case the plaintiff owned property across the street from a business district and was asking to build business property on the land in question, which was not

permitted by ordinance. The court said, on Page 644:-

"As a general rule, in zoning territory of the kind now before us, the lines should be fixed in such a way as to avoid making one side of a main artery of travel purely residential where the opposite side of the street is already so uniformly used for business purposes as to have established its character in that regard (see White's Appeal, 287, Page 259, 268, 134 A. 409, 53 A. L. 1215): For so to do will almost inevitably lead to such unreasonable destruction of values as to be confiscatory. In the case now before us, the court's underlying and unattacked findings of fact make it evident that plaintiff's lot is not characterized by the residential area to its north and east, but rather by the active business district which it faces. To zone this piece of ground-lying, as it does, on one side of a main thoroughfare and chief artery of travel for the general locality and environs—as purely residential, while the opposite side of the street is given over to business purposes, is clearly unreasonable, discriminatory and confiscatory, and the court below correctly so decided."

I have read and examined, very carefully, the case cited by the city attorney as conclusive of the fact that Winnebago County cannot build a new courthouse and jail on the Clark-Kennedy Site until the city ordinance is changed. This case is found in 311 Illinois, Page 234. The case in itself does not determine whether or not the county can build on the place in question but as is said by the court on Page 237 "the principal question argues in this case is whether or not the city council has the power to require observance of its fire regulations by the county, in the building of a county jail." The question as to whether this was a reasonable regulation was not up for consideration in the case, at all, but the only question considered was as to whether the city could make REASONABLE REGULATIONS concerning the erection of buildings which would be built by the county. It is my opinion that this case is absolutely not in point as it does not determine at all the question involved in this opinion.

In conclusion, it is my legal opinion that in the event Winnebago County is desirous of building a new courthouse and jail on the socalled Clark-Kennedy Site, that authorization and instruction be given to the District Attorney of Winnebago County to begin the proper legal proceedings against the proper officers of the City of Oshkosh, forcing them to allow the building of a courthouse and jail on the site in question. It is my opinion that if such action were prosecuted, a judgment allowing the building of a courthouse and jail would be granted by the

courts.

Whereas, at the present time Winnebago County has no ambulance and is in serious need of such a conveyance and service, especially for the purpose of rendering prompt aid to persons injured in automobile accidents and other accidents within the boundaries of the county, and for the purpose of quickly conveying such persons to hospitals for medical and surgical attention that may save lives and reduce suffering, And Whereas, the records in the sheriff's office disclose a long

list of sad accidents which have occurred in the last two years, and in which the use of a county ambulance would have eliminated the present unsatisfactory and inhuman methods of getting victims from the scene of accidents to hospitals, where doctors and nurses are available.

And Whereas, under the present lack of a county ambulance, vic-

tims of accidents lack the convenience and comfort and prompt service that such a vehicle would provide, and often private citizens are put to great inconvenience and their motor cars much damaged through conveying injured persons to hospitals, now therefore, Be It Resolved, that the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors proceed to acquire a County Ambulance, bids to be advertised for, at a cost not to exceed \$2,800.00 fully equipped with siren, first aid box and

any other necessary facilities.

Be It Further Resolved, that the County Ambulance be in charge of and operated by the Sheriff's department, with deputies to be assigned to the services of such ambulance, and properly trained for their duties by the Red Cross or by such schools as are created for such purposes, from time to time.

The committee met on May 14th at the Court House at Oshkesh, Wisconsin and organized with the following personnel: Chairman Robert M. Heckner, Scoretary Lyman W. Kezertee, and following named Supervisors as members, Supervisor Byron Gunz, Supervisor Gustav

Kalfahs Sr., and Supervicor George H. Macke.

The following enumerated projects were submitted to the committee for its consideration, viz: Court House project, County Parks project envisioning establishment of a CCC camp or camps in Winnebago County by the Federal Government, project for furnishing crushed lime to the farmers of Winnebago County at cost, project for needed repairs and improvements to the Winnebago County Fair Grounds, project for the erection of a new County garage and warehouse on the county owned property on Knapp street, Oshkosh, project for additions to the Nurse's home and installation of an elevator and various other improvements to the Sunnyview Sanatorium at Winnebago, Wis., jointly owned by Fond du Lac and Winnebago County, and a project for rural electrification for townships in Winnebago County. All of these projects contemplated the obtaining in some degree of federal aid in the way of outright grants and aid in financing such projects.

Due to the many federal organizations necessary to deal with to obtain information regarding federal attitudes toward various projects submitted to the committee for its consideration, much time was necessarily consumed in the process of obtaining adequate information from the several sources necessary to contact to secure the needed information. This situation was further complicated by the development of uncertainty as to whether the federal or state governments would eventually administer Wisconsin's share of the Four Billion, eight hundred, eighty million dollars (\$4,880,000,000) appropriation authorized by the United States Congress. Preconceived interpretations of federal policy, which upon investigation proved erroneous, also had to be contended with. In some cases actual visits by the committee to the property involved in the matters under consideration, had to be made. However, the committee feels that it is now in a position to convey to your honorable body a reasonably accurate report of each project considered by the committee to expect the with the committee's recommendations in connection with each such project. For convenience we deem it best to report separately on each project enumerated in paragraph three (3) of this report, in the order in which each project is given. We therefore, submit, herewith, under caption One (1) Report on Court House Project, our findings and conclusions and accompanying recommendations in connection therewith.

In as much as the Winnebago County Board had at its annual fall session in November 1934 varied to huild a new court house, and sub-

In as much as the Winnebago County Board had at its annual fall session in November 1934, voted to build a new court house, and subsequently supplemented that decision to build by voting on January 8th 1935 to purchase at a cost of \$50,000, the so-called Clark-Kennedy site, situated at the northwest corner of Jackson Drive and Algoma Boulevard, which aforesaid site was subsequently purchased by the County, thus ending long drawn out deliberations extending over many years by various County Boards, your committee on projects were and are of the opinion that in any contemplated work creating projects, the project of the erection of a new and adequate court house for Winnebago County to replace the present obsolete, dangerous and inadequate structure, it should be given precedence over all other sug-

gested projects.

In order to ascertain what aid and assistance Winnebago County might reasonably anticipate from the Federal Government, your committee proceeded to get in touch with the two United States Senators from Wisconsin and with Congressman M. K. Reilly of the Sixth Congressional District, by directing inquiries to each of those gentlemen as to the proper federal agencies to contact in the effort to obtain a federal grant of funds to assist this County in the erection of the proposed new court house. Prompt replies were received from Senator F. Ryan Duffy and from Congressman M. K. Reilly, the latter telegraphing information regarding the proper authority to contact in reference to several matters that engaged the attention of your committee. The committee takes this occasion to thank, publicly, these two officials for their promptitude and courtesy in answering inquiries directed to them by your committee.

two officials for their promptitude and courtesy in answering inquiries directed to them by your committee.

The committee in compliance with the advice of Senator Duffy and Congressman Reilly, contacted A. Lawrie Kurtz, Acting State Director PWA, Veterans Administration, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, and we received from Mr. Kurtz, instructions and information as to the basis upon which federal grants and loans would be awarded upon approved projects. These conditions are changed from time to time; the latest information from that source being that upon approved projects an award of 45 per cent of the cost of the project if approved

would be made in the shape of a federal grant, the balance to be a federal loan secured by County obligations bearing an interest rate of four per cent per annum. Applications could be made by the County for the federal grant only, or, for federal grant and loan combined. A set of the latter applications were furnished to your committee by

Mr. Kurtz for use if the County so desires.

From its investigations and inquiries your committee is satisfied that as a project, the erection of a new court house for Winnebago County would provide employment for labor to the following extent, based upon an expenditure by the County for court house purposes of Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$500,000). Any increase or decrease in that figure would be based upon the same percentage. It would require 132,000 man hours for common labor, which would require 68 men for 48 weeks at 40 hours per week; skilled labor—128,000 man hours, 66 men, 48 weeks, at 40 hours per week. Now, if the work hours are to be reduced, of course that increases the number of man hours.

Continuing further with the labor factor comprehended in the erection of the proposed new court house, the committee herewith submits for the consideration of your honorable body, statistics in relation thereto, that your committee has reason to believe are reasonably accurate and that clearly portray the extent to which unemployment may be relieved, provided Winnebago County proceeds to fulfill its clearly apparent need for a new court house building. Figuring that \$500,000, may be the approved cost of a new court house, it is estimated by reliable statisticians that \$380,000, will be used for all labor costs, and that \$217,344 of this amount, will be for labor at the building site. Dividing a dollar into parts, it may quite accurately be said that 76 cents of each dollar will be paid to labor on the court house project. This 76 cents would be further divided as follows: 44 cents to labor at the site, 21 cents to labor in mills and factories, 7 cents to labor at the place where materials originated, and 4 cents to labor in transportation.

An interesting possibility arises in connection with the question of a federal grant for an approved project of this nature. The committee is credibly informed that the grant if the project is approved, would be based upon the cost of the whole project, including the land. Should this eventuate, the County would be reimbursed for the expense of the new court house site to the extent of 45 per cent of

land. Should this eventuate, the County would be reimbursed for the expense of the new court house site to the extent of 45 per cent of that cost of \$50,000, we so recently paid for the Clark-Kennedy site. In this court house matter, Winnebago County has come a long way over carefully thought out routes to the point that we have now reached. The County is possessed of a new site for a new court house. We have a fine nucleus in the way of a sizable court house building fund. We have the prospect of being able to secure a federal grant of 45 per cent of the cost of the court house project. We need anticipate no difficulty in the financing of this project. We need anticipate no difficulty in the financing of this project. Apparently, there is nothing that threatens to bar the way to a realization of our long cherished dreams of at last being able to erect an adequate, modern structure for court house purposes, fitting to the dignity and prestige of Winnebago County. Only procrastination, timidity and ungrounded fear has so far held us back. Your committee is convinced that we should continue to face forward toward the goal of our County's ambitions, especially as by so doing we can at this time alleviate to a marked degree the existing evils of unemployment in this County. The committee, therefore, concludes, that the court house project has its unqualified approval, and we respectfully recommend to your honorable body that the Board adopt the following resolution, towit:

composition of said committee to be representative of all parts of the County, six members of said committee shall be named by the Chairman of this Board, the Chairman of this Board to be the seventh member of the committee and Chairman thereof, that the duties of this special committee shall be to make any and all investigations in regard to plans, designs, specifications, estimating costs and all other work pertaining to the securing of plans, ideas, specifications, are all other work pertaining to the securing of plans, ideas, specifications, are all other such securing involved in the matter of property. drawings and all other such service involved in the matter of properly presenting before this Board, plans for a proposed new court house for Winnebago County.

The aforesaid special committee is hereby empowered and authorized to investigate extensively and thoroughly, any and all plans for the financing of the proposed new court house, and to report back to this Board the result of their findings at as early a moment as is consistent with a careful ascertainment of all facts pertinent to the

task for which said committee is created.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the aforesaid committee is hereby authorized and empowered to create expense chargeable to the Court House Fund of Winnebago County for the purposes set forth in this resolution, in an amount not to exceed One Thousand dollars (\$1,000).

#### PROJECTS COMMITTEE REPORT ON CCC CAMP AND COUNTY PARKS

The following Report No. 3 was presented: To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County. Gentlemen:

Your project committee has had before it for its consideration proposals for the establishment of a county park or parks and also a pro-posal to secure for Winnebago County a civilian conservation corps camp, or as it is more familiarly known as a CCC camp.

Your committee has made a very extensive investigation of the county park question and we find that it is so closely allied with the question of the establishment of civilian conservation corps camps, that this committee feels that the two projects may be treated under the same heading. Comprehended also under this heading are the important subjects of county forest reserves, conservation of the natural resources of our county, propagation of fish and game and their con-servation, prevention of soil erosion and other allied subjects.

Your committee finds that the statutory provisions of the Wisconsin laws very clearly set forth the methods by which Wisconsin counties may be enabled to embark on a park program. In Wisconsin a number of county boards already have legally authorized county park commissions for the purchase, improvement and maintenance of county

owned recreational areas.

According to the information that we have, the counties of Iron. Dunn, Marathon, Marinette, Waupaca, Brown, Door, Eau Claire, Portage, Dane, Waukesha, Milwaukee, Walworth, Racine and Kenosha have such legally constituted commissions. Your committee visited Kenosha County on June 19th and were very courteously shown over its wonderful park system by County Board Chairman Guttormsen, City Manager Laughlin of Kenosha City and Mr. Floyd B. Carlson, Director of Parks for City and County of Kenosha, Kenosha County has 529 acres of park area of which 370 acres are in the northern end of the county and 159 acres in the western section of the county. It is on this latter area of 159 acres that at present and for over a year past, a CCC camp of 250 men are and have been working, and with what your committee there observed, with results of not only aesthetic,

but of financial advantage to Kenosha County.

A few of the counties mentioned in this report do not yet have any county park holdings, others have only a few acres, but several have quite substantial and creditable county parks.

The need for recreational activities is felt to be increasing in importance. As a result of the mechanical and highly commercialized ways of modern living the whole appearance of nature's handwork has taken on such an artificial aspect that primitive surroundings have almost ceased to exist. It is, therefore, important before it is too late that we should preserve what little there is left of the primitive or to assist nature in restoring such appearances

Almost universal approval is accorded those progressive communities that are providing future generations with facilities for recreational enjoyment and conserving some of the scenic and naturalistic facilities which the immediate vicinity may afford.

The extensive use and patronage of all existing state or county owned recreational spots in Wisconsin abundantly justify the action of those who have sponsored and are responsible for their development.

A number of counties already have or are applying for federal assistance in county park developments, either by the National Park Service, CCC camps or by some other form of relief labor through which agencies a considerable amount of very creditable work has already been done.

Winnebago County exhibits too, some little evidence of the need of a settled policy not only in regard to recreational facilities, but as well of the need of a settled policy regarding the continuance or non-continuance of an unguided and promiscuous development of these and other features of our county, which are detrimental and contrary

to the best interests and prosperity of the people of our county. No attention has hitherto been paid by the authorities of this county to county zoning plans, prevention of soil erosion by either wind or water, and other methods of conservation of our God given resources. We cite instances with which many of the members of this board are familiar. For example, pronounced soil erosion at Winchester and in Wolf River, which if allowed to continue without hindrance, will cause this county a serious loss of taxable property values. Then too, is the matter of the lack of attention paid to the preservation of historical remains such as were left by the American Redmen and as exemplified in Indian mounds, Indian garden beds and other objects of historical and archeological interest.

