

TRUSTEES' ANNUAL REPORT.

Trustee Thos. Hough read annual report No. 4 of the Trustees of the County Asylum and Superintendent of Poor Farm, as follows:

To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin:

Gentlemen: We hereby submit our annual report for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1907.

Considering the general high prices of foodstuffs and clothing, the expenses of the institution for the past year have been very reasonable.

No extensive permanent improvements have been made this year.

The continual demand for men at the new poor house in grading has made it necessary to postpone the construction of a cement walk until another year.

We have contracted for 1,500 tons of West Virginia splint screened lump coal at \$4.45 per ton, which will include the coal supply for the new poor house. You will notice that the asylum fund is overdrawn considerable, as nothing has been appropriated to the asylum fund for several years; and as the receipts for the care of insane are decreasing, owing to the fact that our own insane are increasing in numbers, we recommend the appropriation of a sufficient amount to reimburse the asylum fund, viz: \$9.000.

COUNTY PHYSICIAN'S REPORT.

Frank Brockway, County Physician, read his report No. 5, as follows:

To the Honorable Board of Trustees of the County Asylum and Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wis.:

Gentlemen: I hereby respectfully present to you my report as county physician for the fiscal year, ending July 1, 1907.

COUNTY ASYLUM.

I have visited the county asylum, as usual, twice a week regularly, and at other times when sickness made it necessary.

In the first month of the year, July, 1906, there was but one acute disease of much severity, an attack of pneumonia, and which made a good recovery. There were no deaths this month.

In August there were no deaths, and but one severe case of sickness, an attack of erysipelas. This was an aged woman who had suffered from a number of previous attacks and who died from the effects of this disease in the following month, September, that being the only death during that month. There was one death in October, from old age, and no deaths in November. There were no serious illnesses in either month. In December there was one death, cause, apoplexy. During this month there was a mild case of typhoid fever in an attendant.

This young woman had only been at the asylum a short time and undoubtedly had been infected before going there. There have been no other cases, so evidently the source of infection is not at the asylum.

In January, 1907, there were no deaths. In February, there were two, one from paralytic dementia, and the other caused by paralysis. During this month one of the male patients was afflicted with a severe attack of pneumonia, from which he eventually made a good recovery. There were no deaths in March and one in the month of April, cause, dementia. In April there was one accident, a severely sprained ankle. This case finally made a perfect recovery. In May there were two deaths, one from paralysis and the other from tuberculosis.

There were no deaths in June, the last month of the year. Of the eight deaths during the year, four were males and four females. Seven of them were above sixty years of age, ranging from sixty-two to eighty-five. The other death was caused by tuberculosis and was that of a man about thirty years of age.

While I have only mentioned the more severe cases of acute illness, there has been the usual number of chronic ailments, and minor acute troubles, which require the attention of the physician.

The sanitary conditions of the asylum building have been good throughout the year, the water and food supplies healthful, and the inmates well cared for by the superintendent and matron and their assistants.

THE COUNTY POOR HOUSE.

I have visited the poor house regularly twice a week throughout

the year, and have made special visits whenever necessary.

In July, 1906, there was one death, none in August, one in September, two in October, two in November, one in December, one in January, 1907, none in February, two in March, one in April, one in May and one in June.

Of these seven were males and six females. The youngest in age at death was fifty-two and the oldest over ninety. Eight of the deaths were due to old age, two to heart disease, one to paralysis, one to tuberculosis, and one to suicide. There were two births during the year, one normal and the other a still-birth. Both babies were females. The inmates have been well cared for and the sanitary conditions in the new building are excellent.

THE COUNTY JAIL.

There have been about the usual amount of calls to the jail during the year. There have been no contagious diseases, and no severe acute illness. The sanitary conditions here have been good, the food wholesome, and the inmates given the best of care by the sheriff and his assistant.

THE WORK HOUSE.

I have inspected the work house several times this year, and have always found the food wholesome, the water supply good and the building clean and sanitary. There were no sick calls during the year, which proves that Superintendent Abrams has taken good care of those consigned to his charge.

I have no recommendations to make in regard to any of the institutions, as I believe they are all sanitary and well adapted to the purposes for which they are used. This county may well be proud of her public buildings.

In closing I wish to thank the Board of Trustees, the Board of Supervisors, and those in charge of the different county institutions, for their assistance to me in my work.

INHERITANCE TAX.

Supervisor Gustavus offered Resolution No. 6 as follows:

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors, of Winnebago County:

Whereas, Chapter 44 of the Laws of 1903 of the State of Wisconsin, provides for the taxation of legacies and inheritances and also provides for the collection of the same through the medium of the County Court, the County Treasurer and the District Attorney without any assistance from the State;

Whereas, Said chapter further provides that 35 per cent, of the said tax so collected must be paid to the State Treasurer and only 5 per cent, to the county; therefore, be it

Resolved, By the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, that whereas the collection of said tax incurs considerable expense and work upon Winnebago County and practically no expense upon the state; that said tax so collected belongs legitimately to the County where the deceased resided and not in the state treasury; be it further

Resolved, By this Board that the legislature of the State of Wisconsin at its next session be memorialized to amend said Chapter 44 of the Laws of 1903 so that 90 per cent. of the payments made upon legacles and inheritances be apportioned to the County and 10 per cent thereof to the State. Be it further

Resolved, That members of the legislature of this district at the next state election be furnished a copy of this resolution by the County Clerk so that the members of our district may work in our behalf.

WINNECONNE BRIDGE.

Supervisor Gunderson offered the following petition:

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Gentlemen: The petition of the Town Board of Supervisors of the Town of Winneconne, Winnebago County, and of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Winneconne, Winnebago County, respectfully shows your honorable body as follows:

- 1. That there now exists within the village limits of the Village of Winneconne aforesaid, a bridge across the Wolf river, being in section twenty-one (21), township nineteen (19), north of range fifteen (15), east; that said bridge is out of repair, and that it is necessary that said bridge be repaired without delay in order to avoid its becoming in a dangerous condition, and in order that it may be used hereafter.
- 2. That the Town of Winneconne, at the annual town meeting in April. 1997, voted to raise the sum of two thousand two hundred dollars (\$2,200,00) for the purpose of repairing said bridge referred to in paragraph 1 of this petition; that the amount of two thousand two hundred dollars (\$2,200,00) has been regularly and legally placed upon the tax budget of said town for the purpose of repairing said bridge, and that the same will be raised by the regular tax levy for the year 1907 by said Town of Winneconne.

And in this behalf your petitioners further show, that the last equalized valuation of the taxable property in said town was one million seventy-seven thousand two hundred dollars (\$1.077.200.00).

3. And your petitioners further show that at the regular annual meeting of the Village of Winneconne aforesaid, in April, 1907, it was duly and regular

larly voted to raise the sum of seven hundred dollars (\$700.00) by taxation in the Village of Winneconne for the purpose of repairing said bridge aforesaid; that seven hundred dollars (\$700.00) so to be raised for that purpose has been regularly placed upon the tax budget for said village for the year 1907, and that the same will be raised by taxation within the Village of Winneconne for the year 1907.

