

IMPROVEMENTS

There have been several important improvements made about the instirution during the past year.

The three receiving pamps, put in last year, gave us so much satisfac-, n, that we have placed one more this year to take the return from launand kitchen. It is giving good satisfaction. Size, 6x4x6; cost, \$150.

The steam pump which supplied the institution with water was too small, and we have replaced the same with a larger one. Size, 14x8x12, at an expense of \$553.23; complete with fittings, etc.

The water from asylum building roofs has been conducted into the large eistern under laundry, so that hereafter we will have an exhaustless supply of soft water for laundry purposes, which is one of the desirable things we have never had before.

The dry room has been rebuilt in accordance with modern plaus and is everything that could be desired. Cost complete, \$252.31.

Three hundred feet of new hose, to take the place of the old and defective line, has been installed, also hose carts for same and it makes our fire equipment more effective.

The asylum building has been rewired for electric lighting, owing to the fact that we considered the old wiring defective and dangerous if required to carry sufficient voltage for good lighting. Total cost of rewiring asylum building, including labor, material, etc., \$783.70.

We invite a careful inspection of the above mentioned improvements, believing you will recognize the necessity therefor and their efficiency.

COUNTY PHYSICIAN'S REPORT

County Physician Frank Brockway read his report as follows:

To the Honorable Board of Trustees of the County Asylum and Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wis:

Gentlemen:—I herewith respectfully present to you my report as County Physician for the fiscal year, ending July 1st, 1905.

COUNTY ASYLUM.

I have visited this institution regularly twice a week and have made special calls whenever necessary.

During the first three months there was little sickness, nothing of a very serious nature, and no deaths.

In the second quarter we still had comparatively little sickness, although we had two deaths, one, an aged man died of a stroke of paralysis, and the other from chronic consumption. There was one accident, a broken leg during this period.

The third quarter of the year being the winter months there was considerable sickness. There were seven deaths during this period, four of them being in the month of March. One of these deaths was caused by chronic epilepsy, one by accident, one by debility, due to old age, one by paretic dementia, and three by consumption.

The last quarter of the year was a healthful one for the inmates. For a period of seven weeks during this quarter, with the exception of one bed-ridden patient, there was no one in the institution sick in bed. There were no deaths during this quarter. You will notice from this report that the most of the illness and the greatest number of deaths, occur in the winter and early spring months, when the inmates are necessarily confined in doors. This does not mean that the building is unsanitary, but that the confinement weakens the power of the body to withstand the ravages of disease. The patients have been given all the outdoor exercise possible during the whole year. I wish to call your attention particularly to the fact that about fifty per cent of the deaths during the year were caused by consumption. This disease will probably continue to be a fruitful cause of death in this, as well as other similar institutions, for the reason that the weakened bodies of many of these unfortunates offer little resistance to infection by the germ.

However, I believe that, could we devise some means whereby we would be able to isolate these tubercular cases and keep them away from

the healthy patients, we might be able to control the disease to a greater extent. To accomplish this, some slight changes would be necessary in the interior of the asylum building, which I believe could be made at small cost.

The food for the inmates has been well selected, well cooked and nourishing, the beds and sleeping rooms kept in a cleanly condition, and the clothing clean and comfortable. The attendants have been kind in their treatment of their charges and have done all in their power for their good. The Superintendent and Matron in their watchful care and constant striving to better the condition of the inmates, have shown themselves to be very efficient in the work of careing for the patients committed to their charge.

The conduct of the institution throughout the entire year has been excellent.

I have visited the Poor House regularly twice a week, and have made numerous special visits. Although this building is old, it has been kept in good repair, and the comfort of the inmates carefully looked after. There is always a great deal of sickness in this institution, most of it being diseases incident to old age.

There were seven deaths during the year, six males and one female. There were two children born during the year, one of them living but a short time, it being diseased from birth. The other was taken and provided for by the Children's Home Society.

Under the supervision of the matron, Mrs. C. F. Apley, the inmatcs have been well cared for and given all the comfort possible in an institution of this kind. I have no recommendations to make regarding this institution, except that I wish to state that lighting the building by electricity, would, by doing away with the kerosene lamps, improve the sanitary conditions very materially.

THE COUNTY JAIL.

There has been comparatively little sickness at the jail during the past year, and nothing of a serious nature. While I have had frequent calls to prescribe for the prisoners confined there, it has always been for some slight ailment.

The building is sanitary, and the prisoners are well cared for by the sheriff and his assistants. Jailor Ritschke is deserving of a great deal wicredit for the neat and cleanly condition in which he has kept the prisoners' quarters.

THE WORK HOUSE.

While there have been no sick calls to the Work House, I visited and inspected the institution several times during the year. I have invariably found everything to be in a cleanly and sanitary condition. The large experience and natural ability of the Superintendent makes him very efficient in careing for the men committed to his charge.