This county is annually appropriating thousands of dollars for relief either in the form of doles or work relief. However, our work relief projects have been of a sporadic nature, organized on the spur of the moment, without any long range view. It is possible for this county by the establishment of a County Park Commission through whom to work, to arrive at definite and exact objectives, looking not only to the se-curing of better recreational facilities for our future generations, but also to the proper conservation of the resources that we now have and

to their expansion and extension,

The Wisconsin Statutes prescribe what Winnebago County or any other Wisconsin County must do to avail themselves of the machinery to accomplish the above mentioned objectives. It is therefore the judgment of your committee on projects that this is an opportune moment for Winnebago County to make a beginning by the establishment of a county park commission for Winnebago County in conformity with the provisions of Section 27.02 of the Wisconsin Statutes, and your committee therefore respectfully recommends that your honorable body

adopt the following resolution, to-wit:

Whereas, there has been in the last few years, a rapid increase
in the use and development of the roads, lakes and beauty spots of

Winnebago County, and

Whereas, there have been specific instances of damage to property in the County, caused by erosion by wind and water, and Whereas, Winnebago County has heretofore had no general policy

parks, forestry and conservation, and

Whereas, an unguided and promiscuous development of these and other features of our County is detrimental and contrary to the best

interests and prosperity of the people of the County, and Whereas, the State Legislature, recognizing the injurious effect these conditions, has granted authority and provided a means whereby the interests of the people of the County can be properly protected.

Now, therefore, be it resolved, by the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, that pursuant to the authority granted by Section 27.02 of the Statutes of the State of Wisconsin, that Winnebago County adopt the following general policy for parks, forestry and conservation. to-wit:

First, That a Winnebago County Park Commission be and the same is hereby created.

Second. That Winnebago County establish and maintain one or more County Parks

Third. That Winnebago County establish forest reserves by either gift, purchase, or the lawful seizure of tax delinquent lands,

Fourth, That Winnebago County will proceed to the growth of timber and the propagation of fish and game on County Forest Re-

Fifth, That Winnebago County accept as gifts, seize for delinquent taxes or purchase lands for the prevention of soil erosion by either wind or water.

Sixth. That this resolution shall not be construed to appropriate

any funds at this time for the foregoing enumerated purposes.

#### REPORT OF PROJECTS COMMITTEE ON LIME CRUSHING PROJECT

The following Report No. 4 was presented:

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County,

Gentlemen:

Your committee on projects has had before it for its consideration, a petition signed by a number of prominent agriculturists of this County, some of whom are members of the Agricultural Committee of this Board, and also other prominent members of the Board, said petition asks that a project be set up for the furnishing of crushed lime at cost to the farmers of Winnebago County.

On December 3rd, 1934, Resolution No. 71 was adopted by the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, and on January 3th, 1935, Resolution No. 11, clarifying the intent of Resolution No. 71, was also adopted by the Board of Supervisors Under these resolutions the Board agreed to initiate a project of furnishing crushed lime at cost to the farmers of Winnebago County. However, it was assumed by the sponsers of the lime project and by the majority of the board that the cost would not include the factor of labor inasmuch as the labor involved in the project would be secured from relief sources. Under that assumption, the cost to the purchasing farmer would be fifty cents a ton. However, under a ruling of the District Attorney, it was ruled that "at cost" meant the inclusion of the item of labor, and with the cost of labor factor added, the cost to the purchasing farmer would be a little over one dollar per ton. Under the circumstances, the added cost not having been anticipated, there was a waning of desire to purchase on the part of the farmer. Your committee is reliably informed that this same type of fertilizer cannot be purchased from other sources under three dollars a ton delivered to the farmer.

Your committee is convinced that our District Attorney is in thorough sympathy with the project of furnishing crushed lime to the farmers of this county at cost, and we have his assurance that he is sponsers of the lime project and by the majority of the board that the

farmers of this county at cost, and we have his assurance that he is ready and willing to do anything that he legally can do to assist this County to get this project underway, but of course your committee nor the Board cannot expect the District Attorney to give us a legal opinion which he himself does not believe is based on the law.

Your committee considers this a very worthy project and we understand that other counties have this sort of project underway and that much good is being accomplished from it. We have taken up this matter with some of the petitioners and the committee has held a hearing on the subject, and it was agreed that the sponsors of this project would have a report for the committee by June 22nd, but we have made no further headway then that twards arriving at a soluhave made no further headway than that towards arriving at a solution of the problem.

Your committee, therefore, believing that this matter can be

worked out satisfactorily to comply with the ruling of the District Attorney, which ruling your committee feels is well founded on the facts as these have been presented to the committee, recommends that the project for furnishing crushed lime at cost to the farmers of Winneproject for furnishing crushed lime at cost to the farmers of winne-bago County, be furned over the Highway Committee, in whose charge it was originally given, and that the Highway Committee in consulta-tion with the Agricultural Committee and with the County Agent, we believe can evolve an effective plan to put this project into operation and submit to this Board for its consideration, the proper resolution.

Your committee attaches hereto the petition of the petitioners

herein before referred to in this report.

#### REPORT OF PROJECTS COMMITTEE ON IMPROVEMENTS AT WINNEBAGO COUNTY FAIR GROUNDS

The following Report No 5 was presented: To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County,

Gentlemen:

On May 14th, 1935, at a meeting of your committee on projects at the Courthouse at Oshkosh, appeared Taylor G. Brown, Secretary of the Winnebago County Fair Association, urging that your committee recommend a project for the repair and improvement of conditions and buildings at the Winnebago County Fair Grounds.

From the statements of Mr. Brown and the knowledge that your committee was able to gather relative to conditions at the Fair

committee was able to gather relative to conditions at the Fair Grounds, it appears to the committee that there is need of attention to the drainage arrangements of the Fair Grounds, and also need for painting to the buildings thereon and also repairs and additions to some buildings.

The Committee has had no further communication from Mr. Brown, nor from any other official of the Fair Association, although additional

information was requested of Mr Brown, by letter.

The committee feels that upon the basis of the statements submitted to us by Mr. Brown and which were corroborated by others in a position to know of conditions at the Fair Grounds, that undoubtedly a very fine opportunity exists for securing the needed repairs and improvements at the fair grounds, through the medium of the public works administration whose acting director is Mr. A. Lawrie Kurtz. Veterans Administration, Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

Your committee from information it has, believes that projects such as suggested by Mr. Brown, would receive a very favorable consideration by the federal authorities, as a work project, as it seems to be desired by the federal authorities that projects involving the greatest amount of labor as compared with the least amount of expenditure for materials, should receive most favorable attention from the federal authorities at this time. Wor was because the second project and the the federal authorities at this time. Men can be more speedily put to work on such projects than on others involving larger costs for ma-terial and more detailed preparation.

Therefore, it is the recommendation of your committee, that the County Fair Committee of the Winnebago County Board have this matter brought to the attention of that committee for its consideration, and that the said committee report back to the Board its recommendations.

Because your projects committee have not been furnished with more detailed information relative to this project, and because your committee realizes that Winnebago County has a competent Highway Committee, which is in full possession of all the facts pertaining to the necessity of a new garage and warehouse, it is the recommendation of your committee on projects, that this matter be turned over to the Winnebago County Highway Committee for its consideration, and that the said Highway Committee submit to this Board further details relative to the project petitioned for.

In the event that the County Board approves, application can be made on behalf of this project, to the Public Works Administration, Veterans Administration, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, whose acting director is Mr. A. Lawrie Kurtz, and the recommended project can there be judged on its merits. #### REPORT OF PROJECTS COMMITTEE ON SUNNYVIEW SANATORIUM.

The following Report No. 7 was presented: To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County. Gentlemen:

Your committee on projects submits herewith its report on the project submitted for its consideration by the Trustees and Superin-

tendent of Sunny View Sanatorium.

We attach hereto the communication of Chairman of the Board of Trustees of Sunny View Sanatorium, Mr. E. R. Williams, in which Mr. Williams gives a detailed statement of the needs of the institution.

Summarized, the Board of Trustees, feel that there should be a project set up for an addition to the nurses home at the sanatorium, the estimated cost of which is \$20,000. The request cites also the need for a garage, estimated to cost \$4,000, and elevator costing \$9,200, and widening of lane and resurfacing of parking area to cost \$17,300 the total cost amounting to \$50,000. The request sets out in comprehensive detail the particulars as to why these various things are needed.

Winnebago County has a very substantial investment in the Sunny View Sanatorium, and your committee feels that the ultimate degree of success for this institution can not be obtained without the institution being provided with the proper facilities wherewith to function. The committee is sympathetic with the desires of the Board of Trustees. and Superintendent of Sunny View to make this fine institution 100%

efficient However, as Sunny View Sanatorium is jointly owned by Fond du Lac and Winnebago Counties, and Winnebago County has a very competent Sanatorium Committee to look after the welfare of View Sanatorium, your committee on projects feels that this Sunny view Sanatorium, your committee on projects teels that this request of the Trustees and Superintendent should be turned over to the Sanatorium Committee of this Board for their consideration.

In the event that the committee from Fond du Lac County and our own committee can agree that the request of the Sanatorium Trustees should be granted and both County Boards approve, the project can then be submitted to the Public Works Administration for its aproval for a federal grant and loan. Your committee on projects is informed that if the project can be carried out, that it will provide work for the following, viz:

Nurse's Home and garage, 14 skilled laborers for 10 weeks, 10 common laborers for 10 weeks.

Elevator, 4 skilled laborers for 10 weeks, 4 common laborers for 10 weeks.

Painters, 10 men for 5 weeks.

Tree planting, 10 common laborers for 5 weeks.

Resurfacing road and building shoulders, 35 common and semi-skilled laborers for 10 weeks

Your project committee, therefore, recommends that the matter be turned over to the Sanatorium Committee of this Board for its investigation and report.

The following Report No. 8 was presented:

To the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin:

Gentlemen:

Your Committee on Poor and Blind, to which was referred the application of James Crowley, Omro, Wisconsin, for aid for blind, would respectfully report that we have carefully considered and investigated the application and recommend that said application be held over till the November, 1935, session.

Your committee would therefore recommend the passage of the following resolution:

tions to our rural population, now therefore be it Resolved, By the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors that there be, and there is hereby created a special committee of three mem-

bers of the Winnebago County Board, to be appointed by the Chairman of this Board, the compensation of said committee to be the same per diem and mileage paid to other regularly constituted committees of this Board, and the duties of said committee so appointed to be to contact the various chairmen and town board members of all townships in Winnebago County, with the view of explaining the program of the Rural Electrification Administration as regards extensions of of the Rural Electrification Administration as regards excessions of electrical facilities to rural areas in this County, and to formulate a program or plan whereby the benefits of such rural extensions of electrical facilities can be secured for such townships and rural areas as may desire to avail themselves of the liberal terms offered by the Rural Electrification Administration. #### PROJECTS COMMITTEE ON RURAL ELECTRIFICATION

The following Report No. 1 was presented: TO THE HONORABLE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF WINNEBAGO

COUNTY, WISCONSIN:

At the time that your projects committee was holding its sessions and deliberations in the effort to analyze and list for the consideration of the County Board, projects that might reasonably be undertaken by Winnebago County in co-operation with the Federal Government, in the effort to alleviate unemployment conditions in this County; the project of rural electrification was considered by your committee, but

owing to the fact that definite information was not available to your committee at that time, no recommendation was made to your Honorable Body by the Projects Committee at the Adjourned Session held

on July 9th, 1935.

Recently, however, the Chairman of your Projects Committee has received letters and pamphlets from the Rural Electrification Administration, explanatory of the aims and purposes of the Rural Electrification Administration and setting forth the advantages that this arm of the Federal Government offers to rural communities desirous of securing extensions of electrical facilities to rural communities. These letters and pamphlets referred to in this report are herewith attached, so that interested members of the Winnebago County Board may have available more particularized information regarding this important subject than your project committee was able to acquire at the time the committee was engaged in considering these matters.

From a perusal of the pamphlets sent out by the Rural Electrifica-

tion Administration it appears to your subscriber that many reasons present themselves in favor of a more thorough consideration of the subject of rural electrification by your Honorable Body than has heretofore been possible from the meager facts available to the Board at its earlier sessions.

Because of the expense involved, the Chairman of your projects committee did not feel justified in calling a meeting of the projects committee subsequent to the last session of the Board held in October, but the Chairman of your projects committee feels that the matter of rural electrification is of sufficient importance both to rural and urban citizens of Winnebago County as to justify the consideration by the Board at this annual session of this important project for which the Congress of the United States of America has provided an appropriation of one hundred million dollars. Rural Electrification is being undertaken with the co-operation of the National Grange, the American Farm Bureau Federation, and other farm groups, the private power industry, the manufacturers of electrical and plumbing equipment, the National Association of Master Plumbers, and various other agencies. Many of these groups see in REA's program, not only a new standard of farm life, but an increase in industrial activity which will help substantially to lift the Nation out of the depression.

Your subscriber, therefore, respectfully recommends that your Honorable Body, at this session of the Board, take time to carefully canvas the possibilities and advantages to Winnebago County of the

program of the Rural Electrification Administration.

## REPORT OF THE MEDIATION BOARD

The following Report No. 7 was presented:
TO THE HONORABLE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS, WINNEBAGO COUNTY, WISCONSIN:

Gentlemen:

We herewith submit the following report of the services performed

by this department:

This board has had thirteen hearings, to date, has heard and investigated thirty-four foreclosure actions and has made twenty-nine recommendations to the Courts in which said actions are pending. Five recommendations are still pending. We have traveled 365 miles, viewing premises involved in said actions and making our investigations.

In considering the various foreclosure actions that have been brought before us, it has been encouraging to learn that most of the mortgages are more than willing to cooperate and make concessions to the mortgagors, if there is any probability of the person eventually paying off the mortgage. In some cases it has been the attitude of the mortgagors that the amount of the indebtedness should be reduced and they be allowed to pay off the small amount and get a release of the full debt. There are also several mortgagors who are willing to mitted the property without more several processors. to quit-claim their rights in the property without making it necessary for the mortgagees to incur further costs and expenses.