And in this behalf your petitioners further show this Honorable Board that the taxable property in said Village of Winneconne, according to the last equalized valuation thereof was three hundred and forty-two thousand, six hundred dollars (\$342,600,000).

- 4. And in this behalf your petitioners further show this Honorable Board that the total cost of repairing said bridge aforesaid is five thousand eight hundred dollars (\$5,800.00), and that it will cost five thousand eight hundred dollars (\$5,800.00) to put said bridge in a state of good repair.
- 5. And in this behalf your petitioners further show this Honorable Board, that the Village of Winneconne and the Town of Winneconne have provided for the payment of one-half the cost of such repairs, being one-half of the sum of five thousand eight hundred dollars \$(5,800.00), to-wit: two thousand nine hundred dollars \$(2,900.00), and that the cost of the repairs of such bridge exceeds one-eighth \$(3)\$ of 1 per centum of all the taxable property in said town, and in said village according to the last equalized valuation thereof, and that the sum of seven hundred dollars \$(700.00)\$ to be raised by the Village of Winneconne and provided for by the Village of Winneconne exceeds one-eighth \$(4)\$ of 1 per centum of the last equalized valuation of all the taxable property of said Village of Winneconne, and that the sum of two thousand two hundred dollars \$(\$2,200.00)\$ provided for by the town of Winneconne for the repairs of said bridge exceeds one-eighth \$(5)\$ of 1 per centum of all the taxable property within the Town of Winneconne according to the last equalization thereof.
- 6. That said bridge as aforesaid is wholly within the Village of Winneconne, which said village is wholly within the Town of Winneconne.
- 7. Wherefore, your petitioners pray this Honorable County Board of Winnebago County, to appropriate the other half of such cost of the repair of said bridge, and cause such sum to be levied upon the taxable property of the County, subject to such assessment, the amount so to be raised by said county to be such sum as will with the amount provided by said Town of Winneconne and said Village of Winneconne be sufficient to defray the expense of repairing said bridge so petitioned for, and that said sum, when so collected, shall be paid out as provided by law. And in this behalf your petitioners further respectfully petition this Honorable Board to take any and all such steps, acts and action as shall be necessary and proper to carry out the objects and purposes of this petition in accordance with law, and so your petitioners will ever pray.

In witness whereof your petitioners, being the Town Board of Supervisors of the Town of Winneconne, Winnebago County, Wisconsin, and the Board of Trustees of the Village of Winneconne, Winnebago County, Wisconsin, have signed this petition in their official capacity.

BRIDGE AT WINNECONNE.

Supervisor White offered Report No. 6 as follows:

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Gentlemen: Your committee on Roads and Bridges, to whom was referred the petition of the Board of Supervisors of the Town of Winneconne and the Board of Trustees of the Village of Winneconne, County of Winnebago, which petition represents that said town and village has voted to repair the bridge across the Wolf river, said bridge being located in the Village of Winneconne, in said town, and

that the cost of said repairs to said bridge will exceed one-eighth of 1 per cent of all the taxable property in said Town and Village of Winneconne, according to the last equalized valuation thereof; and that said town and village has provided for the payment of one-half the cost of said repairs, to-wit; the sum of twenty-nine hundred dollars, that being one-half the cost of said repairs, as appears from the said petition, your Committee respectfully report that the Town and Village of Winneconne have complied with all requirements of law in providing for the cost of said repairs and that the county is under legal obligation to provide for one-half the cost of the repairs to said bridge: and

Supervisor of Assessments D. M. Shea offered his Annual Report No. 7 as follows:

SUPERVISOR OF ASSESSMENS ANNUAL REPORT

To the Honorable, The Board of Supervisors of Winnebage County,
Wisconsin.

Gentlemen: Pursuant to chapter 445, laws of Wisconsin for the year 1901, and acts amendatory thereto, I respectfully submit my sixth annual report.

In accordance with law, I called the sixth annual meeting of the assessors of Winnebago County, which was held in the court house,

at Oshkosh, in April, and am pleased to say that every assessor in the county was present. With few exceptions, the assessors took an active part in the discussion of the assessment laws and the best method of enforcing the same.

But it is a peculiar fact, that no matter how enthusiastic they are at the annual meeting, nor how strongly they are impressed with the fact that they have taken their oath to assess all property at full value, some of the assessors will return home and violate their oath of office by assessing the property in their district at a value far less than the true one.

In arriving at the true value of real property I used the inspection method; special form "B" of this report will show the number of parcels inspected in each district, the valuation as fixed by me, the assessment of the same and the ratio of assessed to true value.

Table 8 shows the number of acres assessed in each district, the aggregate and average value of same and the assessment of all platted lands including city and village lots, and also shows the aggregate and average value as fixed by me.

Tables 1 to 7 show any and all changes made in personal property in the county.



November 15, 1907, 9 o'clock a. m.

Board met pursuant to adjournment, Chairman Thompson presiding.

Present, full Board except Supervisor Noble-excused.

Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

Accounts presented and referred to appropriate committees.

Supervisor Gustavus asked that the Chairman appoint a committee of two to look up the matter of inheritance tax and report to Board by Monday morning.

Chairman Thompson appointed as such committee Supervisors Gustavus and Audiss.

Chairman Thompson called Vice-Chairman Audiss to the Chair.

SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS REPORT.

Superintendent Patch offered Report No. 8, as follows:

Gentlemen: It is with pleasure that I present the following annual report on the condition of the common schools in Winnebago County. It is understood by the Board that this report does not include the schools in the City of Oshkosh, Neenah or Menasha.

In general I find the schools to be in a fairly satisfactory condition, in regard to equipment; and good teachers in charge of the schools. But I find that very few of the schools in the County are in good sanitary condition, there being no means of proper ventilation.

That these conditions exist throughout the entire state is proven by the fact that at its last session the state legislature enacted a law providing that additional state aid to the amount of fifty dollars (\$50.00) per year for three years be paid to schools, providing a proper heating and ventilating system in their schools. A great many schools are taking advantage of this and I believe that during the next year the conditions in most if not all the schools will be greatly improved.

In this County the opportunities for securing a high-school and normal school training are especially good. We have fine high-schools and a normal school, as a result, a great many of the graduates of

these schools wish to secure positions as teachers. They are inexperienced and consequently will teach more cheaply than those who have had experience in the work will or can. School boards engage these cheap teachers and thus the older and better ones are forced out of the County. In this way we are using the schools of our County as a training school for other counties. It seems to me that sufficient wages should be paid to keep some of the older teachers here.

Beginning August 23, and continuing for five days the annual teachers' institute was held. The attendance this year was a little larger than usual, there being ninety-nine teachers enrolled. The work was entirely of a professional nature and only those subjects were taken up which experience has shown could be put to practical use in the schoolroom.

The regular examination for teachers' certificates was held during the last of July and the first of August, before the institute, instead of after the institute. The reason for this change is that the teachers' institute is for the purpose of making better teachers instead of more teachers and should not be used for the purpose of preparing applicants to pass the examination.

The present system of classification of schools in the County is very satisfactory and the library catalogue is, I believe, the best to be found in any county in the state.

The system of certificates of award and library certificates, the first to secure more regular attendance of pupils and the second to stimulate an interest in the reading of good books in the school library, is also a good one and should be continued.