In closing, I wish to state, that the hearty co-operation with, and good will shown me, by those in charge of the county institutions and the members of the Board of Supervisors, has made my work pleasant and agreeable. For this I wish to express my sincere appreciation and to thank you most heartily.

REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF ASSESSMENTS.

Supervisor of Assessments, D. M. Shea, read his report, No. 4, as follows:

To the Honorable the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Gentlemen: Pursuant to Section 8, Chapter 445, Laws of Wisconsin, of the year 1901, I have the honor of presenting to you my fourth annual report.

This report will show in detail the value of a complete list of properties as estimated by me, and the values of the same pieces of property as

fixed by the several assessors in the respective assessment districts. The value fixed by me has been determined by actual sales in many instances: and in such cases, the consideration was verified by other information than that found in the recorded instrument. In other instances sales of adjoining or neighboring property of similar character were used to aid in arriving at the true value. In still other instances prices offered and refused, earning capacity, community opinion, and all the various means used by buyers, sellers, brokers or investors to determine values, were brought into requisition.

In substantially all cases an actual inspection of the property was made. The values fixed at the true value contemplated by the law, but are intended to be safe and conservative. The number of pieces taken in each assessment district is as large as could well be made in the time that could be spared for this branch of the duties of the office, and as could be examined with the required care. The number of pieces is thought to be sufficiently large to constitute a fair and safe basis of valuation in each assessment district. In the cities where a much larger number of parcels, and a greater variety in the character of the property is found, a much larger number of sample pieces were taken.

The tables will show the number of pieces taken in each assessment district in the county, the valuation found by me, and the assessment of the same pieces made by the local assessor for the year 1905.

The above remarks apply especially to real estate. The personal property problem is in many respects more difficult. Actual inspection is largely impracticable. Some forms of personal property cannot be seen at all: some is never found and never assessed. The same assurances of accurate results cannot be felt in the case of personal property that exists as to real property. This seems unavoidable.

It gives me pleasure at this time to express my deep sense of appreciation and gratitude to officers of the various towns, cities and villages for the cordial and helpful attitude they have shown toward the work of this office, and to myself personally. It seems to be fully felt, as it should be that the purpose of this office is to secure an equal measure of justice to all in the matter of placing the burden of taxation. If every citizen feels that the necessary taxes are justly and lawfully apportioned there will be nothing but satisfaction.

Few indeed are those of our fellow citizens who are unwilling to bear their just share of taxation if they are assured that they are required to bear no more than their just share. It is but a few years since every town, city and village had a system and a percentage of its own. Equalization was then a matter of guess-work, and sometimes of political trading and log-rolling, of which even the winning districts were not always proud. It is now well established that no just equalization can be made without a just assessment; and that no assessment can be just except the assessment at actual value.


The cordial appreciation of these facts by assessors and other municipal officers is deserving of high commendation. The efforts that have been made, and that are being made to bring the assessments up from the old 30, 40 and 50 per cent assessments to true value in a half dozen years or less is remarkable, and has in many instances required a high degree of moral courage on the part of officers whose constituents did not always readily grasp the purpose of the new laws.

Three or four localities in this county might be named where the assessors are still clinging unduly to the old methods: but it is hoped that these will shortly be replaced by a new spirit of progress and fairness or by new and improved assessors.

I, D. M. Shea, Supervisor of Assessments in and for said county, do hereby certify that the accompanying tables 1 to 9, with special forms thereto attached, forming the statistical part of my report, constitute a true and correct statement and tabulation of the taxable property, real and personal in the several assessment districts of said county and the value thereof as ascertained from the assessment rolls of said several districts for the year 1905, together with a statement and tabulation of all taxable property in said several districts for said year and the market value thereof as determined by me.

Gentlemen: Pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 290, General Laws of 1895 and amendments thereto, known as the "Workhouse Law," we have the honor to submit the following report for the year ending October 31, 1905:

In doing so we are pleased to note that during the year just closed nothing has occurred to detract from nor lessen the practical usefulness of the County Workhouse. The local management, under the experienced guidance of the superintendent and matron, Mr. and Mrs. Abrams, who have been at the helm from its inception to the present time, has been sure guarantee of success. They have never for a moment relaxed their zeal and faithfulness to duty. By firmness and watchful care, complete discipline, cleanliness, humane treatment and sanitation have been main-

tained; all aiding in the conclusion that the workhouse has been and will be a continuous blessing to the taxpayers of the county; a panecea for and a protection from the "tramp nuisance" which menaced the county prior to its installation in 1896.

COUNTY PHYSICIAN

There have been no "sick calls," requiring medical aid during the year, but County Physician, Dr. Brockway, mindful of the importance of a proper sanitary condition of the workhouse and surroundings, has, in the line of duty, made several official visits thereto.