In short, it is the opinion of this committee that while we have no absolute authority in determining the rights between the parties, we do believe we have rendered a service in getting the parties together to talk over the entire proposition with a view toward a settlement with-out continuing the foreclosure action.

### COURTHOUSE BUILDING COMMITTEE REPORT

The following Report No. 8 was presented: TO THE HONORABLE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF WINNEBAGO

COUNTY, WISCONSIN:

Gentlemen: The Winnebago County Courthouse Building Committee begs leave to report that at their first meeting, held July 13, 1935, they went on record to make an application to the Federal Government for a PWA Grant, in behalf of Winnebago County for the building of a new Courthouse and Jail on the Clark-Kennedy Site in the City of Oshkosh, Wisconsin.

In order to prevent any delay in submitting an application for a

grant, the Chairman of this committee and two members were delegated to go direct to Milwaukee with full information and architectural design, statistical data and sketch and make formal application to the State Director of P. W. A. A. Laurie Kurtz for a 45% Grant on the construction of a new Courthouse and Jail for Winnebago County at a maximum cost of \$800,000.00. This committee submitted this application on July 16, 1935.

The next action of the committee resulted in the selection of a Citizen's Advisory Committee to co-operate with the Winnebago County Courthouse Building Committee. The Citizen's Advisory committee has the following personnel: George Banta Jr., Menasha, C. W. Nelson of Neenah, M. C. Mertz, Oshkosh, F. S. Josslyn, Oshkosh and Honorable

Mayor C. A. Weichering.
The Winnebago County Bar Association asked to be represented in an Advisory capacity with the following personnel: W. C. Bouck, C. H. Williams, E. M. Hooper, Frank Keefe and Robert Thompson,

Their request was accepted.

Seventeen meetings were held by your committee in which a great deal of valuable information regarding the operations for building with a Federal Grant, much statistical and engineering data for construction, comparative costs of architectural designs, break-down of labor was compiled, totalling 240 pages of information.

Your committee met with the City Planning Commission relative to the Zoning Ordinance and report that the Commission went on

record in favor of the change.

A survey by the committee of all the offices and departments of the now existing courthouse was made, and with this data proposed floor plans showing required office and department spaces was com-piled and submitted to architects for sketches and plans.

This survey included the inspection of the new Courthouses, recently constructed in Sheboygan, Racine, Kenosha and Milwaukee. which your committee visited securing first hand information of much benefit to the construction of a new Courthouse and Jail for Winnebago County.

Several architects appeared before the committee, showing sketches and floor-plans, construction, arrangement of office spaces, decorations

and equipment, which data is on file with their report.

After many attempts to secure definite information in regard to the possibility of securing a Federal PWA grant, and the tracing down of rumors and newspaper articles stating that Winnebago County's application had been rejected, your committee, asked through Honorable M. K. Reilly, Congressman of the Sixth District for a definite reply as to whether or not Winnebago County could expect a Federal grant. The following telegram was submitted to this committee: (QUOTE)

November 6, 1935. HON. M. K. REILLY OSHKOSH COURTHOUSE PWA PROJECT NOT REJECTED OR DISAPPROVED (STOP) IT IS STILL UNDER CONSID-ERATION HERE BUT ALSO ONE OF THOSE THAT WILL HAVE TO AWAIT AVAILABILITY OF ADDITIONAL FUNDS (STOP) HAVE ASKED COLLINS FOR PREFERRED CON-SIDERATION IN VIEW OF YOUR INTEREST BUT NOTHING

CAN BE ANTICIPATED AT THIS TIME.

## COUNTY FAIR REPORT-1935

The following Report No. 12 was presented by Taylor G. Brown. Sec'y.

TO THE HONORABLE, THE COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS. WINNEBAGO COUNTY, WISCONSIN.

Gentlemen:

I wish to present my 17th Annual Fair Report to your Honorable Body. The 1935 Winnebago County Fair and Exposition has once more lived up to its reputation of being "America's Foremost County Fair." After experiencing rain and cold on two days of the Fair, yet through careful budgeting, and excellent co-operation of fair officials and fair patrons, the 1935 Fair is well out of the "red," and will be recorded as one of the most successful, both from the standpoint of quality exhibits and good attendance. Our balance to the good will be at least \$500.00 more than last year, and we are therefore asking you to appropriate \$500.00 less than last year for the preparation of the coming Fair. We could perhaps cut this particular appropriation still more if it were not for the necessity of raising live stock premiums somewhat for the 1936 Fair. It has been said by many that Winnebago County has never put over any project, with nearer 100 per cent cooperation, than was the 1935 Fair and Exposition. Merchants, farmers, county officials, city officials, fair officials, banks, and industrial concerns, all worked hand in hand for the success of the 1935 Fair, and displayed a real civic pride in the "show window" of

County.

The policy of a 25 cent admission to grounds, with no free tickets to anyone excepting school children on Tuesday, was again in force this year, which enables a large number of people to attend the Fai at a minimum cost. Treasurer Carl F. Fugleberg has reported admission receipts of close to \$12,000.00. J. B. Schneller of Neenah, who had charge of carnival rides and shows, has reported \$643.30, which with other concessions will amount to close to \$4,000.00. Assistant George Ryf reported \$33.35 from stall and pen fees. W. S. Williams, Supt. of Speed, reported \$443 from speed entries. We paid out in George Ryf reported \$335.35 from stall and pen fees. The records of the Fair are now being placed in the hands of the auditors, and complete financial report will be filed at a later date with the county clerk and the state thus doing away with pre-

of the auditors, and complete financial report will be filed at a later date, with the county clerk and the state, thus doing away with pre-liminary financial statements. The County Fair Committee of the County Board has attended all of the various meetings of the Fair Board, and can give you further first-hand details of the business methods employed in the operation of the 1935 Fair and Exposition. It is always our aim to make the Fair a source of education and clean recreation. One of the main educational features is the watching of live stock judging by our fair patrons. We have always been handicapped in this matter by not having a judging pavilion, where people could sit on bleachers and witness the judging, rain or shine. Such a pavilion would also serve as a sales pavilion the year round, and thereby meet a long-felt need of the live stock breeders of Winnebago County. Your County Fair Committee will present a plant to you for the erection of such a building on the county fairgrounds under a WPA project, whereby most of the cost will be met by Federal funds. This is a most worthy project and I trust it will meet with your approval.

Whereas, this new Subsection provides that the duties of such service officer shall be to advise with all veterans of wars, residents of the county, who were engaged in the service of the U.S., relative to any complaint made or problem submitted and shall render him such assistance as he can in properly preparing papers to be submitted to the Veterans Administration in the process of adjudication of any and all claims such veteran may have against the U.S. government, and

Whereas this law provides that the County Board may provide such Service Officer with necessary clerical assistance and such other needs

as will enable him to adequately perform his duties, and

Whereas, it is the opinion of veterans of wars in general throughout the county that there is a great need for the services of such a

Service Officer.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved by Winnebago County Board of Supervisors that the office of Service Officer for Winnebago County is hereby created and he shall be elected by the County Board each succeding two years from the date of this session.

#### BUILDING A COURTHOUSE ON PRESENT SITE

The following Substitute Resolution No. 6 in place of Resolution No. 6 of the July 1935 Session was presented:
TO THE HONORABLE, COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF

WINNEBAGO COUNTY, WISCONSIN:

Gentlemen:

WHEREAS, approximately one-half of the Members of the Winnebago County Board can be said to be favorable to the building of a new courthouse for Winnebago County on the old courthouse grounds;

WHEREAS. Architects widely experienced in designing and supervising the construction of public buildings of the character fitting to the dignity and prestige of Winnebago County for a new courthouse, have given assurance that an adequate, modern new courthouse so fitting to the dignity and prestige of Winnebago County can be erected on the old courthouse grounds, including furnishing and all services and special payments to be made in connection with the building of such new courthouse, at a cost of from \$350,000 to \$400,000, and particularly in view of the fact that a new courthouse built on the old courthouse grounds would permit of the continued use of our present comparatively modern county jail and commodious jail grounds (which county jail some four years ago was remodelled to meet the requirements of the State Board of Control at an expense of over \$20,000.00, and, thereupon, after official inspection our Winnebago County jail was pronounced to be the equal of the latest type modern jail) and which county jail and commodious jail grounds is conceded to be sufficient in every way for the requirements of Winnebago County for 25 or 30 years to come, and that the taxpayers of Winnsbago County should not be obliged to have their investment in the present county jail wasted, and rightfully should be relieved from the additional cost

and expense of a new county jail building and equipment, and WHEREAS, experienced and qualified Architects, as heretofore stated, are in agreement, that a new courthouse to be built on the old courthouse site, could without additional cost to the County for such building, be built in two units, and thus there be no necessity of any cessation in the transaction of the County's business during the construction period. That the first unit would be erected immediately to the north of the present old courthouse; that upon completion of such first unit, all courthouse activities and departments be transferred thereto, temporarily, the old courthouse building then razed, and the second unit erected, whereupon departments and activities, not to be housed in the first unit permanently, be retransferred to the com-

pleted second unit; and,

WHEREAS, a Federal grant for a new courthouse and jail to have been erected on the so-called Clark-Kennedy site, was applied for, but which application was disapproved in Washington, and it is anticipated that a Federal grant when applied for a new courthouse to be erected on the old courthouse site will be approved by the proper authorities in Washington in accordance with the conditions of the Resolution

hereafter following

BE IT RESOLVED by the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin, that Winnebago County now proceed with the building of a new courthouse texclusive of a county jail and its incidental equipment) upon the old courthouse grounds in the City of Oshkosh, at a cost not to exceed \$400,000.00 for such new courthouse building, furnishings and all services and special payments to be made in connection with the building of such new courthouse for Winnebago County

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, by the County Board of Supervisors here assembled, that the Committee designated the Winnebago County Courthouse Building Committee, provided for by Substitute Resolution No. 6, adopted at the adjourned session of this County Board July 9th 1935, and the power vested by said resolution in the chairman of this Board, together with all powers and authority vested in said Building Committee by said resolution, be, and the same hereby are revoked, and the said resolution so passed rescinded in all things.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the County Board of Super-

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, that the chairman of said Board be, and he is hereby authorized empowered, ordered and directed to appoint a committee of five members to be composed of himself as chairman thereof, and four other members to be appointed by him, two from the city of Oshkosh, one from Neenah or Menasha for the cities, Neenah-Menasha, and one from the balance of the county that the members of said committee be paid for committee work a like per diem as committeemen on other committees of the county board are paid, but without provision for mileage and expenses when engaged in committee work, except when on committee work outside of Winnebago county, such pay to be chargeable to the courthouse fund. Said committee suppointed to have charge of the construction and erection of the proposed new courthouse so to be erected on the old courthouse grounds; and to be designated and known as the Winnebago County Courthouse Building Committee.

That said Committee be, and is hereby empowered and directed to take the necessary preliminary steps to determine the most suitable and proper type of building of three stories so to be erected as a new courthouse for Winnebago County upon the old courthouse grounds, and to make necessary arrangements for plans and specifications architectural drawings and designs for a proposed new courthouse building of three stories, and that the Committe utilize as far as may be, data presently secured as to the cubic feet of floor space thought necessary by the judiciary, county officials and department heads to accommodate the several court rooms and chambers, county offices and department rooms, and supervisors room, and vault space for county records, at the present time and estimated to be necessary for the years

of the future.

That said Committee is further authorized, empowered, ordered and directed to make application for a socalled Federal grant to be made for Winnebago County, under the proposed federal provisions for aid to counties for public improvements as and for part payment for the construction and erection of such new courthouse on the old court-

house grounds.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that said committee be, and it is hereby authorized, empowered, ordered and directed, to make necessary arrangements for the borrowing of the required fund, which in addition to the 45% of said \$400,000.00, expected to be obtained as such federal grant, viz., \$180,000.00 and the amount now available in the courthouse fund of \$150,000.00, will be needed to make up said cost of the new courthouse, viz. \$70,000.00 the three items mentioned making the total of \$400,000.00, either by borrowing the said required sum of \$70,000.00 from the federal government, or from another source, as to said Committee may be found most advantageous to Winnebago county.