SOLDIERS' RELIEF COMMISSION.

N. C. Coats, Secretary, read his Annual Report No. 11, as follows: To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Gentlemen: In accordance with the law governing the Soldiers' Relief Commission we herewith submit to your Honorable body a summary of its business for the year ending November 15, 1907.

The amount expended for relief during the year just closed was \$5,994.00. Relief has been granted to 137 families representing 342 persons. This is 8 families more than were granted relief last year.

The amount expended is somewhat larger than that given in our

last report. The reason for this is the greater number of families relieved and the continued increase of the high prices of the necessities of life over that of last year; and the increase of indigency due to advancing age, and the consequent decrease in the earning power of beneficiaries.

The average age of the heads of families is 66 years. It will be readily seen by your honorable body that at such an age the earning power of the beneficiaries of the commission is limited in the extreme; and it would not be expected that at their age the earning power would be much. Couple these conditions with the difficulty encountered by an old man or an old woman in obtaining even light employment, and it will be readily observed how unfortunate are these veterans of the war for the preservation of our country.

Advancing age brings additional applicants, and it is evident to this commission that the applicants for relief will be larger the coming year than during the year just closed.

The commission would therefore respectfully ask your honorable body for a larger appropriation than that of last year.

Inasmuch as there is no surplus of which this commission can avail itself, we would respectfully ask for seven thousand dollars (\$7.000.00).

The Commission appreciate and thank your honorable body for the courtesies extended to it in the past.

PETITION FOR BRIDGE.

Supervisor Mills presented a petition for a bridge which was referred to Committee on Roads and Bridges, as follows:

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Gentlemen: The joint petition of the Town Board of Supervisors, of the Town of Omro, Winnebago County, and the Trustees of the Village of Omro, Winnebago County, respectfully shows to your honorable body:

First. That within the townships of said Town of Omro, at the intersection of Sections Seven (7), Eight (8), Seventeen (17), and Eighteen (18) of Township Eighteen (18) north of Range Fifteen (15) east, Winnebago County, and on an Omro town road, within the platted part of the corporate limits of the Village of Omro, there has been maintained for many years, and still is maintained, a bridge across Fox river, a navigable stream; that said is maintained, a bridge across Fox river, a navigable stream; that said is maintained, a bridge across Fox river, a navigable stream; that said is maintained, a bridge across Fox river, a navigable stream; that said is maintained, a bridge of Omro is entirely within the Township of the Town of Omro.

Second. That the aforesaid bridge is in urgent need of repair in order to preserve and maintain the same and make the same suitable and safe

for public use and public traffic; and which said bridge has been pronounced by competent bridge experts to be unsafe for public use and in danger of collapse.

Third. That your petitioners have caused an estimate to be made of the cost of the repairs on said Fox river bridge, necessary to be made in order to make said bridge safe for public travel and preserve the same from decay and destruction, and find the same to be Four Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$4,200.00); That on the 9th day of November, 1907, the electors of the duly assembled in special town meeting, duly Town of Omro called and assembled for the purpose of considering tion of making the necessary repairs to said Fox River bridge and to provide means for raising funds for defraying the expenses of the same, did, by unanimous vote, vote to repair said Fox river bridge and directed its Board of Supervisors to act jointly with the said Village of Omro in the repair of said bridge, and did vote and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) to defray the expense of its proportionate share of the cost of making such repairs on said bridge, and did authorize and direct the assessment and levy of that amount on taxable property of the Town of Omro and the placing of that amount in its annual tax roll for the year 1907, and the Town Board of the said Town of Omro has regularly placed said amount of Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) appropriated for the repair of said bridge on the annual tax roll of said Town of Omro for the year 1907.

That the Trustees of the Village of Omro, in a meeting duly called and regularly assembled, did vote to join with the said Town of Omro, in the repair of said bridge, and did vote and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Dollars (\$600.00) to defray its proportionate shares of the expense of making such repairs to said bridge; that said sum of Six Hundred Dollars (\$600.00) so appropriated, has been included in the annual tax budget of said Village of Omro and placed upon the annual tax roll of the taxable property of said Village of Omro for the year 1907. That said sum of Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) so provided for by the Town of Omro, and said sum of Six Hundred Dollars (\$600.00) so provided for by the Village of Omro, aggregating in the whole Twenty-one Hundred Dollars (\$2,100.00) is one-half the estimated cost of making the necessary repairs to said Fox River bridge.

Fourth. Your petitioners further show in this behalf that the total assessed valuation of all the taxable property of said Town of Omro, according to its last equalized valuation, is the sum of One Million Six Hundred Seventy-eight Thousand Four Hundred Dollars (\$1,678,400.00) and that the assessed valuation of all the taxable property in said Village of Omro, according to its last equalized valuation, is the sum of Six Hundred Eighty-one Thousand Dollars (\$251,00.00) and that the sum of Twenty-one Hundred Dollars (\$2,100.00) provided by said Town of Omro as aforesaid for the payment of one-balf the cost of the repairs on said Fox River bridge, exceeds one-eighth of 1 per centum of all the taxable property in both said Town of Omro and said Village of Omro according to the last equalized assessed valuation of said Town of Omro and said Village of Omro.

Wherefore, your petitioners pray your honorable body, the County Board of Winnebago County, to appropriate the other half of the cost of such repairs to said Fox River bridge, to-wit:

The sum of Twenty-one Hundred Dollars (\$2,100.00) and cause such sum to be levied and assessed upon the taxable property of the County of Winnebago, subject to such assessment, which sum appropriated by said County of Winnebago, will with the amount provided by said Town of Omro and said Village of Omro, be sufficient to defray the expense of the repairs to said Fox River bridge, so petitioned for; and that such sum when collected

be paid out, as provided by law, for the repairs of said Fox River bridge, and further, that your Honorable Board take any and all such steps and acts and make all provisions that shall be necessary and proper to carry out the purpose, aim, and ends of this petition, in accordance with law, and so your petitioner will ever pray.

In witness whereof, your petitioners, the Town Board of Supervisors of the Town of Omro, Winnebago County, and the Board of Trustees of the Village of Omro, Winnebago County, have signed and presented this petition in their official capacity as such officers, of such municipalities, on this 18th day of November, A. D. 1907.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT OF THE AGRICULTURAL SCHOOL OF WINNERAGO COUNTY.

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Gentlemen: The County School Board takes pleasure in presenting the following report on the building and equipment of the Winnebago County School of Agriculture and Domestic Economy.

When the County Board at its session in March, 1907, voted to establish a School of Agriculture and Domestic Economy in this County, it conferred upon the people of the rural districts one of the sreatest benefits they have ever received. This is true because the school furnishes a practical education to a class of young men and women whom the high schools and colleges do not and can not reach.

The high schools train students for the professions, the office, the mercantile business, but they do not furnish the practical training for the farm, the bench, the shop or the home. The School of Agriculture and Domestic Economy does this and more, since it supplies academic training where this is necessary, to the individual student.

The County School Board feel that they have acted in the matter of supervising the building and equipment of the school, in a manner that will prove to be to the greatest advantage to the people of Winnebago County, inasmuch as they have secured at a minimum cost, a building which could not be duplicated at the present date, at a sum far exceeding the amount paid.