SILO

Supervisor Kenny offered Report No. 7, as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON POOR AND POOR FARM

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Gentlemen: Your committee on Poor and Poor Farm beg leave to report that by our last annual report we had overdrawn our appropriation and had a shortage of \$164.52; that we had given to us by the Finance Committee the sum of \$564.52, which, after balancing our shortage, left us \$400 to our credit as a Contingent fund.

By resolution of Supervisor Arnemann we were given \$1,102 insurance money and \$398 from the general fund, making a total of \$1,500 with which to build a Silo on the County Farm.

Pursuant to the resolution we proceeded to advertise for bids to build a silo with a double air space as directed and at a cost not to exceed \$1,500. On April 22, 1905, we opened bids as follows: O. C. Schoenfeld, \$1,414; Gill & Frank, \$1,428; J. B. Christiansen, \$1,435.

We let the contract to O. C. Schoenfeld, the lowest bidder, for \$1,414, to which was added \$4.80 to furnish cement for a stronger mortar than was specified for inside of Silo making the full contract price to be \$1,418.80. Paid Henry Anters for plans, \$10.00; John Williamson for specifications \$4.50, which, added to cost of Silo makes \$1,433.30, leaving a balance in silo fund of \$66.70.

We bought an Ensilage cutter and filler of the Blizzard make from Peterson & Jones for \$165.00, for which we paid the balance of our Silo fund, or \$66.70 and \$98.30 out of our Contingent fund, leaving on hand \$301.80.

POOR CONTINGENT FUND

Supervisor Nash offered Report No. 9 as follows:

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Gentlemen: I have to report, as required by resolution of this board providing a Poor Contingent Fund of two hundred dollars, (\$200), that I have paid out of said fund during my term of office the following amount:

November 8, 1905, six dollars, (\$6.00), for the board and clothing of the child of Mrs. Shoennerer for two weeks.

In explanation, I may state that on October 24th, County Judge C. D. Cleveland, informed me that Dr. W. A. Gordon of the Northern Asylum had informed him, as provided by the laws governing state asylums, that there had been born to Mrs. Shoennerer at that institution a child, and as provided the county must take the child and provide for its keeping or the state would provide for it and charge it back to the county. Thinking that the county could take care of the child with less expense than the state, I secured a home for it in this city and have notified the Children's Home Society who say that they will try to provide a home for it in the near future.

ANNUAL REPORT OF COUNTY SUPERINTENDENT

Superintendent Overton offered his report, No. 10, as follows:

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Gentlemen: I beg leave to submit the following report of the schools of Winnebago county for the year ending June 30, 1905.

On June 30, 1904, the total money on hand in the various districts of this county was \$18,773.03. Total amount of district taxes raised was

\$18,831.98; taxes levied by the County Board, \$10,227.67; state money, after deducting library money, was \$10,119.39; from all other sources \$3,395.39, making a total of \$61,347.45 received during the year.

\$2,245.06 was paid out for building and repairing; \$424.47 for apparatus; \$4,237.50 for services of male teachers; \$28,647.95 for services of female teachers; \$733.02 for old indebtedness; \$272.27 for school furniture; \$641.26 for services of district clerks; and \$7,546.26 for all other purposes, making a total of \$44,748.44 expended during the year. In two districts there is a general indebtedness of a total of \$198.29, leaving an actual balance of \$16,599.01.

The total value of the buildings and sites in the county is, as estimated by the school clerks, \$102,830.00, and the value of the apparatus is \$7,485.00. These values are very far from being the true valuation. This valuation should be regularly fixed by some competent authority. This padded valuation gives rise to the idea that the schools are very much better off than they really are, to a person who is not posted on facts; and if, as sometimes happens, this person happens to be a member of a Committee of the Legislature you can easily see that we are not likely to gain by it.

The general condition of buildings and grounds is very good. Nearly all of our buildings are comfortable and ordinarily well lighted. All are well roofed and painted on the outside. About three-fourths of them are provided with hardwood floors. The furniture if we except 25 per cent of the schools is antiquated and out of date. A great deal of it is badly placed so that it is very harmful for growing children to sit at the desks. I can name whole schools that have not one pupil who is not more or less round-shouldered. I have made suggestions and expostulations to the school officers in vain. A great deal of work has been done to better the condition of the school outbuildings, but as much of this was misdirected the conditions are still not up to a good moral standard.

During the summer just passed three new buildings have been constructed and are now in use. Two of these are of the ordinary type, the third demands more than passing mention. It is constructed on the most approved plans as to convenience, ventilation, heating, and in lighting. In the latter point it is one of the very best rooms in the county. The district is to be congratulated on having for clerk a young man who is progressive in the extreme, and who looks to the needs of the district and measures their wants by a standard not governed by pennies.

