

### NOVEMBER SESSION.

#### FIRST DAY.

Supervisors' Room, Oshkosh, Wis.,

Nov. 9, 1897, 10 A. M.

The County Board of Supervisors of the county of Winnebago, Wisconsin, convened in the Court House in the city of Oshkosh, in annual session, on the 9th day of November, A. D., 1897, at 10 o'clock in the foremoon, and was called to order by E. R. Hicks, the former Chairman of the Board.

The members, after severally subscribing to the oath of office, were duly sworn as such members by Hon. C. D. Cleveland, county judge.

#### ELECTION OF CHAIRMAN.

The first business coming before the board being the election of Chairman, Supervisor Tuttle placed in nomination the name of E. R. Hicks, the nomination being seconded by Supervisors Noble and Chase.

Supervisor Leupold presented the name of W. C. Kimball.

On motion, the Chair appointed as tellers, Supervisors Heffron and Grundy.

On motion by Supervisor Noble, the first ballot was made informal.

The first ballot resulted in 39 votes being cast, of which E. R. Hicks received 23, W. C. Kimball 15, blank 1.

Supervisor Kimball moved that the ballot be declared formal and that E. R. Hicks be unanimously declared elected Chairman.

The motion was carried unanimously.

Mr. Hicks expressed his thanks for the honor conferred by his election.

#### ADOPTION OF RULES.

Supervisor Kimball moved that the rules adopted by the Board at the annual session in 1896 be adopted by this Board, except that rule (3) be amended by striking therefrom the word "Jurors," and adding in place thereof the words "Sheriff and coroners accounts,"

The motion was carried.

#### RESOLUTIONS TO PAY COSTS OF SUITS AGAINST COUNTY.

By unanimous consent, Supervisor Kimball submitted the following resolution (No. 1) appropriating the sum of \$96.12, as costs in a suit by the Alexian Bros. against the county of Winnebago, restraining from sale for taxes the property of plaintiff, and to charge the same back to the city of Oshkosh:

WHEREAS, In an action entitled, "The Alexian Bros., of Oshkosh, plaintiffs, against Winnebago County and Thomas J. Baird, as Treasurer of Winnebago county, defendants," judgment was rendered against the said defendant in the sum of ninety-four dollars and seventy-two cents (\$94.72), on the 21st day of August, A. D., 1897, and,

WHEREAS, The plaintiffs are entitled to said sum and interest thereon from August 21, 1897, to November 9, 1897, amounting to ninety-six dollars and twelve cents (\$96.12),

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin.

That the sum of ninety-six dollars and twelve cents (\$96.12) be and the same is hereby , appropriated in satisfaction of said judgment aforesaid, and the proper county officials are hereby authorized and directed to draw an order for said sum payable to Hume, Oellerich & Jackson, attorneys for the said plaintiffs in said action, said order to be delivered to the said attorneys upon their filing with the clerk of the circuit court a satisfaction and release of said judgment; said satisfaction and release to be approved by the District Attorney, and that the County Treasurer charge back said amount to the city of Oshkosh.

I recommend that the above resolution pass.

Baird, as Treasurer of Winnebago County, defendant," judgment was rendered against said defendant in the sum of eighty-three dollars and twenty cents (§82.20), on the 21st day of August, A. D., 1897, and,

WERKEAS, The plaintiff is entitled to said sum and interest thereon from August 21, 1897, to November 9, 1897, amounting to eighty-four dollars and thirty cents (\$84.30),

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsiu.

That the sum of eighty-four dollars and thirty cents (\$34.30) be and the same is hereby appropriated in satisfaction of said judgment aforesaid, and the proper county officials are hereby authorized and directed to draw an order for said sum payable to Bouck & Hilton,

attorneys for the said plaintiff in said action, said order to be delivered to the said attorneys upon their filing with the clerk of the circuit court a satisfaction and release of said judgment, said satisfaction and release to be approved by the District Attorney and the County Treasurer charge back this amount to the city of Oshkosh.

The chairman called the attention of the board to several important matters which demanded their earnest consideration, among them being the enormous cost to which the county is subjected, for the support and maintenance of children committed from this county to the Industrial and Reformatory schools of the state, and urging that the effort be continued to have the laws so amended as to enable all counties to commit and maintain such children in institutions within their several counties.

The necessity of observing strict economy in transacting the business of the county, and urged the committees to expedite the business assigned them during the session by submitting their reports at as early a date as possible, as will be consistent with the thorough consideration of the matters referred to them.

The importance of carefully completing the work of regulating the compensation for services rendered by the sheriff began at a former session, etc.

Various accounts were submitted and properly referred.

#### CANCELLATION OF TAX CERTIFICATES.

Petitions were presented from L. O. Chase, Silas Bullard, M. M. Schoetz, Valentine H. May, and J. M. W. Pratt for the cancellation of tax certificates described in the petitions for the reasons set forth by the petitioners.

The petitions were referred to the committee on illegal assessment.

#### MENASHA BRIDGE.

Supervisor Verbeck submitted a petition from the supervisors of the town of Menasha asking for an appropriation of \$847.00, being one-half of the cost of constructing an iron bridge in said town across Mud Creek, said bridge having been already built and paid for by said town.

The petition was referred to the committee on roads and bridges. On motion by Supervisor Schoetz, the Board adjourned.

#### PETITION FOR REMISSION OF FINE.

Supervisor Schoetz submitted the petition of F. W. Buboltz, praying for a remission of a fine of \$14.33.

To the Honorable County Board of Winnebago County, Wisconsin.

GENTLEMEN: I hereby petition your honorable body to refund to me the sum of \$14.33, as a fine and costs imposed upon me by Thomas Sherry, justice

of the peace, on the 1st day of June, 1897, upon a charge of selling vinegar for a different quality than it really was.

Believing that while the fine was justly imposed under the existing law, I think that upon the presentation of the facts, as shown by the accompanying affidavits, your honorable body will readily see that an injustice has been done me and that you will refund to me said amount, and thereby remove from my name the stigma necessarily attached to it for a conviction of this nature.

STATE OF WISCONSIN, ss. fond Du Lac County,

Mrs. F. W. Buboltz, being first duly sworn, on oath says that on the 6th day of May, A. D. 1897, and for a number of years before she was a resident of the city of Menasha, Winnebago county, Wisconsin; that on or about the 28th day of June, A. D. 1897, she removed, with her family to Ripon, Fond du Lac county, Wisconsin, where she now resides; that on the 6th day of May, 1897, at the instance of W. W. Chadwick, Assistant Dairy and Food Commissioner of the state of Wisconsin, a warrant was issued for the arrest of F. W. Buboltz husband of deponent, on a charge of selling vinegar, represented to be cider vinegar when in fact it was not; that the said F. W. Buboltz, upon being apprised of the fact that said warrant was issued, immediately appeared before Thomas Sherry, the justice who issued the same, and paid the fine imposed, together with the costs, amounting in all to \$14.33.

Deponent further says that at the time of the issuance of said warrant the said F. W. Buboltz was the owner of a grocery store in said city of Menasha; that said F. W. Buboltz for about two years before said time and thereafter had nothing whatever to do in the conduct or management of said grocery store, but that the same was conducted solely by this deponent and her daughter, Emma, the said F. W. Buboltz during said time being, except at short intervals, upon his farm in another part of the state.

Deponent further says that the circumstances under which said vinegar was sold and which resulted in issuing said warrant for the husband of deponent was as follows:

That in said store conducted by deponent there were kept for sale two kinds of vinegar, known as "cider" vinegar and "white" vinegar; that at all times, except in the instance related, both of said kinds of vinegar were represented and sold for just what they were; that some time previous to the said 6th day of May, A. D. 1897, the said F. W. Buboltz decided to go out of business and remove his family to his said farm, and consequently was selling all of

the stock of groceries and was not replenishing same; that in said store at said time there was but a small quantity of each of said two kinds of vinegar in their respective barrels; that the quantity in the "cider" vinegar barrel was very small, there being a somewhat greater quantity of said "white" vinegar: that a hoop became broken upon the barrel containing the "white" vinegar, causing the said barrel to leak, and deponent desiring to save what remained, poured the vinegar known as "white" vinegar from the barrel so leaking into the barrel holding the small quantity of "cider" vinegar, intending to represent and sell this as "white" vinegar: that at the time deponent emptied this said "white" vinegar into the said "cider" vinegar barael the daughter, Emma, who aided deponent in the conduct of said store, was confined to her home on account of sickness and had been so confined and absent from said store for about two weeks previous to said time, and was ignorant of the fact that deponent had so emptied the "white" vinegar from the barrel so leaking into the "cider" vinegar barrel; that said Emma, daughter of deponent, had returned to said store on or about the 6th day of May, A. D. 1897, and resumed her position as clerk in said store; that on or about said day W. W. Chadwick, said Assistant Dairy and Food Commissioner, visited the said store and calling upon said Emma, asked that he be sold a certain quantity of "cider" vinegar, and the said Emma, wholly ignorant of the fact that her said mother had poured into said "cider" vinegar barrel said "white" vinegar, for the reasons heretofore stated, drew from said barrel said "white" vinegar, which she had known had always contained said "cider" vinegar, the quantity desired by said Chadwick and delivered the same to him as requested; that at the time said vinegar was being so drawn, sold and delivered to said Chadwick by said Emma, as aforesaid, deponent was busy with other customers in a distant part of the store and was unaware of what said Emma was doing, and did not discover what took place until said vinegar was delivered to said Chadwick, whom she at once informed as to the error.