Be It Further Resolved, that said committee be, and it is hereby, authorized, empowered, and directed, after the determination by said Committee of the proper type of courthouse building of three stories, found suitable and adequate in design and fitting to the dignity and prestige of Winnebago County, to be erected as a new courthouse on the old courthouse site, to enter into the necessary contracts and and agreements, with a licensed, responsible qualified architect, or firm of architects, experienced in the construction and erection of public buildings of the character proposed for such new courthouse, for the preparation of plans and specifications, drawings and designs, necesary and sufficient to cover the proper construction and erection of such new courthouse in strict compliance with the State Building Code of Wisconsin; that said architect, or firm of architects so employed are to supervise the preparation of binding and sufficient contracts to properly safeguard the interests of Winnebago County in the cotstruction and erection of such new courthouse, the said contract or contracts to be drafted and prepared by the legal department of Winnebago County; that said architect, or firm of architects to assist and advise with the Committee in deciding upon the qualifications, experience in the construction of public buildings, and responsibility of

prospective building contractors who may make and enter bids for the construction and erection and supplying of materials for such new courthouse; and to assist and advise with the Committee in its decisions as to the letting and entering into of the contract for the construction and erection and furnishing of materials for such new courthouse, all of which service by such architect, or firm of architects to be without additional cost or expense to Winnebago County and to be within the

stipulated compensation of said architect or firm of architects;

That the contract so to be entered into by the Committee for construction and erection of such courthouse and for the furnishing of materials therefor, to be let to a recognized, responsible contractor, experienced in the construction and erection of public buildings of the character of the proposed courthouse building; that the contract so to be entered into to specifically provide, that if any changes in plans and specifications, drawings and designs for such new courthouse found necessary, that same to be carried out as so changed without additional cost over the original contract, and to be within the agreed and stipulated contract price, and that any such changes not to have the effect of modifying or voiding the said contract or any of the conditions and provisions thereof in any way; that the contract provide that all materials purchased and going into the construction of said new courthouse by such contractor, be strictly in compliance with the plans and specifications and design for such building, and acceptable to the Architect supervising and in charge of the construction of such new courthouse; that the workmanship be of the best and acceptable to said architect; that time be made the essence of the contract, and that a stipulated time limit for the completion of the construction of such new courthouse be provided for in said contract, with an appropriate penalty for delays to be deducted from the contract price;

That contract with the architect or firm of architects to provide in addition to foregoing, that said architect to provide proper supervision of the construction and materials that go into the construction at all times; that the architect to have a competent, qualified, licensed architect continually on the job when construction in progress, and that any failure herein on part of the architect to have an appropriate penalty provided in such contract, to be deducted from the compensa-tion to which the architect would be otherwise entitled; or that upon failure by the architect to have such competent architect continuously on the job when construction work in progress, that the Committee can place a competent man in charge as inspector for Winnebago county, and his compensation then to be deducted from the compensation to which such architect would be otherwise entitled; that all of the supervision herewith provided for on the part of the architect, or firm of architects to be without extra compensation and to be within the compensation of the architect, or firm of architects heretofore pro-

vided for;

the Committee have one of its members, in turn, make periodical visits to the construction project while the new courthouse under construction, to keep proper check on the architect on the job, and to see that all provisions of the plans, specifications, designs, and contract are carried out and strictly in compliance with the State Building Code; that such committee member for such inspection visits be limited to his stipulated committee pay as herein previously provided:

That the Committee be, and is hereby, authorized, empowered and directed to carry to final completion the construction and erection of such new courthouse, and to arrange for the necessary furnishings and equipment therefor; and that same when fully completed to the satisfaction of the Committee to be finally accepted as such completed new courthouse for Winnebago County, when and if the certificate of the architect, or firm of architects so employed by the Committee, approves the completed new courthouse as being in all things in strict compliance with the plans and specifications, drawings and designs. and in compliance with the State Building Code of the State of Wis-

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE COUNTY PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE'S WORK, WINNEBAGO COUNTY, WISCONSIN.

The following Report No 19 was presented by Miss Katherine Weinman.

November 1, 1934 to November 1, 1935. To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County,

State of Wisconsin.

Gentlemen: The annual survey of the health work of the past year shows some gratifying results. The accompanying statistical report gives the actual work done in figures. Aside from the picture there is another less tangible and less easy to portray—but probably more far reaching and productive of results in health that the addition of figures. This aspect of the work has to do with awakening and increasing the consciousness of good health and its importance to the individual and to the commonwealth. This health consciousness is of slow growth and is dependent on influences from without, that aid in its cultivation. These influences, from whatever source, when taken together may be termed education.

The health education program of the county is planned to bring into the lives of its citizens the consciousness of the value of good health, especially to the children. Although science has been able to remove some of the hazards that we have had to encounter, there are

still a number of dangers to be busy about. Goiter prevention is now well established in the county. This prophylactic measure should neither be neglected nor discontinued until the doctors offer us something more effective. We live in one of the great goiter belts of the world and only constant care over a long period of time can save us from the disastrous results of disease of the thyroid gland.

Immunization against diphtheria, smallpox, and typhoid fever are well understood and well organized. If a single case of any of these diseases should appear, the contacts who have not been protected by

immunization could have this treatment at once.

The great menace today to the health of all and especially the young, is tuberculosis. Despite the activity of the organizations pledged to fight this foe, we still have tuberculosis. Consideration of this problem prompted the Winnebago County Medical Society, with the advice of the State Board of Health to form a plan more effective than we have had for the eradication of this disease. This plan provides for the discovery of tuberculosis early enough to make its cure simple and sure

A recent letter from Dr. Harper of the State Board of Health contains this paragraph: "It is believed that by vigorous cooperation on the part of the medical profession, the officials, and the citizenship of the state, tuberculosis in a decade or two can almost be eliminated from the human family, especially if the modern method of detecting tuberculosis is applied in the early stages." This message from Dr. Harper is encouraging and timely since the County Medical Society has formulated a plan which is in accordance with the suggestions in the letter. The county health committee and the county nurse will cooperate with the doctors if it is possible for them to carry out this campaign against tuberculosis

paign against tuberculosis

Dental Hygiene Program.

The Dental Hygiene work was done as in former years with Mrs. Mildred Weng in charge. The amount of good this work has done in disease and disability prevention cannot be estimated. The statistics show that only half as many children are badly in need of dental care this year as were in need of this treatment a year ago. Many schools have from one third to one half the children showing dental work up to date. The lectures combined with the showing of charts and models, proved effective in the teaching of oral hygiene. This year the health contest idea was stressed the children having dental corrections finished

contest idea was stressed the children having dental corrections finished being given stars to place after their names on the health chart. A far greater number of children respond to the contest suggestion than to ordinary advice on the care of the teeth. The child's individual health card shows when the dental work has been attended to Many dental corrections were done through the help of the corrective fund, which could not have been done without it.

## Special Education.

County Fair Exhibit: A special exhibit this year featured the modern treatment of tuberculosis

#### School Board Convention.

The health hour was devoted to a study of the problem of Tuberculosis Prevention and was ably presented by Dr. Pfefferkorn and Dr. Lockhart. A film was shown in the form of an animated cartoon which showed the value of the scientific attack on the dread disease tuberculosis.

Other talks given:

Several talks to nurses.

Talks to teachers.

Talks to women's clubs.

Talks and demonstrations to 4-H and agricultural clubs.

#### School Health Records.

A new card was designed this year of the same size as the report cards. This was done to enable the children to take the card home more easily. Checking health chores is a valuable way of getting the children to form the desired habits.

The water supply of all schools was checked and a retest made of all unsafe water. To date almost all the schools have a safe water

#### Hot Lunch.

The hot lunch privilege is now enjoyed by the majority of the rural children. This practice enables the teachers to guide their pupils in

regular and proper habits of eating; it does away with the too hurried consumption of the packed lunch; and it makes the noon meal a digestible and refreshing one.

## WINNEBAGO COUNTY LIBRARY REPORT

Ninth Annual Report—1935

The following Report No. 21 was presented by Deputy County Librarian, Mrs. A. L. Anderson:

TO THE SUPERVISORS OF WINNEBAGO COUNTY:

Do you rural supervisors really know what constitutes the work of the County Library? How it serves the schools, Granges, Clubs, with books, pamphlets and magazines? If not, come to the room which houses the headquarters of the County Library in the Public Library building and learn from first hand observation and personal questions how the

business is conducted

There are 116 book stations spread throughout the county so that books and material can be available to all the residents of Winnebago County. These stations are in 90 schools; 2 stores; 1 bank; 3 village homes; 10 farm homes; 1 nurses' home; 1 municipal building; and 8 Home Demonstration clubs. We have requests from those eight and two others who want good sized collections in their communities to use in their club work, but we have been unable to fill these requests because of the inadequate book stock. Since November, 1934, we have put small collections in 13 new places. All these collections may be changed as frequently as desired so that the books are rotated in all collections in the contract of the contraction of th parts of the county and every station has a chance to get the titles it needs.

The County now owns 14,218 books; —during the year we have added 1,620 new books to our collection; 12 of these were gifts; 254 were discarded because they were worn out. To keep the book stock in good condition we had 149 rebound; 193 glued; and 327 mended.

Up until the last few years, we have concentrated upon the collections for the schools; but now we feel the pressure for the books to be used by those no longer in school. We also find that the collection for the schools need to be enlarged, but there we do have an excellent

basic beginning.

Beside the books we also have pamphlet material useful for programs of all kinds; pictures to illustrate the lessons on picture study; and we subscribe to 32 magazines. Some of the friends of the County Library have given their used copies of magazines to be used in various places in the county Mrs. J. Sutherland; Mrs. H. W. Pierce; and Mrs. J. Harwood Evans were among these friends Mr Frank subscribed to "Sports Afield" for the Eureka station Likewise Mr. Shrove gave the "Christian Herald" and Mrs. Helen Reed the "New Republic" to the Waukau branch Rev Mansfield of Allenville gave his own plays to the County collection and Gertrude Fahley gave us plays and program material. Glen Feavel, Veronica Sullivan, gave us books to be added to the collection and Mr. Julius Due of Oshkosh gave a dictionary stand to the Waukau Branch.

What use has been made of the books owned by the county? The stations report that the books, magazines, and program material were used 143,252 times during the year. That is they were actually taken from the station and used at home and there they may have been used by other members of the family, but that does not enter into our count. For the past nine years the following circulation and books in the

The County Library cooperates with the County Superintendent of Schools; the County Supervising teacher; the County 4-H and Home Demonstration Club leader; the County Nurse; 4-H Clubs; Granges; Community clubs and also with the Cadets from Teachers' College do-

ing their practice work in the County Schools.

At the County Library room, exhibits of work were made by the Starr School and this exhibit was also used as part of our 1934 County Fair booth. The Larsen School also exhibited work made by the pupils. Several schools were brought to the County Library room to visit.

Beside this, the County Assistant, Mrs. A. L. Anderson, spoke at a meeting of the Winneconne Civic League; gave book talks at a number of Home Demonstration Clubs; talked at the Women's Adult Evening school; at 4-H Clubs; and at schools; had book displays at various times in various parts of the county; at ended the Home Demonstration Achievement Day at Omro; explained the library service to the new teachers of the county at their annual Institute; and attended the annual County School Board meeting. We also had a booth at the 1935 County Fair. The State County Library conference was held at Madison and was attended by both Mrs. Anderson and myself. I also attended the county library section at the American Library Association convention held at Denver in June.

We are cooperating with the Teachers' College in the National Youth Administration work and are giving two men work, supervised by Mrs. Anderson. This is giving her very much needed help as these lads are assigned to us for 50 hours a month during the school year.

They help with typing, pasting, mending packing boxes, etc.

As the residents of the County realize what the County Library can mean to them, more and more demand is being made by them for the service. The following figures of circulation analyzed by Townships omits the "behind the scenes" work that must be done by the County Assistant to get the books ready for the eager and willing custodians who maintain the county stations.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WINNEBAGO COUNTY

CHILDREN'S BOARD 1935

The following Report No. 25 was presented. To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors, Winnebago County: Gentlemen:

The County Children's Board herewith presents to you the annual report of the work of that board and statistics together with the state-

ment of expenditures.

As in former years, all work has been done at the suggestion and under the supervision of the juvenile department of the State Board of Control. Usually a representative of that board has attended the meetings. Monthly reports of foster homes under the supervision of the County Children's Board and of the Bureau of Family Service have been sent to the State Board. Our card files have been kept up to date and epiged. Service for the state board of the Bureau of Family Service have been and epiged. to date and enlarged. Seventen foster homes have been investigated and recommended to the State Board of Control for renewal of licenses or for new licenses. These homes have been supervised, the foster or for new incenses. These tonies have been supervised, the loster children have been carefully watched and their interests guarded in every possible way. We believe that it is greatly to the advantage of all concerned that normal children should be placed in homes rather than in institutions. The child in a home has more individual care and develops better and more normally. The cost of maintenance and supervision is considerably less.

of the foster homes in use in 1934 all are still in use except one in which the foster child died last July. Except in very few instances the children are in the same homes as they were a year ago. This. we believe to be a very significant fact, for children should remain in one home if possible and have the feeling of permanence and secur-

ity necessary to their best development.

The problem of unmarried mothers has again received our careful consideration. Though the number reported has been smaller this year, we believe we have a fairly complete record. With fewer cases reported there have been fewer settlements, but every settlement by the alleged father has meant not only the paternity was established for the child, but also that the county has been relieved of a certain financial burden. Several cases are still pending. In this work the Probation Officer has, of course, been most active.

For a number of years each of the several welfare agencies working in this county has worked separately. In order to prevent overlapping or duplication of effort, in March 1935, our board held a meeting which was attended by representatives of each of the other agencies. At that time it was agreed that our board should become a clearing house for

all the welfare work in the county

Cards were devised and printed on which each agency now makes to the secretary of the Children's Board a report of each case it handles. We now have, for the first time, in our files records of all Winnebago County cases in charge of the Green Bay Diocese Apostolate, the Children's Home and Aid Society, the Children's Country Home, the Bureau of Family Service, as well as of the Probation Officer. This again will enable us to do more efficient work as well as cut down costs for the county since a number of cases cared for in the county have been found to be residents of other counties.

Members of our board have attended conferences for social workers, investigated cases of neglect, dependency, and illegitimacy; but in all this work our county probation officer has been the indispensable agent of the board and has taken over the work with children and unmarried mothers to such an extent that in that work alone she has saved the county more than the entire cost of salary and expenses for her office and car. This she has done in addition to most valuable

work on children's aid.

For the ensuing year our board plans to continue the projects already begun and hopes to work especially on planning for and with young persons in its charge who are soon to become eighteen years of age and help them decide how they soon may become self supporting members of the community. It plans, also, to make a study of the kinds of recreation now available for young persons in the county with a view to encouraging communities to provide means for wholesome forms of recreation.

This is a brief summary of the work done by your county probation officer covering the period from November 1, 1934 to November 1, 1935, exclusive of one week of vacation.

Some of these families have other incomes and a few have not been on the list an entire year. This has made it possible for them to be taken care of for this amount.

In the cases of neglect and delinquency it has sometime been found necessary to take the child out of the Home and place it in a foster boarding home. In the new invironment and proper supervision the child develops normally and the tendency to delinquency generally disappears. It makes possible the development of a good useful citizen. The boarding home program for such children where they are surrounded by the home atmosphere and receive individual training is far preferable to the institution. While it may seem expensive, if compared with institutional care, generally it will be found much less expensive.

foster boarding There have been during the year cared for in homes or relatives homes:

Fourteen children over twelve years of age.

Six of these are in free homes.

Two others have been returned to their own homes.

These foster homes were not licensed the children being twelve years of age or older.

Eleven children under twelve years of age are being supervised in

licensed foster homes two of which are free homes.

Seven others are with relatives, making a total of eighteen. Plans

are being made for three to return to their mothers.