INSTITUTE

The regular Annual Institute was held in the Normal Building in Oshkosh, July 31 to August 11. Prof. B. Mack Dresden was the leading conductor. He was assisted by A. W. Trettien and E. E. Sheldon. Ten males and ninety-two females were enrolled. The enrollment was closed at the end of the third day, and the stragglers were not given credit for attendance. The average daily attendance was 91.8; the average age of the members was 21.3 years; the average experience of actual teachers was 22.8 months. Twenty-nine of those in attendance had never taught. Forty-seven had attended Normal, fifty high schools and five graded and county training schools.

This institute was the best organized of any we have had yet. The faculty met before the institute and thoroughly criticised each other's outlines of work. In consequence, no work was duplicated and no contrary directions were given. The meeting was in thorough working order at the close of the second day. The spirit throughout was excellent, and in my visits to the schools this fall I am seeing results.

CONVENTION OF SCHOOL OFFICERS

The laws of 1905 provide that there shall be an annual convention of the district officers of the county. Clerks must attend and the others may attend. They are paid per diem and mileage at the rate of three cents per mile. We have planned to hold this meeting in December. From the good that has come from similar meetings held in this county in past years I maintain that this was one of the very wisest school laws passed at the recent session of our Legislature.

TRANSPORTATION

Last year we made our first attempt at transportation of pupils. The excessive fall of snow, while it hindered the success of the experiment, gave us unquestionable data as to the feasibility of the plan. The results show that many of our smaller schools could be closed and the children taken to another school with monetary profit to the district and greatly increase the educational advantages of the pupils.

CHART AGENTS

During the last few days of July and the first of August an organized gang of sharpers started a canvass of the county, selling a set of something that purported to be the epitome of all that was required to be taught on the subject of Agriculture in the country schools. This gang got in two days work before I had knowledge of their presence, and one day more before a circular letter could reach the clerks. About a dozen districts were caught to the tune of \$47.50 each.

At a meeting held in this building the officers who signed the so-called orders organized, engaged counsel and prepared to fight the payment of any paper that had been given in the courts if necessary. The opinion of the lawyer engaged, and of the counsel for the officers of other similarly afflicted counties being almost unanimous that the paper could not be collected. The district certainly will not have to pay anything as the goods were not purchased at a regular board meeting, nor were they properly approved by the State or the County Superintendent.

LIBRARIES

We started to catalogue our school libraries last year. Some of our

more progressive teachers began the movement after receiving instruction at the institute in Library work. The result was that about twenty-five libraries were started, and of these at least ten were most excellently done. This was so encouraging that this year each teacher is required to catalogue her library and put in the eard charging system. Up to date I have seen encouraging results. This plan will increase the efficiency of our libraries many fold. Since the introduction of the County Traveling Libraries we have been able to confine our selections to books that were of actual value and use in the school room, and now, with proper cataloging of the material at hand, we hope to accomplish excellent results in our Library Work.

CONCLUSION

During the past year we had an excellent corps of teachers who were well trained and enthusiastic. Our results will hold up well in comparison with those of any other year. The excessively had roads of last winter completely demoralized many of our schools for the time being, and in some cases it took nearly all of the rest of the school year to recover from the effects of the breaking up of classes. This year, so far as I have visited, I see an excellent chance for our schools to make a record breaker of progress.

Secretary of Indigent Soldier's Commission in full for all services and expenses Seventy-five Dollars (\$75.00)

Purchasing Agent, One Hundred Dollars, (100.00)

Janitor for court house and jail, Seven Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$720.00) per annum. The duties of the janitor shall be to keep the court house neat and clean; to keep the building well heated; to keep the entire grounds and lawn clean and properly mown; to keep all sidewalks clear; take all charge of firing and care of boilers in court house and jail; do washing of towels used in the toilet room of court house; and for all other services rendered by said janitor; the services of said janitor to meet the requirements of the building committee of the board. Stid janitor is permitted to occupy the living room of the court house.


Resolved: By the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago county, that the present method of compensating the sheriff of Winnebago County, be changed from part fee system and part salary system, and that after the first day of January 1906, the sheriff of Winnebago county receive compensation as provided for by Chapter 217 of the laws of the State of Wisconsin, for the year 1901, And be it

Further Resolved: That the salary of the sheriff and undersheriff of Winnebago county and all his deputies be fixed in accordance with the following schedule, and said schedule of salaries is to take effect on the first day of January, 1996:

Sheriff, per annum	\$ 6000 00
Under sheriff per annum	1200 00
Deputy Sheriff, acting as jailor	500 00

That the above schedule includes the number of deputies which shall be appointed by the sheriff of Winnebago county, and who shall be paid by Winnebago county all other deputies shall be paid by the sheriff of Winnebago county, and above schedule shall be for all services rendered by the said sheriff of Winnebago county and under sheriff and his deputies for said county for any and all work that may come before him and them and which he and they are supposed to do according to law inside the State of Wisconsin. Said salaries as aforesaid to be paid strictly in accordance with Chapter 217 of the laws of the State of Wisconsin for the year 1901