Deponent further says that she had no intention of selling said "white" vinegar as "cider" vinegar, but intended to sell it for what it really was, and had the said Chadwick called upon her for the said vinegar, the error would not have occurred, but the neglecting to inform her said daughter, Emma. of her having made such change as aforesaid resulted in deponent's said daughter, Emma, mistaking said "white" vinegar for said "cider" vinegar and causing the arrest of said F. W. Buboltz.

Deponent further says that at the time said vinegar was procured by the said Chadwick the said F. W. Buboltz was not in the city of Menasha, nor had he been for some time before and after, and when he came to the said city of Menasha, it was for the purpose of appearing before the justice who had issued said warrant, the said F. W. Buboltz having learned that said warrant was issued in a letter written to him by deponent.

Emma Buboltz, being first duly sworn, on eath says that on the 25th day of May, 1897, and for a number of years before and for some time thereafter she resided in the city of Menasha. Wisconsin; that she now resides in the city of Ripon, Wisconsin, having removed thereto on or about the 6th day of May, 1897; that for a number of years she assisted her mother in the grocery store of her father. F. W. Buboltz, in said city of Menasha, acting in the capacity of clerk; that prior to, on or about the 6th day of May, 1897, deponent had been sick and confined to her home and unable to attend to her duties as clerk; that on or about said 6th day of May, 1897, she resumed her position as clerk in said store; that on said date one W. W. Chadwick, Assistant Dairy and Food Commissioner, visited said grocery store and requested deponent to sell him a certain quantity of "cider" vinegar; that thereupon deponent went to the barrel known by her to contain, at all times previous, "cider" vinegar and drew from said barrel the desired quantity and delivered same to said W. W. Chadwick; that at the time deponent was drawing and selling said vinegar the mother of deponent, Mrs. F. W. Buboltz, was busy in another part of said store and was paying no attention to what deponent was doing or had done until said vinegar was delivered to said Chadwick, when her said mother told deponent that the barrel which had before this time contained "cider" vinegar now contained "white" vinegar, and related to deponent how and why such change had been made; that at the time said vinegar was sold as aforesaid to said W. W. Chadwick, the light in the vicinity where said vinegar was situated was so dim and uncertain that deponent could not discern by the color of said vinegar what it's quality Deponent further says that she had no intention to sell said "white" vinegar for said "cider" vinegar, and as her mother had not told her until said vinegar was sold of the change made, as aforesaid, deponent supposed that the barrel which had always contained "cider" vinegar still held such vinegar or she would not have sold same under the circumstances.

F. W. Buboltz, being first duly sworn, deposes and says that he resides in Ripon, Fond du Lac county, Wisconsin; that for a number of years last past and until on or about the 15th day of June. 1897, he was the owner of a grocery store in Menasha, Wisconsin; that said store was conducted solely by his wife, assisted by his daughter, Emma; that for a number of years deponent had nothing to do in the conduct of said store, and was not in city of Menasha but operating a farm owned by him in a different part of the state; that while on and conducting his said farm and on or about the 28th day of May, A. D. 1897, deponent received a letter from his wife, stating that a warrant was issued for his arrest at the instance of W. W. Chadwick, Assistant Dairy and Food Commissioner of Wisconsin; that as soon as possible thereafter deponent came to the city of Menasha and at once appeared before Thomas Sherry, the justice who had issued said warrant, and deponent, believing that although he was not morally liable, was guilty technically of the offense charged and concluded to pay the fine and costs assessed and incurred, amounting in all to the sum of \$14.33.

Deponent further says that he was informed by his wife of the circumstances under which said vinegar was sold, and believes the same to be true; that at the time said vinegar was sold to said W. W. Chadwick the stock of deponent's said store was being sold out, preparatory to the removal of his family to Ripon to reside on the farm of deponent; that deponent has read the affidavit of his said wife, and hereto attached, and knows it to be true so far as his knowledge extends; as to the other matter therein contained believes it to be true.

Deponent further says that as soon as possible after he was informed by the issuance of the warrant against him he wrote to H. C. Adams, Dairy and Food Commissioner of Wisconsin, relating briefly the facts to him, and in reply thereto said H. C. Adams wrote to Thomas Sherry, the said justice who had issued said warrant for deponent's arrest, the letter hereto attached, marked Exhibit "A;" that this said letter was received by the said Thomas Sherry on the 4th day of June, 1897, after said deponent had paid said fine and costs; that after receiving said letter from said H. C. Adams the said Thomas Sherry informed deponent that since the fine had been paid, he was powerless to refund same to him and comply with the law, but that had the fine not been paid, he could have probably afforded him the relief desired, as he believed him to be the victim of circumstances and only technically guilty.

Supervisor Fridd moved that the annual visit of inspection of the county poor farm and asylum be made on Thursday, November 18th.

Supervisor Edwards moved as an amendment that the district attorney and county officers be invited to attend.

Supervisor Krueger moved that all persons interested in the care of the poor and insane be invited to attend.

Supervisor Krueger withdrew his amendment.

Mr. Edwards' amendment was adopted. The original motion, as amended, was carried.

#### TO ELECT COUNTY OFFICERS.

Supervisor Grundy moved that on Friday, November 19th, the Board proceed to the election of the county officers to be elected by the Board.

The motion prevailed.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE COUNTY ASYLUM AND SUPERINTENDENT OF POOR AND POOR FARM.

John T. Orchard, secretary of the Board of Trustees of the County Asylum, submitted the following report, together with the report of A. C. Austin, Superintendent of Poor and Poor Farm, as also the report of H. M. Weed. County Physician:

#### TRUSTEES' ANNUAL REPORT.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin:

We, the Board of Trustees of Winnebago County Asylum for the Chronic Insane and Poor House, do herewith submit to your honorable body our annual report, being for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 1896, and ending September 30, 1897.

It is with profound regret that we chronicle the death of our esteemed friend and member of the Board of Trustees, C. P. Northrup, who passed away the 1st of June last.

The late Mr. Northrup has served faithfully as a member of the Board of Trustees of Winneaago County for a number of years at different times and also as a member of your County Board. For several years he was found by his constituents and fellow members to be an honorable and trustworthy servant, always striving to do right by his fellow citizens.

In his death the county has lost a useful and loyal citizen and his family a worthy head.

The population of the insane asylum and poor house have both increased during the past year. At the end of last year we had 184 patients in the asylum and now we have 206; and in the poor House we have a gain of eight. In order to accommodate the additional number of insane we have fitted up a room on the third floor of the main building, with new beds for the better class of patients.

There have been furnished to inmates in the county asylum and poor house during the past year 13,378 weeks' board at an average cost of \$1.67 per capita per week.

For the past two years the crops in the garden and on the farm have been excellent, consequently we have not been obliged to buy much feed during the past year; and there has also been quite a saving in fuel during the past year, as was predicted from the result of the new boiler house, the fuel bill being over \$800 less than last year.

We have built a new root cellar this summer under the east bay of the large barn, and have also built a new wagon shed, with some minor permanent improvements, at a total cost of \$223.18, all of which is included in the total expenditures for the year.

We have audited bills and drawn orders on the county treasurer during the past year as follows:

Your trustees have charged the county of Winnebago for the past yeas follows:
Care of their own insane at \$1.50 per week, and clothing furnished at 25 cents per week

By the above figures you will observe that the profits of the institution for the past year will pay for the care and clothing of all the county's insane and poor and still leave a profit of \$1,110.35, and if it were not for the keeping of the asylum fund intact for the purpose of paying the bonds as they become due, it would not be necessary for the county to levy any taxes for the support of the asylum and poor house.

The total number of immates in the Northern Hospital for the Insane during the fiscal year ending on the 30th day of September, ultimo, for which the state has charged to Winnebago county is sixty-two, and the bill from the state for care at \$1.50 per week, and clothing furnished same, amounts to \$2,772.36. Adding this bill to the amount charged to Winnebago county by your Trustees, makes a total of \$12,986.14 to be provided for by the county for care of insine and poor, and your Trustees recommend that said amount, or so much thereof as your honorable body thinks proper, be included in the tax levy of the county.



#### COUNTY PHYSICIAN'S REPORT.

To the Honorable Board of Trustees of Winnebago County Insane Asylum:

GENTLEMEN: I have the honor to present to you my report for the portion of the year beginning January 4, 1897, and ending September 30, 1897.