The Kiwanis Club is paying the tuition of one of our boarded children at the State Teachers College Training School. They have also bought clothing in one other case. The County Children's Board has provided clothing, dental, surgical and medical care in cases of dependent children. A more complete report on this will be received

The fine cooperation of various agencies, physicians, individuals, members of the County Board and officials when needed has been greatly appreciated. The present location of the office which makes the much needed private interviews possible and the lack of which has been such a carriery bondiery in the root is also are the carriery benefits. has been such a serious handicap in the past, is also much appreciated. There has been a transformation that did not, at first, seem possible.

The County Treasurer reported to the Investment Committee that The County Treasurer reported to the Investment Committee that \$57,500.00 in 44s Liberty Bonds in the Courthouse Building Fund had been called for redemption as of October 15th, 1935, and same had been deposited with the First National Bank of Oshkosh at par value for cash. It was brought to the attention of the Committee that the County was holding \$50,500.00 in U. S. Treasury Bonds with a market value of over \$104.50 per \$100 bond. After a thorough discussion Motion was made, seconded and carried, directing the County Treasurer to sell the Treasury Bonds at the market and purchase short term Treas-

ury Notes with the proceeds.

The County Treasurer has reported to this committee that the committee's instruction has been carried out with the result of a net profit to the County of \$1,744.44. The Treasurer further reported that the proceeds of the sale of the block of bonds of \$50,500.00, together with accrued interest money in the Courthouse Building Fund have been invested in Treasury notes bearing 11/2% interest and maturing September 15th, 1936, and the total investment at present is as follows:

#### COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT REPORT

The following Report No. 30 was presented:

Oshkosh, Wisconsin, Nov. 11, 1935.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors, Winnebago county, Wis.: Gentlemen:

In my seventh annual report it is my intention to put before you in a concise form, as near as possible, facts and figures concerning the Agricultural Extension Work carried on in Winnebago County beginning November 1, 1934 and ending November 1, 1935. With these facts and figures at your disposal it is your privilege to estimate the effect that this work will have on Agriculture and Society. At best it will be only an estimate, as there is no way in which we are able to measure the effect of any educational program.

A careful study of the report will reveal the fact that we have

contacted a great many people in our work. Through these contacts we have set standards, formulated ideas and practices for better or for

worse which may carry on far beyond our mere conception.

The agricultural investment in Winnebago County represents an investment of approximately \$40,000,000, made up of 2,573 farms or working units, supporting 12,000 people. As agricultural department head I appreciate the responsibility I assume and I can assure you that more efficiency and good citizenship has been foremost in my mind as I believe efficient farming and good government should be the goal of agricultural extension work.

Many of you remember that two years ago there was a question in the minds of this body whether or not Agricultural Extension work should be continued. In playing up the services rendered through this office, I aim to justify the board in their action and not to gain personal prestige. Without the support of this body little could be said for agri-

cultural extension work,

Generally speaking, the attitude toward extension work has undergone a great change in the last few years. Farmers are appreciating more and more the part science is playing in agriculture and they are gradually appreciating the services and information that is rendered through this office.

The work is not carried on in a hit or miss fashion, but carefully planned by the Agricultural Committee, the District Supervisor, The Home Demonstration Agent and myself. We try to adhere to this

plan and only in a few cases did we deviate.

### FARM MANAGEMENT

Parasite and Disease Eradication

One of the principle projects which we carried on in disease control work was the Bangs Disease Eradication Program under Federal Supervision. We did not accomplish as much in this work as we had expected, the Federal Government being too slow in testing and making payments. In many cases cattle were condemned and were not paid for until six months later and in other cases testing was three months late. In the meantime the price of cattle increased and so the producer was forced to sell low and buy high.

Before the year was over the Bangs Disease Control Organization as perfected and as a result began to function more efficiently and promptly. The test in itself worked out very satisfactorily. The infection in infected herds was reduced from about 30 per cent to 5 per cent. As soon as the dairymen learn to understand the program it is my opinion that it will work wonders. So far we have about 300 herds tested in the county. During the year we held 12 meetings to explain the program and we also spent a great deal of time explaining the plan to individuals.

At farm meetings during the year in cooperation with Extension Specialists we stressed modern methods of controlling parasites and

diseases in hogs, sheep, horses and poultry.

Culling the Seed Stock-Goal-2 Dairy Herd Improvement Associations. To my mind the largest and most effective program that we carry is our Dairy Herd Improvement Work. In starting this program six years ago we felt that the pure bred breeders were furnishing a large percentage of the seed stock for the dairy industry and that the culling of the seed stock would be most essential to more efficient dairying. The first of November 1929 we started this movements by organizing the first Pure Bred Association in the state, the Dairy Herd Improvement Association No 1. Two years later we organized the No 2 association and this year we organized the No. 3 association At present with these associations we are testing 74 herds of which 49 are pure breds. Between November 1 1933 and November 1, 1934, there were 128 bulls sold out of the No. 1 association and 27 out of the No. 2 association, or a total of These animals were all from tested dams and about 90 per cent were from cows that had produced 400 pounds of fat or over in a year. When you stop to consider that the average dairy cow in the county only produces about 250 pounds of butterfat in a year and that an increase in the efficiency of the dairy cows in the county one pound per cow per year would result in a net income of approximately \$1,300 per year to the dairy farmers, you can see that a program of this kind will be very effective.

As an educational climax we hold a bull sale every year. These sales draw good sized crowds of interested dairymen. At this event we stress the importance of using bulls from dams of known pro-

duction.

On the 31st of October we sold 12 bulls for an average price of

\$90.40 per head.

If time and space would permit, much could be said concerning the Dairy Herd Improvement work you are sponsoring. But in passing I wish to say that during the dull years the Winnebago County dairy cattle breeders have been progressing while most of the others have been retrogressing and I am safe in saying that in this line of work that you are not less than five years ahead You have a lot of excellent dairy cattle in the county. You have many good dairy cattle breeders. They are young. They know their business and they are working. It is my opinion that in a short time they will put Winnebago County on the map as a dairy cattle breeding section.

The farmers and breeders have been given more service in buying and selection of livestock this year than in the past. This is a part of our work that we do not care to encourage, but it is so closely affiliated with our breed promotion work and livestock efficiency that it seems necessary. We confine this work as nearly as possible to breed-

ing stock.

Livestock Exhibits

We have paid a great deal of attention to Livestock exhibits as we believe exhibits are often the show window of our livestock industry. In June the Hoistein breeders held a cattle show at the County Fair grounds. 65 head of Holstein cattle from all parts of the county

were displayed and judged by a nationally known judge.

State Fair
At the State Fair we exhibited 56 hogs. This exhibit won about
\$400. Among the most coveted prizes won were two firsts and one third
on amateur litters, second on county exhibit in the fat classes and
second on county exhibit in the 4-H Club Department; first, second
and third on heavy single fat barrows, first and second in the heavy
and medium weight pens and grand champion over all weights and

breeds. To my knowledge this was the first purple ribbon ever won at the State Fair by a Winnebago County breeder on livestock, owned, bred and exhibited by the same breeder. County Fair

On account of reduced premiums at the County Fair we were unable to get as many dairy cattle on display as we had hoped. Nevertheless we had a very good display. The hogs, sheep and poultry shows

were about as large as usual.

As a special educational feature we held a fat hog show. The animals were judged by a packer judge, then shipped to Milwauke where they were slaughtered and the carcasses graded. The object of this show was to get the farmers and packers agreed on the most desirable type of hog to raise.

#### SOIL IMPROVEMENT

You will remember that a year ago we had a great deal of discussion on limestone grinding. Much time was spent during the first part of the year in getting a limestone grinding project set up under a County Works plan. After holding eight meetings to explain the plan, testing 147 samples of soil and taking orders for over 7,000 tons of ground stone etc. the project was declared illegal and drouped.

If something does not change our plans we expect to get lime and marl moving in ten days or two weeks The material from practically all of the limestone and marl deposits has been analyzed for the calcium equivalent and cost of grinding and de-

livery has been determined.

Beginning with the ox to break the sod, the cradle to reap the harvest and the oxcart as a mode of conveyance, in less than a century from these crude beginnings in virgin soil 85% of our cultivated land in Winnebago County is showing a deficiency in some form of plant food. A question that we should begin to worry about is this—with our present methods of cultivation, harvesting, machinery, roads, markets, etc., what will happen to our plant food in the next fifty years.

With this thought in mind we have given considerable thought to maintain our soil fertility. This involved promoting legumes to maintain nitrogen, intelligent use of commercial fertilizers, care of barnyard manure and soil erosion. If at any time during the growing season you have driven through this county you could easily see that Winnebago County farmers are interested in growing alfalfa, sweet clover and soybeans, and they show intelligent use of commercial fertilizer and care of barnyard manure and erosion.

Farm Accounting
We had planned to do more work in farm accounting and analysis
of farm practices, but nothing of much importance has been done

along that line except in individual cases.

#### ADJUSTMENT PROGRAM

The three principle emergency programs that we have had to handle are the corn-hog, sugar-beet, and farm credit. We have had full

charge of the corn-hog program We had 464 signers this year. work is not completed so I cannot give you the cost of administrating the work. Last year the cost was 4.4%. Most of the last year's third payment checks and this year's first payment checks have been handled through this office. Our part of this program has been all the clerical work, seeing that the committees and inspections function according to instructions, holding educational, sign-up and referendum meetings. The amount paid this year will be \$37.197.65.

In the best program we had only a part of the work to do. The rest was done at the regional office We held a large number of educational meetings, made out the contracts and gave out the checks. There were 291 contracts signed. The total payment will be \$27,880.98.

Farm Credit

We have not had as much work with the agricultural credit work, this year as we have had in the past. The Land Bank and Commissioner's Loan now have their office in the city. The call for seed loans has been small. Only 9 loans were made. Most of the time spent on the work has been to explain the loan and furnish information regarding it.

#### COMMUNITY ACTIVITIES

#### Public Discussion School

For the last two years we have been carrying on public discussion programs in cooperation with the Rural Sociology Department of the University of Wisconsin This was done to familiarize farmers with agricultural problems, as we believe that if correct facts and figures were presented in a good many cases difficulties and closses could be avoided. Our plan has been to get the rural people into meetings and with the assistance of specialists train them in preparing and presenting their subjects. Farm Week

The Farm and Home Week Conference was held at Winneconne, February 27, 28 and March 1. Side roads were blocked and therefore the attendance was not as large as we expected, yet we feel that it was a very successful undertaking. This program seemed to create more interest and satisfaction than any we have ever had. 250 people

attended the firt day, 310 the second and 200 the third.

On the first day a meat cutting demonstration by Prof Lacey, poultry dressing and meat canning demonstrations by Prof J B. Hayes and Miss Charlotte Clark respectively "Sheep and Swine Disease Control and Herd and Flock Management" was discussed by Prof. James Lacey and Prof. Hayes.

The second or barley day was given largely to the discussion of the kind of barley malsters want and how to get it. Tre principal speakers were Prof Briggs and Prof. Leith of the Agronomy Department of the University of Wisconsin

J. J. Reid of the Agricultural Bacteriology Department, presented an exhibit to show the value of inoculation. This was the first display of its kind ever to be taken out of the Experimental Station in winter

Those interested in chick raising were given an opportunity to hear a very interesting discussion on the ure and cost of electricity in

brooding chicks.

Others had a chance to hear an educational discussion of the use

and cost of electricity in hot beds

A baking demonstration using farm and dairy products given under the direction of Miss McFarlane was of interest to the women of the

county

The people seemed to take real interest in each day's program, but to my mind the Public Discussion Program on the third day was the most interesting and beneficial. It was a discussion and debate program, farmers themselves taking part bringing out facts regarding the agricultural situation today. These facts would be hard to get to the farmers in any other way.

# Home Talent Entertainment

The annual Drama Festival was held again in June and our second Music-Folk Dance Festival was as successful as it was last year. Association Picnics and Meetings

The annual Holstein dinner and program was held in March at the Community Grange Hall, about 200 people throughout the rural

areas of Winnebago County being present. The Dairy Herd Improvement Associations held picnics in the summer.

#### 4-H CLUB WORK

It is generally considered that the most important part of extension work is 4-H club work. It would be given a more important part in this report if it were not for the fact that the work is divided between the Home Demonstration Agent and myself.

We have learned that club work requires a great deal of time and personal attention. At a time like this when the emergency programs are crowding the regular work it is difficult to give the time and at-

tention that is required to be most successful.

Although the enrollment this year was not so large as we had planned the quality of the work was very good and our percentage of achievement members was ahead of last year

Thirty-one clubs with 44 leaders and 350 members constituted our enrollment for this year.

The 4-H Leaders Organization met every six weeks during the summer. The aim of this organization was to promote and strengthen club work by discussion problems of interest to all and by forming county-wide policies. They had a definite hand in planning the summer program and made decisions as to how the contests, 4-H fairs, etc., should be handled. This organization sponsored two 4-H dances, the proceeds of which were to help pay for achievement pins and send club members to the State Fair. This group assisted in correcting the record books and helped plan the county achievement program

The 4-H club drama rules were formulated again this year by representatives from interested clubs. Three groups entered the county contest and the winners entered the state contest.

On the 16th of July, Prof. Humphrey of the University of Wisconsin, cooperated with us in holding two dairy calf judging demonstrations. One meeting was held in the Town of Winchester, the other in the town of Algoma. At this time the boys and girls of the county were given an opportunity to meet and work with a man nationally known as a dairy cattle authority. In a very pleasing manner he discussed with the club members, the selection, fitting and showing of dairy cattle. A cattle judging contest was held at each meeting and

all members desiring to could take part.
Our annual 4-H Club Round-up was held at Winneconne, July 24th. About 200 club members and leaders attended this contest, the object of which was to select members to represent the county at the State Fair. Thirteen Home Economics and four agricultural demonstration teams took part and the winners from each group were sent to

the State Fair.

State Fair

From the round-up a livestock judging team consisting of two boys and one girl, an agricultural individual demonstrator, a home economics individual baking demonstrator and a clothing judging team were sent

to the State Fair.

The individual agricultural member set up an agricultural booth demonstrating modern methods of egg marketing. His display took second and his demonstration first, awarding him a trip to the International Livestock Congress which will be held in Chicago the

latter part of November.

The Home Economics member won first in baking and second in individual demonstration. Her subject was "Baking With Cheese." This girl was awarded a trip to the State Club Camp in Madison next June.

The home economics judging team won first on judging clothing, and were also awarded a trip to the National Congress.