When the contract for constructing the building was let at \$20,560.00 to Thompson & Christianson of Fond du Lac, it was at a figure \$9,000.00 below the lowest bid of any other contractor. The building is near completion and the work has been well and ably done.

The state department made the statement before the matter was decided that it would require about \$35,000.00 to build and equip a school containing the three separate apartments of Manual Training, Agriculture and Domestic Economy, such as this County has built, and that if land was secured for a farm it would require much more. We have secured both land and building for a sum which will not

much exceed \$35,000.00, when completed.

The aim of the Board at all times has been to secure the best possible in building and equipment without unnecessary or extravagant expenditure of money.

The building, with its equipment, which you as a body have inspected, proves that in this, they have been successful.

In doing so we are pleased to note that during the year just closed nothing has occurred to detract from nor lessen the practical usefulness of the County Work House. The local management, under the experienced guidance of the Superintendent and Matron, Mr. and Mrs. Abrams, who have been at the helm from its inception to the present time, has been a sure guidance of success. They have never for a moment relaxed their zeal and faithfulness to duty. By firmness and watchful care, complete discipline, cleanliness, humane treatment and sanitation have been maintained, all aiding in the conclusion that the Work House has been and will be a continuous blessing to the taxpayers of the County, a panacea for and a protection from the "tramp nuisance" which menaced the County prior to its installation in 1896.

Our County Physician, Dr. F. Brockway, has made several visits for inspection but has not been called for sickness among inmates.



Resolved, By the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, that the proposal submitted by the German National Bank of Oshkosh being the most advantageous of the several proposals submitted, be and the same is hereby accepted, and the German National Bank of Oshkosh is designated as the County Depository; the following is a copy of said proposal:

"Pursuant to your notice and Section 693 of the Revised Statutes for the year 1898, we hereby submit the following proposals to-wit:

"We will receive on deposit the funds or moneys belonging to the County of Winnebago, Wisconsin, as made from time to time during the year 1903, and allow interest on daily balances at the rate of three and three-fourths (3%) per cent, per annum, the same to be computed monthly and placed to the credit of the County at the end of each month; the said funds or moneys so on deposit to be held subject to draft and payment at all times on demand and to furnish as security any bond to the County required by law.

"We furthermore agree to make no charge to the County or to its Treasurer for any exchange on drafts received or remitted, nor any collection charges on checks of the County or its Treasurer."

Supervisor Christoph offered the following Report, No. 25: To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Gentlemen: Your Committee on Illegal Assessments beg leave to report that they have under consideration the following petitions for caucellation of Tax Certificates. to-wit:

The petition of the Wisconsin Traction, Light, Heat and Power Company for the cancellation of certificates as follows:

Certificate No. 97. Sale of 1905; amount—\$23.38. Certificate No. 141. Sale of 1906; amount—\$26.90. Certificate No. 112. Sale of 1907; amount—\$25.18.

Affecting the following described lands, to-wit:

Beginning at the intersection of the North line of Lot 174 of Block "B" Town of the Island, Third Ward, City of Menasha, with the East-line of Washington street, running thence northerly along the East-line of said Block "B," 30 feet, thence East 80 feet parallel with the North line of said Lot 174, thence South 30 feet, thence West 80 feet, to the place of beginning; the petitioner represents that said tax certificates are illegal and void for the reason that the tract of land above described is not subject to taxation by said City of Menasha, on account of the fact that the same is a part of the street railway system of this company being used for storage purposes only, and has been so used for a period of about 10 years.

Further, that said property was so assessed and taxed in the face of the protest and contrary to the opinion of the City Attorney of said City.

Your committee, on examination of the facts relating to said Tax Certificates, find that the land described therein is the property of an Electric Street Railway Company, compelled by law to pay an annual license fee based on its earnings and exempt under the general Tax Law, under the provisions of Section 1222, C, D, E, of the Wisconsin Statutes of 1898, as amended by Chapter 354 of the Wisconsin Session Laws of 1899, and Chapter 197 of the Wisconsin Session Laws of 1903, and Chapter 493 of the Wisconsin Session Laws of 1905, viz: Section 1184 of the Revised Statutes of Wisconsin and the amendments thereto.

Your Committee would recommend that said tax certificates be cancelled and that the amount so paid for such certificates be refunded to W. F. Gruencwald and E. W. Thomas, the owners of said tax certificates, with the interest thereon at the rate of 7 per cent. per annum, from the date thereof, to-wit:

Petition of Jos. L. Fieweger for the cancellation of tax certificate No. 101. Sale of 1907; amount \$16.70, covering the following, to-wit:

MINORITY REPORT.

Supervisor Gustavus offered the following Minority Report, No. 34, as an Amendment to Report No. 33:

To the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

We, the undersigned members of the Equalization Committee do hereby respectfully report:

That the report of the other members of the Committee does an injustice to the City of Oshkosh.

We believe the people of Oshkosh are as willing to pay their fair share of the taxes as any other part of the County, and we believe that they approve of the endeavors of the last few years to have all property taxed at its full value, thus increasing the assessed and equalized value of all the towns and cities in the County. But the people of the City of Oshkosh are opposed to the changes in the assessed and equalized values which results in their being raised faster than other parts of the County, and consequently being compelled to bear a constantly increasing proportion of the taxes,

We call attention to the fact that there has been since the year 1904 a proportional greater increase in the equalized value of property in the City of Oshkosh than in any other part of the County.

In fact, this Board has, commencing with 1904, down to this year, added a proportionately larger share to Oshkosh's assessment than to any other part of the County.

The result is, that the last year's assessment Oshkosh was equalized at .44807 of the entire County property, as against .42813 in 1904.

This year it is proposed to again increase it to .4511. This constant higher proportionate increase against Oshkosh we do not believe is right or called for

We regret exceedingly that in the figures submitted to the Board to show that the assessment in Oshkosh for the present year was only 7% of the value, that there should have been included in the small list of small pieces of property one large and new institution which it is claimed is greatly under assessed. If this low assessment on this one piece of property were true, it would cut but a small fraction of 1 per cent. on the total valuation of the City of Oshkosh, but by using it in connection with a few other small pieces, it is so used as to deduct 7 or 8 per cent. from the assessed valuation which except for the inclusion of this one piece, on the figures of the Supervisor of Assessments himself for this year, would have shown property in the City of Oshkosh to have been assessed at 86 or 87 per cent.

We regret too, that time and opportunity has not been given us or the other efficers interested in the matter, to compare the assessed and true valuation in Oshkosh of a sufficient number of pieces of property to make the comparison a real basis for equalization.

If, for instance, twenty pieces are selected for comparison in the Town of Neenah, then to make an equally fair comparison for the City of Oshkosh we should have at least 600 or 800 pieces; or if twenty pieces are taken in Omro Village, we should have, to make an equally fair comparison in Oshkosh, at least 800 to 1,000 pieces.

Believing, as we do, that the proposed increase in the equalized value of the City of Oshkosh is not justified, but in a spirit of compromise, and for the sake of harmony and good feeling, we have concluded to report a basis of equalization which we believe is certainly fair to the other cities and the villages and towns of this County, though still higher than we believe it ought to be for the City of Oshkosh.