The health of the inmates of the asylum during these nine months has been, to my mind, something marvelous. During this period but three inmates of the asylum have been confined to their beds. One of these, a woman, was sent to the asylum in a bed-ridden and dying condition from the effects of paralysis, and lived only about two weeks after being admitted to the institution. Another, a man, and an inmate for several years, had for many years been a sufferer from a large, open sore upon his thigh, caused from a burn. This sore became infected and death resulted fortyeight hours after my attention was called to the case. The third one of this trio was sick in bed with a slight fever for about forty-eight hours and made a complete recovery. Aside from these three cases, but two other inmates of the asylum have required the attention of a physician. speaks volumes for the cleanly and sanitary condition of the building, the purity of the water and the excellence of the food. In view of this splendid showing, the people of winnebago county can well take pride in this, their chief charitable institution. The fine showing made at this institution is due in large part to the untiring devotion of the matron and superintendent, who are certainly the right people in the right place.

The attendants, under the supervision of the superintendent, have been uniformly kind and efficient.

At the poor house the conditions, of course, are changed. This institution being filled, as it is, with diseased and aged people, can not enjoy the same immunity from sickness as is shown at the other building; but at the same time when it is kown that during the past nine months no epidemic of any kind, no fevers or serious bowel troubles have occurred, it

must be conceded that the cleanly and sanitary conditions of this building have not been entirely overlooked. No immate of the poor house has died from an acute disease. Consumption, heart disease and old age have carried off those who have passed away, the details of which will be found in the records of the superintendent.

During the year one specimen of the genus homo first saw the light of day in the poor house, and he a gentleman of color, while the mother, although having a dark skin, proved to have a whiter heart than many of her more favored sisters, for she refused to have the little one for whom she had sinned and suffered taken from her; and when able to do so, went bravely out into the world to make a home for herself and child. The almost perfect sanitary conditions existing at the asylum can not be reproduced at the poor house, because the asylum is a modern and the poor house an old structure, but it is approximated as near as soap and water can bring such a condition of things a bout. At the beginning of the year, at my suggestion, which met a ready response from the superintendent, an infirmary for men was fitted up out of w hat used to be the laundry. A large airy room on the ground floor with an outside door and separated from the main building by an enclosed hallway.

Most of the cases among the men where confinement to the bed is necessary are now placed in this room, with the result that the disagreeable and unhealthy odor which formerly greeted the olfactory nerves on entering the building is almost entirely done away with, while those who remain in the ward are able to obtain their much needed rest at night, undisturbed by the groans and complaints of the sick or dying. It furthermore causes a saving in food and labor. Were five or six person sick in five or six different parts of the building, as many different portions of food would have to be prepared and as many different parts remaining would be wasted, while with the present system the food for the sick is carried to the infirmary and there served, with the result that it can be served warmer and only one part is wasted. The saving of labor is in the same proportion.

During the year several of the worthy poor of our county have been taken from hospitals, where they belonged, and sent to the poor house in a bed-ridden condition, there to ling er for a few days or weeks and then die.

Through the force of absolute necessity, a nurse was provided for a few weeks to help us out of our dilemma.

The poor house is not a hospital, nor has it the conveniences of a hospital, and the strength of Mrs. Wiley and her one assistant, together with the spasmodic help to be obtained from the inmates, is needed to keep the building in a cleanly condition, the clothing clean and whole, prepare the food and take the proper care of those who in the nature of things become helpless after becoming immates of the building.

Now, if the institution is to be made a receptacle for bed-ridden patients, a fund ought, to my mind, be set aside for the purpose of procuring

a good nurse whenever, in the opinion of the superintendent, such a course becomes necessary.

With a good nurse (provided when necessary) added to our present armamentarium, it is difficult to see how it would be possible to better the condition of the poor unfortunates who are obliged to accept charity from a kind and indulgent public.

#### REPORT OF WORK HOUSE COMMITTEE.

Arthur Kellogg, formerly chairman of the work house committee, submitted the following annual report, showing the workings of the institution for one year:

To the Honorable the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin.

GENTLEMEN: Your committee on work house respectfully submit to you our annual report, made up from official records in the Connty Clerk's office.

Our report will show you the amount it cost Winnebago county tax-payers for justices, officers, transportation, board, turnkey, fees for tramps, drunk and disorderly and petty larceny from July 1, 1895, to July 1, 1896, being for one year previous to the establishment of the work house; also from July 1, 1896, to July 1, 1897, being for one full year of the working of the work house, and what it cost the tax-payers under the working for justices, officers, transportation, board, turnkey, fees for tramps, drunks and petty larceny.

Our report will show you the number of tramps in lock-ups at Oshkosh, Neenah, Menasha, Omro and Winneconne from July 1, 1895, to July 1, 1896, for one year previous to the establishment of the work house; also the number in the same lock-ups from July 1, 1896, to July 1, 1897, being the first year of the establishment of the work house.

There was paid out for justices, officers, transportation, board and turnkey's fees for tramps, drunks and disorderly and petty larceny from July 1, 1895 to July 1, 1896, or one year preceding the erection of the work house, \$15,399.65.

There was paid for justices' and officers' fees and transportation for tramps, drunks and disorderlies and petty larceny from July 1, 1896, to July 1, 1897, the first year the work house was in operation, \$848; superintendent's salary, \$2,550; total expense, \$3,398.08. Take this amount from the cost of previous year will show a saving to the county of \$12,001.57, or \$1,000.13 per month for the year.

You will see that over one-quarter of all committed to the work house were for drunk and disorderly. There has been committed to the work house during the last year five or six of the hardest class of criminals, such as jail breakers and burglars, and for long term of sentence, some as long as six months.

The superintendent has had to employ extra watchmen, and has had to keep all night watchmen many nights; and after using all means at his command, there has been one or two escapes that could not be found. There has been four or five other escapes, which at the superintendent's own expense have been capturned to serve out sentence.

Some few inmates have refused to work. These have been kept in the dungeon on bread and water, one as long as seven days before he would conclude to work; others for shorter time.

Ball and chain has had to be used in two or three cases. One, in particular, who wore it nearly three weeks.

There has been but very little sickness among the inmates during the last year. The county physician has been called three times.

Your committee believe that the tax-payers of Winnebago county can ,ustly feel proud of having the model work house of the state, and at the small cost of \$4,300, including the four acres of land, barns, all tools, building neatly painted and every thing in first class condition.

Your committee wish to thank the members of the Board for their support and assistance while building the work house the past year and a half; also the honorable Chairman for appointing us.

We can not suitably finish our report without saying that the largest part of the success of the work house and its successful working is due to Superintendent R. E. Abrams, who, at all times, has been ready and willing to do all in his power for the best interests of the work house and taxpayers. As to how your committee have performed the duty assigned them, we leave that for you to determine.

The Report was referred to a special committee consisting of Supervisors Durkee, Edwards and Jensen.

The Chairmen of various Committees asked an extension of time in which to make their reports. The request was granted.

On motion by Mr. Schoetz the Board adjourned.

# SEVENTH DAY.

The Board met pursuant to adjournment, Chairman Hicks presiding. On calll of roll all the members responded.

Supervisor Durkee submitted the following resolution, (No. 14).

Resolved, By the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County that the claim for the care of MaryBroderick as allowed at the session of the Board heid March 3, 1897 and reported on page 171 of the proceedings of that date be referred to committee on Poor and Poor Farm and they be requested to ascertain and report to this Board as to what municipality said account should be charged.

The resolution was on motion adopted.

### REPORT ON MENASHA BRIDGE.

Supervisor Athearn submitted the following report on the petition of the Supervisors of the town of Menasha for an appropriation for a bridge in said town described in the petition.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County Wisconsin.

GENTLEMEN:—Your Committee on Roads and Bridges to whom was referred the petition of the Board of Supervisors of the town of Menasha in said County of Winnebago and State of Wisconsin which petition represents that the said town of Menasha has been compelled to build a new bridge across Mud Creek without the consent or knowledge of the County Board, respectfully recommended that the chairman of the County Board appoint two commissioners from the towns exclusive of the town of Menasha to inspect said bridge and report to the County Board.

Your committee further recommend that the the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors of Menasha be requested to explain to your honorable body why he did not comply with the law in building said bridge?

# APPROPRIATION TO TOWN OF WOLF RIVER.

Supervisor Vogt submitted the following resolution (No. 15), for an appropriation to the town of Wolf River:

Resolved, By the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, That

WHEREAS, The estimated cost of one iron bridge in the town of Wolf River was Fourteen Hundred Dollars (\$1.400); and

WHEREAS, The bridge cost Sixteen Hundred and Fifty Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$1,650.50); and

WHEREAS, The county paid Seven Hundred Dollars (\$700) and the town of Wolf River Nine Hundred and Fifty Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$950.50), being One Hundred and Twentyfive Dollars and Twenty-five Cents more than one-half the cost of said bridge; therefore be it

Resolved, That the sum of One Hundred and Twenty-five Dollars and Twenty-five Cents (\$125.25) be and is hereby appropriated from the bridge fund of Winnebago county and paid the town of Wolf River.

On motion, the resolution was referred to the committee on roads and bridges.

# FIXING THE SALARIES OF ELECTIVE OFFICERS.

Supervisor Kimball, from the committee on bonds and salaries, submitted the following report and resolution (No. 16), fixing the salaries of the county officers to be elected by this board, and moved its adoption:

To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin.