Five 4-H club boys exhibited 32 pigs. They won two firsts and one third in the amateur division and were placed well up in the money in the 4-H club and open classes, winning a total of \$280.00, besides some special prizes awarded by the breed associations.

During the season Gerhard Boss was awarded \$100 for winning first in farm accounting and was honored at a luncheon at Fond du Lac sponsored by the International Harvester Co.

This year we may say that three girls and two boys won first in state competition other than livestock, three in home economics and two in agriculture.

County Fair

At the County Fair the 4-H club department entered 470 exhibits

on which they won \$700.00.

Seven 4-H club members were entered in the Milwaukee Stockvards Pork Production Contest in which they won \$50.00.

The total winnings for the year amounted to \$1,140 besides many special prizes. 112 boys and 111 girls completed their projects, making

a 64% achievement.

Achievement Day at which over 300 people attended and which marked the end of our year in club work was held October 25th in Oshkosh.

#### MISCELLANEOUS

In March in cooperation with Prof. Lacey, two lamb docking and casterating demonstrations were held in the towns of Winchester and

Two spraying and pruning demonstrations were held in April in

cooperation with Prof. Kuehner.

In the spring and again in October poultry culling demonstrations

were conducted with Prof. Hayes in charge.

Three herds of hogs and one flock of sheep were entered in the State Meat Animal Contest. Amos Luedtke of Neenah won first on hogs, producing an average of 1,925 pounds of pork per litter in six months, Julius Miller of Neenah won third and Chas. Foote of Omro, sixth. In the sheep contest Fred Busse of Omro won fifth place.

The Department of Markets assisted us in helping the farmers market their wool through the National Wool Pool.

In cooperation with the State Conservation Commission we distributed 3,000 trees for windbreak nurroses.

#### REPORT OF HOME DEMONSTRATION AGENT

The following Report No. 31 was presented by Miss Helen Briggs: Oshkosh, Wisconsin, November 11, 1935

To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors:

I am submitting herewith my annual report from November 1, 1934, to September 10, 1935.

### PROGRAM OF WORK

Home Demonstration Club Work. 4-H Club Work, Community Activities.

# HOME DEMONSTRATION CLUB WORK

In the spring of 1934 the president of each Home Demonstration Club attended a meeting to help plan the lessons for the winter of 1934-1935. Mrs. Mortenson was present and discussed the lessons on Foods, Nutrition, Clothing, Home Furnishing, and Home Management that might be chosen. After a discussion on the most urgent needs of the farm provident areas that might be chosen. of the farm people and present trends, each woman cast one vote for the lesson her club had chosen.

The following lessons were selected: Art Principles as applied to Interior Decoration, Christmas Suggestions, Hooked Rugs, and Floor Finishes. I think they made a wise selection in continuing their study of the living room. The women enjoyed learning to make a hooked rug because it would add a bit of color to the room and when made well they would give long and good service. It also gave them a very effective way of using the otherwise useless woolen pieces. It takes

many hours to make a good hooked rug but the amount of satisfac-

tion gained more than offsets the time spent.

Very simple rug frames were used and in most cases they were made at home. The only expense for most of the rugs was the cost of the hook which was twenty cents. Gunny sacks were used in place of buying burlap.

I also taught the women how to crochet a rug using cotton or woolen pieces and carpet warping. The total number of rugs com-pleted up to June 1st was 171 and many more are practically completed. This lesson has been particularly effective because it gave the women something to do at meetings and the rugs were brought back to a meeting after they were finished and it furnished an excellent

opportunity to compare and evaluate them.

In March two demonstrations were given at the County Farm and Home Program. Miss Clark, Food Specialist, gave a meat canning demonstration and Mr. Lacey and Mr. Hayes demonstrated cutting pork and poultry. The second day a foods demonstration was given emphasizing the use of butter, cheese and milk. There was a large attendance and the women thoroughly enjoyed the demonstrations

For the first time a Landscape Short Course was given this year by a college specialist. Only Home Demonstration Club members could by a conege specialist. Only home Demonstration Chilo members could attend and each club received four lessons during the winter months which were held entirely separate from our other meetings. In many cases their husbands attended the meetings and did much of the measuring of the grounds and actual planting of material. Each woman was required to make a drawing scale of her home grounds on squared paper. The meetings consisted of an hour lecture and the remainder of the time was spent in sketching shrubs, trees, etc., in desirable places on the plan.

The lectures included the care of the lawn, placing of driveways, characteristics and habits of growth and care of trees, shrubs and

flowers

In the spring an open meeting was held and slides were shown

illustrating the subjects discussed during the winter months.

Four planting demonstrations were given by Mr. Holmes at the homes. The men folks attended and all of the plant material ordered by that family was planted and pruned. A total of 679 trees, shrubs and fruit bushes were planted and the total attendance of the eight clubs was 219.

These lessons proved to be most worthwhile to the farm people. The landscape plan which they have made will be kept and a few improvements can be made each year as they feel they have the time

and money to go ahead.

We are fortunate in having a county library which furnishes books for the Home Demonstration Clubs Each Club elects a librarian and she reports to the County Librarian who teaches her the system of handling the books. A short talk on any good book greatly increases its circulation and so we feel it is worthwhile to spend a few minutes this way whenever one of the members has something of value to pass on to the others. Many new books have been ordered for our clubs because the women read mostly the better fiction stories that deal with situations that are close to them. Books dealing with pioneer and farm life are very popular. Only the best books are sent out to them. From November to June this year 1,236 books were read by the members of Home Demonstration Clubs. This is a decided increase over last year.

I feel the following comments that have been sent to me by Home

Demonstration Club members are worth quoting:

"Surprised and pleased at the type of books we got." "Would not have been able to have gotten into Oshkosh this winter

after books.

"Could not afford to take magazines this winter so don't know what we would have done for reading. "Had no money for shows or magazines and the books helped keep

"The folks we love to be with, and who understand us best are folks who have read and use that reading in thinking out other things."

"Is reading worthwhile to women? It is one of dire necessity! A woman's job is one of multiple sides and reading helps her to do that many sided job with greater estimation to have love and efficiency that many sided job with greater satisfaction to herself and efficiency that spells success."

"Like people we meet, books have a great influence on our thoughts and life.

The County Librarian has spoken to many of the clubs this year

and the women have enjoyed this part of the program.

We had our first achievement program in June this year. were started early and the women enjoyed planning for it.

were started early and the women enjoyed planning for it. Howard rugs, refinished and recaned furniture, quilts, and smaller garments made were displayed. About 800 women attended.

Mrs. Mortenson talked on the local leader plan and three other state people spoke. A most interesting play "In An Antique Shop" was presented. Several women from each club took part and the episodes were woven together with Music. The play was especially appropriate because it related to projects the women had been studying.

As to plans for the future: There are two groups that have asked to be organized and receive the Home Demonstration lessons. There

are several other communities in which a number of women have been

working to get a club started

At a meeting with Mrs. Mortenson in June the presidents voted to change over to the local leader system. However, the Home Demonstration Agent will still attend as many of the local meetings as she can conveniently.

#### 4-H CLUB WORK

The 4-H Clubs were reorganized and new clubs started in the spring. The Home Demonstration members assisted in selecting leaders and in organizing clubs. I try to keep a close relationship between the two groups and with this in mind I had Miss Salter speak on this subject at the Home Demonstration achievement program in June.

This year 350 members were enrolled in 31 clubs with 44 leaders. I met with each club at least once during the spring for the organization meeting and in the summer I worked with each girl's club doing project work. At each of these meetings I discussed judging This work proves to and the girls judged the articles in most cases. be most helpful in raising the club standards and teaching the girls the correct method of procedure. Two open meetings were held and a clothing judging demonstration was given by Miss Salter preparatory to the county contest.

I worked with sixteen Home Economics demonstration teams or

individuals helping them all once or twice or more times.

The judging and demonstration contest was held July 24th and about 200 club members and leaders attended. Thirteen Home Economics demonstration teams and four agricultural demonstration teams en-The winners from each group entered the state tered the contest. contest. The agricultural indivilual was high at the state fair so he will go to the National Congress in Chicago. He demonstrated on "Egg Marketing Factors" and he gave his demonstration in the booth which he put up himself.

The Home Economics individual was high in baking demonstration and second high in all Home Economics individual demonstrations. She demonstrated on "Baking With Cheese." She will have her way

paid to State Camp in Madison.

Forty-five girls entered the baking and clothing judging contest and the winning team was sent to the State Fair. The team placed highest among all Home Economics judging teams and so will go to the National Contest in Chicago.

Contests were held for the boys in crops and livestock judging.

The livestock team went to the State Fair.

The 4-H leaders organization meet every six weeks during the summer. The aim of the organization is to promote and strengthen club work by discussing problems of interest to all and forming county-wide policies.

The leaders had a definite hand in planning the summer program. They made decisions as to how the contests, county fair, etc., should be handled. The leaders organization planned and sponsored two 4-H club dances to make money to send members to state fair and help pay for achievement pins. This group will also help correct record books and plan the county achievement program.

Some of the money earned by the leaders was used for a leaders' dinner and for refreshments at another meeting. At the dinner meeting we had the following speakers: One of our State 4-H leaders County Agent, County Nurse, two local 4-H leaders, County Fair Secretary. The president of the leaders' organization was in charge.

The 4-H Hot Lunch project was carried again this year in five schools and I assisted with hot lunch in ten other schools that did not carry it as a 4-H project. I called at each school from two to four times during the winter.

The 4-H Club drama rules were formulated again this year by representatives from interested clubs. Three groups entered the country contest and the winning group entered the state contest. The High contest and the winning group entered the state contest. The High School Teacher that acted as judge gave criticisms and suggestions for improvement.

# Community Activities

As in other years, I have attempted to organize my program of work in such a way that all members of the family will be benefited. I have tried to make the Home Demonstration Clubs more conscious to the things they can do to sponsor 4-H club work. There is also a chance for 4-H groups to cooperate for the improvement of the community. A local fair sponsored by a community club for the 4-H club of that section this fall and a grange program put on by a 4-H club last winter are examples of the type of programs that are beneficial to the adults as well as the boys and girls.

Local 4-H clubs conducted fairs in many sections of the county because the County Fair is not held until late in September after school has started. These local fairs stimulate an interest in club work for

the club members and parents as well.

I find a growing interest in the Drama and the Music-Folk Dance Festivals. Programs planned well in advance work out much more smoothly, and so this year we plan to draw up county rules early in

The annual Drama Festival was held again this year and our second Music-Folk Dance Festival was as successful as it was last year.

We had a good attendance and a splendid program at our second County Farm and Home program. The first day a Meat Cutting and Canning Demonstration was attended by both men and women, the second day program for women was a foods demonstration, and the third day a public discussion and debate was carried out by representatives of farm organizations.

Three clubs entered the 4-H Club drama contest and the winning

group was sent to the State Camp in Madison.

I left the county in September and so the remainder of the report will be given by Miss Briggs, who is the new Home Demonstration Agent and 4-H Club leader.

Gentlemen:

In accordance with the terms of my contract, I am presenting the report of my work as 4-H Club Leader and Home Demonstration Agent of Winnebago county It is my hope that I may present a picture of my activities in connection with this work for the length of time I have been here, that is, from September 11th to November 1st.

Both the 4-H club work and the Home Demonstration work have been well organized in the county through the former 4-H Club Leader and Home Demonstration Agent. The work I have done in 4-H work has been largely concerned with finishing up the summer activities. Because the major project to be considered since I have been here the 4-H Club Work.

is the 4-H Club Work, and because it deals with the boys and girls, I will tell first of these activities.

### 4-H CLUB ACTIVITIES

County Fair.—Each club member, in order to complete his requirements and receive his achievement pin, must make a public exhibit. A number of clubs held local fairs so that more of their members

would have the opportunity to exhibit.

The first major project after I came was the County Fair. There were 12 4-H booths—six Home Economics Display, four combined Home Economics and Agricultural Display and two Agricultural-Educational. A display booth is one which simply displays the articles made by that club, while an educational booth explains some part of the project. These booths were all very attractive and represented a large number of club members. The spirit shown by the club members and the leaders in arranging the booths and in participating in the fair events was very commendable.

There were a total of 470 exhibits at the fair, which number in-

cludes: Cioming Calves ..... 52 Home Furnishing ..... 24 Pigs ..... 30 Canning ...... 26 Ducks ..... Sheep ...... 23 Poultry ..... 48 Rabbits ..... Colt ..... Handicraft .....

A judging contest with 10 participants and a dress revue with 15 models were also held

#### Achievement Activities

Each year special recognition goes to the outstanding club members enrolled in the various projects in the county. The awards are based on record books, project requirements, and other activities of the club member. These club members in turn are competing with outstanding members from other counties to find the best state 4-H members who in turn compete for honors in Chicago at the National 4-H Club Con-

This year Elaine Peterson of the Stand Up and Cheer Club and Lucille Radloff from the Mikesville club were chosen in the judging contest at the State Fair to represent Wisconsin at the Chicago Club Congress. Ellward Wolff from the Algoma Club also will go to this Congress as the

outstanding individual agricultural demonstrator.

The outstanding members in our county as chosen this year are: Best meat animal project, Warren Plummer, Allenville Boys 4-H club. Best Dairy Club member, Marie Sorenson, Stand Up and Cheer club. Best Junior Leader. Phillip Lautenbach, Wolf River 4-H club.
Best All Agricultural boy, Ward Laiten, Blue Bell Busy Bees 4-H club

Best Canning member, Dorothy Meltz, Allenville Girls club

Best Baking Member and Dress Revue Winner Irene Schultz, Oshkosh club.

Best All Home Economics girl, Lucille Radloft, Mikesville 4-H club. There were 350 4-H club members enrolled in 31 clubs taking a total of 400 projects Of this number 223 boys and girls completed their projects, making our percentage of completion about 64 per cent as compared with 61 per cent achievement rate of last year

Our achievement program at which time the achievement pins were awarded was well attended. Eight clubs received 100 per cent completion certificates showing that all their members had been given achievement pins. A number of outstanding 4-H club members gave very nice talks on "What My 4-H Work Has Meant to Me" Several musical selections were by 4-H club members. The principal speaker was Prof G M. Briggs who was introduced by Mr. J. F. Shea, chairman of the County Board.