The equalization which we recommend and report in favor of is given below, together with the percentage of each town based on such equalization, viz:

Whereas, the County Superintendent of Schools certifies that the sum of Two Hundred (\$200.00) is necessary for stationery, printing and postage for one year; be it further

Resolved, By the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, that the sum of Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars, be and the same is hereby appropriated in accordance with Section 704, Wisconsin Statutes of 1898, to be paid in monthly payments during the year 1908, the same to be charged up and levied upon the taxable property of Winnebago County, except the cities of Oshkosh, Neenah and Menasha, and that the traveling expenses of such County Superintendent of Schools be paid as provided by Chapter 52 of the laws of 1901, amending Section 461-D, Wisconsin Statutes. In order to provide for the sum of Twenty-five and 50-100 (\$25.50) Dollars for a special fund for joint school district No. 5, Village and Town of Omro and joint school district No. 2, Village and Town of Winneconne, as provided in a resolution heretofore adopted by this Board; be it further

Resolved, By the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, that the sum of Twenty-five and 50-100 (\$25.50) Dollars be levied upon the

taxable property of said Winnebago County, except the cities of Oshkosh, Neenah and Menasha.

In order to provide for a fund to complete and equip the County School of Agriculture and Domestic Economy building at Winneconne, we recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, By the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County that the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars be levied upon the taxable property of said Winnebago County for completing and equipping said County School of Agriculture and Domestic Economy building at Winneconne.

Whereas, The County Board has voted to establish a County School of Agriculture and Domestic Economy at Winneconne, as provided by Chapter 231 of the Laws of Wisconsin, year 1901, as amended by Chapter 143 of the Laws of Wisconsin of 1903 and Chapter 540 of the Laws of Wisconsin 1907, and

Whereas, said School has been established and placed upon the approved list of Schools of Agriculture and Domestic Economy by the State Superintendent and the Dean of the College of Agriculture, and

Whereas, It is estimated by the County School Board that it will cost the sum of Six Thousand (\$6,000.00) Dollars to maintain and run the said school for the year ending June 30, 1908; and

Whereas, a Resolution has heretofore been adopted by this Board appropriating said sum of Six Thousand (\$6,000.00) Dollars; be it therefore

Resolved, By the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County that the sum of Six Thousand (\$6,000.00) Dollars be and the same is hereby levied upon the taxable property of said Winnebago County for the maintenance of said School as aforesaid.

INDIGENT SOLDIERS' FUND.

Your Finance Committee to whom was referred the report of the Indigent Soldiers' Commission, respectfully report that we have examined the same and compared it with the orders drawn and cancelled and find the same correct. We find the balance on hand in said fund to be Twenty-two (\$22.00) Dollars.

In order to provide a fund for the relief of the Indigent Soldiers of Winnebago County for the ensuing year, your Committee recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, By the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County that the sum of Six Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$6,500.00) be and the same is hereby appropriated as a fund for the relief of the indigent soldiers of Winnebago County for the year 1908, and the Clerk of this County Board is hereby authorized and instructed to levy said amount upon the taxable property of said Winnebago County.

RESIDENCE OF INMATES OF COUNTY POOR FARM.

Supervisor Koplitz offered Resolution No. 1, as follows:

Whereas, It is a well-known fact that persons have been committed to Winnebago County Poor House as County charges when they should have been committed as residents of the different towns, villages and cities of the county in which they have their places of residence. All of which tends to show that they were wrongfully committed and an injustice thereby done to the County as a whole. Now, therefore, be it

Resolved, By the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County that the Poor and Poor Farm Committee be and they hereby are requested to investigate this said matter of the residence of the inmates of the said County Poor House, and with special reference to those classed as County charges; and that they do make and report to this Board the names of all persons or inmates classified as charges against the County with their places of residence.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MUNICIPAL COURT.

Supervisor Parker offered Report No. 2, as follows:

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

The undersigned, your Special Committee, to whom was referred the Municipal Court Matter for Menasha and Neenah, at the November session of this Board, to report at this the March Session, as to the advisability of establishing said court, as provided by Chapter 651 of the Laws of Wisconsin for the year 1907, respectfully report as follows:

First: That we had the same under consideration from a financial standpoint, and in order to arrive at the cost and expense of the Justices of the Peace for said Neenah and Menasha, we have taken four years, that is to say, two years during hard times next preceding the establishment of the Work House and we find the amounts paid by Winnebago County during said two years preceding the Work House, to the Justice of Menasha and Neenah, to be \$10,043.78. We deducted one-half from this amount in order to make allowance for tramp and vagrant cases, leaving a balance of \$5,021.89, add to this the amounts paid said justices for the last past two years, amounting to \$920.09, making a total for said four years of \$5,941.98. We divided said last amount by four, which makes an average of \$1,439.49½ per year for said four years. Figuring on a salaried basis for said Judge, of \$1,500.00 per year, we are of the opinion that it would be a saving to the County inasmuch that said Judge would be required to pay over all fees received by him to the County Treasurer of said County; and other savings would be made, such as cases now being tried in Oshkosh Courts could now be tried in the new court when established and would thereby save considerable by way of witnesses, and there would not be the distance to travel, say nothing as to the convenience such a court would be to the citizens and tax payer.

We further report that the city authorities are willing to furnish court room in both city halls of Menasha and Neenah, free of charge.

Your Committee therefore recommends the establishment of said court upon a reasonable basis and that the resolution offered in the November session be passed.

JURORS FOR MUNICIPAL COURT.

Whereas, The law establishing a Municipal Court for the City of Oshkosh and County of Winnebago, provides that Jurors for said Court shall be drawn exclusively from the City of Oshkosh; and

Whereas, The County of Winnebago pays two-thirds of the expense of maintaining said Court; and

Whereas, The ends of justice will be as well subserved by selecting jurors from the County at large. Therefore, be it

Resolved, By the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, Wisconsin, that it is the sense of this Board that Section 8 of Chapter 24, Laws of 1325, (the law establishing said Court) which provides for the selection of Jurors for said Court to be amended in such a manner as to provide for the selection of Jurors in conformity with Sections 2533 A, 2533 B, 2533 C, and 2533 D, and in any and all other respects as is now provided for the drawins, summoning, paying and other acts incident thereto, of Jurors in the Circuit Courts. And be it further

Resolved, That a request be made of each member of the Legislature from this County (by sending them a copy of this Resolution) to use every honorable means to bring about the passage of the aforesaid amendment.



INVESTIGATION OF COMPLAINT OF WORK HOUSE.

Supervisor Kellogg offered Report No. 7, as follows:

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County: .

Gentlemen: Your Committee on Work House, to whom was referred the matter of the investigation of complaint against the Super-intendent of Work House, Mr. Robert Abrams, as requested by Mr. Abrams and as provided by resolution of this Board, beg leave to report as follows:

Your Committee made a complete investigation of the charges; called before the Committee witnesses and examined them, and from such investigation, your Committee beg leave to report:

That they found the charges preferred unfounded; that no cruelty or harsh treatment was used toward any of the inmates.

That the inmates were and are well fed and cared for.

That the Work House is excellently managed in every respect, and the management and conduct of the institution meets with the approval of the Committee.