GENTLEMEN: Your special committee on salaries and bonds beg leave to report in part as follows; that we have considered the matter of salaries for the different officers to be elected by the Board and would recommend the passage of the following resolution:

Be it resolved by the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, That thesalaries be paid monthly and the different county officers be paid as follows:

To the County Physician, \$500 per annum for all medical services in County Insane Asylum, County Poor House, County Jail and County Work House, medical services for any county poor or non-resident poor in the county, after having been determined to be such by the proper county authorities; and that said sum of \$500 be in full compensation for all medicines furnished prisoners committed to the County Jail and the County Work House and the poor not immates of the County Poor House.

County Superintendent of Poor Farm, \$800 per annum.

Matron, \$300 per annum.

Superintendent of Work House, \$2,700 per annum, this said sum to be for all washing, mending, fuel and food furnished prisoners and care and custody of all prisoners committed therein.

Secretary of the Indigent Soldiers' Commission, \$30 per annum.

Janitor of the Court House, \$600 per annum.

Purchasing Agent, \$100 per annum.

Supervisor Harrington moved that that portion of the report pertaining to furnishing medicines be stricken out. An animated discussion of the amendment followed, participated in by Supervisors Schoetz, Kimball, Noble, Chase and Harrington.

The amendment was lost.

The report as to the salary of County Physician was accepted.

# SUPERINTENDENT OF POOR FARM.

The report of the committee, fixing the salary of Superintendent of Poor and Poor Farm at \$800 per annum, was adopted.

### SUPERINTENDENT OF WORK HOUSE.

Supervisor Lampert moved that the fixing of the salary of the Superintendent of Work House be postponed to November 17, at 10 A. M.

The motion was lost.

On motion, the report of the committee, fixing the salary of the Superintendent of Work House at \$2,700 per annum, was adopted.

# JANITOR OF COURT HOUSE.

On motion, the report of the committee, fixing the salary of Janitor of the Court House at \$600 per annum, was correct.

# PURCHASING AGENT.

Supervisor Schoetz moved to amend the report of the committee, fixing the salary of the Purchasing Agent at \$100 per annum, by making the salary \$150 per annum.

The amendment was lost.

Supervisor Schoetz moved to amend the report by fixing the salary at 125 per annum.

The amendment was lost.

On motion, the report of the committee, fixing the salary of Purchasing Agent at \$100 per annum, was adopted.

Supervisor Chase moved to adopt the report of the committee as a whole.

The motion was carried and the report of the committee was adopted.

O. E. Pederson, County Superintendent of Schools, submitted his following annual report:

### ANNUAL REPORT OF SUPERINTENDANT OF SCHOOLS.

# To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

I again have the pleasure of assuring you that the common schools of this county are progressing as well as the limited circumstances will permit. The heroic efforts of the common school teachers against the obstacles which they have to overcome has no parellel among other institutions of learning. Their limited means, their small salary and the apparent lack of public interest are agences that will discourage the bravest, unless backed by a loyalty that knows no defeat. I commend these teachers to your kind consideration, with the assurance, that as workers in the vineyard of intelligence and good citizenship, they have been faithful and earnest to an extent that far exceeds the value received for their wages.

### EXAMINATIONS.

Eight meetings for examination of teachers have been held at the usual places. Since the "institute fee" law has been in operation, applicants for certificates have diminished to such an extent that now only those that expect to teach write for a certificate. There are 110 schools in this county, employing 123 teachers. Of the 123 persons teaching, 11 are graduates of the Normal school or hold state certificates, 5 hold first-grade certificates, 17 hold second grade certificates; the remainder, 90, hold third-grade certificates. 85% of those holding third-grade certificates are either graduates of high schools or have attended for several terms a normal school. The number of persons examined during the past year are 176. A certified copy of the amount of fees collected, money expended for institutes, and the amount on hand, has been filed with the county clerk.

# LIBRARIES.

The township library system has now become firmly established in every town in the county. While there has been considerable opposition to this law in some towns of the county, the feeling is gradually dying away and people are slowly becoming reconciled to one of the best laws that has ever been enacted for the benefit of the common schools. The books selected for these libraries are of the best in the land. They contain the best literature and the most interesting scenes in the history of our country. I have been told by a competent authority that Wisconsin has the best library law of any state in this country.

### INSTITUTES.

The regular annual institute was held last spring at Winneconne with an attendance of 110 teachers. It was a grand meeting, with plenty of enthusiasm and earnestness. Prof. Hewett, of this city, and Prin. Smith, of Kilbourn City, were the institute conductors. They worked hard and gave the teachers the benefit of their valuable experience and knowledge to the best of their ability. The usual one-day institutes have also been held, with splendid results throughout the whole county.

# MANUAL.

Special effort has been made during the last year to have the schools better graded and closer adherence to the Manual or course of study, as it is prepared by the state superintendent. The Manual is a very valuable guide for teachers in the district schools. It has been prepared especially for that purpose, and should be followed so far as it is possible and consistent. I am pleased to state that a decided improvement has taken place, with reference to the use of the Manual. Last spring before the annual meeting I urged through the school journal, which I publish for the exclusive benefit of the schools in this county, the teachers and school boards to make an effort to have the school furniture and apparatus improved, and especially the blackboards and maps. It has been a custom in the past for school boards to stock up with several expensive charts

and a high priced globe and at the same time neglect to supply the school with the necessary blackboards and maps. Several years ago a schoolsupply agent went through this country selling a chart for \$20 that cost only \$5. Seventy-five per cent of the school boards bought this chart. There was \$1,500 expended of which the agent received \$1,100 in profits. Not a few schools have purchased globes from these agents paying as high as \$40 and \$45 a globe, when they were actually not worth \$10 apiece. The same is true of text books. Two years ago an agent for one of the book companies canvassed this county; he offered to exchange his new books for their old books without any charge for the exchange. agent even went so far, in some cases, as to pay the freight on both the new and the old books. The school boards naturally thought that was a very flattering offer, and not a few of them bit, or rather got bit. first place the books were twenty-five years behind the present improved text-books Of all the impositions played on the schools, this is the most detrimental, because the modern text-books are such an improvement over the old that no school can afford to be without them, especially when a change of text-books is made. The first thing the book company wanted was to have the clerk send in the old books; after this was done the book companies insisted on the exchange price, declaring that the agent had no right to make any such contracts. Just about this time it was necessary for the schools to begin, the book company had the old books, the school boards had nothing except the prospect of having considerable trouble. Most of the school boards immediately forwarded exchange price rather than have any further trouble. Finally the books came, minus the geographies. The fact is this company had no geographies, but they were about to have one published. Two months afterward the geographies came, this was the only modern text-book of the whole lot. However, it furnished a considerable consolation to the teachers to have an improved text-book in geography, even though they had to wait two months for it. No candid person will for one moment question the motives of school boards in making these unwise and unnecessary purchases for the schools. It is the want and knowledge of judgment as to the actual needs of the school, that these mistakes are made. A globe worth fifty cents will answer for all practical purposes in a district school. A chart is a luxury which a school can well get along without until it has all the necessities needed for the proper maintenance of a school. A change of text-books should not be made before consulting with some competant person in such matters. It is, therefor, very gratifying to be able to report that through the assistance of the school journal I have been able to direct and guide school boards aright on these very important matters during the last year. Not a single change in text-books has been made this year without first consulting with me. The result is, the schools have got the best books in the market and have not had any trouble whatever with the book companies. The same is true of other school apparatus. I do not know of a school that has purchased an expensive chart or globe this year; on the

other hand, most every school has made some improvement in their school furniture by putting in new blackboards, seats, teachers' desks, book cases, maps, etc. Every school should have plenty of good blackboards. Go into the village and city schools and you will find that every room has its four walls covered the whole distance around with blackboards. I have mentioned the above facts to show you that when school boards are properly counseled they will make such purchases and perform such duties as will conduce to the best interest of the school. The school journal has been of great assistance to me in this matter. Not a few school clerks have told me that the journal had helped them in performing their duties and that it increased their interest in the progress of schools. If you, gentlemen, should see fit to make a small appropriation for a larger distribution and maintenance of this journal, I assure you it will be wisely expended and will be gratefully received by me.