And Be It Further Resolved: That said salaries shall be paid at the end of each month, and said sheriff shall keep accurate books of account, in which shall be entered from day to day in a Journal, the items of service and the fees and name of the particular proceeding of action in which the same is rendered, and shall carry the items of charges into a Ledger Account with proper reference to such journal entries, and that he shall pay to the county treasurer all fees, per diem and other emoluments of whatever kind received by him and shall at the end of each quarter of the year file with the county clerk, to be laid before the County Board, a sworn statement of all such fees, per dlem and emoluments collected by him or for him during the quarter of a year and all the expense of his office, during such time. And said salaries of s. 'A sheriff, undersheriff and deputy as aforesaid, shall be paid in lieu of all 'ees, per dit u and compensation for services rendered by them except for keeping and maint.ining prisoners in the county jail and except for actual expense. of conveyance of prisoners upon arrest and except that for all services rendered outside of the state of Wisconsin. Said sheriff shall be allowed

such compensation as given by Chapter 126 of the laws of the State of Wisconsin for the year 1901.

And Be It Further Resolved: That the method of compensation of said sheriff, undersheriff and deputies, as aforesaid shall go into effect on the first day of January, 1966.

Your committee on bonds and salaries further beg to report that Eber L. Simpson, sheriff of Winnebago county, has entered into an agreement in writing, attached hereto, wherein and whereby the said Eber L. OPINION OF DISTRICT ATTORNEY JACKSON.

To the Committee on Bonds and Salaries of the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Gentlemen: You have asked me whether, under the resolution heretofore passed at this session of the county board, the salary of the present sheriff and his deputies can be fixed by law and the present fee system of remuneration be done away with.

Chapter 217 of the laws of 1901 provides, among other things, as follows: "The county board of any county in this State may, at any time before or during the term of office of the sheriff, by resolution, change the method of compensating the sheriff, under-sheriff and deputies from fees now provided by law to salaries, provided, that whenever any county board so changes the method of compensating the sheriff, undersheriff and deputies and so fixes their salaries and the number of deputies, the same shall remain and be the salaries of the sheriff, under-sheriff and deputies; and shall fix the number of deputies during the term of the sheriff then in office, etc. Section 649 of the Revised Statutes provides that the salaries to be received by county officers, including county judge, shall not be increased or diminished during his term of office.

Section 26, of Article 4, of the constitution of the State of Wisconsin provides that the legislature shall never grant any extra compensation to any public officer, agent, servant, or contractor after the services shall have been rendered, or the contract entered into, nor shall the compensation of any public officer be increased or diminished during his term of office.

This last constitutional provision does not apply to county officers, but only to officers who receive a fixed salary from the State treasury.

Supervisors vs. Hackett, 21 Wis. 613. State vs. Kalb, 50 Wis. 178.

Chapter 217 of the laws of 1901 must be taken as amending so far as the office of sheriff is concerned, Section 649 R. S. This chapter was in effect long before the present sheriff was elected to office, and, in my opinion he must be deemed to have taken the office with the knowledge that the county board had the power granted by Chapter 217 of the laws of 1901

Unless this act is unconstitutional the county board has the power to change from the fee system to the salary system in remunerating the present sheriff and his deputies. As the sheriff and his deputies are paid out of the county treasury and not out of the state treasury I know of no good reason why this chapter is unconstitutional, and in my opinion the County Board of Winnebago has the power, by resolution, to change the present method of remunerating the present sheriff from the fee system to the salary system.

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

GENTLEMEN: We, the undersigned, members of the Equalization committee of said Board, object and earnestly protest against the adoption of the majority report. The said report is made up from

figures furnished by the Supervisor of Assessments. That the said supervisor of assessments has given Oshkosh a per cent of .4435. That the report raises the assessed valuation in the whole county the sum of \$2,611,856.00, and raises Oshkosh alone \$1,891,356.00, leaving only \$720,500.00 to be placed on all the rest of the towns and cities in the county. Why should Oshkosh stand more than .4435 per cent of the whole raise? There has been placed on the city of Oshkosh the sum of \$732,998.00 more than the .4435 per cent of the total in the whole county; while Menasha has a per cent of .0553 there has been placed on Menasha the sum of \$37,712.00, less than .0553 of the whole raise.

That the Supervisor of Assessments, for example, reports that the assessors of Oshkosh and the assessors of Menasha have been assessed practically, on the same percentage; while the supervisor of assessments has raised Oshkosh over .09 per cent and Menasha only .039 per cent. That other districts have not been raised in proportion to Oshkosh, and we believe that the report is unjust and inequitable, and beg your honorable body to inquire into the method of making up this report.