ABSTRACT SYSTEM.

Supervisor Ream offered Report No. 8, as follows:

To the Honorable, the County Board of Winnebago County:

Gentlemen: Your Special Committee on the Abstract System, appointed at the November Session, beg leave to report as follows:

That the contract for the installing of the Abstract System was let to Mr. Ralph Adams on the 7th day of March, 1907, and is being carried on with dispatch, and your Committee is informed by the Contractor that the work will be completed and the system turned over to Winnebago County within a period of about two months from date. According to the above contract monthly payments of \$550.00 have been made and the total amount of \$6,050.00 has been paid to said Contractor, leaving unpaid on the contract, \$6,875.00.

Your Committee beg leave to further report that during the process of the carrying out of said contract the Committee's attention

was called to the fact that, in order to make a complete abstract of title of the records of Winnebago County, it would be necessary to gather data from the proceedings of the City Council of Oshkosh, from the City Council of Neenah and Menasha, and also from the proceedings of the County Board of Winnebago County in reference to the vacation of streets and alleys, and provision for this additional work was not made in the contract entered into with the Contractor, the Committee entered into an arrangement with the Contractor whereby he should gather the necessary data and he charged Winnebago County for such work only the actual cost.

Your Committee found further on proceeding with said work that the contract entered into with the Contractor provided that all irregular descriptions that would occur in the preparation of the abstract were to be entered into the Miscellaneous Index. The Committee's attention was further called to this fact by the Contractor, and it was found that a complete chain of title could not be made by having the irregular descriptions above referred to in the Miscellaneous Index; that it would perfect the System to have the irregular descriptions traced out or chained by the Contractor and thereupon entered upon the regular tract indices in the same manner as the regular descriptions. This change in the work entailed extra expense, but the Committee entered into an arrangement with the Contractor whereby this extra work was to be completed and a perfect chain of title furnished for the actual cost of doing such work.

Your Committee beg leave to further report that they have paid to the Contractor on account of such extra work \$500.00 and that there will still be due on account of such extras upon the completion of the contract a sum in the neighborhood of \$2,500.00.

Your Committee further report that the contract entered into with the Contractor provided that if the Committee should deem it advisable that the Committee, acting for the Board, could secure the services of an expert Abstractor to inspect the work of the Contractor upon its completion.

Your Committee begs leave to further report that, from an extended investigation of Abstract Systems that are being conducted in other counties, it will be advisable for the County Board to provide for a competent Abstractor to have charge of the abstract work, and your Committee would recommend that the work of issuing abstracts be deferred until such time that the County Board of Winnebago County, by resolution, provide for the placing of the Register of Deeds on a salary and that provision be made in such resolution at such time for an additional Deputy Register of Deeds or Assistant to have charge of the Abstract work and also an additional copyist, and your Committee would further recommend that the aforesaid Deputy or Assistant, although appointed by the Register of Deeds, should be subject to

the confirmation of the County Board, and that a sufficient salary be provided to insure the procuring of a competent Abstractor, said Depnty Register or Assistant so provided for, when appointed, to continue under such appointment, subject to the action of the County Board or deposed for inefficiency or for other sufficient cause. That the said Deputy Register of Deeds or Assistant, give a sufficient bond to be fixed by the County Board covering the Abstract Department, and that the bond of the Register of Deeds be fixed so as not to cover the abstract work, as the Committee, from their wide investigation, feel that the success of the System will depend largely upon the character and competency of the person placed in charge of the Abstract Department. In the event that the County Board can enter into some satisfactory arrangement with the present Register of Deeds to accept the salary provided for by the Board for such Register for the continuation of his term, that the work of issuing abstracts proceed at once upon the completion of the abstract system.

Your Committee would further recommend that, after the wide investigation made by your Committee, that the County Board should establish a scale of fees to be charged for the issue of said abstracts, and would recommend that such scale be not less than twenty-five cents per entry, or, in the event of entries in such abstract containing proceedings of Probate Court or other entries of unusual length, that the charge for such entries be made at the rate of ten cents per folio. Also that the Abstractor charge One Dollar for certifying to each abstract.

Your Committee beg leave to further report that the authority vested in the Special Committee, while it was the intention and generally understood that such authority was broad enough to warrant the Committee in undertaking any work necessary in reference to the above contract, upon investigation the Committee has some doubts as to whether the authority originally vested in such Special Committee was sufficiently broad to warrant the entering into the agreement with the Contractor for the completion of the extra work above referred to in this report and the payment of the \$500.00 which the Committee has paid the said Contractor, and also for the making of future payments for such extra work, and the Committee is also in doubt as to whether the original authority vested in them as such Special Committee would warrant their employing an expert Abstractor to inspect the work of the Contractor, and your Committee recommends that some appropriate resolution be presented and passed enlarging the authority of the Special Committee so as to give them power to undertake the aforesaid work.

Your Committee would also recommend that some reasonable regulation be considered by the Board as to the prohibiting of the use of pen and ink in the vault of the Register of Deeds' office or in copying from the records in the Register of Deeds' office.

SHERIFF'S SALARY.

Supervisor Ganzer offered Report No. 9, as follows:

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Gentlemen: Your Committee on Bonds and Salaries, to whom was referred Resolution No. 8, passed at the November Session, directing said Committee to equalize the salaries of the Sheriff, Under Sheriff, Jailer and Deputy, and also directing that all further business of the Sheriff of Winnebago County be transacted strictly in accordance with Chapter 126 and 217 of the Laws of 1901.

Now, therefore, your Committee do hereby beg leave to report and recommend the passage of the following resolution:

Resolved, By the County Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County, that the salary of the Sheriff, Under Sheriff and Jailer be fixed in accordance with the following schedule and the following schedule of salaries, to take effect and be in force from and after January 1, 1909: Sheriff, per annum, \$4,800.00; Under Sheriff, per annum, \$1,000.00; Deputy Sheriff, per annum, \$1,000.00; Deputy Sheriff, acting as Jailer, \$600.00. The above schedule includes the number of deputies shall be appointed by the Sheriff and to be paid by Winnebago County; all other deputies shall be paid by the Sheriff. The above schedule shall be for all services rendered by the said Sheriff of Winnebago County, Under Sheriff, and his Deputies for said County for any and all work that may come before him and which he and they are supposed to do according to law within the State of Wisconsin; said salaries as aforesaid to be paid strictly in accordance with Chapter 317 of the Laws of Wisconsin for the year 1901. Be it further

Resolved, That said salaries shall be paid at the end of each month, and said Sheriff shall keep accurate books of account, in which shall be entered from day to day in a journal, the items of service and the fees and name of the particular proceeding, transaction, or action in which the same is rendered, and shall carry the items of charges into a Ledger Account with proper reference to such journal entries, and that he shall pay to the County Treasurer all fees, per diem and other emoluments of whatever kind received by him and shall at the end of each quarter of the year file with the County Clerk, to be laid before the County Board, a sworn statement of all such fees, per diem and emoluments collected by him or for him during the quarter of the year, and all the expense of his office during such time. And said salaries of said Sheriff, Under Sheriff and Deputy as aforesaid, shall be paid in lieu of all fees, per diem and compensation for services rendered by them except for keeping and maintaining prisoners in the County Jail, and except for actual expense of conveyance of prisoners upon arrest, and except that for all services rendered outside of the State of Wisconsin. Said Sheriff shall be allowed such compensation as given by Chapter 126 of the Laws of the State of Wisconsin for the year 1901. Be it further

Resolved, That the above and foregoing schedule of salaries be and remain the salaries of the Sheriff of Winnebago County, the Under Sheriff and Deputy Sheriff, acting as Jailer, until the County Board further fixes the amounts thereof as provided by Section 2 of the Chapter 376 of the Laws of 1907.