# SALARY OF TEACHERS.

In no line has there been such a marked change as in the reduction of teachers' salaries. It is safe to state that there has been an average reduction of 15 per cent. in the teachers' salaries during the last two years. Several School Clerks have justified themselves to me in reducing the teachers' wages, because the city of Oshkosh did so; others have told me that because the farmers were suffering hard times the teachers should also be willing to suffer some by having their wages reduced. In the first place. the cases of Oshkosh and the county are not parallel. The city finances and those of the several towns are entirely different; furthermore, the teachers in the county have never received as high wages as they ought to have, while those in the city, from what I have been able to learn, had received fair wages. There are a few schools in the county that pay as high as \$40 per month, but there are a great many more that pay less than \$20 a month. The wages paid in the different schools ran from \$18 to The average wages paid, however, are less at 11 - \$25 a Now, in making due allowance for the hard times, the small schools and weak financial support from the state, still there is a limit for which a person should consent to teach. To my mind, the person that does not value his services as a teacher at more than \$18 a month is hardly a fit person to entrust with the responsible care of governing and teaching a school. But there are reasons for these conditions, which I shall endeavor In the first place, you can not hire a cheap teacher to make clear to you. without invariably getting cheap work, and this is the most expensive kind of a school you can possibly run. I can see no good reason why one teacher offering his full time and services should not receive approximately the same wages that the teacher in the next district is receiving, who is doing the same grade of work, even though he has more pupils than the first teacher has. I know of a school in this county that had a daily attendance of only three pupils for six consecutive weeks. The natural thing for a

School Board to do under such circumstances is to reduce the salary, because the school is so small. This, in my opinion, is a wrong solution for the difficulty. Instead of reducing the teachers' salary, the school should be abolished or rather consolidated with the adjoining districts. The next . difficulty that arises is the long distance which the pupils of the district which has been abolished must travel in order to get to the adjoining district. But this can be easily obviated by having the District Board provide a means of conveyance whereby the children can be taken to the nearest school house. It is far better to have one good school than to have two poor schools. It is far better to have a child attend a four months' school under a good teacher than an eight months' school under a poor teacher. How is it that when I visit these large schools that pay their teachers a respectable salary, as a rule I find that the school is progressing nicely-the children are industrious, orderly and obedient-but when I visit these small schools, with underpaid teachers, there is a lethargy and indifference about the school that shows plainly that the right kind of work is not being done. It is not natural for a person laboring the same length of time, doing the same quality and quantity of work, for \$18 a month, should feel with as much earnestness and as great a responsibility as a person receiving \$36 a month, doing exactly the same work. This diversity of wages paid is largely the result of our district school system. Without doubt, when this system was first inaugurated, it best suited the conditions it was intended for; but under present conditions it does seem to be the most cruel and unjust system that could possibly be devised by man. It is a recognized principle that every citizen of the state should contribute his share, in proportion to the value of his property, for the benefit of our common school system. Then why, in the name of justice, should one man pay an annual tax of \$7 while his neighbor pays \$49, under exactly like circumstances and conditions? Why should one district raise only \$27.10, while a district in the next town must raise \$250 under like conditions and secumstances? The township system, if adopted, would obviate new wery obstacle I have mentioned under the district system. Instead or one man paying a school tax seven times greater than his neighbors, the town could, at its annual meeting, vote an appropriation sufficient to support the schools of the town, and each man would then be paying an equal share for the support of the schools. Then school districts that are too poor to be maintained could be consolidated with the adjoining districts, means of transportation could be provided for those who have too long a distance to walk, then everybody would be the gainer and no one the loser. Then teachers' wages could be placed on a basis of equal-. ity; then teachers could be hired on their merits for the school year instead of as now by the term or until they can better their condition by getting higher wages in some other district. I say, all these things would result from the township system. When the people once realize the benefits that will accrue from this change, they will undoubtedly demand the adoption of this system.

### THE STATE AND ITS DUTIES.

I have discussed at some length the demerits of our common school system and suggested some remedies with the hopes of arousing in your mind a stronger interest in the welfare of our schools. We can not expect to get perfection out of chaos in a week, month or year. school system is distinctively an American production. It is only about a hundred years old. Still it is the most established piece of machinery we have in our government. We often hear it said that "It is the duty of the state to educate the child". This seems to be a correct principle. A short time since I had an occasion to study the common school system of other states, and comparing them with Wisconsin's school system I naturally compared those of Michigan, Illinois, Minnesota and other neighboring states, thinking I would find their school system much the same as ours: but I was very much disappointed. In order that you may know what Wisconsin is doing for its common schools I will make just one comparison. I found that the State of Minnesota pays \$7 for every child of school age, while the State of Wisconsin pays only \$2 for every child of school age. In other words, the State of Minnesota pays three and one-half times as much for education of every child in the common schools as does the State of Wisconsin. But this is not all. I find that the comparison becomes still more interesting in higher education. The State of Minnesota pays \$88.80 for the education of each student in its university, while the State of Wisconsin pays \$259 for the education of each student in its state uni-Or rather, the State of Wisconsin pays more than three times as much as the State of Minnesota for the education of each student in its One thing is certain, that Wisconsin puts a much higher value upon the education of a few students at the university than it does upon the large mass of children in the common schools. It is equally true that the State of Minnesota places a much higher value on the education of the large mass of children in the common schools than it does upon a few students at its state university. But why is it thus? should the state of Minnesota pay \$12 for every student in the university to \$1 for each child in the common schools, while the state of Wisconsin pays \$130 for each student in the university to every \$1 for each child in the common schools! Wisconsin may well blush for its ruthless negligence toward the common schools. In its financial support toward these schools it stands way at the rear of its sister states. The tendency of the times, at least in Wisconsin, is to make our educational system top heavy. The system is out of harmony. We are neglecting the foundation of the edifice and spending useless time and money on the top, which has a very questionable right as a state institution.

Last June the leader of higher education in this state made the following astounding assertions:

"We have rested upon the shallow and sophistical doctrine that the hope and security of the country is in the common schools," This is, in-

deed, a strange doctrine to promulgate to American citizens, whose theory has been, since the inception of our school system, that the safety and security of our government depended upon the average intelligence of its citizens. It may seem strange that foreign educators, such men as Superintendent Skinner, of New York, and Superintendent Lane, of Chicago. should declare in the National Teachers' Association in Milwaukee, last July, that such utterances against the common schools were dangerous. and in substance stated that the man who decried or belittled the importance of our common school system was a public enemy. I say it seems strange that such men as Superintendent Skinner and Superintendent Lane should have to warn us of such utterances and during all this time not one word of protest from our own state officers. Well may Wiscoasin ask where are the friends of the common schools, when those holding high public places, having taken an oath to protect them, fail to come to their rescue when they are assailed.

# PRODUCT OF COMMON SCHOOLS.

The brightest pages of American history have been contributed by men who were either wholly self taught or received their school training in the common schools. The two greatest of all our presidents-Washington and Lincoln-never entered a higher institution of learning, for one was trained in the common schools and the other taught himself. Of our twenty-four presidents, only eleven were college graduates, and not one of these eleven served a second term. The greatest editors and the most powerful preachers this country ever produced never entered a college. out the history made in the United States by men and women who never attended a higher institution of learning, and the loss would be irrepara-That man, or body of men, however exalted or established in their own convictions, who have only contempt and hatred for the American common school, even at its feeblest beginnings, or fancy that the mighty current of popular education can be fenced within the levees or diverted into the reservoirs of any system less comprehensive than the present, reckon without their host.

### PRIDE OF THE MASSES.

Here, as everywhere in American affairs, the final verdict of 70,000,000 of people is better than the most scientific of any clique in church, university or partisan civic policy. And the one thing the people of the United States will not do until a permanent majority concludes to adopt a different form of government, will be to intrust to any class, however well informed or apparently impartial, that absolute authority over popular educational affairs so attractive to a growing class of scholarly men in our own and every land.

Had I the gift of genius,

The gift of a glowing pen,
I would lift the somber curtain
From the common life of men,

And show behind it sitting Divinities in disguise; In the seeming ordinary, Blessings from highest skies. I'd paint a picture of beauty, Commending to everyone That happiness lies in the duty That stretches from sun to sun; That the highest heaven of wisdom Is alike near unto us all, And each of native methods Must find it, if found at all, But, being without these graces, I can only fling the fire Of my earnest and strong convictions In the effort to lift aims higher.

Supervisor Schaetz moved that the report be accepted and published with the proceedings of the Board.

Supervisor Krueger moved to amend by also printing for distribution 400 copies of the report. The amendment was accepted by Mr. Schoetz.

After a discussion the amendment was withdrawn.

The motion to accept the report was carried. When on motion by Supervisor Noble the Board adjourned.

WHEREAS, The Chairman of this Board, by resolutions Nos. 38 and 39, passed at the last November session of this Board, dated November 28, 1896, and printed on page 107 of County Board proceedings for that year, was instructed and empowered to remove from the Good Shepherd's Industrial school and from the Boys' Home Industrial school and from the Wisconsin Industrial School for Girls several children named in the above mentioned resolutions; therefore, be it

Resolved, By the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, That the Chairman of this Board be and is hereby instructed and authorized to carry out the wishes of the Board, as expressed in the above mentioned resolutions, by demanding the children mentioned in said resolutions from the above mentioned institutions; and be it further

Resolved, That he be authorized and instructed to place as many children as possible permanently with the Children's Home Society of Wisconsin at a cost not to exceed \$45.00 for each child.

## REPORT OF THE INDIGENT SOLDIERS COMMISSION.

Supervisor Schoetz moved that the rules be suspended and that the report of the Indigent Soldiers Relief Commission be received. The rules being suspended, Thomas S. Allen, Chairman of the Commission, then submitted the following report:

To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County.

GENTLEMEN: We have the honor to submit our annual statement of the Indigent Soldiers Commission for the current year ending the 1st day of December. The accompanying report of our Secretary in detail is so complete as to relieve us of the necessity of repetition or explanation:

The total number of applicants for aid who received assistance is 102, as against 107 for the previous year, many of them temporary. Their average amounts to \$29 each. The greatest amount to each, outside of temporary cases, is about \$45.