That the said described property was at the time of the sale of said certificates the property of the Wisconsin Traction, Light, Heat & Power Co., an Electric Railway Corporation subject to the payment of a license fee in lieu of general taxes as provided in the above mentioned Section of the Wisconsin Revised Statutes.

Your committee, on examination of the facts relating to said tax certificate, find, that the allegations as set forth by the petitioner are true, and would recommend that said tax certificates be cancelled and that the amount 30 paid for such certificates be refunded to petitioner with interest at the rate of 7 per cent per annum from the date thereof, to-wit: Tax

certificate No. 121, sale of 1903; amount \$19.86, interest \$3.48, total \$23.34, and that the same be charged back to the City of Menasha.

Petition of St. Josephats' congregation of City of Oshkosh, by Francis Laslow, Vice President, John Ogonowski, Secretary, John N. Tadych, Treasurer, for the cancellation of tax certificate No. 559, sale 1899, amount \$3.41, affecting the following described property, to wit: lot 51, of block 2, of J. B. McMcLaren's Sub. "Welfth ward, Oshkosh. Said tetitions: represents that said certificate is illegal and void for the reason that by a clerical mistake lot 51 of block 2 in J. B. McLarens Sub. was, at the time of the assessment of said lot for taxes, owned by said congregation and a retrospection into the previous years will show that the property at that time was church property and consisted not only of lot 51, but also of lots 52, 53 and 54, in said Subdivision which were not assessed; the owner of said property having purchased said certificate and paid \$6.11 therefor, for the purpose of cancellation. Your committee not being fully satisfied as to the claims set forth by petitioner we recommend that the matter be deferred until the March session.

Petition of T. H. Gill for the cancellation of tax certificate No. 220, sale of 1905; amount \$3.48, affecting the following, to-wit: ¼ of lot 24, of block 99, in the Sixth ward, City of Oshkosh. Said petitioner represents that said tax certificate is illegal and void for the reason that all the real estate covered by the tax certificate above described is owned by the Wisconsin Central Railway Company, and is adjoining the track of the Wisconsin Central Railway Company and was acquired prior to 1899 solely for railway purposes, and has been held since the date of purchase for the necessary uses in connection with the operation of said railway as contemplated by Section 1038 of the Revised Statutes; that said property for the above reasons is by law exempt from taxation. Further, that in accordance with Chapter 315 Laws of 1903, the above described property has been duly returned to the State Board of Assessments as railway property and assessed by said Board as such and is consequently exempt from local taxation.

Your committee having made examination of the premises described in said petition find, that the same are not used for railroad purposes, being situated at the corner of Ninth and Michigan streets in the Sixth ward, City of Oshkosh, and being vacant property, your committee further state that on account of such property not being used for railroad purposes, and not immediately adjoining the depot grounds, tracks or right of way of raid company that it would not be exempt from taxation and would recommend that the prayer of the petitioner T. H. Gill, in said matter, be not granted.

Your committee has before it a statement of the County Treasurer, of lands withheld from sale for and on account of the several reasons as set forth in said statement, and beg leave to report they have carefully considered the same and would recommend that said statement be accepted and that the lands therein, withheld from sale be charged back to the

several towns, villages and cities as per said statement herewith submitted.

It also recommends that the sum of \$6.00 be allowed E. W. Thomas for services rendered in examining title to property in question, and assisting in other matters in connection therewith.



Said sum to include not only the building of said poor house, but also the heating, lighting, and any extras thereon.

Further Resolved, By this Board, That said committee are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to act for and on behalf of Winnebago county in the selection and adoption of the plans and specifications for said poor house, and for the letting and executing of all contracts for the building and erection of said poor house on behalf of Winnebago county

Further Resolved, By this Board, That said committee are hereby authorized, directed and empowered to secure and adopt proper plans and specifications for all such work, and are hereby given full power and authority to adopt the present plan of Wm. Waters, with such modifications or changes therein as they may see fit for fully carrying out the purposes of this resolution; it being understood that they shall have the right and power to decide upon, determine and adopt proper plans and specifications, and to adopt or reject any such plans or specifications, or change or modify any as they see fit in order to carry out the purposes of this resolution. And said committee is hereby directed, empowered and authorized to perfect proper plans and specifications for the erection of said poor house, including the heating and lighting thereof as soon as properly may be done; and are authorized, directed and empowered thereupon to advertise for and receive bids for the full completion of said work, and to secure the erection, construction, and completion of said poor house in accordance with said plans and specifications; and they are hereby further authorized and directed to enter into and execute any and all necessary contracts therefor and for the sesuring of an archi:ect for the supervision of said work.

Further Resolved, By said Board, That in the advertising for bids for the persaid committee shall act in conjunction with the district attorney of said county, who formance of said work, and in letting all contracts in connection with said work, is hereby directed to see and approve all contracts, bids, writings and instruments necessary to carry into full effect the purpose of this resolution.