COMPENSATION OF CLERK OF COURT.

Supervisor Ganzer offered Report No. 10, as follows:

To the Honorable, the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Gentlemen: Your Committee on Bonds and Salaries to whom was referred Resolution No. 23, at the November Session directing your Committee on Bonds and Salaries to change the method of compensating the Clerk of the Circuit Court from the fee system to a salary in lieu of all fees, and further directing that all business of the Clerk of the Court be transacted strictly in accordance with Chapter 411 of the Laws of the State of Wisconsin for the year 1901.

Now, therefore, your Committee on Bonds and Salaries, to whom was referred said resolution as aforesaid, do hereby beg leave to report and recommend the passage of the following resolution:

Resolved, By the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County that the present method of compensating the Clerk of the Circuit Court be changed from the fee system to a salary system and that after the first day of January, 1909, the Clerk of the Circuit Court of Winnebago County receive compensation as provided by Chapter 411 of the Laws of Wisconsin for the year 1901. Be it further

Resolved. That the salary of the Clerk of the Circuit Court and his deputy be fixed according to the following schedule: Clerk of the Circuit Court, per annum, \$1,600.00; Deputy, per annum, \$900.00; said schedule of salaries to take effect January 1, 1900. Be it further

Resolved. That the aforesaid salaries be paid at the end of each month in the same manner as the salaries of the other County officers are paid, and that the Clerk of the Circuit Court shall keep accurate books of account in which shall be entered from day to day in a journal, the items of services and fees and the name of the particular proceeding, transaction or action in which the same is rendered, and shall carry the items of charges into a ledger account with proper references to such journal entries, and he shall pay to the County Treasurer all fees, per diem and other emoluments of any other kind received by him and shall, at the end of each quarter of

the year, file with the County Clerk, to be laid before the County Board, a sworn statement of all such fees, per diem and emoluments collected by him or for him during the quarter of the year, and all the expenses of his office during such time, and the salaries of the Clerk of the Circuit Court and his Deputy so paid, shall be in lieu of all fees, per diem and compensation for services rendered by them, and; be it further

Resolved, That the schedule of salaries hereby fixed shall be and remain the salaries of the Clerk of the Circuit Court and his deputy until further action thereupon by the County Board, as provided by Section 2 of Chapter 376 of the Laws of 1907.

Your Committee on Bonds and Salaries further beg leave to report that Fred Badger, Clerk of the Circuit Court of Winnebago County, has entered into an agreement, in writing, attached hereto, wherein and whereby the said Fred Badger as such Clerk of the Court on behalf of himself and his Deputy Clerk of Court, has agreed to accept and does accept the change in the method of compensating him, the said Clerk of the Circuit Court, and his said Deputy, as provided for in the resolution above recommended; that said agreement on the part of Fred Badger is attached hereto.

OPINION OF DISTRICT ATTORNEY ON FEES TO CHIEF OF POLICE OF OSHKOSH.

District Attorney Foulkes offered Report No. 12½, as requested, as follows:

To the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County:

Gentlemen: Referring to matter upon which request was made by you that I report to the Board on Friday morning as to an explanation why bills were coming in to the Board from the Police Department for service of criminal warrants, etc., and other matters in reference thereto, when the contract with the Sheriff of Winnebago County covers the service of all papers in criminal cases, and upon which I made an oral report this morning (Friday), and calling attention of the Board to the fact that I would put my remarks in writing so that they would appear in the proceedings of the County Board, heg leave to say:

That while it is true that the contract with the Sheriff of Winne-bago county covers all matters upon which bills come into the County Board from the Police Department, I call the attention of the Board to the fact that in many instances the police make arrests for violations of the state laws, without warrant, and the offenders are later brought into court and the police officer makes complaint and warrant is served in the court room; and of course in those cases they make the return; and that is one of the items for which bills are presented to the Board. This cannot well be avoided as the police officers have authority to make arrests without warrants when crimes are committed in their presence.

I would further state that in some of the other cases bills come in to the Board because the police are the guardians of the peace of the City of Oshkosh, and when violations of the law are committed, as an illustration, burglaries or larcenies committed at night, those are reported to the police at once by the proper persons and the police start at once to take steps to apprehend the criminals. This would not permit the time in many cases for the matter being taken up with the Sheriff's department, and the police frequently make arrests in those cases; and they also serve the warrants in those cases; and I consider this to be a proper charge to be allowed by the County Board under those c'roumstances.

In some other cases matters are laid before the police department and the police do the investigating and have all the facts in their possession, and in those cases it is deemed advisable to let the police make the arrests. In one particular case that was called to my attention by the Board, the Chief of Police made a trip to Milwaukee and apprehended an offender for committing larceny.

In that case the matter was brought before the police department and the Chief of Police, upon doing some detective work, located the party in Milwaukee, and he was in possession of the facts, and under the circumstances presumably the proper person to make the arrest. In all cases in which criminal prosecutions are started from the District Attorney's office, I think without any exceptions warrants were placed in the hands of the Sheriff; but in cases that are started from the District Attorney's office they are usually for offenses that have been committed at some previous time and there is no particular haste to get the officer on the track of the criminals. In a very few instances I have had the police officers serve subpoences in criminal cases, but

this was done because there were witnesses that had to be subpoenaed at once, and in most of the cases the Court was waiting for the witnesses to be brought in, and, in order to expedite matters and not keep the Court waiting, those subpoenaes were placed in the hands of the police officers who were in the building.

Trusting this satisfactorily answers all your inquiries, I am

Whereas, the Special Committee on the Abstract System have reported to this Board that the contract entered into with Ralph Adams for the installing of an Abstract System is nearing completion and that there may be necessary some extra work to furnish a complete and proper system which will require extra compensation, and

Whereas, the original specifications and contract with the aforesaid contractor provided that the Special Committee could procure an expert abstractor to pass upon the work of the contractor if they deemed it advisable; Now therefore, we recommend and report to the Board for adoption the following Resolution:

"Be It Resolved, By the Board of Supervisors of Winnebago County: That the Special Abstract Committee be continued with the powers it now possesses, and with power to call upon the District Attorney for an opinion upon any question arising before them, and to take any further legal advice they may deem necessary or proper, and with the further authority to employ some competent person or expert abstractor to inspect the work of the contractor and to inspect and pass upon the question of whether any and all extras that may be claimed are properly chargeable as extras or are covered by the original contract and should be performed by the contractor under his said contract, and that upon receiving opinion of their legal advisers and the decision of such expert abstractor, and if it be found that any and all of the extras, so called, are proper charges as extras, that the Committee be and they hereby are empowered to pay for one-half of the extras, in their opinion found to be properly chargeable as extras, and that the same be paid for on the certificate of said Committee by an order signed by the Chairman of the County Board and the County Clerk, as is provided for other payments under said contract, and that the claim for said extras shall not be further paid until presented to and allowed by the County Board of Supervisors, and any advance or payment on said extras shall not be deemed an acceptance thereof, or an admission of any liability therefor, and if the Board shall disallow said claim for extras or any part thereof said contractor shall refund all moneys advanced in excess of the amount of extras allowed by said Board, and that before part payment thereupon the County officers may require a receipt showing the money advanced is received with such understanding and agreement. And it is further

Resolved, That the Special Abstract Committee be given full power to do any and all things required to be done, other than as provided for in this Resolution, and to make any and all payments in reference to the final completion, perfection and acceptance of the Abstract System; and the proper County officers shall pay for the same in proper County orders, in payment thereof on the certificate of said Committee therefor. And it is further

Resolved, That the Committee aforesaid, as a part of the authority vested in it, is empowered to purchase a typewriter proper for the compiling of the Abstract System, and pay therefor.