The total amount allowed and for orders on the county treasurer from December 1, 1896, to December 1, 1897, was \$2,974.60, the amount for the previous year being \$3,341.51, showing a reduction of \$366.91. This leaves a balance to be drawn against of \$617.40. From this the December payment is to be deducted, leaving some \$300 to be carried forward. It is our opinion that with this balance to start with we shall need \$3,000 for the coming year, which, it is expected, will meet the demands of the law and do justice to the old veterans, their widows and families. We have never overdrawn the fund, and it is hardly necessary to say we have no wish or intention to do so.

The basis upon which we have heretofore acted is an allowance of an average of \$4 per month, or \$48 per year. The average has usually been considerably less.

We have thus befriended 102, rendering assistance to some 300 or more individuals belonging to families.

Milwaukee. with its large census, appropriates \$18,000; Sheboygan allowed last year \$2,342, but asks an increase to \$2,700. Winnebaeo connty, from all accounts, has not been surpassed in liberality by any county in the state. We, as individuals, having good reason to be thankful to the County Board for its generosity, and in the name of old comrades and their families, do hereby tender thanks.

We are confident this grand old country will never allow those who went to the front in support of the union to suffer for want of food, clothing or shelter.

#### REPORT ON MENASHA BRIDGE.

Supervisor Athearn, from the committee on Roads and Bridges, submitted the following report on the report of the special committee on the petition of the Board of Supervisors of the town of Menasha, asking for an appropriation for a bridge across Mud creek, in said town.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin.

GENTLEMEN: Your committee on Roads and Bridges, to whom was referred the petition of the Board of Supervisors of the town of Menasha, in the said county of Winnebago and state of Wisconsin, which petition represents that the said town of Menasha has built a bridge across Mud creek, in said town of Menasha and that the oost of said bridge was Sixteen Hundred and Ninety-four Dollars (\$1,694.00).

Your committee would respectfully report that, in their opinion, the said town of Menasha has paid more for the erection of said bridge than should have been paid, and that items are included in the itemized account of the building of said bridge that the county should not assist in paying.

Therefore your committee would respectfully recommend that the sum of Fve Hundred Dollars (\$500) be appropriated and paid to the said town of Menasha for the full payment of all claims of the said town in connection with the building of said bridge; and that the Clerk of this Board be instructed to apportion according to law the taxes for this appropriation to the following towns, to-wit: Algoma, Black Wolf, Wolf River, Winchester, Clayton, Menasha, Neenah, Vinland, Winneconne, Winneconne village, Poygan, Omro, Omro village, Rushford, Oshkosh, Nekimi, Nepeuskun and Utica.

OPINION OF DISTRICT ATTORNEY ON COMMITMENT OF INSANE.

To the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County.

Chapter 202, 1881, section 6 (section 5,930, paragraph 6) provides: "From and after the time this act shall take effect, no physically infirm or mentally imbecile person, not deemed to be dangerous when at large, shall be committed as an insane person to any hospital asylum for the insane, solely because of such infirmity or imbecility."

This gives authority to commit an imbecile, when dangerous, to an insane asylum. If not dangerous, he shall not be committed as insane nor be retained there as such.

On the other hand, he may be committed to the Poor House, if the facts warrant, as a pauper.

Then the question whether the county or some town is liable, depends upon the fact whether the person is retained in the asylum because he is "deemed to be dangerous when at large" or because he is a pauper. If he is retained because he is a pauper and he is not dangerous when at large, then he must be charged to the town of which he is a resident when he is committee. Each case must be determined upon its own individual merits, as to whether the idiot or imbecile is dangerous when at large or is simply a pauper.



MINORITY REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SHERIFF'S AND CORONER'S ACCOUNTS.

The committee further submitted the following minority report on sundry bills and accounts referred to the committee on Sheriff's and Coroner's Accounts, as follows:

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County.

GENTLEMEN: The undersigned, members of the committee on Sheriff's and Coroner's Accounts, beg leave to report that we are unable to concur in the report of said committee relating to the general account of the sheriff, as presented to this Board, and as acted upon by a majority of said committee.

The committee, however, is unanimous in its action upon all of said report, excepting the following items. fourteen (14) in number, found in said account and allowed by your committee and amounting to \$1,846.90, to-wit:

We should not feel that we had performed our whole duty to the taxpayers, as members of said committee, by merely declining to sign the majority report; but think the amount involved in the present bill of the Sheriff, as well as future claims in like cases, justifies us in presenting in writing a statement of our objections to the allowance of the same by this Board.

All of the above items are charges for mileage in traveling by the Sheriff in pursuit of accused persons who escaped from such pursuit or evaded arrest. Chapter 117, laws of 1880, contains the following provision:

"Provided, that in no criminal action, proceeding or examination, before any court or officer, when the defendant escapes pursuit, shall any fees be recovered from the county by any constable or sheriff, except when such escape is without fault, connivance or negligence of such constable or sheriff and the District attorney shall certify such pursuit was necessary and proper, and then only such sum or sums as the County Board may, in its discretion, allow as a fair compensation for the time and necessary expenses incurred in such pursuit." See section 680, S. & B. Annotated Statutes.

This provision, we think, means that where the offender against whom a warrant is issued evades the officer and so escapes pursuit, the County Board is barred from allowing, and the officer from recovering, any fees for such pursuit, unless the District Attorney shall first certify that such pursuit was necessary and proper; assuming the Sheriff to be without fault.

In the cases represented by the first six items above the District Attorney refuses to give the necessary certificate, on the ground that he has no knowledge whatever concerning those cases. Hence said six items, amounting to \$614.40, should be disallowed and we believe this Board has no other discretion.

In the cases represented by the remaining eight items we understand that the District Attorney either caused the warrants to be issued or was cognizant of their issue, and is ready to certify that the pursuit was necessary. Whether he will certify that the pursuit was proper in point of speed and distance traveled, we are not informed. Hence, upon the filing of such certificate, a reasonable compensation should be allowed the Sheriff for his time and expenses. We think Five Hundred Dollars (\$500) would be ample allowance.

We are aware that the District Attorney has placed a different construction upon the statute; but he has not informed us that it has ever been passed upon by the courts. And while we have the utmost confidance in the legal ability and unquestioned integrity of the District Attorney, yet every lawyer is sometimes mistaken, and in this instance we must differ from his construction of the statute. We are sustained in our construction by the opinion of many good lawyers. We have the assurance, however, of the District Attorney that if the Board should wish to do so, he is ready and willing to test the question in court. In view of the amount involved, we think it the part of wisdom to secure the construction of the courts upon the statute; and therefore recommend the disallowance of the above items as indicated herein. All of which is respectfully submitted.

### LIGHTING COURT HOUSE.

Supervisor Nash, from the committee on Public Buildings, submitted the following report, which, on motion by Supervisor Noble, was accepted:

To the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County.

GENTLEMEN: Your committee on Public Buildings, to whom was referred resolution No. 13, introduced by Supervisor Chase, directing said committee to investigate the gas bills, with a view of lessening the same or providing for lighting the Court House by other less expensive means, beg leave to report as follows: That they have examined the pipes about the building, had the meter tested and found no defect in them, and have come to the conclusion that the amount of gas was used that the bills call for; but in what part of the building we are not in a position to say until further investigation. And report further as follows:

That we have examined and seen tested the Ransom Automatic New Process Gas Machine. The company offers to put in a seventy-five-light machine, all complete, for Four Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$450), which is operated by gasoline and water.

Also the Eagle Automatic Acetyelene Generator, operated by carbite and water, which the company offers to put in a seventy-five-light machine, all complete, for Five Hundred Dollars (\$500,) or put in a machine and run it for a year for Seven Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$750.) After the expiration of one year, if the county is not satisfied, they will remove the machine at an expense of not to exceed Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$250) for operating the same; if satisfactory, the county to own the same in payment of Seven Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$750,) for which they agree to give a satisfactory bond in fulfillment of the agreement.

After being favorably impressed with the last named machine, the Eagle Automatic Acetyle Generator, we submit it for consideration without recommendation.

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ILLEGAL ASSESSMENTS.

Supervisor Hough, from the committee on illegal assessments, submitted its following report on the petitions referred to them:

To the Honorable, the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County.

Wisconsin.

GENTLEMEN: Your committee on Illegal Assessments beg leave to report that they have examined and considered the several petitions and matters referred to them and report and recommend as follows:

First. Your committee have had under consideration the petition of Si-las Bullard for cancellation of tax certificate No. 485, issued by the County Treasurer on the sale of delinquent lands, May 21, 1895. E. ½ of 10t 18, S. of the right of way of the Milwaukee & Northern Railroad, 10t 18, block 55. Fourth Ward, city of Menusha. Petitioner claiming said certificate to be illegal for the reason that said property was doubly assessed for the year 1894 and the taxes were paid by one John Gallner. Previous to the sale of the County Treasurer, your committee being satisfied that this claim is true and the property intended to be assessed was the W. ½ instead of the E. ½, your committee therefore recommended the cancellation of said certificate and the owner to be paid the sum paid for said certificate and the interest thereon upon surrendering said certificate for cancellation as follows, to-wit: certificate No. 485; face, \$5.54; interest, 96 cents; total, \$6.50—and when so paid, to be charged back to the city of Menasha.