#### WINTER ACTIVITIES

The Hot Lunch Project will again be carried as in previous years. Every year more people seem to feel the importance of a Hot School Lunch. I visited a number of schools explaining this project and to date there are seven schools who wish to take the Hot Lunch as a 4-H There are several other rural teachers who have expressed an interest in starting this work as a project in their schools

A number of clubs are all ready organized for winter's work. Some

of them will carry on regular project work, while others will keep organized by having social activities.

#### Home Demonstration Work

Two new Home Demonstration Clubs have been formed this fall with an added enrollment of about 40 women. One old club has dropped out, so that now we have 16 organized groups with an enrollment of nearly 400 women.

At a meeting with Mrs. Luella Mortenson, our State Home Demonstration Leader, the presidents of each club planned a program for the coming winter. These lessons will include a lesson on Economics in Clothing (Repairs and Made-Overs) Hobbies, Dress Accessories, Meal Planning and Table Service and One-Dish Meals.

I have attended a number of Home Demonstration meeting to help

them get their work lined up for this next year.

Four groups plan to take up work in Home Grounds Landscaping with Mr. L. G. Holmes from the University, who met with several similar groups last year.

#### Community Activities

There has been so much interest in drama festivals and a public discussion program that this county again plans to participate in these events.

Mr. A. F. Wileden and Miss Amy Gessner from the Rural Sociology Department of the University were here to draw up plans with representatives of organized groups in the county for work in dram and public discussion. Committees were appointed to direct the work. The question "Is Dairying Doomed in Wisconsin?" was selected as the topic for discussion in these organized groups.

Total number of illegitimacy cases accepted .......10 This Society has rendered services on these cases outside of the County where confinement has taken place, work with parents of the girl, the alleged father, and cooperation with the district attorney in aiding of established paternity and securing a financial settlement.

Most of these 10 illegitimate children, through the services of this Society, have been returned with the girl to her immediate family or

the home of relatives involving no expense to Winnebago County.

Many children have been placed in free homes or with relatives which

Many children have been placed in free homes or with relatives which has prevented County expense.

The Society has provided the services of a worker and an automobile to make the necessary calls. It has provided the clerical help necessary to keep complete records as required by the State Board of Control; medical care and clothing has been provided where necessary. The Society has given the benefit of a state-wide service in making calls on relatives throughout the state and supervision of unpartial state. married mothers where confinement has taken place outside of the County.

# REPORT OF OUTDOOR RELIEF DEPARTMENT.

The following Report No. 39 was presented by L. J. Howman, To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin Gentlemen:

During the past year our work has been largely routine. There has been the usual increase in the number of relief clients during the winter months with a corresponding decrease during the spring and summer

There are several reasons for the increased cost of relief this year over last. The problem of securing shelter for our people is becoming increasingly difficult—and we have had to spend much time in this phase of work. In many cases people are 'refusing to rent to relief clients, both city and county, and it is almost impossible to find places which can be rented at a price such as we have been accustomed to pay. Rents have advanced in practically all parts of the county and our rental costs have been forced up accordingly. There has been a general increase in the price of nearly all commodities especially food, and as this is the primary requirement in all relief, there has been a corresponding increase in the cost of this item. We try to be fair in our food allottments so that none need suffer, particularly the children, but because of the varied requirements of different families there is bound to be some dissatisfaction. The need of food, shelted or medical attention is usually the first reason for people to seek relief. Quite often they are comparatively well supplied with clothing and household needs. However, after a prolonged period of unemployment and relief, it is necessary to grant them additional aid of this kind. This fact has been very evident during the past months and we have been called upon to furnish clothing, bedding, stoves and other household supplies in increasing amounts.

In spite of the fact that no work relief projects have been provided and due probably to better working conditions, an increasing number of and due propally to better working conditions, an increasing number of those on relief have been able to secure employment. Of the applicants we had during the year, thirty have been able to get reasonably steady work and in fourteen instances they are temporarily employed. For a number of months through the ruling of WERA we were unable to get our boys in the conservation work but these restrictions have now been removed and through the enrollment of several of our young men, their families have ebcome practically self-supporting. The National Youth Administration, which provides aid to young people between the ages of sixteen and twenty-five who are on relief, gives them an opportunity to attend school and furnishes them employment to the extent of six dollars per month, thus enabling them to secure necessary clothing, books and other essentials. A number of our cases have been certified for this form of aid. The Rural Resttlement Administration is seeking to rehabilitate families on relief and those of our families who were

formerly on farms, we are referring to them.

One of the primary objects of this department is the establishment of legal settlement of the applicant and his return to such place it possible. Many of our families come from out of the state and formerly we were unable to return some of them because of various settlement laws of the different states. Since the establishment of the Wisconsin Transient Bureau, we have been fortunate in having their cooperation and assistance in obtaining authorization for the return of some of such cases, who otherwise would have become county charges and would have increased our costs materially.

At the time that this department was organized, there were in this county many non-resident cases having a legal settlement in some other county or state We have been able to persuade some of them to return and for others we have secured court orders, resulting in a decrease in the number of non-residents in this county until at the present time we have only fifteen such cases on relief. Some of these are being paid for regularly by other counties, others are physically unable to return at the present time, while in a few instances their removal has been denied by the court for sufficient reasons.

We also have a number of families for whom we are supervising the relief given but there is no charge to this county because arrangements have been made for the payment of all bills by their former municipality. During the past year removal hearings have been held in 23 cases and of these the court has ordered the return of 20. Other arrangements have been made for the return of 14 more so that since November 1, 1934, 34 families numbering 106 individuals have left the county. Since the organization of this department 163 families have been returned to their former homes, who ifthey had remained here would have cost this county a considerable sum of money even though we might have been able to collect for their care in some instances.

From November 1, 1934 to November 1, 1935, there have been considered by this department 273 cases or 846 individuals. Of this number 170 cases were given relief, 57 being non-residents who had some legal settlement. 129 were new applicants and 13 were transferred to other agencies. 137 investigations and 1197 calls were made. 29 committee meetings and court hearings were attended and 11,762 miles were

traveled.

The following Amendment to Resolution No. 8 October, 1935, Session was presented:

An ordinance to amend the ordinance creating a Pension Depart-

ment published October 14, 1935.

The County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago county, Wisconsin does hereby amend the ordinance adopted at the special session of the County Board on October 9, 1935, which ordinance was published October 14, 1935 to read as follows:

The County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin does ordain that there be and there hereby is created by this ordinance a Winnebago County Pension Department under and by virtue of the laws of the State of Wisconsin for 1935.

Such department shall consist of a board of three members and as many assistants as may be required. The Pension Board shall be composed of the Overseer of Outdoor Relief, who shall serve on said Pension Board during his continuance in such office of Overseer; the County Probation Officer who likewise shall continue to serve on said Pension Board during occupancy of the probation office, and a third member designated "an investigator" to be elected by the County Board at its annual meeting and whose term of office shall be for one year. The Overseer of Outdoor Relief shall be the chairman of the Pension Board.

The County Probation Officer for Winnebago County, in addition to the duties of such office, shall have charge of the investigation and supervision of all cases of aid for dependent children. The investigator shall have charge of investigating cases pertaining to applications for old age assistance and blind pensions.

The duties of such Board shall be to administer within Winnebage County all laws of the State of Wisconsin relating to old age assistance, aid for dependent children, blind pensions and any and all similar

forms of public assistance.

It shall be the duty of this Board to hear all testimony relative to any application for pension, and to determine the amount of pension to be received by each applicant, action of the majority of the Board shall govern disposition of each case.

The Chairman of the Pension Board shall, on or before the 25th day of each month, certify a list of all persons to receive pension to the proper county authorities, together with the amount to be received by

each on the first of the next succeeding month.

It shall also be the duty of said Chairman of the Pension Board to supervise the entire personnel and operation of the said Pension Department. The Pension Board shall have the right to hire and discharge any and all employes subordinate to said board.

It is further ordained that the said Pension Board be and it is hereby authorized to employ for and on behalf of Winnebago County, Wisconsin, for the purpose of carrying out the duties of the said Pen-

sion department:

(a) One expert stenographer.

(b) Junior stenographers as required, not, however, exceeding two in number

(c) Junior investigators, whose duty it shall be to investigate any and all cases required of them by the said Pension Board, and do all other work connected with the Department as may be required of them.

not, however, exceeding two in number.

In addition to the duties herein set forth, which may be required of the employes of said Winnebago County Pension Board, or any of them, they shall be required to perform any and all duties involving the investigation of county-at-large poor charges, and also, when requested by the Overseer of Outdoor Relief, investigate cases coming under the supervision of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Relief Department, and assist and recommend action to the Soldiers' and Sailors' Relief Commission in individual cases requiring attention when requested by that Department so to do.

The Winnebago County Pension Department shall have access to and shall succeed to all the property, records and documents of the departments now operating in Winnebago County relating to aid to dependent children, blind pensions, county-at-large poor charges and

administration of old age assistance.

The moneys appropriated heretofore, for aid to dependent children, county-at-large poor charges, Blind Pensions, Old Age Assistance, and any and all other funds relative to pensions, and other forms of public assistance, controlled by the County Board, with the exception of the appropriation for Soldiers' and Sailors' Relief, are hereby appropriated for the use and disposal, according to law, of the Winnebago County Pension Board, to be used for the same purpose for which they were originally appropriated.

All laws, rules and regulations governing and appertaining to County Employes doing the same type of work as employes of the said Fension Department, shall be applicable to and govern the employees

of said department.

The number of policies now in force have been reduced from 147 to 120. The County Nurse's car is now insured with the fleet policy of the Highway Department Additional insurance has been placed on books of record in the Court House in the amount of \$64,600.00. All insurance is now written with the Underwriters Insurance Association with the exception of those policies with agents not members of the Underwriters Association and the distribution of premiums is made under direction of that Association.

At the time additional insurance was placed on books of record, your County Treasurer, with the cooperation of the other Departments of Government in the Court House, completed an inventory of Records. This survey and inventory revealed that there are many valuable records which cannot be reproduced and therefore have no insurable value. These records are of inestimable value and in the event of their loss or destruction could not be replaced from any known source of information. The amount of insurance placed covers only those records on which recovery could be made by the County if destroyed by tornado or fire

Your County Treasurer has been informed that it would be possible add coverages for Riot and Civil Commotion, explosions, aircraft and motor vehicle damage and smoke damage at a cost of \$40.02, if the

County Board so ordains.

The Public Building Committee of the County Board, Court House Custodian and the Sheriffs Department have cooperated with the Treasurer in eliminating certain fire hazards such as untidy condition in the attic, inadequate protection under heaters and installing more fire extinguishers which has resulted in a lower premium rate and caused a recent refund of \$263.95 in premiums.

# ILLEGAL ASSESSMENT COMMITTEE REPORT ON WAIVER OF INTEREST AND PENALITIES ON DELINQUENT TAXES.

The following Report No. 99 was presented: To the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin. Gentlemen:

The Illegal Assessments Committee report on Resolutions No. 6 and No. 7 relative to the cancellation of interest and penalties on delinquent

taxes, is as follows:

Your committee has during its entire deliberations, realized the grave importance and seriousness of these resolutions, to the entire We have listened to people in favor of the resolutions and have consulted with others who are not in favor of passing a resolution of this type and hereby make our recommendation, and for the reasons herein given;
It is our recommendation that we do not recommend the passage

of these resolutions. In order to make our position clear, we set forth

the following reasons for our recommendation

Passage of a resolution of this type would be extremely unfair to people who have already paid their taxes. Some of them, no doubt, have mortgages on their property or had to borrow money from some outside source in order to keep up their taxes.

In the event that the penalty and interest is allowed to be deducted.

it will be necessary for taxes to be levied to make up the deficiency

represented by the loss of the penalty and interest.

It is our belief that the passage of any resolution, of this type, will not result in any great benefit to the small property owners but will only enable those people, who are able to pay their taxes at this time, if they so desired to take advantage of this reduction. The small home owner, who owes two or three years' back taxes, in all probability, would not be able to borrow any money with which to pay up his delinquent taxes, and the intent and purpose of the passage of a resolution of this type would be therefor defeated.

It is our belief that the county will not be the loser, in the final

analysis, but that the great majority of the pieces of property that will of necessity be taken by Winnebago County, for nonpayment of taxes, will bring much more than the amount of the taxes, penalty and in-

terest.

It is our further belief that in the event any injustice is done, in an individual case, where the county has taken the property because of the nonpayment of taxes, some consideration can be shown to the former owners of the property by allowing them to repurchase said land from the county.

We further feel that the passage of a resolution of this type would have a bad effect, in general, upon the payment of taxes, by people who are able to do so, and would create a situation where everybody will not pay their taxes until just before the county is in a position to take a tax deed, hoping and continually expecting that some legislation will be passed permitting them to pay up the back taxes, without any interest or penalty, as is attempted to be done at this time.

It is our opinion that if the resolutions, as are herein considered,

were passed, it would result in great confusion to keep track of the property upon which taxes are unpaid and would necessitate the supervision of this property and probably make it necessary for the county to be continually borrowing money, on their tax certificates, and would, in general, complicate the tax situation of the entire coun-

Being assured that some governmental aid could be secured on this project, through WPA, this aid to be in the form of labor furnished by WPA to take care of such preliminary work as razing present buildings, excavation, the loading and hauling away of excess dirt, landscaping and beautification labor, and

Being further assured, that because of Winnebago County's excellent financial standing, the necessary funds could be secured by bond issue, at 2½% per annum, or less, probably as low a rate of interest as shall ever again obtain, and

WHEREAS, a previous County Board has acquired a parcel of property for the purpose of building thereon a courthouse of the type,

property for the purpose of building thereon a courthouse of the type, size and style required by Winnebago County, now therefore.

An ordinance establishing setback building lines as provided by Section 59.97 of the Statutes, in Winnebago County, Wisconsin. The County Board of Winnebago County, Wisconsin, does hereby

SECTION I-DEFINITIONS:

As used in this ordinance the following words mean—SETBACK LINES: Lines established adjacent to highways for the purpose of defining limits within which no building or structure or any part thereof shall be erected or permanently maintained. "Within" a setback line means between the setback line and the highway right of way.