Resolved, That the aforesaid salaries shall be paid at the end of each month in the same manner as the other County officers are paid, and that the Register of Deeds shall keep accurate books of account in which shall be entered from day to day in a journal the items of services and the fees therefor, and the name of the particular transaction or action in which the same is rendered, and shall carry the items of charges into a ledger account with proper reference to such journal entries, and he shall pay to the County Treasurer all fees, per diem and other emoluments of any kind received by him, and shall at the end of each quarter of the year file with the County Clerk, to be laid before the County Board, a sworn statement of all such fees, per diem, and emoluments collected by him, or for him, during the quarter of the year, and all the expenses of his office during said time, and the salaries of the Register of Deeds, his deputies and copyists, so paid, shall be in lieu of all fees, per diem and compensation for services rendered by them. Be it further

Resolved, That the method of compensating the Register of Deeds as aforesaid, shall go into effect January 1, 1909.

RULES OF THE COUNTY BOARD

ADOPTED NOVEMBER 13, 1907.

- 1. The meetings of this Board shall be held in the Supervisors' room, and the hour for the daily meetings shall be 9 A. M., providing that on the first meeting in each week the hour of meeting shall be 10 A. M.
- II. At the first meeting of the Board it shall be the duty of the Chairman, or in his absence, the Clerk, to call to order.

The Clerk shall then call the roll of Members.

A quorum being present, the Board shall proceed to the election of a Chairman.

- III. It shall be the duty of the Chairman to appoint the following standing committees: Equalization, Finance, General Accounts, Illegal Assessments, Justice and Constables' Accounts, Sheriff and Coroners' Accounts, Insane, Poor and Poor Farm, Work House, Corporations, Roads and Bridges, Public Buildings Printing, Per Diem and Mileage, Bonds and Salaries.
- IV. The Board may adjourn for such time as shall be necessary for the Chairman to prepare the list of committees, and no business can be done until the same shall be announced.
- V. The Chairman shall take the chair at the hour to which the Board may from time to time stand adjourned, call the Board to order and direct the calling of the roll of members by the Clerk.
- VI. Upon the appearance of a quorum, the journal of the preceding day shall be read by the Clerk, and any mistake therein shall be corrected by the Board; provided, that upon the last day of the session, the journal for that day will be read and, before the final adjournment, corrected.
- VII. After the reading and correction of the journal, the order of business shall be as follows:
 - 1. Reception of Petitions, Memorials, Accounts, etc.
 - 2. Presentation of Resolutions and disposition of same.
 - 3. Reports of Standing ommittees.
 - 4. Reports of Select Committees.
 - 5. Consideration of Miscellaneous Business.
- VIII. The Chairman shall preserve order and decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Board; and shall clearly and distinctly state every motion or question before debate
- IX. The Chairman shall vote on all questions taken by ayes and nays, except on appeals from his own decisions; provided, that when the effect of such a vote shall be to produce a tie, the question shall be deemed to be lost; and providing that in the order of voting, his name shall be called last.
- X. Every motion or amendment shall be reduced to writing when a request therefor shall be made by any member; and all petitions, memorials and substitutes shall be reduced to writing and read before they shall be considered by the Board.
- XI. Every written resolution shall have attached thereto the name of the per son introducing it; and when referred to a committee, the names of such committee shall be endorsed thereon.
 - XII. Every member, previous to speaking, shall rise and address the Chair.
- XIII. When two or more members rise at once, the Chair shall designate the member who is to speak first; but in all cases the member who shall first rise and address the chair shall speak first.

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XIV. No member shall speak more than twice upon the same question without leave; and when called to order by the Chairman, shall take his seat, and shall not be allowed to proceed without leave of the Board.

XV. A vote on any question shall be taken by ayes and nays when called for by five members; and shall be so taken on all questions involving the expenditure of money; and whenever a vote is so ordered and taken, the members voting in the affirmative and negative, as well as those absent or not voting, shall be recorded at length in the records of the proceedings of the County Board.

XVI. No account or claim against the county shall be audited unless it be made out in items and duly verified and be filed with the Clerk of the Board, except as otherwise provided by law.

XVII. When a motion is under consideration, no motion shall be entertained except:

- 1 To adjourn.
- 2. To lay on the table.
- 3. For the previous question.
- 4. To postpone to a day certain.
- 5 To commit to a committee.
- 6. To amend or to substitute.

7. To postpone indefinitely.

These several motions shall take precedence in the order in which they stand in this rule.

XVIII. A motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, and for the previous question shall be decided without debate, except as hereinafter provided.

XIX. A motion to postpone indefinitely or to a day certain or to commit shall not be again entertained on the same day or in the same stage of the proposition.

XX. A substitute shall be open to amendment the same as the original proposition; but when adopted, shall not be subject to amendment. If an amendment or substitute is lost, another substantially the same shall not be entertained.

XXL When a motion or question has once been determined, any member voting with the majority may move a reconsideration of the vote, but such motion shall be made and acted on at the same or next succeeding meeting, and shall not thereafter be made except by unanimous consent.

XXII. The previous question may be moved by any member, and the Chairman shall then say: "It requiring five members to second this motion those in favor of sustaining the motion will rise." If five or more members then rise, the previous question shall thereby be seconded and an opportunity then be given to any two members opposed thereto to briefly state their objections. The question shall then be, "Shall the question be now put?" which, if carried by a vote of two-thirds of the members present upon a call of the ayes and nays, the Board shall immediately proceed to vote upon the pending amendment, if any, and upon the main question.

.XXIII. In filling blanks, the largest sum and the longest time shall be first

XXIV. These rules shall not be changed, amended, or repealed unless the proposition or amendment is introduced in writing and the same laid over to some subsequent meeting of the Board, not less than five days intervening, and then only with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

XXV. Any of these rules may be suspended upon any pending measure by unanimous consent or by two-thirds of the members present.

XXVI. These rules and all amendments or additions thereto which may hereafter be made shall govern the Board until altered or repealed, as herein provided.

XXVII. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in "Jefferson's Manual," so far as they remain in common use and are practicable and applicable and pelt iehsoehntnir, wiconsishall govern the Board.