Your committee further report that they have considered the petition of M. M. Schoetz for the cancellation of tax certificate No. 723, sale of 1894, the W. 1/4 of lot 20 S. of the old plank road, except the E. 16 feet and the right of way of the Milwaukee & Northern Railroad, subdivision of lot 11, block 55, Fourth ward, city of Menasha, said petitioner claiming said cer-

tificate to be illegal for the reason that the description is indefinite. Your committee finding that the land intended to be sold under this certificate is not a part of the subdivision of lot 11 of block 55. The correct description is as follows, to-wit: All that portion of the W. ½ of lot 20 of block 55, city of Menasha, which lies on the south side of the plank road, so called, or highway which runs southwesterly or northwesterly across said lot, excepting and reserving therefrom the E. 16 feet thereof. Your committee finding the above description indefinite, would recommend that said certificate be cancelled and the owner be paid the sum paid for said certificate and the interest thereon, upon surrendering said certificate for cancellation, as follows: Certificate No. 723; face, \$1.30; interest, \$.32; total, \$1.62—and when so paid, to be charged back to the city of Menasha.

Your committee further report that they have had under consideration five petitions of J. W. M. Pratt, numbered as follows, Petitions No. 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6, for the cancellation of certain tax certificates covered partly or wholly by railroad land. As there is a question of law to determine on these matters and your District Attorney not having had time to look this matter up at this session, your committee would recommend that further action on this matter be deferred until the March session.

Your committee have also had under consideration the petition of L. O. Chase for the cancellation of tax certificate No. 101, sale of 1894. This certificate is also covered by railroad land; and at the request of the District Attorney, your committee would recommend that further consideration of this matter be deferred until the March, 1898, session.

Your committee would further report that they have considered the petition of Aug. Klemhans for the cancellation of tax certificate No. 363, sale of 1895, and No. 259, sale of 1896. No. 259, sale of 1896. E. F. Wickert's sub-division of lots 3, 4, 5, 6, 16, 17, 18 and E. 25 feet of 7 and 14, block 1 of Bassett's second addition to Jones' plat of the Island, Third ward, lot 2, block 1, city of Neenah. No. 363, sale of 1895, lot 2, block 1, of Bassett's second addition to Jones' plat of the Island, Third ward, city of Neenah. Said property having been declared exempt from taxation, your committee would recommend the cancellation of said certificates and the owner be paid the sun paid for said certificates, with 7 per cent. interest, upon surrendering said certificates for cancellation, as follows: Certificate 363, sale of 1895, face, \$23.57; interest; \$4.12; total, \$27.69; certificate No. 259, sale of 1896, face, \$23.60; interest, \$2.47; total, \$26 07; grand total, \$53.76—and when so paid, to be charged back to the city of Neenah.

Your committee further report that they have had under consideration the statement of T. J. Baird, County Treasurer, of lots and tracts of land withheld from sale and to be charged back, as prescribed by section 1,135 of the Revised Statutes, for the reason that the description of the parcels of land therein given are indefinite and insufficient. After examining said descriptions, we concur in the opinion of said Treasurer that the descriptions are too indefinite to be sold. We therefore recommend that the

We find that the town of Omro is now liable for all defects in said bridge, and we understand that the town of Omro has been obliged to pay out more or less at different times to keep said piers in safe condition. For the above reasons your committee would recommend that the prayer of the petitioner be not granted.

# EEPORT OF WORK HOUSE COMMITTEE.

Supervisor Chase, from the committee on Work House, submitted the following report on commitments to the Work House since the last report and comparing the number with former periods:

To the Honorable, the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin,

GENTLEMEN: Your Work House committee beg leave to submit their report, showing substantial progress on the direct line of solving the tramp problem, and in so doing we take pleasure in saying that we believe all doubts and misgivings heretofore entertained by some as to the practical result of a county work house no longer have any "visible means of support." as applied to this county.

Basing our conclusions on the experience of the past, fully measured, sustained and exemplified by facts and figures, we have no hesitation in saying that the Work House is no longer an experiment but a successful consummation, a substantial and economical blessing to the tax-payers of Winnebago County.

These facts and figures, as was fully shown in detail in our last annual report, make a direct saving of over \$12,000 for the twelve months ending June 30, 1897, being the first full year of the occupancy of the Work House, compared with the corresponding twelve months just prior thereto. The indirect saving during the same period can not be definitely shown, as from the time the Work House was first occupied until the present time the army of able bodied tramps, which up to that time had been rapidly increasing, has since then been as rapidly decreasing. They are no longer besieging and hovering like hungry vultures in and around the County Jail, to be fed and supported by the tax-payers at an expense each of \$3.25 per week, besides the large additional expense for arrest and detention. They are doubtless seeking greater ease amid "fairer fields and pastures green," where no Work House superintendent exacts from them each day ten hours' labor pounding stone.

As a proof of the foregoing, we herewith submit comparative statements from official records, showing the number of persons in "lock-up" during the last year prior to the establishment of the Work House and also during the first year of its occupation, to-wit:

From July 1, 1895, to July 1, 1896, 6,199.

From July 1, 1896, to July 1, 1897, 824.

While these figures show a very large percentage of decrease, as applied to tramps, it is much less as applied to drunks. This is easily accounted for by the fact that professional tramps do not repeat their visits to the stone pile, while drunks from choice, or rather lack of choice, being old offenders with not sufficient nerve to refrain from drink, are compelled to do so, some of them many times during the year.

GENTLEMEN: Your Chairman, with the Committee on Public Buildings, who were requested and instructed by resolution, November 24, 1897, introduced by A. H. F. Krueger, to investigate, and if they deem advisable, to place the new carbide gas light in the Court House, beg leave to report as follows:

That after receiving the proposition of William Faber & Co. for carbide gas light, we also received propositions from the following: McCabe & Co., for a Ramson Automatic Gas Machine; the Oshkosh Electric Light and Power Company, to light with electricity; and the Oshkosh Gas Light Company, for lighting with gas.

Your committee, after careful investigation, deemed it advisable to enter into a contract with the Oshkosh Gas Company, which is as follows: "You have at present thirteen Welsbach burners, and if you will allow us to place sixty additional incandescent lamps at a cost not to exceed \$30, we will guarantee that your average monthly bill will not exceed the sum of Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25), and will enter into a contract to that effect for two years.

We further agree if during the contract period herein named the price of gas should be reduced to a lower figure than named to consumers for similar consumption, then and in that case the lower and better price shall apply to the contract.

We further agree that in case of a new Court House being erected or a residence for the Sheriff being built prior to the expiration of any period for which this contract may be made, these prices shall apply to the new buildings as well.

Bills payable monthly on or before the 5th day of each month.

# BONDED INDEBTEDNESS OF THE COUNTY.

Supervisor Schoetz, from the Finance Committee, further reported as follows on the bonded indebtedness of the county:

To the Honorable, The County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin:

GENTLEMEN: Your Finance Committee, to whom was referred the resolution by Supervisor Potter, directing your Finance Committee to make a report of Winnebago County's indebtedness, respectfully report as follows, to-wit:

That on the 27th day of June, A. D. 1893, Hon. C. W. Davis, then Chairman of the County Board of Supervisors, and J. P. Rasmusen, then Clerk of this Board of Supervisors, made and executed fifteen (15) certificates of indebtedness to the Commissioners of the Public Lands of the State of Wisconsin, in the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000) each, amounting to the sum of Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$60,000), with interest thereon at the rate of 4½ per cent. per annum, said loan to be payable within twenty years. The first number of said certificates of indebtedness, to-wit, No. 1, for said sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000), became due and payable on the 1st day of January, A. D. 1898, and that annually thereafter one of said certificates of indebtedness becomes due and payable, with interest as aforesaid.

Your Finance Committee further report that said certificate of indebtedness, No. 1, in the sum of Four Thousand Dollars, together with the interest on the same and interest on all said certificates of indebtedness, as aforesaid, has been paid by the County Treasurer of said Winnebago County; and your Finance Committee herewith present said certificate of indebtedness, No. 1, as aforesaid, marked: "Cancelled and destroyed."

Your Finance Committee report that they have no other data to go by than the resolution duly passed by the said County Board of Supervisors on the 9th day of March, A. D. 1894, to negotiate the additional sale of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars asylum bonds, which said resolution reads as follows, to-wit:

The following resolution was presented and adopted by 37 ayes to 1 nay, all voting aye except Supervisor Daley; Supervisors Oellerich and Orchard not voting:

To the Chairman and Members of Committee appointed by County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin, to Negotiate the Sale of \$25,000 Asylum Bonds.

GENTLEMEN: For \$25,000 4½ per cent. asylum bonds, interest payable annually, principal and interest payable at the American Exchange National Bank, of New York City, dated March 15, 1894, and maturing as follows: Fifteen Hundred Dollars yearly after five years, excepting the last two installments, which shall be Two Thousand Dollars each, we offer, on delivery in Chicago with papers evidencing their legality, par, less a commission of Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars; and we will furnish the bonds in blank for Fifty Dollars, executed in duplicate. Farson, Leach & Co., Chicago, By Bentley Marstin, Agent. WHEREAS, As the said proposition was the highest and best proposition received by said committee; and

WHEREAS. The said proposition was accepted by said committee, subject to the approval of the Board of Supervisors, now therefore the Board of Supervisors hereby approve the action of said special committee and do hereby award and sell said bonds as described in said proposition and resolution authorizing the issue of said bonds as awarded to said Farson, Leach & Co, they to remit the sum of \$175.00 on said proposition.