SECTION II—FINDING AND DETERMINATION:

(1) a Setback Lines: That it is found and determined that public safety, welfare and convenience requires the establishment of setback safety, welfare and convenience requires the establishment of schools building lines along highways, at intersections of highways with other highways and at grade crossing intersections of highways with rall-roads within the County, outside the limits of incorporated villages and cities, as hereinafter provided. Such setback lines are hereby established, as provided by Section 59.97 of the Statutes. Unless otherwise described, such setback lines shall be parallel to the center lines with the highest respectively. of the highways, measured at a right angle to the center line of the highway, at the distances hereinafter specified for each highway at intersections of highways with highways where the grades are not separated, setback lines are hereby established across each sector between the intersecting highways. Such setback lines shall be straight lines compacting two points on the intersection highways. tween the intersecting highways. Such setback lines shall be straight lines, connecting two points on the intersecting highway setback lines which points are located fifty (50) feet distant from the intersections of the highway setback lines. At intersections of highways and railroads where the grades are not separated, the setback lines are straight lines across each sector between the intersecting highways and railroads, connecting points on the highway setback lines and the railroad right of way lines, which points are located at distances of one hundred (100) feet from the intersections of such setback lines and right of way lines respectively. and right of ways lines respectively.

b. No building, billboard, sign, or structure, except necessary highway and traffic signs, of any kind, except open fences through which there shall be clear vision, shall be hereafter constructed, erected or moved into the space within such setback lines. Except as herein

provided, no building or structure presently existing within such setback lines shall be removed hereafter in any way, or be replaced by any structure.

c. No building, billboard, sign or structure within the established setback lines, except the open fences hereinbefore mentioned, shall be altered, enlarged or added to in any way which will increase or prolong the permanency of any portion located within the established setback lines.

(2) County Line Highways: In all cases where any of the highways for which setback lines are established by this ordinance, are located on the county line, such establishments shall apply only

within this county.

SECTION III—MAP DESIGNATING HIGHWAYS: That the map and plan annexed hereto marked Highway Classification Map is hereby incorporated in, and made a part of, this ordinance for the purpose of designating and identifying the highways to which the ordinance applies, and the manner of its application. The designations shown on such map are those which are referred to in this ordinance.

SECTION IV-SETBACK LINES ESTABLISHED: For the purpose of this ordinance all highways in Winnebago County, outside of the limits of incorporated cities and villages, are divided into Class "A" highways, Class "B" highways and Class "C"

(1) Class "A" highways: For all highways marked on the map and plans as Class "A" highways, setback lines located parallel to and distant eighty-five (85) feet from the center line are hereby established The following highways are hereby designated as Class "A" Town of Wolf River—

(3) Class "C" Highways: All highways in Winnebago County not otherwise marked and classified are hereby classified as Class "C" For all Class "C" highways, setback lines located parallel to and distant fifty-five (55) feet from the center line are hereby established. SECTION V-MAP SHOWING STRUCTURES WITHIN SETBACK

LINES: (1) The County Highway Commissioner is directed to prepare a record showing all buildings, structures, and premises situated within the setback lines established by this ordinance, which record shall contain the names and addresses of the owner or owners of the said buildings, structure or premises and of any occupant other than the owner, the legal description or descriptions of the premises, the nature and extent of the use of said buildings, structures and premises and he shall indicate on a map such buildings, structures and premises and the purposes for which the same are used. Such record shall be published, corrected and filed in accordance with the provisions of the Wisconsin Statutes governing the same. It shall be the duty of the County Clerk, the town assessors and the register of deeds to make records and reports relative to such building, structures and premises in accordance with the provisions of the Wisconsin Statutes. SECTION VI—ENFORCEMENT:

(1) It shall be the duty of the County Highway Commissioner in conjunction with the District Attorney to enforce the provisions of

this ordinance.

SECTION VII—VIOLATION AND PENALTY:

No person, firm, association, or corporation shall construct, erect, alter, or move any building or structure into or within the setback lines in violation of the provisions of this ordinance. Any person, firm association, or corporation convicted of any violation of this ordinance

shall be fined not more than ten (\$10.00) dollars, and be required to remove any builling, structure or part thereof found to be in violation of this ordinance at his or its sole expense within a reasonable time or this ordinance at his or its sole expense within a reasonable time. If such person, firm, association or corporation shall fail to remove any such violating building, structure or part thereof within a reasonable time, the County Highway Commissioner shall remove, or cause to be removed, such building, structure or part thereof. The Highway Commissioner shall certify to the County Clerk the cost of such removal and the same shall be charged against the person, firm, association or corporation, and placed in the next tax roll to be collected as other County tays are collected. as other County taxes are collected. SECTION VIII-SAVING CLAUSE:

The several terms and provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed severable, and if any provision of this ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstances is held invalid, the remainder of the ordinance and the application of such provision to other persons or circumstances shall not be affected thereby

SECTION IX-EFFECTIVE DATE

# COURTHOUSE BUILDING COMMITTEE REPORT

The following Report No. 5 was presented: To the Honorable Board of Supervisors, Winnebago County, Wisconsin

Your Special Committee appointed for the building of a new Court-house and jail for Winnebago County begs leave to report that since the November session, seventeen meetings have been held at a total expenditure of \$790.68.

The problems before this committee were many and varied and decisions were necessary involving careful study, planning and deliberation so that the result ultimately would be in the best interests of

Winnebago County.

Matters pertaining to the wrecking and razing of the buildings, together with their removal, the issuing of bonds for the financing, labor requirements, the letting of contracts and the proper selection of a responsible architectural firm were thoroughly discussed with repre-

sentatives from the various interested parties.
On January 23rd, Mr Frank Sherwood representing the Unemployed Taxpayers appeared before the committee, asking that the men in this organization be given an opportunity for employment on any project the building of a new Courthouse and Jail would entail.

Interviews were granted to members of the building trades, equip-

ment firms, wrecking concerns and architects.

The Citizens committee has met constantly with the Courthouse Building Committee and have freely given their time and experience, which was of much benefit to this committee.

On January 20th the Common Council of the City of Oshkosh amended the Zoning Ordinance to include permission to build the new building in a Class A Zone.

Lewis Magnusen, City Attorney and Harvey Oleson, City Building Inspector met with the committee, outling the proper procedure for the application of a building permit, and assuring the committee that they would cooperate to the fullest extent in the granting of a permit.

The Winnebago Clearing House, representing the banks met with the committee relative to the issuing of bonds to cover the financial part of building. Their information was very valuable and their recommendations approved They suggested a serial bond issue of \$600,000 at an interest rate of not to exceed 3% stating that the actual cost of interest to the county would be approximately 1 to 1½%. The architectural firms of Lindl & Schutte, Vitzthum & Weeks, Auler, Jensen and Brown, Granger & Bollenbacher and a representative from Holabird and Root appeared before the committee giving information and in some instances sketches and floor plans of a pro-

information and in some instances sketches and floor plans of a pro-

posed building.

After the interview with Lindl & Schulte, Vitzthum & Weeks, Auler, Jensen & Brown and Mr. Long of Holabird and Root, the com-

mittee could not agree on the architect.

The Citizens Advisory Committee rendered a written report covering this angle, recommending that the architect be selected either by a Competitive plan or the employment of a non-contesting Advisory architect to meet with the committee and advise with them as to the selection of an architect.

By vote of the committee W. G. Herbst, President of the Wisconsbranch of the American Institute of Architects was requested to appear. He outlined in detail the procedure of a contest plan informing the committee members that there were two types that could be followed. An open competition whereby any architect could enter and a closed competition where a limited number of architects would be invited to compete. Both plans to furnish cash prizes and the main award to be the contract for the architectural services in building a new courthouse and iail.

After careful consideration of the competitive plan the committee voted not to enter this form of choosing an architect.

The choosing of an architect was the greatest problem of the committee. Due deliberations and careful analysis of all the evidence and information gathered was gone over and on February 10th, the committee by vote eliminated Lindl & Schutte. On February 23rd the committee selected the architectural firm of Auler, Jensen and Brown as architects and the Vitzthum Company as associate architects, with the understanding that these two firms present a contract and agreement for the consideration of the committee members. After several days of deliberation between the two architectural firms, no agreement could be reached and the committee went on record to rescind the former actions taken on both architectural firms.

On February 26th the committee voted unanimously to grant an interview to Granger & Bollenbacher of Chicago. John O. Merrill a member of the firm appeared before the committee with a history of the work done, their financial status and exhibited photographs of buildings in which they were the architects.

By unanimous vote the committee went on record to engage Granger & Bollenbacher as the architects for the building of a new Courthouse and Jail for Winnebago County at a maximum cost of \$700,000 upon the presentation of a contract approved by the committee.

On March 4th the committee authorized the chairman of the Winnebago County Board to sign the contract with Granger & Bollenbacher. The contract has since been received properly signed by the four members of the firm of Granger & Bollenbacher. In behalf of the firm Mr. John O. Merrill informed the committee that several sketches and floor plans would be presented to the committee in the near future.

The bond issue was a matter of business for several days and the committee adopted a tentative arrangement as follows.

The issuance of \$600,000 serially over a period of fifteen years.

The rate of interest to be 21/2%.

Bonds called in before due to pay a premium of 1%.

First payment to be April 15, 1938.

Amount per year to be \$50,000.

This information was submitted to the Winnebago Clearing Association and the District Attorney for suggestions and recommendations as to form.

The District Attorney gave a legal opinion on the matter of the Bond issue stating that the interest rate should be stipulated at not to exceed 3%, and that bonds be stipulated to sell at par value or above par value and that no premium rate legally can be paid for bonds called in before the maturity date.

In the matter of the razing and removal of the buildings on the site the committee advertised for bidders on both properties in The Daily Northwestern of March 7th. Bidders were allowed to bid on either building or both jointly and proposals to be in the County Clerk's office by March 23rd at 10 o'clock. Bids will be opened by the committee on

that\_date.

The contract for architectural services call for the letting of seperate contracts to bidders on general work, plumbing, Electrical work, Sewerage work Ventilating, Heating and Equipment. It is the consensus of opinion of the committee that the reason for the separation of the letting would give the committee the opportunity to award the contracts to local concerns and the employment of local labor and the purchasing of local materials as far as possible.

The committee has labored faithfully with but one view in mind and that is to secure for Winnebago County the best possible Courthouse and Jail that the appropriation allows.

# SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON DELINQUENT PROPERTY

The following Report No. 6 was presented: To the Honorable, the County Board of Supervisors, Winnebago County, Wisconsin:

Gentlemen:

Your committee appointed to investigate and take action with regard to the commission of waste on lands where taxes are delinquent, beg leave to report as follows:

We have had considerable contact with the officers and employees of the Paine Lumber Company of the City of Oshkosh, Wisconsin, and have also contacted prominent local business and professional men, in regard to the advisability of starting legal action against the said Paine Lumber Company, to prevent them from committing waste of their property, located on the west side of the City of Oshkosh, Wis-

The Paine Lumber Company, in the past, employed approximately 2,000 men in the City of Oshkosh, when operating to capacity. For a period of over 25 years this industry has been one of the largest tax-

period of over 25 years this industry has been one of the largest happayers and employers of men in this entire county.

At the present time the Paine Lumber Company has sold, for wrecking purposes, two of the buildings located on the property formerly operated by them as their woodworking plant. The saw mill, which has not been in operation for several years and is obsolete, has been sold, together with the south end of the Old Mill, which was in such a condition as to make it unsafe for manufacturing purposes.

However, this committee has been assured by the Paine Lumber Company, that it is their present intention not to raze any further buildings, with the exception of those already started, namely the Saw Mill and the south end of the old factory. It is further agreed that in the event conditions make it necessary to raze any other buildings, the Paine Lumber Company will advise this committee before proceeding.

Some time ago the president of the Paine Lumber Company, made a statement to the effect that his company was through operating in the City of Oshkosh and that in all probability their future activities and operations would be carried on at some place where the freight rates and transportation facilities are more advantageous and where their operations would be nearer the source of supply for raw materials. These statements were made at a time before the company became interested in the production and manufacture of the so-called Rezo Door.

We find, by our investigation, that the money received by the Said Paine Lumber Company, in the sale of the buildings above referred to, has been used to advertise and acquaint the trade with the qualities of the new Rezo Door,

The taxes on the Paine Lumber Company real estate are levied on units of lots. There is only one unit upon which the buildings have on units of lots. There is only one unit upon which the buildings have been wrecked, which has effected the value of the property adversely to any extent. This unit is the parcel where the old saw mill and office are located. The land upon which the old mill was located is taxed in a unit with the new mill and power house and the larger buildings, comprising the Paine Lumber Company property. The assessed valuation of this last unit is so high that the wrecking of part of the old mill should in no way decrease the value to an extent that will make it impossible for Winnebago County to realize the amount of their taxes from it.

In our contacts with the officers and employees of the Paine Lumber Company, we have learned that while they intend to sell some of the obsolete machinery, it is their present intention to keep the plant in such a condition that it can be operated as a unit, if and when business conditions warrant its operation. We have been assured by the Paine Lumber Company that their plant will not be dismantled in any way so as to affect any operating unit of the plant. The 2,000 K. W. turbine is not to be sold.

While the new Rezo Door is being manufactured outside of the City of Oshkosh, at the present time, this is being done because of the fact that it would be impractical to manufacture the door in the large plant of the Paine Lumber Company, at Oshkosh, until the sales have increased from the present.

From our investigation, it is our opinion that the value of each taxing unit of the property owned by the Paine Lumber Company, in the City of Oshkosh, Wisconsin, and upon which taxes are delinquent is more than equal to, and in most cases, far exceeds the amount of taxes now due on said property and which will become due before Winnebago County is in a position to take a tax deed We also believe, from our investigation, that it is the present intent of the Paine Lumber Company to keep their plant as an operating unit and manu-

Lumber Company to keep their plant as an operating unit and manuar facture their new door, in Oshkosh, when business conditions warrant. Under the present existing conditions, therefore, and based on our present information, we recommend that no injunctional proceedings be commenced against the Paine Lumber Company, at this time, but that a Delinquent Tax Committee be authorized, and if conditions warrant, with regard to any property, that they are to protect the interests of Winnebago County, in the future.