Further Resolved, By this Board, That said committee is given plenary power to act for and on behalf of this board and on behalf of the county of Winnebago in carrying out the purposes of this resolution, it being understood, however, that the cost of said building when completed, including heating, lighting, and extras, also including architects' fees, shall not exceed the sum of \$50,000.00; and said committee is hereby directed to adopt such plans, drawings and specifications and let such contracts on behalf of Winnebago county as will insure the completion of said building according to the intent and purpose of this resolution, for the sum of \$50,000.00.

Further Resolved, By said County Board, That said committee on poor and poor farm be and they are hereby authorized to secure and employ a competent architect and superintendent for the supervision of said work and to advise with and aid the said committee, and to see that all contracts, plans and specifications are fully complied with. And said committee shall reserve to itself in all contracts let and entered into, the right, power, and authority to determine at any and all times who shall be the representing architect to determine for Winnebago county all questions which may arise in the construction and building of said poor house under any contracts let, and to determine the question of whether all contracts are being carried out in accordance with plans, drawings and specifications.

That there shall be levied and collected annually, upon the taxable property of said county a sum of money sufficient to meet the interest on said notes as they become due, and also to pay and discharge the principal thereof as it becomes due.

SHERIFF'S SALARY

Supervisor Ganzer, chairman of Bonds and Salary committee, offered report No. 13, as follows:

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Gentlemen: Whereas, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago have,

by resolution, directed that the method of compensating the sheriff and deputies of Winnebago County from the salary and part fee system to all salary in lieu of all fees, and directed that this committee on Bonds and Salaries fix the salary of the sheriff before the adjournment of the present, session of the said County Board and report the same to this body, and directed that all further business of the sheriff of Winnebago County be transacted strictly in accordance with Chapters 126 and 217 of the laws of 1901.

Now therefore, your committee on Bonds and Salaries to whom was referred said resolution as aforesaid, do hereby beg to report and recommend the following resolution be passed by said Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County.

Resolved, By the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago county, that the present method of compensating the sheriff of Winnebago county be changed from part fee system and part salary system, and that after the first day of January, 1906, the sheriff of Winnebago county receive compensation as provided for by Chapter 217 of the laws of the State of Wisconsin for the year 1901.

Further Resolved, That the salary of the sheriff and undersheriff of Winnebago county, and all his deputies, be fixed in accordance with the following schedule, which said schedule of salaries is to take effect on the first day of January, 1906:

Sheriff, per annum	\$6,000.00
Undersheriff, per annum	1,000.00
Deputy sheriff, acting as jailer	500.00

That the above schedule includes the number of deputies which shall be appointed by the sheriff of Winnebago county, and who shall be paid by Winnebago county. All other deputies shall be paid by the sheriff. And said schedule shall be for all services rendered by the said sheriff of Winnebago county and undersheriff and his deputies for said county, for any and all work that may come before him and them, and which he and they are supposed to do according to law inside the State of Wisconsin. Said salaries as aforesaid, to be paid strictly in accordance with Chapter 217 of the laws of the State of Wisconsin for the year 1901.

Further Resolved, That such salaries shall be paid at the end of each month, and said sheriff shall keep accurate books of account in which shall be entered from day to day, in a journal, the items of service, and the fees and name of the particular proceeding or action in which the same is rendered, and shall carry the items of charges into a ledger account, with proper reference to such journal entries; and that he shall pay to the county treasurer all fees, per diem and other emoluments of whatever kind received by him, and shall, at the end of each quarter of the year file with the county clerk, to be laid before the county board a sworn statement of all such fees, per diem and emoluments collected by him or for him during the quarter of the year, and all the expenses of his office during such time. And such salaries of said sheriff, undersheriff and deputy, as aforesaid, shall be paid in lieu of all fees, per diem and compensation for services rendered by them, except for keeping and maintaining prisoners in the county jail, and except for actual expenses of conveyance of prisoners upon arrest, and except that for all services rendered outside of the State of Wisconsin said sheriff shall be allowed such compensation as given by Chapter 126 of the laws of the State of Wisconsin for the year 1901.

Further Resolved, That the method of compensation of said sheriff, undersheriff and deputies as aforesaid, shall go into effect on the first day of January, 1907.

RULES OF THE COUNTY BOARD.

ADOPTED NOVEMBER 15, 1905.

- The meetings of this Board shall be held in the Supervisors' room, and the hour for the daily meetings shall be 9 A. M., providing that on the first meeting in each week the hour of meeting shall be 10 A. M.
- II. At the first meeting of the Board it shall be the duty of the Chairman, or in his absence, the Clerk, to call to order.

The Clerk shall then call the roll of Members.