Your Finance Committee further report that the bonded indebtedness against said Winnebago County in total amounts to the sum of Eighty-one Thousand Dollars, and recommend that a sinking fund be created to liquidate all bonds as they fall due.

#### ELECTRIC LIGHT PLANT AT COUNTY ASYLUM.

Supervisor Edwards submitted the following communication from the Trustees of the County Asylum, which was referred to the committee on Insane:

#### RECOMMENDATION OF THE TRUSTEES OF INSANE.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin-Gentlemen: The Trustees of the County Asylum beg leave to call the attention of this Board to the unsatisfactory condition of the lighting plant of the County Asylum. The plant was always too small for the work that it was intended to do; and the engine, which is only a thirty-horse power, has become so worn that it takes all the steam we can make with the two boilers to run it, and have to stop the fans while it is running.

We would therefore recommend that your honorable body do appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000), or as much thereof as may be necessary, to put a new lighting plant in the County Asylum.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ILLEGAL ASSESSMENTS.

On reassembling, Mr. Hough, from the committee on Illegal Assessments, submitted the following report on the petitions referred to the committee for the cancellation of tax certificates:

To the Honorable, The County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County.

GENTLEMEN: Your committee on Illegal Assessments beg leave to report that they have examined and considered the several petitions and matters referred to them and would report and recommend as follows:

First. Your committee have had under consideration five petitions of J. M. W. Pratt for cancellation of the following tax certificates. Petition No. 2 of J. M. W. Pratt contains the following tax certificates for cancellation, city of Menasha, Fourth ward:

REPORT ON COURT HOUSE FIRE, BY CHAIRMAN E. R. HICKS AND THE COMMIT-TEE ON PUBLIC BUILDINGS.

The committee on Public Buildings further reported as follows on the damage to the Court House by fire, and making an itemized statement of the expenses incurred in making the necessary repairs:

To the Honorable, the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County.

Your Chairman and the Building Committee beg leave to report that on Friday eve, December 24, 1897, a fire occurred in the Court House building; and before it was subdued, it burned out the west side of the Circuit Court room and part of the roof, and the lower stories in the west end of building were thoroughly water soaked. We met and conferred as to the best method to proceed, and decided to adjust the loss with the insurance companies and proceed to repair and replace the damaged property.

There were twenty-one insurance policies covering the loss, aggregating \$50,000. We spent several days in adjusting the loss, and finally settled in a very satisfactory manner with the insurance companies for the gross amount of \$3,173.54, covering loss to real estate, fixtures, furniture, books, etc. We forthwith procured plans and specifications looking to the repair of the property, and advertised for bids and let the contract for re-

pairing the building and purchased the furniture, carpets, etc., to replace the old ones and have nearly completed the same. We have kept the insurance fund as a separate fund, from which we have paid the expense arising from time to time and have also paid your committee for the time spent in such business, allowing therefor the regular per diem fixed by statute.

We have expended for all such purposes the sum of \$2,664.20, and beg to submit the following detailed statement of our receipts and disbursements:

As shown by the foregoing statement, we have \$509.34 remaining in this fund, which we recommend be turned into the general treasury of the county. We feel that although the loss was disastrous to the county and of great inconvenience to the occupants of the building, that we have been able to replace the property and have the Court House in much more serviceable and attractive shape to-day than it was before the fire.

The amount of loss, as agreed upon, was endorsed pro rata upon the outstanding insurance policies; and the county is now carrying that much less than \$50,000 insurance.

We would recommend that the Chairman of this Board be instructed to arrange our insurance so as to have it become due one-third every year instead of all in one year, as at present.

# RULES OF COUNTY BOARD.

#### ADOPTED NOV 9, 1897.

- I. The meetings of this Board shall be held in the Supervisors' room, and the hour for the daily meetings shall be 9 A. M., providing that on the first meeting in each week the hour of meeting shall be 10 A. M.
- II. At the first meeting of the Board it shall be the duty of the Chairman, or in his absence, the Clerk, to call to order.

The Clerk shall then call the roll of Members.

- A quorum being present, the Board shall proceed to the election of a Chairman.
- III. It shall be the duty of the Chairman to appoint the following standing committees and in the following order: Equalization, Finance, General Accounts, Illegal Assessments, Justice and Constable Accounts, Poor and Poor Farm, Corporations, Public Buildings, Roads and Bridges, Sheriff and Coroner Accounts, Printing, Per Diem and Mileage and Work House.
- IV. The Board may adjourn for such time as shall be necessary for the Chairman to prepare the list of committees, and no business can be done until the same shall be announced.
- V. The Chairman shall take the chair at the hour to which the Board may from time to time stand adjourned, call the Board to order and direct the calling of the roll of members by the Clerk.
- VI. Upon the appearance of a quorum, the journal of the preceding day shall be read by the Clerk, and any mistake therein shall be corrected by the Board; provided, that upon the last day of the session, the journal for that day shall be read and before the final adjournment corrected.
- VII. After the reading and correction of the journal, the order of business shall be as follows:
  - 1. Reception of Petitions, Memorials, Accounts, etc.
  - 2. Presentation of Resolutions and disposition of same.
  - 3. Reports of Standing Committees.
  - 4. Reports of Select Committees.
  - 5. Consideration of Miscellaneous Business.

- VIII. The Chairman shall preserve order and decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Board; and shall clearly and distinctly state every motion or question before debate.
- IX. The Chairman shall vote on all questions taken by ayes and noes, except on appeals from his own decisions; provided, that when the effect of such a vote shall be to produce a tie, the question shall be deemed to be lost; and providing that in the order of voting, his name shall be called last.
- X. Every motion or amendment shall be reduced to writing when a request therefor shall be made by any member; and all petitions, memorials and substitutes shall be reduced to writing and read before they shall be considered by the Board.
- XI. Every written resolution shall have attached thereto the name of the person introducing it; and when referred to a committee, the names of such committee shall be endorsed thereon.
- XII. Every member, previous to speaking, shall rise and address the Chair.
- XIII. When two or more members rise at once, the Chair shall designate the member who is to speak first; but in all cases the member who shall first rise and address the Chair shall speak first.
- XIV. No member shall speak more than twice upon the same question without leave; and when called to order by the Chairman, shall take his seat, and shall not be allowed to proceed without leave of the Board.
- XV. A vote on any question shall be taken by ayes and noes when called for by five members, and shall be so taken on all questions involving the expenditure of money; and whenever a vote is so ordered and taken, the members voting in the affirmative and negative, as well as those absent or not voting, shall be recorded at length in the records of the proceedings of the County Board.
- XVI. No account or claim against the county shall be audited unless it be made out in items and duly verified and be filed with the Clerk of the Board, except as otherwise provided by law.
- XVII. When a motion is under consideration, no motion shall be entertained except:
  - 1. To adjourn.
  - 2. To lat on the table.
  - 3. For the previous question.
  - 4. To postpone to a day certain.
  - 5. To commit to a committee.
  - 6. To amend or to substitute.
  - 7. To postpone indefinitely.

These several motions shall take precedence in the order in which they stand in this rule.

XVIII. A motion to adjourn, to lay on the table and for the previous question shall be decided without debate, except as hereinafter provided.

XIX. A motion to postpone indefinitely or to a day certain or to commit shall not be again entertained on the same day or in the same stage of the proposition.

XX. A substitute shall be open to amendment the same as the original proposition; but when adopted, shall not be subject to amendment. If an amendment or substitute is lost, another substantially the same shall not be entertained.

XXI. When a motion or question has once been determined, any member voting with the majority may move a reconsideration of the vote; but such motion shall be made and acted on at the same or next succeeding meeting, and shall not thereafter be made except by unanimous consent.

XXII. The previous question may be moved by any member, and the Chairman shall then say: "It requiring five members to second this motion, those in favor of sustaining the motion will rise." If five or more members then rise, the previous question shall thereby be seconded and an opportunity then be given to two members opposed thereto to briefly state their objections. The question shall then be, "Shall the question be now put?" which, if carried by a vote of two-thirds of the members present upon a call of the ayes and noes, the Board shall immediately proceed to vote upon the pending amendment, if any, and then upon the main question.

XXIII. In filling blanks, the largest sum and the longest time shall be first put.

XXIV. These rules shall not be changed, amended or repealed unless the proposition or amendment is introduced in writing and the same laid over to some subsequent meeting of the Board, not less than five days intervening, and then only with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

XXV. Any of these rules may be suspended upon any pending measure by unanimous consent or by two-thirds of the members present.

XXVI. These rules and all amendments or additions thereto which may hereafter be made shall govern the Board, until altered or repealed, as herein provided.

XXVII. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in "Jefferson's Manual," so far as they remain in common use and are practicable and applicable and not inconsistent herewith, shall govern the Board.