- ${\bf A}$ quorum being present, the Board shall proceed to the election of a Chairman.
- III. It shall be the duty of the Chairman to appoint the following standing committees: Equalization, Finance, General Accounts, Illegal Assessments, Justice and Constables' Accounts, Sheriff and Coroners' Accounts, Insane, Poor and Poor Farm, Work House, Corporations, Roads and Bridges, Public Buildings Printing, Per Diem and Mileage, Bonds and Salaries.
- IV. The Board may adjourn for such time as shall be necessary for the Chairman to prepare the list of committees, and no business can be done until the same shall be announced.
- V. The Chairman shall take the chair at the hour to which the Board may from time to time stand adjourned, call the Board to order and direct the calling of the roll of members by the Clerk.
- VI. Upon the appearance of a quorum, the journal of the preceding day shall be read by the Clerk, and any mistake therein shall be corrected by the Board; provided, that upon the last day of the session, the journal for that day will be read and, before the final adjournment, corrected.
- VII. After the reading and correction of the journal, the order of business shall be as follows:
 - 1. Reception of Petitions, Memorials, Accounts, etc.
 - 2. Presentation of Resolutions and disposition of same.
 - 3. Reports of Standing ommittees.
 - 4. Reports of Select Committees.
 - Consideration of Miscellaneous Business.
- VIII. The Chairman shall preserve order and decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Board; and shall clearly and distinctly state every motion or question before debate
- IX. The Chairman shall vote on all questions taken by ayes and nays, except on appeals from his own decisions; provided, that when the effect of such a vote shall be to produce a tie, the question shall be deemed to be lost; and providing that in the order of voting, his name shall be called last.
- X. Every motion or amendment shall be reduced to writing when a request therefor shall be made by any member; and all petitions, memorials and substitutes shall be reduced to writing and read before they shall be considered by the Board.
- XI. Every written resolution shall have attached thereto the name of the per son introducing it; and when referred to a committee, the names of such committee shall be endorsed thereon.
 - XII. Every member, previous to speaking, shall rise and address the Chair.
- XIII. When two or more members rise at once, the Chair shall designate the member who is to speak first; but in all cases the member who shall first rise and address the chair shall speak first

XIV. No member shall speak more than twice upon the same question without leave; and when called to order by the Chairman, shall take his seat, and shall not be allowed to proceed without leave of the Board.

XV. A vote on any question shall be taken by ayes and nays when called for by five members; and shall be so taken on all questions involving the expenditure of money; and whenever a vote is so ordered and taken, the members voting in the affirmative and negative, as well as those absent or not voting, shall be recorded at length in the records of the proceedings of the County Board.

XVI. No account or claim against the county shall be audited unless it be made out in items and duly verified and be filed with the Clerk of the Board, except as otherwise provided by law.

XVII. When a motion is under consideration, no motion shall be entertained except:

- To adjourn.
 - 2. To lay on the table.
- 3. For the previous question.
- 4. To postpone to a day certain.
- 5. To commit to a committee.
- 6. To amend or to substitute.
- 7. To postpone indefinitely.

These several motions shall take precedence in the order in which they stand in this rule.

XVIII. A motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, and for the previous question, shall be decided without debate, except as hereinafter provided.

XIX. A motion to postpone indefinitely or to a day certain or to commit shall not be again entertained on the same day or in the same stage of the proposition.

XX. A substitute shall be open to amendment the same as the original proposition; but when adopted, shall not be subject to amendment. If an amendment or substitute is lost, another substantially the same shall not be entertained.

XXI. When a motion or question has once been determined, any member voting with the majority may move a reconsideration of the vote, but such motion shall be made and acted on at the same or next succeeding meeting, and shall not thereafter be made except by unanimous consent.

XXII. The previous question may be moved by any member, and the Chairman shall then say: "It requiring five members to second this motion those in favor of sustaining the motion will rise." If five or more members then rise, the previous question shall thereby be seconded and an opportunity then be given to any two members opposed thereto to briefly state their objections. The question shall then be, "Shall the question be now put?" which, if carried by a vote of two-thirds of the members present upon a call of the ayes and nays, the Board shall immediately proceed to vote upon the pending amendment, if any, and upon the main question.

XXIII. In filling blanks, the largest sum and the longest time shall be first put.

XXIV. These rules shall not be changed, amended, or repealed unless the proposition or amendment is introduced in writing and the same laid over to some subsequent meeting of the Board, not less than five days intervening, and then only with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

XXV. Any of these rules may be suspended upon any pending measure by unanimous consent or by two-thirds of the members present.

XXVI. These rules and all amendments or additions thereto which may hereafter be made shall govern the Board until altered or repealed, as herein provided.

XXVII. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in "Jefferson's Manual," so far as they remain in common use and are practicable and applicable and not inconsistent herewith, shall govern the Board.




